Adventurers are invited to take a walk on the wild side at the end of March as Killarney prepares to embrace the new Wander Wild Festival in Killarney, Co Kerry, which takes place from March 27-29 inclusive, heralding the Spring equinox celebrated with pageantry, fire, passion, drama, adventure and exhibitions. Offering a great escape, the town will come alive with a full-on programme. The inaugural Wander Wild Festival will offer an inside glimpse of what the real Killarney is all about with a springtime celebration of the great outdoors. The guest speakers lined up will include writer and storyteller Michael Harding who will explore rituals, the ocean, soul – and chest pain – while ultra-athlete Shane Finn, who completed 24 marathons in 24 days and cycled and ran across America in 36 days, will share his experiences with special guests in a live podcast. Film will feature prominently throughout the festival with screenings, including The Lost Skytrain, a gripping documentary about the disappearance in 1943 of a WW2 Douglas C-47 plane that was later discovered, with the bodies of five men, by two local farmers on Kerry's McGillycuddy Reeks.

KILIMANJARO BOUND



A Killarney student is set to take on the highest mountain in Africa and the highest single free-standing mountain in the world, Kilimanjaro, in aid of the Meningitis Research Foundation.

Killian Broderick from Listry who is a Business, Economics and Social Studies student at Trinity College Dublin is planning to climb in August of this year along with a group of students from the college he attends. Killian is currently working to secure his poisition on the trip by raising funds towards the cost of \notin 4,220.

The former Intermediate School Killorglin student, is the son of Murt and Carol Broderick.

"Currently I have managed to raise 10% of my target just from a few social media posts. Deadline for fundraising is the 24th of June. On Friday the 6th of March I will be having a pub quiz in Faha Court. €40 for a table of 4. I'm hopeful that this will get close to the halfway mark in my fundraising", Killian told the Killarney Outlook.

"Kilimanjaro is of course going to be a challenge. It demands a high level of fitness and mental fortitude", he added.

"Nearly everyone suffers from altitude

treated correctly. I will be finished exams in Trinity for the start of May and will then be home for nearly 4 months before I embark for Tanzania. During these months I will be training intensely and spending a lot of time on the Reeks. Kilimanjaro will take about a week to conquer and once I am on top of Uhuru I'm sure all the preparation, training and physical fatigue will be forgotten", he added. Higher Education becoming elitist unless new Government intervenes

Early trends indicate that most Kerry applicants couldn't consider entering course choices in Dublin colleges on their 2020 CAO application form due to prohibitive costs. There are many courses in Dublin that Kerry students would love to apply for. Unfortunately, unless they come from wealthy backgrounds or have family accommodation in the city, rural students are restricted to courses nearer home. Kerry is proportionately sending more students to higher education than any other county. Many have to leave the county to pursue their courses of choice. That option is becoming far more difficult due to spiralling costs, particularly accommodation, and a totally inadequate higher education grants system. Every young person from Kerry should have the right to be become a doctor, dentist, pharmacist or whatever, if s/he has the ability. The system is making it much more difficult to achieve that ambition. A succession of past Governments never accepted that education is a right not a privilege. As a lifelong advocate for equality of educational opportunity for all young people, I believe that education should be based on ability to learn, not on ability to pav.

Donogh O'Malley, a dynamic Minister for

Education (1966/68), fifty years ago opened the portals of opportunity to the youth of Ireland by introducing fee-free post-primary education, a free school transport scheme and by providing more 3rd level colleges. He also launched means-tested third level grants, giving easier access to less well-off students. O'Malley's determination to eliminate elitism in education has provided Ireland with the best educated and most productive workforce in Europe.

Higher education is very expensive. The financial burden is somewhat eased for students who qualify for partial or total state funding. The maximum standard maintenance grant payable to students whose college is 45 km (28mls) or more from home is only €3025. In addition, means testing of applicants for grants is so restrictive that thousands of students in higher education are ineligible for any financial aid. Capping the gross annual income level for grant eligibility at €39,875 ignores spiralling living costs. The price of college accommodation is increasing again, by at least 4%, for the new academic year.

Students who are ineligible for grants need about €12,000 annually to maintain themselves away from home or about €4000 if living at

home. The annual

student contribution of €3000 must also be paid. Many college students do up to 15hrs of work part-time and/or depend on their parents to make ends meet. Indeed, 60% of parents get into considerable debt to cover college costs. The incoming Government - left, right or centre - must honour its pre-election promise to ease the financial burden on hard pressed families. Abolish the €3000 student fee contribution immediatelv. Restore the minimum qualification distance between home and college for the non-adjacent grant from 45km (28mls) to its pre-recession level of 24km (15mls). Increase the standard maintenance grant from €3025 to €5000 and all other grants on a pro rata basis. Increase the annual income level for standard grant eligibility to €50,000 from the current level of €39,875. If the youth of Ireland is again betrayed by unfulfilled promises, there will be a high price to pay at

COLLEGE EDUCATION OPEN DAY



Friday, 6th March sees the spring education open day taking place in Clonakilty Agricultural College.

Clonakilty Agricultural College, based in Darrara just outside the town of Clonakilty, provides agricultural education and training in through its own full-time and part-time QQI programmes and also in conjunction with three higher education Institutions in the region, CIT, IT Tralee and UCC.

People coming to see the college and what's on offer will be brought through the different programmes that lead to qualifications from Level 6 up to Level 8.

For students starting 1st year next September, they will follow on with the changes to the programme that were implemented this year and have helped with the learning experience. Students will go on a 4-week placement in October, and return to that farm again in March. During their time in the college between September and May they'll get the foundation training in areas of livestock husbandry,



grassland management, farm business and more specific training in areas such as pesticide application. There is a large emphasis on farm safety, soils and the environment and sustainability.

In 2nd year (Level 6) which starts the following September the course specialises in either Drystock (Cattle and Sheep) or the longerestablished Dairy Herd Management course. Both courses have longer periods of on-farm training incorporating the calving/lambing periods on farms but also the breeding season on cattle and dairy farms.

Graduates of Clonakilty's Level 6 programmes have many routes of progression after the two years with us. The Level 6 in its own right is required for applying for jobs with the Department of Agriculture. By 2021 there will be an apprenticeship route in place with a Level 7 degree qualification. This will be an important extension to the current programmes as there is an ever-increasing demand from farmers in the region to have enthusiastic, forward-thinking young people looking to manage the farms of the next decade. In this respect it is one area of the rural economy where it is a sellers' market.

The higher education routes still exist and continue to expand with graduates of Darrara able to gain "advanced entry" to degree courses in agriculture in all of the Institutes of Technology in Munster; including Cork, Tralee and Waterford.

For people who have a non-agricultural qualification there is the option of gaining a Teagasc Green Cert (the Specific Purpose Certificate in Farming) through a part-time route.

The Open Day starts at 11am on the morning of March 6th and all are welcome to explore their options in agricultural education and job prospects that can arise from coming to Darrara in

This helps to bring the mind into the here and now

rather than spinning off into the future. • Practice the 4,2,6, breath. Breathe in through your nose for 4 counts, hold for 2 and breathe out through your mouth for 6. This helps to calm the parasympathetic nervous system and move you out of a stress response.

DRIVING AND VISION

It is important that you can see clearly to be able to drive safely. Conditions that may affect your visual field and driving include strokes and brain tumours, as well as eye conditions such as diabetic retinopathy and glaucoma (if you have them in both eyes).

Make sure you have regular sight tests and if your optometrist tells you that you must not drive, you must stop all driving immediately. Driving when you are medically unfit to do so is a criminal offence, and you may be prosecuted if you are involved in an accident. Driving glasses

If you have been advised to wear glasses for driving, make sure you wear them, even for short trips – and keep a spare pair in the car. Choose glasses with thinner sides for driving as they won't block your side vision as much as thicker ones. If you wear contact lenses, keep a pair of glasses in the car in case you need to take your lenses out. Even if you don't need to wear glasses all the time, you will probably find they are particularly helpful when the lighting is poor, and for driving at night.

Headlights of oncoming traffic can be dazzling when you

are driving at night or in poor weather conditions. Special driving lenses designed with a specially-developed glare filter and a contrast-enhancing filter can help reduce reflections and uncomfortable glare from oncoming traffic.

If glare is an ongoing problem for you, make sure your windscreen and headlights are thoroughly cleaned and free from grime and dirt. If you wear glasses, and don't forget to keep them clean too. If you find that problems with glare at night persist, make an appointment to have a sight test. Sunshine can be dazzling too, particularly when the sun is low in the sky. If you wear glasses, you may find it helpful to have a pair of prescription sunglasses in the car, or to wear clip-on sunglasses over your prescription glasses. Polarised sunglasses are great for driving in bright conditions. Polarised lenses

WALSH FAMILY CELEBRATE OVER 100 YEARS OF POLICING

On February 21st 2020 exactly 98 years to the day since the foundation of An Garda Siochána, Cillian Walsh from St. Margaret's Road became the fourth member and fourth generation of the Walsh family to join An Garda Siochána.

The son of Ray and Mary Walsh, Cillian graduated from the Garda College in Templemore on that date and has been assigned to Terenure Garda Station in Dublin where he began his life as a police officer on today February 24th 2020 continuing a proud tradition preceded by his Great Grandfather, his Grandfather and Father in An Garda Siochána.

The oldest member of the Walsh family who served in the Police was Ray's maternal Grandfather, Michael O'Halloran who joined the Royal Irish Constabulary (RIC) circa 1910 and served in the RIC until the foundation of the Irish State in 1922. With the formation/founding of An Garda Siochána on February 21st 1922 Michael joined as one of the first members of An Garda Siochána and served in Counties Meath, Cork and Kildare. During his time in Co. Cork he served in the village of Meelin and it was at this time that Ray's mother and her sisters attended boarding school at the Loreto Convent Killarney.Ray's father Tom Walsh joined An Garda Siochána in the late 1940's and served until 1979 having been stationed in Ballincollig, Cork City, Limerick City, Kinlough, Co. Leitrim, Ballineety & Cappamore Co. Limerick. Tom retired as Sergeant in Charge of Mayorstone Garda Station in Limerick City.

Ray joined An Garda Siochána in 1980 and served for 31 years before retiring as Sergeant in Charge of Killarney Garda Station having served at different times in Cahersiveen, Killarney, Tralee, Brosna, and Roxboro Road in Limerick City.

TRALEE CBS SEE OFF SEM CHALLENGE

Corn uí Mhuirí Final: Tralee CBS 4-15 St. Brendans 1-15

n a game that took a crazy but enthralling amount of swings and roundabouts, the Sem looked dead and buried at half-time, inevitable winners twenty minutes later, and were finally defeated by a margin that even Tralee would admit wasn't reflective of their efforts.

Tralee had a huge wind advantage at the start and took full advantage. Conor Hayes opened the scoring before Seán Quilter boomed over an incredible score from distance. Jordan Kissane added another from the wing. The wind was holding up Sem kick-outs and Tralee were snapping up all the midfield breaks. When Sean Quilter stood over a free that was well within his range, everyone expected the margin to increase by a point – instead, he snapped it quickly to a lurking Jordan Kissane, who finished to the net. Quilter took the straightforward option with another free and it was 1-4 to 0-0.

The Sem forwards were trying hard with a paucity of possession. Dylan O'Callaghann latched onto a ball and fed it across to Jason Kerins in the square – he was opulled down, but Emmet O'Shea drilled home a brilliant penalty. It was a brief interruption to Tralee's dominance as they added points by Cian Purcell and Fergal O'Brien. William Shine cleverly took an advance mark (the only one in the game) for St. Brendans' first point. Jordan Kissane cancelled that out, but at least the Sem were making some headway. Emmet O'Shea set up Ryan O'Grady for a welltaken point but Fergal O'Brien replied with a great free-kick. Emmet won a free for Ryan but again O'Brien responded with a score and then won a '45 drilled over by Devon Burns - the Tralee keeper was at his brilliant best in this game.

At 1-10 to 1-3, the gap looked just about manageable considering the strong wind, but Tralee drew another ace when Seán Quilter rose high to a long ball and batted it down to fellow Kerry U20 Conor Hayes. The Strand Road man, son of popular referee Paul, hit an unstoppable finish and Tralee's lead was into double figures. Emmet O'Shea pulled one back, but things still looked very bleak at the break for the Sem. Half-time Tralee CBS 2-10 St. Brendans 1-4

The second half was even more one-sided than the first – but it was a dramatic role reversal. It was the Sem who were doing all the hunting and harrying now. Michael Lenihan in particular took over midfield with an awesome display and once the supply lines were opened, the Sem forwards showed what they can do. Lenihan set up Emmet O'Shea for a point and Ryan O'Grady turned supplier for William Shine. William in turn won a free converted by Emmet and Padraic Looney swung over a beauty. 2-10 to 1-8

Ryan O'Grady split the posts. Mark Cooper drove forward - with Tralee concentrating on closing down his passing options rather than closing him down, he calmly stroked it over the bar. 2-10 to 1-10, just a goal between them. Emmet O'Shea with a free. Straight from the kick-out, the Sem came hunting again, Ryan O'Grady splitting the posts. 2-10 to 1-12, a one point game, and the Green hadn't had a single shot in the half yet. That was about to change, and again the game changed dramatically. The wind dying down was a factor, but the main key to Tralee's resurgence was unquestionably was the introduction of substitute Sean Kennedy. The Annascaul player scored 2-5 from midfield against an East Kerry side that included Neil O'Shea, Evan Looney, Tom Doyle, Ruairí Doyle, Eoghan O'Sullivan, Emmet O'Shea, Dylan O'Callaghan, Harry Buckley, and Ryan O'Grady to win the U14 County Final back in 2016. He had concentrated more on a soccer contract with Sunderland since then, but it was obvious very quickly that he had left none of his football skills behind him.

He drove through to tee up Conor Hayes for a vital point, Tralee's first in 19 minutes. That turned the tide completely, Sean Quilter won a penalty, but Eoin Moynihan made a great save. Quilter caught the rebound, won a free, and put it over. Minutes later Kennedy was again at the heart of a great move, driving through with Conor Hayes coolly slotting home his second goal. Seán Quilter added a point and the lead was back to 3-13 to 1-2.

The Sem kept going, with Ryan O'Grady forcing a good save out of Devon Burns and Emmet O'Shea pointing a free, but the Green had the bit between their teeth now. Conor hayes in particular was on fire, and he reacted fastest to Fergal O'Brien's deflected effort, punching it into the net to complete his hat-trick. Seán Quilter added a point and Jordan Kissane closed out Tralee's scoring, with a late '45 and a pointed free by Ryan O'Grady closing out the Sem's efforts.

SP Sliabh Luachra have been hugely uimpressing in football in recent years, but they have been even more successful in basketball. The side that headed up to play St. Malachys in the U19 A Final in the National Basketball Arena last Monday included three players facing their fourth All Ireland Final - Ronan Collins and the Cronin twins Damien and Mark have two U16 All Irelands won already. That said, this was always going to be a very small David against a very big Goliath, St. Malachys is situated in the heart of Belfast and is the most prolific basketball nursery out there. They are coached by Adrian Fulton, one of the great Superleague players of yore with Star of the Sea (he was a frequent visitor to Killarney to take on St. Pauls in the 90s) and a former international. They had three current Superleague players in their ranks. Conor Ryan and Darragh Ferguson are very good players, but Adrian's son CJ belongs in the stratosphere. This guy is to basketball what David Clifford was to football in 2018, a genuine wunderkind. David Gleeson had two early baskets and the outstanding Ronan Collins sank three, with point guard Damien Cronin also shining in a first quarter that finished 11 apiece. Fulton was already doing damage with his steals, though, and he helped Malachys into a big 33 - 20 lead by half-time. Two big three-pointers by Paul O'Leary helped to trim the gap back to 10 points but then Darragh Ferguson cut loose, closing the half with a lay-up, a three, and a free shot. 49 - 31. Ferguson was sinking everything he touched, adding another 8 points. Tommy Bowler (the only Killarney Cougars player among his Gneeveguilla and Rathmore team-mates) sank a great three but the momentum was all with St. Malachys and they were never going to be caught. Darragh Ferguson (25) got MVP after that scoring spree but, having watched the video, I actually thought that Ronan Collins did more overall while Fulton (16), for me, was the

Ladies National League: Kerry 3-14 Tyrone 0-8 The Kerry Ladies are in flying form and looked comfortable against the Red Hand early on after Niamh Ní Chonchúir's early goal and a shooting exhibition by the outstanding Louise Ní Muircheartaigh. Tyrone rallied but Kerry led by double scores, 1-9 to 0-6, with Ní Muircheartaigh already with 0-6 on the board. The second half was a tight contest after Tyrone scored a penalty but Kerry always looked that bit sharper and Louise Ní Muircheartaigh's penalty made the game safe as well as taking her own tally to 1-10. Kerry finished with a flourish, Hannah O'Donoghue goaling with the kind of audacious lob that makes the likes of Cristiano Ronaldo look mundane; it was a real moment of magic.

GAA Congress 2020

It always tends to slide under the radar, especially after a Special Congress already this year that introduced the new playing rules, but Congress is actually where the direction of the GAA is decided and this year sees a number of important motions up for debate. With a whopping 61 motions going forward, obviously time for debate will be limited, but these are a few of the more interesting ones up for discussion.

Black Card For Hurling: Purists will claim that hurling dioesn't need it, but the truth is that the game has gotten very physical and occasionally cynical. The sin bin has worked wonderfully in football; I wouldn't mind it in hurling, but I am in a clear minority. 89% of inter-county hurlers opposed the black card in a recent poll. Kerry will be voting against its introduction.

Club Games To Go To 35 Minutes a Half: Kerry will also be voting against this one. 60 hard minutes is plenty long enough for amateur players.

All Ireland and Provincial Championship Semi-Finals to go to Replays: At the moment semifinals go to extra-time and penalties. That's with good reason; the crowded fixture list doesn't have room to bring them to replays. Kerry will be voting against. Head Injuries to be Treated as Blood Injuries: A player can leave the field, replaced by a temporary sub, for HIA. Badly wanted, overdue, and almost certain to be

unanimous.

Managers/Captains to Have Two Calls For Hawk-Eye: Great in theory, similar to tennis. Except that tennis is a stop/start game. I don't agree with this; I think it would be used strategically to eat up the clock rather than for good reasons. Let's at least wait until sufficient grounds have Hawk-Eye. Two Designated Players Allowed to Question the Referee: They say that the road to hell is paved with good intentions. In my opinion, this one has landmines all the way. No, no, and a thousand times no. Leave the match officials alone. This would only exacerbate, not solve, the ongoing problem of abuse of officials. That a Designated Official be Allowed to Consult the Referee: See above.

EMPLOYMENT CONTRACTS - YOUR EMPLOYER OBLIGATIONS

Employers are legally obliged to provide workers with a written statement of the employment agreement between the two parties (the Contract).

Having Contracts of Employment in place can offer protection to the Company in the event of a dispute or issue arising. This document can help to safeguard the Company in the event of employee litigation or Labour Court hearings.

Reasons why you, as an Employer, need to issue a Contract of Employment:

. It outlines the requirements of the position and the conditions the person is meant to work against.

It addresses the legal requirements against which all employees are protected today.

 In the event of poor performance the employer can refer to the contract and all conditions contained therein, and manage the employee against such conditions.

. The use of probationary periods is fundamental for all new employees.

These give the employer an opportunity to assess new recruits.

Legal Requirements

The Terms of Employment (Information) Acts 1994 and 2001 provide that an employer is obliged to provide an employee with a written statement of terms of employment.

The Minimum Terms of Employment Act also provides that within the first FIVE days of employment, all new employees must be issued with a document that outlines their 5 core terms of employment. The document must be issued even if the employee leaves. An award of up to 4 weeks wages may be made where an employer is found to have failed to issue such a statement.

Citizens Information

Know Your Rights:

Question

My daughter is starting secondary school in September and we live 5 kilometres from her school. Am I eligible for the School Transport Scheme?

Answer

You may qualify for the School Transport Scheme. The scheme provides subsidised school transport for both post-primary and primary pupils. Bus Éireann runs the school bus service and the Department of Education and Skills decides the annual fares.

The service is only provided where there are at least 10 eligible pupils in a distinct locality that can be economically serviced by a bus route. Even when a pupil meets the age and distance criteria for school transport, there is no legal entitlement to it.

Your daughter is eligible for the Post-Primary School Transport Scheme if she is attending her nearest school and lives 4.8 kilometres or more from the school. The Department and Bus Éireann determine the appropriate nearest school with regard to ethos and language.

Parents must arrange to bring their child to the nearest pick-up point on the bus route. Generally, bus routes are organised so that no pupil has more than 3.2 kilometres to travel to a pick-up point.

There is a single annual charge of €350 per pupil. However a family does not pay more than €650 per year. The charge is due to be paid in full by the end of July or else in 2 instalments: by the end of July and the start of December. Pupils who are eligible for school transport and who hold a valid medical card are entitled to free school transport to the nearest school.

Since your child is enrolling in post-primary school for the first time, you should either apply for school transport online or download the form from Bus Éireann's website, buseireann.ie. Applications are now being accepted for the 2020-2021 school year. You should apply by Friday, 24 April 2020.

COPING WITH GRIEF

Whilst we may often think of grief resulting from the death of a loved one, any loss can cause grief. These losses may include divorce or the break up of a relationship, a miscarriage, loss of a pet, loss of our health, a job, a cherished dream, a friendship, financial security, or selling the family home.

Grieving is a highly individual and personal experience and the way in which we grieve can depend on many different elements. These include our personality, our life experiences, our faith, the nature of the loss, our resillence and coping style. Grief can be like a roller coaster – with ups and downs. Powerful feelings can come unexpectedly some more intense and longer lasting than others. Feelings can range from shock and disbelief, to guilt, sadness, anger, fear and frustration. Physical symptoms are also common such as weight loss/gain, insomnia, fatigue, nausea, aches and pains. Forgetfulness and poor concentration are also symptoms of grief. All of these feelings are perfectly normal and there is no right or wrong way to feel. Sometimes people can feel guilty about their anger – but it is okay to be angry.

It is important not to go through this alone and to talk and share your feelings. This may be with family and friends or you may prefer the support of a counsellor. Counselling can offer the space and time to talk through your feelings and overcome obstacles to your grieving. Allowing yourself time to experience your feelings is very important even if, at times, they are difficult. For many people their faith, prayer, meditation or going to church can be a great solace in times of loss. Support groups where you can share your sorrow with others who have experienced similar losses can be also be of tremendous help.

It is vitally important that you take care of yourself when you are grieving. You are coming to terms with a major upheaval in your life so give yourself permission to take things a bit easier. Your energy may be low, so do not place too many demands on yourself and make sure you get enough rest and sleep. It is important to look after your physical health by eating healthily and getting some exercise each day. Don't rush things and put off making major decisions such as moving home or changing jobs for at least six months to a year.

When David got overwhelmed he "encouraged himself in the Lord". He recalled past victories where God delivered him and gave Him refuge and rest from his enemies (1st Samuel 17:37). By simply quietening down and surrendering our burdens to the Lord, praising Him IN every situation we tune into His strategies for overcoming our enemy (1st Samuel 30:6: Psalm 131; Psalm 55). We don't praise God FOR the problem, instead we praise Him in it - and He leads us out. The greatest offering you can give God is your worship, especially when circumstances are not good. This is not to win favour with Him, because we can never make ourselves righteous by good works, but heartfelt worship, and faith in Jesus' victory, enforces the devil's defeat through praise (Psalm 8:2). God is not the author of our problems dear reader - Satan is. He hates us because we are God's offspring created in His image. He brings attacks against us to block God's plans for us, having gained legal access because of our sin. But God made the Way for us to be saved and delivered from the power of the devil, sin and death. He sent His Son Jesus to redeem us by His perfect sinless blood and pay the penalty for our victory. (Ephesians 1:7; John 3:16-21; Acts 10:38) Friend, you are an over-comer in Christ!
