

Killarney man brings Fitzgerald's story to life

Talented Killarney author Patrick O'Sullivan Greene, who has penned a fascinating book on the life and times of The Great Gatsby writer F Scott Fitzgerald, has said there is strong anecdotal evidence that the great American wordsmith had Kerry roots.

There has been suggestions that Fitzgerald's family can traced to Horse Island off Ballinskelligs and research is ongoing to determine if the famous novelist, essayist and short story writer gave any indication of his Kerry connection during his lifetime.

Patrick O'Sullivan Greene, formerly of New Street, Killarney and now residing in Beaufort, is the author of Gatsby: Death of an Irishman which was released in March to coincide with the 100th anniversary of publication of Fitzgerald's most famous work.

O'Sullivan Greene's research found that Fitzgerald (1896-1940) was initially deeply ashamed of his Irish connection but his views softened when he took an interest in revolutionary politics.

The Killarney man's book guides the reader through F Scott Fitzgerald's troubled $upbringing, his\, quest for\, status, his\, ambivalence$ towards his Irish heritage, the socio-political climate of early 20th-century America and the careless jazz era excesses portrayed in The Great Gatsby.

The book peels back the intricate layers of Fitzgerald's character, revealing the underlying themes of identity and self-rejection in his work, his shifting views of Irish issues and how his personal battles influenced his writing and contributed to his tragic life.

Patrick O'Sullivan Greene will deliver what promises to be an engaging talk on the life and times of F Scott Fitzgerald in the ANAM Arts and Cultural Centre in Killarney on Thursday, July 3 at 6.45pm.

Part of the Celebration of Irish and American

Friendship programme, the free lecture is titled Revolution, Rejection and Revival and it will mark a celebration of 100 years of The Great


The event will also include a glamorous 1920's dance spectacular, tuition on how to dance the Charleston and a live performance by Killarney's own Liberace, Jack Patrick Healy. The master of ceremonies for the event will be Radio Kerry's Brendan Fuller.

The author will also share the story of how F Scott Fitzgerald's grandson, Thomas Manhan, came to Ireland to learn Irish following his graduation in 1964.


Patrick O'Sullivan Greene's works include Revolution at the Waldorf (2022) and Crowdfunding the Revolution (2020).

A qualified chartered accountant, he has worked in finance for most of his career and is back in his native Killarney after spells in Dublin, London, New York and France.

He has presented at the Dublin Book Festival, the American Irish Historical Society in New York, the Princess Grace Irish Library in Monaco and at the national conference of the American Conference for Irish Studies.

KILLARNEY STUDENTS Present Climate App to Rotary Club

Two Killarney students, Keira Geaney and Abbie O'Sullivan, were warmly welcomed by the Killarney Rotary Club at their weekly lunch meeting in the Great Southern Hotel last week.

Currently studying Political Science and Government at University College Cork (UCC), Keira and Abbie were invited to speak about My Carbon Buddy, a climate-conscious app they developed during Transition Year at St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary School. The app is designed to track individual carbon footprints and is being tailored for use by environmentally aware businesses, particularly in the aviation sector.

My Carbon Buddy has already garnered accolades, winning awards at both the BT Young Scientist Exhibition and SciFest.

"We were delighted to welcome Abbie and Keira to the lunch at the Great Southern Hotel," said Ciara Irwin, President of the Killarney Rotary Club. "The girls are no strangers to us, having participated in our Youth Leadership Programme. Abbie even represented our club in Strasbourg in 2023."

Now working full-time on the app, Keira

and Abbie are part of the 2025 Student Inc.programme, Ireland's flagship student entrepreneurship accelerator. Hosted at the Tom Crean Business Centre in Tralee, the programme began its 13-week summer session on May 26, bringing together 90 student entrepreneurs from nine higher education institutions.

This year's cohort includes 11 teams and 65 solo entrepreneurs, with a 40/60 gender split and an even balance between business-humanities and science-engineering disciplines. Participants receive €4,000 in seed funding, along with mentoring, industryled workshops, and expert coaching to develop their startups.

Beyond their entrepreneurial efforts, both Keira and Abbie serve on the National Youth Council of Ireland. They are currently in Slovenia, representing UCC in a shadow cabinet for the European Union, helping to shape youth policies across the EU.

Keira is the daughter of Linda Bartlett and Bernard Geaney, and Abbie is the daughter of Aisling Crosbie and John O'Sullivan.

Jackie's bridge described as a 'fitting tribute'

It was a project very close to his heart during his high-profile political life and now his name will be forever associated with it.

The landmark Barraduff Bridge – on the busy road from Killarney to Mallow – has been dedicated to the memory of colourful Kerry TD Jackie Healy-Rae who campaigned long and hard for a new structure to be built there.

The long-awaited replacement bridge, located at what had been a notorious accident blackspot, was close to the top of the nononsense Independent TD's famous €100 million deal, agreed with the then Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern, in return for his support after the 2007 general election.

It is understood that the Kilgarvan politician had initially sought €4 million for a new super bridge but Healy-Rae later agreed to the existing bridge being widened and the road realigned at a considerably reduced cost of €1.5 million.

The new structure, which crosses over the Owneycree River and was unveiled in 2011, now has a plaque dedicated to the politician with the trademark tartan peaked cap and it has been described as a fitting tribute shortly after the 10th anniversary of his passing last December.

Fittingly, the honour of unveiling the specially inscribed memorial on Thursday evening fell to Jackie Healy-Rae's granddaughter, Maura, who was officiating at one of her last engagements as Cathaoirleach of Killarney Municipal District Council.

It was she that first suggested the bridge dedication and the proposal received unanimous backing from her Killarney Municipal District Council colleagues.

"This plaque and the dedication of this bridge serves to recognise Jackie's contribution as an elected public representative over a period of time that spanned 40 years," Cllr Healy-Rae said. She recalled her grandfather as being straight

talking, charismatic, witty, colourful, shrewd and serious when the situation demanded but, above all else, he had an ability to connect with people, his constituents trusted him, and he treated their concerns or problems as his own.

"It is very difficult to encapsulate his political career and the contribution he made to this area, and indeed the county, but I guess the greatest compliment that can be paid to Jackie is that when he achieved the unimaginable in getting elected to Dáil Éireann in 1997, he never forgot the people that put him there.

"He demanded and ensured funding was provided for key pieces of infrastructure in Kerry which he believed had been neglected – this bridge being an example of such," Cllr Healy-Rae added.

She said many criticised Jackie for the famous list of projects and schemes he presented in

return for government support but when asked towards the end of his career if he would have done anything different in this respect, Jackie replied: 'No, I'd do a hell of a lot more of the same'

"That was a key attribute of his – he meant what he said and said what he meant. It didn't matter to him what the media or his political opponents said if he felt he was doing right by his constituents."

The Healy-Rae family and supporters were out in force for the unveiling with Minister of State Michael and Deputy Danny both celebrating their father's great legacy.

Also in attendance were outgoing Mayor of Kerry, Cllr Breandán Fitzgerald, Killarney Municipal District Manager Angela McAllen and Killarney Municipal District Engineer John Abern

EMPTY BUILDINGS EVERYWHERE, AND NO PLACE TO LIVE

The National Parks and Wildlife Service said it has six houses in Killarney that are "uninhabitable". These are in the vicinity of the regions's main tourist attraction, Muckross House. Yet none of the "uninhabitable" houses is on the Kerry County Council derelict site list. One of the houses is used for bats. At this stage I think the whole approach by the State to housing is itself batty. The full extent of the vacant property owned by the HSE in Kerry was released on foot of a query by Sinn Fein councillor Deirdre Ferris.

The 14 vacant HSE properties include town centre buildings in Tralee, at Pembroke Street and Denny Street; the old Dingle Hospital and Workhouse; The St Finan's Hospital, land and gate House in Killarney; health centres in Dingle, Kenmare, Ballinskelligs, Waterville and Rathmore as well as radio stations in Knocknagoshel in the north of the county and Clahane in the west.

Then Pa Daly TD found vacant OPW properties, in Kerry. There are 7 former coastguard cottages on Valentia Island alone. Garda stations in Abbeydorney near Tralee, and Brosna are lying idle with 12 years.

In Killarney we have the prime "vacant" ¾ acre site on the Muckross Road. It was one of two sites bought in 1981 for a Department of Justice if memory serves. One was sold off. Apparently there are "title issues" to be resolved before disposal.

I have said it previously, I think the housing emergency now is such, the housing ministry should be handed over to Sinn Fein. We already have independents in Government who are at the same time wishing to say they are in opposition. Quite frankly, there are too many

vested interests anchored in property in Fine Gael, Fianna Fail and the independents.

CONGRATULATIONS TO THE NEW MAYOR - BUT A TOUGH YEAR AHEAD FOR THE COUNCIL

IN KILLARNEY

Congratulations to the new Cathaoirleach of Killarney MD Martin Grady. We like to say mayor even though Killarney is not technically entitled to the title.

Mayor Martin is a third generation local politician. And congratulations to the vice-chair John O'Donoghue whose uncle was also a councillor, Micheal Gleeson, a former mayor. Killarney's Cllr Marie Moloney, a former senator, is Kerry vice-chair so well done to Marie too. Martin and John and Marie will be faced with tough decisions requiring strong leadership.

Number one is the Áras Phádraig primary care and theatre complex. That has to be voted on again. A passionate campaign has risen against it. Just why it has to be voted on again has not been fully explained.

Mayor Martin was not present for the previous vote; his colleagues all approved the plans and Martin has said he may vote against it primarily because this is council land, not HSEs. Yes, it seems ridiculous that the HSE own so much land, while they need council land to build their primary care centre.

But sites including St Finan's have been mooted before for primary care centres and they failed. There is also this misunderstanding going around that the Áras was gifted to the people of Killarney. It was was bought by the council, is my understanding. And surely a medical centre for its people, is a fit purpose, whether it was a gift or not? Councillors have to ascertain basic full information for the public. This is true also of the Green Lawn car park proposal which to me is the biggest disaster of all and has upset

more people than the Áras proposal. And with the Aras, development worth 21 million euro is at stake, around three quarters of which is under the Urban Regeneration Fund, itself underpinned by European money. Will Killarney councillors forgo the opportunity of a much needed small theatre, a much needed primary care centre, because of a head of steam over one State agency giving land to another state agency? Seriously? The design includes plant rooms and is much better than some of the awful buildings in much of modern Killarney, even those on Lewis Road /College Street.

My big issue is the trees - they need to be preserved. And the theatre needs to seat 300. A perfect combination would have been a badly needed large new library and theatre on the site. But none of our officials or councilors seems to have come up with that. Could we eventually have all three perhaps - library, theatre and primary care centre? Surely no one is arguing a theatre - and by extension those frequenting it - are too precious to have a medical centre as its neighbour. In ancient Carthage which I once visited , the baths, the library and medical areas were all together.

Big questions lie ahead for our Mayor and his councillors.

Word had not got out. And there were very few media present. But it was the Edge who took centre stage at the Gleneagle arena. It was a thrill and a half to meet with him, even briefly.

Now whether he will play on the stage might be the next question. He seemed very moved by the whole event. They are joyous occasions. But there are questions to be asked. One such is the level of English language skills demanded of new Irish citizens and front line workers.

Ireland is an outlier along with Cyprus and Sweden when it comes to not demanding language skills. The stipulation in all other countries is in place so new citizens especially those in front line work can participate fully in their new country. We keep putting this question off. I asked Justice Minister Jim

O'Callaghan about poor levels of English at all levels in nursing homes and hospitals.

He was confident most of those he would meet on Monday would have good English.

Administratively, it would be very difficult to bring in a language test, as there would have to be testing and assessments, the minister said.

Of course, the big unspoken elephant in the room is the Irish language. Irish is our first language. Putting in a provision for basic English only language skills would rattle this skeleton, sources tell me.

Meanwhile a number of candidates at the citizen ceremonies I approached could not communicate with me. One woman had not one word. Another man here with 16 years had little English either and needed an assistant to translate my question, help him fill forms and read the instructions.

I just wonder how this lack of basic communications skills will end up for all of us, new and old?

OVER 80 PEOPLE TO CLIMB CARRAUNTOOHIL ON PENULTIMATE DAY!

More than 80 participants are expected to climb Carrauntoohil this Friday, 27th June, commencing 10.30am. The assent will be the penultimate of five climbs over five consecutive days in memory of a young man who tragically lost his life in a car accident last August.

Family, friends, and GAA teammates of the late James McNeive, from Knock, Co. Mayo, a muchloved member of the communities he touched, are preparing to honour his memory, from tomorrow June 24th until 28th through the Summit for James – 5 Peak Challenge less than a year after the 28-year-old primary school teacher's tragic death. A core group of 30 dedicated climbers, including James's family and former teammates from the local Aghamore GAA club where James played, will take on all five peaks across the UK and Ireland. Over 400 people are expected to support the final climb on Croagh Patrick in James's home county, including architect and TV personality Dermot Bannon. Remembering James, cherished by his pupils, their parents and colleagues in the schools where he taught, Dermot Bannon said, "James was an amazing person and was special to our family, as he was my son's teacher."

The Summit for James - 5 Peak Challenge will raise funds for several worthy causes which were close to James's heart including the Irish Kidney Association, the charity chosen as his younger brother, Matthew, age 27, has spent his entire twenties on dialysis while waiting for a second kidney transplant.

In an extraordinary show of determination and resilience, Matthew plans to take on three of the five mountain peaks as part of this 5-day event. For two of the days, Matthew will have to attend dialysis treatment at Beaumont Hospital, yet he remains committed to pushing forward with three of the climbs.



HOUSE PRICES RISE IN KERRY


The price of the average second-hand three-bed semi in County Kerry has increased to €357,500, up 0.7pc from €355,000 in the last three months, according to a national survey by Real Estate Alliance.

Across the county, the average time taken to sell fell by one week to an average of five, the Q2 REA Average House Price Index shows.

Average Killarney prices were steady this quarter at €395,000, with time to sell currently five weeks, while Tralee prices rose 1.6pc to €320,000, with time taken to sell at five weeks.

"We are seeing a trend where more and more landlords are selling and exiting the market, while no new investors are entering into the market," said Donal Culloty of REA Coyne and Culloty, Killarney.

The survey shows that across the county, 50pc of purchasers were first-time buyers, while a total of 30pc of sales in the county this quarter were attributed to landlords leaving the market. Additionally, agents across the county reported that the BER ratings of properties saw A-rated properties command 10pc price increases in comparison to comparable C-rated properties.

or the second year running, the centuriesold bonds between the people of Killarney and the people of America will be appropriately acknowledged in a Celebration of Irish American Friendship on July 3/4.

With the 100-year anniversary of the opening of Killarney National Park – gifted to Killarney by the Bourn-Vincent and McShain families – scheduled for 2032, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce initiated a programme in 2023 to acknowledge that landmark occasion and to celebrate past and present links.

One of the highlights of this year's programme, commencing at 5.00pm on Friday, July 4, will see the remarkable life story of John McShain, the man who built Washington and then went on to buy Killarney, re-enacted in word, music and song and by multi-media at the ANAM Arts and Cultural Centre.

The top class production, scripted by Noel P O'Sullivan and produced, directed and narrated by performing arts school owner Fiona Crowley, will chart the life and times of

the McShain family, their time in Killarney and their very special legacy in the town.

Showcasing the finest of Killarney talent, the event will feature the magnificent voice of Mary Culloty O'Sullivan, the musical genius of Tomy Flaherty, the thought-provoking poetry of Tim Buckley and so much more.

A native of Philadelphia and the youngest son of Derry-born Catholic emigrants, construction tycoon John McShain was the main contractor in the \$4.25 million reconstruction of the White House during the Truman years, from 1949-1952.

He was also responsible for the construction of the Pentagon, the Jefferson Memorial, the Roosevelt Library at Hyde Park, the JFK Centre for Performing Arts, Washington National Airport and many other notable US landmarks. A regular visitor to Killarney with his wife Mary and their daughter, Sr Pauline, they acquired some magnificent properties, including Killarney House in the 1950s.

In 1973, the McShains gifted Innisfallen Island,

Ross Castle and 8,000 acres of parkland, mountains and lake to the State and an agreement was reached that, when they passed on, Killarney House and Gardens would be given to the Irish Government for a nominal sum.

John McShain died in 1989 and when his wife, Mary, passed away in 1998, their daughter Pauline, a US based nun, carried out her father's wishes and handed the keys and the deeds of the property to the people.



Muckross House Welcomes Delegation from American Twin, Filoli Estate

Killarney's iconic Muckross House and Gardens recently welcomed a distinguished delegation from its American twin, the Filoli Country House in California, also known as the Bourn-Roth Estate.

The visit saw representatives from the historic Filoli Estate spend the day exploring Muckross House and the surrounding Killarney National Park, strengthening ties between the two heritage properties.

The link between the estates stems from their shared history: both were once owned by the wealthy Bourn family, whose legacy continues to shape the cultural and architectural heritage of these landmark residences.

The 26-strong group of Filoli friends and donors, led by President and CEO Kara Newport, travelled from the US to visit the Gardens of Ireland last week and, on Thursday, they enjoyed a day-long visit to William Bourn's former Killarney residence which inspired the Filoli project.

Set on 16 acres of formal gardens surrounded by a 654-acre estate, Filoli is a historical landmark in California listed on the National Register of Historic Places in the US. It was built between 1915 and 1917 for William Bowers Bourn II and his wife, Agnes.

Around that time, Bourn regularly took his family to visit Europe and while on an Atlantic crossing in 1906, his daughter Maud met Arthur Rose Vincent, from Cloonlara in Co Clare.

They were married four years later and Bourn purchased Muckross House and its surrounding 11,000 acres, on the Lakes of Killarney, for their daughter and new son-in-law and immediately began plans to develop the gardens.

The Bourns travelled frequently to Ireland to visit their beloved daughter and soon fell in love with the local landscape. William's affection for his daughter and Killarney was so strong that he decided to build a Californian home reminiscent of his daughter's Killarney estate.

They commissioned the construction of the Georgian style Filoli Country House and they

engaged the highly acclaimed Willis Polk as the principal architect with instructions to use Muckross House as a model.

Nestled at the edge of towering oak and redwood-forests in the coastal foothills, just 30 miles south of San Francisco, there are amazing similarities between the 43-room stately residence and the house at Muckross.

It served as one of their residences from 1917 until the time of both William and Agnes Bourn's deaths in 1936. The estate was sold the following year to William P Roth and Lurline Matson Roth, heiress to the Matson Navigation Company, and in 1975 they donated the estate in its entirety to the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

The Filoli estate operates as a private, non-profit organisation with its own board of governors, staff and volunteers and it attracts in the region of 400,000 visitors per year.

It has been the set of a number of Hollywood films and, most famously, it was the mansion seen from the air in the opening credits of the smash hit television drama series Dynasty.

Like Muckross House, Filoli is run by a Board of Trustees with a very significant National Parks input. The Trustees of Muckross House are a not-for-profit charity organisation which runs the enterprises in order to preserve the crafts and to preserve and maintain the history, heritage and folklife of Kerry.

All funding generated on site is spent on achieving those goals as well as on the maintenance of the house and on enhancing the visitor experience for visitors.

The group visiting Filoli's twin residence in Muckross – joined by the bond that was William Bourn – was formally welcomed by Muckross House Trustee Sandra Dunlea and Denis Reidy along with Pat Dawson of the National Parks and Wildlife Service.

They enjoyed a tour of the historic house accompanied by head guide Anne Tangney, a private viewing of the amazing art on show with library and research staff, a trip around the magnificently manicured gardens and a visit to Muckross Traditional Farm with head gardener Gerry Murphy.

Established in 2024 after an initial public meeting drew 145 attendees, the Shed has become a thriving hub for retired women aged 55 and over, offering weekly activities including yoga, line dancing, social talks, day trips, and peer support. Operating as a non-profit, it now welcomes 70 to 90 women each week.

- 2 spring onions, finely chopped
- 1 green chilli, deseeded and finely chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, crushed
- 5cm piece fresh root ginger, peeled and grated
- 3½ level tbsp mild curry powder*
- 1tbsp chilli powder
- 3 tosp chopped fresh coriander, plus leaves and sprigs to serve
- 3 tbsp fat-free natural Greek yogurt

- 1 large onion, finely chopped
- · 2 large red peppers, deseeded and sliced
- 2 tbsp tomato purée
- · 400g can chopped tomatoes

Put the pork mince in a large mixing bowl with the spring onions, green chill, 1 crushed garlic clove, half the grated ginger, 1 tissp curry powder, ½ tsp chilli powder, the chopped corlander, yogurt and a pinch of salt. Mix well with your hands, then roll into balls. Spray a large non-stick saucepan with

low-calorie cooking spray and put it over a medium-high heat. Put the meatballs in the pan and cook for around 5 minutes, turning until lightly browned all over, then transfer to a plate. Add the onion, red peppers and 3 tbsp

While that's going on, cook the rice according to the pack instructions. Divide the curry and rice between 4 bowls, then top with the coriander leaves and sprigs



Blurred vision can also be a symptom of non-optical conditions such as a diabetes, a stroke and preeclampsia (a condition caused by high blood pressure in pregnancy).

What are the symptoms of blurred vision?

Blurred vision is hazy and unfocussed, as though you were looking through an oily film and you feel you need to rub your eyes to get things back into focus.



It can affect your entire field of vision or your peripheral vision (the edges of your vision), and can occur in one eye or both. You may not realise that you have blurred vision in one eye until you do something that requires shutting your other eye – for example, doing your make up. This is because your brain provides compensation.

How do you treat blurred vision?

As blurred vision has many possible causes, the treatment will depend on the condition. If the blurring is recurring or ongoing, you should book an eye examination. This will investigate the cause recommend suitable treatment or refer you to an appropriate specialist.

If you think it may be one of the symptoms of a serious medical condition such as stroke or pre-eclampsia, you should seek urgent medical

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"Pay Boost Proposal for Childcare Staff is a Win for Workers, Parents, and Children" - Deputy Michael Cahill

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has today warmly welcomed new proposals recommending a 10% pay increase for Early Years Educators and School-Age Childcare Practitioners, hailing it as a major victory for staff, families, and the future of high-quality childcare in Ireland.

The proposed increase, recommended by the Joint Labour Committee, stands to benefit over 35,000 professionals working in early learning and care across the country.

"This is excellent news for childcare workers, parents, and children alike," Deputy Cahill said. Deputy Cahill, who has consistently advocated for improvements in the childcare sector, emphasised that better conditions for workers are key to improving access and quality for families.

"I have long said that we must value and retain the people at the heart of childcare. This pay increase is a clear and practical step towards professionalising the sector, attracting new talent, and ensuring that children continue to receive the best possible care and education," he stated.

The Government has earmarked €45 million in Core Funding to support these proposed increases without additional costs being passed on to parents, a move Deputy Cahill strongly supports.

"This announcement underlines our commitment to affordable, accessible childcare. We are easing pressure on families while also acknowledging the incredible dedication of childcare professionals," Deputy Cahill added. "Better pay means more workers, less turnover, and better outcomes for children. It's a win-win for everyone."

Deputy Cahill concluded by stating, "I commend the work of the Joint Labour Committee and all stakeholders involved in securing this proposal. I will continue to champion investment in early years and school-age care, because when we support those who support our children, we build a better Ireland for all."

Minister Healy-Rae announces a competitive public procurement procedure seeking tenders for the Provision of Children's and Young Person's Farm Safety Awareness Initiatives

Minister of State for Forestry, Farm Safety and Horticulture, Michael Healy-Rae, TD, is seeking proposals for projects which promote children's and young person's safety awareness on farms for the next five years.

Minister Healy-Rae said: "The Department is providing funding of €200,000 from its dedicated farm safety budget for 2025, with an option to extend the contract for a further four years. This tender will support initiatives that have the potential to make a real impact on farm safety and reduce the number of fatal and serious non-fatal incidents involving children and young people on Irish farms."

Announcing the competitive public procurement procedure and request for

tenders, Minister Healy-Rae said: "This request for tenders will support initiatives that promote a lifelong culture of farm safety from a young age. The successful initiatives will make an important contribution to changing attitudes to safety on Irish farms, not only by increasing farm safety awareness among children and young people, but also by encouraging conversations about farm safety among all generations in farming families."

Over the past ten years, 17 people under 18 years of age have died on Irish farms, accounting for almost 10% of all fatalities on farms. Children and young people are particularly vulnerable on farms as the workplace surrounds the family home.

BAN THEM OR CATER FOR THEM – but stop ignoring illegally parked campervans in Kerry

Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú, a leading member of the EU Tourism Taskforce, has called on local authorities across Ireland to grant more planning permissions for facilities for campervans or invest in municipal campervan parks where no private facilities exist.

Ní Mhurchú has accused local authorities of putting their head in the sand when it comes to the regulation of, and opportunity provided by, camper van tourism.

Ní Mhurchú says that Ireland is way behind the rest of Europe when it comes to facilities for campervans. According to Ní Mhurchú, it is leading to a situation where campervans are parking illegally by our beaches and in public car parks annoying local residents in our coastal communities and causing friction. "I would like to see more planning permissions given to camping and caravan parks and more supports for private existing campsites. Where no private facilities exist, local authorities should invest in modern basic facilities for campervan tourists that will allow them to dispose of waste, have showers, get water and power. Charge them a small fee for using these municipal camper van parks and reinvest that money back into the park"

According to Ní Mhurchú, illegally parked campervans are an eyesore at our beaches, "Where are those campervans dumping their waste, grey water, sewerage and where are they getting water and sanitation?"

Camper van tourists spend money in the local restaurant, the local shop and buy groceries in the local supermarket. They are a valuable part of our tourism offering and we should have specific facilities that they can use and stay in the area.

Ní Mhurchú emphasised that she is only advocating for municipal facilities to be provided where existing private campsites do not exist.

Ní Mhurchú will raise the issue with EU Tourism chief, EU Commissioner Apostolos Tzitzikostas when she meets with him in July. She will ask the EU Commissioner to consider EU funding supports to build these basic campervan facilities across Europe so that we can encourage a sustainable form of tourism that will reap rewards for coastal communities across Ireland and the EU

Campervan culture has exploded since Covid as it becomes an increasingly popular way for Europeans to holiday. Travelling by road can be a more sustainable approach to exploration and adventure.

BASIC INCOME FOR ARTISTS

"This special return service will make a real difference," Cahill added. "It's a common-sense


solution that recognises the passion and loyalty of Kerry supporters who are travelling in their thousands to back the team."


Deputy Cahill again thanked the supporters for their unity and strong backing of Kerry football, and praised the quick response from the relevant transport authorities.



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



KERRY FC 2-1 BRAY WANDERERS

Kerry FC were back at home this Friday ahead of a double game-week, which saw them first play host to third-placed Bray Wanderers in Tralee. Kerry FC came into the game off the back of a last-minute equaliser by the hands of Athlone Town last Friday night in the midlands. Still, it is not all bad for Kerry FC as they have only lost one of their previous six games, which came against league leaders Dundalk FC a month ago.

For Bray Wanderers, they lost last weekend away to Treaty United but remain firmly in third place, just eight points off the summit of the First Division league table and seven clear of fourth place. Bray's last win on the road came on the fourth of April, which would be a big factor in the minds of both sets of players heading into the game.

Kerry FC were still without Carl Mujaguzi and Joe Adams as they work back to full fitness from injury, and it would be a first league start of the season for Kennedy Amechi, who impressed with a goal off the bench last Friday night in Athlone.

It was a fantastic evening for League of Ireland football in the Kingdom and brought with it a huge atmosphere to Mounthawk Park on a special evening for the club which would be the one hundredth competitive game in Senior football for the Men's team, all it needed to cap off a special night was a victory.

FIRST HALF

Kerry FC had the dream start on the evening when Kennedy Amechi scored the fastest goal in the club's history inside just eleven seconds. From the kick-off, Sean McGrath played the ball back to Tim-Oliver Hiemer, who went route one and looked like it would be dealt with by the Bray defence. Amechi made himself and nuisance, and James Corcoran made a hash of his clearance, which gave Kennedy the perfect opportunity to slot the ball home into an empty net.

Eleven minutes in and Kerry FC were the most controlled of the two sides. A lovely move in





the attack opened up space for Oran Crowe to take on a shot, but it whistled wide of the near post of Corcoran. A let-off for the seagulls who started the game far from where they would have liked to have been.

The first half had very little to write home about and got quite fiery in the middle of the pitch instead of both eighteen yard boxes with four yellow cards being dished out in the space of twenty minutes by referee Oliver Moran.

Kerry FC went in at half time ahead and conveyed a very impressive opening forty-five minutes' performance, which would hopefully continue into the second half.

SECOND HALF

Five minutes into the second half, Bray Wanderers were awarded a penalty when goal scorer Kennedy Amechi took down Jamie Ryan. Oliver Moran showed no hesitation in pointing to the spot which Max Murphy dispatched with some vigour.

Bray started to push up the intensity and had a fine chance to turn the game on its head when Cian Curtis found Billy O'Neill in the box, but his header was kept out superbly by Tim-Oliver Hiemer.

Just seven minutes later, on the hour mark, Hiemer was on hand once again to keep out O'Neill one more time. The shot was at a tough angle, but he managed to get it off, and Tim did brilliantly to see off the danger.

With thirteen minutes to go, Daniel Okwute had a great opportunity to regain the lead for the hosts, but his curling effort outside the area didn't have enough dip and it went over the crossbar

In desperation to get a winner in the eightyfourth minute, centre back Abel Alabi was brought on up front to replace Daniel Okwute, with the idea of the big man making himself a nuisance, and he did so to huge effect. He created a chance which went out for a corner and pounced on a mistake from Corcoran,



which allowed Alabi to head the ball into an empty net, regaining Kerry's lead with just three minutes remaining of normal time.

Kerry FC would see out the four minutes added in injury time and pick up a huge win and a first-ever win against Bray. A superb performance from the Kingdom, who now have a quick turnaround as they head to St. Colman's Park on Monday evening to face Cobh Ramblers.

Time to look at Modular Homes to deal with the Housing Crisis

Delivering the extremely large numbers of Housing Units set down in the Programme for Government will be more than challenging in the present 5 year term, if we don't embrace new initiatives, according to Kerry Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill. Deputy Cahill is calling for a diverse number of solutions, including Modular Homes. The Rossbeigh man has raised the issue regularly in Dáil Éireann and he is calling for urgent, focussed action, because housing is the subject of the majority of the representations made to him and his son, Kerry County Councillor Tommy Cahill

"The traditional house build will always be with us, but in this time of a great shortage of housing for a rapidly growing population, we need to look at a range of solutions. We need all types of housing, including affordable homes. We need Local Authorities to source and deliver Low Cost Sites. We also need put significant resources towards the delivery of Modular Homes, because they cost so much less than traditional houses and can be delivered much more quickly" stated Deputy Cahill, Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Older People and Tourism.

"Modular homes are not only cheaper to provide and can be erected in double quick time, but they are also reputed to be easier and cheaper to heat and maintain. I have spoken to many young couples and their parents who agree that Modular Homes can be a big part of the solution to this housing shortage. These houses have up to 80 years of a lifespan and would appear to fulfil the requirements of young families starting out or even an older couple downsizing" said Deputy Cahill.

"But the crux of the matter is that we need to move now and forge ahead with acquiring sites and erecting homes now. There can be no dilly dallying, no more talking about it. I will keep pushing the relevant Ministers for Housing, Finance, Local Government, Public Expenditure etc and we will get this done" said the Rossbeigh man.

"Sites exist on lands owned by semi-state bodies and other organisations, that are not being utilised at present for any productive purpose and I feel they can be targeted quickly and easily to ease a lot of the pressure here. It is up to the Local Authorities to identify them, acquire them and either erect houses on them or make them available to couples who can do so themselves" said Deputy Cahill.

"WE need to give our people choices, affordable housing, social housing, private housing, low cost sites and modular homes, we need to zone plenty land, Uisce Eireann must provide infrastructure such as Wastewater treatment facilities, including Constructed Wetlands in our unsecured villages as it is a much cheaper and speedier solution and developers must be allowed provide workable Wastewater treatment facilities" stated the Kerry TD.

"Our people need homes, not excuses and I believe good quality Modular Housing is how we should address this now. Young couples and indeed their parents have said to me in Killorglin, Killarney, Cahersiveen, Dingle, Kenmare, Castleisland and in every corner of County Kerry that they are more than happy to build or buy a modular home as they are affordable and they can secure mortgages. I am convinced that this is the answer to the Housing shortage at this time" added Michael Cahill TD.

HIT AND MISS KERRY SEE OFF CAVAN CHALLENGE

All Ireland Preliminary Quarter-Final


KERRY 3-20 CAVAN 1-17

Kerry had been coming along an easy route for a lot of this year's campaign. I don't think anyone can really argue that a lot of the counties in contention for the National League title weren't exactly going all-out for it. Since then we haven't met any Division One team. Cork gave us a great game of it the first time out and nothing easy the second time, either, but realistically we haven't really had our collar pinned in comparison to other leading contenders for Sam.

And then we ran into Meath last weekend. And I mean, ran straight into a brick wall of a Meath team. Muscle, pace, power....you'd give them the edge. As for hunger....the disparity there was seriously worrying. Kerry lose out on the week's rest after coming second in the group - I still wasn't worried about Cavan too much. That's not to be disrespectful but their concession rate coming into this was just too big and their scoring rate, while decent, didn't look likely to make up the difference. But that week's rest.....I really think that the schedule is overloaded and stamina and panel depth is what won Armagh last year's All Ireland (that's not to doubt that they kicked some phenomenal scores as well). Can we match it? Moreover, do we really believe deep down that we can match it? I'm not asking about your personal opinion, I'm wondering about the players. I wanted a statement victory here. A real "we had a bad day at the office; get over it" kind of feeling. Did we get that?

Cavan ran at Kerry straight from the throw-in and won a free tapped over by Paddy Lynch. I'm afraid I think we are a little vulnerable to that direct running – a lot of people will be tHinking of Donie O'Sullivan or Tim Kennelly; I'd have Liam Flaherty in that company as well. If you are running with those lads nearby, I advise you to be running away. I will say that the old bugbear of the lack of a defined tackle has been an ongoing conversation since at least the sixties. Nine times out of ten, when a forward runs into a defender, the forward gets the free.

Diarmuid O'Connor had started around the middle, but he came off holding his shoulder after just three minutes. A lot of criticism of management for starting him. I wouldn't be



that hasty in judgement. There's no way that you could throw him in against Armagh without playing minutes under his belt. It cost Mayo in 1997 as well and Brian Cody with King Henry in an All Ireland Final, but it's one of those that if it works, you look like a genius.

Graham O'Sullivan won the kick-out and finished the move himself with a point. Pádraig Faulkner won a free for Lynch to fire over again – it's not begrudgery, but I really did think that one was soft enough. David replied in kind after a foul on Brian Ó Beaglaoich.

And then the big man cut loose. Turned his hapless marker, sliced in along the endline, and struck a bullet into the far corner of the net. Are there five players in the whole country that could do that? Dylan Geaney calmly fisted over another score. This was the purposeful Kerry I had been hoping to see.

Seán O'Shea narrowly wide with a great two pointer effort. Brian Ó Beaglaoich fouled, but again Seán's effort drifts just wide of the post. That's not criticising Seán; even with David's final tally, I thought Seán was my man of the match for his tireless work in the engine room. Mark O'Shea and Seán O'Brien both looked completely revitalised compared to last week as well. This time, it was the opposition who were struggling on their own kick-outs. They lost Niall Carolan to a black card as well, a bit of a careless tackle on Conor Geaney.

Tom O'Sullivan with a great effort. Good work by Joe O'Connor and Gavin White is racing onto it at the back post – somehow, he clips it off the post and wide. Gavin was another to have a good game, himself and Tom O'Sullivan got their drives forward to telling effect, but that should have been a goal. David Clifford with a two point effort.....just wide. The football was brilliant, but the scoring return? It was giving me twitchy vibes, that's zero out of a potential 1-6.

That's more like it, a great two pointer from Seán O'Shea after a fine catch by Joe O'Connor. Conor Geaney quickly added another. This is Kerry in full flight. David Clifford with a magnificent two-pointer despite being tackled and off balance. David is at his peak here....even watching it, sunglasses should be advised. David in a practised one-two with Paul Murphy and again Liam Brady has no chance from close range. Superb finish off his left leg, clipped the post and in. 2-6 to 0-2.

Paddy Lynch with a free after a foul on the returned Niall O'Carolan. Their first score in a quarter of an hour, but Seán O'Shea replied in kind after a foul on Tom O'Sullivan. Joe O'Conor almost got in for a score, but in fairness Ciarán Brady made a superb tackle.

Joe made a great turnover himself and David Clifford was on hand to split the posts. The Kerry players were looking to David as their first option more often than not. Wouldn't you?

Seán O'Shea on the end of a great move for a two pointer. David gathered from Conor Geaney and swivelled, but Liam Brady did well to deflect it. Dylan Geaney notches a point. Cavan just can't find their forward line or penetrate Kerry's arc, not least because of our workrate, and they can't quite plug their own leaks. That said, Kerry did have another three wides before the break, and they did get caught for a two up rule breach (no team can be doing that from now on; the air is a lot thinner at this level) and Lynch added another two pointer free just before the whistle.

Half-time Kerry 2-12 Cavan 0-8.

Kerry had left behind almost as many chances as scores, but Cavan definitely looked outclassed. David Clifford fisted over to open the second half scoring. Straight from the kick-out Kerry came again, Conor Geaney with a great goal effort, but Liam Brady saved and Cavan (Oisín Kiernan, I think?) got a deflection on the follow-up attempt for a '45, with Shane Ryan's effort tailing off.

A foul on Pádraig Faulkner saw Paddy Lynch slot another free.

Tom O'Sullivan with another surging run before giving it to David Clifford – again, Liam Brady

ade himself big for the save. Joe O'Connor tried to fist in the rebound but he had no room to manoeuvre and Brady blocked again. Shane Ryan did convert this '45 and David Clifford added another point.

Cavan on the attack but that was great tracking by Seán O'Shea to steal it and he sends a kick pass to David Clifford – Kerry's kick passing was effective all day. David's effort whizzed narrowly wide of goal.

Long ball in touched on by Pádraig Faulkner and Evan Crowe is on hand in the square to fist it to the net. Very much on hand – the attacking player cannot be inside the square before the final pass is made. Since 2012 he can be in the square when that ball arrives, but not before the pass is initiated. Unless, of course, the referee and umpires don't spot it. Cavan got away with one there. It isn't worth an argument in a game like this, but in a tight encounter..... ah, well. Let's not be fomenting unnecessary controversy.

Jason McLoughlin with a great two pointer. Cavan were beginning to look sharper. Pádraig Faulkner was cutting wreck, and a defensive slip allowed him to snare the ball and drive at goal. His rocket flew just over rather than under the crossbar. That's 1-3 on the trot from Cavan. It's Kerry who look a bit rattled now. Six points in it

Spare a thought for the Kildare supporters. Next weekend is a step up for Kerry, a big one. We have taken hits, but are holed below the waterline? I've seen Jack O'Connor relish the underdogs tag before. Dublin in 2009 is the famous one. Nobody outside of Kerry and few inside thought Kerry could eat Dublin that day, given how we were struggled. It was the famous game of the "startled earwigs".

KERRY 2-20 KILDARE 0-4

Kerry's hard-fought victory away to Down last weekend put them clear at the top of the

group and guaranteed a knock-out game. Top team in either group goes straight into a semifinal, while second and third play off in quarter-finals. Kerry had beaten Carlow and Down, and with four points already in the bag, would still have been ahead of Down on head to head. Nonetheless, momentum is crucial and a good home performance was still required by John Madden's side. And to say that they produced one is an under-statement.

Kildare had not been going well and a young Lilywhite outfit simply had no answer to Kerry's precision and power, and certainly they had no way of stopping the deadly long range missiles from Kerry joint captain Patrice Diggin in particular. She opened the scoring almost instantly with one such long range strike and quickly added a free won by Jackie Horgan. She did have one effort curled wide but added two more the points in quick succession, the second after an excellent pass by Kate Lynch. Jackie Horgan set up Ann Marie Leen for a fine score to make it 0-5 to 0-0.

Kildare were trying to send long ball into an isolated forward line, but Kerry were quite simply in complete control and clearing their lines comfortably.

Patrice Diggin and Jackie Collins, the joint captains, both picked off points – Caoimhe Spillane had actually made a great break into space for a goal chance for the second point. Patrice Diggin, in unstoppable form now, clipped over another free and won the puck-out to return it between the posts. In the twentieth minute Ellen O'Donoghue gathered from Jackie Horgan and neatly sliced straight through the defence. She tried flicking it past the keeper, who did well to stop it, but Kate Lynch pounced with a natural predator's instinct to knock it to the net. Kerry didn't score again, despite a few chances, but more significantly, nor did Kildare. Half-time Kerry 1-9 Kildare 0-0

Whatever slender hopes Kildare had of relied on a fast start for their side. Unfortunately for hem, Kerry's hunger was far from sated and they put a ferocious press of Kildare's belesgured defence, forcing enough turnovers so that Kate Lynch finally had space for a rocket of a shot that gave the keeper no chance. Kildare did at least get on the board shortly after, Caoimhe Ní Bhuirceál slotting over a '45. Patrice Diggin replied straight away with a free but Kildare's Laura Edwards soon picked off her first point from play. Was there a danger of a contest breaking out here?

Not really, to be honest. Kerry weren't long wrapping matters up with ten points on the

trot. Patrice Diggin coolly took her tally to an even dozen with four more frees. Jackie Horgan and Ann Marie Leen scored a second point each. Ellen O'Donoghue and Ruth O'Connor (a superb score) joined them on the scoreboard. Even Niamh Leen, linchpin of an unshakeable defensive unit, had the luxury of coming up the field to send over a great point before Jackie Horgan took her own tally to three and Kerry's lead to 2-20 to 0-2. Kildare did finish with two frees from Ní Bhuirceál but any competitive element was long gone from Austin Stack Park by then.

That won't matter to Kerry. More importantly, they showed real hunger throughout - in fact, it has been the theme of a fantastic group stage for them. They got game time into a lot of players, with players coming off the bench to add impetus in all three games, including a number of championship debuts. Crucially, they haven't picked up any long-term injuries and now have time to recharge the batteries. The road is about to take a steep uphill curve now that Kerry are down to the last four. Kerry bowed out last year by the narrowest of margins to Kilkenny in extra-time at this stage. Can they go a step further? With the greatest respect to a young and rising Kildare side, the next step will be much harder, but Kerry certainly look well

She will join fellow new signings Maisie Burnham and Tara Cousins in due course before the start of the Women's Superleague season in October.

INTEGRATE

It's not easy integrating into college life if you're making a daily return commute from Kerry to Limerick or Cork. But that's the only option facing many students who can't afford to meet the cost of accommodation. Rental accommodation, alone, has increased by 65% in the cities during the past five years, putting most of it beyond the reach of students. With rent spiralling out of control, deserving students, who have studied hard to achieve a college place, are struggling to pay for college.

EXPENSIVE

Further and third level education is very expensive. The financial burden is eased a little for students who qualify for a partial or total grant. Even so, many college students have to work part-time or depend on their parents to make ends meet. Thousands of students who are ineligible for funding must come up with about \le 12,000 annually if they are living away from home or about \le 5,000 if living at home. The student contribution of \le 3,000 has also to be paid.

SUSI

Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI) is Ireland's higher and further education grants awarding body. Student grants are divided into maintenance grants and fee grants. Maintenance grants are paid directly to the student's bank account. Fee grants pay tuition fees, the student contribution and the cost of essential field trips. SUSI grants are available at PLC, undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

ELIGIBLE

To be eligible for a grant, an applicant must meet a nationality criterion, a residency criterion, an education progression criterion and an approved course criterion, all of which are mere formalities for most applicants. To be eligible for funding, your total household reckonable income must fall below specific income thresholds. The SUSI website contains tables outlining the income thresholds and the associated maintenance grant rates for applicants. The minimum distance from home to college for the higher grant (non-adjacent) eligibility is 30km. About 80,000 students should be eligible for some level of standard

maintenance grants ranging from €612 to €4,292.

GRANT

The maximum standard non-adjacent maintenance grant payable in the 25/26 academic year will be €4,292. For students who live less than 30km from their college, the standard maximum adjacent grant is €1,774. The gross annual income level for grant eligibility is €47,010 (less than four dependent children), €51,520 (between four and seven children) or €55,850 (between eight or more dependent children). Income thresholds increase by €4,950 for each additional family member in college. The amount of nonassessed holiday income that a student can earn per annum is €8,424.

CDECIAL

There is also a special maintenance grant of €7,586 (non-adjacent) and €3,230 (adjacent) for applicants whose annual gross income is less than €27,400 (less than four dependent children), €30,030 (between four and seven children) or €32,555 (eight or more dependent children). On 31st December 2024, the reckonable household income must include an eligible long-term Department of Social Protection payment as prescribed in the Student Grant Scheme.

PRIORITY

SUSI is prioritising new grant applications until 10th July. SUSI will process late applications but its best to be on the priority applications list. Submit your online grant application as soon as possible. Applicants are assessed on gross income from all sources in the 2024 financial year. Applications are assessed as either a 'dependent,' 'mature dependent' or 'independent' application. A dependent applicant is assessed on the income of parents or guardians, while an independent applicant is assessed on personal income and that of her/his partner.

RECKONER

As the grant is means-tested, visit the eligibility reckoner on www.susi.ie. This facility provides potential applicants with an approximate indication of whether or not they are likely to qualify for a grant. However, it's always advisable to submit a grant application. Even if you don't currently qualify, your financial circumstances may change going forward.

REGISTER

Before you start your application, create an account in your SUSI student portal. You will be asked for your Personal Public Service Number (PPSN), Name, Date of Birth, Email address and Phone number. Create your log in details where you can set up your username, password

and security pin. Then carefully complete the interactive application form. Once you have submitted a grant application you can follow its progress on the SUSI Online Application Tracker.

FUNDING

Further information on state funding can be found on www.studentfinance.ie.

Most of the institutions also offer a range of scholarships for excellence in areas such as academic, sport, creative arts and entrepreneurship. Colleges also operate a Financial Assistance Fund for students experiencing financial difficulty during term. Go to the relevant colleges' websites for further details. Watch out also for local scholarships such as Credit Union Scholarships available to members. If at all possible, avoid taking out a student loan, but if you must then the best rates are available from your local Credit Union.



Over 7,500 New Citizens Welcomed at Irish Citizenship Ceremonies in Killarney

More than 7,500 people from 143 countries were officially granted Irish citizenship this week during a series of ceremonies held at the Gleneagle Arena, Killarney. The events mark one of the largest gatherings of new citizens in recent years.

Among those taking the Oath of Fidelity was U2 guitarist The Edge (David Howell-Evans), who shared his personal connection to Ireland.

"Today's ceremony was very moving," he said. "The room was full of so many people, everyone from different backgrounds, with different stories. It was a privilege to be a part of it and to experience the collective joy as we all became citizens together. I moved to Ireland with my parents as a baby, so it's not a stretch to say that this is long overdue. I have always felt Irish, this will always be home to me."

The ceremonies were presided over by retired Judge Paddy McMahon and officiated by the Minister for Justice, Home Affairs and Migration, Jim O'Callaghan, alongside Ministers Colm Brophy and Niall Collins.

According to the Department of Justice, the top nationalities represented among the new citizens were Indian (1,888), Brazilian (817), and British (516). In terms of residence, most applicants were from Dublin (3,820), followed by Cork (777) and Kildare (619).

The latest ceremonies bring the total number of people granted Irish citizenship since the introduction of official ceremonies in 2011 to over 206,000.

Citizenship processing has significantly improved in recent years. In 2024 alone, nearly 31,000 decisions were made, with average processing times reduced from 15 months in 2023 to just 8 months. The Department credits digital applications, electronic vetting (eVetting), and streamlined systems for the faster turnaround.

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
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
















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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.




A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take £20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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
There are a lot of trees suitable for smaller gardens and they come in all shapes and sizes, evergreen or deciduous.

On the other hand you can choose a tree that is columnar in shape and it won't spread out too much. There is also the option of standard trees. These trees are usually about 3ft to 4ft in height and grow from the top to ground level, staying at the height you plant them at.
