

WHAT ARE OUR CHILDREN WATCHING ONLINE?

Pornography is a subject which can evoke strong responses both for and against. But let's look at the issue of pornography use amongst teenagers and children - and specifically internet pornography. The difference between internet pornography and other forms of pornography is the speed at which the images are available, the ease at which the images can be accessed and the hardcore nature of the images.

We know that the average age globally that a young person first views pornography on the internet is 11 years and that mirrors our findings here in Kerry. We carried out informal research in 4 secondary schools in Kerry and young people (age 16/17) have told us that most of them will have seen their first image by the end of 1st year in secondary school and some will have viewed their first image by the age of 8, 9 or 10 years of age. Our statistics

54% of male students and 38% of female students viewed their first image on the internet. The majority just came across it and did not go looking for it. Most young people are viewing their first image on a mobile phone. A worrying statistic is that 9% of male students watch it once a day with 45% of male students watching it a couple of times week. 12% of male students watch it once a week and 13% of females students watch it a couple of times a month

Exposure to pornographic material at a young age can be a traumatic, confusing and disturbing experience. Add to this the actual content our young people are viewing - this is not just 'mild' pornography but rather images and videos of rape, sexual violence, degradation and extremes in sexually deviant behaviour. Pornography creates a powerful biochemical 'rush' in the user that actually mimics the brains' reaction to alcohol and drug use so therefore the viewing of pornography is highly addictive. The negative effects of pornography include modelling and imitation of inappropriate sexual behaviours, unhealthy interference with normal sexual development, residual feelings of shame, guilt, anxiety and confusion and development of misleading and potentially harmful attitudes toward sex.

So what can a parent do? Plenty!! First of all let's talk about the conversation with children (if we warn children, they will be more comfortable in letting you know when they come across an image. So the conversation might go like this:

"...you might come across something on the computer, or someone might shows you a picture on their phone that might upset you... the people might be naked or they are doing stuff that looks very strange! If you see something please let me know and we'll talk about it...'

Next week we'll discuss how to deal with the older teen who might be viewing pornography.

Health Matters.... With Dr. Michael O'Doherty

MELANOMA

Melanoma is the most serious type of skin cancer. It affects young adults as well as older people. If diagnosed at an early stage, before it has spread, treatment is likely to be curative. The outlook is not so good if it has spread before being treated.

SKIN CANCERS ARE DIVIDED INTO:

- Melanoma (malignant melanoma). These cancers develop from melanocytes (cells which make a pigment called melanin when the skin is exposed to sun).
- Non-melanoma skin cancers. These are about 20 times more common than

How common is melanoma? Melanoma is the least common form of skin cancer, but it is the most serious. It is the one most likely to spread to other parts of the body. Melanoma is the second most common cancer in people aged 15-34.

What causes melanoma? A cancerous tumour starts from one abnormal cell. The exact reason why a cell becomes cancerous is unclear. It is thought that something damages or alters certain genes in the cell. This makes the cell abnormal and multiply out of control.

Sun/Sunbed damage to the skin: The main risk factor which damages skin and can lead to a melanoma is damage from the sun. It is the ultraviolet (UV) radiation in the sunshine and in sunbeds which damages DNA of skin cells and may trigger a cancerous change. People with fair skin and children are most vulnerable to damage. (The damage to the skin can occur many years before a cancer actually develops.) Other factors which increase the risk of developing melanoma include family history, having multiple moles, using suppeds and a weakened immune system.

What are the symptoms of melanoma? A typical melanoma starts as a small dark patch on the skin. It can develop from a normal part of skin, or from an existing mole. If you notice a new mole or skin lesion or a change to an existing mole (including bleeding or itch) then it is best to get it checked by your doctor. A melanoma can develop on any area of skin. The most common place for a melanoma to develop in a woman is on the legs; whereas for men it is on the chest or back. Rarely, a melanoma can develop in the iris or back of the eye. If some cells break off and spread (metastasise) to other parts of the body, various other symptoms can develop. A common early symptom of spread is for the nearby lymph glands (nodes) to swell.

How is a melanoma diagnosed? If a melanoma is suspected then your doctor is likely to advise an excisional biopsy. This is where the entire abnormal area of skin is removed by a minor operation. This tissue is looked at under the microscope confirm the diagnosis and the level of thickness (which determines treatment).

Treatment The treatment depends on the stage. The excisional biopsy may be curative if the margins of the melanoma are clear (fully excised). If there is any concerns regarding the margins a wide local excision may be required. This aims to remove any abnormal cells which may be present. Depending on the level of spread surrounding glands may need to be removed and chemo/radiotherapy may be required.

What is the outlook (prognosis)? The prognosis for people with malignant melanomas has been improving over a period of 25 years and people with melanomas now have amongst the best outlook for any cancer. Around three quarters of people who have a melanoma removed will have no further problems.

The outlook depends on the stage. The deeper the growth the less likely of a cure. Melanomas which have spread to other parts of the body are unlikely to be cured. Can melanoma be prevented? Most skin cancers (non-melanoma and melanoma skin cancers) are caused by excessive exposure to the sun. We should all limit our sun exposure in the summer months (or all year when in hot countries nearer the equator)

Covering up with clothes and a wide-brimmed hat when out in the sunshine.

 Applying sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 (SPF 30 for children or people with pale skin) which also has high ultraviolet A (UVA) protection. In particular, children should be protected from the sun. Sunburn or excessive exposure to the sun in childhood is thought to be the biggest risk factor to the developing of skin cancer as an adult.

TOP TIPS FROM SAFEFOOD FOR A SAFE BARBEQUE

With some fine weather here at last (and the World Cup on TV), a barbeque is a great way to spend time with family, friends and neighbours. But just because you are cooking outdoors, don't let your good cooking habits go up in smoke when you light the barbecue - you want them to go home with memories of a good time, not a tummy bug to remember you by! To make the most of your barbeque, here are some top tips from **safefood** for how to get it right every time.

Before you get grilling

Before you begin to set up your barbeque this year and think of your menu, give your barbeque grill a thorough clean by scrubbing the metal rack with a suitable oven cleaner or a damp brush dipped in bicarbonate of soda. And remember to rinse it thoroughly with warm, soapy water afterwards.

Keep your cool

When cooking and eating outdoors, food is away from your fridge for a longer period of time which can lead to germs multiplying quickly. With this in mind, keep perishable foods like salads coleslaw and quiche in your fridge until you need them.

Before you start

Before you try your best imitation of a TV chef, make sure frozen foods are fully thawed (preferably in the fridge on the bottom shelf; which may take overnight) before you start cooking them. Keep foods you plan to cook properly chilled in the fridge or a cool box until needed and light your barbecue well in advance.

For Charcoal barbeques, the flames should have died down *before* you start cooking

It's in your hands

As with preparing any food, make sure to wash your hands before and after handling food. Remember to keep raw meat separate from cooked meat and ready-to-eat foods like salads. Always use separate utensils for handling raw and cooked meat when cooking. Never put cooked food on a dish that has been used for raw meat or poultry (unless it's been thoroughly washed in between) and keep food covered whenever possible.

Cook with confidence!

The big issue when barbequing is making sure your food has been cooked thoroughly, all the way through. This is particularly important when cooking poultry, pork, minced and skewered meats, such as burgers, sausages and kebabs on the barbecue - while the outside may look cooked (and in some cases burnt), the inside can still be raw.

safefood recommends these meats should be cooked until they are piping hot all the way through, with no pink meat remaining and the juices run clear. If you've got lots of people visiting your barbeque and want to ensure that meat is thoroughly cooked, why not pre-cook the meat in your kitchen just before you put it on the barbecue for that great flavour.

When cooking foods on the barbeque make sure to turn them regularly and move them around the grill to ensure they are cooked evenly on all sides – then remove them from the heat and place them on a clean plate.

For meats that need to be cooked all the way through be sure to cut into the centre of them to check that:

• They are piping hot all the way through

- There is no pink meat left and
- The juices run clear

Remember - Steaks or whole meat joints of beef or lamb can be served 'rare' as long as they are cooked on the outside as any harmful bacteria will be on the outside only, and not in the centre.

Mind that marinade!

If you like to marinate your meat, make sure any marinade used on raw meat is not then used as a sauce to coat vegetables or cooked meat as it will contain raw meat bacteria! If you want to use marinade as a sauce, be sure to cook it in a saucepan and bring it to a rolling boil before serving it.

Love those leftovers

If there are any leftovers from your barbeque, these should not be left outside where they may be in the sun and where insects and animals might be able to access them. As with all leftovers, cover these foods and allow them to cool in a cool place (the kitchen) before refrigerating within 2 hours of cooking. The rule to remember for leftovers is - if in doubt, throw them out.

7 golden rules for a safe barbeque

- Keep perishable foods like salads, coleslaw and quiche in your fridge until you are about to serve them.
- Burgers, sausages and kebabs, pork and poultry **must be cooked all the way through** but steaks or whole meat joints of beef or lamb can be served 'rare' as harmful bacteria are on the outside only (and not in the centre).
- If you like to marinate your meat, make sure any marinade used on raw meat is not then used as a sauce to coat vegetables or cooked meat as it will contain raw meat bacteria.
- If you choose to barbecue any frozen food, it must be completely thawed on the bottom shelf of your fridge before you cook it.
- When handling raw meat and poultry, wash your hands thoroughly and frequently, most importantly before going on to prepare salads and other ready to eat foods.
- Once your meat is cooked thoroughly, make sure to keep cooked meat separate from raw meat and to use separate chopping boards, cooking utensils and plates. Harmful bacteria in raw meat, poultry and their juices can cross contaminate cooked food and lead to food poisoning, something your guests won't thank you for.
- If there are leftovers from your barbeque, allow the food to cool before refrigerating, however make sure to refrigerate food within two hours of cooking. Always remember that with leftovers if in doubt, throw it out.

BBO CHICKEN BURGERS

WHAT YOU NEED...

- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts
- 4 rashers bacon (optional)
- 4 large burger buns, sliced in half
- lettuce, tomato and red onion, to serve

FOR THE SAUCE AND MARINADE...

- 4 tbsp tomato ketchup
- 4 tbsp brown sauce
- splash chilli sauce (optional)
- 2 tsp clear honey
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed



METHOD

Make the sauce and marinade by mixing everything together in a large bowl, then put a few spoonfuls aside.

Slice halfway into the thickest part of each breast and open it up like a book.

Flatten down slightly with your hand, then toss in the bowlful of marinade to coat.

Chill for as little, or as long, as you have time to.

Barbecue the chicken for about 10 mins until completely cooked through, turning so it doesn't burn but is nicely charred and sticky.

Cook the bacon at the same time until crisp, if using, and toast the buns.

Assemble the burgers with lettuce, slices of tomato, onion and the reserved sauce on the side for dolloping on top.

MEXICAN CORN ON THE COB

Spice up barbecued sweetcorn with chilli, lime and lashings of melted butter.

WHAT YOU NEED...


- 4 corn cobs
- 100g butter, softened
- zest 1 lime
- 2 tsp chopped fresh chilli or 1 tsp chilli powder, mild or hot, depending how spicy you like it
- · lime wedges, to serve




METHOD

Soak corn in cold water for 15 mins. Heat a griddle pan or barbecue and, when hot, place the corn directly on the bars. Cook for 30-40 mins, turning regularly, until the corn is tender and charred in spots.

Meanwhile, mash the butter with the lime zest and chili. When the cobs are done, top each with a knob of flavoured butter









Get a sizzle in your griddle with this mouthwatering steak recipe - master the sauce and use it on burgers and chicken too.

WHAT YOU NEED...

- 4 lamb leg steaks (of beef if you prefer)
- 1 tbsp sunflower oil, plus a little extra

- 2 tbsp red wine vinegar


METHOD

A week to go and it's the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle!! A lot of hard work and determination has been put in. You feel good because you put in the effort and mileage on the legs... So well done!!

Over the next two week's I will be focusing on "what to bring – day of cycle". I am going to specifically reference equipment, clothing & nutrition.

EQUIPMENT: - ESSENTIAL

Bike - Needless to say the bike, ideally the bike that you have been training on! I have known some people who decided to change bikes week beforehand, which did not work out to their advantage.

Helmet – Helmets are compulsory for the cycle. Please ensure that it is properly fitted. It never ceases to amaze me cyclists cycling without a helmet - I wonder do they place a value on their brain and indeed life?

ID & Cash – It would be wise to bring an id such as a driver's license, as well as some cash, should you want to stop en route for a cool 99!

Puncture Repairs Tools - Carry a spare tyre tube. Make sure you also have the tools you need to change a flat on the road, if you don't know someone maybe kind enough to assist. However if you don't have the tools, they won't be able to help. In addition to a spare tube, bring tyre levers, a pump or a CO2 inflator.

Water Bottles - Bring two water bottles that fit in the bike cages. Ideally starting the cycle these should be filled with carbohydrate based drinks, and once drank; alternate bottles with water and one with a carbohydrate drink. The reason being is not to overload the stomach. Remember it is important to refill bottles at the water and feeding stations.

Equipment: - Nice to Have (especially for long distance)

Bike Computer - Bike computers are helpful to measure distance, speed and time as you ride. The cheapest models cost approximately €15- €45 and are worth having to keep track of your progress, and can also act as a motivational tool.

CLOTHING: ESSENTIAL

Padded Shorts - Padded shorts are necessary if you want a comfortable ride. If you do not have a pair, do yourself a favour and buy the padded shorts as they make a world of difference.

Rain Jacket – It's Ireland, and that means the weather is unpredictable! So be sure to bring along a light rain jacket. You do not want to be on top of Coomakista, feeling cold, with no protective layer, and then having to go down hill and face the journey

Clothing: Nice to Have

I have classified the following two items as "nice to have", primarily due to costings. However I would be inclined to say they are essential pieces of clothing, and less costly options are available.

Cycling Gloves - Padded gloves will make the impact of riding and holding onto the handle bars for hours much easier on your

Cycling Jersey - Cycling specific jerseys are great, as not only do they wick away the sweat; they also have convenient pockets on the back for storing food, tools and other

So that's about it for this week. Before I depart, I would like to bring your attention to a family fun cycle, organized by Kerry Recreation & Sports Partnership. It's PEDAL IN THE PARK, which takes place on the eve of the Ring of Kerry Cycle in Killarney National Park. There is a 5k and 10k route. Registration is from 6:15pm onwards with children's entertainment, and cycle starts at 7pm.

Next week I will focus on nutrition and words of wisdom, so for now this week's cycle training programme, according to the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle Training programme, presents 200km schedule....enjoy the mileage!

Citizens Information

Know Your Rights:

JOBSEEKER'S ALLOWANCE TRANSITION PAYMENT

My One-Parent Family Payment will be stopped next month when my youngest child reaches 10 years of age. Is there another payment I can get?

ANSWER

You may qualify for a Jobseeker's Allowance Transition (JST). This payment aims to support lone parents into the workforce.

You must have been getting a One-Parent Family Payment (OFP) within the 3 years before you make your claim for Jobseeker's Allowance Transition. You must be habitually resident in Ireland, you must be capable of work and your youngest qualified child must be at least 7 and under 14 years of age. When your youngest child turns 14 the normal Jobseeker's Allowance (JA) conditions will apply to you.

The rules for JA and JST are very similar. The means test is exactly the same and the maximum weekly rate is the same (€188). Income from work is assessed in the same way. The main differences between JA and JST are:

For JST, you are not obliged to be unemployed, available for full-time work and genuinely seeking work.

The 4-in-7 rule applying to JA does not apply to JST (you do not have to be fully unemployed for 4 out of 7 days). This means that you could work part-time for 5 days, for example.

You cannot cohabit with another person while you are getting

To get JST you must sign a declaration every 3 months to confirm that you are still entitled to the payment. You must participate in employment activation measures and you have to participate in any recommended course of education or training. You may also be able to access childcare supports.

The basics

- Stop, look and listen

- If possible, cross at a pedestrian crossing or

traffic lights

- Never cross at a bend
- If there is a footpath use it
- If there is no footpath, walk/run/jog on the right hand side of the road, facing oncoming traffic and keeping as close as possible to the side of the road
- Walk no more than two abreast and if the road is narrow or there is heavy traffic, walk in single file

Increase your visibility

More than two-thirds of fatal pedestrian collisions happen at night. Although you can hear a car coming and see its lights, the driver may not see you (and certainly won't hear you). To protect yourself make sure you:

 Always wear a pair of reflective armbands, high-visibility belt or other reflective or fluorescent clothing which will help you to be

seen from a distance

Carry a torch on country roads

SOBERING FACTS

Drunken pedestrians are a source of danger to themselves and other road users. If you have had one too many, don't attempt to walk - hail a taxi, use public transport or get a lift from a (non-drinking) friend.

Pubs and clubs also have a responsibility to prevent intoxicated customers walking out on public roads where they could be hit by passing vehicles, or cause a crash through their own behaviour. To prevent this happening, bar staff or anyone serving alcohol should decide if the person is fit to walk. If not, they should arrange to get them home safely.





THE BEST POTATO SALAD

Proof you can teach an old salad new tricks, these recipes are perfect for Summer dining

GRILLED SWEET POTATO AND SCALLION SALAD

- 4 large sweet potatoes, par-cooked and cut into 1/2-inch slices
- 8 scallions
- 3/4 cup(s) olive oil
- 2 tablespoon(s) Dijon mustard
- 1/2 cup(s) cider vinegar
- 1/4 cup(s) balsamic vinegar
- 2 teaspoon(s) honey
- salt
- (freshly ground) pepper
- 1/4 cup(s) (chopped) flat-leaf parsley

DIRECTIONS

Preheat grill to high. Brush sweet potatoes and scallions with 1/4 cup oil and arrange on



grill. Grill potatoes for 3 to 4 minutes on each side, or until just tender. Grill scallions until softened and grill-marked, about 2 minutes. Remove scallions and cut into thin slices.

In a large bowl, whisk remaining 1/2 cup olive oil with the mustard, vinegars and honey. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Add potatoes, scallions and parsley, and toss until potatoes are well coated. Transfer to a platter and serve.



CLASSIC PICNIC POTATO SALAD

- 3 pound(s) (medium) red-skinned potatoes, about 12, cut into 1-inch chunks
- 1/4 cup(s) (distilled) white vinegar
- 1 tablespoon(s) olive oil
- 2 teaspoon(s) (spicy) brown mustard
- 1 1/4 teaspoon(s) salt
- 1/4 teaspoon(s) black pepper
- 1/2 cup(s) mayonnaise
- 1/3 cup(s) whole milk
- 2 small celery stalks, thinly sliced
- 2 green onions, minced

DIRECTIONS

In 5- to 6-quart saucepot, place potatoes and enough water to cover; heat to boiling over high heat. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer for 8 to 10 minutes, until potatoes are fork-tender.

Meanwhile, in large bowl, with wire whisk, mix vinegar, oil, mustard, salt and pepper.

Drain potatoes. Add hot potatoes to bowl with vinaigrette; gently stir with rubber spatula until potatoes are evenly coated and vinaigrette is absorbed. Cool for 15 minutes. REVISED REGULATIONS FOR AGRICULTURAL VEHICLES



The Minister for Transport, Tourism & Sport Leo Varadkar has recently signed legislation introducing revised standards for agricultural vehicles.

Why are the regulations changing?

These standards take effect from 1st January 2016 and are being introduced following a comprehensive review, including a public consultation, undertaken by the Road Safety Authority (RSA) over a prolonged period in 2008-2009 which examined the current legislation, policy and practice relating to the use of agricultural vehicles on public roads.

The current regulations are in place for more than half a century during which time agricultural vehicles have become bigger, faster and more powerful, and their use has been expanded to include a wide variety of tasks outside the scope of the current regulations.

Agricultural vehicles are now widely used on our roads; they are generally constructed to very high standards and it is important that the regulatory regime reflects the developments in agricultural vehicle technology and requires them to comply with recognised vehicle standards in relation to a number of key safety areas, i.e. braking, suspension systems, tyres and lighting as well as the weights for which they are designed.

The majority of correctly maintained tractors already in use comply with the revised standards being introduced. Those that do not comply are likely to need only minor remedial works carried out such as fitment of a flashing amber beacon and/or a replacement manufacturer's plate indicating their design axle weights and maximum permitted towable masses.

Trailers already in service will also be able to continue in use, but, due to varying construction standards, some will need remedial work carried out if they are intended to be used at higher weights and at speeds of more than 40 km/h.

Tractors and trailers operating at higher speeds and weights will also be required to be appropriately plated and speed rated.

A summary of these standards is as follows:

Braking: More powerful braking systems will be required for agricultural vehicles operating at speeds in excess of 40km/h. Most of the correctly maintained tractors which have come into use in the past 30 years already meet these requirements.

Lighting & Visibility: Agricultural vehicles will need to be equipped with appropriate lighting systems, flashing amber beacons and reflective markings.

Weights, Dimensions & Coupling: New national weight limits are being introduced. These will enable tractor and trailer combinations which are unplated to continue in use at limits which are safe for such vehicles, i.e. combinations of agricultural tractors and trailers, where either of them is

unplated, will have their maximum towable mass capped at 3 times the tractor's unladen weight.

Plated tractors and trailer combinations will benefit from being able to operate at higher weight limits of up to 24 and 34 tonnes for tandem and triaxle agricultural trailers respectively that meet certain additional requirements; i.e. they must be plated, they must be fitted with a flexible suspension system, they must be fitted with flotation tyres for operation at 10 tonnes per axle in the case of a tandem axle trailer or 9 tonnes per axle in the case of a triaxle trailer, and finally they must be fitted with a steered or steering axles if they have an axle spacing of 1.8 metres or greater.

Exemptions from compliance with the revised national weight limits are being provided for certain types of interchangeable towed equipment such as slurry tankers, manure or fertiliser spreaders and grain chaser bins.


Plating & Speed Rating: Trailers operating at weights exceeding 19 tonnes or at speeds exceeding 40 km/h will require fitment of both an authorisation (i.e. a national weights and dimensions plate) and a speed disc.

If you are unsure as to whether your vehicle or vehicles comply with these revised standards, we recommend that you contact the vehicle manufacturer or one of their authorised distributors for advice.

Penalties: Breach of the new Regulations may result in a direct summons to court, whereby on conviction, courts may impose a class C fine (up to €2,500), a prison sentence or both on both the person who commits the offence and on the owner of the vehicle. RESEEDING ADVICE FROM KELLIHERS FEEDS & AGRI SUPPLIES TRALEE

Grass is the key ingredient in Irish livestock farming and it sets us apart from most other countries. Grazed grass is the cheapest feed for livestock and grass silage is among the cheapest winter feeds. The benefits are seen in reduced production costs and in the green and environmentally friendly image of our milk and meat products. The rainfall that so often makes grass utilisation difficult is what allows such a consistent supply of grass from year to year.

GRASS RESEEDING TO INCREASE PROFITS: Grass reseeding is one of the best paying investments available to livestock farmers. To maximise grass production and utilisation target a reseeding rate of 10% of the farm area each year. Get the basics right when reseeding; herbicides, lime, fertiliser, cultivation and sowing Choose a grass mixture with the best grass varieties available

The best grazing mixtures will include Astonenergy and Glenveagh. Astonenergy has the highest digestibility and palatability, Glenveagh has the best ground cover of all available varieties.

THE DECISION TO RESEED: Grass reseeding is an important grassland management tool to increase the productivity of grass swards. Reseeded pastures will produce higher annual yields of grass compared to old swards. Grass digestibility and intake potential will improve. Essentially you are sowing the very best grass varieties that are available and replacing broadleaf weeds, grass weeds and older less productive perennial ryegrass plants. The message from research and advisory organisations in the past ten years is that reseeding pays; it delivers increased stock carrying capacity, reduces costs and increases profitability. Based on reseeding rates in Ireland in the past few years this message is being taken up by farmers. There is however much more potential to exploit this important management tool to continue improving efficiency and this should be an integral part of dairy expansion

RESEEDING ADVICE - GET THE BASICS RIGHT: Overall reseeding: Identify paddocks to reseed - Poor yield performance and low Perennial Ryegrass content (less than 50%).

Timing of reseeding: The farm needs a good supply of grass and suitable soil conditions to carry out the cultivation and seed sowing operation. Both

requirements are weather dependent. Spring reseeding generally leads to more successful establishment and gives better opportunities for post emergence weed control. Spray off the old sward with Glyphosate. Get a soil test done and apply Lime, Phosphate and Potash as recommended. Apply Nitrogen at or after sowing. Select a suitable grass seed mixture with the best available varieties and sow at 14-16kg per acre. A fine firm seedbed is essential whether ploughing or not.

Ideally cover the seeds and always roll well. Monitor closely for pest attack from the date of sowing and take action where necessary. Slugs, Leatherjackets, Frit Fly and Rabbits are the main threats.

Post emergence weed control is essential particularly for docks and thistles. Normally apply herbicide 5-6 weeks after sowing. Get advice on the most suitable product.

OVERSEEDING GRASS SEED INTO EXISTING SWARDS: Suitable on well managed grassland where sward density is reduced - not suitable on old 'butty' swards. Ensure the field is correctly fertilised; soil sample and apply N, P, K and lime as required.


Ideally harvest a heavy crop of silage as the regrowth of the existing sward will be slowed down and this will give the new seeds a better opportunity to germinate and establish.

Select a suitable grass seed mixture with the best available varieties and sow at 10kg per acre. Choose the grass mixture based on the intended use of the pasture. A higher than normal tetraploid content can improve establishment due to their upright growth habit. Sow seeds with a suitable drill / slot seeder; there are a number of purpose built machines available. Alternatively, broadcast seed and apply 2000 gallons per acre of watery slurry.

Monitorcloselyforpestattackfromthe date of sowing and take action where necessary. Slugs, Leatherjackets. Frit Fly and Rabbits are the main threats. Slugs can be particularly troublesome and preventative treatment with slug pellets is recommended.

Graze at least every 3 weeks for the rest of the season, do not allow covers to go over 1200kg DM/ha; this is to avoid shading of the new seedlings. Best to graze for the rest of the season, if silage crops have to be taken then cut a light crop

Fertilise well for the season.

ECO-FRIENDLY ACTIVITIES FOR VERY YOUNG CHILDREN

Environmental protection is an issue that affects our children deeply. The condition of the world when they grow up will shape their health and their lives. Even very young toddlers can be introduced to the idea of living green as they help parents or other caregivers toss paper and plastic into recycling bins or turn off lights when leaving a room.

- Singing. Most children love to raise their voices ... in song or otherwise. Belting out simple, repetitive lyrics is a great way for kids to learn " Repair, Reuse, Repurpose, Recycle," the basic 4 R's of going green.

A number of elderly Chinese citizens took their own lives in the province of Anhui in April and May. They weren't ill or depressed. They killed themselves to ensure they could be buried rather than cremated. Traditions associated with death and burial remain a cornerstone of Chinese culture. This is especially true for Chinese senior citizens from the more rural areas of the country. They plan for their deaths years, even decades, in advance. It can sometimes take that long to save up for an elaborate and beautiful casket.

"My grandparents are in their 80s. Their coffins were made at least 15 years ago," one woman said "A coffin purchase is like a house purchase to them and means a lot."The Chinese historically have viewed the corporal body as an ancestral gift. Many believe upon death it should be placed in the ground, intact, near the family's ancestral village.

"Chinese people value death as life itself; it is not an end, rather, a new beginning. People treat the ancestors who passed away as if they were still alive, which explains the concept of a burial of a complete body in a coffin and burning money and clothes made of paper." a professor at Beihang University said.

Unfortunately, authorities believe there's literally no room for this type of ancestral homage today. The Chinese government has been encouraging greater use of cremation or burial at sea as far back as 1949, with mixed results.

Nine million Chinese die every year. Cemetery space is almost non-existent and burial has been prohibited in all but the most rural areas for years.

In Anhui province, officials say it was concern over fires caused during ritual burial celebrations in 2013 that caused them to crack down in 2014. To ensure adherence to the new cremation-only policy, in April and May they began visiting funeral homes and even private residences to register and destroy caskets.

Shock and outrage over this decision triggered a spate of sudden suicides. Among those who took their own lives — or attempted to do so

An 81 year old hanged herself on May 13. Her suicide note explained that she'd killed herself to be sure she could have the death she wished and she wanted to be buried.

A 91 year old man hanged himself from a tree on May 6th, an hour after his son returned from a meeting and told him authorities planned to begin seizing coffins to ensure compliance with the new cremation policy. The man had a special red lacquered coffin stored lovingly under a cover in his room, made from the wood of 12 fir trees.

An 83 year old woman was so appalled after officials arrived at her home and sawed her coffin in half that she hanged herself on May 23rd and an 81 year old woman, hanged herself in her own backyard on April 18th after authorities showed up at her home to register her coffin.

Another 88 year old woman had purchased her coffin over a decade ago and kept it near her bed. Since April 20th, she's tried to poison herself four times by drinking pesticide because authorities tried to seize her coffin. She agreed to stop attempting to take her life after officials agreed not to take the coffin.

Despite the evidence to the contrary, the official stance of the Anhui Civil Affairs Department is that there is no connection between the suicides and the new burial rules. Those who chose to die in April and May needed to be absolutely sure authorities would honour their desire to be buried. Beating the deadline was the only way.

Though much has been made of the June 1 deadline, the transition to cremation is being phased in. By the close of 2014, 50% of people who die will have to be cremated. By the end of 2015, that number rises to 70% and to 80% by 2016.

On Friday, Peanut was crowned the 2014 "World's Ugliest Dog" at the Sonoma-Marin Fair in Petaluma, California. Peanut's unique appearance is the result of having been set on fire by his previous owner. When Peanut was originally discovered after the abuse, he was said to be near death and the abused dog resided at a shelter for nine long months before Holly Chandler met, and fell in love, with him.

The two-year-old dog's guardian, Ms. Chandler, of North Carolina, entered Peanut in the contest to help raise awareness about animal abuse.

Ms. Chandler sees past Peanut's physical anomalies - in fact, she thinks that they simply add character, I guess I don't see him every day as being that ugly. But I guess the judges thought so.

The 2013 winner of the World's Ugliest Dog contest was a four-year-old beagle, boxer, basset hound mix named "Walle," from Chico.

In November 2013, a former World's Ugliest Dog winner passed away. The dog, named Elwood, had won the title in 2007; he passed away on Thanksgiving Day. The former title holder was the inspiration for a children's book, written by his guardian, Karen Quigley, called "Everyone Loves Elwood."

NOW LAUGHING SUPPOSED TO BE BAD FOR **OUR HEALTH**

A study of the reported benefits and damage of laughter in patients from 1946 to the present has shown that laughter is bad for you but chuckling is good for your health.

One woman with racing heart syndrome collapsed and died after a period of intense laughter and laughing 'fit to burst' was found to cause possible heart rupture or a torn gullet. A quick intake of breath during laughing was also discovered to often cause inhalation of foreign bodies and can also provoke asthma attacks, while bursts of laughter were also proven to cause incontinence and trigger hernias.

However the review found that chuckling can also have a positive impact in health saying it reduces arterial wall stiffness, which researchers suggest may relieve tension. And it lowered the risk of heart attack.

Hospital clowns improved lung function in patients with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and 'genuine laughter' for a whole day could burn 2000 calories and lower the blood sugar in diabetics.

Researchers from Birmingham and Oxford universities concluded laughter can have serious health implications.

WELL DONE INDIA

Recently the Supreme Court in India issued a landmark verdict that banned the use of bulls for entertainment purposes. These include jallikattu, rekla races, and horse and bull races. These entertainment venues are abusive and traumatic to both men and bulls, and the verdict should be praised. Dr. Nanditha Krishna, who is the chairperson of Humane Society International/India and is a member of Humane Society International, stated that this decision is a huge victory for animal rights, and those that were a part of the fight should be thanked and congratulated for their work.

Jallikattu is when crowds of men chase and torment bulls for entertainment. The practice often leads to bulls and men getting injured, and according to Humane Society International, there is nothing "intellectual or cultural in fighting bulls." The bulls are taunted by the crowds, tails twisted and broken, and are wrestled to the ground and prodded with studded nail sticks. Chili powder is also thrown into the bull's eyes to make them crazy, and alcohol is also forcibly poured down their throats. The origin of jallikattu comes from the man's domestication of cattle, "which gave him the draught power of the bull and milk from the cow." As with many cultures and traditions that are harmful to our animals or humans, we've learned to give them up for more humane actions. Just as child marriage and slavery used to be tradition, humans have since learned that this practice is cruel and should be given up.

5 LIGHTENING MYTHS THAT COULD KILL YOU

When it comes to staying safe from lightning strikes, everything you think you know is probably wrong. That's the word from weather experts, who worry that outdated advice and persistent myths about thunder and lightning storms may be backfiring, putting people in danger instead of protecting them from harm. 1. Golfers are most at risk of getting hit. Not true. In 6 years Fishermen accounted for more than three times as many fatalities as golfers — and camping and boating each chalked up almost twice as many deaths as golf.

2. The "30/30 rule" can keep you safe. It's been years since experts relied on the 30/30

rule, which went like this: If it takes less than 30 seconds to hear thunder after seeing a lightning flash, lightning is close enough to pose a threat, go indoors. And, after the storm ends, wait 30 minutes before resuming outdoor activities. Instead, the new advice is just to go inside either a substantial shelter or a hard-topped metal vehicle at the first sound of thunder. Once there, experts still recommend waiting a half-hour before going back outside.

3. If you're caught outside, assume the "lightning squat." The idea was to squat down low with your two feet together," Jensenius said. "Some had you putting your hands over your head or your ears, basically to get yourself into a ball." But that's also wrong. People are endangered as much by ground lighting as they are by a direct strike. For instance, lightning can hit a tree and then spread along the surface of the earth. If you're crouching on the ground, you're likely to get hit. Again, the best advice is to head to shelter at the first sign of a storm.

4. Just go ahead with your plans during a lightning storm. The biggest mistake most people make is not being willing to cancel or postpone activities when dangerous weather crops up. Men, who make up more than 80% of lightning fatalities, are notoriously unwilling to postpone a hike or head back to shore on a fishing trip. But that stubbornness may be a deadly decision.

5. You'll hear a storm in time to get to safety. People are able to hear thunder from about 10 miles away. But any number of factors can interfere with the warning. In many cases you can't hear it that far because of background noise, you won't hear it if you're near a motorway or in a crowd at a football game. And if the wind is blowing, it would muffle the sound

Bottom line: Don't take chances with lightning. The odds of being struck may be one in a million in a given year and one in 10,000 over a lifetime, but it's better not to be that one.
