# Launching **'An Cathal'** Traditional Open Boat

Creating a wonderful legacy for everyone to enjoy the Lakes of Killarney

Brothers Michael and Tony Fleming of Ross Castle Boat Tours, based at Ross Castle, on the shores of Lough Lein, Killarney National Park, launched their new traditional open boat 'An Cathal' this weekend with family and friends, to make boating experience accessible for all people with challenges and different abilities.

The traditional open boat 'An Cathal' is named in honour of their late Dad, Charlie Fleming, who operated Ross Castle Boat Tours until his untimely passing in 2024.

Michael and Tony Fleming worked collaboratively with the National Parks and Wildlife Services, in the design and output of this inclusive tour boat, where people will now have the opportunity and support and enjoy Killarney National Parks Unesco Biosphere Reserve and experience the beauty of the lakes, mountains and soaring White-tailed Eagles overhead.

The specially designed boat is specifically for people with limited mobility and neurodiverse needs.

An Cathal' is fitted with a fixed stairway to enable people access / egress the boat with ease and has fasteners built into the floor to allow wheelchairs to be securely attached.

A key aspect is to support neurodiverse people. The boat is also fitted with a dedicated diversity section with a Sensory Box which will be carried in the boat. All the staff have completed 'AsIAm' Online Training. Assistance Dogs are also welcome on-board. Michael Fleming, Ross Castle Boat Tours said they were "Committed to expanding our support services and are currently working on a Visual Guide for inclusion on our website. This will highlight what guests can expect on arrival and during a tour. We support quieter tours on request

and early morning / late evening tours if required. Our aim when we were looking at this project was to create an outdoor experience, particularly one that was inclusive and supported biodiversity across the Killarney National Park. So with the assistance and support from NPWS (National Parks and Wildlife Services) I think we delivered a much needed experience that really puts Killarney National Park on the map in terms of inclusivity." NPWS Conservation Ranger, Killarney National Park, Padruig O'Sullivan said "It is a great initiative for the National Park - it caters for people from all walks of life, especially people with challenges. It is part of the National Park Mission Statement, which is obligated to open the Park to all. The process and presentation with the Flemings from safety inspection to boat design was carefully drawn and collaborated with us. We are delighted to see it in operation today.

Also at the launch was NPWS Conservation Ranger, Killarney National Park, Tricia Beecher, who said "it's such a great opportunity and wonderful initiative for Killarney National Park, for the public and for families, people of all abilities can now get out and enjoy the wildlife and beautiful scenery we have in the Park. Deirdre Pendergast of My Canine Companion said after the launch "It's a great initiative for families of children with autism. Tony and Mike have made it possible for people like us to use the lake and see the beautiful scenery around us, and to use the boat in quiet times to cater for children with sensory needs."



# Kerry TDs back calls for new **HEALTH POLICY**

hree Kerry TDs have joined an Oireachtas Heart and Stroke group to back urgent calls for a new national cardiovascular

disease (CVD) health policy.

Deputies Danny Healy-Rae, Michael Cahill and Pa Daly have agreed to be advocates for the thousands of heart disease and stroke patients in their constituency.

Ten thousand lives a year are claimed by CVD, Ireland's biggest killer, accounting for almost 30% of all mortality.

In Kerry, 18,000 people live with the disease, which causes a wide range of heart conditions. Nationally, 80,000 CVD patients are discharged home every year – or one every seven minutes. But despite the enormous toll of death and infirmity, Ireland has not had a CVD disease policy for over five years.

The new group, set up by the Irish Heart Foundation, aims to build consensus across the political spectrum to support these "abandoned" patients – and thereby deliver huge reductions in preventable death and disability.

"The absence of a policy framework for the prevention, detection and treatment of CVD, along with services that maximise patients' health and wellbeing in the community, is preventing the development of lifesaving services," said Chris Macey, Director of Advocacy with the charity.

"This is resulting in preventable death, disability and loss of quality of life on a significant scale. "Cardiovascular care has been operating in a policy vacuum for the last five and a half years since the previous National Cardiovascular Health Policy expired."

Ireland, he said, has the lowest number of cardiologists per capita in the EU and there is a critical need for investment in cardiac imaging, including Echocardiography, Cardiac CT, and Cardiac MRI.



access to cardiac and stroke rehabilitation remains inadequate, they are also struggling due to the high costs associated with having a CVD condition and the widespread absence of psychological support to deal with the trauma of having a stroke, heart attack or other heart disease diagnosis.

As well as the need for the fresh CVD policy, the Irish Heart Foundation is also asking the Oireachtas Heart and Stroke group to support the following:

Action to increase awareness, treatment and control of high blood pressure which affects 1.5 million people in Ireland and is the biggest risk factor for heart disease and stroke;

Full implementation of the National Stroke Strategy to ensure stroke survivors are admitted to dedicated stroke units, which reduce death and severe disability;

Greater investment in cardiac rehabilitation programmes, which can reduce deaths from heart disease by at least a fifth, but which are understaffed and under-resourced nationwide. Mr Macey said that for the first time in several years, the Irish Heart Foundation is optimistic about the future prospects of heart patients and stroke survivors.

"The sector is united. It has a vision that can address current deficits and futureproof services for the rapid upsurge in heart disease and stroke due to our expanding and ageing population," he said.

"This can deliver big reductions in preventable death and disability, through more costeffective services, but it can only be achieved if policymakers make CVD a national health priority in the midst of so many crucial competing needs across our health services and our population."



# IT'S THE TALK | OF THE TOWN



Anne Lucey looks at the **positive news** happening in Killarney

**CONCERN ABOUT THE** STRAIGHT AND NARROWER IN FOSSA



Concern regarding the reduced carriageway on the Fossa road has come to liaht

The big conundrum: how will two tourist coaches pass each other on the narrower Fossa straight?

The wider raised cycleways will be welcomed by some cyclists - although serious cyclists eschew bike paths. But the road will narrow to under 20 ft, it seems. These are supposedly traffic calming measures.

In reality a one-way system may have to be introduced to allow agriculture contractors and large coaches to travel through Fossa, is the fear.

Agricultural contractors are particularly vexed. To get from Beaufort to Killarney and back with standard 10 ft wide silage and machines, operators will have to drive over the white line at Fossa, they tell me.

They can't drive right up to the kerb as this would endanger cyclists. So they will have to go over the white line into the oncoming lane! You have a similar story with wide buses on the Ring of Kerry unless they take down their side mirrors coming through Fossa.

Michael Cahill TD defended the work - saying engineers have assured him the 19 ft plus road will be wide enough. That it conforms to European standards, is what he has been assured. (Is that an assurance?)

Mayor Maura Healy-Rae told me she has become concerned as the works progress.

"Concern regarding the reduced carriageway has come to light," Maura says.

Council staff and engineers tell her the plans are in accordance with national guidelines "and that once the surface is down it will not appear or seem as narrow," Mayor Maura says.

She is "not completely satisfied with this response".

Killarney Councillors, let us recall, unanimously voted the project through in July 2022 - amid fear the funding from the TII would not come through.

It is not the first time projects like Fossa have been voted through because of the threat they would lose the funding and have ended up in the mire. The South Kerry Greenway, is an example

The inappropriate medical centre at the Aras Phádraig is a more recent example. Actually, a birdie tells me the Aras will have to be voted on again, because of omissions in the reports by council management. Apparently "a technical glitch" was responsible.

### The mess being made of the new EU led self-catering regulations

The Irish Self-Catering Federation are calling for clarity with the new rules which could see many short term lets across the Killarney Municipal District shut down - partly because of the mess that has been created in getting rid of town councils.

Killarney MD is a rent pressure zone and has a population of over 10,000, so it's not looking good.

We have no towns anymore. It's all lumped into

MDs which makes town boundaries impossible to determine.

The register is necessary. There is no doubt about that. It will be handled by the already highly funded Failte Ireland, Junior minister Michael which self catering to US persuade Airbnb.

the But other elephant in the room

is the EU. The short-term letting regulation is coming from a Europe increasingly concerned with the effect of Airbnbs on housing for locals. Just to recap what it says on the Department of Local Government press release last week:

"The legislation will introduce a register for all Short Term Lets (STLs) in Ireland, which will be implemented and managed by Fáilte Ireland from 20 May 2026, ensuring compliance with the new EU Short Term Rental Regulation which was adopted by the EU on 11 April 2024." The real story here is that line minister James Browne can't actually explain the rules for Ireland until he goes back and makes sure they are in line with European legislation.

Our Dáil is now little more than a version of Kerry County Council: Europe is dictating most legislation. And Fine Gael and Labour made such a mess of local government reform in 2014, there is no difference between a town and a townland!

Junior minister Michael Healy-Rae is hoping to persuade his fellow ministers to change the population limits to suit Killarney. Perhaps the person he should really lobby is Killarney's Fine Gael MEP Sean Kelly?

### Milltown and the Green Fields of France

Owen O'Shea's new book One Man's Ireland, based on the memoirs and letters of republican Dan Mulvihill of Castlemaine, is his latest foray into the early years of the last century in Kerry. I read it while taking "a breath of French air" through the landscape of Verdun in France.

This is where millions of French men fought against the Germans in 1916. Most of the beautiful peaceful falling down villages you cycle through have monuments to these young men.

France won the battle as well as the war. But it never recovered from Verdun. Crossing the Meuse, it struck me there is more written about Milltown than Verdun, thanks to O'Shea.

I have reservations about any war, whether battle or skirmish, Irish or French. I derive this mainly from my years in University during the Hunger Strikes. I vividly recall the anger and fear I and other people felt - but also the niggling doubt about all of it. What exactly were young people of my age dying and killing for? The whole thing left me with an increasingly jaundiced view of nationalism.

Mulvihill, like many Irish revolutionaries, also believed they were killing for the perfect system. In 1917 Russian communists believed this too. As do Hamas in 2025.

O'Shea's book reinforces the tragic and pointless nature of all of it. In his old age, Mulvihill and his fellow revolutionaries felt truly "betrayed" by their treatment and lack of influence in the new Irish State.

Mulvihill emerges as one of the finest people of his generation. After training in London, a city he liked, he was a telegraphist with a good job. Many families have stories like this: fine people with great opportunity who returned from overseas, and in Mulvihill's case created a State that ultimately let them down.

O'Shea's book is well-written and a page turner - albeit a bit local.

I would still like to know more about Verdun. And how the mass slaughter worldwide whetted the appetite for violence here. Was it simply that every country from the largest to the smallest was under a cloud of blood lust

at the time?





# HOOKED ON CYCLING

James Looney recalls his journey with the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle

This would be the time of year just after Easter when boys & girls would be getting ready to clean and oil the bike getting ready to train for the Ring of Kerry Cycle.

In my time on the ring I drove the lead van with music and announcing in towns of the cyclists passing through & joking with people along the way that was for about 12 years then at a drivers meeting it was suggested that the drivers should cycle the ring to feel the strains & pains of cycling the Ring of Kerry.


So my training started with a 5 speed bike & my first trip was Muckross & Dinis, If I could survive that cycle & my ass got used to the saddle I would keep at it which I did. 5 or 6 trips around Muckross & Dinis I was ready for the wide open road out to Loo Bridge & back, up & down the County Bounds out to Kilgarvan & back. Then the big one Killarney, Kenmare, Molls Gap & home. What a sense of achievement in just training for the first time.

The big day came for the Ring of Kerry cycle for drivers & helper of support vans August 1995. We started for the ring at 7.00am, Dan McCarthy & Sons, daughter Catherine & Tim O'Connor.

We travelled through Killorglin when Tim O'Connor got a puncture, big stop & everyone in for repair, on again through Glenbeigh for Cahirciveen, up the winding road of Mountain Stage pass the viaduct onto Kells for Cahirciveen town for the break tea & sandwiches for ½ hour. Then out for Waterville & Coomakista climb. Gear down, head down & keep your composure & head for the top, say a prayer at the cross & head downhill for Sneem. More tea & sandwiches, Sneem to Kenmare passing Parknasilla, Blackwater Bridge, Tahilla. Into Kenmare another break before heading for Molls Gap everyone in good form, a bit tired but looking forward for Molls, time about 3.30pm.

Molls was tough going especially the section of the road that's dead until you pass 2 houses on right about ½ ways up Molls, Jubilation on reaching the top. Heading down from Molls was fast & dangerous, rough uneven road, potholes, sharp twists & turns, just have your wits & use your brakes to arrive safely down to level road from Muckross to town,

Our finishing point was at the Golden Gates, so at Flesk Bridge

we stopped to regroup all the cyclists but with the excitement of the gathering & finished, we danced around the bridge for ½ hour hugging & shouting what at a day to remember. I was hooked on Cycling.

# STATE EXAM CANDIDATES MUST NOW FOCUS ON JUNE'S WRITTEN EXAMS

#### WRITTEN EXAMS

Less than six weeks remain before the state exams get underway on Wednesday, 4th June. The Leaving Certificate exams, the Junior Cycle exams and the Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA) exams will run until Tuesday, 24th June, Monday, 16th June and Thursday, 12th June, respectively.

### GRADES

The H/O/F grading system and the CAO common points system have been very successful since first introduced in 2017. Each grade covers ten percentage points and 625 points is the maximum attainable CAO score. Grades from H1 to H7 are awarded points at Higher Level, grades from O1 to O6 merit points at Ordinary Level, while grades F1 and F2 are awarded points at Foundation Level by certain institutions.

#### JUNIOR CYCLE

At Junior Cycle level, in addition to classroombased assessments (CBA) during second and third years, students complete a state exam after three years and are awarded a Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement. All Junior Cycle subjects have undergone syllabus change and no Junior Cycle exam lasts longer than two hours. In addition, all subjects are now examined at common level except for Irish, English and Mathematics, which are still offered at both Higher and Ordinary levels. Six grade descriptors - Distinction (85% to 100%), Higher Merit (70% to < 85%), Merit (55% to < 70%), Achieved (40% to < 55%), Partially Achieved (20% to < 40%), Not Graded (0% to < 20%) - are used in the Junior Cycle exam.

#### OPTIMISM

Candidates can approach the state exams optimistically because they are well prepared by a dedicated teaching force. The national results achieved each year in the state exams are very impressive. In addition, places in further and higher education courses, apprenticeships and traineeships are very plentiful in a buoyant economy. At this stage, there will certainly be more places available than there will be applicants to take up these places. More

employment opportunities are available to school leavers as the economic continues to thrive. However, if the trend of previous years continues, the vast majority of Leaving Cert exam candidates will continue in education as the changing nature of the work environment means that employers are looking for staff with qualifications at craft, traineeship, degree or post-graduate level.

#### CERTIFICATION

The stigma of failure has long gone from the state exams. Back in the day, failure in Irish meant overall failure. Thankfully, those days are far behind us. Every candidate's performance is now acknowledged by individual certification. Leaving Cert exam candidates' main aim nowadays is to achieve the minimum entry requirements, the specific course requirements and the points for their preferred courses. The State Examinations Commission (SEC) also provides a range of exam supports, known as Reasonable Accommodations at Certificate Examinations (RACE), for candidates with physical, visual, hearing and learning difficulties in order to remove, as far as possible, the impact of the disability on the candidate's performance in the exams. This facility ensures that no candidate for the state exams is disadvantaged because of a disability.

#### **GOOD MANAGEMENT**

Despite all the media hype about exam pressure, all you need is a cool head, a positive attitude, optimum use of the remaining weeks, good personal and time management, plenty of nutritious food, rest and an exercise programme to burn off any excess stress. Approach the exams with confidence, do your best during the remaining weeks and at the actual exams. Then forget about them and enjoy the summer. Exams should be kept in perspective. They are just another milestone on the eventful journey through life.

### SCHEDULE

With the oral exams now concluded and practical coursework, project work and study reports, due to be completed soon, exam candidates have will have precious marks

banked before June. In the few remaining weeks, the written papers become the major focus of attention as the June exams draw ever closer.




## MOLLIE HEADING STATESIDE ON ATHLETIC SCHOLARSHIP



#### PRESBYOPIA

#### What is presbyopia?

Presbyopia is the normal loss of near focusing ability that occurs with age. Most people begin to notice the effects of presbyopia sometime after age 40, when they start having trouble seeing small print clearly.

Presbyopia is caused by an age-related process. This differs from astigmatism, myopia and hyperopia, which are related to the shape of the eyeball and are caused by genetic and environmental factors. Presbyopia generally is believed to stem from a gradual thickening and loss of flexibility of the natural lens inside your eye.

These age-related changes occur within the proteins in the lens, making the lens harder and less elastic over time. With less elasticity, this means the eye has a harder time focusing up close and we may have to hold material further away to see it clearly.

What is the treatment for presbyopia?

Presbyopia is a natural part of ageing and there is no cure for it. The solution is generally to wear glasses for reading

Contact lenses are also available

for presbyopia if you do not want to wear glasses.

stop needing reading glasses? Will I make my eyes worse by wearing glasses?

No. As presbyopia is caused by the lens stiffening, and not the muscles weakening. Wearing glasses will not make your eyes worse and there are no exercises that can help this. However, you may notice that when you take your glasses off, things appear to be worse without them than before you had them. This is simply because you are noticing how clear and comfortable vision should be. Before you had the glasses, you were unaware how blurry your vision really was because it changed slowly over the years. Presbyopia will get worse as you age until you reach your late fifties, when you will have no natural focusing ability left. Unfortunately there is nothing you can do to stop it. For any vision changes it is





# KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

**ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS** WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it

becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.




A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years. The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder 645,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.



## LATE WOES SCUPPER CRONIN'S CIRCUIT BID

Reigning NAPA Auto Parts Irish Tarmac Rally champions, Keith Cronin and Mikie Galvin, finished in eighth place on the Circuit of Ireland, after late dramas snatched away a seemingly certain victory. They had led the event for nine of its eleven stages in their Citroën C3, and had 36 seconds in hand over the Skoda Fabia crew of Callum Devine and Noel O'Sullivan, when they encountered brake issues approaching the penultimate test. They made efforts to bleed the system at the roadside, and were nine minutes late starting the stage as a result, incurring one minute and thirty seconds in penalties. They then picked up a puncture in the stage, which lost them further time, and saw them drop to eighth on the leaderboard. With no prospect of improving their overall position, they nursed the car through the final stage to make the finish. The outcome has cost them valuable points in their quest to retain the Tarmac Championship title

Devine and O'Sullivan took the rally win, with Garry Jennings and Rory Kennedy coming through to take second place in a Ford Fiesta Rally 2, ahead of Declan Boyle and Patrick Walsh in another Fabia.

"It was fine on the first stage after service, then when I was pulling away from the finish I noticed it," said Cronin of his brake maladies. "We tried to fix it, and I was driving very carefully on the next stage, but I had no handbrake or anything, I was having to drive in over things, and we got a puncture. It's very disappointing. We got some few points but it won't be a lot. Today will obviously have to be a dropped score from us," he added.

The Circuit started on Friday afternoon, with two runs over the Ivy Hill stage near Aughnacloy on the itinerary. Conditions were extremely wet, with patches of standing water waiting to catch out the crews. Cronin and Galvin set down a marker on the opener, going fastest by 9.2 seconds from Devine and O'Sullivan, with James Ford and Neil Shanks a further tenth back in their Citroën. The latter then undid their good work with an overshoot on the stage two, allowing Matt Edwards and David Moynihan (Hyundai i20N) through into third spot. Cronin and Galvin were fastest again on the second run, but only by a tenth from Devine and O'Sullivan.

Saturday's route consisted of three loops of three stages, south of Dungannon. The weather was equally as inhospitable as the previous day, causing more standing water and mud to be liberally scattered across the roads. Cronin and Galvin were fastest on the first four tests of the day, and had built up a margin of half a minute over Devine and O'Sullivan. As the leaders then moved to manage their advantage, Edwards and Moynihan upped the ante, and set a trio of fastest times, to move to within seven seconds of Devine and O'Sullivan. Josh Moffett and Andy Hayes (Citroën) had earlier challenged Edwards and Moynihan, before going off the road on stage five. Little damage was caused and they later returned to the field under SuperRally rules. The chase was then taken up by Eddie Doherty and Tom Murphy (Skoda), but they fell back as

Edwards and Moynihan smelt a chance of second spot.

The tumultuous penultimate test was to prove the undoing of three of the top four crews. Aside from the troubles of Cronin and Galvin, it also saw the retirements of Edwards and Moynihan, who damaged their Hyundai, and Doherty and Murphy, who picked up two punctures and could not continue, having only one spare on board their Fabia. Through the chaos emerged Devine and O'Sullivan, to take the Circuit of Ireland victory on what was their first appearance of 2025.

Cronin and Galvin's next scheduled outing will be the Rally of the Lakes in Killarney in two weeks' time, where they will be hoping to regain momentum in their defence of the Tarmac crown.

## MUNSTER SEMI-FINAL

#### Kerry 3-21 Cork 1-25

I have to open with a confession. I absolutely bought the hype. I had pre-determined that this would not be a long report on a game where lexpected few lessons to be learned and without significant consequence. There's always a little bit of "will the loser go into the Taillteann Cup?" No. Will Cork put it up to us? Absolutely, they caught us in 2020 and have been steadily improving over the last couple of years, but Kerry's dominance at U20 and minor means we all know which side will be favourites for the next number of years. We'll face harder tests than Cork.

By jaysus, if we face harder tests than this Cork team, we won't be going too far. They were magnificent. Kerry got out of jail as much because of Cork's profligacy when they had us on the rack as any inherent merit of Kerry's; that's the plain and honest truth of it.

Now, that doesn't mean that I join in with the chorus of muppets trying to have an inquest while the patient still has a pulse. This game was more about Cork being good – much better than anyone, including Cork supporters – really expected rather than any inherent defect of Kerry's.

We started so strong Ruairí Murphy clipped over a good opening score. Cork replied, a good kick by Mark Cronin. Super burst of pace by David Clifford and he fisted over. Chris Óg Jones did likewise at the other end, but already Kerry were dominating the middle and sending very quick ball into their forward line. Cork had nothing like that cutting in them, everything looked like hard work.

David and Dylan Geaney with good Kerry scores. Kerry are kicking great long passes, Paudie Clifford in particular acting as a great fulcrum. He sent that ball in to Dylan; he might have gone for goal. Paudie and Dylan combine to tee up David for his third point. Joe O'Connor adds another. Paudie becomes the second Clifford on the scoreboard.

0-7 to 0-2. Lads, I'd only whisper it, but I'd be very tempted now to head off while the traffic is quiet and go out to my brother's for a cup of tea and watch it from there. I actually like Cork, they are fierce passionate without ever being nasty. I honestly don't want to see them demolished. That really and truly is what I was thinking. It felt like one way traffic and a Kerry garda directing it.

Except that his shift must have ended, because traffic very quickly began to switch direction. Cork made astute positional switches, but a big thing was lan Maguire really rising to the



midfield challenge. I always thought he was solid but not quite in the elite bracket; that's more humble pie for me to swallow. He was awesome. Worse, Cork started beating us to the breaking ball.

Graham O'Sullivan had started the game well and been very involved in Kerry's scores, but once Cork were winning ball, he was dropping deep. I saw two problems. One is simply that Graham drifting back gave Brian O'Driscoll license to roam and he kicked a great two pointer. I don't blame Graham: I blame the overall tactics. Putting a defender in to bolster the forwards is an old tactic - Paddy Bawn Brosnan, Tom Prendergast, Seán Murphy, Eamonn O'Donoghue, Páidí Ó Sé, Jonathan Lyne and Brian Ó Beagaioch in recent years.... Mick O'Dwyer, of course. He was a huge success at it, and one of the very, very few. I could understand, but never like, the idea of sacrificing a scorer for a workhorse under the old rules that rewarded negativity. But with the new rules?

The second problem, and a more pressing issue for me, was the sight of Kerry forming a defensive shield. Cork, who didn't have Kerry's speed in the build-up, were happy to recycle until they found an opening around the two point arc. It's not that any one defender had a bad game for Kerry, but we gave Cork more space and time to probe at us than I liked. You're telling me that the likes of McGuinness, McGeeney, Joyce, McStay aren't looking at that and rubbing their hands at the idea of meeting a Kerry team with that defensive strategy?

Ah, cool the jets. David Clifford with another score. Paul Geaney off the mark after Brian Hurley's effort drops short. Again, Kerry's speed bursting out was crucial. A good turnover by David sees him notch another point. 0-10 to 0-4. But I am a lot more intrigued by this contest now.

Brilliant save by Shane Ryan, and it had to be to deny Seán McDonnell. Shane has to go off with injury. That was a big moment, a goal there would have invigorated Cork. Instead, Paul Geaney reads the pass perfectly and clips over for Kerry.

Except that Cork are rising to this. They are

coming at Kerry now. Brian Hurley wasn't far away with a two point effort. Ian Mauire slots a great point. Brian O'Driscoll with a point from play. He's cleverly finding space to stretch Kerry's as Cork recycle and he booms over another two pointer. Mark Cronin drops an effort short, but slots a '45 just on the whistle. Half-time Kerry 0-11 Cork 0-9. I still think that Kerry will be okay, but just two points up after completely dominating the first quarter?

Two pointers break games open, and Cork are better at them than us. No surprise there after league form, but the reason that we weren't kicking too many two pointers is because we were using the space to open teams for goals. Brian Hurley opens the second half with a two point free, though, and it's level pegging. Seán O'Shea is on now for Kerry; I imagined management had hoped to give him an easy quarter of an hour late on. There'll be nothing easy here! Despite the weather, there's a buzz about the crowd now.

Paudie Clifford with a free – very soft, I have to say – and he finds Seán O'Shea for a score. Lovely little cut-back by Paul Geaney and it's another one. Seán McDonnell responds with a super score, though.

Great block to deny David Clifford. Paudie Clifford with a point; he has probably been Kerry's best player so far. David isn't going to be denied twice and splits the posts. Kerry, with Joe O'Connor really beginning to take hold, are winning turnovers now and Dylan Geaney picks off another point. Brian Hurley replies but Barry Dan O'Sullivan fists over. I'm more and more convinced that I'd love to see Diarmuid and Barry Dan as our first choice midfield and Joe free to inflict and prevent damage with a roving commission on the wing – his instincts aren't defensive but he does track well. 0-17 to 0-13. Back in the old days when I was a younger man (i.e. Four months ago) that was real daylight. Now, with two pointers....who knows?

Shane Murphy with a kick-out, Joe O'Connor gathers and sets Paudie Clifford clear. Paudie slices straight through the heart of the defence, he could go himself, but he unselfishly flicks it to Paul Geaney....Geaneys don't miss chances like that. 1-17 to 0-13, maybe fifteen minutes

left including injury time. Safe enough, surely..... Now, I'll wear two hats just for a minute. I saw it, and I saw it clearly, and I instantly thought "that's a yellow for Paudie". I know the player is low, but the hands are high and clear contact. Definite yellow. But I now know that referees were notified about stringency in regard to head contact. I didn't think it was a red at the time, but the rules are both strict and unambiguous. As for any suggestion of the Cork player "making a meal of it"? A nonsensical and embarrassing comment. The school of punditry where attention is more important than accuracy or intelligence.

Cathail O'Mahony is just on the pitch, but he kicks a great two pointer. Seán McDonnell with another. That's four points in fewer minutes and an extra man for Cork.

It gets worse fast. Cork turn over the kick-out and race at Kerry on the overlap. Great finish by Chris Og Jones. 1-17 apiece. You'd fancy Cork now. Ruairí Deane puts them in front.

A high and hopeful punt from Cathail O'Mahony, but Shane Murphy gathers well. Kerry recycle. Cork are pressing forward but that gives Joe O'Connor space to carry it down the left wing before laying off to Seán O'Shea. He dummies the defender, cuts in, and strikes a real beauty. Great goal. Did he take too many steps? Yes, absolutely. I couldn't even run that far in one go. The truth is that it should have been a free out, but have you ever seen those frees given? I haven't. Take another look at Owen Mulligan's famous goal against Dublin in 2005. One of many examples.

Mark Cronin with a free. Just a point in it now. Great chance for David after a super catch by Joe. David's off balance from close range and it spirals off his boot and wide. Should he have fisted it? Easy for the likes of you and I to say, isn't it?

Colm O'Callaghan sets up Eoghan McSweeney. One point; it wasn't far away from being two.

David clips over a Kerry point, but play is called back for off the ground. Whistle blows, extratime. Cork supporters are animated but very friendly. Kerry supporters aren't saying too much.

Both sides are going for it in the first half of extra time, but the gaps aren't showing. Good fetch by Joe O'Connor – an absolute colossus for Kerry – and he takes a hard full frontal tackle. Again, I thought "that's surely a yellow". Again, with the benefit of hindsight and a closer look, it's closed fist to the body and there is head contact – Seán Brady won't be succeeding in any appeal either.

David Clifford's free puts Kerry in front and he adds a two pointer. 2-20 to 1-20, but Chris Óg Jones pulls one back with a free. Half-time in extra-time, 2-20 to 1-21.

Chris Óg Jones from play. One point in it. Good work by Cathail O'Mahony to set up Eoghan McSweeney....great two pointer. There's still one point in it, but the lead has been reversed. Great reply by Killian Spillane, but Conor Cahalane cancels that out.

Seemingly out of nowhere, Kerry drive forward. As is my wont, I'm advising Joe O'Connor to take his point. You'd have to be daft or brilliant to go for goal from there. It turned out that Joe certainly wasn't daft. What a shot! It deserved to win.

Mind you, Cork must have serious regrets when they look at the dying minutes. Conor Cahalane with a clear chance at goal, but it goes just wide. Cathail O'Mahony with a point effort.... wide. With single digit seconds left, Cork are recycling....in fairness to Eoghan McSweeney, he has the courage to go for it....and it curls away left. A two pointer there would have meant penalties.

As it is, Cork leave with a loss but with pride in their team fully restored. Kerry leave, but I think more with a sense of relief rather than jubilation.

Great game. The best Kerry/Cork game in years, arguably decades. 2020 was drama rather than quality. This was quality all through. The sendings off on both sides and the amount of steps taken by Seán O'Shea are talking points by supporters. I'm a simpler man. I'd be looking at our defensive structure with two pointers and both sides should look at the chances they missed to close it out.

Moreover, Kerry lost Podge to injury and with Shane Conway still nowhere close to returning from injury, who was going to step up as our main scorer?

Oisín Maunsell, the captain, picked off two fine points. Dylan Moriarty stepped up to the frees – I must admit to being taken very much by surprise – he was immaculate. Kerry back level, but Kildare notched another four points on the trot. I thought – I was certain – that we were gone.

'Tweek' Griffin, never the biggest of men, always had ferocious heart and drive as a Kerry hurler. He has managed to install that in his players as well. Moriarty – he scored five from five chances in that last quarter, Kevin Goulding.....and one last look at the posts for Oisin Maunsell.

There are games where the fact of winning is far more important than the manner of it. This was one of those.

## DR. SEÁN MURPHY RIP Only three men



men have ever had an All Ireland Football Final be referenced in culture and folklore by their personal name. You can talk about iconic displays – Willie Bryan in 1972, teenager Jimmy Barry Murphy with 2-2 in 1973, Seamus in 2000, Seán Cavanagh eight years later, David three years ago. But the final is not remembered, not outrightly defined, by their name. You had Larry Stanley in 1919 captaining Kildare to victory over Galway. You had the Maurice Fitzgerald Final - if you don't know which final I am talking about, you may as well stop reading now. But in 1959 Seán Murphy stamped his name at wingback in Kerry's victory over Galway, and he did it so emphatically that he later became an automatic choice on the Team of the Century and the Team of the Millenium. It may well have been - and probably was -the greatest single display in an All Ireland Final ever.

It wasn't a big surprise to any of his neighbours from Camp, or to good football judges from farther afield. Mike Allen, a man who has always lived at the core of Kerry football, told me one time about watching a Frewen Cup game between the Sem and Ballyvourney. The Sem won it, but 'Small Jer' O'Leary, arguably the best judge of them all, singled out a very young and small wing forward for Ballyvourney named Seán Murphy. "That young lad will be heard of yet". Small Jer got very little wrong, and he certainly wasn't wrong on that occasion. He made his senior debut for Camp as a 15 year old, going toe-to-toe with the likes of Thomas Ashe, Paddy Bawn Brosnan, and Danno Keeffe, names from his childhood.

Murphy from Camp wasn't any new name in Kerry GAA circles. The four sons of Jackie Murphy, the local headmaster, would have grown up around stories of Tim and John 'Kerry' O'Donnell, Charlie O'Sullivan, and the great Paddy Kennedy. Jackie had played junior for Kerry himself in the 1920s. The Murphy brothers didn't lick their football from the stones!

Pádraig and Seán attended Coláiste Íosagáin in Ballyvourney. You'd be surprised to find out how many Kerry footballers came out of that nursery, but it wasn't considered one of the top GAA schools (it had been a Seminary Prep. School until it accepted ordinary boarders in 1949). Until the Murphy brothers came along, with Pádraig as captain and Seán man of the match in midfield led the school to their first ever Corn uí Mhuirí. All four brothers, Pádraig, Seán, Tomás, and Seamus would captain the school to Corn uí Mhuirí titles.

He was a year underage when he was first picked for the Kerry minors in 1949. He was partnered in midfield with Denny Falvey from Annascaul and that team had Johnny Foley in goal, Jerome O'Shea and Mike Galway (uncle to the rugby legend and an All Ireland winner with Kerry three years later), Mick Brosnan, Paudie Sheehy, and Colm Kennelly at full forward. A serious array of talent, and they reached the All Ireland Final, only to lose to Armagh on a 1-7 to 1-5 scoreline.

Back then, it wasn't unheard of for the best minors to be called into the Junior team, and Seán Murphy lined out for them at midfield beside John Dowling, with his brother Pádraig at wing forward. They beat Lancashire in the All Ireland Final and Seán had his first inter-county celtic cross.

Headford played Dr. Crokes in that year's East Kerry Final (it wouldn't become the Dr. Paddy O'Donohue Memorial Cup until 1954). The simplest way to describe Headford is to consider it a precursor of Sliabh Luachra but without Kilcummin, who were a senior club. Dr. Crokes, with the likes of John C. Cooper and Dan Kavanagh on board, were red hot favourites. But Glenflesk parish priest Fr. Michael O'Driscoll, a keen GAA supporter, cycled to Ballyvourney to watch a challenge game between Coláiste Íosagáin and Headford, and the next time Headford trained, they had Seán and Pádraig Murphy from Camp and the Laois minor keeper on board. That would be considered disgraceful now and wasn't legal back then, but it was fairly commonplace. A late penalty save that denied Teddy O'Connor saw Headford shock everybody by winning by two points, with Seán Murphy one of the day's heroes for Headford.

A year later, in 1950, he was an automatic selection for the minors. They still had the most of last year's minors and were joined by Donal Marcus O'Neill in goal, and Seán's brother Tomás. Another really formidable outfit, and while Cork were unlucky enough to lose to them by a point, no other team came close. They beat Wexford by 3-6 to 1-4 in a one-sided final in Croke Park. Seán had already made his senior debut for Kerry in late April, lining out at centre forward in a league defeat to Cavan.

A year later he played against Mayo in the All Ireland Semi-Final. The sides drew, 1-5 apiece, but Mayo won the replay by 2-4 to 1-5. That was a great Mayo team, Padd Prendergast, Seán Flanagan, Mick Mulderrig, Pádraig Carney, Mick Mulderrig....a lot of Mayo supporters can name that team off the top of their head. They beat Dublin in the All Ireland Final, the last Mayo team to win Sam.

1952. It must have felt like a nadir. Paddy Bawn Brosnan had an absolute stormer in the Munster Final. But he was the only Kerry player to emerge with any credit as Cork demolished them by 0-11 to 0-2. Certainly Seán Murphy could make no hand of Donie O'Donovan.

Steps had to be taken. Kerry secretary Micheál Ó Ruairc made some phone calls. A year later Tom Cronin, one of Cork's heroes that day, was back in Kerry colours. So was Tom Moriarty, and Ned Roche came back from Tipperary to his native county.

1953: The Miraculous Horseshoe

Seán Murphy had only played one National League game that year, coming on as a sub in another defeat to Cavan, and he missed the facile win over Clare in the Munster Championship, but he was back in the geansaí for the Cork game. The Rebels were obvious favourites after the previous year. Kerry had a point to prove and did – they actually led by 1-4 to no score after a whirlwind opening. In the end it was 2-7 to 2-3, a very late goal giving Cork a veneer of respectability.

Louth in the All Ireland semi-final. Louth were a formidable team back then. In fact, reports indicate that they actually played more of the football that day but just couldn't put it on the scoreboard. Kerry had the cushion of two early goals from Tom Ashe and another from Seán Kelly (uncle of our MEP). They needed it; Louth actually cut the gap back down to two before Kerry edged clear on a 3-6 to 0-10 scoreline.

Armagh in the final. Jerome O'Shea was man of the match at cornerback. Paudie Sheehy had gotten well beaten by Stephen White. No shame in that; White was one of the best footballers in the country at the time. When it came to the crunch selection meeting, his father John Joe recused himself - by the time he came back, his son was no longer starting and no longer captain. Mitchels had no other starter so they nominated Jas. as Kerry captain. An early goal had Armagh ahead by 1-3 to 0-5 at the break. Kerry gradually pulled level and went two points in front. Then came the famous penalty - the story goes that Johnny Foley had a lucky horseshoe given to him by the great Danno Keeffe and that was why Bill McCorry missed. A less interesting but a lot more honest story would take into account Jas. Murphy and Micksie Palmer running alongside McCorry and shouting at him, and Colm Kennelly jumping across his path as he began his run-up. Ah well, just like America's Wild West, 'when the legend becomes fact, print the legend'. The official attendance was just over 85,000 to see Kerry win by four points. In fact, people flocked through two broken-down gates. It didn't sound like a big deal back then, but a friend told me that people were passing children along overhead to keep them safe from the crush. At least 92,000 people got in, maybe more.

1954: Royal Revenge

Kerry were back, and back with a vengeance. They were favourites in 1954. Seán Murphy had firmly established himself at half back. He considered it his best position and would not be budged again, having filled a lot of different berths for Kerry previously. Kerry got out of Munster easily enough and beat Galway by 2-6 to 1-6. Meath in the final, and there weren't too many people expecting a Royal victory. Mick Dunne was the only pundit to tip Meath – but Mick Dunne was one of the greats in his own right.

That was a disservice to a great Meath team. Peter McDermott, the famous 'man in the cap', Kevin Lenehan, Nobby Clarke, Willie Rattigan....I get the impression that Paddy 'Hands' O'Brien was the best full back of his own or many eras. They were an aging team; this was the last chance saloon for many of them.

Man of the match was Tom Moriarty from Castlegregory, and he wore green and gold. Except that it was Meath's green and gold. Kerry's midfielder Tom Moriarty, also from Castlegregory, and his team-mates were wearing Dingle's red and white to avoid a clash of colours. It wasn't an issue beforehand

– Kerry had also worn Dingle jerseys and won an All Ireland Final in 1939. Guess who they had beaten? In fact, Meath had never beaten Kerry in a championship game?

Meath knew their history too, and they won fair and square. The day didn't start well. The Kerry minors, including the likes of Tim Barrett, Jack Dowling, Brendan Kennelly, Tom Long, Jim Foley, Teddy Dowd, Johnny Culloty, Fred Lynch...the likes of Tomo Burke, Teddy O'Sullivan, Johnny Foley, Eamonn Horan, and some lad called Mick O'Dwyer only just made the subs' bench. They looked better than Dublin, but a star turn from Vinnie Bell and a very late goal he created saw Dublin win out by 3-3 to 1-8. Dublin, and Bell, would also win the minor hurling.

The game started with referee Simon Deignan, who had refereed Kerry's Munster Final victory in 1947 before playing on the Cavan team that beat them in the Polo Grounds Final that year, and had also played county championship with Tralee's John Mitchels, chasing a small dog off the pitch...That's got nothing to do with Seán Murphy. It's just that there's no way I could resist the opportunity to write a sentence like that.

To cut a long story a tiny bit shorter, Meath were stronger, fitter, and faster than Kerry. John Joe Sheehan's goal shortly before halftime gave Kerry a tiny lifeline, but Meath were simply better overall. There was talk afterwards about banning collective training – Kerry, with ten players domiciled outside the county, apparently felt that it had given Meath an unfair advantage.

1955: Collective training was banned in 1955. I believe it complicated matters for everyone and equalled opportunities for no-one. Kerry only led Waterford by two points at half-time in their first game but blew them away in the second. Mind you, Kerry were without Jim Brosnan, studving medicine in the US, or the retired Jackie Lyne. Kerry had given championship debuts to Gerald O'Sullivan of Legion and Dan McAuliffe from Duagh, both of whom were working in South Kerry at the time. Poor ould South Kerry....arrah, they'd be more likely to win a County Championship than Waterford to beat Kerry! The idea that a Waterford side could beat Kerry in football....ah, hubris. But both of those are later stories. Seán missed that game but he was back for Cork.

Kerry needed him, needed everybody. Eamonn Young had Cork well primed. It was an absolute cracker. If anything Cork were better footballers, but hadn't any shooters like Paudie Sheehy (0-5) or Tadghie Lyne (0-4). Kerry edged a titanic battle by 0-14 to 2-6, with Cork desperately unlucky to crash a goal chance back off the post late on.

Confidence in Kerry wasn't high, and it didn't improve when they were haunted to draw against Cavan in the semi-final. With two minutes left, Kerry were two points down and barely hanging on. Seán won the ball, sent it to teenage Johnny Culloty, who crossed it into the Cavan square. Seamus Morris, the keeper, went to gather. But so did Phil 'Gunner' Brady, one of Cavan's Polo Grounds heroes. Tadhgie Lyne had just a sliver of a chance as he nipped in....but even a sliver was plenty for Tadghie Lyne. Goal, and Kerry a point up. More drama. Cavan got, and deserved, a late equaliser.

The replay saw a very low-scoring first half before Kerry cut loose with two goals early in the second half from John Joe Sheehan and Johnny Culloty and Mick Morris added two more for a comfortable Kerry finish.

Dublin had been the strongest early power in gaelic football, but that was largely based on immigration from rural areas. The GAA was essentially a 'culchie' sport, proudly so, soccer was the urban one and much riven by dissent, rugby was upper class. None of that may have been fair, but all of it was true.

Until Vincents. Love them or hate them - and a lot of Dublin inclined to the latter - but they were very much Dublin. Seán Murphy, who had given up teaching and gone to UCD to study medicine, had played Dublin Championship with Geraldines, although not under his own name. Vincents formed a homegrown core of the Dublin team and in 1955 they looked unbeatable, sweeping all before them. Heffernan, Des 'Snitchie' Ferguson, the Freaneys, Cathal O'Leary, Pádraig 'Jock' Haughey.....Dublin to the core, and Dublin loved them. They were new, dashing, pace and precision. Kerry were cumbersome in comparison. Catch and kick was going to be replaced by panache....

Hubris. It'll get you every time. Let's be fair. Dublin were missing Norman Allen, Marcus Wilson, and Jim McGionness through injury and Kevin Heffernan needed an injection to play. Dublin actually put up a good battle, and Ollie Freaney's late goal had the gap at just three points, but with Tadghie Lyne on board with 0-6 and our own 'flying doctor' Jim Brosnan with two of his own, Kerry had pulled off a bit of a surprise win. Lyne was man of the match, but Seán Murphy featured prominently in that discussion too.

1956. Cork were hurting. It didn't get better quickly as they were hit by a long punt from Denny O'Shea dropping into the net. No problem. They had Kerry completely on the ropes in the first half, leading by 0-6 to 1-0 and with Neilly Duggan's goal disallowed. Kerry were barely hanging on and, in truth, a late goal from Dr. Jim Brosnan to snatch a draw was probably more than Kerry deserved. It was the same story in the replay. Cork were the better side and led by three points when John Cronin got a late goal to make it 1-7 apiece. This time though, Cork held their nerve. Neilly Fitzgerald kicked a winner and Kery were out. Not an auspicious start for this young Mick O'Connell lad!

Another South Kerry lad made his debut a year later. Just Waterford, though, basically a formality. Except.....Waterford 2-5 Kerry 0-10. And, look, spare me all the guff about Kerry's disarray; Waterford earned every bit of it. They took out Cork a few years later as well. Ardfert's Tom Collins played three Munster Finals in 36 hours that weekend – only one of those games is remembered now. It was a long road home for the likes of young O'Dwyer; probably even longer for veterans like Seán Murphy.

1958. Kerry actually got another serious fright

against Tipperary – that was the day that Mick O'Dwyer really made a name for himself. Two goals from Garry McMahon saw Cork off surprisingly comfortably, 2-7 to 0-3. There was a bit of a new name in the All Ireland semifinal. Ulster, apart from Cavan, hadn't really featured much in All Irelands. Tyrone had tried to make the breakthrough last year but were overhauled by Louth. This time out Derry, a highly respected Derry side that included Seán O'Connell, Jimmy McKeever, Roddy Gribben, and Patsy Gormley, saw off Kerry by a point after an absolute cracker.

1959. Seán was rested for the comfortable opening win over Tipperary but, inevitably, was back in situ against Cork. The big news was the return of the teenage corner forward from 1955. Johnny Culloty was back after an ACL injury (a career-ender for most back then), now as a goalkeeper. Cork still had dash and flair, but couldn't break Kerry's half back line of Seán Murphy, Kevin Coffey, and Mick O'Dwyer. A 2-15 to 2-8 victory was deserved overall.

Dublin in the semi-final. Several of the players on either side recall it as the best game they ever played in. Certainly they all gave it everything. Mick O'Connell lorded the first half and Dan McAuliffe got the vital goal. Cathal O'Leary went toe-to-toe with O'Connell in the second half – O'Leary was always under-rated outside his native county – and Pádraig Haughey and Ollie Freaney got goals, but Kerry prevailed on a 1-10 to 2-5 scoreline.

Croke Park, September 27th, 1959. Kerry versus Galway in Croke Park. Seán Murphy's finest hour, possibly by the best individual display in a game by any gaelic footballer. Frank Evers had given Galway the ascendancy with a goal after five minutes to put them in front. Kerry managed to draw level by half-time, 0-5 to 1-2. It was a day for defenders, really, with the likes of Enda Colleran, Jack Mahon, Jerome O'Shea, and Niall Sheehv. And one of them absolutely reigned supreme. Mind you....let's keep these grains of truth in the story - it was surprising that Galway kept playing it out to the left wing. I've heard it suggested that they wanted to avoid O'Connell in the middle.... nonsense. Frank Evers would have loved competing against Micko and Seamus Murphy, and was plenty good enough to do it. Galway's problems were two-fld. They just couldn't keep the ball away from Seán Murphy, and they couldn't keep their goal protected. Kerry took over, with two goals from Dan McAuliffe and another from Garry McMahon, to win by 3-7 to 1-4. In truth, it was as comfortable as it sounds. We'd see those Gaway players again and things would be nowhere near as comfortable for Kerry, but Seán Murphy would have retired from the inter-county scene by then.

Seán Murphy was the obvious certainty to follow in Jim McKeever's footsteps as the Texaco Footballer of the Year – Christy Ring won the hurling.

Seán was a beloved family doctor in Tralee and a devoted family man. Those aspects of his life are obviously far more important, but the fabric of Kerry is woven of football stories and there was none finer on any field than Dr. Seán Murphy. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam dilis.



## HERBS

Most herbs are very easy to grow. They can be gown in the garden in vegetable beds or raised beds or in containers like a window box on a window sill. There are a lot of different types of herbs, but the most commonly grown herbs for culinary use are the likes of basil and dill which are annuals and have to be sown every year, parsley and chervil which are biennials last for two years while herbs like fennel, mint, tarragon are perennials.

If you want to grow mint, make sure you plant it in a container and not in the ground as it is a very invasive herb.

Even if you are not using your herbs for culinary use, it is important to pick them regularly, otherwise they tend to go to seed very guickly.

"So let us come boldly to the throne of our Gracious God. There we will receive His mercy, and we will find grace to help us when we need it most" (Hebrews 4:16 NLT).

Welcome back dear student, continuing on from last week on God supplying our needs. Folks joke that they might have to burn somewhere for a while because of how they've lived, but it's no joking matter. The Word of God dearly lays out the Truth. 'Absent from the body is present with the Lord' — that means when we close our eyes on this earth for the last time, we open them in eternity (2 Corinthians 5:8). Hell is real and it's no party. Often I see the bars overflowing with people partying, singing, and dancing. For many, the partying masks inner turmoil. The fanciful notion that hell is party-central, and heaven is just boring and no fun at all - is far from the Truth. However, He gave us a free will for us to choose whether we spend eternity with Him in heaven, or separated from Him forever, with no second chances.

There is only One Way to know our eternal destination - that is by accepting Jesus Christ as Lord, giving him our whole heart, and acknowledging that His sinless life, death, and resurrection paid the price for our freedom (John 14:6). And there is no other Saviour, and no shortcut through anyone else but Jesus! (Acts 4:12) No matter how good a life we live, that is not a free pass into heaven. Only through the Blood of the Saviour can we come into God's Presence washed and cleansed from our sins (1 John 1:7-9). There's no special prayers after death that will change the outcome.
