Their key services include home visits by its 4 MND nurses, financial assistance towards home help and the supply of specialised equipment on loan. The IMNDA also funds and promotes research into the causes and treatment of MND. Pieta House first opened its doors in Lucan County Dublin in 2006. Since then, they have helped over 60,000 people in suicidal distress or engaging in self harm. They operate 20 locations across the country, and they now employ over 200 therapists and support staff, and the demand for their services is increasing.

It's the talk of the town

CHINK IN DOOR FOR RETURN OF ANNALS OF INISFALLEN

The long term goal of bringing back the Annals of Inisfallen, the principal record of Munster History written largely on the Lower Lake isle of learning has gathered a whole new momentum thanks to ClIr Niall Kelleher, former minister Jimmy Deenihan and maybe even this column which has been pursuing the matter.

The motion to set up a formal committee by Niall Kelleher who as president of the Chamber of Commerce and Tourism sees the tourism spin-off is being matched too by former minister Jimmy Deenihan who is now President of the Kerry Archaeological and Historical Society.

The venerable KAHS are now requesting a formal invitation to the Bodleian where the Killarney manuscript is only one among many of the Oxford Library's vast collection.

This is the time to strike.

Not only does Killarney now have a secure place in the form of Killarney House to store the annals, but there is also now the global recognition that important local artifacts are best viewed in their native places. This is true of the Elgin marbles or of Inisfallen and items are being returned worldwide particularly stolen goods.

There has been an interesting response from Oxford and it is the first ever such comprehensive response.

The Bodleian stresses the manuscript was not acquired illegally

From the time it passed into the possession of Sir James Ware (1594-1666), the Irish historian and politician, it passed through several intermediate owners to Richard Rawlinson (1690-1755), who bequeathed his great collection to the University of Oxford. "There is no suggestion that Ware acquired his manuscripts illegally. Indeed, in collecting Irish manuscripts, he had been helped by Irish scholars of the calibre of Dubhaltach Mac Fhirbhisigh," the Bodleian says.

It also makes the point that the annals are accessible on line now:

"The Annals of Inisfallen manuscript was gifted to the Bodleian Libraries by Richard Rawlinson more than 250 years ago, and while the physical item remains in our care, it is freely accessible online, in high resolution on our Digital Bodleian platform, enabling us to both preserve this important piece of history and make it accessible to all - regardless of their geographic location. Digital access to this precious piece allows it to be used for a wide variety of purposes, such as learning, teaching, research and the enjoyment of all."

And they also say that Trinity in Dublin has a number of English Medieval manuscripts. But the chink in the door is the last paragraph of the statement to me which says if a formal



Killarney House would be the perfect place to store the annals.

Governmental approach is made, then the door will be opened in the form of a repatriation committee:

"The Bodleian Libraries have not been approached by the Irish Government nor the Government's Arts and Heritage Minister with a request to have the Annals returned to Ireland. The University of Oxford does have a policy on repatriation and any decision would be made by the University's Council (its governing body) following advice received from those responsible for the collection of which this item is a part.

As a member of a national and international academic and museums community, Oxford would make its decision in the context both of its own procedural guidelines and its appreciation of the wider context. "

All our TDs now - especially our Minister need to be pressurised for a formal request. There has never been a greater opportunity.

LOCAL COUNCIL COMMENDS PARK

There is a new rapprochement between the council and the national park and it is to be welcomed. The turf fight of the days of yore seems truly over in Killarney. A motion by councillor Niall Kelleher asked that his council write to "the local management" of the NPWS to commend them on the many works carried out in the National Park in 2021.

"There has been a massive notable improvement and while there is a lot of work to be done, a very good start has been made," he said.

He is not the only one. Speaking recently with a leading member of the Tidy Towns and Meitheal groups, there was high praise for outgoing manager Seamus Hassett who is being promoted and leaving Killarney.

"There is a great working relationship with the park," the man said. As well as sprucer gardens in Muckross, better paths, a wellcultivated relationship with volunteers, there are the houses done up all around the park including the painstaking work currently underway at Gate Lodge at the New Entrance - and much was to the credit of Seamus Hassett, the busy Killarney man said.

We wish Mr Hassett well in his new position. Who knows, he may return to Killarney in an exalted guise some day.

THE AGE OLD PROBLEM OF LITTER

The huge question of litter is on our minds in advance of the Spring Clean. It is worth recalling how pre-pandemic the Tidy Towns took 120 bags from the wood near the old electric mill alongside the Flesk River on Mill Road. That amounted to almost a tonne of dumped household waste from cat food to vegetable scrapings.

A few weeks later bags were again being dumped and a stakeout led to a prosecution. Litter is destroying our parks and regularly there is now open roadside dumping. The extent of the problem has been outlined by council officers who are finding it increasingly difficult to catch the culprits.

People who litter here "are getting cuter" and it is increasingly difficult to identify those dumping their waste on public and private property.

Kerry County Council received 885 litter complaints between January and December 2021, some 121 fines were issued to perpetrators who were identified.

However, less than half the litter fines have been paid to date. Ten court prosecutions on litter have been brought.

The trend is continuing, In January of this year alone almost 100 litter complaints were notified, the last meeting of Killarney Municipal District was told.

When it came to dumping of waste, the council investigated 355 complaints in 2021 and took one prosecution. This January it has investigated 18 complaints of illegal dumping. Amid calls by mayor of Killarney, Marie Moloney, to step up litter and dog fouling fines, director of services Ger O'Brien said the council was "100 percent committed to tackling litter" :

"Regrettably for more and more of the waste dumped, there is zero evidence for us to pursue. People have got cuter, people have got wiser. Before people would leave a name and address. Unfortunately, those days are gone," Mr O'Brien said.

Not every tree can have a cctv camera, but stake-outs by committed Tidy Town and other volunteers may be the way forward.

KERRY COMMUNITY RESPONSE FORUM ESTABLISHED

n interagency group has been established in Kerry to coordinate Athe response to the arrival of Ukrainian refugees in the county. The group, which held its first meeting this morning, includes a wide range of statutory, community, and voluntary agencies as well as representatives of the HSE and the Department of Social Protection.

The Kerry Community Response Forum will meet regularly to share information, coordinate responses, identify needs and target resources to refugees who have already arrived in Kerry and others expected to arrive to the county over the coming weeks.

The interagency group will work closely to ensure that refugees receive a range of supports, interventions and advice for the foreseeable future and will ensure that this can be achieved in a targeted and efficient manner.

Included in the new group are representatives of the HSE, Kerry County Council, An Garda Síochána, the Department of Social Protection, Kerrv Education and Training



Board, the community and voluntary sector, local development companies, Kerry Chambers, local transport providers, and organisations working with refugees in the county including the Killarney Immigrant Support Centre and the Tralee International Resource Centre.





Today, as Kerry's first citizen, I say thank you, on behalf of the people of Kerry for all you that you have done and continue to do." The event was addressed by representatives of the HSE. An Garda Síochána, and business and community organisations. The flag at the Ashe Memorial Hall was lowered to half mast in memory of those who died and in tribute to those who continue to suffer the effects of the pandemic.



A GUIDE TO SCREEN USE

Many people worry that viewing a screen can damage their eyes. There is no evidence of this. In fact, because you can alter the size, brightness and contrast of the display, it can easier and more comfortable to see on a screen compared with looking at things on paper. However, some people find that looking at a screen for a long time is tiring and may find wearing glasses for computer use helpful.

Special protective coatings can be put on glasses lenses to help against eye fatigue from digital screens. Such coatings include blue light blocking lenses. These can help reduce glare for more comfortable and relaxed vision, create better contrast perception, offering a more natural colour experience

Here are some ways to look after your eyes while using your screen: •Apply the 20-20-20 rule – every 20 minutes look at something 20 feet away for 20 seconds. That will give your eye muscles a rest.

•Try to blink regularly. Focusing on a screen may make you blink less, which may make your eyes dry and uncomfortable. •Position your computer screen so that: it is between 40 and 76 centimetres (16 to 30 inches) from your eyes.

•the top is level with, or slightly below, your eyes.

•it is tilted away from you at a 10- to 20-degree angle.

•there are no distracting reflections, e.g. from a window.

Once you have adjusted your screen, adjust the font size so it's easy to read.

Use document holders for reading or reference materials. Place them close to the screen at the same distance from your eyes. This will enable your eyes to remain focused as they move between the screen and the documents.

Use a character size that is easy to see. The character size is an important factor since it determines the distance at which you prefer to view the monitor



HOGAN HEARTBREAK FOR

ST. BRENDANS Hogan Cup Final:

Naas CBS 3-14 St. Brendans 2-15 No-one could have asked any more of any of them, every single player, all of a completely unified management, the school itself that backed them all the way, or the droves of supporters who turned out in style to do both the team and themselves proud.

It took a great team to beat them. And let there be absolutely no begrudgery there; that was a genuinely great Naas team. They were class all the way. As a matter of fact, it may have been the best Hogan Cup Final I have ever seen - it's a final where tension tends to make the play somewhat stilted and defensive more often than not. That didn't happen in this case, far from it. Both sides played positive, front foot football. They trusted their players to go man on man. No precious hoarding of possession. They took each other on, drove forward, and went for scores. Much has rightly been made of a superb flash of skill by Luke Crowley in the second half with a behind-the-back hop to fox a defender (I was even more taken by the way he spun neatly between two attempted tacklers seconds later) - it typified the approach of both sides.

That skill and daring was evident from the very start5. Naas' dangerman Kevin Cummins was narrowly wide but after gathering from Jack McKevitt he confidently opened the scoring – I suspect that he was considering a goal attempt. One number fifteen clearly had a whiff of danger – the other quickly showed that he was just as lethal, with Will Shine evading his marker with ease and coolly firing over two points to put the Sem in front. The aforementioned Crowley was denied by a brilliant block by Robert Fitzgerald (that was a great duel all through, just about edged by the outstanding Glenflesk man), and instead Gavin Thompson landed a long range monster to level matters at 0-2 apiece.

Naas were winning that bit more possession, helped by the incredible distance in their goal kicks – David McPartlin was able to bypass midfield entirely and land missiles down on the Sem's half backs. The defence handled the pressure well, though, and it was Cian Foley who drove forward to kick the next score.

Danger always threatened, though. Kevin Cummins fumbled a good goal chance, Cian lynch doling well to clear his lines, but it was a bit like King Canute fighting the tide. Forward again came Naas, and this time Cummins made no mistake after gathering from Cian Boran, slotting adroitly past a hapless Aaron O'Sullivan.

The Sem upped their game considerably, but could only convert two out of five chances, Shine and Foley on target. Level pegging.

Given that Naas had the benefit of the wind, the Sem would have had ben fairly happy with that. Unfortunately, in the end of the first half, it was the Leinster champions who found an extra gear and extracted full benefit. Niall Dolan slottesd over to put them back in front. The Sem almost got in for a goal, but Mikey Moriarty's goal effort was blocked by the outstanding Fitzgerald, with Darragh Fleming's '45 trailing just wide.

Nass exploded into life, scoring a rapid 1-2 in as many minutes. Superb combination play by Dara Crowley and Colm Dalton teed it up for Fionn Cooke, who again gave Aaron O'Sullivan no chance. Will Shine once more cut the gap to a point, but then Naas struck for a hammer blow. Unsurprisingly, it was the man of the match (it was always going to be between the star corner forwards on the day) Kevin Cummins who struck, audaciously lobbing Aaron O'Sullivan for a goal that would be sublime in any circumstances, let alone an All Ireland Final. Seán Broderick made it a five point game with just a few meagre minutes left on the clock. The Sem never gave up – they never do – and were rewarded when Mark O'Shea pounced on a loose ball and fired it to the net, but the sands of time ran out with Naas still leading by two pints and worthy All Ireland champions.

Not the ending to the journey that any of us had anticipated, but what a magnificent journey it was. The Sem did themselves as proud in defeat as they had in their many victories along the way. Comhgairdeas to Naas CBS, who lost the 2019 decider, on becoming the first Kildare school to lift the Hogan Cup. Nobody could begrudge them, they were absolutely brilliant on the day – and they were made to prove it.

A hard day for the Sem, but they showed pure

class all the way (I was especially proud to see the whole panel on the field to applaud the presentation to the winners, that takes real character and I expected no less. They will be back.

KERRY SHOW THEIR STEEL AGAINST ORCHARD COUNTY National Football League: Kerry 1-13 Armagh 0-13

The chances of Kerry losing out on a place in the League Final were already mathematically slim as Kerry headed to the Athletic Grounds, and the Kerry management may have had half an eye on that when they picked a team that was missing a few big names. I suspect that there was a deeper message being sent, though. This was an Ulster county who have been quietly flying in the National League and have arguably had the best player in the country in recent months in Rian O'Neill. This was always going to be a battle, a test of character as much as skill. I had no problem with how Armagh played the game – they danced on the edges quite a few times and Kerry players were made fully aware that there were opposing players present even when the ball wasn't - look, no great harm in it. I'd call it tough rather than dirty, and the truth is that you have to be able to take that at this level.

Kerry not only took it, they gave plenty of it back with interest. Good. Skillful shrinking violets aren't going to be much use when championship games go to the wire.

Kerry made the better start, looking organised and hungry – and wayward in their shooting. In fact, we had three wides on the board, all scorable, before Tiernan Kelly opened the scoring for Armagh.

Astonishingly, it was going to be their last score for no less than 24 minutes, and Kerry's defence can take all the credit for that. There was an element of scepticism when it was initially announced that Paddy Tally would be coming on board as a selector, but the Tyrone native seems to have done his work well in adding a new confidence and surety to our team defending. Jason Foley went head to head against the talented O'Neill and acquitted himself very well. Tadhg Morley yet again was understated excellence, eschewing the spectacular in return for clinical efficiency. Dan O'Donoghue and Gavin White are surely automatics on Kerry's first fifteen for the championship, but Dylan Casey and especially Brian Ó Beaglaíoch have shown that they are very much in the mix. The number five jersey was viewed as a straight contest between Paul Murphy and Mike Breen – Graham O'Sullivan showed that he is a real option too. Like Paddy Tally, Jason McGahan has obviously been doing his work very well in the background too. Three of Kerry's most effective defenders, though, aren't technically defenders. We almost expect it of Paudie Clifford at this stage, so effective has he been, and this was him at his best. Stephen O'Brien also seized his chance with both hands. ranging the pitch and doing trojan and often unseen work. Another hero who has been very much unsung is Jack Barry, who along with

Adrian Spillane gets through an amount of hard work in the trenches; I thought he had one of his best games in a long time.

Killian Spillane will be disappointed with his showing before departing at half-time, but he set up Jack Savage for our opening score. Diarmuid O'Connor grabbed the kick-out -Kerry pressed Armagh very well on their kickouts - and set up Paudie Clifford to double our tally. Diarmuid ruled the midfield roost with an iron hand and a foul on him saw Jack Savage make it 0-3 to 0-1, before Diarmuid split the posts himself. Tony Brosnan (selected on the Sigerson Team of the Year this week)won and converted a free. Jack Barry won the kick-out and set up Stephen O'Brien for a fine score. Kerry did leave a few scores behind them with the strong wind, but thy could be well pleased with the focus and intensity of this display; this was high tempo football and Kerry were relishing the contest. When Jack Savage kicked his third point in the 26th minute, Kerry were 0-7 to 0-1 ahead and could be well pleased with their performance so far.

Rian O'Neill was drifting out the field by now in search of possession (I'm a traditionalist when it comes to having your top scorers in scoring positions) and it fell to Tiernan Kelly to take his and Armagh's second point. Jmaes Morgan, their full back, soon added another. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch burst through for Kerry's final score of the half. A foul on the impressive Jarlath Óg Burns saw Rian O'Neill open his account from a free. Jemar Hall did kick the ball into the Kerry goal soon after, but the whistle had already sounded for a free out – again, good cohesive defending by Kerry. The first half action ended on something of a surly note, with a number of players getting involved in scuffles that saw Jack Savage picking up a black card. I have no problem with it, there were no punches thrown and no real risk of injuries. A bit of argy bargy without malice is no great harm; if Armagh were trying to rattle Kerry (as I would have done in that situation) they got a firm and decisive answer.

Half-time Kerry 0-8 Armagh 0-4

Four points wasn't a huge lead, given the strength of the wind, and it was quickly reduced to a goal by impressive Armagh substitute Stefan Campbell. Paudie Clifford replied though, with arguably the score of the day, a long range beauty off his left leg. Greg McCabe pulled another one back. Dylan Casey carried the ball well up the wing before being tackled much too late after off-loading. I did think that there was a little bit of cynicism in that one, and Casey needed treatment afterwards. Kerry were already swinging into action, though, Stephen O'Brien spotting Kerry's big half-time substitute in the danger area and threading a quick and accurate pass to him. David Clifford one on one in front of goal? It wasn't actually his most clinical finish; I thought he stubbed it a little bit, but the result had a feeling of inevitability about it. Even this far from home, they all know what David does with chances like that! 1-9 to 0-6.

Armagh have steel in them, though, and had no intention of folding. Rian O'Neill pointed his second free and then took a mark to make it 1-9 to 0-8. This was an absorbing contest now.

There was no doubt about the classiest operator on the field. David Clifford, as the late and great Jimmy Magee was wont to say, is "different class", and he fired over from a tight angle. Rory Grogan pointed a free in response. Jack Savage opted to take a point when he had the option of slipping it to the inrushing Stephen O'Brien. Given that it put five points between them with fourteen minutes left, I think it was the right decision.

Rian O'Neill pointed another free after Tadhg Morley was penalised for over-carrying. It's no big deal, but it was clearly the Kerryman who was being fouled. Armagh were piling on the pressure now, but Kerry were closing down on their shooting opportunities, and they were missing more than they were scoring. The next score felt like it would be crucial, and it came Kerry's way. Our speedy transition from defence to attack was a key weapon in our arsenal, and a good ball out of his ow half by Paul Geaney found David Clifford, who once again split the posts. Rian O'Neill won and converted a free in reply, but time was starting to run out.

Kerry were struggling a bit on Shane Ryan's kick-outs now under a hard Armagh press, and one wayward effort saw the Rathmore man make amends by standing tall against a rasping shot – I thought Jason Duffy could have directed it lower and wider, but he had to snatch rapidly at the chance. An Armagh goal at that stage would certainly have let a fox loose in the henhouse!

As it was, a foul on Stephen O'Brien, my overall man of the match (I thought Stephen should have been a contender for Footballer of the Year in 2019, this was reminiscent of that form) saw Jack Savage close out Kerry's scoring with his fifth point. Jarlath Óg Burns, more impressive as an auxiliary attacker than in his own half, pulled one back and Armagh pressed for an equalising goal, but again Kerry soaked up the pressure with impressive composure.

KERRY PIPPED LATE BY DOWN HURLERS National Hurling League: Down 1-19 Kerry 0-20

Kerry had the wind in the first half, and also had most of the hurling, with the trinity of Michael Leane, Mikey Boyle, and Fionán Mackessy really driving them forward and Pádraig Boyle and especially Shane Conway, as always, giving an exhibition of the poacher's art. He opened Kerry's account, with Michael Leane adding another from long range. Paul Sheehan, Down's most dangerous hurler, pointed two frees and Tom Murray had them leading by 0-3 to 0-2. Padraig Boyle restored parity and Fionán Mackesy and Shane (f) had us back in front. Paul Sheehan with two points (1f) squared things up at 0-5 apiece. Kerry, who were hurling very well now, even if they were leaving a few chances go astray, powered into a big lead through Shane Nolan, Shane Conway (2f) and Pádraig Boyle. Paul Sheehan hit back with two frees but Conway and Leane again picked off good scores. Sheehan and Daithi Sands kept Down in touch, but Kerry closed out the half with a flourish, Paudie O'Connor pointing and Padraig Boyle hitting a superb brace. Half-time Kerry 0-14 Down 0-8

Down needed to start the second half with a bang and did exactly that, Conor O'Keeffe picking up a black carded and Conor woods blasting home the resultant penalty. Mark Fisher added a point and suddenly the gap was down to two points, while Down had that strong wind behind them.

Colin Walsh settled Kerry nerves with a good point, but Pierse Óg McCrickard replied. Down were taking control now, outscoring Kerry by 0-5 to 0-1 (a Shane Conway free won by Colum Harty) to go into a one point lead, 1-14 to 0-16. Colum Harty drew us level – he was Kerry's best hurler in the second half – before Matt Conlan and Shane Conway (f) exchanged scores. Oisin McManus and Conor Woods (f) had Down in front by 1-17 to 0-18. Harty brought it back to a one point game and Kerry had two goal chances, but couldn't capitalise on either. Maurice O'Connor finished off a great team move to draw Kerry level.

Unfortunately Down shaded the dying minutes. Oisín McManus converted after a free was brought forward (rightly) and, while Kerry pressed for an equaliser, Jordan Doran drew a free that saw McManus slot over the final score. This result puts Down into the League Final, while Kerry are away to Westmeath (we will be favourites but it's certainly not a banker – they beat us well, 3-15 to 1-15, in our earlier meeting in the League). Interesting times ahead!

She opened Kerry's account with three frees, while Monaghan's Jodie McQuillan did likewise. That was the score at the water break. Remember, it isn't that long ago that Kerry had almost no teams competing on the National stage – I still credit Kieran Donaghy and Tralee Garveys for spearheading a revival and St. Pauls for promptly taking up that baton.

St.Pauls themselves didn't finish with silverware, but one former member most certainly did. Tara Donnellan, daughter of Killarney Legion selector and well known sportsman Eoghan Donnellan and Kate Murphy, was a key player for Limerick Celtics U18 side who won the National Cup, beating Liffey Celtics 66-57 in a cracking final.





TREES FOR SMALL GARDENS

There are a lot of trees suitable for smaller gardens and they come in all shapes and sizes, evergreen or deciduous.

There are a lot of things to consider when choosing a tree for a limited space, the most important being the eventual height and spread fo the tree.

Some ornamental small trees can still reach a height of 20/25 feet. Sometimes even these small trees can be too big for a small garden but there is still a lot of choice out there.

Examples would be a weeping tree which never gets too tall and is very easy to prune back if need be. On the other hand you can choose a tree that is columnar in shape and it won't spread out too much. There is also the option of standard trees. These trees are usually about 3ft to 4ft in height and grow from the top to ground level, staying at the height you plant them at.




Welcome back dear student "I, yes I, am the One who comforts you" (Isaiah 51:12). Dear friend, who or what have you been taking comfort in? We drink to numb the pain. All so painful that you think when you hear the stories – 'it's no wonder they drink or struggle with addiction – that was their way of dealing with the anguish.' These things were coping mechanisms for a time, but unfortunately the thing that may have helped you forget lost its impact and turned sour.

Friend, you and I were created by God. You are not a mistake. God knit you together in your mother's womb, and He created you to live a blessed, victorious life (Psalms 62:1-2; Psalms 139:13-18). But the devil knows this too, and has sought to bring destruction in any way that would derail you causing you to lose your joy. "The thief comes ONLY to steal, to kill and to destroy" That is how he works. But Jesus said "I have come that you would enjoy your life in abundance." (John 10:10) Lot's of people who struggle are not enjoying their lives. In fact if truth be told they are miserable inside. And to make it worse, they may have indulged in blaming God, or others for their problems entertaining unforgiveness, bitterness, even hate - a recipe for disaster. The first step is to acknowledge you need help by calling upon the One who created you and loves you. Jesus said 'whoever calls upon the Name of the Lord shall be saved' (Romans 10:13). Let's pray aloud....Dear God, I confess I am a sinner. Please forgive me and restore joy to me. I want to know You. Lord Jesus, I need You! Please come into my life and take over as my Lord and Saviour. Heal me from the pain of my past, and deliver me back onto Your path for my life. Fill me and baptise me with Your Holy Spirit, teach me Your Word, and be my Friend to help me every day, in Jesus name I pray, amen (Psalms 119:50; John 15:14).
