APRIL DATE FOR OPENING OF KILLARNEY HOUSE

A preview opening of the Ornamenal Gardens at Killarney House and Gardens will take place on April 3rd.

The first phase of the restoration of Killarney House and Gardens is now complete and this area of the Killarney National Park has been closed to the public since 2014.

A celebration for the whole community, the unveiling of the gardens will reveal just how much work has gone into restoring the grounds to their 18th, 19th and 20th century magnificence. The National Parks and Wildlife Service and the Office of Public Works have been working painstakingly to bring the gardens back to their former glory, using the original plans. This is just one element of the restoration project, which also involves developing a major National Park visitor centre in Killarney House, restoring some of the formal rooms, and using the house's exceptional collection of antiques to tell the story of the house and those who lived there.

The visitor centre will feature cutting-edge technology in a new extension, including,

exhibition areas for temporary exhibitions, and space for cultural events. The project is designed to optimise the potential of this landmark location while respecting its status as a heritage property managed by the National Parks and Wildlife Service of the Department of Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht.

Former home of the Earls of Kenmare, the present Killarney House the stable block of the original 18th-century Kenmare House. It was here that Valentine, Viscount Castlerosse, entertained his friends in the 1920s and 1930s. The house and a portion of the Kenmare estate were sold to an American syndicate in 1957, with John McShain ("the man who built Washington") buying out the other members of the syndicate in 1959. It came into the full possession and care of the State in 1998 on the death of McShain's wife, Mary.

Recognising its potential as an important heritage tourism asset, Failte Ireland supplied funding of €5.2 million under its Tourism Capital Investment Programme, with the balance of the overall cost of the restoration project being funded by the National Parks and Wildlife Service of the Department of Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht. Killarney National Park is the undisputed crown of the region's attraction, and now a hidden jewel is about to be revealed.





First is ability, which varies with each person but when mixed with the FRANK CON WAY other two can



produce inspiring results. Belief, this is critical for an athlete to succeed and without belief it is highly unlikely for an athlete to succeed. YEAR OF MERCY PILGRIMAGE TO ROME

Killarney man Michael O'Connor led a group of pilgrims to Rome at the beginning of February - here is an account of their trip.

During the month of February I had the privilege of travelling to Rome with a group of pilgrims to celebrate the Jubilee for St Pio prayer groups around the world.

On our first afternoon we had a wonderful panoramic tour of Rome. It ended at Maria Maggiore Basilica, one of the first shrines dedicated to Our Lady with its magnificent mosaics and richly decorated ceiling. We visited the crypt of the Nativity which contains the relics of the manger in Bethlehem. We also had the opportunity to walk through the Basilica's Holy Door. We celebrated the first Mass of our pilgrimage together in a side chapel.

That night we waited outside the Church of San Salvador for the arrival of the caskets of St Pio and St Leopold Mandic. The little church was filled to capacity, so after the special Mass we filed in to pay our respects to the saints. Next morning we walked in pilgrimage from Castel Sant'Angelo the short distance to the Holy Door of St Peter's Basilica. Inside the Basilica we had time to visit the side altars where the remains of Pope John 23 and St Pope John Paul lie. Later myself and some of the Kerry group had the privilege of accompanying the remains of St Pio and St Leopold in procession from the church of San Salvador to St Peter's Basilica, whom were in glass caskets.

In the afternoon we went to the Irish College where the Dean, Rev Ciaran O'Carroll, welcomed us before Mass, outlining the history of the college and its association with our great

The Jubilee for Padre Pio's prayer groups took place next morning in St Peter's Square in brilliant sunshine. More than 800,000 pilgrims thronged the Square, eagerly awaiting the arrival of Pope Francis. He sped around in his pope mobile, stopping here and there to greet pilgrims and bless the sick. In his homily to the prayer groups he quoted St Pio who said that prayer is a force that moves the whole world and spreads the smile and blessing of God over every langour and weakness. "It's true," said Pope Francis. "Try it!"

That afternoon we travelled to the Basilica of St John Lateran and some of us had the opportunity to engage in the age old tradition of climbing the holy stairs in the nearby church on our knees. This gave us a plenary indulgence. Our Mass on Sunday morning was in St Patrick's Church, centre of the Augustinians in Rome. We filled the church with a chorus of hail Glorious St Patrick before leaving.

The last Basilica we visited was the impressive St Paul outside the walls which houses the remains of St Paul under its main altar. When we walked through its Holy Door we saw along the nave of the Basilica, mosaics of all the popes, starting with St Peter and ending with Pope Benedict.

This was one of my most memorable pilgrimages to Rome. Since St Pio appeared to me on two occasions, I have been taking pilgrimages for the past number of years to San Giovanni Rotondo where St Pio spent most of his life. I also have a First Class relic of the saint and there have been many miracles and healings through his intercession.

IS IT SAFE TO EXERCISE **WITH DIABETES?**

Exercising with diabetes is extremely beneficial in helping control sugar and insulin levels. So yes it is important to get up and active. However before you go throwing on the runners to hit cardiac steps, the first step is to consult with your doctor or specialist first to get the correct level of exercise that it is ok for you to commence

Exercising with diabetes can be a tricky one at the start to figure and control your blood sugars and getting the levels right. It may even be required to check your blood sugars before, during and after your responds to the exercise you are doing. But quite quickly you will learn what exercises best suit you and the safe intensities to take your workout level to.

Exercise can also help people with type 2 diabetes avoid long-term complications, especially heart problems. People with diabetes are susceptible to developing blocked arteries (arteriosclerosis), which can lead to a heart attack. Exercise helps keep your heart healthy and strong as covered last week. Plus, exercise helps you maintain good cholesterol—and that helps you avoid clogging up of the arteries.

As with all exercise programmes you will have to start off small and build up the intensity sensibly.

A good programme if you are a beginner or have not exercised in a while is to start off with a 30mins aerobic activity most days of the week such as; swimming, cycling, walking, basketball, tennis etc). Then after a few weeks you can gradually start introducing some weight bearing exercises 2-3 times per week. Something as simple as using your own body weight to start can suffice eg. squats, push ups, lunges, pull ups etc. Then when you are comfortable with these progressions & want to move onto something more intense I would advise engaging a trainer to show you how to effectively & safely incorporate weights into your programme so you get the best benefits and know how to use them without casing an injury.

The main thing is not to be afraid of exercise. The long term benefits will far out weigh the awkwardness of building it into your daily routine and learning how to regulate your blood sugars through diet and controlled medication while exercising. WHAT IS LYMPHOEDEMA?

Lymphoedema is a transport disorder of the lymphatic system and lymphoedema (swelling) occurs when lymph flow is impaired. Damage, obstruction or absence of the vessels can lead to swelling and most often it is the limbs that are affected. Tissues with lymphoedema are at increased risk of infection and it can impact on limb function. It is very important to know that while this is a long term condition it is a treatable and manageable condition. There are two types of lymphoedema- primary which is a developmental or inherited disturbance of the lymphatic's or secondary which is acquired damaged to the lymphatic system.

Secondary lymphoedema can occur in those with cancer and the main causes are:

- 1. Damage to the lymphatic system due to removal of lymph nodes, radiotherapy to lymph nodes, extensive scarring or large wounds
- 2. Advanced cancer causing an obstruction in the lymphatic system
- 3. Problems with veins like deep vein thrombosis

- 4. Infection or inflammation
- 5. Not being able to move around due to paralysis or neurological conditions

It is important to recognise the early signs of lymphoedema as early treatment can help control swelling and stop it from getting worse.

The early signs include:

- Swelling in part of the body. To begin with this may come and go and it will be worse in the evening time.
- · A feeling of heaviness, tightness, soreness or stiffness in the affected area.
- Skin changes over a period of time, skin feeling tight, taut and shiny.
- Clothing or jewellery feeling tighter than usual. (Further information from Lymphoedema Ireland and MLD Ireland)



809 EXTRA REGISTERED TO VOTE

The National Youth Council of Ireland (NYCI) has welcomed that 809 people in Kerry have been added to the supplementary register in advance of tomorrow's general election, and is calling on young people to ensure they cast their vote. The NYCI is the representative body for youth organisations with 1,400 staff and 40,000 volunteers who work with over 380,000 young people nationwide.

James Doorley, NYCI deputy director explained: "The figures from the local authority indicate that 809 people in Kerry added their names to the supplementary register before the February 9th deadline, which is to be welcomed.

"Now, however, the focus must turn to getting out the vote. NYCI is encouraging 18 to 25 year olds in particular to make sure they make their voices heard tomorrow, Friday the 26th of February," added Mr Doorley. Mr Doorley said: "We've been working to increase the number of young people on the register for the past number of referendums and elections, and we're delighted that the local media have been supportive of our campaign this time round. This campaign, along with registration drives run by many youth and community organisations, has helped contribute to the additional numbers on the electoral register.

HOTELIERS WELCOME FG'S **COMMITMENT TO TOURISM**

Kerry hoteliers today welcomed Fine Gael's commitment to ensuring tourism remains at the heart of Ireland's economic policy during the life of the next Government. Market conditions within the industry remain challenging, particularly outside of the larger urban areas and traditional tourism hotspots.



DIN JOE CROWLEY RIP

It is with deep regret that Kerry GAA has learned of the death of former Kerry footballer Din Joe (D.J.) Crowley who passed away on Friday morning last.

The Rathmore clubman, burst onto the intercounty scene when giving a man-of-thematch performance in the 1969 All Ireland Final partnering the legendary Mick O'Connell at midfield prompting the famed John D. Hickey in the Irish Independent to report "This was a "tour de force" by Crowley if ever there was one".

A year later, in the famous 80 minute final against Meath, Crowley left an indelible mark on the game when scoring one of the most celebrated goals in the history of All Ireland

football finals following a famous solo run from the middle of the field. That goal not alone ensured a 22nd title for the Kingdom but it also ensured that the Rathmore man would for ever more be associated with that final prompting a Sunday newspaper to proclaim in colour "The Goal of the Century".

Crowley, a late developer in football terms, made his championship debut against Limerick in 1967 without having represented the county in League football and played 16 championship games for the Kingdom scoring 2-14 in the process in a relatively short intercounty career from 1967 to 1971. He played in the 1968 All Ireland final defeat at the hands of Down at full forward but it was as midfield partner to

Mick O'Connell that he is best remembered, the Valentia stalwart describing him as "very strong!" He also won 3 National League titles with Kerry, (1969, '70 & '71) and 3 Munster titles. DJ toured Australia with the ground breaking Kerry team in 1970 playing on the legendary Aussie Rules player and captain Ron Barassi in the Olympic Stadium in Melbourne.

On the Club scene, DJ won a county Junior Championship medal with Rathmore in their 1969 final victory over Lispole and won 3 County Championship medal with East Kerry (1965, '68 & '69).

PETROL OR DIESEL **ADVICE**

Starting the engine will circulate the contaminated fuel and increase the risk of damage.

If you're on a petrol station forecourt, put your car into neutral and get help to push your vehicle to a safe place.

If you have driven a short distance after misfuelling, safely and legally park the vehicle, turn off the engine and call us.

If the misfuelling has gone unnoticed, the car will eventually stop.

The effect of petrol in a diesel vehicle can be very expensive.

Find out what happens if you add the wrong fuel to your car.

PETROL IN A DIESEL

This is the most common wrong fuel occurrence. Approximately 70% of calls for assistance with misfuelling to the AA are diesel vehicles having been filled with petrol. Petrol contamination of a diesel fuel system can cause the lubricating qualities of the diesel fuel to be 'washed out' and starve the moving parts of the injection system of lubricant. Depending on how long the diesel vehicle has been run on the petrol will determine any potential consequential damage. Best practice is not to start the engine as this will reduce the risk of the petrol washing the lubrication out.

ON THE FORECOURT

If you've just started putting petrol in a diesel and realised mid-way, stop. Take a note of how much you've put in. Talk to the staff at the filling station, pay for your fuel, then put your vehicle in neutral and push to a safe place until you get

The car might even eventually stop.

DIESEL IN A PETROL CAR

This is much harder to do and is less common to the AA than petrol in a diesel vehicle.

Approximately 30% of calls to the AA for misfuelling are where the driver has put diesel in a petrol car. This is because the diesel trigger nozzle tends to be bigger and often won't fit a

Diesel contamination of a petrol fuel system will cause the engine to smoke excessively, misfire and cause difficulty starting. The petrol fuel filter will become contaminated with the oil base of the diesel fuel. Spark plugs will also become oiled and contaminated causing the vehicle to run rough, cut out and not restart. On some petrol vehicles the emissions controls can also become contaminated especially if the vehicle has been started and driven.

ON THE FORECOURT

If you've just started putting diesel in a petrol car and realised mid-way, stop. Take a note of how much you've put in. Tell the staff at the filling station and pay for your fuel. Put the gears in neutral, move your vehicle to a safe place and wait for assistance.

FILLED UP WITH DIESEL

If you've filled up with diesel and paid but you're still on the garage forecourt, don't start the car. Instead, go back into the filling station and explain what has happened. Again, put the gears in neutral, move your vehicle to a safe place and wait for assistance.

If you've started the car, stop as soon as you can and when it's safe to do so.

TELL-TALE SIGNS OF THE WRONG FUEL **MAY BE:**

- an excessively smoking exhaust
- · lack of power
- · engine misfiring
- engine cut out and won't restart.

Senior cycle subject choice is the first step on the road to college

During the final two years of senior cycle, students study one of three Leaving Cert programmes, each leading to a state exam. The vast majority of students prefer the traditional Leaving Cert (LC). The Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme (LCVP) is similar to the traditional

Leaving Certificate, except that students also take three Link Modules (Enterprise Education, Preparation for Work and Work Experience). The Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA) is strongly vocational, meaning that it's more job and employment focused. The subject areas are more practical than academic. This is a great option for students who may prefer not to go directly to third level when they finish school, although many continue their education along the Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) Awards

Subject selection for Leaving Cert is extremely important because the subjects you choose will influence your further study and career. Give this process serious consideration and decide for yourself what senior cycle subjects will suit you best. Leaving Cert students usually take seven subjects. Mathematics, Irish and English are compulsory subjects. It's also advisable to study a modern language, as many third level colleges have a modern language as an entry requirement.

The task facing you, therefore, is to select three optional subjects — four if you decide not to take a third language. Take care that your subjects fulfil the entry requirements for your courses of interest. Many colleges also impose additional subject requirements which are course specific. For example, for entry into courses in primary teacher education, an applicant must achieve, at least, grade H5 in Higher Level Irish. While it may not be a major consideration as you plan for senior cycle, it's useful to know that a number of courses at third level utilise criteria of selection in addition to, or other than, points achieved in the Leaving Cert exam. These criteria include art portfolio, interview, audition and suitability test.

When calculating total points' score, six subjects may be used from any one sitting of the Leaving Cert exam. The potential maximum points' score in the new points' scale, which comes into effect for 2017 Leaving Cert exam candidates, is 600 or 625 if Higher Level Maths is one of the six subjects counted. Students studying the Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme (LCVP) may include the points awarded for the Link Modules as one of the six subjects used for calculating points. In the new points scale, the Link Modules on the LCVP are awarded 66 points for a Distinction (80% to 100%), 46 points for a Merit (65% to < 80%) and 28 points for a Pass (50% to < 65%).

Keep the following criteria of subject selection in mind when making your choice. Firstly, if you have a flair for - a special ability in, an aptitude for - a particular subject and a reasonable level of interest in that subject, you will derive tremendous personal satisfaction from studying that subject, irrespective of career considerations.

Secondly, take note of the subjects in which you are achieving good grades. The Leaving Cert exam is a test of achievement. Grades and points determine entry to higher education. There is little benefit to you in taking a subject which you find difficult and are unlikely to do well in. Be aware that the points' potential at higher (H) level is far greater than at ordinary (0) level. For example, in the new points' scale, H3 is worth 77 points while 03 is worth only 37 points. Study as many of your subjects at higher level

Thirdly, select subjects you are interested in because you will obviously work harder at those. Of all the variables that determine success at school, at college and in your career, interest is the most critical. It's highly probable that the subjects that interest you at school will have a major influence on your college course choices in two years' time.

Fourthly, it's essential for you to be aware of subjects that are required for any particular career interests you may have. Each college has a system of general and specific entry requirements which you must satisfy before you are considered for a place in a particular course. For example, as and from 2017, the minimum general entry requirements for UCC are 2H5 and 4H7/06. A pass in a laboratory science subject in the Leaving Cert exam is a specific entry requirement for a degree course in Nursing.

The task facing you, therefore, is to select, after due consideration, a subject grouping that will satisfy the four criteria of Flair (aptitude), Achievement, Interest and Required. It may help you to remember that you need to make a FAIR choice of subjects. Study the information carefully, give careful consideration to your subject choice, think about your course options and the related careers. In the end choose wisely as this is the first step on your path to college.

Know Your Rights: TRAINING SUPPORT **GRANTS**

OUESTION

I'm getting Jobseeker's Allowance and am really interested in working with food. I found a café near me that is willing to offer me a job. They have asked me to do a food safety (HACCP) course first but I can't afford the course fee. Is there any help with this?

ANSWER

You should talk to your Department of Social Protection (DSP) case officer about a Training Support Grant. This scheme can give you quick access to short-term training that will help you take up a work opportunity.

Your DSP case officer can approve a grant under this scheme

- A training need is identified that is not provided by DSP directly or any other State provider and is not available quickly or in a suitable location.
- The intervention identified is linked to both the activation needs of the jobseeker and labour market conditions.
- The intervention is part of the agreed personal progression or action plan to enter or re-enterwork.
- They are satisfied that you have provided reasonable evidence or grounds of need (for example, in the form of a job offer or of a potential job offer) or an identified skill gap or a requirement to maintain or achieve accreditation (for example, safe pass, driving licences, HACCP, security industry permits).

You can get funding of up to €500 a year under the scheme. (However the maximum contribution that can be approved and paid for essential driver training is €250.)

You need to provide a quotation from the training provider. Generally the grant is paid after you have finished the programme, done the relevant assessments and achieved certification.

IERS TO SUCCESS



Do you ever feel that you have more potential that you are realising? Perhaps it seems as if your plans never come to fruition - or you sabotage your own success. Perhaps you lack confidence in your own abilities and doubt your

capacity for success. Do you tend to procrastinate or find your great ideas never see the light of day? Then it may well be that you are creating your own psychological barriers to success?

Many of us carry around limiting beliefs and negative habits which hinder our success. These beliefs and behaviours are sometimes so well developed that we don't even realise they are there - and when we do, we don't have the skills or tools to overcome them. Typical barriers to success include: Fear of success and/or fear of failure, low self-esteem, negative thinking, reluctance to seek help, negative past experiences that continue to create emotional blocks, difficulties relating to others, depression, self-doubt and/or lack of self-belief.

However we pay the price for these negative thoughts and self-

Bring to mind something that you've been wanting to do - and write it down on a sheet of paper. Now think of all of the reasons that stop you from doing this - and write these down. Next review the list and cross off those that are simply not real or true (it may be helpful to enlist the help of a friend here).

Now look at the negative beliefs on your list that can be substituted with something more positive. The brain cannot hold two contradictory beliefs simultaneously - thus try replacing a negative belief (e.g. I could never go to college) with a more positive one (I have the ability to go to college). Better still, write the positive affirmation in the present tense as if it is already happening (I am studying in College and loving every minute of it). Write down your affirmations and put them on your desk or bathroom mirror, repeating them as often as possible. Notice when self-doubts crop up.

When self-doubts and limiting beliefs sneak in - do a reality check and ask yourself'Is there a rational reason to believe them?' If so, what can you do to change this? Is there something practical we can do to? Sometimes our doubts and negative self-beliefs are rooted in earlier life experiences or childhood traumas. If this is the case, perhaps you could seek the help of a counsellor or coach to overcome these.

Next week we will continue to look at our own personal Psychological Barriers to Success and discuss ways in which these can be overcome.

TAX Matters with



SOLE TRADER START UP

To set up as a sole trader you must register for income tax with Revenue as a self-employed sole trader. As a self-employed individual you pay tax under the self-assessment system. You pay Preliminary Tax (an estimate of tax due) on or before 31 October each year and make a tax return not later than 31 October following the end of the tax year. You must keep proper records to allow you to fill out your annual tax return. You pay the Universal Social Charge directly to Revenue when you make your annual tax return.

EARNED INCOME TAX CREDIT: Since January 2016, as a self-employed trader you may claim a new Earned Income tax credit of €550.

You must keep accounts which record:

- · All purchases and sales of goods and services and
- · All amounts received and all amounts paid out

You must keep supporting records of the above such as invoices, bank and building society statements and receipts. You may claim certain business expenses against tax as well as your contributions to your personal pension.

Under the Start Up Refunds for Entrepreneurs (SURE) scheme you may be entitled to a refund of PAYE income tax that you paid over the 6 years before the year in which you invest in starting a business.

You must register for Value Added Tax (VAT) if your annual turnover exceeds or is likely to exceed the following annual limits: €75,000 in respect of the supply of goods or €37,500 in respect of the supply of services.



UPDATE ON NUNS EVICTION FROM LAST WEEK

A few weeks ago it came to light that two San Francisco-based nuns, whose lives are almost entirely devoted to feeding the homeless and selling baked good to live, were facing eviction as their rent had suddenly been hiked by about \$2,000 a month. They were in the process of fighting the eviction but did not feel particularly good about their prospects. Under a recent deal, the nuns of the Fraternite Notre Dame Mary of Nazareth Soup Kitchen at 54 Turk St. can stay for a year at their current rent. And the landlord won't try to evict them. The man who made it happen was famedmotivational speaker, Tony Robbins who flew in for a Bay Area engagement and headed for the soup kitchen after reading of the nuns' plight and handed them a check for \$25,000. Mr. Robbins' check was just phase one of a business plan. The next step, he said, is to find a more permanent place. The third is to market their pastries to get a steadier income. Mr. Robbins has risen up from very little and become very successful, and dedicates a considerable amount of energy and resources to helping others less fortunate than himself, for many decades now.

CREDIT CARDS FOR MONOPOLY

For its upcoming Monopoly Ultimate Banking, a modernized version of the classic real estate and free market-themed board game, the toy company has eliminated Monopoly's colourful wads of cash. 8 REASONS WHY SPIDERS ARE ONE OF THE MOST UNDERRATED ANIMALS ON THE PLANET

Physically, spiders aren't what many would consider angelic creatures. It could be the amount of eyes spiders have. It could be the amount of legs or it could be the way that they move. Maybe it's some awkward amalgamation of the just-mentioned, as well as any other skewed fact floating around out there. Whatever the exact reason, for years now spiders have been looked at by some humans with fear.

Don't get me wrong: arachnophobia (the fear of spiders) is a very real thing. In no way am I trying to say that it isn't, or that those that suffer from it should for some reason feel ashamed

In celebration of Save a Spider Day (March 12th), what I hope this list says — what I hope this list proves — is that spiders aren't just something to be screamed at, or squished beneath boot heels, but something to be respected, and even admired.

Myth: On average, us humans swallow eight spiders per year while we're sleeping.

Truth: While we can't say that it has never happened before, the number in this myth is absurd. The only reason a spider would be remotely interested in climbing into bed with you is in search of bed bugs. Not convinced yet? Check out this article further debunking

- 1. Spiders Are Ingenious Hunters Some spiders pounce on their prey. Some ensnare their prey in a web of silk. Some dig trap doors into the dirt and let their pray fall into a very similar ball of silk. And others? There are many others that have their own individual way of hunting — their own techniques, their own schemes, etc.
- 2. They Call Earth Home The exact number of spider species is unknown. But, as of 2014, 45,000 different species had been identified. And they span across the planet.

Each continent, even each region, has spiders specific to it. For example, tarantulas — one of the most versatile spiders when it comes to climate — can be found in all continents, save for Antarctica.

- 3. They Steer Us Clear of Famine You wouldn't believe how crucial spiders are to organic farms, THEY EAT BUGS, LOTS OF BUGS, They eat insects and other pests who have been proven to be guite detrimental to crops. If they don't eat, we don't eat.
- 4. The Strength of Silk Ounce for ounce silk is actually stronger than steel. And spiders have plenty of it. They also have plenty of uses for it, including prey capture and immobilisation, but also for reproduction, dispersal, and also as nourishment on occasion — on slow hunting days, they'll nibble on their own silk. It can be used as an "alarm line" rather than to capture prey. Or, in the event that a spider wanders too far from its shelter, they could be keeping a line of silk in which they follow back home.

Myth: Daddy-longlegs are a type of spider. Truth: Yes, they are arachnids, but they are not spiders. Daddy-longlegs, otherwise known as Leatherjackets, have one body section, two eyes, a segmented abdomen, and produce neither silk or venom. Spiders, on the other hand, have two body sections, (typically) eight eyes, an unsegmented abdomen, silk and venom.

5. They Have Superpowers - Some jumping spiders have the ability to de-focus their vision. Meaning: they sense distance by comparing a blurry image to a clear image. It all lies with the colour green. The comparison that they're able to create helps them gauge distances before pouncing on their prey (farther distance = blurry, while nearby = clear, for example). But why green? Well, the why may not be easy to answer. But they noticeably suffer in judgment when under red light.

- 6. Spiders actually have water-repellent hair that not only can keep them dry, but prevents them from drowning. Those same hairs can capture air bubbles that the spider can take beneath the surface of the water. It's also what allows them to float!
- 7. Some Species of Spiders Are Deserving of An Oscar - Over 100 species of spiders commit to the craft of acting to catch their prey. Through evolution, they're able to appear like ants, both to evade certain predators, and to help them catch, well, ants
- 8. They Have Personality The majority of spiders live in solitude. They hunt alone. They eat alone. Some spiders will even try to eat each other if they cross paths. Yet, there are 25 species of spiders that live in a much more social atmosphere, where, as studies have shown, the spiders can take on different sorts

CUNNING CARNIVOROUS PLANTS CATCH MORE PREY BY LETTING SOME GO

Pitcher plants that typically grow in acidic and nutrient-poor soils, have developed the ability to eat insects and other small prey to supplement their diets. Nepenthes grow modified leaf structures which form a saucer cup with a slippery rim lined with visual or edible bait. When an insect approaches to investigate the reward, they slip off the rim and into the cup which is usually filled with a viscoelastic fluid. Unable to escape, the prey is slowly digested and absorbed by the plant.

However, observers of the Nepenthes rafflesiana, found in Borneo, discovered that the effectiveness of some traps is dependent on the weather. The rim (known as the peristome) is only slippery when wet from rain or increased humidity, but stays dry during the day allowing ants—a staple prey—to freely come and go.


Ants typically send scouts out to search for food. When they find a source, like the nectar produced by a pitcher plant, they return to the colony to recruit others to help them harvest it. If N. rafflesiana captured every scout, the steady trickle of ants would be random and infrequent, but by allowing some scouts to escape and return with friends, the plant is able to lure greater numbers in at once.

Younger N. rafflesiana plants with fewer pitchers tend to rely on the "slow and steady" method of capture, maintaining a constantly slippery surface.
