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

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
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"I have decided I am opening my restaurant July 1st no matter what"

With TV appearences on Prime Time and SKY NEWS this week, along with numerous national and local radio stations, Killarney Restaurant owner Paul Treyvaud has gone viral after a tweet in which he pleged to open his restaurant Treyvauds on High Street on July 1st no matter what.

"I have decided I am opening my restaurant July 1st no matter what. That gives them 4 months to sort out everything. I've done everything I've been told to do. 55k came in from UK with that variant, now over 1500 from Brazil.

The problem is no longer us. It's an incompetent Gov". Paul tweeted.

Speaking this week, Paul said if he is not open by July 1st,

everything he has worked for is gone. "There is no point opening in October or November because there will be nobody around Killarney then" he said.

"This isn't a conspirancy nut jobits pure maths, If I don't open by July 1st everything is gone", Paul said.

His tweet reached far and wide with many people agreeing with Paul. "I have no intention of losing everything I've worked on all my life for and I am so angry and annoyed and have lost hope with the people running the show", he said. "I'm not telling any other business that has been shut to do the same, but all I am saying is that there is strength in numbers, I'd rather fight my own battles than take another cent of state aid", Paul said.

BLACK VALLEY ON THE RADAR FOR ELON MUSK

It may have been one of the last areas in Ireland to see the arrival of electricity in the 1970's but now reports suggest that The Black Valley is to get a high speed satellite delivered internet as part of a pilot project funded by the tech billionaire Elon Musk.

The owner of Electric carmaker Tesla is the founder of SpaceX, the company which is currently deploying a series of satellites into space which will provide cheap and fast broadband for rural locations. Residents in the Black Valley are well used to the delayed arrival of techology in their area, the picturesque part of Kerry was also the last place in Ireland to get telephone landlines and they still have to deal with unreliable mobile signals.

Currently almost a third of Kerry residents are without access to a quality broadband service and the expected rollout of National Broadband Service will take approximately another seven years.

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

CALL FOR CLUSTER HOUSING FOR THE ELDERLY

"At the February meeting of Kerry County Council, Councillor Michael Gleeson called on the Government and Local Authorities to develop appropriate in size and location cluster housing for older persons who do not want to be confined to Nursing Homes but wish to continue reasonably independent living in a community setting.

Councillor Gleeson said that for almost a year Nursing Home residents have not been able to directly speak to or interact with their families and friends. They have endured considerable isolation and loneliness. Following lives of working and caring they have been cut off from those who are most important to them.

S"ome of those people would be well able to live reasonably independent lives if the appropriate housing was available for them. I refer to developments such as Clúid Housing in Killarney or Brú na Sinnsir in Rathmore. These developments afford people the dignity of having a home and the security and reassurance of having neighbours, Carers and medical attention", Cllr. Gleeson told Killarney Outlook.



Dental treatment for medical card holders in Kerry under grave threat

The Irish Dental Association (IDA) has said that dental treatment in Kerry for medical card holders is in "complete chaos", warning that the unprecedented number of dentists withdrawing from the outdated Dental Treatment Services Scheme (DTSS) is having serious repercussions for patients.

Between 2017 and 2020, State spending on dental care for medical card patients in Kerry decreased by 48%, from €2,425,497.87 to €1,257,435.95. This represents the second-biggest funding drop in the country over three years.

Concurrently, according to HSE figures, the number of DTSS contracts held by dentists in Kerry fell by 37%, from 62 to 39 between March 2017 and January 2021.

The DTSS provides access to



limited dental treatment for adult medical card holders. The IDA believes members should individually consider courses of action that are open to them.

Medical card patients were now faced with:

Delays while seeking treatment; Increased travel times while seeking that treatment; and Possible reliance on the already

Possible reliance on the already underfunded public dental service to provide care in areas where DTSS contracts are not in place.

The IDA is the representative body for 2,000 dentists (public and private) practising in Ireland.

his week, hotel and questhouse owners in Kerry are calling for an urgent review of business and employment supports for the hospitality sector following the announcement at the weekend that it is unlikely to reopen before mid-summer.

They are also asking the Government to intervene with the banks to ensure that appropriate supports and engagement processes are in place for business owners and their team members until Covid – 19 has been suppressed. Bernadette Randles, chair of the Kerry branch of the Irish Hotels Federation warns that failure to act now will have long term implications that could take years to repair."

"Public health must always be the number one priority and we recognise the difficult balance the Government has to achieve. However, if the all-important summer period is being eroded, additional supports are required now to safeguard businesses and the livelihoods they support until society reopens and the sector and wider tourism industry can recover. Ms Randles

"The news at the weekend resulted in acute frustration and anxiety for many people. Prior to this pandemic, some 15,700 livelihoods were supported by tourism and hospitality here in Kerry with the sector contributing €592 million to the local economy. Hotels and guesthouses not only provide local employment opportunities, they buy local services, source locally produced food and provide a vital infrastructure in support of local business and communities. In some parts, whole communities are built around tourism. A severely devastated tourism and hospitality sector would be a major loss to the economy and society here for many vears to come. This can and must be avoided."

"It wasn't that long along ago that in the aftermath of the last financial crisis tourism was the number one sector in terms of job creation. Government must step up with engagement and the required supports to ensure that the sector and its 270,000 community nationwide can recover," she said.

KERRY GREENS WELCOME PLAN

FOR KILLARNEY CYCLE LANES

The Killarney cycle lanes project proposed by Kerry County Council, has been welcomed by local Green Party activists, who say the town is choked with traffic.

Diarmaid Griffin, Killarney Representative for the Greens, said: "This project will provide safe cycling routes for day-to-day activities like shopping, going to school or visiting the town centre. It will also help to address the chronic vehicle congestion in our town by allowing people a viable alternative while also addressing air and noise pollution"

However, in a detailed submission on the project, the Kerry Greens have pointed out that the design of junctions in the project need to be reworked and they've advocated greater adherence to the NTA's National Cycling Manuel and the Design Manual for Urban Roads and Streets (DMURS) in the plans.

Anluan Dunne, chair of the Kerry Greens, remarked: "This project is ambitious in its scale and it is really good to see fully segregated cycle lanes provided for. However, we are concerned that the junctions are unsafe or inefficient for people walking or cycling. We would like to see the junction designs modified to reflect the National Transport Authority guidance through the National Cycling Manual."

Green Party leader, Eamon Ryan, recently announced funding of €50 million euro for the development of cycling infrastructure in rural counties like Kerry. Following the funding announcement, 248 new posts to assist in the expansion of walking and cycling facilities nationwide.

At the time, Minister Ryan stated: "Developing high quality walking and cycling facilities will encourage more people to switch to active travel and will contribute to tackling climate change. Really good design is what is needed to connect communities and make walking and cycling attractive, safe and accessible to everyone. I am delighted to confirm that we will fund dedicated resources in all local authorities to deliver on the commitments in the Programme for



Government. This is a game-changer in terms of delivering highquality infrastructure across the country in both rural and urban areas." Anluan Dunne concluded: "We have made a constructive and supportive submission in respect of the project. We hope that the junctions in particular are looked at again to make them safer, more efficient and connected."

The Kerry Greens look forward to the delivery of this project and the positive impact it will have for Killarney.

SHOPFRONT ENHANCEMENT SCHEME

TO BE PILOTED IN KERRY

A pilot scheme, by Kerry County Council, to enhance shopfronts has been launched in Tralee.

The Tralee Town Centre Pilot Shopfront Enhancement Scheme aims to improve the streetscape environment by encouraging and supporting business owners to upgrade their shopfronts. The scheme applies initially to Upper and Lower Castle Street in the town. It is intended that the scheme will result in a more attractive environment that residents, visitors, shoppers and businesses can enjoy. It is also envisaged that this scheme will assist in promoting Tralee as an attractive place for social and business interaction, thereby increasing the vitality and viability of the town, with positive benefits for all. Funding for the initiative was secured through the Department for

Rural and Community Development under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme. If the pilot initiative is successful, consideration can be given at a later stage to rollout of the scheme to other locations, subject to a suitable funding stream being identified. Dulux Paints has kindly agreed to sponsor an appropriate colour design solution for those property owners who wish to paint their buildings under the scheme

Mayor of Tralee, Cllr Terry O'Brien welcomed the initiative as a boost for the town centre: 'This is a great scheme which will be piloted on Castle Street and it has real potential. Kerry County Council wants to encourage retail innovation, creativity, vitality and recognises the role shopfronts, signs and advertising can have on the character of a street.



'This initiative, combined with the Business Incentive Scheme which was launched in 2019, will encourage and support property owners to regenerate and revitalise their premises and create a vibrancy to the town centre as a location for economic and social interaction,' he said. 'I would urge eligible property owners to get in touch with the

Tralee Municipal District Office to get involved or to obtain more information,' said Cllr O'Brien.

The ten award categories along with the overall title of the 'Press Photographer of the Year' 2021 will be introduced by some familiar faces from the world of entertainment, literature, politics, health, media and sport. The awards, which will be opened by Miriam O'Callaghan and Crispin Rodwell, President of the Press Photographers Association of Ireland, will include an address by Minister for Tourism Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht and Media Catherine Martin TD. The first category, Daily Life and People, which includes a broad variety of images of Irish society will be introduced by Professor Luke O'Neill, Professor of Biochemistry, Trinity College Dublin. Introducing the next category, Sports Non-Action, featuring striking sporting images of the year gone, is former Leinster and Ireland rugby star Jamie Heaslip. The third category, Arts and Entertainment, will be welcomed by international star of the small and big screen Gabriel Byrne. The politics category, featuring images of a year of government spotlight like no other, will be led by another globally recognised Irish actor Liam Cunningham. The fifth category, Sports Action, which is packed with shots of active sporting moments, will begin with a message from Leitrim senior county hurler Zak Moradi. Reportage, the category which involves photographers submitting picture essays of a chosen subject, will begin with an introduction from Dr. Marian Keyes, Senior Executive Librarian, dlr LexIcon. The seventh category and, without doubt, one of the most striking is Nature and the Environment, which will be introduced by Irish novelist Joseph O'Connor. The Multimedia category, which recognises excellence in the use of video, will begin with an introduction by Editor in Chief for US Glamour Magazine, Samantha Barry. Containing striking and carefully crafted images the Portrait category will be introduced by Irish actor, comedian and writer Pat Shortt. The final category, News, will be introduced by Irish CNN reporter Donie O'Sullivan. Finally, the overall award of the 'Press Photographer of the Year' will be led by Pulitzer prize-winning author and former US Ambassador to the United Nations Samantha Power.

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
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€50 MILLION TO CLEAR LOCAL IMPROVEMENT SCHEME LIST

A Kerry County Councillor has claimed that it will cost €50 million to clear the backlog in the Local Improvement Scheme list in the county. Speaking at this months meeting of the Local Authority, Councillor Michael Cahill called on the Council to publish details of the number of roads on the list, the number of schemes that were carried out in 2020 and the approximate length of time it will take to complete the priority list based on the current level of funding.

"If we are to receive the same allocation each year as that which we were allocated in 2020 (€666,792) that allowed for only a mere 10 roads to be surface dressed, it will take almost €50 million and 73 years to clear the backlog" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"This is a totally ridiculous and hopeless situation for the hundreds of applicants on the waiting list" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"The funding for this important scheme which was abolished following the crash, for a 10 year period, needs to be substantially increased as a matter of extreme urgency." "There are thousands of households being forced to pay the Local Property Tax while receiving absolutely no services whatsoever in return



and this is morally wrong and needs to be addressed" stated the Fianna Fail man.

Meanwhile Councillor Cahill also said that the 'Hardship and Emergency Scheme' must be reintroduced this year. "I am aware of a number of roads where there are people with serious medical conditions living and where Doctors and Nurses are finding it increasingly difficult to access due to the deteriorating condition of the road. We have to prioritise these roads for funding" added Mr Cahill.

It was agreed following a proposal from Councillor Cahill to write and seek an urgent meeting with the Minister.

Responding to Councillor Cahill at the February County Council meeting, Charlie O Sullivan, Director of Roads and Transportation in Kerry said: "A total of 715 applications were placed on the Local Improvement List for Co. Kerry following a validation and prioritisation exercise, the results of which were notified to the members in February 2020. A further 17 schemes were categorised as Community LIS schemes as part of the same exercise. Funding of €666,792.07 was received from the Department of Rural and Community Development for the completion of Local Improvement Schemes in 2020. This funding facilitated the completion of 10 schemes from the LIS Priority List: 9 from the Main Priority List and 1 from the Community List. The number of schemes to be delivered in 2021 is contingent on the level of funding that may be provided, by the Department, this year, and having regard to any restrictions on works programmes, as a consequence of directions by Government on controlling the spread of Covid-19."

Ireland returning to a two and two bit banking system following Ulster Bank exit - Kelleher



"Ireland is now effectively a banking duopoly," says Fianna Fáil MEP, and member of the Economic and Monetary Affairs Committee, Billy Kelleher.

Kelleher was commenting ahead of the NatWest announcement confirming that Ulster Bank would cease its operations in the Republic.

"This is a heart breaking day for the thousands of loyal Ulster Bank staff around the country. Nearly 3000 people are now facing into a very uncertain future following this decision, in what is already a period marred by uncertainty. "Fundamentally, it returns Ireland to a two and two bit banking system, comprised of Pillar Banks, AIB and Bank of Ireland, with Permanent TSB and KBC lagging behind. This is a huge blow to the competitiveness of the Irish banking market and ultimately to Irish consumers. We need strong and healthy competition in our banking sector to continue to drive innovation and lower costs.

"For a growing economy like Ireland, this could have dangerous repercussions for SMEs and mortgage holders. Even before this expected announcement, the Irish lending market was structurally weak. With the loss of one of the big players, consumers will have even less choice and will end up paying more.

"This is yet another blow to the economy. At this stage, I feel the Government must invest in a fully independent analysis of the Irish banking system, and in particular the credit market for SMEs and mortgage holders. The stability of our economy depends on a functioning banking system.

"At a European level, the completion of the Banking Union and the creation of a Single Market for Mortgages has never been more important. We must make it viable and attractive for non-Irish banks to enter the Irish market. This is the only way we can avoid increasing costs for consumers and damage to our economy," concluded Kelleher.



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Leaving Certs would do well to apply for both the written exam and SEC-Accredited Grades. Then do your best for the next three months



With definite information now at their disposal, Leaving Cert candidates should consider their strategy for the run into the exams. Exam students will return to school on Monday, 1st March and benefit from three months of inperson teaching. The mental health benefits of normal schooling are considerable. There are also huge educational advantages for students in having the guidance and advice of their teachers at this time.

From Monday, 8th March, students can sign up online for the traditional exam, the SEC-Accredited grades or both via the Candidate Self Service Portal. By applying for both options students have a lot to gain and absolutely nothing to lose as the State Examinations Commission (SEC) has, in effect, provided every Leaving Cert candidate with not one, but three methods of having their achievement measured at the end of their post-primary education – a traditional leaving Cert, the SEC-Accredited Grades or a hybrid system of combining both methods, whichever yields the best results.

So, students have the best of all worlds. They should apply for the SEC-Accredited grades and also for the traditional Leaving Cert exam. Students can opt into these processes on a subject-by-subject basis. Students will be awarded a SEC-Accredited grade in each subject they apply for based on their previous work and teacher's assessment. In addition, they will achieve a grade in each subject they sit for in the traditional Leaving Cert exam. The icing on the cake is that the student will ultimately be awarded the higher grade in each subject across both options.

The traditional Leaving Cert exam begins on 9th June, which allows students three months of focussed study. The timetable for the written

exams is available at www.examinations.ie. For those taking the traditional Leaving Cert, oral exams will be held during the Easter holidays or shortly after. Coursework will also proceed in the relevant subjects. Additional time will be provided by the SEC for completion of this work. In some subjects, the holding of practical exams may not be possible given public health considerations. Details of revised schedules will be issued to schools in the coming weeks.

Modifications have already been introduced in the exam papers for each subject to compensate for the disruptions already experienced. Students will be offered a greater choice of questions. Further concessions may be provided by the SEC due to school closures in January and February. All of these arrangements will be finalised as early as possible.

National standardisation will take place for both the traditional exam results and SEC-Accredited grades. Guidelines will be provided for teachers as to how best to assess their students for SEC-Accredited grades. Similar to last year, teachers' SEC-Accredited grades will be subject to a form of in-school alignment to ensure fairness among students and the Principal will sign off. Schools will not rank their own students in order of merit this year. Each school's results will go through a process of national standardisation by the SEC. This process will not include a school's historical performance in the Leaving Cert, so-called 'school profiling' which caused major controversy in 2020. School profiling was withdrawn from the standardisation process at the eleventhhour last year because of concerns that it would downgrade results for high achieving pupils in schools in disadvantaged areas. The oral and coursework components of the exams will not form part of the SEC-Accredited Grades process.

Tenders are being sought from organisation with the required expertise to assist with the standardisation, though it will not be the same contractor as last year. Considering the serious mistakes made by non-national psychometric contractors last year, I would prefer the computer algorithm to be designed by the National Educational Psychological Service (NEPS) or by a specialist task force of Psychologists from the Psychology Departments of our own Irish third level colleges. Irish expertise in this area is as good as you'll get.

ISSU Welcomes and Supports Decision on State Examinations

The Irish Second-Level Students' Union (ISSU) welcomes and supports the announcement by Minister for Education Norma Foley that Leaving Certificate 2021 students will have the option to receive SEC accredited grades, written exams, or both. We also welcome the clarity that has been provided to Junior Cycle students.

Since the beginning of the state exams negotiations, the ISSU has consistently called for Clarity, Choice and Compassion for students. The ISSU believes that these elements have now been taken into account by the Department and other education stakeholders in the provisions for the 2021 Leaving Certificate.

ISSU Education Officer, Alicia O'Sullivan, today said: "We are delighted that students have finally received clarity about their state exams. We are also proud that we have delivered choice for students. As a stakeholder, we at the ISSU have brought pragmatic and realistic proposals to



the table, many of which are evident in today's announcement. The student voice has been heard in these negotiations, and we will continue to work to ensure that is always the case".

The ISSU does, however, regret that students who opt-in to receive calculated grades will not receive them before the written examinations. Speaking about this, ISSU President, Reuban Murray stated:

"We had presented proposals and timelines to the Advisory Group and the State Exams Commission in an effort to provide these results to students before the written exams, however it became apparent that this would be an impossible task. The ISSU will never advocate for unrealistic solutions that would give our members false hope. We needed to find a real solution and this IS a real solution - this is what students have asked for and the Department and Minister Foley have heard the student voice."

"After having advocated for clarity, choice, and compassion, we welcome this announcement. Being offered the choice between calculated grading and sitting the exams is something which most students wanted, and we are happy that this has been delivered", St. Brendan's College, Killarney Student, Kacper Bogalecki and Kerry Regional Officer for the Irish Second-Level Students' Union (ISSU) said.

"THE END IS TRULY IN SIGHT"

- AN TAOISEACH MICHEÁL MARTIN

Following a Cabinet meeting this week, An Taoiseach Michael Martin, TD announced plans to extend Level 5 Covid-19 restrictions until 5 April with the exception of schools of which, the phased return will get under way next Monday, 1 March. The Taoiseach made the announcement at Government Buildings on Tuesday evening.

In his address, Micheál Martin acknowledged the difficulties the country faces with the extension of the Level 5 restrictions but he said "we will get through this, we just need to stay focused and get through these next few months safely together".

Speaking about the hardship that the situation is taking on mental health and wellbeing, he acknowledged the devastation the pandemic has brought to so many businesses and livelihoods, saying "but I also know that the end is now truly in sight".

Speaking about the vaccine rollout An Taoiseach said that by the end of March, 1.25 million doses will have been administered.

He also told the country that depending on vaccines arriving as scheduled, they will administer on average, more than one million

doses per month during April, May and June.

It is hoped that by the end of April, up to 40% of people over 18 years of age will have had their first dose - by the end of May, up to 64% will have had their first dose.

By the end of June, he said that up to 82% of adults who can be vaccinated will have received at least one dose and 55%-60% will be fully vaccinated.

Decreasing hospitalisations

We must reduce the pressure on our health system and frontline workers. The government has today decided to facilitate the safe return of in-school education and childcare services on a cautious and phased basis during March and April.

This will be alongside the scaling up of the vaccination programme in line with supply, ensuring that all vaccine doses are administered to target groups as soon as possible.



THE CURRENT PUBLIC HEALTH RESTRICTIONS WILL REMAIN IN PLACE UNTIL 5 APRIL 2021, WHEN A FURTHER REVIEW WILL BE CONDUCTED.

Measures to support business and those unable to work due to the pandemic will be extended further.

The impact of these restrictions on the economic, physical and mental well-being of our communities is considerable. An additional €10 million in funding will be made available to meet the increase for mental health services, and a further top-up of €10 million will be made available to enable critical services to continue being delivered to vulnerable groups.

The revised plan for managing the virus – COVID-19 Resilience and Recovery 2021: The Path Ahead – sets out how in-school education and childcare services will be reinstated in a phased manner from 1 March, with staggered return throughout March to be concluded after the Easter break on 12 April.

The decision to extend Level 5 restrictions is difficult and will have considerable impact on all parts of our economy and society. However, we continue to have an unacceptably high level of disease in the community, so we must continue to suppress the disease. The higher transmissibility of new variants requires all other restrictions to remain in place while these initial services reopen.

This cautious, measured approach is being taken in order to:

Make steady progress, starting with childcare and schools, while avoiding a further wave of disease and re-imposition of restrictions

protect the most vulnerable by an efficient rollout of the vaccination programme

remain vigilant and agile regarding the uncertainties in the face of new variants and to capitalise on emerging evidence on available vaccines

lay the foundations for the full recovery of social life, public services and the economy

If the transmission of the virus reaches acceptable levels, the vaccination programme progresses as planned and public health advice allows, further options that will be considered from **5 April are:**

Some easing of restrictions on outdoor activities and meetings beyond 1 other household

Consideration of extending the current 5km limit

Staggered start of easing of other areas of restriction with a focus on outdoor activities including sport and some areas of construction

Any further easing of restrictions after 5 April will need a further three to four week period to allow for assessment of the impact of changes.

The requirement to work from home will continue throughout this period, unless work is an essential health, social care or other essential service or activity that cannot be done from home.

The government's community support and well-being programmes will continue and employment and business supports will be extended, many of them to June.

The government is committed to developing a clear roadmap for a return of activities in the hardest hit sectors including tourism, culture and sport.

Local Communities and Local Delivery

a further Stability Fund for Community and Voluntary Organisations top-up of €10 million will be made available to enable continuity of critical service delivery to vulnerable groups

Wellbeing and Mental Health

auxiliary mental health supports will continue to be offered remotely to ensure those in isolation can access assistance when needed. An additional €10 million in funding will be made available to meet the increase in demand being experienced.

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

COMPASSION

Compassion is an essential component of human existence. If we are to accept our humanness then we need to develop compassion. What do we mean exactly by compassion and where does it originate. Compassion can be understood as the emotional response when we perceive suffering, and it can involve an authentic desire to help. It literally means to suffer together. The latest research findings from a number of scientists has shown that our brains are "wired up to respond to others' suffering". Nancy Eisenberg, is a leading academic in the field of Compassion who has published widely and has found that compassion is part of our basic human nature. This means that our temperament or what we what we are born with, the way we self-regulate our emotions and what we experience from our parents in their parenting practices all contribute to the way we develop our empathy, compassion and helping behaviour. In other words we are born with empathy for others, the recognition that if we see upset in others we will respond with kindness and the concept compassion takes that further by wanting to help alleviate the suffering and pain in the other.

The Dalai Lama captures this beautifully when he says "So long as we are human we need compassion. Compassion brings inner peace and whatever else is going on, that peace of mind allows us to see the whole picture more clearly. So, in our education we need lessons about developing warm-heartedness and finding inner peace." We all understand compassion for others, but an essential ingredient for increased mental health is compassion for self. In the same way we recognise someone else's suffering and we want to respond by making it better, the next level is to have compassion for ourselves, to recognise our own pain and to understand our own humanness. A question that is very useful to ask ourselves is if someone else told us this story, the story about being angry or hurt or disappointed would we have compassion for them? Then why not for ourselves? A good question indeed.

Some of the ways to develop compassion for oneself are to literally feel warm to oneself rather than hurting oneself with self-criticism. Remembering the common humanity which means we acknowledge our suffering and personal failure is part of the shared human experience. And lastly, developing self-compassion requires that we take a balanced approach to our negative thoughts without trying to suppress or deny them. The key here is balanced, so if we do have a negative thought about ourselves, we develop the habit to balance it with a forgiving thought, a more compassionate one. Remembering that it is in our mind that we can be developing the more compassionate thoughts.

Prevent Aging Eyes Never too early to start



The skin around your eyes ages 5 to 10 years faster than the rest of your face therefore it needs special attention. 

On Wednesday 17 February, Rowing Ireland held its reconvened AGM for 2020 remotely via Zoom to consider the Domestic Events Calendar and Irish Rowing Championships for 2021. The AGM was held together with an EGM to discuss certain changes to the rules of competitive rowing for 2021 should racing return, as lockdown continues to keep rowing clubs closed. Because all GAA activities are discontinued at the moment any claim for injury is unlikely to be entertained by the Player Injury Fund Administrators if sustained during personal training activity or during other training before clubs are given the green light to resume activity by GAA Headquarters. Until then all players must understand that they participate in training activity at their own risk.

2. Heretofore the Player Injury Fund could pay injured players €300 per week for 26 weeks in respect of Loss of Wages. All clubs have now been notified by GAA Headquarters that for the moment and the immediate future Loss of Wages Claims WILL NOT be paid.

LEVEL 5 LOCKDOWN

CLUB SPECIFIC GUIDELINES

for activities post Dec 31st

In level 5 and under the current restrictions in the North, individual training only is permitted – neither adult nor underage teams may train collectively.

GAA club grounds must stay closed.

Club games are not permitted Dressing rooms, showers and all other indoor training facilities should remain closed for club activities.

Club Gyms must remain closed until further notice. No indoor meetings can be held.

All officer Training must be delivered online. Outdoor coaching education courses are not permitted. No organised indoor gatherings can take place under the current restrictions.

Commercial use of indoor halls (for example by state bodies – e.g. HSE/Schools is permitted where agreement was in place prior to March and relevant insurance are in place. No outdoor gatherings on GAA property are permitted.

Exception: Walkways may stay open for use by the community with social distancing in place.

No great controversies or grounds for complaint this year, in fairness. Kerry were hoping for lone nomination David Clifford to get one, considering that we won the National League and the Championship was knockout, but in fairness it wasn't exactly a full-blooded League either. To be honest I don't see grounds for complaint. After all, Cork beat us in the Championship and they have no All Star either. Munster champions Tipperary have just the one - I'm delighted for Conor Sweeney. Most people may have forgotten it now, but it was his late and defiant super-score against Limerick



that set up Tipperary's history-making season in a history-making jersey.

Off hand, I personally would make one change. I'd have Eoghan McLaughlin of Mayo ahead of Eoin Murchan at wing back, and that's no dig at Murchan. In fairness, any Kerry supporters who have forgotten how dangerous Eoin Murchan can be from the half back line have very short memories indeed! But Mayo brought in a lot of impressive young players this year and McLaughlin was one who showed absolutely top quality. Tommy Conroy came in for high praise in the forwards, and he is unquestionably a talented young player as well, but there is no one on that team that I'd drop for him.

Dublin won nine All Stars, the same as Kerry won in 1981 and Dublin won in 1977. Curiously enough, 2020 All Star midfielder James McCarthy's father John was on that Dublin team but didn't win an All Star that year, while Denis Ogie Moran and Seán Walsh won All Stars in 1981 but sons David and Tommy didn't in 1921! Just one of those quirks of football fate.

A few people are saying that Cluxton is very unlucky with All Stars. After all, he only has six of them. Six. The crathur. Look, Galligan was always a lock this year. Like Sweeney's iconic score, his winner in that fate-defying comeback against Monaghan might have been washed from the memory in 'normal' years as the big guns re-assert themselves through the back door, but I'm glad it wasn't.

It's a funny thing, and a sign maybe of where football is at, but I suspect that Tipperary and Cavan will remember the football of 2020 a lot longer than All Ireland winners Dublin will! Mar a deireann an seanfhocail, an rud is annamh is iontach....

No complaints about the hurling, either. Austin Gleeson would certainly have made my team. I honestly thought he was excellent this year, and he would have got my nod just ahead of Aaron Gillane. Limerick's Will O'Donoghue is another I thought would have certainly made it but on reflection, I think they may have been right in going for Barron.

The Players of the Year Awards are very straight forward as well. I'd say Hegarty and Mullan were absolutely locked in early on. Cody was always going to be the favourite in a year where no one player was that far above his fellows. And as for Senior Footballer of the Year? I would honestly have argued against none of them, but I honestly believe they picked the best player of the three nominees. Fenton rarely looks spectacular, but he is just constantly in effective motion and his decision-making is among the best I have seen. That's the key trait of this Dublin team to me - they see every pass, they make every tackle, they execute every single score. And they have a couple of players - McCarthy, Fenton, Kilkenny, and O'Callaghan especially - who are up there with anyone who played the game.

Fenton (whose father won three O'Donoghue Cups with Spa and whose uncle Denis remains one of the best administrators Spa or East Kerry ever had) joins just a handful of players to win Footballer of the Year more than once in all it's various guises. Meath's Trevor Giles, Kerry's Pat Spillane, Dublin's Jimmy Keaveney and Down's James McCartan are the others to win it twice. The undisputed greatest of them all, though, is Kerry's Jack O'Shea, Footballer of the Year a whopping four times. Fenton revealed last Sunday how delighted he was to get a congratulatory text from O'Shea. Lovely touch by two of the greatest midfielders of all time, it

says something about the quality of both men.

KERRY GAA APPOINT PAT FALVEY

There have been strong indications from Kerry GAA in recent weeks of additions to the Kerry footballers' backroom team, with Paul Galvin probably the most high profile person to decline a role at this time.

However, last Sunday Kerry GAA revealed a huge addition with the announcement of Pat Falvey as Kerry's incoming performance coach. Pat hardly needs introduction to anyone reading this as one of Ireland's most famous mountaineers and explorers. Among his more famous exploits are being the first man to complete the Seven Summits Challenge (the highest mountains on each of the seven continents, including Everest from two sides) twice, leading the Everest expedition that saw Dr. Clare O'Leary become the first Irishwoman to conquer the world's highest mountain, and climbing the likes of Kilimaniaro, Denali, Aconcagua, walking to the South Pole, and many more of the world's most impressive peaks and terrains.

Much more important for the Kerry footballers, though, is Pat's widely regarded ability to communicate the ability to embrace and overcome such challenges. Pat has long been recognised, not just for his ability to motivate people, but for his more impressive ability to direct that motivation and channel it for the team. I'd consider Pat Falvey an important asset in any project.

He's the biggest name addition, but Kerry have quietly added two big guns under the radar as well. Gavin Rackard was the performance nutritionist with Connaught Rugby while Kevin Beasley was very highly rated (including by me, for the little that should be worth) as Kerry's nutritionist under Eamonn Fitzmaurice.

We all know that Kerry aren't far away at all; and we got real affirmation of that in 2019. Pat Falvey will possibly be able to appreciate my somewhat clumsy metaphor when I say that this close to the summit, the small incremental steps are the crucial ones - and these appointments of proven quality feel like great incremental steps to me.

GAA CONGRESS

GAA Congress takes place online this weekend. A total of 10 of the 47 motions, dealing with the format of the All Ireland Football Championship for this year and beyond, have been moved back to later in the year in order to allow for clarity in Government guidelines and hopefully in order to allow these important motions to be debated in person rather than online. That debate will centre around the two main proposals for the Football Championship going forward, i.e. a league based system with separate provincial championships or retaining the current province-based structure, except with each new 'province' to have 8 teams.

There are motions, mostly in regard to playing rules, on this year's Congress.

Motion 20 would allow referees to award a penalty if a clear goal-scoring opportunity is denied by a cynical foul. In football, the

offender's punishment would be a black card; in hurling a referee will now be able to impose a sin-bin for such an offence.

There is a proposal to introduce a TMO, similar to that in rugby, to review potential gamechanging decisions in big games. I'm not convinced of the merits here – rugby is a stop/start game by design, whereas GAA is at least meant to flow.

Motion 6 will allow the return to collective training for inter-county training to be set by Central Council, rather than time-tabled on an annual basis. Prior to the lockdown, it was the most ignored rule in the book anyway, to be blunt about it.

There is a motion to disallow joint captains for trophy presentations.

Motion 12 wants All-Ireland finals to be played on or before the 29th Sunday in the year and provincial championships not allowed to proceed until the third Sunday in May. I appreciate the logic of set rules but I think 2021, of all years, also demonstrates the necessity for some leeway.

Motion 13: The maximum number of clubs allowed in an intermediate and senior county championship to be set at 16.

Motion 23 would see team officials banned from entering the pitch unless the referee allows it for medical treatment of a player – i.e. no more maor foirne. There have been too many controversies for me; I'm in favour of this one.

Motion 25 would allow games to be started and now completed with 13 players. This should be a shoe-in as a recognition of rural depopulation. Motion 27: Where a player seeks to distract an opponent taking a dead ball kick or puck, the ball can be moved 13 metres forward. I'm surprised it isn't already in the rulebook and would welcome it.

NADIA BRINGING THE POWER

Irish Athletes have been working hard to keep their season alive in the light of tough circumstances, especially after the understandable cancellation of the Indoor Track and Field Championships, which had been due to take place last week.

However, one athlete at least is quietly but powerfully making waves in her chosen discipline. Nadia Power opened the year by setting a new Irish record at the Vienna Indoor International. Ciara Neville won the 60m sprint in her first race for almost a year. But that was just a marker laid down. She followed that up with first place in an IFOM Gent Meeting in Belgium. Last week, the Dublin City Harriers athlete smashed that record again, bringing it down to 2.00:98 while taking third place.

The form of the likes of Ciara Neville, who won the 60m sprint in her first outing for almost a year, or Phil Healy, has been hugely encouraging, and we all should know and appreciate the huge effort the likes of Jordan Lee are putting into this Olympic year.

But right now, Irish eyes are focussed on the 2019 Bronze medallist from Dublin who is currently smashing records on every outing....

and doing it with a smile on her face.

Here's a bit of one from left field, to say the least, but it's very relevant to athletics and I find it fascinating. Nike's Vaporfly road shoes have, quite simply shattered all records on their introduction. Elite athletes and ordinary runners alike are having phenomenal results when they race in these new high tech shoes. I'm not even going to try and understand the science behind it; my limited understanding is that runners expend an average of 4% less energy to maintain a running pace (including peak speed). This has been confirmed by multiple and reputable tests; it's not an advertising slogan. The carbon fibre plate and the special midsole foam reduce the impact energy of your foot on the ground, making it easier for you to do. It has more 'give' in landing but it returns instantly to its shape, making less work for your foot. You use your toes and bend your knees less in Vaporflys - again, that's the science, not slogans.

Look, who am I kidding here? I have no clue how it works. But what I do know is that it has opened up a debate that has been on the horizon in sports, and ultimately all human endeavour, for several decades now.

The whole reason I mention any of this is because running shoes seems to be a place where the expansion of scientific technology and the biological limits of human endeavour have to reach an accommodation. At what stage is about the equipment rather than the person?

The release of Nike's improvement on the Vaporfly, called the Viperfly, has been temporarily shelved. The reason? Because of fears that ordinary runners could match or surpass the times set by Usain Bolt.

Isn't that exactly why you would buy this kind of running gear? I imagine that this is an advertising ploy by Nike and you will find Viperflys flooding the market at the onset of the Tokyo Olympics. But I'd be fairly sure that this is a debate that's going to define sport for the next generation; we might want to give it a bit of thought before everybody picks sides. I'll tell you right now where I stand. I don't run

competitively (I barely amble at an amateur level!) but if I come across a pair of Viperflys

that I can afford, I'm going for it. I'd love to try these things.

LEAGUE OF IRELAND TEAMS

Participating teams in the League of Ireland for 2021 have been decided, with Limerick outfit Treaty FC joining the League as the tenth team in the First Division (the LOI is composed of twenty teams in two Divisions, a Premier and First). Limerick FC are effectively the remainder of Limerick FC, who were a great club and gave it a great shot but unfortunately just couldn't afford it financially and got almost no support from the FAI – a very old story, sadly, in LOI.

I like the look of Treaty United and I always liked the Limerick teams, tough out but honest. They pipped Shamrock Rovers B (I wouldn't be comfortable with the top clubs having their own feeder teams in the League; to me it would stunt growth and foster elitism) and a so-called 'Dublin County' (who certainly did not look like a long-term entity or had a lot of Dublin backing) to having their registration to be accepted.

IRISH JOCKEY WINS BIG IN SAUDI ARABIA

I wouldn't be great for the horse-racing, to tell ye the truth. Don't mind tips on tomorrow's horses; I'm the kind of punter who could bet on yesterday's races and still manage to get them wrong. Other lads just have the knack with horses.

Take young David Egan from Kildare, just 22 years old. I think it might be fair to say that David has the knack. David just won the richest horse race in the world.

Last weekend David was the jockey on Mishriff in the Saudi Cup in Saudi Arabia. Mishriff, owned by local boy Prince Faisal, who apparently also has the knack, wasn't favourite for the race, even though he (possibly she? I'm not sure) won the French Derby and came second in the Saudi Derby. The favourites were the American pair of Charlatan and Knick's Go. Mishriff stayed behind the big two and, after Charlatan saw off his main rival, David coolly judged it perfectly to chase down the leader and go in front with impeccable timing.

My favourite quote in the whole thing comes from Mishriff's outstanding trainer, John Gosden. Talking about Mishriff's 2020, he came out with this gem, "...the horse had a perfect year bar getting stuck in a bottomless bog at Ascot, which is really specialist ground..."

Yes, on days when you win a \$20 million race, it's the memories of bottomless bogs in Ascot are the memories that will come back to haunt you!

TENNIS

Unfortunately, the Australian Open attracted more headlines for it's covid protocols and protests and an occasional breach of them. That was a bit unfair – while certain behaviour did need to be called out, the vast majority of participants behaved impeccably. Now, I saw no game live. I watched them online with delayed viewing, which meant that I could pick and choose the games I watched and I always knew that I was in for a sporting spectacle. Even so....

Naomi Osaka, a power player who is able to go toe to toe with Serena and also one of the few who can match her for precision, is one of the most exciting players I have seen in a long time. I am a colossal admirer of both the Williams sisters – they helped redefine womens' sports for me and did it with real grace and style, plus a rare and welcome flash of necessary truculence when called for – I still applaud it; this is a necessary change. To be blunt on this side topic, the idea that men should get to define 'lady-like' was outdated around the same thing as the penny farthing. But I digress....

Osaka's fourth round game against 15th seed Muguruza was incredible. At 4-6, 6-4, Osaki was down 5-3 and 40-15 in the final set in the game. Two match points. And even if by some miracle you survive those, you basically have to win almost every single point from here on in against a brilliant player. It's a hot day. You started well, but she sent every stinger back with interest and somehow; pre-match predictions that she would begin to buckle were all wrong. She's relishing this, and the



crowd are getting behind the underdog. You've played an hour and a half of gruelling intensity. You aren't showing it, but you can feel that slight burn at the back of your legs and in the shoulders that's your body saying "starting to feel this, boss". Muguruza is waiting to break your serve just once more and wrap it up.....

Osaki swatted away two match points like irritants and was suddenly as imperious as Venus herself in the early days, or Steffi in her early twenties. I never saw Martina play; they tell that she set the template. Osaki simply never lost again. Muguruza bowed out with her head very high – there is no villain in that true story, by the way. Fantastic game.

The mens' games threw up two absolute classics as well. Novak Djokovic, who bruised

his abdomen early in the tournament, beat Alexander Zverev by 6-7 (6), 6-2, 6-4, 7-6 (6). For those who don't understand the scoring, let me explain. It's quite acceptable to whistle softly between your teeth in amazement now. Djokovic went on to win the title from there. There was an even bigger scalp, though, 22 year old Stefanos Tsitsipas coming back from two sets down to take out none other than Rafael Nadal earlier on (twenty minutes of highlights, which I find never really capture the gruelling intensity of a match like that, was all I could find). Tsitsipas has now beaten all of the dominant big three of Nadal, Djokovic, and Federer - along with Andy Murray, they have basically shared the no. 1 slot since 2004. Tennis would certainly seem to have a new queen. Does it perhaps have a new crown prince?

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


Welcome back dear reader, last week we learned that in order to connect with God we must acknowledge that we are sinners and that we need a Saviour. 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Herbaceous Pernnials

What we mean when we call a plant an Herbaceous Perennial is that in most of them, the stems are soft, succulent and green as opposed to being brown and woody. With most Herbaceous Perennial they will sprout growth from ground level in spring and will grow and flower right through the summer and into the autumn. With most Herbaceous Perennials in late autumn and early winter, they start to look a bit ragged. But depending on the severity of the winter some will hold on until the first real cold snap. The maintenance for most Herbaceous Perennials isn't a lot really. During late autumn and early winter, cut the majority of them down to ground level and mulch over with some compost. Some Herbaceous Perennials such as Lupins and semi hardy Fuschias will have woody stems because of the milder climate here so when pruning back cut right back to just a couple of inches above ground level. Herbaceous Perennials are a valuable plant in the garden for a number of reasons. Because of the short length of time it takes them to grow to the maximum height and spread.

When planting a Herbaceous border, always remember to plant the taller ones to the back or middle and the smaller growing ones to the front. When choosing your plants pick one plant tha you can repeatedly plant in the border to create a sense of continuity to the planting scheme. Herbaceous Pernnials flower from April until October/ November so you have a wide range of flowering times and colour to choose from. The secret to having a good flowering Herbaceous Border is every fdew years in the winter to lif and divide the plants that are suitable for this.




