
Kerry Stars Volunteers have been celebrated, Lee Strand makes a generous donation to local schools and a Killarney teenager has released his debut



In addition, free recipe books will be available on the night (on a first come, first served basis), ensuring that participants leave with practical resources to support their journey towards healthier living.


HeartBeat Killarney Kerry emphasises that meetings are free to attend and open to all, offering an inclusive space for anyone interested in heart health and wellbeing.



PIGS LANE earns spot in global bar guide

ig's Lane in Killarney has become one of the first Irish venues to be recognised by The Pinnacle Guide – described as the "Michelin guide for bars." The cocktail bar, part of the O'Donoghue Ring Collection, has been awarded a coveted 1 PIN status, placing it among just 61 bars worldwide named in the latest listings announced on 24 September. Ireland features in the guide for the first time this year.

Using a global rating system, The Pinnacle Guide awards 1 PIN for "excellent," 2 PINS for "outstanding," and 3 PINS for "exceptional" bars.

The honour follows a string of recent accolades for Pig's Lane, including Best Designed Bar of the Year at the 2025 Bar of the Year Awards, where it also took bronze in the Cocktail Bar category.

Opened in October 2023 as Killarney's first subterranean cocktail bar, Pig's Lane has gained attention for its creative cocktails, curated wine list, and hidden whiskey parlour, alongside live music and events.

Managing director Gemma Ring said: "To be recognised alongside such incredible bars around the world is incredibly inspiring. This achievement is a celebration of our entire team."

Pig's Lane takes its name from the historic laneway that once ran from College Street to Railway Road in the early 1800s.



What a Difference the Meitheal Makes

Before-and-after photographs highlight the remarkable transformation carried out by Mountain Meitheal volunteers in a section of woodland near Dundag Bay.

The group will soon return to Killarney National Park to continue their crucial battle against the invasive Rhododendron ponticum. Their first outing of the new season is scheduled for Sunday, October 5th, beginning at 9:00am, with volunteers gathering at the Dundag car park.

This session will focus on clearing rhododendron plants, a vital step in giving native woodland the chance to recover and regenerate naturally. Left unchecked, the invasive shrub overwhelms the landscape, suppressing biodiversity and threatening the survival of native trees and plants. Organisers are calling for as many volunteers as possible, stressing that every extra pair of hands makes a real difference in slowing the spread of rhododendron and restoring balance to the park's ecosystem.

For those unable to join on Sunday October 5th, you can do so on Tuesday's mornings at the same location.


Draft integrated urban strategy for Killarney open for final public consultation

Kerry County Council is in the final stages of preparing the heritage-led Integrated Urban Strategy for Killarney, developed as part of the THRIVE Town Centre First Heritage Revival Scheme. This comprehensive strategy examines both the development needs and the future potential of Killarney town centre, with a focus on its historic and cultural setting; improved connections; and enhancing the streets and spaces in the town centre.

As part of this process, a number of heritage buildings, streets and public spaces in the town centre have been identified as having significant potential for regeneration. These assets present valuable opportunities not only for adaptive reuse, but also for conservation, public realm improvements, and new uses that can reduce vacancy and dereliction while enhancing the overall vibrancy and appeal of the town centre. The Killarney THRIVE project is co-funded by the Government of Ireland and the European Union through the ERDF Southern, Eastern and Midland Regional Programme 2021-2027.

Kerry County Council extends sincere thanks to all who have contributed to shaping the strategy through the public consultation process to-date. Speaking about the consultation, Jean Foley, Town Regeneration Officer with Kerry County Council said "This strategy represents an exciting time for Killarney. It builds on the town's rich heritage while setting out a vision for a more vibrant, inclusive, and resilient town centre. We're encouraging everyone in the community to share their views during this final phase of consultation. Your feedback will help ensure the strategy reflects the ambitions and needs of Killarney into the future."

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in Killarney



TRALEE GETS A CAKE, BUT WHERE IS THE BREAD?



Colleagues from Cork who arrived recently to cover sittings in Tralee were appalled at the state of the Ashe Street courthouse and can't understand why the county courthouse has not been done up in Kerry as in every county in the country.

Then came the announcement - under a heritage scheme for town buildings which is part EU funded, the Ashe Memorial Hall is to get seven million euro.

I saw the press releases coming in from some of our four Government TDs and for a moment I was confused. The Tralee courthouse is in Ashe Street, so the confusion was understandable. At long last, I thought. But no! The millions are going to a museum rather than a working building. Thousands who are not in a good place - all courts are stressful - have to use the filthy embarrassingly decrepit place. I include the well paid barristers, solicitors and judges in their expensive shoes. As well as the hacks and others.

Is this where we are now in Kerry? I am reminded of the Jeanie Johnston. A 15 million euro Tralee historical recreation project from the Spring era, which had to be bailed out by the rate payers and tax payers all over Kerry. It is sitting forlornly now on a quayside in Dublin. Pa Daly TD (SF) was the only public

representative brave enough to speak out this time. If this kind of money is in play - and clearly it was the four other Kerry TDs, all part of the Government, who secured the money which represented close to a tenth of the total funding nationally - why couldn't they do something for the courthouse "an essential service", Pa asked? The historic courthouse building would have been eligible for the heritage funding - if put forward.

"It is incredible to me that when an opportunity has presented itself to purchase additional space to expand the existing court building it has been completely overlooked," Pa said of the refusal to buy the An Post site to expand the courthouse in Ashe Street.

It is good to see museums looked after but surely after necessary infrastructure affecting the daily lives of people is addressed. There has been no huge campaign about the Ashe Memorial Hall or huge distress about its condition. In fact I heard very little of any kind of distress other than it needs space for an expanded collection which is easily addressed by opening a museum in Killarney, for instance. In contrast, there is a twenty year campaign for a proper courthouse.

We seem to have a bunch of Marie Antoinettes in the Dail, removed from reality and deaf to the bread and butter courthouse. I was particularly disappointed to see the fussy welcome "under embargo" by Michael Cahill for the funding for a museum when the Tralee court is crying out and the courthouse in his own town of Killorglin was closed and has never been replaced. Killorglin court now sits in Cahersiveen.

When it comes to our TDs, "let them eat cake!" springs to mind.

CABLE CAR ON MANGERTON BACK ON THE AGENDA AFTER 50 YEARS

A cable car for Mangerton is back on the agenda. The request to look at exploring cable cars is to be worked on by the council and by Failte Ireland after a motion put forward

by Independent councillor Charlie Farrelly of Castleisland.

Charlie told me he was inspired by a trip on the Dursey Island cable car this summer. From an economic as well as a tourist and environment point of view, a cable car makes sense, he said. In 1968 the OPW and Tourism agencies abandoned the cable car to the Devil's Punch Bowl after jarveys fearing the competition as well as An Taisce fearing for the wildness of the area opposed it.

The mile long Swiss style cable car to bring tourists up Mangerton got planning permission and the cost was to be 200,000 old pounds. The car would have needed 125,000 passengers a year to make it economically viable but would open up parts of Killarney not seen by many visitors, according to the proposal at the time.

"I believe as a tourist county and the capital of tourism we have some breathtaking locations to introduce a cable car," Charlie said.

Mangerton, Rossbeigh, Valentia Island and Ballybunion were suitable locations, he felt.

"It would be a huge attraction and money making venture and it would showcase the county.

He has asked that the studies and plans for Mangerton undertaken in the 1960s be looked at and reviewed.

The council has acknowledged the potential of the proposal and is to get support from Failte Ireland.

There is a new school of thought now which suggests cable cars could actually protect the environment and vulnerable landscapes while allowing them to be appreciated, Charlie said. Thousands of walkers now visit Mangerton Mountain each year; the area is no longer remote, and the mountain along with other locations is suffering terrible erosion as a result of the number of walkers. Similar environmental damage is occurring on dunes in seaside areas such as Rossbeigh. Michael Cahill looked for a cable car ten years ago but got no hearing. There is a change in attitude now by the authorities.

2025 IS A MAST YEAR

It will be a busy time in the Muckross nurseries. If you go down to the woods in Killarney or anywhere in Europe this year you will be crunching acorns under foot along with hawthorn and even walnuts depending on where you are. Eamonn Meskell of the NPWS has confirmed this is a mast year for the oak as well as other species - thousands of acorns are being collected to propagate in the nurseries in Muckross. It is "a massive mast" year for all fruits and seeds, Eamonn said.


"We will be harvesting many seeds again this year, Rowan, Ash, White thorn, Acorns, Hazel Alder, Birch, Yew etc etc.," he said. The nursery at Muckross has the capacity to produce 60,000 seedlings now. All native seeds harvested from the park. It is a great achievement.

Mast is the collective word for what happens every five years or so - trees build up reserves to produce enormous quantities of seeds. Mast in this sense comes from the Old English "maest" and is related to most. As in the year with the most acorns. Trees do produce seeds every year of

course and these are eaten by squirrels, mice and in Killarney the deer and the sheep.

In mast years there are enormous quantities allowing the trees a chance to propagate. One large oak can drop 10,000 acorns. Traditionally herders would fatten their pigs on the abundance of acorns in a mast year. So if you go down to the woods these days, don't be surprised to see pigs fattening...

Kerry House Prices Breach New Highs as Landlords Exit Market

The average price of a threebed semi-detached house in Kerry has risen by 4% in the past three months, bringing the typical property to €372,500, according to the latest REA Average House Price Index.

In Killarney, values increased by 2.5%, with the average home now topping €405,000 for the first time. Tralee saw the strongest growth, with prices climbing 6.2% to €340,000, and houses selling in as little as five weeks on average.

The survey highlights a striking trend across the county, with over 40% of recent sales linked to landlords leaving the market. This follows the Government's extension of rent pressure zone legislation, which has triggered a wave of investor sell-offs.

"There is a large increase in



landlords selling due to the change in recent rent pressure zones legislation," said Donal Culloty of REA Coyne and Culloty, Killarney.


The Index, which tracks the sale prices of standard three-bed semis nationwide, shows Kerry outperforming the national quarterly average rise of 1.6%.

The power of storytelling was at the heart of this year's Story Sanctuary Creative Writing Workshop, held in Anam House on August 28th for children aged 9 to 13. This year's workshop theme was emotions. Using cards showing different facial expressions, constructed by the children themselves from a set of cubes, the young writers were challenged to guide their protagonists through a shifting journey of feelings.

The results were really imaginative with stories ranging from a caterpillar's transformation into a butterfly, to an ordinary day ending in the surprise of Disneyland tickets. The workshop not only encouraged creativity but also helped participants explore the ways emotions shape both storytelling and real life.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL'S ARTS OFFICE - CILL RIALAIG RESIDENCY AWARD 2025

Kerry County Council's Arts Office is pleased to announce the successful recipients of the 2025 Cill Rialaig Residency Award. Many strong applications were received, and adjudicated upon by an independent, expert panel. This year's residency is awarded Artists Kathleen Hurley and Aoife Bambury.

The Cill Rialaig Project, in South Kerry, provides a retreat for artists and writers from Ireland and abroad. The Project was founded by Dr. Noelle Campbell Sharp and involved the redevelopment of the pre-famine village of Cill Rialaig as a retreat for artists, poets, writers, film makers and composers. Seven studios, a meeting house, a library and a utility house have been completed at the village.

More than 6,000 well known Irish and international artists have had residencies at Cill Rialaig, most often followed by successful exhibitions in their towns, cities and countries. Cill Rialaig welcomed a significant number of artists to Ballinskelligs in 2025.

Kerry County Council's Arts Office is delighted to have secured two cottages for two, oneweek residencies, taking place this September. Kathleen Hurley is a visual artist, her work is a continually evolving dialogue with the natural world, and our relationship to it. Kathleen loves experimenting with a diverse range of




materials from driftwood charcoal, oak gal link, bones and wings interspersed with Chinese paper, rice glue, paint, thread, and plastics. Many of the sculptural pieces combine found and natural objects, which become repurposed as organic hybrid artefacts. Rhythm and repetition are an important factor in her work; walking, breathing, movement the sea, birds flying, language, sewing all feature in her recent work.

Aoife Bambury is a contemporary visual artist and sculptor based in Kildare, but originally from Co. Kerry. Aoife is engaged in exploring the complex and often fraught relationship between humanity and the natural world. In her practice, she interweaves elements of nature with features of human-made, utilitarian

objects within her sculptures and prints. Her work is an ongoing investigation into how patterns and elements from the natural world influence, co-exist with, and are affected by human presence. Her current research focuses on the devastating impact of ash dieback on native trees in both her native Kerry and current home in Kildare. Witnessing this devastation has inspired a body of work documenting the present state of the ash.

The Cill Rialaig Residency offered by Kerry County Council is an important annual support to artists. From 2026, the residency opportunity will be open to Visual Artists, Musicians and Writers.

HSE South West Urges Parents to Book Your Baby's Free Immunisation in Cork and Kerry

HSE South West and local community health teams are inviting parents across Cork and Kerry to attend free RSV immunisation clinics open now through to the first week of October - a call to action for parents of babies born 1 March to 31 August 2025 to shield their infants against severe RSV infection before the winter season. The RSV immunisation is a highly effective and safe method of protecting vulnerable infants from severe illness, significantly reducing the risk of hospitalisation and admission to intensive care units.

Clinics are available in community health centres, GP practices and pharmacies across Cork and Kerry.

Appointment availability has been extended. While clinics were initially scheduled to conclude at the end of the month, services will now continue through to the first week of October, ensuring greater access for those who need it.

Protect your baby against RSV

Clinics supporting parents across Cork and Kerry will continue to operate for the next 3 weeks.

Parents of babies born 1 September 2025 to 28 February 2026 will be offered the immunisation before hospital discharge.

The RSV immunisation programme aims to protect vulnerable infants during their first winter months and safeguard vital paediatric services by reducing preventable admissions. Nirsevimab begins working immediately and provides up to 150 days of protection against RSV

Parents of babies born 1 March – 31 August 2025 can book a community clinic appointment at https://www2.hse.ie/conditions/rsv/immunisation/

Babies born 1 September 2025 – 28 February 2026 will receive the immunisation in their maternity hospital before discharge.

CALL UP FOR CILLIAN ON THE IRISH ROWING SQUAD

With the main summer rowing season concluded, an extended rowing season has brought some further exciting news to the lake shore in Muckross Rowing Club, where Junior 18 rower Cillian Leslie has been selected to represent Ireland in the Coupe de la Jeunesse Beach Sprint in Cadiz, Spain in October. The Coupe de la Jeunesse is a rowing federation of 16 European countries with annual Olympic rowing events for athletes in the Under 19 category. Since 1985, the Coupe has brought together Europe's best junior rowers with many Coupe athletes progressing to further international success at senior level. Ahead of the introduction of coastal beach sprint rowing at the Los Angeles Olympics in 2028, the fastpaced Beach Sprint event has recently been added to the annual programme of Coupe rowing competition. The Coupe Beach Sprint for 2025 will take place from 30th October to 2nd November in Cadiz on the southwestern Spanish coast

Cillian is the son of David and Melissa Leslie from Ballyhar. His selection to the squad of 16 Irish rowers for the Coupe Beach Sprints follows his participation in a national trial series which included a land based trial and two water based trials organised by Rowing Ireland. Cillian also makes a bit of history as the first Muckross and



Killarney rower to be selected to row for Ireland in the coastal branch of the sport. The Muckross club is enjoying a particularly successful year in 2025, with Cillian becoming the seventh Muckross rower selected for international competition this year. Most recently, Muckross U23 rower Caoimhe O'Sullivan placed fourth for Ireland as part of the Womens Eight crew at the European Rowing U23 Championships. At the Home International Regatta held in London in July, the club was also represented in the green jersey by Rachel Fuller, Daniel Daly and Ethan O'Neill with Rachel returning as a double gold medallist. In August, Muckross was represented by Cian Scannell and Ronan Fahy at the Coupe flatwater regatta held in Linz, Austria. A highlight from Austria was the bronze medal win for Cian and his Lee Valley crewmate Colin Creedon in the Mens Double. Fingers will be crossed once more for further success for Cillian and his fellow Irish squad members at the Coupe Beach Sprint contest at the end of October. The Beach Sprint competition will see Ireland's eight male rowers and eight female rowers take part in their respective Mens and Womens Single and Double races, in addition to combining for Mixed Double races. All in Muckross wish Cillian the very best of luck as training intensifies before the Coupe event.

Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses offer a pathway to employment or higher education

ALTERNATIVE

Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses, which are provided by Education and Training Boards (ETB), are an attractive alternative to higher education and provide a link between 2nd level and 3rd level. The CAO route doesn't suit everybody directly after Leaving Cert. Some may not feel ready for 3rd level. Others may not have secured a CAO offer or may be unhappy with the offer received. PLC courses provide an alternative route into CAO courses other than Leaving Cert exam results Colleges of Further Education throughout the country offer PLC courses leading to awards at Levels 5 & 6 in Further Education and Training (FET) from Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI).

OPPORTUNITY

A PLC course is ideal for a person who has completed the Leaving Cert and requires further vocational education and training to enhance her/his employment prospects. A PLC course provides students with the opportunity to try out a course before committing to 3rd level studies. It's also tailor made for a student with the Leaving Cert Applied (LCA) and for mature students, who are returning to education.

FULLTIME

PLC courses are full time, mainly one year, offering a blend of academic work, practical work and work experience. Many PLC courses lead directly to employment. Increasingly, PLC courses are used to access 3rd level education, with more than 750 courses in the CAO system now accepting a PLC qualification for entry.

This year, 13,160 applications to the CAO offered a PLC qualification. This is a very healthy development as it provides an alternative route into 3rd level.

The CAO website provides links to a host of fulltime higher education, further education and training and apprenticeship options available to post-second level applicants. For all queries and information about Further Education and Training or Apprenticeship options, click on the further education and training tab on the CAO website to enter the FFT HUB.

APPLY

Just click on the 'Course Finder' tab on the FET course hub for further information on these courses. Select your course. Click on "Apply Now." Create your Fetchcourse.ie account and complete the application form. You can access over 6,000 FET courses nationally, on www. fetchcourses.ie where applications for FET courses are open throughout the year.

CENTRALISED

The centralised application system has made the application process for PLC courses much easier. Entry requirements normally consist of Leaving Cert standard and satisfactory performance at interview. Mature applicants are assessed on their life's experiences. Individual PLC colleges are still advertising courses for 2025 entry and are still accepting applications for courses that have vacancies. your local PLC provider, Kerry College of Further Education and Training, www.kerrycollege.ie, for information about PLC vacancies in your locality.



CLLR. MARTIN GRADY Highlights Importance of Culture Night in Kerry

Cathaoirleach of Killarney Municipal District, Cllr. Martin Grady, has underlined the importance of Culture Night, describing it as a vital celebration of Kerry's rich artistic heritage and creative spirit.

Speaking after the annual event, Cllr. Grady said Culture Night "shines a light on the wealth of arts and culture we have in this vibrant county."

This year, more than 60 events will take place across Kerry, offering audiences and practitioners the chance to enjoy a wide variety of art forms, including music, dance, storytelling, visual arts, historical talks, street spectacles, crafts, film, and theatre.

The initiative is co-ordinated each year by the Arts Office of Kerry County Council, with Cllr. Grady praising the work of the Council's Arts Service in bringing the programme to communities across the county.

"Culture Night is only made possible by the wonderful enthusiasm and support of each venue, each participating artist and community group, and by families and friends showing up to celebrate creativity, our language, and all things artistic that make Kerry such a special place to live in and to visit," he said.

He added that the "magic of this night" comes alive through the creativity and dedication of local artists and organisers, whose contributions are deeply valued.

Cllr. Grady also called on the public to support Kerry's arts sector beyond Culture Night itself. "Our artists and arts venues need our support year-round. They are important assets in our community, and I encourage audiences to enjoy and support arts and culture in Kerry throughout the year," he said.









Deputy Healy-Rae Raises Alarm Over Rising Energy Costs in Dáil

Kerry Independent TD Danny Healy-Rae has sharply criticised the Government over rising energy costs, warning that households, the elderly, and small businesses are being pushed to the brink. Speaking in the Dáil this week, Deputy Healy-Rae said that the closure of Bord na Móna in 2020 by the previous Government has contributed to spiralling electricity prices.

"Since Bord na Móna was closed, the cost of electricity has increased day by day," he told the chamber. "In recent weeks, we've seen several companies hike their prices again, and then we hear of another reducing by 4%. What's going on with the energy regulator?"

The Kerry TD also voiced concern over new social housing projects being built without chimneys, which he said leaves residents completely reliant on electricity. "Many people are already behind on their bills," he warned.

Deputy Healy-Rae criticised delays in the SEAI's Warmer Homes Scheme, saying applicants can be left waiting up to two years for support. "That is a lifetime for an elderly person," he said.

He further highlighted the pressure on small businesses, many of which are struggling to keep doors open under soaring energy costs. Families and elderly residents, he added, are finding it increasingly difficult to heat their homes.

"The situation is unsustainable," Deputy Healy-Rae concluded, calling for urgent action to tackle energy affordability.





WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.


The online event, hosted by broadcaster Maura Derrane, will feature Dr Louise Fitzgerald, GP and clinical lead in menopause and occupational health, as well as the personal story of 53-year-old Sharon Butler from Mahon, Cork.

Sharon's heart health journey began unexpectedly on her 46th birthday. "I was trying on a new pair of shoes when I felt a sudden rush in my chest and pain in my oesophagus. I thought it was indigestion," she recalls. Her daughter quickly called Sharon's partner, a medical intern, who recognized the signs of a heart attack. Sharon was rushed to A&E, where tests confirmed she had suffered one. She later learned she had SCAD (Spontaneous Coronary Artery Dissection), a rare condition in which a tear in the artery wall can cause a blockage.

Sharon reached out to the Irish Heart Foundation for support and continues to work with them. Janis Morrissey, the Foundation's Director of Health Promotion, says the webinar offers women a chance to "take stock of where they are at, understand what factors impact their heart health, and make even small changes that can make a huge difference." 




comprehensive eye : examination is as essential for back-to-school success as supplies for learning.

Studies have consistently linked school performance to poor vision and visual disorders.

More than one in 10 children in every classroom is estimated to have an undiagnosed common vision problem that affects their learning and development.

Some eye conditions do not display any signs or symptoms, so the only way to know for sure is to take your child for a sight

Signs which may show there is a problem with a child's sight include:

- an eye appearing to drift inwards or outwards;
- difficulty concentrating;
- · headaches;
- sitting too close to the television; or
- rubbing their eyes a lot.

The condition 'lazv eve' can run in the family, so if someone in your family has either an eye turn ('squint') or suffers from reduced vision in one or both eves('amblyopia'), it's a good idea to take any related children for a sight test.

What is vision screening?

Some children have their vision screened at school – this is usually a basic test, designed to pick up children who have reduced vision in one or both eyes. If a problem is suspected, children will usually be referred for a full sight test.

What is a sight test?

A sight test is a comprehensive check which can pick up many conditions, including colour vision defects, problems with the development of 3D vision and any need for glasses. Taking children for sight tests from an early age helps to build good eye health habits into adulthood.

What can I do if I don't want my child to wear glasses?

Some parents avoid taking their children for a sight test, because they do not want them to wear glasses

It's important to understand that some children do need visual correction so their vision can develop normally and to achieve their full potential. The good news is there is now a much wider range of attractive frames to choose from and less stigma attached to wearing glasses.

Many children are also suitable for contact lenses.

This is particularly helpful for children who take part in regular sports activities and they can be successfully worn from an earlier age than most parents expect.

Deputy Cahill Welcomes Expanded Fuel Allowance Scheme

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry and party spokesperson on older people, Deputy Michael Cahill, has today warmly welcomed the commencement of the Fuel Allowance Scheme for the 2025/26 season. The announcement by Minister for Social Protection, Dara Calleary TD, that 410,000 households across Ireland will benefit from this essential support marks a significant step in ensuring that more older people and vulnerable households have the financial assistance they need to cover heating costs during the winter months. Of the 410,000 households, 15,394 of them are in Kerry.

As part of this year's expansion of the Fuel Allowance Scheme, the eligibility conditions have been enhanced to include more people, particularly older people, with an important shift in the qualifying conditions. From January 2025, the over-70s enhanced eligibility criteria will be extended to people aged 66 and over, allowing single people to earn up to €524 per week and couples up to €1,048 per week, while also increasing the capital disregard from €20,000 to €50,000. Carer's Allowance has also become a qualifying payment for Fuel Allowance, subject to meeting the scheme's means test.

Deputy Cahill, who has long advocated for improved financial support for older people, said, "I am delighted that Minister Calleary has



announced this important expansion of the Fuel Allowance Scheme, which will provide much-needed relief to hundreds of thousands of families across the country, particularly to older people in Kerry who often face high energy costs during the colder months. As Fianna Fáil's spokesperson on older people, I have lobbied tirelessly for the extension of these qualifying conditions and have worked closely with Minister Calleary to ensure that the voices of older people are heard and their needs addressed."

He continued, "This year's enhancements are a testament to the ongoing commitment of Fianna Fáil to support older people, and I am particularly pleased to see the extension of the over-70s criteria to those aged 66 and over. These changes will help ease the financial strain for more older people in our communities. I will continue to advocate strongly for the needs of older people, ensuring that they receive the support they deserve, especially when it comes to essential measures like heating assistance." The scheme will see payments of €33 per week, or two instalments of €462, to eligible households for 28 weeks, from late September to April 2026. This initiative, which is aimed at helping those who are most vulnerable during the winter months, comes as a crucial lifeline for pensioners, long-term social welfare recipients, and their families.

Deputy Cahill concluded, "The Fuel Allowance has always played a vital role in supporting people in Kerry and across the country during the harsh winter months, and this year's expanded eligibility is a welcome development. I urge all those who may qualify to check their eligibility and apply as soon as possible. As we move into the winter season, I will continue to work closely with my colleagues in government to ensure that the voices and needs of older people are prioritised."

Support for the return of Kerry Town Councils

The reinstatement of Town Councils to Kerry towns was urged again recently, by way of a Parliamentary Question by Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill to Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, James Browne TD. Deputy Cahill, his party's Spokesperson on Older People and Tourism is an enthusiastic supporter of bringing democracy as close to the people as possible.

"We often hear the phrase "all politics is local' and I believe that it is best practice to keep as much decision making as possible close to those affected most and best placed, to make informed decisions about their locality and people. Much of our direction in life is controlled by Central Government and that is what has to be, but I believe that there is also

a big advantage in dealing with specific service and facility issues locally" stated Deputy Cahill. "Minister Browne responded to my urgings by advising that a Local Democracy Taskforce was set up under the Programme for Government, to consider matters relating to the structure, finance, functions, governance and accountability of local Government. He has, in his capacity of Minister for Local Government already addressed this forum and is looking forward to receiving and considering the recommendations of the Taskforce" said the Rossbeigh TD.

"I have consistently called for the return of Town Councils as a member of Kerry County Council and since being elected to Dáil Éireann on the 1st of December 2024" stated Deputy Cahill.

Councillor Cahill Calls for

Padel Court Developments across Kerry

Deputy Danny Healy Rae Highlights School Transport in Dail Eireann

Deputy Danny Healy Rae has raised the issue of School Transport in Dail Eireann this week. Here is what he had to say:

I am glad to get opportunity to talk about this matter. I will start with drivers who are over 70. I have been looking for this for many years. I am a contractor, and my father was at it from 1956. We have a long record of service of taking children to school in Kilgarvan and Kenmare. I understand the plight of drivers when they reach 70. I had the finest drivers who had to park up and forget about it when they turned 70. I have asked for them to be tested medically, independently or whatever, to ensure that they are perfect in every way, because the safety of children is a priority. I am not trying to put them in any danger by asking for it. I know the drivers I let go are driving other vehicles for other people, doing other things rather than transporting schoolchildren, and they are still driving perfectly. Drivers in the USA and the UK operate beyond 70 years of age. I have seen it and inquired into it. The Minister of State needs to look at that.

The other thing relates to 20-year-old buses. The minute buses reach 20 years of age here, even though they are mechanically sound and pass the test, they are put off the road and are no longer suitable for Bus Éireann. More often than not, those buses are being bought, taken to the North of Ireland and used to provide the same service up there. That is absolutely scandalous.

There is another real problem that contractors face. If a driver gets sick tomorrow morning, I could get a loan of a driver no problem from Teddy McCarthy below in Sneem or from O'Callaghan Coaches in Killarney. However, I cannot do that because they have been vetted by those people, but they need to be Garda vetted by me as well in the space of maybe 12 hours, which is ridiculous. If they are Garda vetted and on Bus Éireann's list, surely that should do. What is the difference of driving in Kilgarvan, Sneem or Killarney? They have to be Garda vetted




separately if they come to me.

We have problems in Cronin's Wood in Killarney where 250 houses are being built. They are having difficulty getting down into the Monastery, the Presentation Convent and those places. They are looking for transport and they are entitled it.

We were trying to get a bus service in the Headford area to take

people to the school in Barraduff. That matter is with the Minister of State. I hope he can do something about it. They found a tenth child late in the day, and we have been told that we have to wait until next year. That is not fair on the parents and children involved. I ask the Minister of State to do what he can about this matter.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION 2025

What You Need to Know

Ireland will go to the polls on Friday, 24 October 2025, to elect its next President. The President of Ireland, or Uachtarán na hÉireann, is the Head of State and is chosen by the people every seven years. A President may only serve two terms, and with Michael D. Higgins' second term due to end on 10 November 2025, the country will soon decide who will take his place. This year's candidates are Catherine Connelly, Heather Humpheries and Jim Gavin.

Although the President is not involved in day-to-day government policy, the role carries important responsibilities under the Constitution. The President represents all the people of Ireland both at home and abroad, attends public events, makes speeches, and welcomes visitors to Áras an Uachtaráin. The President also plays a key part in formal state business, appointing the Taoiseach, ministers, judges and senior officials once they have been nominated by government. The Dáil can only be dissolved by the President, usually on the advice of the Taoiseach, but the President does have the power to refuse such a request in certain circumstances. Every law passed by the Oireachtas must be signed by the President before it comes into effect, and in cases of doubt the President may refer a Bill to the Supreme Court to check if it complies with the Constitution. The President is also Supreme Commander of the Defence Forces, commissioning officers, though command rests with the Government.

Voting in a presidential election is open to all Irish citizens who are aged 18 or over, ordinarily resident in Ireland, and registered to vote. Anyone unsure if they are on the electoral register can check at checktheregister.ie or through their local authority. The deadline to register for in-person voting is Tuesday, 7 October 2025.

To become a candidate, a person must be



at least 35 years of age and an Irish citizen. Candidates can be nominated by at least 20 members of the Oireachtas or by at least four local authorities. A former or retiring President who has served only one term may also nominate themselves. The nomination window opens on 5 September and closes at noon on 24 September.

On election day, voters will receive a ballot paper listing the candidates in alphabetical order. Voting is by preference, with voters writing "1" beside their first choice, "2" beside their second, and so on. People may rank as many or as few candidates as they like. Once the ballot is marked, it is folded and placed in the ballot box.

With just weeks to go before polling day, the countdown is on. The election will determine who becomes the 11th President of Ireland and who will represent the Irish people at home and abroad until at least 2032.





Kerry FC manager Colin Healy made five changes to his side that lost in Dublin on Friday night. You might say it's a weakened side, but on the other hand, it was possibly the strongest bench Kerry FC has seen in quite some time. Darragh Foley made his first start for Kerry FC on the night off the back of his first appearance as a half-time substitute on Friday.

From the outset, the match had the feel of two evenly matched sides testing each other's mettle. The opening ten minutes brought little in the way of clear opportunities, though Athlone registered the first corner of the evening. Chris McQueen was alert at the back for Kerry, dealing confidently with the delivery to clear his lines. For all the early possession exchanged between the teams, neither could land a decisive blow in the opening stages.

Kerry responded with their first corner midway through the half. Arran Healy, lively as ever, swung in a teasing ball, but Athlone defended it well and cleared the danger. That moment encapsulated much of the first half: both sides earned half-chances, but defensive discipline prevailed.

The game sparked into life in the twenty-sixth minute when Darragh Foley was called into serious action for the first time. Martin Scally unleashed a strike from distance, only to be denied by the Kerry shot-stopper, who dealt with the effort calmly. Moments later, Athlone's Dean Williams nearly capitalised on a long ball over the top. He found himself in a promising position but failed to connect properly, leaving Foley to smother the threat without fuss.

As the half wore on, the midfield battle remained tightly contested, with neither side willing to cede control. Athlone looked to exploit direct passes into their forwards, while Kerry worked to build patiently through their midfield trio.

Three additional minutes of stoppage time were signalled at the end of the half, but neither side was able to break the deadlock. At the interval, it remained goalless.

The second half exploded into controversy almost immediately. Just a minute after the restart, Athlone were awarded a penalty in

puzzling circumstances. A long ball into the box appeared to deflect off of Ronan Teahan's head, but the referee judged it to have struck an arm. The decision left Kerry's players and manager Colin Healy visibly frustrated, yet Athlone had their chance to seize the lead.

Up stepped Gilmore, only to be thwarted by Foley, who dived to make an excellent save. To the disbelief of the travelling supporters, the referee ordered a retake, citing an infringement. Gilmore placed the ball once more, but Foley produced an even more remarkable stop the second time, preserving parity and underlining his growing reputation as a reliable presence between the posts.

The incident seemed to galvanise Kerry. Far from retreating under pressure, they grew into the half with renewed belief. Healy made a bold triple substitution and in the fifty-third minute, introducing Joe Adams, Daniel Okwute, and Oran Crowe for Robbie Cleary, Finn Barrett, and Ronan Teahan. The changes injected fresh energy, particularly in attack, where Okwute's physicality and clever touches caused Athlone problems.

Athlone threatened again just past the hour mark, when a corner was swung dangerously on top of Foley. Amidst the scramble, the Kerry keeper not only cleared but also won a free out to relieve pressure. It was yet another sign of Kerry's increasing composure as the game wore on.

Cian Brosnan replaced Sean McGrath shortly afterwards, and Kerry nearly created a breakthrough. Okwute, showing strength and invention, flicked the ball cleverly into the path of Arran Healy, but the pass just ran too far and was smothered by Athlone goalkeeper Andrew Stuart Trainor.

Athlone's Daniel McKenna found himself in the referee's book in the seventy third minute, and his indiscipline would ultimately cost his side late in the contest. Before that, however. Kerry

handed a debut to young midfielder Luke Doolan, who replaced the tireless Arran Healy in the 83rd minute. Doolan almost made an immediate impact, glancing a header from a corner narrowly wide with his very first touch in senior League of Ireland football

As the match ticked into the final minutes, Kerry continued to push. Okwute came close to stealing victory when his shot from inside the left side of the box hit the side netting in the eighty-ninth minute, much to the relief of the home supporters. With four minutes of stoppage time signalled, the tension inside the ground was palpable.

In the third minute of added time, Athlone's evening took a further blow. McKenna, already booked, picked up a second yellow card and was sent off. The dismissal came too late, however, for Kerry to capitalise, and the referee's whistle confirmed the stalemate.

Kerry FC had two very tough games on the road this week and now look forward to being back at home on Friday night as they contest Treaty United in the final Munster Derby of the season for the Kingdom.



I expected East Kerry to have neither of the Clifford brothers and I still expected them to have enough to see off St. Kierans in a testing encounter, most likely the best game of the weekend. East Kerry have been there or thereabouts every year and a string of minor and U20 titles led to a period of convincing County Chapionship dominance. That faltered a bit in recent years, but they still have the strongest panel of any divisional side to me. Make no mistake; I do rate St. Kierans. As a matter of fact, I thnk they are very much a coming team with some serious talent about to come through.

I was only half right on both counts. Paudie Clifford didn't line out, but his younger brother did, and he can play a bit as well. East Kerry did prevail but – and I don't like saying it – St. Kierans could't muster the challenge I expected. I suspect that they couldn't get a lot of prep done, particularly with the likes of Ballymac players involved.

The fact is that they were also blitzed early. Darragh Lyne opened the scoring before David Clifford sent the ball across to Philip O'Leary. He seemed to looking to clip over the bar from a tight angle – certainly if he deliberately lobbed Sean Óg Ó Ciardubháin from there, I'd say Heimar Hallgrimmsson should probably give a call to Kilcummin.

At the other end, Cathal Brosnan brilliantly gathered a Sean O'Connell pass and skinned past two defenders, only to blaze wide with a

West Kerry and South Kerry served up a really cracking contest of open football, easily the bst County Championship game of the weekend. There was drama right from the throw-in, Brian Ó Beaglaíoch finding Tom O'Donnell, who raced through the defence but couldn't quite unleash a shot at goal. It did result in a free for a defensive pass to the keeper, with Cian O'Grady slotting the free. West Kerry also claimed the kick-out with O'Gradydoubling his tally with a point from play.

South Kerry v St. Brendans

Elimination on the table adds serious spice to these games. Coming into the championship I'd have said St. Brendans with a bit to spare, now I'm not so sure. I thought West Kerry would be well on top against a young South Kerry side, especially in the absence of Graham



O'Sullivan. But now I have serious doubts. Donagh Shine, Emmet Daly, Ian O'Sullivan (if fit – he certainly looked ery dangerous in the half hour he played), Cian O'Donoghue....go back as far as Jack Murphy himself, and South Kerry always had good footballers. They were better than West Kerry for a lot of that game but just caught by a late surge.

South Kerry looked organised; St. Brendans looked a bit disjointed, but I think they have better potential and we'll see more of it tis weekend. I give them a tentative nod.

It wasn't Thule, an equally mythological frozen waste suspected to be Hel in Norse legends (it was Iceland) but a land of milk and honey. I have a theory. Athletics when I was growing up was a specialised activity. Yes, everybody took part i the Community Games, but few enough went any further. Certainly, it wasn't exactly water-cooler conversation (not that we had water-coolers, garden hoses more like) like GAA, rugby, or soccer. I remember a Cork girl named Sonia O'Sullivan starting to make international headlines. Prior to that, we could all name maybe five Irish athletes, especially if you named Coghlan and Delaney twice. But suddenly there was an Irish athlete right up there with the best in the world (Barry McGuigan was something similar in boxing; we'd always had boxers, but not like this). It shouldn't have made a difference that it was a girl, or that she was genuinely likeable and relatable, but it did. I think a generation grew up watching hat, and it is their children who are stepping up now. I know that's a bit simplistic, but I wouldn't say it's way off, either.

Five personal bests in seven events exactly when they are most needed. A generation growing up now just met a new breed of Sonia O'Sullivan.

Shout out to Cian McPhillips too. Fourth place. In the world. A fifth of a second away from a medal. A miss is as good as a mile, they say....it'd take sme muppet to say something that stupid. Fionnuala McCormack finished ninth in the marathon. In the world. And she's her, so that can't even count as all that much of a surprise. Sarah Healy and Andrew Coscoran reaching the 1500 finals. Two of them? When last did that happen? Answer: never.

Any of those things would be huge headlines for the vast majority of my lifetime. And now it just feels natural. KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

ith the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it

becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20.000 via a bond from the builder Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.




This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008 This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years. The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dua up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45.000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a spag list from a builder Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.







"And do not be conformed to this world any longer with its superficial values and customs, but be transformed and progressively changed as you mature spiritually, by the renewing of your mind - focusing on godly values and ethical attitudes, so that you may prove for yourselves what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect in His plan and purpose for you" (Romans 12:2 Amplified Bible).
