Students from five schools in Killarney are coming together again this year to raise much needed funds for the Kerry Hospice Foundation.

"Once again, we would love for the public to get behind this; particularly anyone who has benefited from the Palliative services of University Hospital Kerry and is looking for a medium through which to give back", Ms. Moynihan added.

Tormer Kerry footballer, Killian Burns is the creative director behind the new #KEEPTHELIGHTSON campaign which is currently steaming across social media.

Killian, who is Senior Creative Director in Wilson Hartnell told Killarney Outlook that the video content hopes to inspire and ignite other pubs to get involved and was done on behalf of Guinness, VFI, LVA and Ulster Hospitality. "The video was a Wilson Hartnell Content Hub production and my role in it was twofold", Killian said. "Firstly, it was to storyboard out what this video content would look like and then I had the role of video director on the 8 location shoot to deliver on the storyboard. Pubs across Ireland simultaneously switched on their Christmas lights last Friday November 20th at 5pm with consumers are being asked to show their support for a safe reopening by sharing #KEEPTHELIGHTSON with images of their local lit up on social media.

#KEEPTHELIGHTSON is a campaign that will quite literally shine a light on our pubs, highlighting their readiness for a safe reopening.

Turning on their lights early ahead of the crucial Christmas period not only highlights the place of local pubs in the fabric of Irish society, but also the struggle that publicans, bar-staff and their families are facing in order to keep the lights on. In many villages and townlands across the country, the local pub may be the only beacon of light on dark winter nights. Their prolonged closure due to Covid-19 enforced lockdowns serves as a physical reminder of the impact that Covid-19 has had not just on the pub-trade and wider hospitality industry but also on communities up and down the country. The financial impact of Covid-19 pub closures has been hugely significant, with 50% of pubs throughout Ireland allowed to open for only 2



out of the last 37 weeks after enduring at least four delays to reopening over the course of the summer, under the most severe hospitality lockdown in Europe.

Pubs across Ireland have put in place an extensive range of measures in order to reopen safely from implementing social distancing, to following the strictest sanitisation protocols, arranging extra staff training, the provision of physical infrastructure such as Perspex screens, increasing signage and using new systems, tools and technology to create safe socialising environments in their outlets.



While live audiences will not be permitted under the Plan for Living with Covid-19, the performances will be recorded for either streaming or promotional purposes.

"Behind the scenes of every gig is a hardworking team of technical and support personnel. The Live Performance Support Scheme allows us to provide employment for performers but also for the vital cog of technicians and performance support staff that make live music gigs possible. It also will provide us with live music content that can be streamed online or used to promote Ireland's live music industry both at home and overseas", Mark Egan, Director of the Gleneagle INEC Arena told Killarney Outlook.

"We would like to thank the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media for their support. We would also like to thank the various artists that have reduced their performance costs in order to make these gigs happen. These are unprecedented times for the live performance industry and support schemes such as this are vital to ensure the industry remains intact post Covid."

DANIEL'S 11TH BIRTHDAY WILL CERTAINLY BE ONE TO REMEMBER

So how are we all doing this week as Level 5 is nearing the final hurdle? Are we nearly there yet?? Now there's a persistent question we're all familiar with listening to on repeat over a long journey.

Oh if only....the chance would be a fine thing!! There is nothing too familiar about the times we are living in right now. That's for sure.

The enormous scale of the pandemic, Covid19, and the impact it is having are naturally causing a lot of change, fear, uncertainty and anxiety across the globe. Add in social isolation, disrupted work/family routines, cabin fever & economic instability, and it is understandable that our mental health would be somewhat compromised. Now close your eyes and imagine you are Daniel Egan who has ADHD, Crohn's Disease, Learning Difficulties & lives with just one kidney.

Daniel Egan celebrated his 11th birthday on Saturday. It was such an uplifting form of community spirit I have seen in a while. Read on....

"The first lockdown was very difficult Marie. Daniel couldn't understand why he couldn't leave the house to go play with his friends. He desperately wanted to go to school. We found ourselves in an unfamiliar situation with Daniel but with the help of the Gardaí we overcame the situation and now Daniel is great friends with Garda Diane Collins who spoke to him on his terms, breaking down the do's and don'ts of Covid 19, far clearer than I ever could have explained Marie" Mum Kelly Ann told me. Oh I know the feeling Kelly Ann. Similar situations in my house. I sometimes get sick of the sound of my own voice on loop. "She rings him every week Marie and today on his 11th birthday, he was supposed to visit the Garda Station but with the restrictions and health risks for Daniel, Garda Collins and her team came up with something equally as thrilling for Daniel".

I arrived at Arbutus Grove ahead of the sirens of two squad cars, safe in the knowledge that they weren't after me! The Garda cars were closely followed by Martin & John O'Grady from Killarney Fire Station. Daniel was inside and arrived outdoors bursting out of his skin with excitement. Daniel shares his birthday with Nana Mary Egan who also lives with Daniel & his Mum Kelly Ann. "Daniel was born on my mums 50th birthday. I know many people will describe their mothers as their rock Marie but my mother Mary is an exceptional woman. I was living away but when I realised I was expecting Daniel I wanted him to grow up in Killarney. I am a single Mom and without my mother Mary & my family, I would be lost. My



Mom an unbelievable person. I have managed to go back to college to study cheffing which wouldn't be possible without her help. She is just out of hospital. She wouldn't have missed today for the world Marie. Daniel & Mom are so close like you wouldn't believe" Kelly Ann told me. "Kayley at the Ballyspillane Support Group is another person who helps Daniel hugely. She can't see him at the moment but she does phone him and we're hopeful for a drive by next week weather permitting. We are very lucky to have Kayley and our great neighbours too Maura, Elaine & Michaela Breen who have been family friends for years".

Daniel looked on in disbelief. He forgot himself in the heat of the moment and disappeared momentarily go fetch his mask. The Gardaí presented Daniel with gifts and Firemen Martin & John O'Grady presented Daniel with a personalised fire fighter t-shirt and invited him to sit behind the wheel and sound the siren. He didn't need to be asked twice. The handcuffs were sought after for a capture with Garda Collins in the Garda Car, which he thankfully had the keys to release her afterwards.

"This is a wonderful lift for Daniel Marie. He has a lot going on for an 11 year old boy. We have a lot of appointments in the coming months but we will get through them. I am so grateful to the Gardaí & the Fire Station for making his day and in turn making mine.... and my mothers!" Mum Kelly Ann laughed. "Daniels conditions put him in the high risk category so today is absolutely brilliant Marie. A welcomed high for

us all" Mum Kelly Ann continued.

Before I left I wanted to chat to Daniel, the main man, himself. "Well Daniel, what did you think of today?" I asked. "This was such a great surprise. I can't believe it" Daniel said. "Wait until you tell all your friends in school Daniel. What school do you go to?" I asked. "St Olivers NS Marie and Brendan Kealy is my teacher" Daniel said with great pride "And Ms Brosnan & Ms O'Mahony are really great at helping me too". Daniel Egan didn't need to say one more word. It was written all over his face. The sheer joy & ultimate delight of what had just happened. "Thanks Mum"... and he then gave his Mum the biggest hug (bottom right photo) by way of thanks. It's not what you say it's how you say it or in this case show it. I miss hugs. I had all the feels leaving Arbutus Grove. Our community Gardaí & Fire Service making great efforts to ensure Daniel's 11th Birthday was one to remember despite a global pandemic.

Happy 11th Birthday Daniel Egan and thank you for having me Kelly Ann & Mary to your home at Arbutus Grove on Daniel's special day. I hope it's not quite as long before I am invited to a birthday bash again.



Following his transfer from Paralympic competitions worldwide to **Able Bodied Competitions**

Marie catches up with Jordan Lee and his coach Tomás Griffin

was dying to see the new Killarney Valley Athletics Club Arena located at New Road Killarney where it shares an entrance with St. Brendan's College.

An ambition taken on by Killarney Valley AC and boy was it worth every effort. So impressive. I timed my visit carefully to meet up with Jordan Lee a midst a training session for the Tokyo 2021 Paralympic Games with his coach Tomás Griffin. The cool crisp winters evening was an added bonus!

"Wow Tomás this place is amazing!!" I said. "And just in the nick of time Marie. Jordan's training for Tokyo 2021 can now take place here on home soil. He is fully funded by the government as he is on the elite list of Athletes permitted to keep training in the restrictions

. The second lockdown arrived as the track reached completion. The all new Killarney Valley AC Arena was declared as Jordan's official training grounds, provided he is the only person with his coach on the premises at any given training session" Tomás explained.

I had a look around as we chatted. What an honour to have such an impressive facility in Killarney I thought. "The facilities are to olympic standard of any professional athlete for training Marie. Killarney Valley AC hosts 50 athletes here several times weekly in pods and the astro turf can be hired on request. When Covid 19 allows it, the track is available to over 3,000 students in the local vicinity to use with prior arrangement with St. Brendan's within school hours facilitated by their own schools". Jordan Lee's achievements to date are as follows but the most impressive part is that he has managed to transfer from Paralympic competitions worldwide to Able Bodied What a cross over and a Competitions. phenomenal achievement on both levels I thought.

- 2018 WPA European Championship Bronze Medal Winner in Berlin. "I couldn't believe it Marie. I was just 8 months in training at 18 years of age. It was a massive first experience. Imagine this standard is my warm up now. My



personal best now is a high jump of 1 metre 95cm (6ft 6"), the same height as the carpark barriers in town" Jordan explained.

-2019 World Championship in Dubai finishing in 6th place. "I had a heel injury Marie. Initially I was disappointed that I didn't receive a medal but you know what, afterwards I thought to myself, what a great achievement at 19 given I came 6th in the world and did it with an injury" Jordan explained.

-2018/2019 Two Time WPA Italian Grand Prix Gold Medalist

-2019 Current WPA French Grand Prix Gold Medalist

- 2019/2020 Two National Medalist (Able Bodied Competition) - "This was absolutely fantastic for me to make an impact on at the Able Bodied Competition levels. In 2019 I came 3rd at the National Juniors U20 and in 2020 I came 2nd in the National U23's. My idol is Paralympic Sprinter Jason Smyth, who is legally blind since the age of 8, yet he is still Irelands current fastest man over 100 meters" Jordan said

"So what does it mean to you Jordan to have this class of an athletics track right here in Killarney"? I asked. "Well when Tomás said that 'we built the track' he literally meant that we built the track Marie" Jordan said. Tomás was laughing "You see that red colour on the track Marie?? Well it took three whole months for that colour to disappear from our hands". Wow I thought, even with all the hand washing in a pandemic!! "We literally went from work to the track and took holidays when we knew the weather would be good to complete the painting before the weather got bad again" Tomás said.

"It's absolutely fantastic Marie. You have no idea how this will benefit me as an athlete. I don't have to spend time travelling. I have a world class facility here on my doorstep in beautiful Killarney" Jordan concluded.

CAHILL CALLS FOR URGENT ACTION IN RESPECT OF BEAUFORT SEWERAGE SCHEME

ouncillor Michael Cahill has called on Kerry County Council, Irish Water and the Department to urgently address a Sewerage Scheme that has not been operational for years in Beaufort Village.

At a recent Municipal District meeting the Fianna Fail Councillor described the current situation being faced by the residents of Coolmagort Avenue, Beaufort as scandalous. "This is a major Health and Safety issue where raw sewerage is getting into dishwashers and residents and young children are becoming ill" claimed the Rossbeigh based Councillor. "This situation should not be tolerated and needs to be addressed as a matter of extreme urgency" stated Mr Cahill. Councillor Cahill called on the Council to do all in their power to address the situation.

Director of Water Services, John Breen gave the following response.

Reply: There are serious deficiencies in the wastewater treatment plant, which has not functioned for many years, in this 21-house, privately constructed estate in Beaufort. The residents have hired a contractor on occasion to desludge the tank.

In 2018 the residents engaged a consulting engineer to find a solution to the problem. The necessary upgrade works were provisionally estimated at €140,000.

Planning Permission would be required for any such proposed works in this estate.

It is Irish Water's policy that it will not take over any such stand-alone, developer-provided infrastructure, as per the Memorandum of Understanding that IW has with the Local Authority Sector.

On being again requested in November 2018



to desludge the tank, the Water Services department of Kerry Council undertook to do so one more time, on the understanding that the residents would organise and fund this in future. The charge for the intake of sludge from this estate will be waived at the Killarney Wastewater Treatment Plant.

The Department Of Housing, Planning and Local Government sought submissions in late 2019 under a proposed new multi-annual funding programme - the Multi-Annual Developer Provided Water Services Infrastructure Resolution Programme 2019-2021. This programme initially prioritises housing estates with Developer Provided Infrastructure which can be connected to a municipal wastewater treatment plant with adequate capacity. Beaufort Village has no such

municipal water treatment plant.

However, the first wave of investment under this programme includes for a small number of carefully selected demonstration projects. Funding for demonstration projects will allow a longer-term treatment strategy to be developed for settlements with a number of DPIs and the preparation of a Feasibility Study to recommend an appropriate solution. This approach would inform the department of locations where further allocations under this programme can be targeted. Beaufort Village was included, as a Demonstration Project, in the submission by KCC for funding.

Kerry County Council understands that the Department will shortly announce funding allocations under this national programme.

€135,000 FOR KERRY MEALS ON WHEELS

There has been a warm welcome this week with news that 19 Kerry meals on wheels projects have received €135,000 in funding.

The funding, which is being provided under Measure 3(a) of the CLÁR programme, will enable community-based organisations which deliver Meals on Wheels and linked services to purchase equipment and make adaptations to existing vehicles to support the provision of their services. This is a new initiative under CLÁR for 2020 in recognition of the critical role played by community groups in responding to COVID-19, with a particular focus on those groups providing Meals on Wheels services.

Welcoming the announcement Minister Foley said "This is a huge endorsement of the superb community work taking place in Kerry every day. Kerry has received an allocation of €135,000 from a national allocation of €340,000. These organisations are at the heart of our communities and are providing an invaluable service. These organisations are an important lifeline for people

living in their own homes, and they play an important role in combating isolation for many people. The funding announced today will help many groups to continue to deliver their vital services as we continue to deal with the COVID-19 challenge." Also welcoming the announcement was Cllr. Michael Cahill who said he was delighted for the successful groups as they carry out great work on a voluntary basis. This is a new initiative under CLÁR for 2020 in recognition of the critical role played by community groups in responding to COVID-19, with a particular focus on those groups providing Meals on Wheels services.

DR. CROKES REMEMBER

BLOODY SUNDAY

100 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

On Saturday last Dr. Crokes remembered the 100 year anniversary of Bloody Sunday. The national flag was flown at halfmast and as the evening closed in, the two floodlit areas were in full light.

At dusk, a small gathering lit a candle at the clubhouse. These included Club President Jackie Looney, who was assisted by Teddy Counihan, on behalf of his aunt, Margaret O'Leary in lighting the candle and placing it on display in one of the windows in the presence of Club Chairman Patrick O'Sullivan. Unfortunately Club Patron Donie Sheahan was unable to attend and sent his apologies. The club celebrated the link with Croke Park through Teddy Counihan and Margaret O'Leary as Teddy's grandfather and Margaret's father "Small" Jer O'Leary, was instrumental in buying Croke Park. In 1920, Dr. Crokes led the roll of honour with 4 Kerry SFC titles, 1901 and

then the 3 in a row 1912/13/14. Dr. Crokes are still top of the leader board in the number of Kerry SFC titles won, (13) ahead of A. Stacks and East Kerry.


In 1914 Dr. Crokes and Kerry star, Dick Fitzgerald published the first book on Coaching in the GAA, 'How to play Gaelic Football'.

The War of Independence started in 1919 with the Irish Volunteers active nationwide, including Killarney. Dr. Crokes was the only GAA club in town and with club football suspended in reality, until 1924, many of the Dr. Crokes' players spent their time drilling with the local members of the Irish Volunteers. The Kerryman reported on July 3rd, "For the past few days, the Killarney Volunteers have assumed the duties of preserving law and order in the town and district. So far their efforts have met with considerable success as undesirables in the town have been forced to leave the town", a spokesperson for the club

told Killarney Outlook.

The Black and Tans came to Ireland in March 1920 and the Auxiliaries in August 1920. A combination of these entered Croke Park on November 21, 1920, and shot dead a reported 14 people, including 3 children. Many more were wounded. This was in retaliation for the shooting dead of a reported 13 British Intelligence Officers and one civilian earlier that morning. Michael Collins' notorious 'Squad' killed, or fatally wounded those 14 people. Sunday, November 21, 1920, is remembered as Bloody Sunday which happened 100 years ago last weekend.

On the 100th Anniversary, GAA clubs nationwide were urged by Croke Park authorities to light a candle in their homes from dusk in memory of those killed and wounded in Croke Park, Bloody Sunday, November 21, 1920. Dr. Crokes did not resume club football again until 1924.

KERRY BUSINESSES SHOULD APPLY FOR

NEW BREXIT LOAN AS TRANSITION PERIOD NEARS AN END - Griffin

Small businesses in Kerry should apply for a new loan to help them prepare for Britain's exit from the single market and customs union at the end of this year, Deputy Government Chief Whip, Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin said, "I know that Brexit will be challenging for businesses and they want to be prepared, so I welcome the opening of this new scheme by the Tánaiste and Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment, Leo Varadkar T.D.

"The new Microfinance Ireland (MFI) Brexit Business Loan, will provide up to €25,000 to businesses whose turnover already is or is likely to fall 15% or more or if the business has a short term cashflow need as a result of Brexit. Loans are available for between six months and three years.

"Any business, including a Sole Trader, Partnership or Limited Company, with less than 10 employees and annual turnover of up

to €2 million can apply, where they are unable to secure finance from a Bank or commercial lending provider.

"Kerry businesses can apply though their Local Enterprise Office Network or can apply directly to Microfinance Ireland (MFI).

"There are less than 50 days until the end of the transition period on 31 December. It is urgent that all businesses large and small in Kerry now revisit their readiness plans.

"From 1 January, the UK will no longer apply the rules of the EU's Single Market and Customs Union. This means that any business that moves goods from, to or through Great Britain will be subject to a range of customs formalities, SPS checks and other regulatory requirements that do not apply to such trade today.

"There is now an extensive range of training material and information available online on the Government's new Brexit Information Hub to help businesses prepare for Brexit and the lasting change that it will bring. The hub can be accessed via Gov.ie/getbrexitready," Deputy Griffin said.

Announcing details of the scheme, Minister Varadkar said: "I know it's been a really hard year, especially for our small, local businesses and imminent Brexit feels like another bodyblow on the way. This new loan is just one of the ways we are helping business to prepare. "It will provide low cost finance of up to €25,000 and business owners can apply through MFI. 77% of MFI's lending is to businesses outside of Dublin, which is important as businesses all over Ireland will feel the negative effects of Brexit

"If you are a business owner and are wondering where to start, I'd recommend filling out our Brexit Readiness Checker first and having a look at what needs to be done in your business. Then please reach out and use the help that's there."

We all thought that Kerry had suffered by far and away the biggest shock of the 2020 Championship. It turns out that in bowing out to huge underdogs, we were actually the trendsetters in GAA. Last weekend they dropped like ninepins. I didn't know whether to laugh or cry.....so I chose to laugh. This is the 2020 rollercoaster, people. We may as well just enjoy the ride as best we can and mind each other along the way.

GAELIC FOOTBALL

Munster Final: Tipperary 0-17 Cork 0-14

Tipperary wore retro jerseys (the same jerseys worn by the Tipp team that played Dublin on Bloody Sunday) and got a retro result. The last time Tipperary were Munster Football champions, the Hoover Dam was just being opened, nylon and canned beer were just being invented, and Persia was being re-named Iran.

Ulster Final: Cavan 1-13 Donegal 0-12

Cavan have actually won more Ulster titles than anyone else, but they faded as a superpower decades ago. Their last Ulster title was in 1997 – we played them in the semi-final. Cavan acquitted themselves well, the O'Reillys, Carolan, and McCabe doing well, and led at half-time by a point after Fintan Cahill's goal. Kerry just always looked that bit more assured. Darragh and Seamus were no longer players who needed surnames; Maurice was already something else in his annus mirabilis. My standout memory, though, is of a sublime catch and over-the-shoulder pass by Brian Clarke for an Eamonn Breen goal. It was possibly the best piece of skill I ever saw in Croke Park,



spontaneous genius – and it was disallowed for 'taking the free too fast'. Ah well. There'll be no Kerry Cavan repeat this year.

Leinster Final: Dublin 3-21 Meath 0-9

The shocks are making all the headlines, and Dublin will be quiet happy about that. They are calmly proceeding like a giant underwater shark, not even giving decent predators time to thrash in the water. I 'knew' that Meath would win (my 'knowledge' is very cheap currency this week!) but I thought they would ask questions of Dublin. Nope. This was destruction. This was Zeus hurling thunderbolts at a cheeky Prometheus. This was so calm, so clinical, as to actually be frightening. I'm delighted for the underdogs, but there is three of them left in this year's Championship....and one absolutely behemoth. Dublin really are scary good.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

The GAA really doesn't like years that end in '20', does it? A hundred years ago it was the small matter of a Civil War, by which I mean a truly uncivil war, that saw some of the favourites wiped out early. Kerry, for example, had failed to fulfil their opening round fixture against

Limerick. But Tipperary were actually a very strong football county in those days and had narrowly lost to Wexford in the 2018 All Ireland Final. Cavan were a decent outfit too, and would become one of our greatest rivals in the forties, culminating in New York's Polo Grounds. Mayo have always had good teams, and too many of them always had to migrate. So the similarities between the provincial winners of 1920 and 2020 is a statitistical anomaly, no more. People, this is most definitely not the year to be looking for prophecies!

RISK VERSUS REWARD

They are very startling results, and I'll freely admit that I gave Cork no chance against. Then I considered the next game, and I gave Tipperary no real chance against Cork. I was sorry for Cavan, but I was giving Donegal a real chance against Dublin, As for whether I was willing to invest a little oul' hope in this being Mayo's year? Ah, come on, it's Mayo. You have to have hope for them: it's probably a GAA by-law by now. Lose hope, they say, and you lose God.

Now, I'm not embarrassed by any of that, I'm genuinely not. I don't like these commentators that hedge their bets and are very careful with the caveats and the balancing act. Have the guts to make a prediction or you are just waffling. Nor do I indulge in this 'oh, we always fear Cork', always flattering to attempt to deceive (the 'yerra' syndrome, and yes, Kerry supporters do indulge in it), and the 'it's always unpredictable' nonsense – the stats don't remotely back that up.

The theory seems to be that the players are susceptible to what we supporters say in the build-up to a game. Lads, any player who is bothered by voices from outside the camp is already in a bad head space.

Cork's defeat by Tipperary supposedly makes

Kerry's defeat appear even worse. It was a bad day against our oldest rivals, but it doesn't suddenly get retrospectively worse – that's a nonsensical idea

At the same time, nor do I get the idea that Kerry's marquee forwards simply had an off day. Kerry set up very poorly and were slow to change it. Star forwards snatched at several chances, but had to in the absence of support play. We showed Cork way too much respect; it really was an invitation to hubris. Cork had a solid game plan, refused to allow their defensive line to be drawn, and Kerry's defensive strategy and poor tackling (38 Kerry fouls to 25 Cork ones – ouch!) allowed a comparatively limited but hugely committed Cork, who showed fantastic composure when we didn't, to hang in longer than otherwise and reap that brilliant and completely justified reward.

Except that if you then look at Cork's style of play against Tipperary, it's like a role reversal. Cork were the ones sweating under the headlights now; Tipp had nothing to lose. Tipp repulsed Cork's runners in the same way that the runs of Gavin White and Paul Murphy ended against muscular walls a week earlier, but what were Cork forwards like Mark Collins, one of their best leader up front, doing dropping back into midfield? The exact same as Kerry had done a week before them, that's what. Once again, the underdogs backed themselves while the favourites were over-cautious.

Same with Cavan and Donegal. Cavan were very good. I hadn't realised how much pace they had and they were willing to use it, and the late goal put a gloss on it, but it was Cavan who went for the game and Donegal, so ravenous against Tyrone, who tried to hold instead of hunting.

The back door allows for a certain amount of self-indulgence, a parachute if you will. The more apposite side of Billy Beane's over-indulged Moneyball Theory in sports statistics. Knock-out can be a heart-breaker - Meath in 2001, the manner of it rather than the result... Clare in 1992...Down in 1991 by the way, we should have beaten them...Tadhg Murphy, of course, we've all been hearing about that goal recently....1982 of course, but I was young enough to be stupefied rather than despairing at that one....

We all know the stories, and it applies in every sport in the world. That and the appeal of tribalism are the two truisms that make sport so eternally great a human endeavour

STRAIGHT KNOCK-OUT

My last point, and it's a bit premature seeing as we haven't even reached the end of the season. The GAA introduced a back door in 2002. It didn't suit conservatives like myself, but it was necessary; a lot of counties were simply being asked to invest too much in time and money for just one championship game a season based on an outdated system. But it arrived right at the peak of what I think of as 'trickledown' economics in sport. Worldwide, tv and advertising money was being poured into the big teams in all codes. The likes of Europes big soccer leagues or the top NBA, NFL, and NHL franchises were being dominated by the very



richest clubs or franchises and the gap was growing (moneyball was itself a resistance movement in sport against the seemingly unstoppable success of the big spenders/wealth accumulators). The GAA's 'shamatuerism' was no barrier to that inevitability as the top teams pulled well clear.

The GAA turned away completely from being an amateur association focussed on the social and communal impact to a professional but volunteer-based one whose aims could be measured in the annual accounts and nowhere else. It had become an appalling parody of what the GAA could and should be in modern Ireland.

So I hugely welcome their willingness to give genuine consideration to a split season between inter-county and club. This is so badly wanted - reasonable playing calendars for both, fixed dates to let players plan their lives properly, less player burn-out. The strict split between underage and senior that included dropping minor to U17 was an awful attempt at a solution. Split season done properly is of course the answer. But it means cutting back on the huge money generating inter-county side for the sake of clubs, and frankly I never thought that a Croke Park Executive whose priorities were quite plainly more Garth Brooks concerts and NFL games than club players in recent years would do it.

Kudos to all for actually putting it on the table instead of setting up the usual time-waster committee in the hope that the problem goes away. I'll even compromise on the Tier 1 and Tier 2 idea, provided that Tier 2 does get decent coverage and support from the Executive (I see high quality artificial pitches in a much shortened inter-country season) and a proper promotion and relegation structure.

Is it....could it be....would it be maybe stretching things a little bit too far to ask that maybe a return to straight knock-out be on the table?

HURLING

Kerry Into McDonagh Cup Final Kerry 2-22 Carlow 1-23

Kerry have had their eyes on a McDonagh Cup Final from a long way out this year. Forget formats and structures and everything else. This year was about a strong panel (that U20 performance against hot favourites Cork comes to mind), a good league (reached the

final, box ticked), but especially progress in the Championship.

It was tough all the way. In fact, it came all the way down to the wire in Austin Stack Park. Carlow kept asking the hard questions, right to the finish. I like them – Carlow bat above their weight always and do it with every bit of pride and defiance and heart that they have. Anyone who follows Kerry hurling knows that feeling; you have to fight hard enough for the good days. And last Saturday, Carlow certainly made us fight for it.

Mikey Boyle nailed a brace as Kerry led by 0-4 to 0-2, but Carlow's John Nolan got in for a goal. At the first water break Carlow led by 1-6 to 0-6. Kerry were much sharper in the second quarter – and needed to be. Daniel Collins struck for a goal and Kerry were that fractionally faster than Carlow now, with Shane Conway (2f) and Mikey Boyle on target before Collins nailed his second goal (after missing long periods through injury, Daniel looks back to his old self, and relishing a more upfront role). Kerry led by 2-12 to 1-10 at half-time and playing well enough to look secure.

Carlow had other ideas. Chris (2) and John Nolan and the two Kavanaghs pointed in response to a brace by Shane Conway cut the gap tpo three. Sharpshooter Marty Kavanagh cancelled that

Carlow tore into Kerry's lead early in the second half. Chris Nolan (2), John Nolan and Jack and Marty Kavanagh points from play cut the gap. Carlow were well on top now and Kerry really needed to get a grip on things. With five minutes left Kerry were trailing by 1-23 to 2-18. I was fairly flustered by now myself, to be honest, but Kerry stayed impressively calm. Shane Conway's seventh score left one between them and Shane Nolan (awesome for Kerry yet again) levelled before Micheál O'Leary fired over the lead score and doubled up for another – Micheál isn't so much a prolific scorer as a crucial one.

Kerry will be in the McDonagh Cup curtainraiser on All Ireland Final Day in Croke Park. Facing them – yet again – will be the saffron army of Antrim. It will be our fourth meeting so far this year and Antrim have had the upper hand so far. But if we close down those early speed burst goals we have coughed up of late (especially McNaughton's runs the last time we met Antrim a fortnight ago) and press the pedal to the metal more in the third quarter, I actually fancy us. I think they are much more reliably consistent – but we have always had that little fraction more potential.

SOCCER

Very quick, very simple. Ireland slipped down into the third tier for World Cup rankings after that defeat to Bulgaria, but I think we had all pretty much accepted the inevitability and fairness of that anyway. Even allowing for the fact that we were scraping the bones of a makeshift squad, it really was a dire performance, but who cares? Stephen Kenny has a tough job ahead, but needs to be left get on with it.

No, All I have an issue with is this media controversy about the Irish team being shown the film 'Michael Collins'. Apparently it was insensitive and blah, blah, blah. English born lads offended. Or Irish lads offended. Or something offensive anyway, it's not like journalists should actually require details. One former editor of one of these rags has called for Kenny to be fired over the whole thing. Much worse, a couple of people in the camp have made the mistake of responding, giving these parasitic leeches further ammunition.

Anyone who is offended at the Michael Collins film (it's hugely over-rated, watch Loach's 'The Wind that Shakes the Barley' instead – a film that asks hard questions, but does so brilliantly) would want to stay away from Monty Python movies, or the Carry On films....or the Irish team. Go and watch 'Wild Mountain Thyme' instead and get offended at that one instead. The accents are supposed to be legendary bad. I hope so – in a non-covid world, I'd be dressing up like Fr. Ted on Craggy Island and staging a protest with a 'Down With This Sort of Thing' Placard. That's how I roll sometimes.

Until some-one within the camp makes a public complaint (and a complete eejit of themselves), this is a non-story. I didn't want to give this disgusting parody of journalism any oxygen at all, but I felt it had to be mentioned in the context of the commemorations of Bloody Sunday. Irish soccer is at a very low ebb – but it still has a higher standard than some of the muckrakers who pretend to report on it with false patriotism.

Incidentally, if Stephen Kenny really wants to show his panel what fuels grassroots soccer in Ireland, he could do a lot worse than hand out copies of Paddy Osborne's 'Baxter's Boys'. It'd let them know fast that there isn't much point in being overly sensitive or precious about things!

RUGBY

Ireland versus England. Not going great for us in any code these days, is it? Of course, there's a joke about it having gone against us for 800 years...but apparently we are all very sensitive nowadays. England manager Eddie Jones had a little dig at Ireland as the 'United Nations of Rugby' in the build-up, referencing the amount of our team that are adopted sons. I'm not offended; to be honest I do think that the rules regarding national representation are too lax in rugby and Ireland has exploited that. But for an England manager to point it out disparagingly? England? An adage about black pots and kettles leaps to mind. Frankly, I thought it was a lame attempt by both Eddie and the media to foment a non-existent controversy.

As for the game.....look, Autumn internationals. Ireland won't be happy with the result, or



their pattern of play, but I think we are better off finding out any problems now. How many times have Ireland come out of a good Autumn series thinking we are up among the best in the world....only to be sharply deflated six months later when the chips are down?

That first try.....look, no. You have got to deal with that kick from Farrell, end of story. Johnny May's second try was excellent and deserved, but you can't be letting a cross-field ball like that be caught and taken over. Nail man and ball and everything if you have to, but you can't let it be that easy.

We shall speak of our line-out once and once only, and it shall never again be mentioned. Irish mothers have been hanging out lines of washing for centuries now, calculating weather variations (accurate to within 20 seconds), angles of sunlight, differing textures and hues of cloth, likelihood of family members forgetting to 'get the washing' if it starts raining....

It's one of our most exact sciences. When it comes to line-outs, Andy Farrell desperately needs to consult with an Irish mother, fast, because our line-outs were possibly the worst I have ever seen.

We were limited. More worryingly for me, we were very limited in attack. Ireland look very predictable, and we are neither big enough nor fast enough to be breaking down any doors late on. I know we played the angles a bit more late on and it worked, and Stockdale did take his opportunity well, but let's face it, the intensity was long gone from the game.

We have things to work on, and England are a much improved team. I'm not worried about our prospects, but I do want (and I know this will sound ungrateful to some true greats) to see the likes of Sexton, Murray, and O'Mahony being phased out. Sorry, guys, but it's the cruel reality of top level sport; everybody's time is finite.

MICKEY HARTE TAKING OVER LOUTH

Not all the shocks happened on the field of play, either. Only a fortnight ago, Mickey Harte was the longest serving inter-county football manager in the business – only Brian Cody in

Kilkewnny pre-dates him. He led Tyrone to three All Ireland titles and moved them from minnow to top contenders on an annual basis. One of the greatest managers of all time and one of the most respected, especially in light of his dignity in the face of tragedies. Quite simply an icon. That's who he was a fortnight ago. Now Tyrone are looking for a new manager. Peter Canavan has denied all interest, so I'd expect former U21 manager Fergal Logan or current one Paul Devlin to step up, Tyrone won't appoint from outside the county. Now he's Mickey Harte, the most recently appointed inter-county manager out there. And if Tyrone were small pike who became sharks, then Louth barely count as minnows. A single one point win counts as a successful year; that's the brutal reality of where thy are at.

Fair play to himself and Gavin Devlin. No-one will convince me that he's making money here; there's no way Louth have the resources. Mickey Harte loves football and loves nurturing it. It would be easy for him to step back and cherish his accolades, but he genuinely has never been about them. Instead he is stepping back out there to a much harder challenge – Division Four is a much tougher ball game I honestly wish him and Louth every success.... except our Sam Maguire, of course!

JOHN SUGRUE STEPS DOWN AS KERRY U20 MANAGER

The announcement that John Sugrue is stepping down from his one year tenure as Kerry U20 manager is disappointing but understandable, in this toughest of years. After all, John's family and business is based in Laois. While we eventually came a cropper against Galway in a semi-final of a competition that ultimately didn't finish, there is a strong general consensus that John did a wonderful job of management with the U20s and Kerry senior teams will reap rich rewards over the coming years. Kerry have struggled at U20 level over the past decade, a grade that I believe we have been much too slow to prioritise, and the County Board will have to think hard about his successor.

Following on from his many years with various Kerry management teams and his success with South Kerry, John enjoyed a hugely successful managerial stint with Laois before taking over his native Kerry's U20 team. Luxury Christmas Recipes Head Chef Alex Nahke

In this week's Killarney Outlook the culinary team at The Europe, headed up by Executive Head Chef Alex Nahke, want to help make Christmas special for everyone and have created luxurious recipes for two of the season's favoured foods - the perfect Christmas turkey and classic mince pies.

With some tips and tricks to perfecting your turkey, it's sure to be the star of the Christmas table.

Christmas Turkey

"First things first, you need to decide what size turkey to buy. The below guide gives you an idea based on numbers, although this year we are likely to be opting for smaller turkeys than usual", head chef Alex Nahke explains.

2-2.5kg serves 4-6

3kg serves 6-7

3.5kg serves 7-8

4-4.5kg serves 8-10

5-5.5kg serves 10-12

6-6.5kg serves 12-15

Some important things to consider before you get started.

> Make sure your turkey is going to fit into your oven

2. You're going to need a roasting tin that's big enough for the bird with room to spare, and deep enough to catch all the fat and cooking juices.

3. Make a note of the weight of your bird, knowing the exact weight will ensure the

cooking time is correct, and thus avoid an overcooked and dry bird, or an undercooked one.

4. Get your timings right. And don't forget to leave time for your turkey to rest when it comes out of the oven. Turkeys between 4-6kg should be rested for 1½ hours, and ones from 6-10kg can rest for two hours.

Cooking Temperature and Timing Guide

Heat your oven to 180°C/gas 4

4-5kg - cook 21/4 to 21/2 hours

5-6kg – cook 2½ to 3 hours

6-7kg - cook 3 hours to 31/2 hours

7-8kg – cook 3½ to 4 hours

8-9kg - cook 4 to 41/4 hours

9-10kg - cook 41/4 to 41/2 hours

Or 20 minutes per lbs +20 minutes safety- this is a rough guide

Get your turkey out of the fridge at least 30 minutes to 1 h before you cook it. You'll get less shrinkage when it goes into a hot oven.

Always preheat your oven before cooking your turkev.

Place a trivet of Root Vegetables, like parsnip, carrots and onions in the bottom of the tray to help make a gravy with all the juices.

Slightly season the Turkey Sea Salt & Black Pepper, cover the turkey loosely with foil, but remove it just under an hour before the timing is up to get the turkey nicely browned.

Roast your bird for the calculated time, or until the juices run clear from the thigh if you pierce it with a knife or a skewer. The safest way is to buy a temperate probe and use it to penetrate the thigh if it has a temperature of 70C for 2 min that is perfect and safe.

Once cooked, carefully lift the turkey out of the tray and rest on a board. Cover loosely with foil for at least an hour while you get on cooking your roast

CHEF'S TIPS:

No need to wash a turkey before roasting!! You spread bacteria around your kitchen sink, which is a common mistake people make.

The safest way of cooking the stuffing is NOT stuffing the turkey with it. Turkey can contain high levels of bacteria. In order to kill all bacteria you need to reach a core temperature of 75C instantaneously or equivalent, e.g. 70°C for two minutes in the stuffing, so you have your Turkey completely overcooked by the time this temperature is reached in the stuffing.

Use some of the cooked turkey juices for your stuffing to add the necessary flavour

If you get your butcher to take of the legs for you and bone & roll them, then you are left with the crown and that might fit better in the oven! It also cooks faster and you will have a cleaner way of serving the turkey.

of serving the turkey.

The boned & rolled legs you can cook like your normal Sunday roast and serve 1 slice with each plate.

The Europe Mince Pies



The perfect festive treat, dessert or mid-day pickme-up, mince pies are a classic for a reason! Fragrant seasonal spices, a crumbly crust and a sticky sweet filling - this tried and tested recipe is sure to get the seal of approval this Christmas.

Makes 24 mince pies

INGREDIENTS:

For the pastry cases:

250g plain flour, plus extra to dust

25a icina sugar

125g chilled unsalted butter, diced finely grated zest of 1 orange

1 medium egg, lightly beaten

1–3 tsp ice-cold water (if needed) To finish:

1 egg yolk, beaten with 1 tsp water (eggwash) to glaze icing sugar or caster sugar, to dust

FOR THE FILLING:

450g Plums, halved and stoned 1/2 Lemons, zest & Juice

30ml water- not needed if plums are frozen

2 lg Cooking apples

35g Currants

35g Raisins

35g sultanas

35 g mixed Peel

35 nibbed almonds

120 g sugar

1.5 g ground ginger

1.5 g ground cinnamon

1.5 g ground cloves

Good dash of Brandy if liked

METHOD

Cook plums with Lemon & Water until tender, and solid consistency

liquidise

Peel & grate apples and add to the plum mix

Add all other ingredients including lemon zest & Brandy

Cool down before filling into the tartlets

METHOD

For the pastry, put the flour, icing sugar, butter and orange zest into a food processor and whizz to fine crumbs. With the motor running, add the egg and whizz for a few seconds until the mixture forms clumps and you can press it together into a ball. (If necessary, add 1-3 tsp ice-cold water to bring the dough together.)

Turn onto a very lightly floured surface and knead briefly until smooth. Wrap in cling film and chill for at least 30 minutes, or until firm. (The pastry can be made up to 3 days ahead or frozen for up to a month.)

Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured surface to the thickness of 4mm. Using an 8cm fluted cutter, cut out 24 rounds and use to line two 12-hole non-stick mince pie tins.

Option 1: Re-roll the trimmings to the same thickness and stamp out 24 stars or Christmas trees, with an appropriate cutter, for the tops.

Option 2: Shortcrust topping

250g unsalted Butter

110g caster sugar 360g plain flour

4 g salt

2 g vanilla extract


Whip the soft butter with caster sugar and vanilla extract, when white & fluffy fold in the flour and salt Keep whipping it until you have a soft dough you can pipe onto the filled tartlets

Bake with the filling for 20-25min at 160C

Put a dessert spoonful (2 tsp) filling into each pastry case, then press the tops in position. Chill for at least 20 minutes. Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 180°C/ Gas 4.

Brush the tops with the eggwash, then bake the mince pies for 15-20 minutes until the pastry is golden and crisp. Let cool for a few minutes before removing from the tins and transferring to a wire rack to cool. Store an airtight container in the fridge for up to 1 week. Warm slightly before serving, with a dusting of sugar.



HAPPINESS IN THE WORKPLACE

For many of us a great deal of our day is spent in the work place - or thinking about work, therefore it makes sense that we would aim to make our working lives a happy and pleasant experience. However, when faced with various frustrating challenges at work our stress levels can increase and lead to anything from burnout to boredom to distraction. Whilst some levels of stress at work are normal, excessive stress can interfere with productivity as well as our physical and emotional wellbeing.

In her book Real Happiness at Work, Sharon Salzberg discusses eight pillars of happiness in the workplace. These include balance; concentration; compassion; resilience; communication and connection; integrity; meaning; and open awareness. Throughout the book she presents formal meditations along with mini meditations and practices for the reader to try out. These exercises are simple, small and practical ways in which we can achieve greater calm and satisfaction. The following includes some of the advice she gives us to have a more peaceful and happier day at work.

- Before starting a project, meeting or even a conversation, ask yourself: "What do I most want to see happen from this?" 2. Before starting your day, set an Intention. She gives the following example: "May I treat everyone today with respect, remembering each person wants to be happy as much as I do." 3. Try to perform a simple act of kindness every day. The following are such examples: "holding a door, saying thank you in a sincere manner, or listening to someone with a clear and focused mind."
- 4. Pay attention to your feelings. For example, if you're feeling irritated toward a co-worker, pay attention to your irritation, "not so much the story of why you're irritated, but the actual feeling of it." What does it feel like in your body? Where do you feel it? Identifying irritation as it starts helps you prevent an action you might later regret. "With a more immediate recognition of what we're feeling, we have a choice as to how we want to respond in that moment."
- 5. Think about the people who make your job possible, such as a housekeeper, caretaker or fundraiser - and thank them. These are just some simple measure we can take to generate more happiness in the workplace. Over the next few weeks we will take a closer look at Stress, Workplace Stress and how we can manage it in our lives.

HARDWOOD CUTTINGS A lot of hardwood cuttings are grown on outside in prepared beds but if you are only taking a small amount of cuttings you can grow them in pots as well.

While taking a hardwood cutting pick a good healthy shoot that has grown in the current year. Next remove any soft growth at the tip of the cutting. The cut into sections of about 6-10 inches above a bud at the tip with the cut sloping so the water can't rest on it.

Then cut at the base below a bud or a pair of buds and then dip the lower bud into some rooting powder. Next prepare a trench that is well dug over and has good drainage or if you are growing them in pots, make sure there is plenty of drainage. Insert the cuttings two thirds into your pots or ground and allow about 4-5 inches between cuttings. Cuttings should be left until the following

Autumn and remember to water in dry spells.




