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# KILLARNEY-FARRANFORE BYPASS TO REACHCONSTRUCTION BY 2030 UNDER NEW NDP SECTORAL PLAN

inister Michael Healy-Rae TD and Deputy Danny Healy-Rae TD have welcomed what they describe as a "historic and long-overdue commitment" from Government as the N22 Killarney-Farranfore section of the Kerry-Cork Economic Corridor is to be formally included in the Department of Transport's Sectoral Plan under the National Development Plan Review, to be published today.

For the first time, Government is explicitly committing that this major infrastructure project, costed at well over €200 million as categorised in the plan, will reach construction within the lifetime of this NDP, by 2030.

Minister Michael Healy-Rae said: "This is the clearest and strongest commitment that has ever been made to this project. The Killarney-Farranfore Bypass is finally being treated as the strategic national investment that it is, and Government is now publicly committing to have it at construction by 2030. That is the ambition Kerry has waited far too long to hear." He added that the shift in momentum did not happen by accident:

"Let's call it straight, this commitment was lacking in the last government. The truth is that if this project was left to others it would still be sitting on a shelf. The difference this time is simple: the Healy-Rae's are at the table, and Kerry is finally getting its fair share."

Deputy Danny Healy-Rae said: A new dawn arrived at the beginning of this year with the €3 million allocation secured for Kerry County Council, funding that never would have been delivered without us. That allocation allowed the topographical surveys, the ground investigation works beginning on 3 November,

and the detailed planning and design phase to move ahead. You cannot build a mutli-million road without doing the groundwork first, and we made sure it happened."

Both Deputies highlighted that the project is vital not only for Killarney but for the entire county, strengthening the Kerry-Cork Economic Corridor, easing congestion, improving safety, and supporting long-term economic development.

Minister Michael Healy-Rae concluded:

"I want to sincerely thank the Taoiseach, the Tánaiste and the Minister for Transport for recognising the importance of this project and for supporting its inclusion in the NDP Sectoral Plan. Their commitment ensures that this project is now firmly positioned for delivery, something Kerry has been seeking for decades. This is exactly what we said when we agreed to support this Government, that key infrastructure projects in Kerry would finally move from talk to delivery. Today's

announcement proves that commitment is being honoured.".

Minister Norma Foley has also welcomed the news saying:

"Since becoming minister in the last government and this present government, I have secured funding to allow for route selection and preliminary works for the Killarney bypass. Today the final tranche of funding of up to €500 million for the Farranfore to Killarney bypass is included in the Transport sectoral plan, which is one of the key road projects for funding and delivery by government."

Minister Foley also welcomed the funding in the plan for new road developmens which will positively impact and improve access to County Kerry.

"It is very positive to see funding confirmed for the Abbeyfeale and Newcastle West relief roads and the Limerick to Foynes route, which includes Adare bypass due for completion in 2027", she added.

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### KILLARNEY PUTS EMPHASIS ON CYBER SECURITY

usinesses in Killarney have been fully briefed on what measures they need to take to ensure greater cyber security to protect their companies. Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce hosted a very informative breakfast briefing in the International Hotel at which they keynote speakers were cyber security experts Mike Dennehy and Ger McAuliffe from progressive local company Tricel.

The opening question at the event was how will a business operate tomorrow is it loses access to its data today?

Mike and Ger recommended that all employers to include IT training as part of the induction programme for new entrants, organise monthly awareness training for all employees and to conduct monthly spot-checks to ensure everything is going according to plan.

It was essential, they pointed out not to give the same level of access to all employees to reduce risk and to devise a disaster recovery plan in case it is needed.

Companies have also been advised not to allow the public to use their private wi-fi network and, instead, to set up a public or guest network.

Chamber thanked the experts from Tricel for their engaging talk which certainly put the spotlight very firmly on the need to enhance cyber security measures.

# THE LANEWAYS OF KILLARNEY ARE THE HEART OF THE TOWN

It was with particular interest I saw the the lanes raised by Councillor John O'Donoghue at the meeting of the Killarney MD.

Around forty years ago, the then Killarney UDC commissioned architect designed plans on low rise craft centres, shops and cafes for the lanes. Alas the beast the Celtic Tiger arrived and swallowed them.

Some - but thankfully not all - the lanes lost their character.

Those down by the old Hilliards with fine two storey buildings for instance are not quite destroyed and they retain an amount of history. An aunt of mine once told me how every house there lost someone in World War One.

The names alone are worth some research - Bishop's, Chapel, Barry's, Pawn Office, Bowers, Ball Court, Brasby's, Hogan's, Ducket, Bower's, Pig's, and so on.

John wants a muti-annual restoration project for the laneways.

"The laneways of Killarney are of enormous historical and cultural significance as they

are the 'Old Killarney' where residents of the town lived in large numbers, and indeed where many of our ancestors came from. They are part of the fabric of our town and are still inhabited," he said.

There is good news - the council told John it has secured funding and plans to strengthen the use of the lanes and rejuvenate them.



# PUBLIC TOILETS: WORLD TOILET DAY URGES US TO SPEND MORE PENNIES

World Toilet Day : highlighting the dire lack of toilet facilities globally last week went largely unremarked. Apart from a call by Clean Coasts about what to flush and not to flush. But public toilets are a serious convenience.The older we get the more toilets we need, a meeting of Tralee Municipal District heard.

Fine Gael councillor Angie Baily said on the one hand more people are engaging in outdoor pursuits, while at the same time we have older people. All needing the "bog" was the gist of it.

In fact, if you look at some of the outdoor pursuits people, many are retired. In other words they have the leisure time and often have a penny to spend - in more ways than one. Angie's call Hence for portable toilets in places like Blennerville, the gateway to cycling and walking in the west Kerry and Tralee area.

This was "the comfort" of the many tourists, cyclists, runners and walkers using the village

as their start and finish point, Angie said.

This column and indeed other councillors have long called for more public facilities not just on beaches and in towns.

Popular mountain hill walking areas at Carrauntoohil and Mangerton also need toilets for their thousands of users undertaking walks of several hours.

The UN's world toilet day had a theme this year "Sanitation in a Changing World," and this could well tie in with Angie's double edged idea - aging and more outdoor activity.

The council says it must look after and do up the 37 public conveniences under its remit before it can provide new public toilets.

It has set aside €1.145 million in next year's budget for operation and maintenance of the public conveniences in Kerry.

But the pressure must be kept on for more pence for the public's convenience.

# THE IRISH LANGUAGE CELEBRATE THE CÚPLA FOCAL BUT STOP PRETENDING IT'S THE FULL SENTENCE.

Pa Daly TD seems greatly exercised by the use of the Irish language and recently kicked up a storm about the main sign at Kerry Airport which he maintains should be bilingual.

Bilingualism may not even be the objective. There is a certain sense about much of this new Irish language movement which would promote this official language as the first over English and perhaps replace it altogether.

While yes, it is right we have acknowledgment of Irish, I am not certain it is a medium for our lives. The Liam O'Murchú Trom agus Eadrom approach is probably the best - a phrase anois 's arís. For a start we don't have a natural Irish any more. I wince when I hear the thin careful halting caighdeán spoken by 98 per cent of those who speak Irish now, including our new President. It is little more than a direct literal translation - word for word. Esperanto would do as well.

The truth about the what we call the revived Irish of today is that it is barely a skeleton of what once was. It has no flesh. We can thank ourselves for this, and not blame the English. The attempt 100 years ago to force Irish down the throats of every school child choked the natural language. The grammar, the correctness, the sanitisation, the concentration on the purity of the language supposed to reflect the purity of the Gael was such that we can't curse in Irish anymore; we can't feel in Irish; we can't love or grieve in Irish. We lost all our emotional tools and have had to pick up new tools in English. What we have mostly in the revived Irish is an anaemic version of what it once was. That's the truth. As the poet and my old teacher John Montague put it "a new tongue was grafted". John believed his sometimes terrible stutter was linked to the trauma of the language change. The new Irish may be grafted again but it will be just as difficult a graft. And it will be rose without perfume.

My generation and older are probably privileged. At least we have the underground river of Irish in the way we speak English. For English was very much a language being learned when I was young. I recall how conscious we were of correct grammar as people said does bes and don't bes and got tenses and number mixed up. "He were here; he was came, " was often heard.

Some could never pronounce v so that very became "wery". (w doesn't exist in Irish and v is an import). English was a language being learned. There was a self-consciousness about it. Then of course when we went to school, we faced a similar challenge with Irish. The wonder is we speak any language at all!

Irish too might have been anchored in more fertile plains - inland places where the bardic schools and their refined literary colloquies still echoed, rather than the barren hungry coasts.

Those jumping up and down about the revival might be a bit more up front. Oh and Pa Daly's own press releases come only in English. Oops.

# **EOIN AND ALEX** TO REPRESENT IRELAND IN THE US

Scoil Phobail Sliabh Luachra, Rathmore is proudly celebrating the outstanding achievement of their students Eoin Cashman and Alex Thompson who came overall runners-up in the National SciFest finals in Marino College, Dublin last week, winning the Regeneron International Science & Engineering award and will now go on to represent Ireland in a world event to take place in Phoenix, Arizona, US in 2026.

Their project was titled "Dust Dynamics: Analysing Planetary Bodies through the Ballistic Motion of Lofted Dust Particles". This project explores how the motion of moving dust particles can be used to determine the physical properties of a planets environment and calculate such quantities as atmospheric density and acceleration due to gravity. In their work they analysed the behaviour of the dust particles kicked up by the tyres of the Lunar Roving Vehicle driven by Commander John Young on the lunar surface during the Apollo 16 mission in 1972 as observed in the 16mm footage taken by astronaut Charlie Duke.

SciFest is the largest second-level STEM fair programme in Ireland. Hosted locally in schools and regionally in third-level colleges with the regional winners travelling to Dublin for the national finals. The

national winners then progress on to represent Ireland in the Regeneron International Science & Engineering Fair in Phoenix, Arizona in 2026. This is the world's largest pre-college science competition. In the finals in Dublin the lads had to present and explain their project to as series of judges from scientific, engineering and Physics backgrounds and drawn from colleges, universities and industry. Over 16,000 second-level students entered SciFest 2025 so to be judged as national runner-up was a major achievement.

In their analysis they use online software to track the motion of the dust particles and the equations of motion that they learnt in their Physics class to perform calculations. Their calculation of the value of the acceleration due to gravity on the lunar surface of 1.72 m/s2 was within 6.7% of the accepted value.

They believe that future applications of their work could include the analysis of footage taken on other planets such as Mars so as to determine characteristics such as the presence and density of an atmosphere as well as the strength of local gravity. Both students study Physics in Scoil Phobail Sliabh Luachra, Rathmore with their teacher Kevin McCarthy (who mentored the project) and all at SPSL are very proud of their achievement.

The Civil War in County Kerry and its many impacts and legacies feature in a new book which was launched at the Kerry County Museum in Tralee on Friday evening by Minister Norma Foley. Edited by Bridget McAuliffe, Mary McAuliffe and Owen O'Shea, 'The Civil War in Kerry and Beyond: Histories, Memories and Legacies' is a compilation of essays from a range of academics, historians and researchers who spoke at the acclaimed Kerry Civil War Conference in Tralee in February 2023.

"We are so grateful to the very large crowd who turned out at the launch on Friday," said Mary McAuliffe, "and it's indicative of a continuing interest in this period which, for so long, wasn't spoken about in Ireland. # HSE South West Opens Regional Community Neuro Rehabilitation Team

Minister for Children, Disability and Equality, Norma Foley TD, has officially launched the new HSE South West Regional Community Neuro Rehabilitation Team, along with a new dedicated rehab building at Baile Mhuire, Tralee. The team, one of only three pilot services nationwide, provides specialist rehabilitation for people with neurological conditions, including stroke, injury-related impairments, and progressive illnesses, with bases in Tralee and Mallow.

Minister Foley described the launch as a "landmark day for Kerry," saying the service is transforming lives by offering high-quality, local care. She also praised the strong partnership between HSE South West and voluntary organisation Baile Mhuire, which provides accommodation and supports multiple community health programmes.

Julie O'Neill, HSE South West manager in Kerry, said the team's interventions are already helping people regain independence, from returning home safely to walking again. She highlighted Baile Mhuire's role in delivering a wide range of community services to more than 700 people weekly.

Angela O'Neill, Head of Disability Services, noted that the new centre provides both specialist staff and advanced equipment, allowing clients to receive intensive, 12-week therapy programmes. Baile Mhuire Chairperson Ed O'Connor welcomed the opening, saying it strengthens the campus as an integrated hub for neurological services in Kerry.

#### A Chara,

I have just attended a demonstration in Killarney town centre to highlight the plight of several tenants facing mass evictions from a housing estate in the town. It was organised by CATU, the Community Action Tenants' Union, a grassroots movement campaigning for stronger protections for tenants, struggling mortgage holders etc. It is heartening to see people mobilising in support of those who have little prospect of the basic shelter of a 'home' from one day to the next. At the same time, it is disappointing that none of our elected TDs or senators was present to support these unfortunate people and I spotted only one councillor, who was from the Tralee Municipal District. These are the people with the power to bring pressure to bear on government at a national level to address such pressing social issues. Mass eviction by institutional landlords is one of the major issues of our time, affecting tenants right across this country. And it is worth noting that such mass evictions will have consequences far beyond the tenants left homeless as a result. Community groups will be left without members, employers in our town will be left without essential workers, local schools can expect to lose pupils as many of the tenants are children attending primary and secondary schools in the area. Indeed the loss of pupils in significant numbers can jeopardise teaching jobs in smaller schools.

We hear on a regular basis about the efforts being made at regional and national levels to address the housing crisis. We are all so familiar with such terms as social and affordable housing, tenant-in-situ, housing first. However there appears to be no scheme and little political will to take urgent action to prevent this inhumane treatment of people who form an integral part of the fabric of our town. As a starting point, the 'no fault eviction ban' is worth reconsidering.



# Trócaire warns millions of Sudanese children face starvation amid escalating conflict

Trócaire has warned that millions of children in Sudan are at risk of starvation as conflict-driven famine intensifies. Launching the agency's Christmas Appeal for Children Caught in Conflict, CEO Seán Farrell described Sudan as the world's largest humanitarian crisis, with 25 million people needing aid and 12 million displaced since violence erupted in April 2023.

Farrell called the situation a "genocide and man-made famine," stressing that children and women are being hit hardest. Nearly four million children are acutely malnourished, over two million newborns face lifethreatening conditions due to a collapsed health system, and one in six children lack routine vaccinations.

Trócaire is providing healthcare in 15 centres and nutrition services in 11 outreach sites, but says demand is rising sharply. The organisation is urging global political leaders to act, calling for sanctions on warring parties, protection of civilians, unhindered humanitarian access, and support for Sudanese civil society.

Sudan is one of many crises affecting children worldwide; more than 473 million children live in conflict zones, with war driving most global humanitarian needs. Climate change is compounding these emergencies.

# 40,000 young children in Ireland have benefited from 2025 Little Library Initiative

Minister for Children, Disability and Equality, Norma Foley has released new figures today revealing that almost 40,000 young children have benefited from the Little Library initiative this year.

Each year, every one of the 50,000 children leaving pre-school and starting primary school are invited to visit their local library to pick up a free book bag and take the opportunity to join the library as part of the My Little Library Initiative.

So far almost 40,000 young children have collected their bag and taken the opportunity to join the library if they weren't already a member. While many of them are already members of their local library, nearly 20,000 children across Ireland will join the library this year because of the My Little Library funded by the Department of Children, Disability and Equality.

The books and resources in the book bag, which is available in both English and 'as Gaeilge', support parents and their children in the transition to primary school.

Minister Foley said: "I am really proud to support the My Little Library initiative for children and their families and welcome the high levels of participation all around the country.

"The gift of reading to and with children on a regular basis cannot be overestimated. It not only supports connection between parents and their children but also promotes early language and literacy development which is crucial for children's success in their education journey.

"There is still a small number of Little Library

A collection of resources and information is also provided in each bag. This includes a library social story card, First 5 Guidance for Parents of Children Moving from Pre-School to Primary School, Dyslexia and the Younger Child by Dyslexia Ireland and Bookshare Ireland by Vision Ireland.

### Citizenship Ceremonies Return to Gleneagle, Killarney

Killarney will welcome more than 12,000 people on Monday, December 1, and Tuesday, December 2, as six Irish Citizenship Ceremonies take place at Gleneagle, Killarney.

To support the large numbers expected, An Garda Síochána has implemented detailed traffic management plans in the vicinity of the venue. A free shuttle service will operate from 08:00 each morning, running from the train station and from Scott's Street, with multiple pick-up and drop-off points along Muckross Road.

### HOW A KILLARNEY-BASED PHOTOGRAPHER

### Became Part of a Major Project

hotographer Olga Derevyanko, who moved to Ireland from Ukraine, tells a deeply personal story of healing and adaptation through her art. Her photograph "Two Worlds", taken at Banna Beach in County Kerry, reflects the beauty of the local landscape as well as her own inner transformation.

Recently, Olga's work gained significant international recognition. It was presented in Paris at the Joseph Gallery as part of the major exhibition "New Voices", held during Paris Photo 2025, one of the most important global events in photography. The exhibition featured works by 60 Ukrainian photographers from both Ukraine and the diaspora.

The "New Voices" project provides space for diverse artistic voices, the participants showcase the Ukrainian perspective on the global stage at a critical moment in history.

The exhibition gave Olga the opportunity to present her work among Ukrainian artists, curators, critics, and collectors. Her photograph "Two Worlds" now belongs to a private collection in France, marking both recognition and a symbolic connection between her two homes.

In Ireland, this work is currently on display at Outset Gallery in Galway (until January 25, 2026). Through this exhibition, the landscapes of Kerry are presented not merely as beautiful scenery, but as part of a broader narrative about healing, belonging, and the power of nature.

According to Olga, the nature of Kerry was not just a backdrop, but a companion in her process of growth and recovery. Emotions of nostalgia, peace, and renewal permeate her work, allowing viewers to feel the restorative power of nature.

"After moving here, I realised that nature could become not just a background, but a partner in life," says Olga.



Olga is currently also working on a photography project "Healing Land" exploring the healing of Ukrainian women through nature, investigating how natural landscapes help restore inner harmony, discover oneself, and find new life resources. She continues photographing the Irish countryside, the places that have become her home, combining themes of memory, resilience, and transformation.

# Kerry ETB Encourages Parents and Guardians to Take Part in New National Primary School Survey

For the first time, families are being asked directly about their preferences on key

aspects of school provision. Kerry ETB is urging all eligible parents and guardians to participate and to share the survey link within their family networks and local communities.

Kerry ETB's Director of School Youth and Music Con Moynihan said: "This is an important opportunity for parents and guardians in Kerry to have their voices heard. Primary education plays a central role in every community, and the views gathered through this survey will help inform how schools are planned, supported, and developed in the years



ahead. We strongly encourage anyone with children aged 0 to 12 to take a few minutes to take part."

The short online survey asks parents and guardians for their views on:

- Whether their primary school should be co-educational or single-sex
- Whether their school should be denominational or multidenominational
- Whether their school should educate through English or through Irish

The survey is available at: www.gov.ie/primaryschoolsurvey

Responses are confidential and anonymous, and findings will contribute to national planning for primary education. Early summary results will be published in 2026, with further local engagement expected in areas where strong support for change is identified.

Kerry ETB encourages all parents and guardians to complete the survey and to share it with others who are also eligible.



Cian: Bass.


Brónagh: I'm an Alto (whooo Altos!) I love learning harmonies. There's something super satisfying about it!



A former Mayor of Killarney, who dedicated so much of his life to the town and its people, is to be honoured in a very special way this Christmas.

The feature star on the spectacular Tree of Light at St Mary's Cathedral will take on an extra special meaning this year as it will be dedicated to the late Donal Grady, a long-serving local councillor who worked diligently and passionately for the community.

Donal, who passed away last in 2024, was a dedicated public representative who was never reluctant to express an opinion and he worked with great passion and a real sense of purpose on behalf of his loyal supporters.

Through his work as a long-serving chief fire officer in Killarney, he helped so many families at a time when they most needed assistance and reassurance and he brought a great sense of calm and responsibility to the position.

Donal always put Killarney first. He loved the town and its people, he worked passionately on their behalf and he achieved so much and helped so many people.

First elected to Killarney Town Council in 1999, following his late father, John, and brother Seán into politics, he held his seat in every election and he was a very popular and proud Mayor of Killarney in 2010/11. When the town councils were abolished in 2019, he was successful in his campaign to win a seat on Kerry County Council.

His son, Martin, the current Mayor of Killarney, was co-opted on to Kerry County Council when Donal stepped down in 2023 and it was a particularly proud day for Donal when his son retained the seat, in emphatic fashion, in the last local elections.

A true champion of the disadvantaged, Donal was a strong voice for the homeless, always highlighting their plight and fighting their corner and the right to affordable housing was always at the top of his agenda.

Cllr Niall Kelleher, Chairman of the Christmas in Killarney Festival – a sub-committee of Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce – said the star dedication was a fitting tribute to a man who is very fondly remembered in the town.

"He contributed enormously, over a long period of time, to the local community and he always had the interests of Killarney to the forefront of his agenda," he said.







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#### CHANGES TO MAXIMUM RENT CAP FOR COUNCIL TENANTS

- : Majority of tenants will not be affected
- : First adjustment to rent cap since 2004
- : Rental income to be invested in maintenance of homes
- : New scheme brings greater fairness and equity

Approximately two-thirds of County Council housing tenants will be unaffected by new changes to the maximum rent cap which will take effect in February 2026.

Households in which the only source of income is the State pension (Contributory or Non-Contributory) and households on low incomes will not be affected by the revised scheme and

the provision that no household will pay more than 20% of their assessable income on rent remains in place.

This is the first adjustment to the rent cap since 2004 and will bring greater fairness and equity to the present system under which those earning higher incomes are paying proportionately less rent that those on the lower incomes because of the existing rent cap. Kerry County Council has one of the lowest rent caps of any local authority, and the current cap has been in place for over twenty years. It will be phased out over the next three years.

Approximately 5,000 tenants – the majority of whom will not be affected by the changes – are

being informed of the changes this week. As outlined in the Council's budget for 2026, which was adopted this week, the income from the change in the maximum rent cap will be targeted towards a planned housing maintenance programme across the Council's housing stock and will also support estate enhancements and estate management initiatives.

# IRISH NURSES 'CANNON FODDER' IN WORLD WAR 2 BRITISH HEALTH SYSTEM

A SELECTION OF STORIES FROM THE 21ST EDITION OF THE SLIABH LUACHRA JOURNAL, ALONG WITH REFLECTIONS FROM DONAL HICKEY, WHO HAS EDITED ALL TWENTY-ONE EDITIONS OVER THE PAST 42 YEARS, WILL FEATURE ON THE SATURDAY SUPPLEMENT ON RADIO KERRY TOMORROW, SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 29, FROM 9 A.M. TO 11 A.M.

Among the stories highlighted is the remarkable discovery of the grave of nurse Ellie Buckley, who was born in Mountcain, Knocknagree, in 1913. Her resting place was located in Lewisham, London, 75 years after her death in 1942. Ellie had worked on the front lines caring for patients suffering from tuberculosis (TB), a highly infectious disease. At the time, many Irish nurses like her were considered "cannon fodder," much like the young men sent to the front during the First and Second World Wars.

Ellie Buckley's story, written by her niece Eileen Fleming, is included in the 2024 edition of the Sliabh Luachra Journal. All 21 editions of the journal, since the first published in1982, have been edited by journalist Donal Hickey. Stories from the 2024 journal and its veteran editor will feature on the Saturday Supplement on Radio Kerry with Frank Lewis next Saturday, November 29 2025 from 9 to 11am. The programme was first broadcast in November 2024.

Over £30,000 was taken out of Knocknagree by the three banks after a fair day, Christy Lehane writes, some of the cattle dealers did not respect the farmers and tried to cheat them. A painted mural of the fair fills an entire gable end in the village.


Ben Brosnan lists 29 shops in the parish of Kilcummin between 1909 and 1924. Now

there are only two – opened in 1896 O'Keeffe's at Gattabawn, near Gneeveguilla and the post office in Kilcummin run by the McCarthy/Healy family since 1946.


Button accordionist Bryan O'Leary wrote a personal reflection on Jimmy Doyle and his music and throughout the Radio Kerry programme plays music associated with Jimmy Doyle. As well two polkas Jimmy Doyle's and Knocknamoyle are played by Jimmy's son Padraig (guitar), with grandchildren Grace Doyle (12) on concertina, Jack Doyle (11) on accordion, Kaylie Doyle on concertina and Jamie O'Donoghue on his grandfather's accordion.

In 1961 Gneeveguilla beat Rathmore in the East Kerry League. Johnny Barry wrote the story and with Aenie O'Leary tells of Gneeeveguilla man Ambrose O'Donovan, as Kerry captain, bringing the Sam Maguire home in 1984. That was almost as memorable as the game in 1961. Quinlan/Sr Aidan, born Ballydesmond in 1914, was martyred by a riot mob in the East London township in South Africa in 1952. Johnny Walsh writes of Elsie's going against the grain at the time in her living and working with her fellow Dominican nun Sr Gratia Khumalo, a black woman. Elsie and Gratia treated twice as many patients as other medical practitioners because back up from home covered the cost of the medicines.

Australian soldier George Nash, on leave from the World War 1 front in France in 1917, visited Lisnaboy in Cullen, Co Cork, from where his mother Margaret Nolan (nee O'Sullivan) had emigrated to Australia in 1870. In a letter home George wrote 'I went to a fair in Millstreet. Nearly everyone claimed relationship with me. I had no idea I had so many relatives in Ireland.' Donal Hickey writes about the old Gneeveguilla



national school that was knocked and a private house built on the site. "A limestone plaque with 1880 engraved on it was found and is now erected on the front wall of the private house," Donal explains "The school was opened in 1842. In 1889 the school was extended and renovated."

"The Kingdom Wheelblasters has provided for their members a safe place to be part of a team on a level playing field which wouldn't be available in other sporting fields. a place to make new friends, share stories and experiences. try out new skills and opens it has opened doors to new activities. It has also taught us a way to adapt and play many sports." On the day, Para Powerlifter Niamh Buckley, who recently broke an 11-year European Record at the World Championships in Cairo, Egypt attended the Junior Blitz. Buckley, who began her Para Sport journey when she was a child with Kingdom Wheelblasters presented



her medals to members. Showing what members can achieve even if they venture into another Para Sport, Buckley explains the impact Kingdom Wheelblasters had on her.

"When I was growing up all of my friends were competing in sports that I couldn't take part in, so it was a great feeling to be able to take part in sports that were inclusive and where I could fully get involved. It also opened up a whole new world to me."

Kingdom Wheelblasters brings people together from all over Kerry, providing opportunity for those with a physical disability to take part in sport, whether to soar to heights Niamh Buckley has reached, or to participate recreationally on a level playing field.

Laura Sheehy explains, "Kingdom Wheelblasters brings people from all over Kerry together regardless of their disability, where they might not have had the opportunity to meet before. Everyone gets to share their stories and each other's knowledge and skill set. We offer support to the individuals and their families. The club has opened the door to trying many Para Sports and adaptive sports, like our recent events with Tralee Tennis club and Badminton Ireland." Niamh added to Laura's sentiment, saying "people should get involved with Wheelblasters because it can open up so many avenues. For me it gave me the opportunity to try out different sports, travel the country and make new friends. It was thanks to the Wheelblasters that I found my true passion and love for sport.

#### **ALCOHOL & "HIDDEN" CALORIES**

We have all heard of the "hidden" calories in alcoholic drinks, which can contribute to excess calorie intake, but apart from the obvious calories contained within the alcohol itself, alcohol consumption can also lead to excess calorie intake in a number of other ways too.

#### **Mixer Calories:**

Many alcoholic beverages are mixed with sugary sodas, fruit juices, or syrups, which significantly increase the calorie content. These added ingredients are often overlooked when estimating total calorie intake.

#### **Food Intake During Drinking:**

Alcohol consumption can increase appetite and reduce inhibitions, leading to overeating or choosing calorie-dense foods, which contribute to overall calorie intake.

#### Food Intake the day after:

How many times have you gone for the greasy fry the morning after or if unable to eat a breakfast how many times have you spent your day binge eating high calorie content snacks or fast foods like a takeaway

#### Effect on Metabolism:

Alcohol can impair fat metabolism, leading to the body prioritizing alcohol processing over burning fat, indirectly contributing to increased fat storage.

#### Calorie-Dense "Hidden" Additives:

Some flavoured or processed alcoholic drinks contain added sugars, flavourings, and preservatives that add to the calorie count but are not always obvious.

While alcohol calories are often underestimated, they can add up quickly, especially when combined with sugary mixers and food. Regular consumption of alcoholic beverages can contribute to a significant calorie surplus, which may lead to weight gain over time if not accounted for in your overall diet. When weight loss slows, plateau's or turns into weight gain it can often often be the "hidden" calories that are to blame.



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#### **OCULAR MIGRAINE**

Retinal migraine migraine) is an eye condition that causes brief attacks blindness or visual problems like flashing lights in one eye.

episodes can be frightening, but in most cases they're harmless and shortlived, and eyesight goes back to normal afterwards.

Some people get retinal migraine every few months, although the frequency can varv.

Retinal migraine is a separate condition and should not be confused with headachetype migraine or migraine with aura, which usually affects the vision of both eyes.

#### The symptoms of retinal migraine may include:

- partial or total loss of vision in one eye – this usually lasts 10 to 20 minutes before vision gradually returns
- headache this may happen before, during or after the vision attack

It's unusual for an episode of vision loss to last longer than an hour. The same eye is affected every time in almost all cases.

Vision may slowly become blurred or dimmed, or there may be flashes of light. Some people see a mosaiclike pattern of blank spots (scotomas), which enlarge to

(ocular: cause total loss of vision.

Retinal migraine is caused by the blood vessels to the suddenly narrowing eye (constricting), reducing the blood flow to the eye.

It may be triggered by:

- stress
- smoking
- · high blood pressure
- oral contraceptive pill
- exercise
- · bending over
- high altitude
- dehydration
- low blood sugar
- excessive heat

Retinal migraine tends to be more common in:

- women
- people aged under 40
- people with a personal or family history of migraine or other headaches


Treatment for retinal migraine usually just involves taking pain relief for any headaches and reducing exposure to anything that might be triggering the retinal migraine.

If you experience any sudden changes in you vision it is important to have a sight test to rule out more serious causes.

THINK ONCE – your local pharmacy. Many minor illnesses can be managed fully in the pharmacy, helping you feel better faster and avoiding unnecessary waits. This should be your first stop for minor illnesses such as coughs, colds, sore throats, earaches, rashes and stomach upsets.

THINK TWICE – your GP or out of hour GP service (South Doc). GP surgeries are busy at this time of year, but they will attempt to accommodate an urgent problem if it means saving you a trip to the emergency department. They can assess a wide range of concerns, arrange tests, imaging, referrals to specialists, and can potentially save you a trip to the Emergency Department, which i

s for critical emergencies only.

THINK A THIRD TIME – Injury Units in Mallow and Bantry. Killarney is just one hour from the Mallow injury unit, and Tralee is only one hour 20 minutes from the Mallow injury unit. If you're in South Kerry, Bantry is closer than UHK and could give you the expert

# Government must end energy rip-off as number of people in debt on energy bills hits record high - Pa Daly TD

Sinn Féin spokesperson on Energy, Pa Daly TD, has slammed the government for failing to tackle the deepening energy rip-off as the number of people in arrears on their energy bills hits a new record high.

He called on the government to urgently reinstate energy credits and to adopt Sinn Féin's proposals to cut household energy bills ending the rip-off once and for all.

Teachta Daly said: "Shocking new figures from the energy regulator reveal that the number of people in debt on their energy bills has reached a new high. 308,000 people are now in arrears. Many many more are barely scraping by.

"That is a damning indictment of Fianna Fáil, Fine Gael and the Regional Independents, including the Healy-Rae brothers.

"To think that they have withdrawn credits at precisely this moment when fresh price hikes were implemented by a spate of energy



suppliers and as we enter the darkest depths of winter, demonstrates just how little they care about the impact of the cost of living crisis. "Everything is moving in the wrong direction. "Prices are getting higher, the temperature is getting colder, debt has reached new record

highs and the government is ripping away supports.

"In September, Sinn Féin introduced a motion to end the energy rip-off.

"Unsurprisingly, the government rejected our proposals and abandoned its responsibility to ensure that households can heat their homes and keep the lights on this winter.

"We told them the crisis would continue to deepen. So did the energy regulator. And now the highest ever number of households cannot afford to meet their most basic energy needs. "Enough is enough.

"I am calling on the government to urgently reinstate energy credits and to implement Sinn Féin's proposals to bring down the cost of energy long term.

"This crisis is not inevitable.

"Solving it is a matter of will, a political choice that this government is unwilling to make."

# Councillor Cahill Welcomes Council Support for New Night-Time Market Scheme in Kerry

Fianna Fáil Councillor Tommy Cahill has warmly welcomed the positive response from Kerry County Council to his motion at the November full meeting, calling for the development and piloting of a Night-Time Market Scheme across towns in the county.

Councillor Cahill's motion proposed that Kerry County Council engage and collaborate with town teams, community councils, chambers of commerce, and Tidy Towns groups to explore the creation of vibrant night-time markets that would stimulate local enterprise, strengthen the evening economy, and offer safe, family-friendly activity within town centres.

Inits official reply, Kerry County Council confirmed its firm commitment to the Town Centre First Policy, emphasising that the proposed Night-Time Market Scheme aligns strongly with national objectives to create attractive, liveable, economically resilient towns and villages. The Council stated that it "would welcome continued collaboration" with local stakeholders to explore, develop and pilot a scheme that reflects local

needs and opportunities, enhances community activity, and contributes to the overall vitality of towns across the county.

"I am delighted that the Council has acknowledged both the value and the opportunity that a Night-Time Market Scheme presents. Towns right across Kerry are eager for new ways to boost footfall, support local traders, and create safer, more vibrant spaces in the evenings. This is a chance to build something fresh, exciting, and community-driven."

Councillor Cahill highlighted at the meeting how similar initiatives have been transformative in other cities. "Cities like Edinburgh, London, and Prague have shown how well-run night-time markets can completely re-energise town centres especially around the festive period and during the summer. They attract locals and visitors in huge numbers, support small businesses, strengthen the tourism offering, and, importantly, create a safer night-time environment by increasing activity, lighting, footfall, and community presence."

Councillor Cahill also pointed to the Government's Night-Time Economy Taskforce, which has advocated for greater diversity of night-time activities, improved public realm, and better opportunities for cultural and economic engagement after 6pm. A Kerry pilot, he said, would align perfectly with this national direction. "This is about giving our towns new life after dark, markets with crafts, food stalls, music, culture, and community activity. It's about safe, welcoming, well-lit spaces where people of all ages can gather. I firmly believe Kerry can be a leader in this space."

Councillor Cahill said he looks forward to working with town teams, businesses, community groups, and Council officials to progress the next steps. "The appetite is there. The Council is supportive. And most importantly. the national policy is backing it. Now let's bring the various stakeholders together and deliver a pilot that can be rolled out county-wide."

#### **Killarney Innovation Centre**

Minister for Enterprise; Tourism and Employment, Peter Burke TD has assured Fianna Fáil TD Michael Cahill that the Killarney Innovation Centre will receive "appropriate consideration" of its application to The Smart Regions Enterprise Innovation Scheme under Enterprise Ireland.


Deputy Cahill raised the application by way of a Parliamentary Question in Leinster House recently on behalf of the long established Killarney Innovation Centre, in their efforts to raise funding for future projects. I will continue to follow up progress on these fabulous projects being developed for the people of Kerry" added Michael Cahill TD.





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



Bit of a shaky start. South Africa maul us – almost literally as well as in terms of the rules. We simply have no match for their pace and power. That in itself doesn't surprise me. This South Africa side are the World champions, and the Springboks were never shrinking violets in terms of physicality. What does surprise me is that we seem determined to go head to head and match them for brute force.

Five minutes gone and they are over, Damien Willemse finishing off a great move. Just simply rugby done at top pace.

Just a minute later Tommy O'Brien is clattered. And, yes, clattered is the word. I'm not gone on all the subsequent whinging after the game but yes, definitely, that should be a card. Remember Tadhg Beirne in Chicago? 'Should be'. It isn't. Ireland are objecting fiercely and I agree with their stance. That's a blatant yellow. I know in most sports all of my sympathy is with a referee when pundits start using slow-mo on replays, because in most sports, the refs don't have that. But they do in rugby, and that's very poor refereeing.

This is a good overall period for Ireland as they push, but South Africa hold their line well and we can't force a gap. No harm; this is the rugby I want Ireland playing.

James Lowe gives away a penalty – again, no fault, just committed early – but South Africa can't capitalise.

Penalty for Ireland and Prendergast goes for it – just ff the post! James Lowe reacts fastest and Ireland drive for the line with Tadhg Beirne getting over. Game on!

Game kind of off again. James Ryan infringed at the ruck and caught Du Toit on the head. It's a yellow. And yes, it is certainly a yellow, even if it's not as blatant as the earlier one. I know, two wrongs don't make a right.

South Africa win a line-out too easily (lads....) and form a maul. Eventually they are over the line, but it's ruled out for a forward pass. Correct

decision, but Ireland knew very little about it. A let-off.

Jams Ryan's yellow card has been upgraded to red. Look, there is no balancing of scales; that is a decision that can stand on it's own merits. It's going to be tough now on Ireland, who are a battling second best already.

South Africa win another line-out and opt for a maul. This ain't going to be no kicking match! Ireland stop them, but not legally, and it's a penalty.

Tommy O'Brien catches Moodie, but the referee deems it accidental. Penalty but no card. Realistically, it could have been given. Matthew Carley is at least as busy as any player on this pitch!

South Africa are just pounding us. Ireland have to do a bit of shuffling. Finally, with six minutes to go in the half, Cobus Reinach goes over. It's been coming for some time. The conversion makes it 12-0. I'm worried that this game could spiral away from us completely.

Sam Prendergast off on a yellow. Thirteen men now to hold the World champions? Can we hold on until half-time?

We can, much to my bemusement, do a lot better than that. Good work by Josh van der Flier and Bundee Aki, and there's big Dan Sheehan to muscle over. Brilliant try against all the odds. Jack Crowley converts – just 12-7 now.

Oh lads. Jack Crowley is off after knocking the ball out of the hands in the ruck. Hello, Neil Back, you do know that you are not forgotten in these parts? South Africa with a penalty. Jack Crowley and Sam Prendergast are sitting beside each other in the sin-bin. The Springboks, of course, opt for the scrum. Why would they not? They are really taking us to school in that regard.

Yep, there's another one that Ireland collapse, and Andrew Porter is joining the lads in the sin bin. Penalty try. I suggest the Irish management consider playing Sevens Rugby for the second half.

Somehow, Ireland actually start the second half well. Sam Prendergast is back – thank God, I was getting worriedthat we were goig to have to start pulling volunteers out of the crowd. Difficult chance at apenalty, but Prendergast nails it. There are certainly faults in his game, but at the things that he is good at, he is very good indeed. 19-10. We might only be clinging on by our fingertips, but we are still in this.

South Africa with another scrum. Almost inevitably they pile on the pressure and Ireland just don't have enough bodies to cope, with Feinberg Mngomezulu touching down. Another missed conversion – I can't see it making any difference in this game, but Rassie Erasmus will look at that going forward.

Ireland finally back to a full complement of players and still half an hour to go. Remember a certain Troy Parrott? The Irish supporters aren't writing off miracle comebacks these days!

The teamare certainly gvng it everyhing, and Ireand are actualy winning those vital little duels all over the pitch now. A foulon Gibson-Park allows Sam Prendergast to knock over anoher penalty and trim the gap a little bit more. Still struggling desperately in the scrum,

though. A lot of the analysis has concentrated on Ireland's ill-discipline. I would argue that in this case, those card chickens emerged from the scrum-collapsing egg. And, yeah, off goes Paddy McCarthy with a card. Jaysus, lads, I don't get that many on my birthday!

Ireland are defending desperately but also brilliantly. Interestingly, Jack Crowley is in the thick of the action and doing well; he is a different player to the callow aspirant of last year.

In fact, in the dying minutes, it's Ireland who are laying siege to South Africa's lie. They don't get over, but it's not for the want of trying.

Has it been a good Autumn for Ireland? Not really – but there's real potential there.

Marko Bencic opened the scoring with a similar effort from Kelly sandwiching a Keon Edwards three pointer. Tyler Mutemasango was sharp early on for the Cruisers and but for the intervention of Eoin Carroll the Cruisers would have had a firmer grip on proceedings. Edwards and James Aboaba were getting into their stride but Kelly and Grant stepped up to make it 16 each with 3.56 to go in the first quarter. Abrace of threes from Ben Kelly Flynn and Angelo Bumatay kick started a late surge from the hosts and despite baskets from Bencic, Kelly and Oisin Spring it was 27 -22 to the Cruisers by quarters end.

The second quarter saw Aboaba forceful inside and he was starting to cause trouble. Grant, Kelly and Bencic went toe to toe with him but the Cruisers were definitely getting on top. But the Lakers would soon get energy, initially from a Mark Sheehan three which cut the gap to 34-31. When Edwards then went on the rampage it was Kelly who rose the resistance with six points without reply. It gave the Lakers a leg up in the game and when young Cillian O'Leary tied it up at 40 each with a three you could feel the enthusiasm level soar. Edwards was keeping

the scoreboard ticking over but Kelly, Carroll and Spring, from a fast break, maintained parity at half time 46-46.

The Cruisers made the better start to the second half with Andrew O Connor instrumental but the Lakers stayed on their coat tails. Carroll, Grant with a three and squeezed it up again to 56-55 and when Aboaba went again , Kelly equalised with a three. The remainder of the quarter was a real arm wrestling with both sides fighting for supremacy with Carroll and Grant keepin the Lakers in tow at 65-65. Spring then came up with a basket to give his side the lead as both sides slugged it out to the end of the quarter. The Cruisers took their last lead of the game early in the final quarter when Ben Kelly Flynn hit a three. But that Spring basket seemed to give the Lakers the edge in confidence as Kelly and Grant certainly started to prosper. The former put his side back in front while the latter hit a basket and then a massive three to open up a six point lead. Carroll worked his socks off to add two more from the charity stripe to give the Lakers an eight point lead. But if they thought that was it they were mistaken as Padriag Mc Groggan hit two

rapid fire three's to roar back into the game. Kellys contributions were now pivotal as he steadied the ship somewhat but the Cruisers were breathing down their necks. Grant and Carroll then put their shoulders to the wheel to stretch it out to 90-84. A pivotal moment in the game was to arrive as an unsportsmanlike foul helped the Lakers push the lead out to 10,94-84 and they never looked back after that with Kelly, Grant and Spring putting the icing on the cake.

Steve Kelly topped the Lakers chart with 38, Sam Grant had 23, Eoin Carroll 21, Oisin Spring 8, Marko Bencic 6, Mark Sheehan 3, Cillian O'Leary 3.

For the Cruiser Keon Edwards had a game high 42, James Aboaba 17 and Andrew O Connor was next best with 8.

So the stage is now set for the first instalment of the Killarney Derby with the Sports and Leisure Centre playing host. While the Cougars have found wins hard to come by, they possess enough talent to pose a threat and with the unpredictability of a local joust, no one can predict the outcome with any certainty. Tip off is at 7.30pm.

An improving and increasingly confident Killarney Cougars side pushed Templeogue all the way on Saturday night in Dublin, delivering an encouraging performance despite a narrow 110–105 defeat in a thrilling, high-scoring Division One encounter.



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# KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL **STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY**

th the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

# **ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS** WITHOUT **CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY** COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry

County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect" Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008 This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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## CHRISTMAS HOUSEPLANTS

We are coming up to the time of year when people will give and receive gifts of houseplants such as Cyclamen, Azalea, Gardenia, Poinsettia etc. Christmas houseplants obviously give their best display this time of the year but they have to be kept in the right conditions like the right temperature and humidity level to prolong their lives into the new year and longer.

The conditions of a house environment can be a challenging place for houseplants because of central heating which is very drying to houseplants especially for ones that come from humid tropical parts of the world.

There are several ways to improve conditions for your plants in the house. You can avoid placing them in draughts, especially in places where temperatures will fluctuate from very hot to very cold or in very hot areas like above or beside a radiator. Water your plants by placing them in a container of water for about twenty minutes.

For plants that need more humidity place them on a tray of gravel with some water but make sure that the plant is sitting on the gravel not the water.

(1 Samuel 17:47).

Welcome back dear student, David said the above as he was running towards Goliath. Many people are fighting overwhelming battles with sicknesses, addictions, family problems, financial, or mental health issues. The list is endless, but the effects are the same. Fear, dread, exhaustion, emptiness, and confusion. No doubt as he faced this giant, David's heart was racing, his body sweating, his mind in overdrive, but his spirit was strong, and his faith in God sustained him (Psalms 62:7). He told King Saul and those who laughed at him, of how God had delivered him from both lions and bears — fearful situations (1 Samuel 17:34–37). This is what strengthened David's faith — his past experiences of God's Power. The time he spent worshipping God had deepened his relationship with the Lord. Relationship fosters trust – you will trust those you know you can depend on. It is vital for anyone facing their Goliath to press in and seek God (Jeremiah 29:11–14). The Word declares "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge" (Hosea 4:6).

It's not a lack of education, achievements, or finances that's destructive, but lack of knowledge of God and His Word. Yahweh, the Lord of Heaven's Armies, is a Covenant-keeping God. Mostly faith is developed in tears, with trembling hands and knees, crying 'Lord save me!' (Luke 18:9-14; Isaiah 35:3-5). Lots of people are enduring battles that seem hopeless. Friend, you are not alone - call upon the Name of the Lord Jesus! (Romans 10:9-13). "The Lord is near to all who call upon Him, to all who call upon Him sincerely and in truth" (Psalm 145:18).
