The Pop Up Gaeltacht is Ar Ais Aris, there was huge success for Irish Dancers and there is a new Defibrillator at Spillane's in Headford.



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Jerry Surprised with NEW MOBILITY CAR

Killarney man who suffered life changing injuries following an accident in June 2023 has received a new modified car to help him get out and about.

The 23rd annual Circet All-Ireland GAA Golf Challenge were honoured to present Jerry O'Leary and his family with a new, modified car at Scott's Hotel on Friday, October 18th.

While Jerry and his wife Bina knew that the patrons, volunteers and competitors in the GAA Golf Challenge were raising funds to purchase the vehicle, what Jerry didn't know was when and if it would arrive. This changed on Friday night, when after the challenge awards presentation, Ian O'Connell (a former recipient of support from the challenge) requested everyone to go outside Scotts Hotel Killarney where Jerry was surprised and shocked to see a brand new car/van outside for him and his family, courtesy of the All Ireland GAA Golf Challenge. Jerry, Bina and their family were surrounded and congratulated by everyone present including members of Glenflesk Gaa who were in on the secret.

With the aid of sponsors Circet and longstanding backer Michael Lyng Motors, the Challenge were delighted to hand over the keys to the O'Leary family after another memorable staging of the Challenge at the beautiful Killarney Golf and Fishing Club.

Attended by patrons such as Kilkenny and Dublin greats Eddie Keher and Barney Rock as well as the inspirational lan O'Connell, golfers representing their GAA clubs converged on Killarney to compete and raise funds for Glenflesk clubman Jerry.

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GILLIAN O'SULLIVAN SET TO ENTER HALL OF FAME AT NATIONAL **ATHLETICS AWARDS**

thletics Ireland has announced that Killarney native, Gillian O'Sullivan, one of Ireland's most successful athletes, will be honoured with the Hall of Fame Award at this year's 123.ie National Athletics Awards on Wednesday November 20th at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Santry.

The Kerry native began a glittering career in 1994 which would see her represent Ireland at European Championships, World Championships, and an Olympic Games in the 20km Race Walk.

Arquably O'Sullivan's best performance came in 2003 when she took silver in the 20km Walk at the World Championships in Paris, the first time since 1995 that an Irish athlete had won a World Championship medal. The feat sees O'Sullivan remain part of an exclusive club of only five Irish athletes - Eamonn Coghlan, Sonia O'Sullivan, Olive Loughnane, and Rob Heffernan – who have podiumed at a World Athletics Outdoor Championship

Other career highlights included a top ten finish at the Olympic Games in



Sydney back in 2000, a World Record 5.000m walk in Dublin back in 2002 (20:02.60), as well a world best time at nationals over 3000m (11.35.34) at the Odyssey Arena Belfast the following year.

Gillian retired in 2007 aged 30, stating: "To retire from competing was always going to be a huge decision for me but I have put a lot of thought into it, and I feel now is the best time to move on. Athletics has been so good to me, but it has got to the stage where with some of the problems I've had I didn't feel I could get back to the heights I hit in 2002 and 2003 and to leave now I can be happy with everything I have achieved and not have any regrets".

Remarkably, Gillian O'Sullivan's national walk records across 3,000m, 5,000m, 10,000m & 20km still stand today.

The big celebration, to be formally launched on Friday evening by Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Maura Healy-Rae, will have something for everybody to enjoy.

Given the howling Halloween theme, there is a real danger that things will go bump in the night but there will be plenty of daytime fun too when Killarney fully embraces the spirit of the season.

Retail stores will join in the fun and games with a fabulous family atmosphere, brilliant in-store promotions and great giveaways and there will be live music and street entertainment, themed stalls to add

to the atmosphere and the dark triangular eyes of creepily carved pumpkins watching over many stores.

Much of the outdoor activity will be focused on Main Street where there will be cabin vendors selling their wares, face painting and balloon modelling, the Radio Kerry Roadshow on Saturday from 11am and Disney characters out and about meeting the children and the young at heart.

The Three O's will perform on Main Street on Saturday afternoon and the Killorglin Pipe Band will strike up on College Square before parading to Main Street.

The emphasis will be on fun for all the family and with Killarney's designation as an autism-friendly town, there will be a universal and warm welcome for all throughout the weekend.



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Facelift for part of Killarney

Main Street to Kenmare Place is to get a facelift and there is public consultation. The consultation is very welcome. The plans will see a continuation of the one-way system, engineer David Doyle, has outlined along with wider footpaths and a planting scheme.

The council is welcoming comments and observations at Public Realm Improvements at Kenmare Place & Main Street Killarney | Kerry County Council (kerrycoco.ie). Or drop remarks into council offices at the Reeks (We need a bigger town hall and meeting area all in one building). The deadline is November 21st.

I have been reading the accompanying archaeological report by Cork based John Cronin and Associates. It is a good report and details how the most ancient artifact or recorded site in the quarter is the holy Well, Lady's Well at the back of the town hall. Meaning any works in the vicinity will need careful monitoring.

I am intrigued by the statement "Killarney is not a historic town and developed from the early modern period onwards." Certainly it is post-medieval. But the Victorian period is of huge historic interest too

Killarney is mainly an 18th and 19th century town. The "counterintuitively" named New Street is actually the oldest street. It contains the oldest building at No 85 dating to 1770, John Cronin notes.

Copper mining had brought new wealth to Killarney from the mid 1700s.

Interestingly too, the core and street layout of Killarney has changed little apart from Beach Road. I had a look too at plans for the Victorian Cahersiveen where 'the public realm" is also being revamped. (Tralee already has the botox!)

What it all leads to is narrower streets and wider paths.

I have one niggling concern: Will all Kerry towns end up looking the same?

My greatest apprehension is that from Cahersiveen to Killarney we are to have smooth, neutral, spaces for the sake of the "public realm", that great buzz word. No

wrinkles, in other words.

But I don't want to lose the 19th century character of towns like Cahersiveen where the dust of commerce and confidence and an emerging nation can still be felt. The Victoran era for all its faults was one of great hope regrettably we tend only now to see it through the blinkered lens of slavery and colonisation. But new worlds were opening up, bringing industry and tourism. Engineering advances meant rail and steam and coach travel. Education and health were being addressed for the first time in human history - reflected in towns like Killarney and Cahersiveen. The 21st century overlay of "cool" and its zen mindset of sterile pale public spaces all looking the same will not reflect these important centuries.

Battening down the hatches at Muckross

Old buildings and even new buildings - those not built in the last five years are now old - demand lots of attention.

When it comes to the 1843 Muckross House, the region's most visited attraction and water gets in, there is a certain urgency.

Muckross has obvious clout at the moment in high places. Gardens and greenhouses are getting rapid attention and are looking all the better for it. Whether the goodwill continues continue under a new Government remains to be seen. At the moment Killarney and its attractions has a committed minister in the Green Malcolm Noonan and friends too in the Department of Housing heritage section. Thankfully.

A few years back, if water got into the Muckross building it would be a case of run with the buckets.

Now , the Department of Housing tells me it is 'delighted' to confirm tens of thousands of euro of works underway which this column spotted last week.

"We are delighted to confirm essential works are underway at the Coach House area of Muckross House following water ingress to the building," said a spokesman

The "essential" works including re-pointing



stonework, re-pointing chimneys, repairing lead work, fixing valleys, repairing slates and fixing gutters.

The works will secure the building as we head into the harsher winter period and will cost "in the region of €90k".

The cost is miniscule in comparison to a plastic lean-to bike shed for the dozen TDs who cycle! Speaking of which, the raised cycle and walkway between Dinis and Torc, lodged last January, is still trundling through the planning process. A question has been raised over the impact of hauling tonnes of steel, concrete, and other material onto a sensitive site. Further info has also been sought by the council. A submission on the environmental impact legislation by Peter Sweetman, environmental planning consultant, will be pause for reflection.

Peter is taking issue with how readymix concrete to be used for foundations approximately 125m³; 2.5 tonnes of Structural Steel in footing; three tones of micropiles/rock anchors, and 230 tons of structural steel columns and deck framework—along with 3,200 meters of precast concrete deck slabs would not have an effect. It will be a long road if Sweetman is raising concern!

Cycling and e-scooting on footpaths

Someone surely has to crack down on the growing phenomenon of cycling and e-scooting on Killarney footpaths and town lanes.

For a start, cycling on footpaths is against the law. And the footpath can be on High Street or it can be on the Muckross Road, by the way.

Older people are particularly vulnerable when footpaths are used by bikes - especially by bikes without bells.

Clearly the new bike lanes are not in the right places.

Gardai are to launch a safety blitz in Killarney on the need to don highviz jackets on bikes. This is particularly geared towards cyclists on the Muckross and Park Roads where the problem is acute.

Cyclists wearing dark clothes are virtually impossible to see. Gardai will be out and about looking at bike/vehicle fitness as well as visibility and use of footpaths.

Readers $\,$ have contacted this column about cycling on footpaths etc in

the town centre. 'We have a concern in relation to road safety particularly lack of visibility," Killarney's Sergeant Dermot O'Connell said.

Kerry County Council are also shining a light on cyclists and pedestrian safety on Kerry roads this Bank Holiday Weekend and the need to wear high-visibility (hi-viz) clothing.

There has been "a notable increase" in the number of pedestrians using the roads without wearing any high visibility clothing such as a vest or an armband in recent years and this can cause significant danger to motorists as well as pedestrians and cyclists themselves, the council says.

Over a ten-year period from 2014 to 2023, the number of pedestrians admitted to hospital as in-patients with injuries from road traffic collisions was 2,843. A quarter of those hospitalised were aged 65 and over while 17% were aged 14 or less.

Someone also needs to crack down specifically on cycling on paths.

Sneem Stories on Radio Kerry Saturday October 26 from 9 to 11

The terrible fear in the class when on Monday morning, the teacher, after a week-end of over indulging, throws off his jacket, rolls up his shirt sleeves and bellows to the the terrified class, "Blood will be spilled on shirts today." That is the very graphic memory of Sonny Looney and how it propelled him to go working in Parknasilla hotel, where he stayed for over 50 years

The Saturday Supplement, tomorrow, Saturday October 26th with Frank Lewis hears stories in advance of the Sneem International Storytelling Festival that runs from November 8 to 10. The programme is paying tribute to festival founder Batt Burns for his very full and rich life, and the effect his creativity and commitment has had on so many.

"Remember me to Ireland" an elderly lady on a zimmer frame told storyteller Brendan O'Sullivan in an Old Folks Home in New York. "My own memories of foraging began with

stealing apples and crab apples in orchards" that beginning started a life long passion for foraging for Mo Stafford principal of the Skellig Coast Kitchen educational establishment..

"It was believed that the ailment the pilgrim brought to the holy well was transferred to the small piece of cloth that was left behind on a hawthorn bush," is among the stories told by James O'Shea, who has just retired after nearly 50 years of developing and maintaining the gardens at Derrynane House.

"Batt Burns was a leader in Sneem, as a teacher he taught his pupils to discover their native place," Sonny Looney added, "he brought Americans to Sneem for storytlling and in this way developed a new kind of tourism. He started the Sneem International Storytellig Festival. We salute and thank him"

As well there are musical interludes with the South Kerry Rosen Choir, director Brad Dicks and accompanist Tetyana Budzen, singing in St Michael's Church in Sneem.

Frank Lewis and his four guests spent hours swapping stories a mile up the Kerry Way west of Sneem in the wooded Oureegh area. All of that is on the Saturday Supplement on Radio Kerry next Saturday morning, October 26 from 9 to 11. There are full details of the Sneem International Storytelling Festival on sneemstorytellingfestival.com.

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Kerry Homecoming Festival is a county-wide initiative presented by Kerry County Council as part of the Global Irish Festival Series, which is a joint initiative between Fáilte Ireland and the Department of Foreign Affairs, targeting the diaspora. Kerry Homecoming Festival at Halloween opened last Friday, October 18th with the 2 day Global Gaelic Games Social Festival, in Fitzgerald Stadium, Killarney - a gathering of 1000 Gaelic Football enthusiasts from far and wide taking part in non-competitive 9-a-side Gaelic games that emphasise inclusiveness and integration.The festival programme features close to fifty free events and activities such as Samhain spectacles, storytelling, Jack-o-Lantern carving, genealogy workshops and heritage talks, star-gazing, an American Wake at Kerry Writers Museum and much, much more. The legendary Cailleach (Hag / Witch), will be the centrepiece of a thrilling Samhain spectacle in Listowel, Dingle, Kenmare and Tralee. The Cailleach is the goddess of the winter months. Her season begins on Samhain, October 31st, when the Goddess Brigid hands her staff over.

The Cailleach is associated with many locations across the Celtic lands. Her ability to form the landscape and mountains means that many prominent mountain landmarks are attributed to her. In Kerry she has given her name to the Hag's Glen in the MacGilliycuddy Reeks mountains where the Hag of Corrán Tuathail (Carrauntoohill)

plunged to her death in the lake known as Hag's Lake. The Samhain Spectacles will be supported by a series of workshops in 16 towns and villages, in the run up, led by Juli Ní Mhaoileoin, the Dingle Druid, in which people of all ages will learn how to make traditional Samhain masks and Jacko-Lanterns and they in turn can take part in the spectacles wearing their masks or bearing their lanterns. Genealogy and family research feature heavily in the programme with talks and workshops being presented by experts in the Killarney and Tralee libraries and in Castleisland and Killorglin.

Kerry's tradition of storytelling, particularly of the otherworldly kind at Halloween is also honoured through a number of storytelling sessions from Niall de Búrca and Tom Dillon throughout the county.

All of the existing seasonal Kerry festivals and some new ones, including an Féile Eile in Killorglin will also be joining in the fun - Kenmare Halloween Howl, the Patrick O'Keeffe Music Festival in Castleisland, the Skellig Coast Archaeology Festival, the Kerry International Film Festival celebrating its 25th anniversary and Oireachtas na Samhna, both taking place in Killarney, as well as Tralee's annual National Circus Festival and The Tralee Half Marathon,

The Homecoming Festival provides a unique opportunity to deepen our linkages with the



MINISTER FOR HEALTH confirms funding for Kerry Community Cancer Support Services

Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly, has today confirmed Budget 2025 funding for Kerry as part of the National Cancer Strategy.

Budget 2025 contains new investment in cancer services nationally of €41 million, including a €5.5 million allocation to the Alliance of Community Cancer Support and Service nationally.

Kerry Cancer Support Group, and Recovery Haven Cancer Support House are members of the Alliance and will receive funding during 2025.

Minister Donnelly said:

"I'm pleased to allocate €5.5 million in Budget 2025 for the NCCP Alliance of Community Cancer Support Centres and Services. Centres like Kerry Cancer Support Group and Recovery Haven Cancer Support House in Tralee provide vital services for cancer patients in communities throughout Ireland, both adults and children. They do tremendous work to ensure that national survivorship programmes are available all across Ireland. This government places great value on the dedication of the staff and volunteers who make these centres possible.

"I was pleased as Minister for Health to allocate once-off state funding to our community support service for the first time in 2024. This year's allocation of €5.5 million represents an increase in this funding in 2025 and it will become permanent, annual



funding."

The total 2025 cancer funding of €41 million includes:

179 additional staff to be recruited to national cancer screening and treatment services, to continue to improve access and outcomes for cancer patients under the National Cancer Strategy

€4.8 million for expansion of BreastCheck programme, and for the expansion of eligibility for the BowelScreen programme from 59-69 year olds to 58-70 year olds

€10.1 million across cancer control activities, cancer treatments and the Hereditary Cancer Model of Care to improve patient access and expand access to new treatments. This includes specialised radiology posts and advanced practice



radiation therapy posts
€0.7 million for expansion of acute oncology/haematology nursing service to help cancer patients avoid unnecessary Emergency Department (ED) attendance €2 million for post-mastectomy products in the community €5.5 million to be allocated to the Alliance of Community Cancer Support Centres and Services The National Cancer Strategy aims to transform cancer control

The National Cancer Strategy aims to transform cancer control services, across prevention, screening, diagnosis, treatment and quality of life, with a focus on improving outcomes for cancer patients.



STUDENTS JOIN THE FOSSA CLIMATE ACTION GROUP TO PLANT BULBS

he second class children of Fossa National School helped Fossa Climate Action Group begin the road of returning 30% of the grounds of Fossa Church to nature this week. On Wednesday morning, the last of the bulbs were put into the ground in anticipation of them blossoming next spring.

"Fossa Climate Action Group started a long term project on September 1st with a public consultation with parishioners on what can be done to increase biodiversity on the church grounds. A leaflet on the proposed measures was distributed to mass goers during the month of September with comments suggestions welcome. The consultation period ended on October 4th, The Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi, who is the patron Saint of Ecology. The project aims to return 30% of catholic church grounds, across Ireland, to nature by 2030, as agreed by the Irish Catholic Bishop's Conference in 2023", Diarmuid Griffin fromthe group told Killarney Outlook.

"The first practical steps of this were realised this week, with the purchase and planting of 320 crocus, 200 snowdrop, 200 daffodils, and 60 native bluebell bulbs.

'We decided that we would begin by planting flowers that would be an early source of nectar and pollen to bees and butterflies as they emerge next spring' says Mary Fitzgerald, secretary of the Group.

The project began as it hopes to continue; a collaborative effort by many in the locality with planting tools loaned from Johnny McGuire of Killarney Tidy Towns

'A daffodil planting tool designed and made by Anthony Dennehy of Fossa Climate Action Group was very useful on the day as it made light work of the digging' remarks Diarmaid Griffin. 'Especially with a class of eager school kids wanting to ensure that the 200 bulbs were planted in record time'.

The project will continue over the coming year with the removal of invasive plants and smothering Lleylandi to allow nature to flourish. Other suggestions include creating habitats for insects and reducing the area of mown grass to allow islands of native meadow plants.

'We would like to thank the Pastoral Council for funding the initial stage of this project, the feedback, suggestions, and comments from parishioners during the initial consultation period, and Father Geaney for his continued support' Chairman, Paul O' Raw concludes.

TRAINING WHEN YOU HAVE OSTEOPENIA OR OSTEOPOROSIS

Bone density decreases as we get older so it is important to do weight bearing exercises and resistance training to reduce the risk of osteopenia & osteoporosis in later life. For many people it is only when they discover they have one of these that they look at what they can do to help improve bone health.

PRESBYOPIA

What is presbyopia?

Presbyopia is the normal loss of near focusing ability that occurs with age. Most people begin to notice the effects of presbyopia sometime after age 40, when they start having trouble seeing small print clearly.

Presbyopia is caused by an agerelated process. This differs from astigmatism, myopia and hyperopia, which are related to the shape of the eyeball and are caused by genetic and environmental factors. Presbyopia generally is believed to stem from a gradual thickening and loss of flexibility of the natural lens inside your eye.

These age-related changes occur within the proteins in the lens, making the lens harder and less elastic over time. With less elasticity, this means the eve has a harder time focusing up close and we may have to hold material further away to see it clearly.

What is the treatment for presbyopia?

Presbyopia is a natural part of ageing and there is no cure for it. The solution is generally to wear glasses for reading

Contact lenses are also available for presbyopia if you do not want to wear glasses.

Are there exercises I can do to stop needing reading glasses? Will I make my eyes worse by wearing glasses?

No. As presbyopia is caused by the lens stiffening, and not the muscles weakening. Wearing glasses will not make your eyes worse and there are no exercises that can help this. However, you may notice that when you take your glasses off, things appear to be worse without them than before you had them. This is simply because you are noticing how clear and comfortable vision should be. Before you had the glasses, you were unaware how blurry your vision really was because it changed slowly over the

Presbyopia will get worse as you age until you reach your late fifties, when you will have no natural focusing ability left. Unfortunately there is nothing you can do to stop

For any vision changes it is important to have a sight test to determine the cause.

Your choice to take the ab initio route or to climb the ladder to a Level 8 Honours Degree

DECISIONS

As soon as the CAO facility opens for applications each year, the minds of college aspirants begin to focus. All of a sudden there is a sense of urgency about getting the course choices in order. The clock is ticking. Decisions have to be made. The closing date is fast approaching. The conversation is top heavy with third level choices, college locations, distances from home, types of accommodation and all matters relevant to moving on to higher education. Of course, all of that is very understandable. While it's an anxious time for young people, it's also a very exciting time as they begin to realise that the end of the beginning is drawing near. The next phase of the journey, leaving home and moving on to independent living and learning, is not very far away.

REGISTER

The 2025 CAO Application season opens at 12 noon on Tuesday, 5th November and CAO encourages applicants to register early to avoid a late January rush. A discounted application fee of €30 applies for those who open their accounts by 20th January. Thereafter, until the normal closing date of 1st February, the application fee is €45. A discount of 33.3% is very generous and not to be sniffed at, especially when dosh is scare in these inflationary times. As the CAO form is interactive, an applicant can log on at will until the closing date. Other than that, the remaining three months should be devoted to course research.

SCHEDULE

It's important to maintain the study schedule right up to the Christmas holidays. In fact, for those who haven't done so already, target grades and points should be set for the Christmas in-house test. For example, a student who hopes to achieve 500 points in the Leaving Cert exam should be in the 450 to 475 range by Christmas. Midterm break is also an opportunity for review and reflection. In the immortal words of Agatha Christie's most famous detective, Hercule Poirot, order and method are vital in bringing a project to a successful conclusion. That sentiment is very relevant to exam preparation. So, the Halloween holiday period should be used to review one's time management of the past few months. Consider what you did well and where improvements can be made going forward.

During January, CAO applicants will need to focus on course choices. Courses which are restricted must be included on the form by normal closing date of 1st February. Other than that, courses can be added or withdrawn during the change of mind facility which closes on 1st July. In fact, thousands of applicants don't list any courses by 1st February, preferring to do so later on. My personal view is that course choices should be listed by 1st February. It brings the psychological closure of having the task done and dusted until the Leaving Cert exam has been completed. The choices can then be revisited, if required, up to 1st July.

PATHS

There are two paths in the CAO to an Honours Bachelor Degree (Level 8). Option one is the ab initio Level 8 course. That option is now available in all CAO colleges as new Technological Universities have been expanding the number of Level 8 courses available in their colleges. Most of the Level 8 courses are of four years duration, although some are three or five years long. The risk factor is that no award is made in the non-technological colleges until the course has been successfully completed. If you drop out on route, you get no qualification.

STEP-BY-STEP

Option two is to take the step-by step-route by signing up for a two-year Higher Certificate (Level 6) or a three-year Ordinary Bachelor Degree (Level 7). After two years, a successful student is conferred with the award of Higher Certificate. Those who successfully complete a third year are conferred with an Ordinary Bachelor Degree at Level 7. They can then progress to an Honours Bachelor Degree at Level 8. This is commonly referred to as 'the ladder system' and suits those who aren't ready to commit to a Level 8 ab initio degree or who may have come up short on Leaving Cert points.

COMFORT LEVEL

The two options allow people to enter higher education at their own comfort learning level. The traditional big seven of UCD, TCD, DCU, Maynooth, University of Galway, UL and UCC, with a few exceptions, offer Honours Bachelor Degree courses only but the new Technological Universities of TUS, MTU, ATU, SETU, TUD and Dundalk Institute of Technology (DkIT) offer the three levels. In addition to the other colleges in the CAO system, there is plenty of choice for each and every applicant. Use it well and wisely.

DEPUTY HEALY RAE RAISING HOUSING ISSUES IN KERRY IN DAIL EIREANN

On Tuesday of this week, Deputy Danny Healy Rae tabled a motion on affordable Housing in Dail Eireann.

The following is what the Kerry TD had to say to his fellow parliamentarians:

"Several times I have asked ye to afford the same concessions to our people as ye are giving to the Ukraines. What hope has anyone of getting a house to rent when a landlord will get €800 tax free to rent to someone from the Ukraine. What's good for the goose is good for the gander, Irish people should be getting the same concessions as the Ukrainians.

I have to tell ye, there is no such thing as an affordable house in Kerry, that scheme was never introduced in Kerry and anyone who wants to build a house is blocked every way with planning. The regulator ye have

appointed that's stopping them and at the same time ye want to direct them into towns and villages and ye have no treatment systems working in 38 settlements in Kerry.

Then we have another scenario, there are houses being allocated day after day in Kerry through the CBL letting and Lo and behold , a house may be allocated which it was on November 6th last year and that girl and her child are not in that house yet. Is this all a gimmick to portray a good image for the Government , I mean allocate the house if the house is available but if ye haven't even the house bought why should ye allocate it. There are several people coming to me now waiting 3 moths, 4 months 5 months waiting for the key and this girl almost 12 months waiting since the 6th of November".

CALL FOR THE OCCUPIED TERRITORIES BILL TO BE ENACTED

Cllr. John O'Donoghue has called on Kerry County Council members to write to the Minister for Foreign Affairs and request that The Control of Economic Activities (Occupied Territories) Bill 2018 be enacted.

We are becoming so accustomed to brutal images being beamed into our home each night on the news and online, that I fear we are becoming desensitised to violence. It no longer seems to shock us and in the greatest shame of all, we stand guilty of forgetting that they are real people we are seeing on our screens. Be they on what we feel is the righteous or the wrong side, they are flesh and blood like you and me. One of the great tragedies of war is that those decide to wage war never actually see any conflict themselves. From the comfort of their war cabinets they can send more and more young people off to fight, safe in the knowledge that they won't be in any danger themselves. However, the single biggest tragedy of war is the horror inflicted upon civilian populations as they find themselves caught up in the conflict. Unspeakable acts get justified as acts of war, and all the time it is the civilian populations that pay the heaviest price. Very often the war is started by one side claiming a perceived slight, or need to protect their own nation, but the reality is that they are looking to persecute another people on either religious, ideological or economic grounds. This results in the oppressor pillaging the oppressed, both the people and their land. The Control of Economic Activity Bill, more commonly known as the Occupied territories Bill passed through both houses of the Oireachtas in 2016, it simply

needs to be enacted. The Bill would, according to the text of the proposed legislation, make it an offence "for a person to import or sell goods or services originating in an occupied territory or to extract resources from an occupied territory in certain circumstances". This applies to all territories illegally occupied and does to not pertain specifically to any one area of the world. You may have noticed that I have not made reference until now to any specific area, and that is because the Bill itself does not reference any specific area of the world. However, it is undeniable that the passing of the Bill has come more to the fore in recent months due to the conflict in Gaza. Under Article 8 of the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court, it is illegal for a country to transfer its own citizens to the land of another territory that it occupies and this has been happening in the Occupied Palestinian Territories for years now. Were this Bill to be enacted, it would not prevent Ireland from trading with Israel, as regrettably EU Trade Law prevents this, but it would ensure that Ireland could not trade with Israel on any commodities they have as a result of their occupation of Palestine. It is estimated that trade of Israeli goods from Palestine are 15x higher than trade of Palestinian goods and this is a travesty which must stop. In July, the International Court Of Justice which is the highest court in the world declared that the Israeli settlements on occupied Palestinian land were illegal and that all countries were obliged not to trade with them. The International Court of Justice said that all states must now: "abstain from entering into economic or trade

dealings with
Israel concerning
the Occupied
Palestinian Territory
or parts thereof
which may entrench

its unlawful presence in the territory", and "take steps to prevent trade or investment relations that assist in the maintenance of the illegal situation created by Israel in the Occupied Palestinian Territory".

It could not have been laid out more clearly by the Court what we must now do. My Motion is not an anti Israel Motion, I cannot think of another single group of people who have been more persecuted in their history, and I have sympathy for them due to the fact that in Hamas, they have a neighbour whose stated aim is to wipe out the State of Israel. However, that does not excuse the atrocities currently being inflicted upon Palestinian civilians and give Benjamin Netanyahu a free pass to do as he wishes and it is well past the time where we stood up as a nation and made a stand on the issue. Initially, I was heartened by the strong words from our Taoiseach condemning the bombardment of Palestinian civilians at a time when many other world leaders were afraid to speak out, but the time has come when rhetoric will no longer suffice, we need concrete action. Calling for this Bill to be enacted is not about taking sides, it is about choosing to do the right thing and I hope my colleagues here today will support my call", Cllr. John O'Donoghue said.



EXPLANATION WANTED ON FUNDS ALLOCATED FOR LISTRY BRIDGE

Cllr. Tommy Griffin is calling on Kerry County Council to explain why only €21,000 of the €465,000 allocated for Listry Bridge by the Department of Transport over the last five years has been drawn down to date. These figures were provided by Minister Eamon Ryan in response to a Dáil question tabled by Deputy Brendan Griffin.

The 200 year old single lane bridge is located on the main Killarney to Dingle road and it has been the scene of multiple car accidents over the years

In 2019 Kerry County Council submitted a Preliminary Appraisal Report

to the Department of Transport outlining options to address the issues on the R563 at Listry Bridge. This report identified a new structure at Listry Bridge as the preferred option

It is hard to comprehend why Kerry County Council have failed to draw down hundreds of thousands of euros available to progress the badly needed new bridge in Listry.

The failure by Kerry County Council to draw down this funding over such a long period of time shows that a new bridge for Listry is clearly not a priority in County buildings.







SCHOOL LUNCHES WELCOMED

The delivery of free school lunches to all of our National Schools is a major achievement of our Department of Education and particularly, our Minister for Education, Norma Foley TD, according to her fellow General Election candidate, Councillor Michael Cabill

"All children in receipt of these school lunches, are now on an equal footing in terms of nutrition daily. It is a fabulous achievement for our country, particularly while under the additional pressure of welcoming and accommodating families from war torn regions" stated the Fianna Fáil man.

"One glitch in the system that I have brought to the attention of Minister Foley is, whereby some smaller more remote schools, such as Boheeshil in Glencar and Caherdaniel and others, cannot source a school lunch provider, as both their small size and remote location makes the proposition loss making. I believe the companies that operate this scheme should be obliged to deliver to all schools. It looks as if this is all about profit margins, when remote, isolated schools are dropped. All of our children should are entitled to their lunch and these companies should not be allowed pick and choose" said Councillor Cahill.

"Extra supports must be put in place for Caherdaniel and Boheeshil and all other schools that fall within this category, to ensure all of our children are treated fairly and equally" stated Councillor Cahill. "We cherish all of our children equally and support will be given to bring all schools, no matter the size or location, into the School Lunch service" added the South Kerry Councillor.

Minister Foley welcomes the fact that 123 school secretaries in Kerry are now being paid by the State.

Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley has welcomed the news that 123 school secretaries in Kerry are now being paid by the State, following her commitment to deliver on their long-running campaign.

The arrangement comes as part of a package of measures on terms and conditions now being implemented after a series of engagements at the Workplace Relations Commission (WRC) to settle a claim for grant-funded school secretaries.

Work is currently underway to achieve similar for school caretakers, in recognition of the valuable contribution they make to their school communities.

School secretaries are employed directly by many of the 3,089 primary schools and 722 post-primary schools across the country.

There are currently 2,745 individual secretaries on payroll across Ireland, covering 2,984 school secretary positions. Some 203 secretaries have multiple employments.

Minister Norma Foley said: "School secretaries had a long-running campaign to be put on the state payroll, and when I became Minister for Education, I made it clear that I wanted to deliver on this for them. I am really pleased that around 2,700 school secretaries nationwide were rightly put on the State payroll, including 123 school secretaries in Kerry.

It is now my intention to progress the issue for school caretakers and achieve similar recognition for them."

There are now 107 school secretaries on the state payroll in 103 Kerry primary schools, as well as 16 secretaries in nine Kerry post-primary schools.

A survey issued in May to all recognised primary and post-primary schools regarding school caretakers, to gather information from schools employing grant-funded caretakers to facilitate further engagement with their representative union Forsa.

One week later, a face-to-face one-hour interactive workshop on interview techniques and skills were held with Transition year students. The final stage involved mock interviews in front of a panel of professional and trained interviewers and each student was provided with constructive feedback after each

interview. Upon completion of all three stages, each student was presented with a certificate of completion. They will also be assisted from a financial perspective when first starting work in terms of how to budget wages etc and an option to open a FREE Cara Credit Union current account. Principal Teresa Lonergan stated, 'This has been a fantastic opportunity that our local credit union has provided for Transition year students. We are very grateful to them.'



Mikah Blackwell was the Lakers main man again with 29 points, Eoin Carroll had 17, Mark Sheehan 14, Darnell Snyers 13, Rui Saravia 9, Abdul Oladipupo 2.

Michael Hayes checked out with 44 points, Charles Pepin 24, Matthew Sweeney 8, Joseph Coughlan 7, Declan Gbinigie 6.

Coach Ron Howard looking ahead to the Cougars game will be working hard in training during the week. "We got to move the ball a bit quicker, we were a bit stagnant on offence and we didn't do as good as we would have liked on our principles."On his side's defence he noted. "We need to be a bit more aware but we're looking forward to our derby game next weekend. I feel like a native here already, it's the biggest game of the year and we'll be ready for it".

Dr. Crokes v Dinale

An all-club affair, and all the better for it. Everything on the line. I had East Kerry down as red-hot favourites but somehow they never quite gelled his year. The verve and confidence of old seemed to be lacking. I don't think that's any terminal decline, though, especially with Austin Stacks and Laune Rangers in the Intermediate Final.

Dingle have been there or thereabouts for several years now. Once again, Paul Geaney is the absolute standout player of the County Championship for me. Himself and Seán O'Shea are hardy perennials in that conversation

I wouldn't say that Dingle came the hard road. They hit three first half goals against Mid Kerry but got a bit careless and got caught - Mid Kerry have the ingredients but haven't quite mixed the cake together. Peter O'Sullivan is one of the best managers out there in my opinion. South Kerry, despite the displays of Graham O'Sullivan, are very young and a bit lacking up front just yet - I do like the road they are on, though. They are coming, and Kerry football could do with them, but Dingle were always in control there. Likewise the game against Milltown/ Castlemaine, unfortunately, can be classed as a non-event. East Kerry, of course, was the big test. As I say, I don't think East Kerry ever really hit top gear and they were still a penalty save away from going through. Dylan

Geaney had his best game of the year. I find it hard to judge Dylan asa player - when he's on song, he is easily county standard. But does he produce it often enough? He will be in Kerry conversations next year, but nailing a place? I'm not convinced just yet. Tom O'Sullivan actually missed a fair bit of the championship through injury. I actually think that was actually a good thing for him in the long run. He's back fresh and rested and hitting peak form at the right time; his tank was pretty much empty.

Paul Geaney has mostly been dropping back to the forty and dictating Dingle games. He really is a joy to watch. Barry Dan O'Sullivan goes in as a targetman. Not scoring a lot, but he wreaks havoc and that opens space for Conor and Dylan in either corner. Matthew Flaherty has pace to burn. Cathal Bambury is back from injury and I rate him. That said, Evan Looney will be an automatic selection on the team of the championship. His reputation is growing with every game.

At the other end Dingle have a very good full back line, but no team is holding Brosnan, Shaw, and McMahon if they get a regular supply. Obviously Tony is the main man, but David has been outstanding this year as well. Micheál Burns looks like a man reborn these days, relishing his football. Himself and Mark O'Shea will break down doors, playmaker Gavin O'Shea wll simply pick the locks. The one thing Crokes have ahead of any other team is teamwork. Quick composure will win more games that individual brilliance ever will; it's about decision-making and they do it at incredible speed. There's always an easy passing option and they go forward at pace. Hard to live with, and I think Dingle will have to keep a spare man back.

The teams have met three times already this year. We shall completely forget the county league game. Crokes were nigh on full strength; Dingle were the exact opposite. Frankly, they were down so many players that it couldn't even be classed as a B team that day and they went on to be relegated.

League and championship are very different animals these days.

The first round of the Senior Club Championship may have been the best game I saw this year, certainly up among them. Fearless football by both sides; you don't see it often these days. Dingle won it, and I would say deservedly so. They definitely got a couple of soft decisions, but Dingle were fractionally the better side overall for me.

There's no debate at all about the Senior Club Final. The truth is that Dingle were a bit lucky to get past Kenmare Shamrocks in the semi-final and never really got going against Crokes in the final. To be fair, Dingle were missing a couple of key players, but Crokes were simply too good for them anyway. As I said, speed on the ball. I did think Dingle were too defensive for long periods of that game.

For a simple summation, Dingle play very good football and I like watching them play. But I just think that Crokes have that bit more teamwork overall and I expect Crokes by about three points. It should be genuinely entertaining though.


Stephen O' Brien

Still at the bottom of the table, but a big improvement on our debut season. We tailed off sharply after a great start to the season. It's a long slog and I suspect that there are lessons being learnt in terms of stamina all the time. I'd be very happy with where we are and I do think it's a slow and steady upward graph. I know recruitment is always key but I'd actually be hoping we can settle on an inner core group of players and build around that. Interesting that Cork City were promoted with plenty to spare. It really isn't that long ago that Cork City and Dundalk FC were thriving domestically and in Europe and taking the game to new heights. But as always, the FAI had no long term plan and both have fallen off a cliff. Frankly, I'd be surprised if Dundalk are a professional club next year. The thing about cutting our cloth to measure is that somebody actually has to measure the cloth, and nobody actually did that. Meanwhile, the FAI appear to have conveniently forgotten their proposal that allplayers have to be paid some kind of salary - that was always a nonrunner. Lovely idea, but exactly where was that money supposed to come from? League of Ireland clubs are decades behind in terms of developing facilities, and the masterplan of the Irish Government will pay for everything is slightly less than convincing.

The Premiership is fascinating. The top clubs all fell off towards the end of the season. It'll be a tight and entertaining finish, but the quality hasn't been convincing at all. Is the season a bit too long? Is fatigue coming into play? I was convinced at the start of this year that nobody was really going to be there with Shamrock Rovers at the finish, so I'm pleasantly surprised, but it's more that Rovers fell back to the pack than other teams rising to the standard they set. Right now the smart money would have to favour Shelbourne -Duff, disgruntled whinger that he can be, is still a real breath of fresh air in many ways. I'd like for them to get over the line. I can't see Dundalk holding Rovers but Shelbourne should see off Drogs. St. Pats and Derry? Your guess is as good as mine, probably much better. Either way, it's a lot more entertaining than recent seasons, where Rovers had the title pretty much wrapped up at this stage. I did watch the first twenty five minutes of the Womens' Cup Final. For obvious reasons, I gave up at that point. Very poor fare.

English Xenophobia to the Fore

Well, England have appointed replacement to Gareth Southgate, and they have opted for German Thomas Tuchel. The usual xenophobes on social media have been desperately trying to provoke a furore over this insult to the elite English managers. I'm glad to note that English supporters, a much brighter lot than English media think - to be fair, Brexit has not reflected well on their public - have completely ignored that nonsense. When you talk about the creme de la creme of English managers these days....Stephen Gerrard? Wayne Rooney? Frank Lampard? Gary Neville? I'll grant you that the likes of Eddie Howe, Sean Dyche, and Graham Potter are a higher level than that. But does anybody really think that they are at Tuchel's level? There was some talk about Klopp or maybe even Pep Guardiola, but anybody who actually thought that there was any slight bit of credibility in that should probably seek help.

Lee Carsley losing to Greece was probably

the hammer blow for his chances of a permanent appointment, but I think he'll be quite happy to bide his time. Put it this way, he'll be in with England a lot longer than anybody is going to last with Ireland, and at least the FA got their job done in a timely manner. England still face a big problem. though, and it's actually one that has hung around the vestiges of their faded empire for a lot of 150 years now. Hubris. Here's the thing. Every English supporter seriously believes that 1966 was business as usual and every other year has been an aberration. Jude Bellingham was the best player in the world three months ago, just narrowly ahead of Bukayo Saka. It turns out that it's actually Cole Palmer just ahead of Kobbie Mainoo. Whereas the actual truth is that if you were really picking a world eleven right now, Bellingham would just about make the bench. I'm not knocking those players - I'd start any of them for Ireland even if they were wearing blindfolds. But Gareth Southgate taking England to two European Finals and a World Cup semi-final is actually phenomenal. Do you understand how incredibly limited a timeframe an international manager has with the players, and that's only getting tighter as FIFA greed extends the already fairly ridiculous playing schedules at the top level. How do they not understand that? It would be comparable to Hallgrimmson qualifying Ireland for the next World Cup. Tuchel is not going to achieve more than Southgate, I thought Southgate was the best English manager of at least a generation or more.

Alex Ferguson: The Biter Bit

"How sharper than the serpent's tooth is an ungrateful child". King Lear - well, Bill Shakespeare wrote it, but you know what I mean. Manchester United was definitely Alex Ferguson's baby, and he minded it ferociously. He was, without question, the most successful English manager ever (in the sense that Ian Rush, Kenny Dalglish, and George Best were English). So much so that the club quite rightly appointed him as an ambassador of the club, with a £2 million pound annual salary. INEOShave decided recently to end that role and have been called out publicly for doing so. After all, where is the gratitude?

Except that this is not some kind of charitable foundation or community enterprise. This is a multi-billion pound business. Alex Ferguson always understood that aspect of it. He was quite ruthless in his time in getting the best out of players and selling them at the right time. Was Roy Keane discarded because he criticised the team in a Man United TV interview? Nonsense. Everyone who has heard that interview, including all his fellow players, agree that said interview was fairly innocuous. Alex Ferguson reckoned that time was catching up on one of the greatest and most combative midfielders of a generation - in which he was absolutely right, by the way, Roy was never the same player again and this was the easiest way to get him out the door. Roy got played and fell for it hook,

line, and sinker. Alex Ferguson dumped Jaap Stam, supposedly because he had written a book - nonsense. Alex reckoned - and has since acknowledged that he was wrong that Jaap was limited in European games. David Beckham wasn't sold to Madrid because he was dating Victoria Beckham frankly, why would Ferguson care? He was sold at the height of his popularity because it was good business. Very good business. Prior to Ferguson, Matt Busby was the most famous manager in English soccer, and not well treated by the club after his tenure. But Busby was notoriously parsimonious towards the players in his time. Great manager, not a nice human being at all. Sir Alex Ferguson is only reaping what he sowed himself; I'd have made the same decision as INEOS, and

made it well before now.

As for being barred from the dressing room? How did that not happen long before now?It's not disrespecting Ferguson's phenomenal achievements tostate, simply, that you cannot have a former manager casting his shadow over a dressing room where the current manager needs to be the main voice. Bill Shankly, famously, was barred from Bob Paisley's dressing room, the legendary 'boot room' of Liverpool (it hadn't really become the boot room by then), and Paisley was able to thrive. Shankly, in his declining years, would famously go to Everton as he felt more welcomed there. Leeds hit a huge decline after Don Revie's reign, not least because of the enormous shadow he cast (not that I have much sympathy for Clough, another fairly rough customer in his time). Gratitude has its place, of course, but frankly business is business. £2 million a year? I never saw Ferguson, or any other manager, fighting for his players' pensions after they were finished.



PROVINCIAL CHAMPIONSHIPS DEMONSTRATE RULES PROPOSALS

I considered actually talking about the matches themselves, but I think that would be missing the point, really. These games were all about testing the new rules.

Make no mistake, I desperately want this experiment to succeed Gaelic football is mostly absolutely chronic to watch at the moment. It's dreadful, it really is. And the dreaded phrase 'compared to hurling' only makes it worse. I can't be watching that negative handpass fourteen defenders stuff, I really can't. We all thought that the legendarily brutal All Ireland semi-final between Dublin and Donegal in 2011 was the absolute nadir of gaelic football. Except that's par for the course now. If you were to pick an honest All Star team this year, you would be picking fifteen defenders, none of whom have ever had to defend one-on-one. And I'm not suggesting that Kerry are purists who are above that kind of play, far, far from it.

So we really need changes. Did they work? Sorry, but the jury is still very much out for me. The Provincial championships were not really a success. Intriguing more than entertaining. The constant commentary refrain of how great and hunky dory everything is got under my skin. They weren't great games; they were very tame exhibition stuff. Diarmuid O'Connor and Killian Spillane played really well for Munster. Leinster didn't show up at all

-alright, a big early deficit, but I saw no spark of resistance at all. Aidan O'Shea once again stamped his credentials as one of the best players of a generation. I'm not being mean (I've met him; he is an absolute gentleman) but this is not the forum where you need to show it. These games lacked blood and thunder. No physicality and loads of running. I hope the real thing is different; athleticism is already far too prioritized over skill in the game. There is more space up front, but it looks like sprinters from end to end will thrive and that's not good. I did love the kick-outs. Belt it out there and let the best man grab it. Old school, and in a good way.

Will they pass at Special Congress? I expect so; there's a lot of politicking in the background - big surprise, a lot of Ulster is yet again saying 'no', as is their wont to any mooted change, but the truth is that we need a different game. Attendances have been dropping like winter flies over the past few years, and with very good and justifiable reasons. Overall, I think the new rules are a good thing. Yes, they do bring us closer to AFL rules, and I am no fan of the compromise version of that game, but it's way more entertaining than gaelic football is at the moment. But I am reserving judgement. It does sound like the four points for a goal is being dropped - I actually liked that one. Yes, Connaught opened up a big lead over Leinster, but with four points for a goal you could eat into that deficit. It wasn't the cause of Leinster's malaise - frankly, they didn't look all that interested. As far as I am concerned, I haven't yet seen a real version of the game under these rules. Whatever that stuff at the weekend was, it wasn't competitive games of gaelic football. A PR exercise, not any real road test.

Shining a light on PEDESTRIAN SAFETY AND VISIBILITY THIS OCTOBER BANK HOLIDAY WEEKEND



erry County Council and Kerry Gardaí are shining a light on pedestrian safety on Kerry roads this Bank Holiday Weekend by highlighting the need for walkers and cyclists to wear high-visibility (hi-viz) clothing.

As the clocks go back this weekend, all road users are being reminded of the important of hi-viz apparel in the interests of road safety.

There has been a notable increase in the number of pedestrians using the roads without wearing any high visibility clothing such as a vest or an armband in recent years and this can cause significant danger to motorists as well as pedestrians and cyclists themselves.

Over a ten-year period from 2014 to 2023, the number of pedestrians admitted to hospital as in-patients with injuries from road traffic collisions was 2,843. A quarter of those hospitalised were aged 65 and over while 17% were aged 14 or less. These two age groups represent vulnerable road users

Road Safety Officer with Kerry County Council, Declan Keogh said: "It is

essential that pedestrians are visible to other road users and that they wear a high visibility vest or jacket for that purpose. They should also consider the location of where they intend to cross a road and whether that location is a safe place or not. There are several different types of crossings in towns and villages throughout the county which should be used by pedestrians to cross a road safely."

"Wearing a high visibility vest provides maximum visibility in low-light and dark conditions and helps motorists see you sooner. Pedestrians should also pay more attention to their surroundings and the roads they are walking or crossing, and likewise, motorists also have a responsibility to ensure they are watching out for vulnerable road users," he said.

Garda Inspector Gary Carroll of the Roads Policing Unit said: "Visibility is key to pedestrian and cyclists' safety on our roads at night. Wear bright colours, use reflective materials, and always be aware of your surroundings. Our aim is to ensure everyone gets home safely."

JOHN DONOVAN RIP

A tribute to former Killarney basketball star John Donovan by Eamonn Keogh

Many people in Killarney basketball circles were saddened to learn the unfortunate news that former professional basketball player John Donovan has passed away. John was the popular and well liked American player for the St. Vincent's Killarney club that played under the Danny Mann banner in the national league division two in the 1985-86 season.

A towering figure standing 7 ft 1in, he was affectionately known as 'Big John' and stood out on and off the court and was one of the tallest players ever to play in Ireland. His stint locally coincided with a transition period for Killarney basketball. The team had been relegated from the Premier Division one league and only one American player was allowed on the team for the new 1985-86 season. John quickly settled in to a side comprising of a combination of Killarney and Tralee players. Locals Paudie O'Connor, Connie Murphy, Pat O'Shea, Pat O'Connor and Johnny O'Donoghue were joined by Tralee's Mervyn Griffin, Pa

Knowles, Connie O'Connor and Colm Sheehy and were coached by Kerry basketball legend Gerald Gatt Carey.


With Big John leading the way Team Danny Mann enjoyed a decent run winning 15 games and losing 7 and finished third in the league losing out narrowly on promotion back to the top flight. They defeated Avon Hawks 75-73 in a league championship semi-final but lost the final 84-81 to St. Vincent's Cork.

Having arrived in Killarney in September 1985, John was in town just a few weeks when local club St. Paul's was founded. While the rivalry between the two local clubs was intense, John proved to be a hugely popular and well liked figure and built many friendships with people in both clubs. He developed a great friendship with current St. Paul's President Christy Sheehan and his family and was a regular visitor to the Sheehan family home in Bishop Moynihan Crescent. When John wasn't lining out in national league games, he was busy training and coaching underage club players as well as coaching in the local schools. He was always generous with his time passing on his knowledge and expertise to the younger

His living accommodation was in The Danny Mann on New Street and he was a familiar figure on the streets of Killarney every day. Those with little knowledge of basketball knew who he was as he was 7 ft 1 in and he was always friendly, good natured and well mannered.

Born on October 25th 1960 in Ridgewood, New Jersey, John went to Marist College in Poughkeepsie, New York on a full scholarship and was fifth in the Marist program history with 116 blocked shots . As well as Killarney, John enjoyed successful overseas stints in in Steyr, Austria and Tokyo, Japan. He also played with Ireland at international level.

Following his playing days John settled in Templeton, California in 1989. He worked




with American corporations Chevron State Farm and also set up his own insurance company called 'Big John Insurance Agency'. John always spoke fondly of his time in Killarney and had planned a return visit to Ireland in 2020 and 2021 but Covid disrupted those plans. Late last year he said that Ireland was still on his bucket list with hopes for 2024 but he experienced health challenges of two openheart surgeries and also endured an ultra-rare neurological condition, Superficial Siderosis. Unfortunately Big John never made it back to Killarney but his memory will live on and his name always comes up in conversations when local basketball people recall and reminisce about the various American players that have played here throughout the years since 1979. John Michael Donovan, a towering figure both in stature and spirit, passed away at the age of 63 in San Luis Obispo, CA on March 20, 2024 as the result of a fall. John was predeceased by his brother, Joseph Donovan and his sister, Anne Donovan, a legendary figure in women's basketball who won Olympic gold as a player and as a coach for the United States, John's legacy is carried on by his beloved wife, Sharon; his daughters Sarah, Katherine, Rachel, Emily and Meredith and the extended Donovan family.

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





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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.


While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.





This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \in 45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

HEDGING

Hedges can make a much more natural background to a garden than a wall or a fence. They can provide shelter and are cheaper and require a small amount of maintenance. Because a hedge allows the wind to filter through it reduces its velocity. Tall or low growing, clipped or informal, there is a hedging plant for every purpose. One thing to remember about a hedge is that it is intended to be a permanent feature in the garden so therefore should be chosen with care and planted in well prepared soil.

To choose the right hedge for your garden here are a few pointers to think about

- 1. The type of soil you have.
- 2. How exposed the garden is, i.e. what direction is it facing.
- 3. The eventual height and width the hedge will be.
- 4. Does it need to be evergreen.

When you have chosen the type of hedge that you want it is time to prepare the soil. start preparing the soil by digging thoroughly and forking in some well rotted farmyard manure. Hedges can be planted all year around, but the ideal time is between November and March as all hedging plants will be dormant at this time. What that means is when you go to buy your hedging plants they are lifted straight from the ground and are called bare-rooted hedging. This enables you to replant straight back into the ground when you get them home. Just make sure when planting that the roots are spread out well as this will encourage them to root quickly when the growing season starts. Now is the perfect time to plant hedging, however if you wish to wait until the end of March you can plant container grown hedging all year around.
