Killarney Brewing Company has confirmed that the examinership process has now concluded. Unfortunately, despite the best efforts of all involved, the process did not result in a successful investment outcome.

Like many in the drinks manufacturing industry, KBD has faced significant and sustained challenges in recent years, stemming from the lasting effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, delays in opening our state-of-the-art distillery in Fossa, global supply

chain disruptions, rising input costs, and ongoing geopolitical and trading pressures. More recently, high tariffs on Irish whiskey exports to the US and wider economic uncertainty have further impacted the business.

Earlier this year, the company had reached a preliminary agreement to merge with a US-based strategic partner, but the partner ultimately creativity that defined our journey.



chose not to proceed. In response, KBD entered the examinership process in the hope of securing new investment to protect jobs and stabilise operations for the long term. Despite tireless efforts, no suitable investor was secured within the timeframe set out by the court.





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

Double Joy for Killarney Valley at London Diamond League and SIAB International

It was a day of double celebration for Killarney Valley Athletic Club as two of their athletes delivered outstanding performances on the international stage, one at the prestigious London Diamond League where Sarah Leahy set a new Irish 4 x 100 record and the other at the SIAB Schools' International where Babatunde Smith of Killarney valley ac and Killarney community has won the bronze medal and has set a new PB (personal best) of 1.89m

Sprint sensation Sarah Leahy created history today as part of the Irish women's 4x100m relay team, setting a new national record of 43.73 seconds. The team, which included Lauren Roy, Ciara Neville, and Sarah Lavin alongside Leahy, delivered a thrilling performance at London's iconic City Stadium, a venue that once hosted the Olympic Games and World Athletics Championships.

Sarah, known for her explosive starts, took the first leg, lining up against global stars such as Shericka Jackson and Dina Asher-Smith. The double national indoor 60m champion from Killarney set the tone with a world-class opening leg, helping Ireland make a historic mark on the sprinting stage.

Sarah has found the experience today very emotional in the full sell-out crowd in the London city stadium and the girls have received admiration from across Ireland, none more so than from Sarah's home club, where members of Killarney Valley AC are bursting with pride at Sarah's remarkable achievement.

Meanwhile, another Killarney Valley athlete shone brightly. Babatunde Smith, a rising star



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

ELECTORAL SYSTEM NEEDS TIGHTENING IN KERRY



Kenmare is hitting headlines after Seanad privilege was used to raise a case of voter impersonation, during the last Local and European elections.

A garda investigation got underway on June 07th 2024, polling day, after a machine driver from Cahersiveen was suspected to have voted in a polling booth in Kenmare. Polling staff, election workers for Fine Gael and Independents who spotted him gave statements to Gardai in Kenmare, a file was sent to Dublin and the office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (the DPP) directed prosecution.

The machine driver who is in full time employment pleaded guilty, voting cards were left in a tractor and he was given one and "asked by somebody" to vote for a candidate when he was at a low ebb personally, and he was never interviewed by gardai, Kenmare District Court was told. That's all we know.

But the country is talking about it now after it was raised under privilege in the Seanad by Fine Gael.

"Every dog and devil" knew the machine driver was employed by a Healy-Rae company, for years, yet "unusually" his employer was not disclosed in court, Senator Mike Kennelly said. Mike is like a dog with a bone on the subject and wants an investigation.

More broadly, voter impersonation cases very rarely come before courts. So why was there such little watch over this highly unusual case in Kenmare?

We have all kinds of sanctimonious statements from the electoral commission about the importance of voting etc. Yet when push comes to shove, a rare case of voter impersonation was put in with the motoring offences!

No offence to the District court presenters Kerry, who are all very capable, but I would have expected the DPP would insist on the big wigs, State barristers and such to present such a rare case concerning fraud in our electoral system, the heart of democracy.


There must surely now be pressure on a second, separate electoral Kerry case, stagnating in the system involving voter registration irregularity, this time in Killarney.

Before the local elections of 2019, hundreds of registration forms for the supplementary registrar without the voters being present were stamped by a garda in Killarney. Allegedly.

The Garda Ombudsman conducted "a public interest" investigation. A file was sent to the DPP. And there it rests. Unless of course it has been dealt with among the parking fines! Politicians and the authorities might need to sit up a bit.

The powers in Dublin especially seem to believe we are all very nice people in Kerry; Much too nice to engage in skulduggery. And on the very rare occasion we do, it is not to be taken too seriously. We're not feeling ourselves, that's all there is to it. Voting cards found in tractors to cheer us up is entirely to be expected.

Danny Healy-Rae and his family are not commenting on what was said by Senator Kennelly under Senate privilege. That is their privilege.



Crows in Killarney are nothing new. But a crowding of several "murders of crows" last

week in Killarney saw plenty of pictures on social media. I took my own shot by the Beech road car park. The ornithologist Ed Carty told me crows love Killarney because they have good feeding there and message each other. It is likely the crow telegraph shared something juicy on the evening in question and like lions in the Serengeti Park they flocked to Killarney town centre.

Young crows have left the nest now and this adds to their numbers in Killarney. Tralee has crows too but they are not as visible because they tend to gather in Ballyseedy, so they are not as remarked upon, Ed says.

In November 2002 an attempt was launched to control the numbers of crows in Killarney.

The then great Page two of the Irish Times - alas no longer - which focused on regional reports, ran a report from me from Killarney Town Council.

The council had asked Dúchas, the heritage service, to implement a programme immediately to control the number of Corvidae in Killarney National Park. The council believed the caw of the crow had ousted the call of the songbird. Grey crows, magpies, rooks and Corvidae of all description had proliferated recently in the park.

Cllr Pat F. O'Connor, who tabled the motion, believed the large number of Corvidae has led to "a marked absence of birdsong" in the park. To remedy the situation, he wanted their numbers controlled.

"I remember one lamentable occasion when I rose early to hear the dawn chorus only to be greeted by the odd chirp and tweet, which disappeared completely as one travelled away from Muckross House," said ClIr O'Connor. There was, he claimed, a direct link between the absence of songbirds and the large number of Corvidae in the park. Dúchas said horse dung studded with oats and corn was a key draw for the crows.

I am not sure if anything was done by Dúchas which has changed its name to the NPWS. Horse nappies were introduced in the meantime. However there seems little inspection of these devices and the dung is back on the roads of the park and the highways. Certainly we again have plenty of crows.

THE DREAM OF THE SOUTH KERRY GREENWAY

The South Kerry Greenway rumbles, or should I say grumbles along eleven years after being launched. Money is pouring into this ambitious project on which the expectations of south Kerry are being hung.

It is plagued with difficulties, not least the disturbance to landowners despite the Compulsory Purchase Order out on all lands, and despite the brave face being put on the project promoters and politicians.

A meeting is to take place with some of the most grievously affected landowners this week.

But going through farmland is now just one obstacle. Just 8 km or a quarter of the tarred path is under construction. Estimated costs have

soared from the initial five million euro.

Over 22 million euro has been allocated by the T II and this is just over the past four years.

Money is only some of it. The next stage, the spectacular Glinsk viaduct and the Drung Hill Tunnels is peppered with "engineering challenges". That 73-ft Victorian viaduct on which Minister Alan Kelly launched the national greenway strategy in 2014 is not at all as stable as first thought. Alas, I have been to this movie before. With the Jeanie Johnston ship. A council project that got completely out of hand. I hope I will be proved wrong. But the same signs are there as there were with the dream of Jeanie - unanticipated difficulty; a project that is far too ambitious for a local authority, money being poured into it. And a far too brave face being put on all of it.

Letter to the Editor

A Chara,

I just read Anne Lucey's piece in last week's issue of Killarney Outlook. I'd make the following observations:

- 1. Many people outside Killarney (and Kerry) are horrified that the town hosts a 4 July parade given the USA's support for the genocide in Palestine;
- 2. If people are encouraged to visit the town to support the parade, why shouldn't people be permitted to visit the town to participate in the counter-protest?
- 3. If people are upset that folk from Macroom came to Killarney to participate in the counter-protest, then why should a band or organisation from Millstreet participate in the parade? By the article's logic, only people from Killarney should be involved;
- 4. The protestors were vocal throughout the parade, not just when 'children performers passed'. Focusing on this aspect is sensationalist and incorrect; it also neglects to acknowledge that there were many children participating in the counter-protest too

5. Just as visitors to the town watched the parade, visitors to the town – who weren't aware of the parade nor the counter-protest – also participated in the counter-protest. I spoke with several people who took part in this counter-protest and were aghast that Killarney was hosting this 'American' event;

6. There was no mention in any of the Cathaoirleach's comments – nor in Anne Lucey's piece – regarding the verbal and physical intimidation aimed at the counterprotest. The only violence during the protest came from pro-Israeli supporters, primarily US citizens and drunk Englishmen, several of whom assaulted people at the end of the event. Why were you silent about that?

7. No-one can say they are 'anti-war' yet support such an event when the foreign country partner (USA) is central to the genocide.

Be reassured that if the genocide in Palestine hasn't ended by July 2026, the counter-protest will probably be ten times' the size of what it was this year. Outside the Killarney tourism bubble, many Irish people are shocked that

the town hosts this event. History will not be kind to anyone who continues to support this parade

When you worry about falling tourism numbers, rather than blame the presence of refugees and asylum seekers, you might focus on more tangible problems, namely chronic town centre traffic congestion, the inability of Kerry County Council to tackle illegal parking, a lack of public transport, inadequate cycling and pedestrian infrastructure, and the unsustainable price gouging that many restaurants and pubs are now engaging in.

I would encourage the Cathaoirleach to focus his energies on those immediate issues, rather than focus on people who participated in a legal, peaceful counter-protest.

Scoil Nuachabhail is a local National School located just down the road from our event start.



CLLR. CALLS FOR ALL GAA GAMES TO BE AIRED FREE



At this week's Kerry County Council meeting, Cllr. John O'Donoghue raised the issue of GAA Games on TV. Cllr. O'Donoghue believes that all games should be aired free on terrestrial TV and asked members to Kerry County Council to write to the GAA Executive.

Here is what he had to say:


That we would write to the Gaa executive and ask that they review their policy of showing games behind a pay wall online, as this is contrary to the amateur ethos of the organisation.

While the Gaa have always had a streaming service in place through Gaa Go, of particular benefit to those overseas and providing a very valuable service, this year they have ramped things up considerably through Gaa+. Where as previously I took little notice of games being streamed online as it was generally a game that would not otherwise have been broadcast and afforded fans from those counties a chance to watch a game they may not otherwise have been able to see, this year there has huge shift in their business model with some games being deliberately withheld from tv broadcast in order to stream them online. The Gaa have admitted as much and this new departure is very troubling. A very strong argument can be made that pay per view Gaelic games is in direct contravention of the amateur ethos of the game, and I certainly imagine that

those visionaries who met in Hayes Hotel on November 1st 1884 to set up CLG in order to promote Irish games, the Irish language and Irish Culture would find it difficult to reconcile their vision for the Association with the current model. I do however accept that the answer from Croke Park will most likely be that it costs money to run the Gaa and this is a funding stream they cannot do without If that is the case, I at the very least ask that they would consider approaching terrestrial broadcasters e.g. Rte to work something out where people could pay an fee and the games would then be made available either on a dedicated channel or RTE News. Currently many older people have said to me that while they are not happy paying to watch games, they would begrudgingly do so except that they do not have the IT skills to put the game playing on a device even if they have paid the subscription. This is grossly unfair as the people who are too elderly to attend games are being excluded from watching them online due to a lack of technological knowhow. These same people are very often the same ones that gave a lifetime of service to the Gaa and we cannot leave behind now. It is not right and I hope my colleagues will support my motion.

CALL FOR FREE BOWEL SCREENING FOR OVER 70'S

• Further to a previous Notice of Motion I brought and given the favourable response I received from the then Minister, that we would write to the Minister for Health to ask when free bowel screening for over 70s will commence. This is a very straightforward NOM. Previously I received a very favourable response from the then Minister regarding the roll out of free bowel screening for over 70s and I am now wondering when it will begin. This is the second most common form of cancer in men, and the third most common in women. It is the second leading cause of cancer related deaths world wide which is a shame as I believe it is also one of the most easily diagnosed, once a test is done. It is also reasonably treatable provided it is diagnosed in the early stage of the disease. The difficulty is that symptoms do not present until the latter stages of the disease and by then treatment is much more difficult. I believe that through the test, it can actually be identified in advance of it appearing at all i.e. they can tell you that you are quite likely to get it in the future, and given that it causes just over 1000 deaths in Ireland each year, it is imperative that all the most at risk groups can avail of free tests. The over 70's are in this category and I hope that the service will be extended to them before long.

Work Starts on New Home for Four Residents at St John of God Kerry Services

The official sod turning has taken place today of a new residential facility in Killorglin for St John of God Housing Association (SJOG HA). The house on completion will serve as a permanent home for four people living with intellectual disabilities from St. John of God Community Services – Kerry (SJOGCS Kerry). The four residents who are currently living in Saint Mary of the Angels, will move to their own home in Killorglin in early 2026. The purchase of the house and the renovations are being carried out with the support of Kerry County Council and the HSE, with approval from the Department of Housing. Work will be carried out by Teddy Walsh Construction.

The new residential facility will be staffed by a dedicated team from SJOGCS Kerry to ensure the residents' needs are fully met, whilst also providing them with the opportunity to live as independently as possible.

"Ireland's place in the World of 2040"



The story of the world's first transatlantic cable which resulted in the first ever message to be transmitted across an ocean, is an inspiring one. In 1858 the first ever message was sent from Valentia Island in County Kerry to Hearts Content in Newfoundland in which Queen Victoria sent a note of congratulations to President Buchanan of the United States. The 98-word message took 16 hours to transmit, and the President's response of 143 words was sent in just 10 hours. Improvements in the cable technology meant that when the next successful cable was laid in 1866, messages could be sent in minutes.

This year, keynote speakers spoke on a range of perspectives from history to arts & media to politics & society to technology & business.

Speakers include historian Professor Jane Ohlmeyer of Trinity College Dublin, journalist Mick Clifford, Minister of State, Michael Healy Rae and businessman Denis O' Brien. Each of the presentations will be followed by a panel discussion with 4 of Ireland's future leaders, all in their 30's, the same age as Cyrus Field, the entrepreneur who transformed the world when he led the transatlantic cable project in the late 1800s. Cllr. Cahill Highlights Urgent Rural Housing Needs at July Council Meeting

Fianna Fáil councillor Tommy Cahill, the youngest member of Kerry County Council, has called on the local authority to urgently explore new measures to support individuals and families facing housing challenges in areas designated as Rural Areas Under Urban Influence.

At the July Full Council Meeting, held on Monday, Cllr. Cahill tabled a motion asking, "What can Kerry County Council do to help address the housing crisis in areas designated a Rural Area Under Urban Influence? There are people who clearly demonstrate a rural housing need in these areas and are in need of housing."

In response, the Council pointed to the framework of the National Planning Framework (NPF) and current County Development Plan policies, which focus on sustainable growth through the delivery of housing in key urban centres. While reaffirming a commitment to rural development, the Planning Department acknowledged the importance of balancing growth with national guidelines. They also noted that ongoing updates to the Municipal District Settlement Plans aim to ensure sufficient zoning to meet housing targets.

Cllr. Cahill welcomed the reply but stressed that more must be done to ensure that local people with genuine rural housing needs are not left behind.

"We have families who've lived in these communities for generations, who want to build a home and raise their children where they grew up. Right now, the system doesn't adequately reflect their needs. I brought this motion forward to shine a light on their struggles and push for more flexibility in how housing policy is implemented in rural Kerry," said Cllr.

He continued, "We must find the balance between national policy and

local reality. If we want our rural communities to survive and thrive, we need to give people a real chance to live there. We must ensure that the new legislation does not solely focus on cities but also on areas designated as rural areas under urban influence."

Cllr. Cahill, who has quickly built a reputation as a passionate advocate for young people and rural development, has pledged to continue working with Council officials and his colleagues to bring forward practical solutions.

"This training helps ensure our shops are safe, supportive spaces where all customers feel understood and valued. It's a small step that makes a big difference and it reflects our wider commitment to accessibility, inclusion and community care."



The Tralee boutique is part of a nationwide network of Jack and Jill Charity Boutiques that help fund vital in-home nursing care and respite support for children with complex medical needs. Currently, Jack and Jill supports 12 children in Kerry and has supported 95 children in the county since the charity was

founded in 1997.

Jack and Jill relies on public support, including funds raised through its Charity Boutiques to deliver this critical care model which is often described as a lifeline for the families its supports.

Jack and Jill is a nationwide charity that funds and provides up to 100 hours per month of in-home nursing care and respite support to families caring for children, up to the age of six, with severe learning disability often associated with complex medical needs.

Typically, these children may be tube fed, oxygen dependent, may not sleep, take seizures, need a lot of medication and require around-the-clock care. Understandably, their parents can be exhausted and need a break, which is where Jack and Jill comes in. Jack and Jill's service operates seven days a week, with no means test, no red tape and no waiting list. Another key part of the service is end-of-life-care for all children up to the age six, irrespective of diagnosis, empowering parents to take their child home to die at this most difficult time.

The charity must raise over €7.9 Million in 2025 to keep this vital service going, with approximately 21.5% coming from the HSE.





WOMEN'S HEALTH & STRENGTHTRAINING: FAQ Breaking myths, building strength, and supporting women on their fitness journey.

Q1: Is lifting weights really beneficial for women, or will it make me bulky?

A: This is one of the most common myths—and it's just not true! Women typically don't have the testosterone levels required to build large, bulky muscles naturally. Strength training helps tone muscles, increase metabolism, support fat loss, and improve bone health—all without making you look "too muscular." You'll feel strong, not bulky.

Q2: I'm new to the gym. Where should I start with weight training?

A: Start with the basics! Focus on bodyweight movements like squats, lunges, push-ups, and planks to build a foundation. Then, add light weights with proper form. Machines can be less intimidating and help you learn safe movement patterns. Don't be afraid to ask staff for help or consider a few sessions with a personal trainer to build confidence.

Q3: How often should women lift weights?

A: Aim for 2-3 strength training sessions per week. This gives your muscles time to recover while still promoting progress. Even 30-minute workouts can be effective if you're consistent. Combine strength work with walking, light cardio, or flexibility sessions for a well-rounded routine.

Q4: Is strength training safe during different life stages (like pregnancy or menopause)? A: Yes—when done appropriately. During pregnancy, many women continue lifting with modified routines, focusing on safety and core stability. After childbirth and during

menopause, strength training becomes even more important to maintain bone density, muscle mass, and balance. Always check with a doctor and work with professionals trained in women's fitness.



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COLOUR VISION DEFICIENCY

Most people with a colour : vision deficiency (CVD) are able to see things as clearly as other people but they have difficulty distinguishing between some colours. This may have an impact upon a child's performance at school or on the sports field and can also affect career options, for example becoming an electrician or a pilot. As most people with a colour vision deficiency can see some colours. There are some people who are unable to see any colour at all, but this is very rare.

In the normal eye there are three different types of cones. Some cones are best at capturing long wavelength light. Others catch medium wavelength (green) light, while other cones respond best to short wavelength (blue) light. The signals from these cones are sent to the brain where they are perceived as colour. People with CVD are born with one or more cone types absent or different.

Most people with CVD are red/ green deficient, which means they mix up all colours with some red or green in them. For example, a red/green CVD person will confuse blue and purple because they can't 'see' the red element in purple. This is more severe in some forms of CVD than in others.

affected Who iς colour vision deficiency? Colour vision may be affected by some eye diseases, but the most common cause of CVD is genetic. The gene for this is transmitted on the X chromosome (from your mother) and so it mainly affects men and boys, with around 8% of males and 0.5% of females having CVD. There are around 3 million people in the UK with some kind of CVD.

What are the symptoms of colour blindness?

If someone has CVD they may have difficulties distinguishing between different types of food - for example mistaking chocolate sauce for ketchup. It may also be very hard to get a child with CVD to try green vegetables as they will look unappetising. Older children may confuse the red and green lights on their games console. If you have any concerns about your child's vision, a sight test is recommended.

How do you treat colour vision deficiency?

There is currently no cure for genetic CVD. Your optometrist may suggest using colour filters on your glasses, or coloured contact lenses. People with illnesses that have led to CVD, may find that their vision returns to normal when their illness has been treated.



"The imposition of tariffs by President Donald Trump could not have come at a worse time, as I believe the success of this fantastic project could depend on the volume of exports of Killarney Whiskey to the United States. The brand name of Killarney was vital too, as it carries quite a lot of weight in the USA, but nobody could have foreseen the tariffs, which make for nervous investors" said the Kerry Teachta Dála.

"I would be honoured to make myself available to facilitate meetings of all and any stakeholders involved. We need to work fast and smart here, if we are to pull this back from the brink" added Michael Cahill TD.

GNEEVEGUILLA GRAVEYARD



In response to representations made by Fianna Fáil's Spokesperson for Older People, Michael Cahill TD, Kerry County Council advise that they have made a number of approaches to landowners in Gneeveguilla, who have land suitable for use as a Graveyard, but they advise that those holdings are not for sale. Other nearby parcels of land are unsuitable for such use, due to rock and groundwater levels.

"This is very unsettling for residents of Gneeveguilla and its surrounding area, as it could mean that land suitable for graveyard use may have to be sourced at a different location, possibly outside the Parish than at the present location on the grounds of the Church of the Holy Rosary" stated the Kerry Teachta Dála.

"There is growing concern in Gneeveguilla that loved ones may have to be buried outside the Parish. It is absolutely crucial that land is sourced in or around the village for a Burial Ground and in that context I am calling on Kerry County Council and the new Chief Executive, Fearghal Reidy to make every effort to acquire a half acre plot of land" stated Deputy Cahill.

"Equally so, I am calling on any landowner who may have suitable lands in Gneeveguilla to make contact with either Peter Bradley in the Burial Ground Department in Kerry County Council or to contact me directly if they so wish" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"The minimum depth for a burial without encountering groundwater or rock is to a depth of 2.65 meters and this limits the options open to the Council in Gneeveguilla. Should any potentially suitable land for a Burial Ground come available for consideration, then the Council will carryout further assessments on the land" said Deputy Cahill.

"This issue arose not that long ago in Beaufort also and thankfully I was able to facilitate meetings between the stakeholders involved, eventually bringing a positive solution. I can assure the people of Gneeveguilla that I am at their disposal, to act as an intermediary or facilitator on their behalf, on what is an extremely anxious issue" added Michael Cahill TD.





Cost of Running a Car in Ireland Hits €10,373 in 2025



New analysis by OUTsurance Ireland has revealed that Irish motorists can expect to spend an average of €10,373 annually to keep an average petrol or diesel car on the road in 2025, highlighting the growing burden on car owners.

From maintenance and depreciation to fuel and parking, the cost of running a car now equates to €864 per month or approximately €28 per day. Using Ireland's most popular car - the Hyundai Tucson - as a benchmark, OUTsurance's experts have compiled analysis to give the public a clear and comprehensive view of the real costs associated with motoring.

Key Factors Driving the Cost of Car Ownership Fuel (€1,560/year)

Fuel remains a significant outlay for most drivers, especially amid ongoing price fluctuations. Based on SEAI data, fuel costs €10.40 per 100km at a price of €1.76 per litre for petrol or €8.60 per 100km based on a cost of €1.68 per litre for diesel as of July 2025. For a 1.6L Hyundai Tucson travelling 15,000km annually, this translates to approximately €1,560 a year.

Insurance (€616/year)

According to the Central Bank's 2024 National Claims Information Database, the average car insurance premium in Ireland sits at €616. OUTsurance encourages consumers to shop around, with many of their car insurance customers reporting an average saving of €97 on renewals.

Depreciation (€6,274/year)

The steepest cost comes from depreciation. A 2024 Hyundai Tucson valued at €40,000 will have depreciated by approximately €6,274 over the course of this year, based on standard valuation

Motor Tax (€435/year)

Tax costs depend on vehicle emissions. With a range of 141-187 g/km for the Hyundai Tucson, motor tax is estimated at €435

NCT Testing (€60/year)

Routine testing is a legal requirement. At €60 per test, most cars under 10 years old are tested every two years, averaging €30 per annum. Retests incur a €40 fee if needed.

Maintenance & Servicing (€736/year)

Annual upkeep, from regular servicing (€249) to unforeseen costs such as replacing tyres and general maintenance like car washes, totals €736 per year on average. OUTsurance's experts have highlighted how regular upkeep and careful driving on the roads can save motorists money in this regard.

Tolls (€208/year)

Frequent motorway users will spend approximately €208 annually on tolls, assuming 80 trips at an average cost of €2.60 each.

With toll costs ranging from €1.70 to €3.50 depending on when a driver is travelling and which toll road they use, motorists could pay at least €208 annually on average. Careful route planning can help to avoid tolls in some instances.

Parking (€484/year)

Across Ireland, parking costs range from €1.20 to €5 per hour, depending on the location. As a result, the average motorist can pay for parking for around 156 hours in a year, equating to €484 annually.

New RSA Report Highlights Stark Risks for Motorcyclists on Irish Roads

Report shows 105 motorcyclists killed and 884 seriously injured between 2020 and 2024

The Road Safety Authority (RSA) has published a sobering new report highlighting the significant risks facing motorcyclists on Irish roads. The Motorcyclist Spotlight Report: Fatalities and Serious Injuries, 2020 to 2024 reveals that 105 motorcyclists lost their lives and 884 were seriously injured during the five-year period, accounting for 14% of all road fatalities and 12% of serious injuries.

Based on Irish collision data, the report shows that young to middleaged men remain the most vulnerable, with 65% of motorcyclist fatalities aged 16–45 and 100% of fatalities being male. The majority of serious injuries were male (93%) and 82% were aged 16-55.

Key findings from the report indicate that between 2020 and 2024: An average of 21 motorcyclist fatalities and 177 serious injuries per

40% of fatalities occurred between 1pm and 5pm, with another 10% between 8pm and 9pm.

Half of all motorcyclist fatalities took place at the weekend (Saturday-

74% of motorcyclist deaths occurred on rural roads, with Dublin and Cork accounting for the highest numbers of both fatalities and serious

27% of deaths happened at junctions and 63% involved collisions with other vehicles – the other vehicles most commonly being cars (59%) and light goods vehicles (13%).


Serious injuries peaked between May and September, particularly in June (13%).

Two thirds of serious injuries occurred between 12pm and 8pm, with Sunday the most dangerous day (22%).

Failure to observe was identified as the most common contributory action in multi-vehicle collisions resulting in serious injuries.

The RSA is calling on all road users to increase vigilance, particularly during the summer months when serious motorcyclist injuries typically

Ms. O'Connor added: "We must act now to reverse these figures. We all have a part to play in protecting the most vulnerable on our roads. We're urging drivers to take a second look before pulling out or turning this is a life-saver look and we all need to build it into our every trip. We also need for motorcyclists to prioritise safe riding at all times."







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REIGNING CHAMPIONS DEFEATED IN ALL IRELAND SEMI FINAL

Meath 2-12 | Kerry 1-9

Kerrie Cole and Sarah Wall struck goals in either half at Glenisk O'Connor Park in Tullamore on Saturday as Meath booked a return to the TG4 All-Ireland senior football championship final for the first time since 2022 by dethroning reigning champions Kerry.

Although their opponents raced two points clear in the early moments with unanswered efforts from Siofra O'Shea (free) and Anna Galvin, a Meath side that were buoyed by an excellent knockout triumph at home to Tipperary 13 days earlier subsequently edged in front with three scores on the bounce from Marion Farrelly, Emma Duggan and Ciara Smyth.


While a fine point from play by O'Shea had Kerry back on level terms, Meath rocked their Munster rivals on 18 minutes when Cole cut in from the right and smashed an unstoppable shot into the opposition net via the underside off the crossbar.

After Duggan converted a close-range Meath free, Niamh Ní Chonchúir chipped in with a much-needed brace for a Kerry side that spurned a number of scoring opportunities in the opening period. Traded points between Farrelly and O'Shea ensured the Royals brought a 1-5 to 0-6 cushion into the interval, but the Kingdom turned the game on its head when Rathmore attacker Danielle O'Leary bagged a superb goal within two minutes of the resumption.

However, Meath didn't panic and they squeezed back into the ascendancy with points from Duggan and Aoibhin Cleary. Although O'Shea and Caoimhe Evans split the uprights for Kerry in a tense third-quarter, these scores arrived either side of an expertly-taken Meath goal by marauding defender Sarah Wall — whose sister Vikki got through a lot of hard work for the Royals — after 40 minutes.

Smyth and influential Kerry ace O'Shea added further points for their respective outfits as the second half progressed, but Meath were on the brink of victory when former team captain Shauna Ennis and current skipper Cleary registered quickfire scores to leave their side four ahead inside the closing 10 minutes.

The influential Duggan added a two-point salvo as the final whistle approached to make sure Kerry were kept at bay and the Royals — Brendan Martin Cup champions in 2021 and 2022 — can now look forward to a showpiece affair against the winners of today's other semifinal between Dublin and Galway at Croke Park on August 3.

VICTORY FOR KERRY OVER ATHLONE TOWN

On Friday evening, Kerry FC embarked on their third year in the Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup as they took on Athlone Town in Mounthawk Park. The cup game week was a well-needed break for Kerry FC from the league, as they had lost four straight games and were in dire need of a boost to their current form.

For Athlone Town, their form has not been much better. The Midlands side have not won a game since the ninth of May and would be desperate to change their fortunes around in the FAI Cup. Kerry were given a huge boost in their attacking threat last Saturday evening in Longford as new striker Robbie Cleary got off the mark in his debut. Cleary looked to start his first home game on Friday evening against Athlone, and it was certain he would be given a great reception by the Mounthawk Park faithful in a must-win game for the Kingdom


The first opportunity for Athlone Town came in close range for Gideon Tetteh. He got the ball in a dangerous area from Kyle O'Connor and was in a brilliant position to score, but skied his chance from an opportunity that really should have been taken.

The next chance in the game came to the visitors once again. A few intricate passes led to a well-struck pass across the six-yard box from Athlone, but Mathyas Randramamy saved it. Kerry were conceding chances but had not managed to get many of their own inside the opening twenty minutes. Martin Scally was the next to have a shot on goal as his long-range effort outside the area was moving a lot in the air but went over the crossbar to the relief of the home support.

Daniel Okwute had Kerry FC's first big chance of the evening on the half-hour mark when his shot/cross was very close to finding the back of the net, but it went just wide. It was much better from the Kingdom as they tried to turn the screw in the game.

In the final attack of the half, an Arran Healy shot on the edge of the area went just over the crossbar. Healy felt like it should have been a corner and got a yellow card for his protests. Kerry finished the first half well as they hoped to bring the same intensity into the second forty-five.

At the beginning of the second half, it was much of the same story as the first half. Both sides were doing well going forward, but little to no end product on either side. That would change, however, in the fifty-fifth minute when Jason Folarin Oyenuga, who was electric for the visitors all night, cut in on the left-hand side and took a shot on goal. Oyenuga's shot was timid and still managed to make its way passed Mathyas Randriamamy, putting the away side in the lead. Five minutes later, Kerry FC had their biggest



opportunity of the evening as Robbie Cleary was bearing down on goal. His shot was saved by Lee Axworthy Duggan, and he was still scrambling, but it was eventually cleared by Athlone Town. Everyone in Mounthawk Park was left scratching their heads as to how the ball stayed out.

Kerry FC were coming back into the game well and had another big chance of a leveller in the sixty-ninth minute. Daniel Okwute did superbly to get away from his marker on the left-hand side and gave a low, hard cross across the six-yard box, but Dylan Hand was there to keep the danger at bay in a huge moment of fear for the leaders.

Dean Williams had the chance to put the game beyond doubt for Athlone Town as a pass into the six-yard box from Gideon Tetteh found Williams, whose shot was saved superbly by Mathyas Randriamamy. As time passed on, Kerry FC needed something to turn the tide of the game and get themselves back in the tie.

Kerry FC were pushing for the equaliser with consecutive corners in quick succession, but on each occasion, they were being cleared convincingly by Athlone Town. Carl Mujaguzi came close to that all-needed equaliser in the ninety-second minute, but he headed over the crossbar off the back of a Joe Adams corner.

In the final minutes of the game, Kerry FC kept pressing and won themselves a free kick twenty-five yards from goal. Joe Adams stepped up and stuck the effort into the top right corner, bringing the game to extra time. A goal that Kerry FC really deserved in the overall grand scheme of the game, as they pushed for a winner after the ninety. And as fast as you could imagine, after the restart, Kerry FC were in the lead. A brilliant

run from Daniel Okwute on the right wing led to a thumping pass across the six-yard box, and, unlike earlier in the game, there was someone this time to get on the end of it, and it was Kennedy Amechi who put the Kingdom in the lead for the first time on the night.

Kerry FC from then on out were by far the better side and played the remainder of extra time with pure class and saw out extra time to advance into the third round of the Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup. An unbelievable display of grit by this Kerry FC side, who have shown their vulnerabilities at times, but on the night, they showed how much of an unbreakable spirit they continue to have. They will want to keep the momentum going as they now put their focus on next Friday evening when they take on UCD AFC in Mounthawk Park as we return to league action.

All Ireland Final Preview



DONEGAL

Ever since the return of Jimmy McGuinness, Donegal have been on every radar when it comes to contenders for Sam Maguire. McGuinness

is arguably the most iconic individual in the modern era of gaelic games. Back in the late nineties, he arrived in Tralee as part of a star-studded Tralee RTC team – Seamus Moynihan, Pádraig Joyce, Michael Cloherty, Barry O'Shea, Mike Frank Russell, Jack Ferriter, Michael Donnellan.....

Bearded, long-haired McGuinness had the look of a celtic warrior out of a Jim Fitzpatrick painting. He also had an All Ireland medal, having been on the Donegal panel in 1992 as a teenager when they won their first ever All Ireland. The likes of Martin McHugh, the Boyles, Brendan Devenney, and Anthony Molloy were household names. McGuinness was quietly soaking it all up. By the mid-noughties he cut a more sombre, mature figure as he quietly masterminded underage success for Donegal, having furthered his sports education and broadened his already formidable knowledge. Donegal, where fishing, small farming, and emigration constituted the vast majority of employment prospects, always had great sporting people, but no illustrious sporting history of its own. McGuinness certainly didn't rewrite that script on his own, far from it, but he helped lay down the battle plans. In 2010 they agonisingly lost to Dublin in the U21 All Ireland Final when the team captain blasted a late penalty off the crossbar. That would have broken a lot of previous Donegal teams. This one followed McGuinness into senior ranks and two years later that U21 captain, Michael Murphy, was Footballer of the Year and Jimmy McGuinness's Donegal were All Ireland champions for the second time.

There nearly came a third in 2014, but Kerry were standing in their way and prevailed. McGuinness left to take up a professional role with Glasgow Celtic and worked as a soccer coach for a number of years. In his absence Donegal continued to produce great young footballers. By the time he returned to the helm, Donegal were ready to follow their messiah to



the promised land again and they look as if they have footballers capable of doing it. One of the most influential has been that self-same Michael Murphy, who came out of retirement for one more push. It's been the longest championship campaign in GAA history, with no less than ten games under their belt already. Donegal have lost one match in a group stage. They have looked better the longer the campaign has gone on. Now they stand one game away from history. Standing in their way? Once again, it's Kerry.

campaign with a big win, even without Michael Murphy. They followed up with an even more impressive scalp – Kerry in Killarney. There couldn't be any complaints, either. Donegal were the better side all through. Kerry did rally impressively near the finish, but Donegal hit the last score for a deserved victory. Again, that was without Murphy, while Michael Langan had withdrawn from the action after just four minutes.

Michael Murphy was back to face Armagh. Were the All Ireland finalists being a bit cagey about showing their full hand to Ulster opponents? Maybe, maybe not. It certainly wasn't vintage Armagh, but it's doubtful whether they could have lived with Donegal's raking pace and accuracy on the day as the home side racked up a comfortable win.

Donegal were missing Murphy, McBrearty, and McHugh against Galway and it told, as did the shooting form of Shane Walsh for the winners as last year's All Ireland finalists racked up Donegal's first defeat. Next up was another Ulster derby, this time against Derry. Donegal were outplayed for the most part, even if Michael Murphy's introduction at half-time did help matters, and trailed by 1-19 to 0-15 with twelve minutes left. However, Donegal fired the engines at that point while Derry lost the influential Brendan Rogers. That last ten minutes made a lot of people sit up, as Donegal racked up 1-7 without reply to accelerate past their local rivals with formidable ease in the finish

At this stage Donegal looked well on their way


to a National League Final and Tyrone looked bound for Division Two. Jimmy McGuinness had pointed out with straightforward honesty that Donegal were not all that interested in playing another game, even a final, so close to the start of the Ulster Championship. Whether that played a part is hard to tell, but it is worth mentioning that Jimmy McGuinness has never lost a competitive Donegal game in Ballybofey - and still hasn't, this game was played in Letterkenny. Tyrone, battling for survival, were at full strength. Donegal were...not, and this result was not considered the surprise it might seem at first glance. Donegal's final game, against relegation-threatened Mayo, was a real rollercoaster. Donegal had quickly wiped out Mayo's four point half-time lead. Mayo responded with five unanswered points on the trot, only for Donegal to do likewise. Mayo led by two with six minutes left. Dara Ó Baoill had a penalty saved and Hugh McFadden hit the post with a goal attempt. Odhran Doherty pointed to leave one between them. A late point for Ryan O'Donoghue meant that Mayo, who had been staring relegation in the face just minutes before, would face Kerry in the National League Final, while Donegal could look back with real satisfaction on their own campaign.

Donegal opened their Ulster Championship with a preliminary match against Derry. Preliminary or not, this was straight knockout. Shaun Patton had to save an early Shane McGuigan penalty but Donegal's running game, coupled with the shooting accuracy of Dara Ó Baoill and Paddy McBrearty, saw them

open up a six point gap. Dan Higgins did goal for Derry, but Ó Baoill replied and Donegal led by 1-12 to 1-5 at the break. Derry did hit back early in the second half but Donegal always had enough firepower to see off the challenge. Monaghan might not have won Ulster in a decade (they lost by a point to Tyrone in 2021) but they are always there or thereabouts and showed it again by putting Donegal to the pin of their collar. Donegal looked comfortable from early on and led by 0-14 to 0-8 at half-time, even before ringing on All Star Oisín Gallen. Monaghan, thanks to some terrific two point shooting, got right back into it in the second half and made it tight but an outstanding Michael Langan with four points and Finbarr Roarty with an important kick managed to keep Donegal in front and they still had two points to spare at the final whistle.

Donegal were hot favourites against Down in the semi-final and soon lived up to that billing. Donegal were slightly lucky as Down botched a goal chance, but what happened next is worth noting. Shaun Patton launched the ball out, Oisín Gallen on the run laid off to Michael Langan, who in turn found Paddy McBrearty for the goal. I emphasize the rapid build-up because that is trademark Donegal and any team facing them would be well advised to take note of that instant and deadly riposte. That's what Donegal do, and it was no surprise as Donegal won out by 1-19 to 0-16.

It's fair to say that Armagh v Donegal, a repeat of last year's Ulster Final, was always likely to stir the blood. And the game lived up to all the hype,

it was one for the ages. Both sides were at their best, neither side brought any compromise to the table, and there was almost nothing between two superb teams. Donegal with Oisín Gallen and Ciarán Thompson wearing their shooting boots and Michael Murphy at his ballwinning best, led by seven coming into halftime but Armagh rallied to trim the deficit back to three. Once again Donegal pushed their lead out to seven and looked certain winners but Armagh dug deep to outscore their opponents by 0-8 to 0-1 and take the game into extra-time. It was still level at half-time in extra-time, 0-25 to 1-22. Michael Langan set up Ciarán Moore for a second Donegal goal. Armagh equalised and the game looked bound for a repeat of last year's penalty shootout, but Langan set up Niall O'Donnell for a dramatic Donegal winner.

Tyrone were first up in the group stage. Paddy Tally's side had learned their lessons from the Ulster Championship and two goals from Sean O'Donnell gave them the upper hand in the first half. Two pointers from Michael Murphy and Michael Langan, who shared fifteen points between them, looked to have given Donegal the ascendancy, but Tyrone showed commendable steel to finish strongly and win out by a goal. It was Jimmy McGuinness's first ever championship defeat in Ballybofey and left his team under pressure in the group.

Their response was impressively clinical against another Ulster side. Cavan were coming off the back of a huge win over a fancied Mayo and gave Donegal a decent first half. However, they coughed up a soft enough goal to Finbarr Roarty to trail by seven at the break and the second half turned into an absolute nightmare for Cavan. Donegal outscored them by 2-12 to 0-5, with Conor O'Donnell and Caolan McColgan adding Donegal goals.

That set up an enthralling final group game against Mayo. First round defeats for both sides meant that the likelihood was that this was going to be the last game of the 2025 championship for one or the other. Donegal made a strong start and, while Mayo hit back with three points during Peadar Mogan's black card absence, the Ulster champions were full value for a 0-9 to 0-6 half-time lead. David McBrien's goal in the second half gave Mayo a lead of 1-12 to 0-13, but Dara Ó Baoill equalised with a two pointer. It was nip and tuck from then on, with Shaun Patton making a great save

to keep Donegal narrowly in front. In the dying minutes Fergal Boland kicked a sensational equaliser for Mayo, only for Ciarán Moore to kick a last point to win, a point that condemned Mayo to fourth place and elimination.

Donegal were drawn against Louth in the Preliminary Quarter-Final. With respect to the Leinster champions, it would have been a major shock if they had managed to derail their Ulster equivalents. Donegal led by 0-5 to 0-1 before Louth rallied in a tight enough first half. Conor O'Donnell's goal had Donegal in front by 1-6 to 0-7 at the break. The second half was a one-sided contest, Donegal restricting Louth to two Sam Mulroy points until late on and scoring at will themselves. Ciarán Thompson's goal effectively sealed the victory and allowed Jimmy McGuinness to run his bench for the last quarter.

Quarter-Final. With four Ulster teams in the mix (it is unquestionably the most competitive province at all grades these days), the odds favoured two Ulster counties being drawn together, and Donegal were fated to meet Monaghan for the second time this year. Monaghan had improved since that first encounter. They had actually been the better side in the second half of that Ulster quarterfinal by five points and had gone unbeaten in the group stage. That showed as they carved open a seven point lead at half-time with a late scoring burst. That scoreline was a little unfair on Donegal, though, who had been level at 0-8 apiece after 28 minutes and had left two goal chances behind them. Donegal opened the second half with three points on the trot and, after Michael Langan exchanged passes with Michael Murphy before slamming home a brilliant goal, there only looked like being one winner. They reeled off eleven points on the trot in the last quarter to put the game beyond all doubt despite some late consolation scores for Monaghan.

Meath were the story of the year so far and there was huge support for the Royals in Croke Park for the semi-final. They had established a reputation as two point shooters as they beat Dublin, Kerry, and Galway along the way. A focussed Donegal side were an entirely different proposition, though, and Meath found it very hard from early on to get that two point game going as they were forced to shoot from awkward angles or under pressure, coughing

up no less than twelve wides in the first half alone. Meanwhile the likes of Ryan McHugh, Peadar Mogan, and Ciarán Moore were forcing holes in Meath's defence that created space for the likes of Langan, Gallen, and Murphy to pick off the scores. Donegal led by five at half-time. The second half was a procession, with Donegal reeling off goals through Oisín Gallen, Ciarán Moore, and Conor O'Donnell and eventually winning out by twenty points in the finish.

Jimmy McGuinness was a player when Donegal won their first All Ireland in 1992. He was manager for their second in 2012. Kerry had been one of the cradles where he nurtured his formidable football knowledge. Donegal's vernacular anthem has it that "Jimmy's winning matches". Can he win one more?

He has a team that can certainly do it. Shaun Patton probably has the best kick-out record of any keeper this year and he puts great distance on them. That could be a huge problem for a Kerry team who choked both Armagh and Tyrone by using a successful press. Brendan McCole is as good a man-marker as there is out there. I don't see him containing David Clifford on his own, but he'll do as good a job as anyone. Finbarr Roarty and Peader Mogan have pace to burn in bringing the ball up the field. Likewise Ciaran Moore, while the one I'm most afraid of is the veteran Ryan McHugh. He reads the game brilliantly at full pace and forces opposition defenders to leave gaps in order to close him down. He is also a superb passer - leave an opening, and he will put Donegal through it. Eoghn Ban Gallagher made his name as an attacking wing back at minor and U20 but actually minds the house more these days and is likely to follow Seán O'Shea in a more traditional duel. Hugh McFadden is another veteran and a rock solid midfielder, but I personally think that the vastly under-rated Michael Langan is in Footballer of the Year territory. Certainly, as far as I am concerned, his All Star should already be locked down and under the new rules, he is a massive threat. This midfielder is not supplemental to Donegal's impressive attacking array; he is central to it, with 1-25 from play himself.

Michael Murphy is the best footballer of his generation for me and the epicentre of Donegal's attack. He is also Donegal's troubleshooter. It was particularly noticeable in the maelstrom of that Ulster Final, for example, that



Murphy was their go-to man and won almost every ball that came his way (including one absolutely phenomenal catch that reminded of the NFL's famous 'hail mary'). In a game where possession was paramount, he was the difference. Always good for scores himself (he is Donegal's top scorer), he is a focal point of attention and brings the likes of the O'Donnells, Daire Ó Baoill, and Ciarán Thompson into play. Donegal are a running team but, most importantly, they almost never miss. Give the likes of Oisín Gallen (1-23) an opportunity and it's already all over. Add in the likes of Caolan McGonagle, Jamie Brennan, Jason McGee, Stephen McMenamin, Odhran McFadden-Ferry....any of those players can be thrown straight into the mixer and fit in seamlessly.



By any standards, Kerry would have to be considered among aristocrats of gaelic football. Not only have we won the most All Ireland Finals, we have also lost the most finals.

The underlying truth is that we could easily attach caveats to that - Munster has also six teams, and five of them would consider hurling by far the most predominant sport. Cork have always been a formidable obstacle, but they were often our only obstacle en route to an All Ireland semi-final. With Munster seeded, four games often sufficed to bring Sam Maguire back to the McGillicuddy Reeks. Four games, every one of them a ferocious battle, would just about get an Ulster team to their provincial final.

From the days when Dublin-educated teachers brought the Davin brothers codified version of the old game of caid to Kerry and to JP 'Champion' O'Sullivan and his Laune Rangers rugby team in Killorglin, to crowds gathering around the telegraph office in Tralee to hear ticker-tape updates of All Ireland Finals in Jones' Rd. while the kids played codball with papiér mache 'footballs' in Rock St. And dreamed of rising like Pat 'Aeroplane' O'Shea, to the more disciplined game promoted by the likes of Dick Fitzgerald, political opponents Con Brosnan and John Joe Sheehy, Paddy Kennedy rising one-handed for the ball to the approval of the Champion's son, John Joe's sons in turn donning the green and gold....agile Johnny Culloty, Tom Long,, and the quiet-spoken greatest of them all, Dwyer with his shark's smile moving from player to manager with ease....

Anyone is free to impose any caveats they want. Larry Stanley was one of the greatest footballers of all time. He had to prove it against Kerry. The 'Boy Wonder' Tommy Murphy - you will often see pundits compile lists of contenders for the 'greatest of all time', if the Louth footballer's name isn't on it, you can safely ignore any such article - needed no telling about Kerry football. Maurice Hayes was a giant on fields far removed and more important than football, but he transformed his beloved Down team's fortunes at the start and brought Sam Maguire across the border by beating Kerry, they did it three times in a decade, so did that great Galway team, the heirs of Purcell and Stockwell. Football took a more professional approach in the seventies. Heffernan, who had been part of Dublin's fifties revival with St. Vincents, helmed that revolution at Jimmy Gray's request. Mick O'Dwyer's team of bachelors rose eagerly to that challenge. By the eighties they reigned supreme. Kerry hit upon a fallow period by our own standards, a mere eleven years. Maurice Fitzgerald was heralded as the best footballer to never win an All Ireland under Maurice decided he had had enough of that and wrote himself into legend. Páidí, like his beloved Dwyer before him, moved from player to manager with equal success. His nephews never hurt the cause either, nor did a red-haired dynamo at corner forward. He had followed Mikey Sheehy as a magician with the scoreboard, We thought we would never see the likes again. Even as Colm Cooper was stepping away, Kerry's first successful minor manager in twenty years was regretting that a new rule meant that he could not bring in a U16 player to the minor panel for the following year's campaign. That was 2015. The U16 player was a young lad named David Clifford. The manager was Jack O'Connor, who already had All Irelands under his belt. Kerry football.

We are knocking at that door once again. Do you really have to ask yourself why?

Jimmy McGuinness is one of the most admired managers of the modern era, and fully deservedly so. But I think that people outside of Kerry, and maybe a few inside it, tend to forget that only Jim Gavin has a better record than Jack O'Connor, and it's the Dromid man who has done it at all grades. You are going all the way back to the early nineties when himself and the great George Dennis masterminded Vocational Schools All Irelands.

Kerry have been close to All Irelands over the past decade. Close, but not close enough, with the exception of that 2022 win. They were caught by a Dublin surge in 2023 and succumbed to Armagh's pace and power

after looking the better side for the earlier part of last year's semi-final. This year they had their mettle tested early on by Cork and were widely written off after being so comprehensively beaten by Meath. Easy to be wise after an event, but that defeat in particular seemed to kick-start Kerry. Certainly the players knew that they were better than that display (a number of them have openly acknowledged it), and they have been gathering a head of steam ever

Shane Ryan has been up among the best goalkeepers in the country over the past while and has pulled off some stunning saves already this year, e.g. against Darragh Canavan v Tyrone. Jason Foley is one of Kerry's guaranteed All Stars already - I expect Donegal to try to pull him out of position; I'd be delighted if they decided to put Michael Murphy in there as a challenge, I think Jason would love that. With Tom O'Sullivan dealing with injury along the way, Dylan Casey has really stepped up this year, while Paul Murphy's calm experience and reliability will see him assigned to one of the big threats. Mike Breen looks likely to resume his role at number six - he has really stamped his mark this year and gets the nofd ahead of Tadhg Morley. Outside him both Gavin White and Brian Ó Beaglaíoch are at least as much threats as deterrents.

Midfield is a key battleground and with Diarmuid O'Connor's shoulder injury and then Barry Dan O'Sullivan, having just nailed down a place, limping off, Kerry were very much expected to struggle in this area. Joe O'Connor, for my money, has been sensational this year (I would have him just ahead of Donegal's Langan) and in Footballer of Year territory. Much more significantly, though, Seán O'Brien and Mark O'Shea have really seized their chance. From fringe panel players, both have earned starting jerseys. I was initially sceptical of Graham O'Sullivan moving from defence to wing forward – it's an experiment I have seen often and usually costs you a quality defender with out adding much to the middle third. This one is an exception, Graham has taken to the role with ease and is not only key to the middle

third but also comes up with a score or two in every game. In scoring terms, Seán O'Shea is an absolute

nightmare for teams because of his effectiveness

both inside and outside him. He sliced a good

Armagh defence to ribbons with his movement even before his long range accuracy really came into play. If you target him, you leave yourself open inside - Tyrone concentrated on Seánie, and I'd say poor Pádraig Hampsey wasn't exactly thankful afterwards. Kerry are a kicking team for the most part, whereas Donegal rely on ball-carrying for the most part. If Michael Murphy is the kicking exception with Donegal, Paudie Clifford is most definitely the ballcarrying exception for Kerry, and he is the one player that can open up their defence. Dylan Geaney is very good - really good, I think he's very under-rated at the art – of creating space with his movement. Possibly even better than his more illustrious cousin, and that's no small saying. Paul Geaney was superb in winningis first All Ireland against Donegal and a fully fit Paul would be a massive asset for Kerry. He's a deadly threat in his own right, an excellent ball-winner, and adept at drawing attention and opening space himself. That space, of course, is always intended for one man. David Clifford is simply a phenomenon and you build your tactics, whether offensively or defensively, around a talent like this. Can Kerry bring him into play? That's not the question. Can Tyrone keep him out of the play? No team has succeeded in that over seventy minutes. That said, this will be a high-scoring All Ireland. Donegal are admirably clinical with every chance, while Kerry have some spectacular shooters and a penchant for creating goal chances (slightly less of a penchant, so far, for converting them, but hopefully this is the day for that). I'd always be bringing Micheál Burn's dynamism (he's unlucky not to start) and Killian Spillane's guaranteed score-getting into play. while Kerry have options like Tony Brosnan, Conor Geaney, and Dara Moynihan to call on. It will be a high paced game. Donegal are ferociously fit. They will be sprinting at the finish and we will have to match them. Goals will be crucial and, as good as Donegal are at finishing them, I think Kerry are that little bit more dangerous in that regard with the likes of Joe O'Connor breaking the line and David Clifford hunting. In terms of points Donegal wll pick off scores at pace, but I think that Kerry could profit a lot by getting pressure on the likes of Langan, Thompson, and Ó Baoill for the

It's going to be a very close, intense game, and I expect it to be in the mixer right up to the final whistle. I'm tempting fate I know, but I like the look of this Kerry team. Will the injuries finally prove too much for us? I actually think they have made us stronger. By five o'clock next Sunday, we'll all know whether I am right or wrong. Either way, it's going to be a rollercoaster ride.

Kerry had some blips in the National League. After a five-goal opener against Derry, Kerry were badly caught in the second quarter of a weather-delayed second round against Donegal to trail by four at the break in the Fitzgerald Stadium. Kerry did improve in the second half and Diarmuid Oconnor's 62nd minute goal made it look as though Kerry might get a share of the spoils. However Donegal finished strongly to win by two points and fully deserved it.

More worrying was Kerry's second half collapse against Dublin. A one point defeat in testing weather conditions, even at home, might not sound like too much, but a different picture is painted with the realisation that Kerry had led by 1-12 to 0-4 at the break. Yes, Dublin did have that very strong second half wind, but were left with questions after being so comprehensively outplayed in that second half.

It also has to be pointed out that the likes of Donegal, Armagh, and Galway had at least one eye on upcoming provincial championship games when it came to the latter rounds and in the case of the Ulster teams at least, were not exactly subtle about their lack of interest in contesting a National League Final – given the tightness of current schedule of games, they can hardly be blamed. Kerry qualified for the League Final, something that had looked unlikely with three games to go, and the fact of a first round bye in the Munster Championship may ot have hurt their chances in doing so. Nonetheless Kerry did qualify for that League Final and were hugely impressive in outplaying a very good Mayo side on the day. Much was made at the time of Jack O'Connor's previous record of following up on National League titles by annexing Sam Maguire. Personally, I think that the best league side in the country being among the leading contenders for the championship is pretty much the exact opposite of a statistical anomaly and requires no superstition. Nevertheless Kerry could face into the championship with confidence and with silverware already in the cupboard.

Cork in the Munster Final. The general consensus

(and my own opinion) was that while Cork were a decent side, a fairly nondescript Division Two campaign hadn't shown any particular danger signs. How wrong we all were - Cork were absolutely magnificent in a thunderous battle. I may have an obvious bias as a Kerry supporter, but I honestly thought and still think that was one of the best championship contests of the year. With the likes of Brian O'Driscoll, lan Maguire, Seán McDonnell, and Paul Walsh driving them forward, a fearless Cork took the game to Kerry and there was very little between the sides all through a rip-roaring contest until Joe O'Connor drove through for what must be a goal of the year contender that finally secured a hard-win Kerry victory.

Little enough need be said about the Munster Final itself. Clare did their best, but in truth Kerry never had to reach for second gear. They led by 4-10 to 0-7 at the break and the result was beyond any doubt long before the final whistle

Kerry were drawn in the group stage against Roscommon, Cork, and Meath. It wasn't seen as a particularly challenging draw for Kerry, who would not be meeting any Division One opposition until the knock-out stages.

That general opinion appeared to be confirmed as Kerry saw off Roscommon by 3-18 to 0-17 in Killarney. Roscommon had put it up to Kerry in a tight enough first half but Kerry had still pulled five points clear by the break and second half goals from David Clifford, Paul Geaney, and Gavin White made for a comfortable finish.

Cork were up next and the memory of that cracking Munster semi-final added a lot of interest to the build-up to the match in Páirc Uí Caíomh. While the game didn't quite match the quality of that earlier encounter, it wasn't far off it in standard either. However, injuries - and Kerry were already down a few players - really began to be felt. By half-time Kerry had lost Barry Dan O'Sullivan, Paudie Clifford, and Paul Geaney, as well as facing a three point deficit and losing Joe O'Connor for the start of the second half to a black card. Cork actually opened the second half scoring, but Kerry looked a far more purposeful side now with subs like Mark O'Shea and Killian Spillane slotting in seamlessly and their greater scoring power soon saw them take control and run out comfortable winners, albeit with those injuries having ramifications for the future.

Meath were already one of the big stories of the year after seeing off raging hot favourites Dublin in the Leinster semi-final. They had capitulated to Louth in the Leinster Final itself (prompting stories of the notorious final between the two sides in 2010). The Taillteann Cup winners of two years ago were a much more formidable outfit than in recent years, but still underdogs against the Kingdom. Except that nobody told them.

It's fair to say that a hungry Meath totally outplayed a listless Kerry side. We were second to every ball. With Seán O'Shea and Brian Ó Beaglaíoch joining the big injury list, Kerry could point to injuries as something of an excuse. To their credit, they didn't; the performance simply wasn't good enough and Kerry players and management were open

in acknowledging that. But, considering that Kerry had still not met top tier opposition, the manner of that 1-22 to 0-16 defeat (especially one solitary two pointer) sowed real doubts about Kerry's All Ireland credentials.

That defeat meant that Kerry would miss out on the week's break, badly wanted with those injuries, and have to play in a preliminary quarter-final. To say that being drawn against the reigning All Ireland champions, an Armagh side who had given Kerry a hard lesson in last year's All Ireland semi-final, was a further blow to public morale is an understatement. The general consensus was that a Kerry side who had been soundly beaten by Meath and without several top players were not going to stay with a formidable Armagh, especially given the depth of their bench and paucity of ours.

Faced with a hand like that, a team can rise or fold. Kerry rose. Seán O'Shea was absolutely incandescent, scorching repeatedly through Armagh's defence, Joe O'Connor continued his player of the year form, captain Gavin White was a driving force, but it was the displays of less heralded players like Dylan Casey, Seán O'Brien, Mark O'Shea, and a dynamic Graham O'Sullivan that really showcased Kerry's championship credentials. Armagh led by a point at the break and actually led by five points early in the second half. But Kerry were treading water rather than foundering, and they really unleashed their firepower in a fifteen minute spell where they clocked up a whopping fourteen points. I will venture to say that it was close to football perfection in terms of synchronicity and execution; I don't believe that any team could have stayed with them in that period.

Kerry faced a Tyrone side who had outlasted Dublin in a poor enough contest in the guarter-final. Much of the pre-match build-up revolved around the previous history between the teams, particularly in the noughties. Too much so, I felt; I doubt if said history meant all that much in two ambitious training camps. As it was, Darragh Canavan did prove a huge handful for Kerry, but Tyrone had few enough scoring threats without him. They cleaned Kerry out on their early kick-outs and opened a 0-5 to 0-2 lead, but Kerry and David Clifford soon asserted themselves. Clifford scored the game's only goal to give Kerry a 1-9 to 0-9 half-time lead on his way to a personal tally of 1-9 for the game. It says a lot that the man of the match award was given instead to Kerry's powerhouse Joe O'Connor. Both of them must have their name on All Stars already - it's not All Star awards that either of them are looking for, though. Once again it was in the second half that Kerry really blossomed (it definitely appears to be a trend with this team), reeling off nine unanswered points on the trot in the third quarter. It was always comfortable after that. In fact, Kerry could have scored five goals on another day - Naill Morgan was superb in the Turone goal while Kerry left some good chances behind them. It doesn't matter. You can follow a team's form and draw your own conclusions, but neither Jack O'Connor nor Jimmy McGinness needs to be told an All Ireland Final is a game that takes on a life and a narrative of its own.

2014 ALL IRELAND SENIOR FINAL

Kerry 2-9 Donegal 0-12

The only time that Kerry and Donegal contested the Sam Maguire prior to this year was back in 2014. It had been an interesting championship, with all four provincial winners prevailing in the quarter-finals to reach the last four.

Kerry faced Mayo and things looked good at half-time as Kerry led by four, while Mayo had lost the influential Lee Keegan to a red card. However, Mayo fought back in the second half and went ahead through Cillian O'Connor's 59th minute penalty. Kieran Donaghy was hugely influential on his introduction and a late point by Kieran O'Leary secured a draw. The replay, unusually, was scheduled for the Gaelic Grounds and was arguably the best game of the championship. Mayo made the better start, Cillian O'Connor slotting a penalty and adding a goal from play soon after to help Mayo into a seven point lead. Kerry rallied to trim it back to 2-5 to 1-5 at the break, Kieran Donaghy with Kerry's goal. Mayo opened the second half scoring, but Kerry rallied to notch 1-3 on the trot, with James O'Donoghue coolly slotting a penalty.

Michael Murphy, Ryan McHugh, Paddy McBrearty, and Hugh McFadden remain from that Donegal panel, while Paul Geaney is the only current player from the Kerry panel that day. It has to be said that an accidental clash of heads between Aidan O'Shea and Cillian O'Connor didn't hurt Kerry's cause, with O'Connor having to go off and Aidan O'Shea far less influential on his resumption. Andy Moran pounced for an opportunistic Mayo goal to make it 3-7 to 2-9. The sides traded scores, with mayo still a point in front when the outstanding James O'Donoghue scored his second penalty and Kerry just about prevailed in a thrilling

On the other side reigning All Ireland, National League, and Leinster champions Dublin were red hot favourites against a fairly defensive Donegal, and showed why by opening up a 0-8 to 0-3 lead through Paul Flynn and Diarmuid Connolly, However, Donegal rallied, and Ryan McHugh's goal gave them a 1-8 to 0-10 halftime lead. A second McHugh goal on the restart really put the wind in their sails and, just as it seemed Dublin were finally getting to grips with this attacking Donegal side, Colm McFadden struck for goal number three. It could have been more but for the brilliance of Stephen Cluxton on the day. Dublin appeared rattled; certainly, they kicked too many wides as Dublin ran out winners on a 3-14 to 0-17 scoreline. It was manager Jim Gavin's first championship defeat as with Dublin - incredibly, it would be his only one.

The 2014 Final was not a classic of its kind, not by any stretch of the imagination. Some said it was the worst final since 1962 - Kerry had

won that one as well, seeing off Roscommon thanks to Garry McMahon's first minute goal. You can argue that history repeated itself, Paul Geaney goaling right at the start. Jimmy McGuinness had perfected the blanket defence approach pioneered successfully by Mickey Harte, frustrating teams by flooding the defence to force turnovers and then relying of fast-breaking counter-attacks to pick off teams. It was never pretty (in fact, it would lead to such abysmal spectacles that eventually the GAA would establish a committee under Jim Gavin to reform the playing rules for this year's championship) but it was effective. Kerry manager Eamonn Fitzmaurice was a purist of the game but unafraid of pragmatism either, and he countered like for like, playing defensively and refusing to be enticed into Donegal's swarm defence. It made for a tense, tit for tat game that was deadlocked at 1-3 to 0-6 by the break. It sayed like that all through, with Kerry just about holding a one point lead. In the 50th minute Donegal finally made one small error. An insignificant moment in the vast majority of games, but an All Ireland Final with one Kieran Donaghy on high alert? There was a reason they called him 'star' (actually, it was to do with a jacket logo, but who could resist a line like that?) and Kerry had their second goal. Donegal resondedwith three points, Kerry notched two more, still Donegal came back to trim the gap.....in a frantic finish, with just seconds on the clock, Colm McFadden's rocket came back off the butt of the post to leave Kerry victorious on a 2-9 to 0-12 scoreline. Will history repeat itself? We would gladly take it, but with the new rules, whichever team wins on this occasion will have to do so by attacking.

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
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

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


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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

GARDEN MAINTENANCE

It is important at this time of year to do some pruning in the garden. Climbers such as wisteria and pyracantha should be pruned back now after flowering. Rambling roses can also be pruned back if they too have finished flowering. Shrubs like hexes should be given alight pruning at this time of year as the flowers are fading in them.

You can also give your hedges a final trim until next years they will be very little growth from now on,

Don't go too hard especially with coniferous hedges as that would leaving them with dead looking patches for the winter.

Also the time is right to dead head your roses as this will keep them flowering into early Autumn. Roses that aren't looking too good now and have lost some of their foliage can be cut back a bit further to encourage new growth.
