CAUSE FOR CELEBRATION AS **KILLARNEY RETURNS** TO THE TOP TEN IN IBAL REPORT

OF THE TOP LITTER GRADE

illarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce has said there is real cause for celebration this week following the town's return to the top ten in the Irish Business Against Litter League (IBAL).

Killarney has been declared Cleaner than European Norms - the highest possible rating and the adjudicators were lavish in their praise of the effort being made in the town.

Chamber noted that the judges were particularly impressed by the work put in to tackle the commercial bins storage area at the Glebe car park which was identified as a problem area in previous reports but it was awarded the top grade on this occasion.

The Chamber executive said there is great credit due to the management and staff and

KILLARNEY WAS VERY MUCH DESERVING ; the elected members of Killarney Municipal District Council for successfully addressing that issue and to the outdoor staff who work tirelessly every day to continue the war against litter on the streets and approach roads.

> It was also very noteworthy, Chamber added, that very favourable mention was made of the campaign to eliminate single use coffee cups and Killarney is leading the way nationally in that regard.

> It is now hoped that the government will introduce the long-promised levy on single use cups so that the rest of the country can benefit to the same extent that Killarney has.

> "The most pleasing aspect of the entire report is that the IBAL adjudicators noted that there were no heavily littered sites in the entire town and that most of the areas inspected were deemed to be spotless and deserving of an A grade," Chamber added.

> The business organisation said the reintroduction of the Killarney Looking Good Competition and the huge effort being put in by tidy towns volunteers, business owners and residents has contributed enormously in maintaining the town in such pristine condition and it all augurs well for the national tidy towns competition later in the year.

> "The tidy towns adjudication and the Looking Good Competition judging has commenced and we would encourage everybody in the town to continue their great efforts to ensure Killarney is in the mix for the top honours,"

The An Taisce report for Killarney stated:

Hopefully this will have resulted in overall less litter being deposited in the regular street bins. All aspects of the Recycle Facility at High Street Car Park were in very good order - it was spotless. New Market Lane is a lovely town centre outdoor dining environment which was very much deserving of the top litter grade.

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A man who paints pictures with words

Ireland Mournes The Great Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh RIP



Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh may be best remembered for his many gentle witticisms scattered among the most insightful sports commentary the vast majority of us have ever heard – Micheál Ó hEithir was an icon in his own right in a time where radio was king, but he defined a generation of players rather than immortalised them. Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh made us laugh spontaneously - though he always acknowledged that such spontaneity stemmed from meticulous research. There were times you came out of a great game that you had attended in person to find everyone talking more about Micheál's commentary than the match itself. To paraphrase another great voice of the people, though in print form, Con Houlihan, "I missed Italia '90; I was in Italy at the time". Micheál could make you feel like that. Many of you will have come across these quotes a thousand times, especially in this sad week, and might wonder why I am repeating them here. It's far from my first time quoting the great man and it will be far from my last; these quotes are always new to some-one. Among his many gems are:

"Seán Óg Ó hAilpín.... his father's from Fermanagh, his mother's from Fiji, neither one of them a hurling stronghold."

"He's not a big man, he's not a small man, he's what you might call a handy man..."

"Teddy McCarthy to John McCarthy, no relation, John McCarthy back to Teddy McCarthy, still no relation."

"In the first half they played with the wind. In the second half they played with the ball."

"Stephen Byrne with the puck-out for Offaly. Stephen, one of 12. All but one are here today, the one that's missing is Mary, she's at home minding the house. And the ball is dropping i lár na bpáirce..."

"... and Brian Dooher is down injured. And while he is, I'll tell ye a little story. I was in Times Square in New York last week, and I was missing the Championship back home. So I approached a newsstand and I said 'I suppose you wouldn't have the Kerryman would you?' To which the Egyptian man behind the counter replied 'do you want the North Kerry edition or the South Kerry edition?'. He had both, so I bought both. And Dooher is back on his feet..."

"1-5 to 0-8...well from Lapland to the Antartic, that's level scores in any man's language."

"He grabs the sliotar, he's on the 50…he's on the 40…he's on the 30…he's on the ground."

"Setanta Ó hAilpín....the original Setanta from the old Gaelic stories was ten foot tall, had ten fingers on each hand and ten toes on each foot but even he couldn't be playing better hurling than his namesake here today."

"The stopwatch has stopped. It's up to God and the referee now. The referee is Pat Horgan. God is God."

"Colin Corkery on the 45 lets go with the right boot. It's over the bar. This man shouldn't be playing football. He's made an almost Lazarus-like recovery from a heart condition. Lazarus was a great man but he couldn't kick **BY: JIMMY O'SULLIVAN DARCY**

points like Colin Corkery."

"And here's Sylvie Linnane, who drives a digger on a Monday and turns into one on a Sunday."

"Anthony Lynch, the Cork corner-back, would be the last person to let you down - his people are undertakers"

And my own personal favourites....

"I saw a few Sligo people at Mass in Gardiner Street this morning and the omens seem to be good for them, the priest was wearing the same colours as the Sligo jersey! 40 yards out on the Hogan Stand side of the field Ciarán Whelan goes on a rampage, it's a goal. So much for religion."

And last but certainly not least...

"Pat Fox has it on his hurl and is motoring well now... but here comes Joe Rabbitte hot on his tail.... I've seen it all now, a Rabbitte chasing a Fox around Croke Park!"

Those quotes, deservedly famous as they are, do not approach a summation of his greatness as a commentator and as a person.

As he recorded himself in his best-selling memoir "From Dun Síon to Croke Park", he had a normal country upbringing in West Kerry - all his life he considered himself an ordinary man of his people. The fact is that he was obviously wrong about that - he didn't so much epitomise his generation and his culture as transcend them. There was a certain aura of mysticism attached to him by popular culture, especially in his later years. You could think that he sprang full grown from a Maurice Walsh novel or stepped out of a scene from 'The Quiet Man' - it would have been a shorter film if he had been there. There was talk at one stage of him standing for a Presidential election. There is no doubt in my mind that if he had opted to stand, no actual election would have been needed. I'm pretty sure that Micheal D. Higgins (a man that I am very proud to have represent the Irish people) would say as much himself. Like I say, Micheál didn't epitomise those Irish generations from the sixties to the late eighties; he epitomised an idealised version of ourselves. He was what people aspired to, unknown to himself.

He started his broadcasting career in 1949. According to the man himself, he was fortunate in knowing one of the players during a test broadcast and crediting him with better play than the examiners realised – I suspect that is his modesty and humour coming to the fore. The plain fact is that he was a natural from the very start. He had an intimate knowledge of gaelic games - it's often forgotten that while he didn't play county, he was in fact a very good player in his own right. He was a nephew of Kerry player Jerry 'Pluggy' Moriarty, who famously marked the great Larry Stanley of Kildare, and a first cousin of another Jerry 'Pluggy' Moriarty who captained the Kerry Juniors in 1949, and a cousin of Murt Moriarty of Dingle who played for Kerry in the '90s. Micheál himself, of course, had an uncanny knack of knowing the links between players and generations. For him, gaelic games were an unfolding narrative of Irish culture, and that was simply the sea in which his great mind swam.

He rarely spoke of it, and certainly never boasted of it, but he was an integral part of the success of the Kerry Golden Years team himself. Back in the sixties Micheál was friends with a Kerry footballer who was doing hi teacher training in Dublin, where Micheál taught for most of his life. Donie O'Sullivan wanted to do some training on his own but had no means of transport. Micheál, being Micheál and being a proud Kerryman himself, would drive Donie to UCD and wait while the defender trained. When Mick O'Dwyer took over from Johnny Culloty as Kerry trainer and opted for a hard-working youth policy, he had players based in Dublin and he wanted them doing training programmes during the week. Donie O'Sullivan suggested his old friend and Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh took over the training sessions in Dublin. Micheál knew what he was doing; O'Dwyer was able to confidently rely on him for all the years while Kerry were dominating. Micheál didn't confine his help or advice to Kerrymen either. Anyone who thought he would knows nothing about Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh and little enough about the GAA.

He was always famously approachable. I won't relay any of my own encounters with the great man; I'm not sure I know anyone who didn't meet him personally. And like Kipling's poetic paragon, Micheál could always 'walk with kings, nor lose that common touch'. In short, he had an innate and natural way of making you feel like the most interesting person he could be talking to, and it was no affectation. He simply was that interested in people and as happy to converse with everyone.

It'll surprise a few people to know that there

was one exception. When he was commenting on a game, he was absolutely focused from the moment the teams came out for the warm-up. He had copious handwritten notes arranged in order. One of the children – Doireann initially, Neasa in later years, and I'm told they all did it at some stage – would stand over him with a pointer, indicating on a teamsheet who was in possession or who had finished a particular move. And his descriptive voice....even being there watching it, games felt better on the radio than in person. It was as close as I have seen to magic, and it was because he was the consummate professional. It's a harder art than many people think, but he had the gift of making it sound very easy.

He may have been the greatest person I have ever met. Not just in terms of GAA, in anything. I honestly believe that Ireland will be the poorer without him but all the richer for the memory of Dun Síon's greatest son.

Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh (Dún Síon, Co. Kerry / Kilcock, Co. Meath) passed away peacefully on the 25 June 2024 in the Mater Hospital, Dublin. He will be sadly missed by his loving wife Helena, his children Éamonn, Niamh, Aonghus, Cormac, Neasa, Nuala, Éadaoin and Doireann, his grandchildren, his sisters Kathleen and Máire and all his relatives and friends. Predeceased by his brothers Pádraig, Náis and Dónal and sisters Siobhán and Eibhlín.

Killarney to celebrate like never before

he generosity of the man who built America also created a more spectacular Killarney and that incredible deed will be celebrated in great style in the town on Wednesday and Thursday next.

Killarney will always be extremely grateful to the McShain family, not only for the gift of Killarney House and Gardens, but for the donation of Inisfallen Island, Ross Castle and 8,000 acres of parkland, mountains and lake which John and Mary McShain presented to the town.

That remarkable kindness, when added to the generosity of the Bourn Vincent family in Muckross, helped to create Ireland's first national park and enhance Killarney's reputation as the country's tourist capital.

The valued relationship will be very much to the fore during next week's Celebration of Irish American Friendship with the captivating story of John McShain to be told, through poetry, music and song, in a special hour-long production at the Anam Arts and Cultural Centre on Thursday, July 4th (5.00pm).

Co-produced and choreographed by richly talented locals Noel Patrick O'Sullivan and

Fiona Crowley, it will tell the McShain story through the thought-provoking poetry of Tim Buckley, the musical talents of Tony O'Flaherty and Miriam O'Sullivan, the voice of Mary Culloty O'Sullivan and dance courtesy of the Maureen Hegarty Academy.

Detailed script research into the life of the McShain family was conducted by Rachel Kelleher of the NPWS and special permission has been received from the Hagley Museum in Wilmington, Delaware to use iconic images from the coveted McShain family collection in the hour-long production.

"History will tell you what happened but a song will tell you how it felt," Noel Patrick O'Sullivan remarked.

This year also there will be an opportunity to remember the estimated six million Irish people who emigrated to the US since 1820, whose descendants now proudly describe themselves as Irish-American.

Their story will be traced in an engaging public lecture in the appropriate setting of the Garden Room Killarney House – the former McShain residence – on the evening of Wednesday, July 3rd. The guest speaker will be acclaimed genealogist and author Kay Caball who will share insights on who emigrated and why, how and to where they travelled and their connections to the Kerry of today.

The big attraction of the Celebration of Irish American Friendship will, of course, be the spectacular parade on Thursday with fantastic floats, favourite Disney characters, beautiful princesses, marching bands and colourful cheerleaders.

The parade will start at Killarney Outlet Centre at 7.00pm and it will pass through Fair Hill, College Street, Plunkett Street and Main Street and several hundred people are expected to line the street for the gala occasion.

Other highlights of the Celebration of Irish American Friendship will include a kids zone on the grounds of St Mary's Church of Ireland on Thursday afternoon, a family-friendly drum dance at College Square at 4.00pm that day, DJ beats on Main Street from 5.30pm to 6.50pm, a brass band performance at College Square at 5.30pm and a rousing street party with local favourites Truly Diverse on the Main Street stage from 8.00pm to 9.00pm.

John McShain, who died in September 1989 at the age of 93, was a charismatic building contractor who became known as the man who built America.

A bachelor's degree graduate from the La Salle University in Philadelphia, during his incredible lifetime, the wealthy construction baron, racehorse owner and philanthropist was the main contractor in the \$4.25 million reconstruction of the White House during the Truman years from 1949-1952.

He was also responsible for the construction of the Pentagon, the Jefferson Memorial, the Roosevelt Library at Hyde Park, the JFK Centre for Performing Arts, Washington National Airport and many other notable US landmarks.

The man who built America loved Killarney

The records of the McShain enterprises in the United States became an important part of the collection of the Hagley Museum and Library which is an archive for commerce, industry and technology, in Wilmington, DE.

A lifelong Republican, John McShain also owned some of the world's most valuable thoroughbred racehorses and enjoyed a string of top-notch successes in blue riband events like the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, the Ascot Gold Cup, the Irish Derby and the St Leger.

Born in Philadelphia in 1898, McShain was the youngest son of Slaughtmanus, Co Derry-born Catholic immigrants, John and Catherine McShain. John Snr went to seek his fortune in America in 1885 where he joined the firm of his uncle, William J McShain before starting out on his own three years later, working mainly on projects sponsored by the Catholic Church.

Destined for a career in the legal

profession or as a devout Catholic, possibly a life in the priesthood, at the age of 21 he somewhat reluctantly took hold of the reins of the company, John McShain Inc, following the death of his father.

John Jnr's wife, Mary Horstmann, a native of Philadelphia who he married in 1927, was a member of a large Philadelphia Catholic family of wool merchants and her pioneering community and charity work later saw her become a Lady of the Grand Cross of the Holy Sepulchre and a Dame of Malta.

In 1976 she was the recipient of the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice Cross, the highest honour the Vatican can bestow on a laywoman and, the following year, she was presented with honorary doctorates from three universities.

A close, personal friend of former President of Ireland, Seán T O'Kelly, and a regular visitor to Killarney, in the late 1950s John McShain acquired Killarney House and its sprawling 25,000 estate and he spent the twilight of his life there until his death.

In 1973, the McShains gifted the priceless Innisfallen Island, Ross Castle and 8,000 acres of parkland, mountains and lake to the State and an agreement was reached that, when Mr and Mrs McShain passed on, Killarney House and Gardens would be given to the Irish Government for a very nominal sum. When his wife, Mary, died in 1998, their daughter Sr Pauline, carried out her father's wishes and handed the keys and the deeds of the property to the people.

Sr Pauline, a Philadelphia based member of the Society of the Child Jesus order, passed away in March 2019.

John and Mary McShain are buried side by side in his native Philadelphia but their incredible legacy will always live on in their adopted home of Killarney.

Paddle Your Own Canoe

The capsize of a canoe with three people on board on Lough Leane a week ago reminds us of the need to keep a waterproof mobile phone on the water. Especially late at night. Valentia Coastguard told me one man was very lucky as hypothermia was setting in by the time he was plucked to safety by the Shannon based rescue helicopter. It was 10 pm when the emergency services got the call. They believe all three men were local. The call was made from the lake as they clung to their canoe. One man made it ashore but the others were taken from the water and onto UHK inTralee.

Canoeing and kayaking in Killarney is becoming ever more popular. I see at least one Dingle based company advertising kayaking tours.

It would be nice to see the lakes and waterways more used for leisure - not just for commercial tourist activity or angling competitions.

It is the case in Ireland that we don't use waterways in the same manner as European cities and we must re-learn how to use them as transport and as leisure areas.

In order to kayak or canoe within the Killarney National Park, people must obtain a permit.

Obtaining a permit for kayaking is relatively easy, the rangers tell me. You simply telephone 064 6635215 during office hours and schedule a drop into the base in the old stone cow houses on the main N71 road opposite Muckross House.

New Start for Outlet Centre

Planning has gone in for the creation of food kiosks dining area and bar in the Killarney Outlet Centre as well as upgrade of retail units. It's a great idea for the centre which is one of the most standout buildings in Killarney - but which has never really taken off, at least on the Upper /First Floor. When it opened in 1999 in Killarney there was a prohibition on dining facilities and on sale of food of any kind in the Outlet.. I forget the rationale, or lack of by the then planning authority, the Killarney Town Council.

The ban was soon lifted.

The Killarney Outlet Centre was built on what was once the old railway yard owned by CIE owners of the Great Southern.

Surveys in the town had identified a huge lack of retail in Killarney.

The new plans, if they are given the go ahead by the now Tralee based planning office, will see the centre opening past midnight at weekends with closing at 11 pm from Sunday to Thursday.

Further plans are in train to give a new

In the meantime, our local councillors must lobby to bring back the town councils and to reinstate planning and other powers locally.

Some associates of the Monsignor and Major Sam Derry died here. - The Irish College, an important centre for the

- The Wednesday Papal Audience in St Peter's Square.

- A visit to St Peter's Basilica through the Holy Door open for the

2025 Jubilee Year.

- Palazzo Doria, home of Prince Filippo Andrea Doria Pamphilj, the

greatest benefactor of the Rome Escape Line. O'Flaherty made a famous escape himself from here when the building was surrounded by Germans in October 1943.

KERRY HOUSE PRICES RISE 9% in three months

The price of the average second-hand threebed semi in County Kerry has increased to \in 332,500, up 9% from \in 305,000 in the last three months, according to a national survey by Real Estate Alliance.

Across the county, the average time taken to sell fell by one week to a total of six weeks, the Q2 REA Average House Price Index shows.

The survey shows that across the county, 65% of purchasers were first-time buyers and 15% of purchasers were from outside of the county.

A total of 30% of sales in the county this quarter were attributed to landlords leaving the market.

"The first two months of the quarter were quiet, but in the last month the market has

taken off again and prices have increased substantially," said Donal Culloty of REA Coyne and Culloty, Killarney.

"There are very few houses for sale with numerous bidders, and prices are achieving well over the advertised value."

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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.

Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000. Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power.

There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

What does progress look like in my training or fitness journey?

Progress might mean different things for different people but no matter what we are looking to do, be it lose weight, tone up, get stronger, progress in a nutshell is about being better than we were last week or last month.

So, for example for someone who's goal is to lose weight then progress can easily be measure on the weighing scales. Regular weigh-ins such as once a month, at the same time of the day – first thing in the morning is a good example – will give you exactly where you are after each month.

For someone that is looking to get stronger it will show up as an ability to lift heavier than last month, or maybe you have kept the weight that you are lifting at the same level but you have increased your reps and sets. Or even before you increase either of the above you are working away at the reps and sets and weight you started out with but after a number of weeks you are getting to the end of the prescribed sets and reps and it feels like you could have kept going. This clearly shows that you have progressed as the same workout you found challenging at the beginning of your journey is now not testing you in the same manner.

It is not that you are wasting your time at that level but to make further progress you need to increase the load or challenge.

For that person that wants to tone up, this is going to be a by-product of doing strength work and getting stronger but feeling like your clothes fit differently is a good indicator.

Then for some of us basic movements that we once found challenging are no longer as challenging and our mobility and flexibility is much improved compared to before we started out on our fitness programme.

DIABETIC RETINOPATHY

Diabetic retinopathy is a complication of diabetes. It's caused by high blood sugar levels damaging the back of the eye (retina). It can cause blindness if left undiagnosed and untreated.

The retina needs a constant supply of blood. It receives this through a network of tiny blood vessels. Over time, a high blood sugar level can damage these blood vessels in 3 main stages:

Stage 1: Background retinopathy

Tiny bulges develop in the blood vessels. These may bleed slightly but do not usually affect vour vision.

Stage 2: Pre-proliferative retinopathy

More severe and widespread changes affect the blood vessels. These include more significant bleeding into the eye.

Stage 3: Proliferative retinopathy

Scar tissue and new blood vessels, which are weak and bleed easily, develop on the retina. This can result in some loss of vision.

If a problem with your eyes is picked up early, lifestyle changes and treatment can stop it getting worse.

Risk of diabetic retinopathy

Anyone with Type 1 or Type 2 diabetes is at risk of developing diabetic retinopathy. You're at a greater risk if you:

have had diabetes for a long time

• have a persistently high blood glucose (blood sugar) level

- have high blood pressure
- have high cholesterol

 develop a serious illness such as sepsis or pneumonia

are pregnant
are of Asian or Afro-Caribbean background

Reduce your risk of developing diabetic retinopathy or help stop it getting worse. Keep your blood sugar levels, blood pressure and cholesterol levels under control.

Symptoms of diabetic retinopathy

You will not usually notice diabetic retinopathy in the early stages. It does not tend to have any obvious symptoms until it's more advanced.

Early signs of the condition can be picked up during an eye examination.

Treatments for diabetic retinopathy

Treatment is only necessary if screening detects your vision is at risk.

If the condition has not reached this stage, you should continue to manage your diabetes.

The main treatments for more advanced diabetic retinopathy are:

laser treatment

• injections of medication into your eyes

• an operation to remove blood or scar tissue from your eyes

Regular eye examinations and diabetic retinal screening are essential to minimise the risk of diabetic retinopathy.

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College is expensive so apply to SUSI for your college grant by 11th July for priority assessment



COMMUTE

It's not easy integrating into college life if you're making a daily return commute from Kerry to Limerick or Cork. But that's the only option facing many students who can't afford to meet the cost of accommodation. Rental accommodation, alone, has increased by 60% in the cities during the past five years, putting most of it beyond the reach of students. With rent spiralling out of control, deserving students, who have studied hard to achieve a college place, struggle to pay for college.

EXPENSIVE

Further and third level education is very expensive. The financial burden is eased a little for students who qualify for a partial or total grant. Even so, many college students have to work part-time or depend on their parents to make ends meet. Thousands of students who are ineligible for funding must come up with about $\leq 12,000$ annually if they are living away from home or about $\leq 5,000$ if living at home. The student contribution has also to be paid.

SUSI

Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI) is Ireland's higher and further education grants awarding body. Student grants are divided into maintenance grants and fee grants. Maintenance grants are paid directly to the student's bank account. Fee grants pay tuition fees, the student contribution and the cost of essential field trips. SUSI grants are available at PLC, undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

ELIGIBLE

To be eligible for a grant, an applicant must meet a nationality criterion, a residency criterion, an education progression criterion and an approved course criterion, all of which are mere formalities for most applicants. To be eligible for funding, your total household reckonable income must fall below specific income thresholds. The SUSI website contains tables outlining the income thresholds and the associated maintenance grant rates for applicants. The minimum distance from home to college for the higher grant (non-adjacent) eligibility is 30km. About 80,000 students should be eligible for some level of standard maintenance grants ranging from €612 to €4,292.

GRANT

The maximum standard non-adjacent

maintenance grant payable in the 24/25 academic year will be \in 4,292. For students who live less than 30km from their college, the standard maximum adjacent grant is \in 1,774. The gross annual income level for grant eligibility is \in 40,875 (less than four dependent children), \in 44,810 (between four and seven children) or \in 48,575 (between eight or more dependent children). Income thresholds increase by \in 4,950 for each additional family member in college. The amount of non-assessed holiday income that a student can earn per annum is \in 7,925.

SPECIAL

There is also a special maintenance grant for applicants whose annual gross income is less than \in 26,200 (less than four dependent children), \in 28,715 (between four and seven children) or \in 31,128 (eight or more dependent children). That payment is \in 7,586, non-adjacent and \in 3,230, adjacent, respectively.

PRIORITY

SUSI is prioritising new grant applications until 11th July. SUSI will process late applications but its best to be on the priority applications list. Submit your online grant application as soon as possible. Applicants are assessed on gross income from all sources in the 2023 financial year. Applications are assessed as either a 'dependent,' 'mature dependent' or 'independent' application. A dependent applicant is assessed on the income of parents or guardians, while an independent applicant is assessed on personal income and that of her/ his partner.

RECKONER

As the grant is means-tested, visit the eligibility reckoner on www.susi.ie. This facility provides potential applicants with an approximate indication of whether or not they are likely to qualify for a grant. However, it's always advisable to submit a grant application. Even if you don't currently qualify, your financial circumstances may change going forward.

REGISTER

Before you start your application, create an account in your SUSI student portal. You will be asked for your Personal Public Service Number (PPSN), Name, Date of Birth, Email address and Phone number. Create your log in details where you can set up your username, password and security pin. Then carefully complete the

interactive application form. Once you have submitted a grant application you can follow its progress on the SUSI Online Application Tracker.

FUNDING

Further information on state funding can be found on www.studentfinance.ie. Most of the institutions also offer a range of scholarships for excellence in areas such as academic, sport, creative arts and entrepreneurship. Colleges also operate a Financial Assistance Fund for students experiencing financial difficulty during term. Go to the relevant colleges' websites for further details. Watch out also for local scholarships such as Credit Union Scholarships available to members. If at all possible, avoid taking out a student loan, but if you must then the best rates are available from your local Credit Union.

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SPORT ON TV

A Kerry Fianna Fáil County Councillor is calling on RTÉ to liaise with the Government to push for a dedicated Irish Sports Channel, to be included in any financial planning with regard to our TV Licence. Councillor Michael Cahill has claimed that Ireland has been poorly served with sport's coverage on our national television channels in recent times and with plans being made now to change the licensing system, a golden opportunity exists to ensure people can have affordable access to watch their favourite sport with Irish involvement.

"We are for the most part, a nation of sport's fanatics and we follow our Irish heroes in an endless list of codes when we can. Recently, with the advent of Streaming, not everybody can have access to watch even our own GAA games and I believe it is the duty of our

Government

and RTÉ to correct this anomaly" stated Councillor Cahill

"The setting up of a dedicated Sports Channel within the RTÉ stable to date, has probably not come to pass due to financial considerations. But I believe that we now have the perfect opportunity to bring it forward with a review of our TV licence system ongoing" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Many households are paying out hundreds of Euro annually to companies from other jurisdictions, to watch their favorite sport heroes and teams. We can now plan to provide this service with our own national provider and we can ensure our own sports can get widespread viewing here, interspersed with many other sports" added Councillor Cahill.

DEPUTY HEALY RAE RAISES MIGRANT WORKERS IN THE DAIL

Speaking in the Dáil Eireann last and tomorrow morning it will week, Deputy Danny Healy Rae, TD said that that none of us have anything against migrant workers coming here with the proper documentation and work visas or people who come here genuinely distressed. What people are against is people coming here on a plane from somewhere and arriving here with no passport. The Government has no plan. It has proved it has no plan. One arm of the Government is giving out tents this evening,

come along and pick them up and dump them. That is not a plan.

Next to Dublin, Kerry has the second highest number of refugees and asylum seekers, impacting on our medical service. We do not even have one extra GP in Killarney. Our social welfare services are stretched to capacity. Some 36% of our hotel beds are being used by refugees and asylum seekers, clearly reducing footfall to all the other hospitality.

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HELP TO BUY SCHEME

Over €11m in funding was : allocated in Kerry under the Help To Buy Scheme (HTB) to 587 successful applicants, according to Minister for Finance Michael which McGrath, has been enthusiastically welcomed by Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill.

"This is a prime example of a successful initiative by the Government within their policy of 'Housing For All' and in conjunction with funding to renovate vacant and derelict properties, will make a major impact in providing affordable homes for many families" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Every avenue must be exhausted to address the Housing crisis in our county. Rents are spiralling out of control. We must provide

more affordable and social homes, we must provide low cost sites, we must purchase more houses. we must acquire more turnkey projects, we must provide more housing for our disabled, we need to provide more loans and grants, we must zone more lands, we must refurbish more vacant and derelict properties in our towns and villages and we must consider providing modular homes" said Councillor Cahill

"I would encourage anyone in need of accommodation to look up all of these Government supported schemes to identify their options. Some may suit your requirements and do not hesitate to contact Kerry County Council if you require any guidance" added Councillor Cahill.

takes a look at all things sport...

ALL IRELAND PRE-QUARTER-FINAL GAMES

I have made no secret of my contempt for their very existence. These games, and that whole group stage itself, are an artificial and frankly unentertaining elongation of the championship for financial purposes.

Mind you, the fact that I only predicted two results out of four correctly was never going to engender a feeling of fondness on my part either!

Galway 0-14 Monaghan 0-11

Not a great game, but consider that Galway have been making an art form out of winning these dogfights this year and that they are getting closer and closer to full strength after being dogged by injuries, and you start to wonder....

That said, I didn't really have Monaghan up among the contenders for this year's All Ireland. I still feel that they never came out all guns blazing against us, preferring to keep their powder for another day - but this was that other day, and they didn't have enough powder anyway. The first half was a dull enough affair, a point apiece after the first guarter. Monaghan were completely defensive and, unfortunately, it was paying off as Galway led by just 0-6 to 0-5 despite playing all the actual forward football, Monaghan relying on counter-attack. That will get you to this stage, but going further takes more, and Galway had that bit more that shows why they are in the last eight and Monaghan aren't. Monaghan did hit the crossbar in the second half, but Galway always looked that bit more dangerous, even if sub Damien Comer wasn't anywhere near his best. Conor McManus had two late points for Monaghan. I expect that great servant to finally hang up his shooting boots. For me he was up with the likes of Michael Murphy, Cillian O'Connor, and the Brogans as one of the best forwards in the game.

Derry 0-15 Mayo 1-12 (Derry win on penalties)

This was always going to be the tie of the round, and so it proved in terms of excitement, if not actual football. Mayo are perennial contenders and showed it again, always a very tough side to beat, while the same Derry side that were being hailed as champions-in-waiting during their excellent League campaign were being vilified on their way into this game. I never once believed they were as good or as bad as the headlines being written about them. I've always felt that they are too dependent on McGuigan as a scorer, but they are highly talented. I have huge respect for Mickey Harte, but he has always been an apologist for the heavily defensive football that has been acknowledged as a huge detraction from the entertainment value of games – this one was a case in point. I suppose he got burned enough by attacking in other games this year! The start was purely an exercise in tedium as Derry dropped back into a defensive phalanx. It was working, with Lachlan Murray picking off Derry points, but my God was it boring. Derry led by 0-6 to 0-3 at the break.

Odhran Lynch got turned over on one of those reckless forays outfield by the keeper – this from an ultra-defensive team, the penny drops really slowly with some teams – and duly coughed up a turnover point. Mayo were the better side in the third quarter and Paul Conroy, rolling back the years, won a penalty converted by Ryan O'Donoghue. Mayo ahead by two points. It's cruel to say, but the reason why Dublin have lifted Sam so much more than those great recent teams from Mayo is because Dublin don't lose games from this position.... and Mayo do.

Matthew Ruane had a goal chance saved, with O'Donoghue knocking over the loose ball. Derry were still in this though, and you have to credit their dogged defiance. Heading into injury time, there was just a point in it. Mayo should have stretched that lead to two, but Sam Callinan missed....and Derry full back Chrissy McKaigue didn't.

Derry clipped over three points early enough in extra time, but Mayo managed somehow to claw it back and take it to penalties. It's no secret that I wanted Mayo to win, they play much more open football, but I already had a sinking feeling. In fairness to Lynch, when it comes to penalty shootouts, he's the best in the business and Derry were always favourites to win from there.

My heart goes out to Mayo, of course it does. There are worse teams still in this year's championship. But three times this year (Galway, Dublin, and Derry) they were in front in injury time against top tier teams, and they failed to close it out on all three occasions.

Roscommon 0-14 Tyrone 0-12

Straight up, I didn't even give this one much thought. Roscommon are always valiant battlers but Tyrone, while not the power that they were in recent years or anything like the physical presence of the 2020 All Ireland winners, still had forwards like Darren McCurry and the Canavans to call on. Few teams have that kind of firepower.

It turns out that in Donie Smith, Dairmuid Murtagh, Daire Cregg, and our own Conor Cox, Roscommon had plenty of firepower....and, unlike Tyrone, an attacking game plan that brought them into play. Roscommon hunted Tyrone down and just out-fought them. They were hungrier. It's rarely that simple, but 'rare' is not the same as 'never'. Mayo died with their boots on. I wouldn't say the same about this Tyrone team. They trailed by 0-9 to 0-3 at the break and, while they did come out with a greater sense of purpose in the second half, Roscommon were resilient enough to absorb it. In the dying minutes they led by just a single point, but Daire Cregg put over the clincher.

Louth 1-9 Cork 1-8

I tipped Cork to win this one, but I wasn't sure. Both sides had shown more potential than otherwise (I didn't feel that either were at their best against Kerry, although I do hark back to those gaol chances that Louth missed against us) and I felt that it depended on which one really showed up on the day. In fairness, I would say that both teams turned up and gave it everything they had. It was nigh on point for point throughout the first half, both sides playing fairly open football and playing it well. Cork broke the deadlock and went four clear after Daniel O'Mahony flicked Ian Maguire's pass into the net. Sam Mulroy had the last score of the half to leave Cork a goal in front.

Louth came out with all guns blazing and it felt like Cork retreated a little bit in the second half. Cork were still one point ahead when a high ball into the Cork square wasn't properly dealt with and Donal McKenny drove it to the net (sound familiar after our last game?). Chris Óg Jones levelled with two points but deep in injury time, Craig Lennon won a free and Sam Mulroy put over the winner. Swings and roundabouts...

ALL IRELAND QUARTER-FINAL DRAW Kerry v Derry



A repeat of last weekend's minor semi-final pairing and nobody will complain if we get anything like as good a game. We won't – that Derry minor team was fearless, and Derry have been stung a few too many times this year and have reverted to the blanket defence and counter-attack. Will it beat Kerry? I'll tempt fate and give a straight 'no'. Derry have talent, phenomenal talent. The emergence of Lachlan Murray to take some of the scoring burden off Shane McGuigan is an ominous development. They have tended to get into dogfights in recent years but they have tended to win them



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- again, if it goes to a penalty shootout, Derry will be rubbing their hands.

I don't expect Derry to leave the house unguarded. They have been caught for goals in other games and they know just like you and I know that Jack O'Connor and co. will have been paying attention. Derry beat us in the National League but even back then I felt that they were needlessly burning energy that they would need later on. Bringing lads back from a holiday after winning the Club All Ireland to beat an experimental Kerry by a single point in the second game of the National League? That's a sledgehammer to crack a walnut.

I may be a little over-confident. After all, I don't feel that Kerry have really faced any top team yet and peak Derry is definitely a top team. A lot will depend on us being able to slow down that rapid Derry counter-attack - yes, hypocritical as it may sound, I'd do to Derry what they want to do to us. A few high balls down on David and Seanie – I want Kerry keeping a few bodies up top all the time; Derry will be hoping we don't do that - will keep them honest. I don't need it to be our main threat, I just need Tyrone to be wary of it. I also don't want us trying to run our way through tackles. Stretch them on the run and yes, hideous as it is to watch, let's recycle and see how they like chasing it. Kerry should certainly be winning this one. Derry, with the best will in the world, have to be feeling that hard game against Mayo in their legs. If they beat us at this stage, then we didn't deserve to be in the conversation about Sam Maguire anyway.

Dublin v Galway

Dublin didn't look impressive against Louth in the Leinster Final. They were, if anything, lucky to get out of the Mayo game with a draw. In short, they haven't remotely looked like the force of old.

I think we all know that Dublin have been doing the exact same as Kerry, timing their run. I don't think they are the force of old, but I don't think anybody else is either and they still have the likes of Fenton, O'Callaghan, Kilkenny, Basquel. Neither Mannion or McCaffrey are the power they were – do you want to meet either of them in full flight? I expect an ever-improving Galway, who have been hampered all year by injuries, to put up a really good battle. In fact, I expect the scores to be very close with ten minutes to go. But realistically, anything otherthan the champions progressing would be a huge shock here.

Donegal v Louth

I don't think that Donegal are quite the powerhouse they are made out to be. That's not suggesting that they are a bad team or taking away from the almost miraculous transformation wrought by Jimmy McGuinness. On paper that was the tightest Ulster championship of all time. On grass Donegal met and scalped every big gun that came their way. You can't say that they have sauntered to a quarter-final, but they haven't hit any major hurdles, and that speaks loads about their quality considering the teams they have met. Louth beating Cork can't be described as a massive shock, but they feel more like an overperforming Division Two side than genuine giant-killers and I can't see them living with Donegal's physicality and pace.

Armagh v Roscommon

I've said it previously. Armagh are my dark horses. People seem to forget how they have been there or thereabouts for the past couple of years, coming out on the wrong side of some very close games. They have the footballers - in fact, they are a team that I believe would profit hugely by casting off that heavily defensive straitjacket. Discipline is an issue, they always seem to have a kind of martial mindset (that refusal to come out in a reasonable time after the break in their last game being a case in point let alone the amount of schmozzles their players have been involved in in recent years). To me, a winning mindset is a different and more focussed thing. But in a pure football match I genuinely think that they are as good as anyone. No disrespect to Roscommon, who earned their right to be here the hard way, but I can't see them staying with Armagh.

HEARTBREAK FOR KERRY MINORS IN FINAL FOUR All Ireland Minor Semi-Final Derry 1-13 Kerry 1-12

The Kerry minors had cruised comfortably – arguably, even a little too comfortably – through the smooth waters of a Munster campaign and dismissed the relatively tame challenge of Roscommon in the quarter-final without ever needing to check fuel reserves. Derry, who had always been among the hottest of favourites to retain their minor title from last year, was always going to be a different proposition, and so it proved. In the end the Ulster champions had just a little too much in the tank and deservedly shaded a titanic struggle, but Kerry left nothing behind them on the pitch and could walk off with their heads high.

Particular credit had to be given to Kacper Robak between the sticks. It doesn't detract from all Kerry's magnificent efforts elsewhere on the field to say that without the heroics of the goalkeeper, it would all have been to no avail and this game would have been over long before the final whistle. He was superb from start to finish – and it says a lot about Derry's quality that he had to be at his very best all through. He was in action right from the throw-in with a fantastic double save from Jack Sargent (man of the match by a country mile) and Ruairí Biggs on the rebound.

Both teams were lightning out of the blocks. Kerry picked off the first score, Michael Horan gathering a good ball from a tightly marked Ben Murphy and cleverly fisting over. Another good run by Gearóid White saw Pádraig Haran pick up an early yellow card – in game played at this pace, that's a lot to carry for over fifty minutes.

Kerry paid a big price for a momentary lapse. Caoimhín Hargan very deftly robbed Éanna Murphy and found Luke Grant along the endline, who drew the defence before passing across for Dylan Rocks to smash home.

Kerry responded instantly, Seán Ó Cuinn finding Ruadhan Donovan, whose long range effort was neatly tipped past the keeper by Eoin O'Flaherty. Kerry were missing their outstanding midfielder Killian Dennehy, arguably the campaign's best player behind Gearóid White, but O'Flaherty proved to be a more than adequate replacement.

Dara McGuckin drew Derry level. Kerry were dominating possession at this stage, but wides were proving costly in a game where opportunities were hard-earned, the worst of them a very uncharacteristic miss of a breadand-butter free by Ronan O'Carroll after Horan was fouled. It's unfortunate, but the reality is that no team can afford to leave chances like that behind them in a game of this magnitude. Gearóid White did put Kerry into a 1-2 to 1-1 lead after a foul on Jack Joy.

Derry's half back line was always a problem for Kerry – they were superb – and Luke Grant combined with Cathal Ó Mianáin to split the posts. Éanna Murphy nudged Kerry back in front but Jack Sargent replied with an absolutely superb point from distance.

A foul on Ben Murphy (let us whisper it; I thought it was a harsh enough call) saw Gearóid White put Kerry back in front. Kerry were beginning to inch ahead in their personal duels now and hit a purple patch. Points from Kerry midfielder Ben Murphy and Eoin O'Flaherty pushed Kerry clear and Gearóid White added another free to make it 1-7 to 1-3. However, it was Derry who closed out the half stronger, Ruairí Biggs pouncing on a ball spilled by Kacper but the keeper more than made amends with another point blank save and somehow deflecting Jack Sargent's follow-up for a '45. Sargent kicked that one himself; a brilliant effort that bisected the posts perfectly.

Half-time Kerry 1-7 Derry 1-4

Eamon Young curled over another superb point for Derry on the restart and added a free won by the impressive Luke Grant. Ger Dillon slotted another free won by Sargent, who was central to all of Derry's play. 1-7 apiece.

Jack Joy fired over with his left leg to nudge Kerry back in front. Ben Murphy laid off to Stacks' clubmate Gearóid White, who jinked past three players before cutting back to take his point.

Kerry had their purple patch in the third quarter; it was starting to feel like Derry's turn. Turlough McHugh set up Dylan Rocks for another piledriver at the Kerry goal, but once again Kacper Robak made an athletic save. Jack Sargent drove over another free from long distance. Substitute Cody Rocks added another and it was all square again, 1-9 apiece.

Gearóid White edged Kerry in front again but Derry, with Sargent imperious, were definitely beginning to take control. Eamon Young pointed a free and Ger Dillon notched a beauty. Dylan Rocks pounced on a stray kick-out to punish Kerry and put Derry 1-12 to 1-10 in front – it could have been worse if he had gone for goal.

Good work by Ben Murphy saw Joey McCarthy nail a free from long distance to trim the lead back to a point. Jack Sargent calmed Derry's

nerves with a point.

Two between them, but Kerry were still fighting hard for this. Cian Mac Gearailt was denied a point by a superb block by Cathair McBride. Aodhna Ó Beaglaoich kicked one last point for Kerry to take the game down to the wire. Kerry had one last kick-out to take it into extra-time, but it was the outstanding Sargent who rose highest to claim it and secure their return to the All Ireland Minor Final.

No begrudging the winners. Derry were the better side and justified their heavy favourites tag – but no-one could have asked for any more of Wayne Quillinan and his players. Minor teams can far too often be defined by success, especially with Kerry's recent record, but this is as good a Kerry team as I have seen any time over the past decade and I have no doubt that many of these players will be seen at higher grades.

Derry, meanwhile, will face Armagh in an all-Ulster Minor Final.

Kerry v Meath

NO JOY FOR KERRY IN FIRST CUP FINAL Munster Senior Cup Final

One team has been struggling in the bottom half of the First Division table, albeit having shown that they are well able to compete at that level – whereas the other is flying remarkably high in the Premier. To be honest, while Kerry FC's huge improvement on last year – and they have become a far more resilient side overall – has been very pleasing, Waterford are the surprise package of the year. I thought that they were dependent on a phenomenal striker for their success last year. Frankly, I expected Galway to thrive at Premier level and Waterford to make a rapid return to the lower division – shows what I know, I suppose.

Kerry gave as good as they got here in a wellcontested game where neither side was quite willing to go all-out for the first half. Both sides looked assured but cautious, more wary of making a mistake that committing to a breakthrough. To be fair, Waterford were clearly more focussed on the business of the league. They didn't even bring their big guns here, let alone send them out blazing, fielding more of a reserve side. Bit of a surprise to me; I'd have thought that the opportunity for silverware would count for far more 0- it certainly did on our side, and quite rightly.

Waterford made the sharper start, Aaron O'Sullivan having to stretch to knock away an ambitious bicycle kick by Gbemi Arubi. Just two minutes later Connor Evans was just inches away from a dangerous Arubi cross. In fairness, Waterford were well on top in midfield, leaving Kerry struggling to create even half-chances. However, the blues weren't getting much change out of Kerry's composed defence and were just lacking a bit of precision in that final ball. Aaron O'Sullivan was definitely the busier of the two keepers, but there wasn't anything I'd really call a wasted chance. Kerry could be well pleased with their first forty minutes, slightly under the cosh but coping with it admirably.

The goal that arrived....was a bit of a killer. A Kerry attack was cleared with a sweeping left leg punt as far as Ethan Kos. It's easy to say that he should have taken a first touch before knocking it back to his keeper – hindsight's all very well. Kos attempted to sweep it back to O'Sullivan with his first touch – bread and butter for one of the most consistently reliable players in Kerry's panel – and unfortunately the touch was just off kilter. Connor Evans swooped on the loose ball straightaway – credit the predatory instincts – and raced in before sliding it past the hapless O'Sullivan and into the net. To be honest, a bad goal to give away just before the break.

Waterford had the first two chances of the second half and looked like they were getting close to a second goal. However, Kerry began to assert themselves a bit more around the middle and start to push, a bit more willing to pass forward or even take their man on. In fact, just five minutes into the half Ronan Teahan showed a lovely bit of skill to turn and open space for a lovely cross to Kennedy Amechi. He couldn't get his full body behind the header and it was easily gathered by the keeper in the end, but it was clear evidence of real quality and real ambition on Kerry's past.

The goal that Kerry craved arrived just a minute later and it was one of those that looked simple but most definitely isn't. A perfectly weighed ball in for Nathan Gleeson to run onto and an instant cross for an immaculately time Ryan Kelliher finish. Like I say, it looked simple, but that kind of co-ordination takes a lot of work on

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the training ground.

Both sides had chances from then on, with Kerry giving as good as they got, but there wasn't anything that I'd call a chance missed, more half-chances that were mopped up. It looked like it was going to take something special to make the breakthrough.....and so it did.

With just ten minutes left on the clock Waterford

played it back, made a quick little burst out of defence, and laid off to a diminuitive Calum Costello. The teenager was making his senior debut for Waterford, and he picked his moment, cutting inside to carve open a fraction of space and launching a sudden thunderbolt that evaded O'Sullivan at full stretch to nestle in the bottom left corner.

Kerry pressed but couldn't muster an equaliser

and the Munster Senior Cup went Waterford's way, but Conor McCarthy and his team will at least be proud of the battle they put up. They certainly weren't overawed by either the occasion or the opposition and it bodes well for the future. For now, though, it's back to the drawing board and the First Division grind.

"Do not gloat over me, my enemy! Though I have fallen, I will rise. Though I sit in darkness, the LORD will be my Light" (Micah 7:8).

Welcome back dear student, this is such a beautiful promise. People deal with failure all the time. Things don't work out like we hoped they would, or we make mistakes and fall into sin - falling short of God's Glory (Romans 3:23). And the enemy is waiting there to oblige with plenty of accusations, shame, condemnation, guilt, or disappointment - to bring total defeat. God is not as interested in our failure as He is in our response. We must get back up. Quitting and giving into defeat is not an option. When it involves sin there is a danger that pride will not want to admit it, but when we do the Lord our Redeemer is ready to forgive. "The people sitting in darkness have seen a Great Light, and those living in the land and shadow of death, to them Light has dawned" (Matthew 4:16). This was speaking of Yeshua - Jesus, the Messiah coming to rescue His people. How He accomplished this was through living a sinless perfect life as one of us, and dying a horrible death to pay for all mankind's sin with His Blood (Isaiah 53:1-12). The 'darkness and land of the shadow of death' is symbolic of the dungeon that sin, failure or discouragement throws one into. Without Jesus' sacrifice and the Father's Covenant of Love we would have been lost forever with no hope of redemption.

Hopelessness and negativity are key aspects of darkness. Without light nothing is visible and depression reigns. The 'Light of the World' Jesus quenched and overcame the darkness that separated us from God. "...Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5). The greatest darkness is being separated from our Loving Father Who created us. The parable Jesus told of the prodigal son is not so much about the wayward son, his sin and foolishness, but more about the Faithfulness of his father. The son represents you and me, and his father represents God (Luke 15:11-32). The son woke up one day so hungry and broken that he longed to eat some of the pig's slop — then had a lightbulb moment. He remembered how the servants in his father's house were well looked after, not like the situation he now found himself in. This is a beautiful telling of the story each one of us has experienced. The circumstances may be different, but the result is the same — without the Hope of Salvation from our Heavenly Father God, we were all done for.

Darkness is a lonely and isolated place to be in. It feels depressing and never ending. The prophet Zechariah wrote this about the Promised Saviour and Coming King Jesus five hundred years before His birth "....because of the Covenant I made with you, sealed with Blood, I will free your prisoners from death in a waterless dungeon" (Zechariah 9:11). Friend, no matter what's going on or what has happened, know this: God is for you, He is not against you. Just because some things haven't worked out doesn't mean you are no good or hopeless. You must not give up — instead LOOK UP! Pray...Lord Jesus, you know all about my situation. Please help me to come out of darkness - shine the Light of Your Love into my heart for You are my Saviour, my Deliverer, and my Lord. I renounce all sin, fear, hopelessness and defeat. Fill me with Your Strength and heal my life. I will never guit in Jesus' Name, amen!
