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
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Killarney celebrates IBAL report

Even in these difficult times... Killarney has finished second place in the Irish Business Against Litter survey, (IBAL) and declared / Cleaner than European Norms' – the highest possible ranking. The adjudicators of the competition, judged by An Taisce, have praised Killarney Municipal District Council, the town's businesses and residents for maintaining the high standards of cleanliness in very difficult times. With the towns newly planted snowdrops in the foreground on Mission Road, announcing the good news were, Cathaoirleach Killarney Muncipal District, Cllr. Brendan Cronin, President of Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce, Cllr Niall Kelleher, Killarney Tidy Towns volunteer, Kathleen Foley and Killarney Muncipal District Officer, Eileen O'Donoghue.

or the second year in a row, Killarney has been named the 2nd cleanest town in Ireland. The final litter survey of 2020 by business group Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) was announced this week and shows Killarney in 2nd place in the ranking of 37 towns and cities, with Tralee retaining its clean status in 17th. It is the second year in a row that Killarney has finished runner-up to Kilkenny, which took the crown for a record 5th time. For the first time in 13 years, fewer than half of the towns surveyed were deemed clean.

WHAT THEY SAID ABOUT KILLARNEY

"Always a top-ranking town, things were no different this time around in Killarney. It is a great credit to the local authority, traders and residents that the high standards of cleanliness have been maintained in these trying times. The Bottle Bank in the car park on Plunkett Street was exceptionally clean and freshly presented; Other top-ranking sites included Knockreer Playground and Deenagh Woodland Trail, High Street / Main Street and Dr Hans Liebherr Road. The Jarvey Parking and surrounds is beautifully laid out - it was also excellent with regard to litter." Speaking to the Killarney Outlook this week, Cllr. Brendan Cronin, Cathaoirleach of the Killarney Municipal Distirct said he was delighted to welcome the results of the Irish Business

Against Litter survey which placed Killarney 2nd in the national standings declaring it "Cleaner than European Norms".

"This is a tremendous achievement in what has been an exceptionally difficult year for the town. It is important to note the consistency of our rankings for the past number of years and it is important for everyone that our standards are maintained. 37 Towns and cities were judged. Eight of the ten sites surveyed in Killarney received A grade, with two sites receiving B grades. A fantastic result".

"I would like to acknowledge the street cleaning staff of the Municipal District who have operated throughout the pandemic and the businesses who continue to maintain in front of and around their premises to such a high standard.

"2020 was exceptional in that, there was very little organised clean ups. We all know and see the continuing work of individual volunteers who continue to litter pick their own area and show such dedication and pride of place in our district. Congratulations to all, he added.

In all, litter levels rose in 24 of the 37 towns and cities inspected by An Taisce at the end of 2020, resulting in only 17 being judged to be clean – a fall of over 25% on last summer and in sharp contrast to just 3 years ago, when 80% were clean.

According to IBAL, the survey results are

consistent with a trend in recent years. "The decline in cleanliness is less a case of the poorer areas getting worse, but of previously clean towns slipping to littered," says IBAL spokesperson Conor Horgan. "Covid is clearly a factor here, but we should never accept litter as inevitable. It comes down to people disposing of their waste without regard for their surroundings or their fellow citizens and it is entirely unnecessary."

One explanation for the rise in litter lies in the restrictions surrounding cleaning services during the pandemic. "While council workers have not been on the streets as much as normal, the general public has been spending more time than ever out of doors," says Mr Horgan. There was a sharp rise in the amounts of litter on approach roads to towns, reflecting the fact that the benign winter has seen masses of people out walking. "Ironically, too many of them are showing a shameful disregard for the environment they are enjoying."

PPE litter

Coffee cups were among the most prevalent litter types found, while there was another rise in glass bottles and cans, suggesting that outdoor drinking has not waned over the winter months. The survey also showed that the second half of 2020 brought a further increase in PPE-related litter, primarily masks.

n Garda Síochána, the HSE and The Department of Health would like to advise members of the public to be aware of potential scams relating to the Covid-19 vaccine.

In recent days, An Garda Síochána is aware of members of the public having received fraudulent text messages and calls regarding Covid vaccination.

GARDAI ISSUE ADVICE **ON VACCINE SCAM WARNING**

The text messages have made requests for people to confirm private and sensitive information such as PPS number, date of birth

Other people have received phone calls requesting they make an appointment for a COVID-19 vaccine jab at a random hospital. In most cases, the person receiving the call will say they are not in a position to travel to the hospital.

This allows the caller to extract further personal details. Some individuals might confirm that they live alone or reveal their home address. The caller will then offer to come to their residence to administer a vaccine.

The HSE will never text or call individuals requesting personal information and they will never request payment for a Covid test or

Your local GP will be the first point of contact about vaccination or Covid testing.

The Covid-19 vaccine is free and it is not available privately. We would ask that members of the public make contact with any vulnerable friends or family to make them aware of these calls and text messages.

TIPS AND ADVICE

Never disclose private information over phone or via text message.

Do not give out your PPS Number to anyone who makes unsolicited contact with you whether by phone or email. The HSE will never call or text you and ask for your PPS number

The HSE will never call you to request your home address

Never give away personal data or disclose who you may live with or if you live alone

The HSE will never request payment for a Covid test or vaccine

If you receive such a call, just hang up Anyone who mistakenly provides personal

information in response to this scam should contact report the matter to their local Garda

If you have questions or concerns relating to Covid testing or vaccination, contact your local





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

ore than 10,000 doses of the Pfizer BioNtech vaccine administered in nursing homes and community hospitals across Cork and Kerry. Cork Kerry Community Healthcare vaccinators are this weekend completing the first round of the roll-out of the Pfzier BioNtech vaccine in nursing homes and community hospitals in the region.

By the end of Sunday, the vaccine will have been offered to residents and staff at more than 90 nursing homes and community hospitals, with more than 10,000 vaccines doses administered across the two counties.

This mammoth task has been undertaken by peer vaccinators in Cork Kerry Community Healthcare facilities, and teams of HSE vaccinators in private and voluntary facilities. Teams from the South South West Hospital Group have also supported the vaccination roll-out in the community.

The roll-out will now immediately move to residents aged over 65 in other long-term residential facilities, including disability and mental health facilities, with supply of the vaccine the only limiting factor.

Among the facilities where residents and staff

were offered the vaccine this weekend were St Joseph's Nursing Home in Killorglin.

Kay O'Connor, vaccination team lead in Kerry said that the teams have worked from early in the morning to late at night, all with the aim of protecting residents of nursing homes and community hospitals.

She added that private nursing homes have been very supportive of the teams.

"It is a great achievement to have offered and administered the first dose of the Covid-19 vaccine to all the nursing homes in Kerry within a two-week period and this would not have been possible without the hard work and dedication of all the staff. The nursing homes were extremely welcoming of the vaccination team and every nursing home had extra staff on hand to help in the delivery of this very important vaccination programme. Everyone worked well together and we all look forward to working together again in the coming weeks in the delivery of the second phase of this national programme," she said.

She also pleaded with the public to continue to keep up with all the measures to stop the spread of Covid-19.

"Please continue to heed the Public Health advice. By rolling out this vaccine to nursing home residents and the wider community, we will eventually see an end to Covid-19," Kay added.

Priscilla Lynch, Covid-19 lead for Cork Kerry Community Healthcare said:

"A huge thank-you is due to everyone involved in the vaccination programme. As well as our teams of vaccinators, so many others have worked tirelessly behind the scenes on this rollout so that we can get the vaccine delivered quickly and safely."

While the vaccination roll-out is going ahead as quickly as possible, Cork Kerry Community Healthcare reminds the public that nursing homes and residential centres are still facing enormous challenges.

There are currently 47 outbreaks in residential settings across Cork and Kerry (this includes nursing homes, community hospitals, disability centres and mental health services). Most of these are in residential centres for older people ie private nursing homes and community hospitals.

WE NEED TO KEEP FLATTENING THE CURVE IN KERRY

The stark reality this month is that there were more cases of COVID-19 in January than there was in the whole of last year.

And although there is light at the end of this very long tunnel with the vaccine rollout, we still have to play our part and STAY AT HOME.

On Tuesday of this week, the reporting of 90 further deaths brought the cumulative total of lives lost to COVID-19 to more than 3,000 in Ireland

The disease is having a severe impact on the most vulnerable in our society and we have to continue to work hard to suppress it.

Dr Tony Holohan, Chief Medical Officer, Department of Health, said on Tuesday"

"The decline in daily incidence of COVID-19 has begun, however the volume of disease in our communities remains very high. To date we have reported 96,000 cases in January 2021, which has already passed the total of 93,500 cases reported in 2020. Indeed, public health doctors in the Midlands reported a total of 4,000 cases in the first 8 months of 2020 and another 4,000 cases in the first four weeks of 2021.

"Through our enhanced public health surveillance programme, we have identified 6 additional cases linked to the Southern African variant of concern. All cases are being followed up by public health teams in line with the latest ECDC guidance published on the 21st January. "The downturn in incidence has been achieved through the determination of people across the country to stay at home, to work from home and to avoid meeting and socialising with others. It is imperative that everyone continues to strictly adhere to the public health advice to protect

ourselves and our loved ones from this highly-

THE MESSAGE TO PEOPLE FOR THE NEXT SIX WEEKS IS VERY SIMPLE: STAY AT HOME

The Government met on Tuesday of this week to consider a number of issues relating to the public health situation.

Here are the key points from An Taoiseach Micheál Martin.

The first thing to say is that the current level 5 restrictions are having a positive effect on the profile of the disease in the country. We are seeing the total weekly cases, 5 day average cases and the 14 day incidence rates all coming down. Close contacts are also coming down.

The sacrifices that people are making in their homes, in their families, in their businesses and within their communities are bringing us in the right direction, and I would like to thank everyone for their efforts to date. Unfortunately, making progress on the incidence of the disease is not enough and the rates across all age

the disease is not enough and the rates across all age groups are still too high.

We still have very high numbers of people in hospital and in intensive care, we have implemented the National Critical Care Surge Plans, and we simply must

reduce the numbers of people needing these services. Our hospitals are under enormous pressure and we must protect the women and men of our health service who continue to put themselves on the line for all of us every day and every night.

It is very clear to everyone now, all across the EU, that the emergence of new variants of the disease represents a dangerous development.

We cannot give the virus or its variants any space.

Therefore, Government has decided to extend all of the current level 5 restrictions until 5th March, with a view to crushing the numbers of those contracting the disease and in turn, the numbers needing hospitalisation and ICU.

The message to people for the next six weeks is very simple: STAY AT HOME.

Do not travel.

Do not make any journeys outside of your 5km unless you absolutely have to.

Hold firm and stick to the basics.

Another important issue that we have been examining is the issue of travel into the country.

I understand the appeal of the idea that there is a simple answer to the pandemic in our country. We just pull up the drawbridge and we'll be back to normal in no time. However, the truth is that there is no easy way through this pandemic, or out of it.

But I first want to reinforce the key message that the most important thing we can do to drive down infections is to STAY HOME and follow the basics around social distance and hand hygiene.

As I said before, people should not be travelling and the Government has made a number of decisions today to further restrict travel and to mitigate the risk of new variants coming into the country:

There should be no non-essential travel. Non essential travel outside of 5km is a clear breach of the level 5 restrictions.

Additional Gardaí will be deployed to our ports and airports and those found to be in breach of this regulation will be subject to an increased fine of €500. All visa free short term travel from South Africa and all of South America is suspended until at least 5th March. Mandatory quarantine at a designated facility will be required for passengers who arrive in breach of the pre-departure negative PCR requirement. They will also be subject to a fine of €2,500 and / or six months imprisonment.

Similarly, mandatory quarantine at a designated facility



will be required for persons who arrive from Brazil and South Africa.

In other cases, passengers will be required by law to quarantine at home.

The restrictions on people's movement and people's freedom are exceptionally difficult.

The true toll that they are taking on people's mental health and well being is as yet unknown, but it is significant.


Now, more than ever, all of us who have a leadership role – across the political spectrum, in the media, in communities, everyone in society – we must stay focussed on the measures that will bring the disease under control and which we as country are in a position to deliver.


he road we are on is hard.

The length of time that we have had to live with restrictions and the proximity of vaccination makes it even harder.

But it is the road we must take, together. We have done it before and we can do it again.







Councillor questions An Bórd Pleanála

Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor is questioning An Bórd Pleanála's request to re-schedule the hearing on the judicial challenges to their granting of permission for the construction of The South Kerry Greenway.

The hearing had originally been set for March 9th, probably in recognition of the fact that inordinate delays had already occurred in this process. The next available date was June 29th, and this has now been confirmed.

"We had a four week Oral Hearing from which a speedy decision was promised but which ended up taking over twelve months" stated Councillor Michael Cahill.

"Then, as part of the process, a further two months was allowed for the lodging of a legal challenge, two of which were lodged" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"We were thankful that the High Court appeared to recognise the huge amount of time already spent on the project and they scheduled an early date" said Councillor Cahill. "It now transpires that An Bórd Pleanála applied for additional time to respond to these challenges, even though the prospect had been flagged to them, during the Oral Hearing by those involved. The High Court, having facilitated an early date to the defendants, find it is they, the defendants



who seek more time. Nearly four months has now been added" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"As an arm of the State, An Bórd Pleanála must deliver it's own process in an orderly and timely fashion and inordinate delays of the nature we are experiencing here, should never occur. The legal resources of the State, I'm sure, are at their disposal and it should have been possible to prepare for any likely challenge" said Councillor Cahill.

Councillor Cahill who has supported the South Kerry Greenway since the very beginning said "This project has been going on for over 10 years and a number of people have put alot of time and work into it and when one takes into consideration the sheer scale of the project, the fact that it will be the single biggest Tourism project ever for Kerry, the importance of it to the recovery of the economy here in Kerry, the fact that it is a "Lifeline and a Gamechanger" for South Kerry and in particular the Caherciveen and Iveragh region, a region that is under continuous population decline and the fact that it will in particular transform Caherciveen town, a town that has been on it's knees for far too long, a town that needs this massive injection, a town that has suffered greatly at the hands of forced emigration with dereliction and closed up businesses plain to be seen, then I believe a World Class Greenway built to the highest of standards, with world class views that will serve and benefit this generation and generations to come will be worth waiting for."

Kelleher calls for mutual recognition of

Covid 19 vaccine approvals

Irish MEP, Billy Kelleher has said that the EMA should seek global agreement with other medicines' authorisation agencies on the mutual recognition of Covid 19 vaccines in an effort to speed up approval and distribution.

"This is crucial in terms of the expected approval of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine in the United States - a one shot, moderate temperature, vaccine - in roughly two weeks.

"I would be highly sceptical of this vaccine being approved for use in the EU by the EMA until early March at best based on how previous applications were dealt with.

"I firmly believe that, due to the severity of this pandemic, the EMA in the EU, the HPRA in the UK, the FDA in the USA, and their counterparts in Canada, Australia and New



Zealand, should agree to mutually recognise their authorisations," said the Renew Europe member of the ENVI committee.

"If one agency is able to approve a vaccine, while adhering to standards, I do not see why other agencies should have to start from scratch. We should be able to fast track approval based on the work carried out by other regulators that adhere to globally recognised standards.

"We're already running into trouble with the Oxford Astrazeneca vaccine, and it hasn't been approved yet. We cannot afford to wait any longer, than is necessary, to have the Johnson & Johnson vaccine approved and in use.

"Additionally, we need to get to the bottom of contractual problems with companies the EU has entered into approval purchase agreements with; we must have full transparency. Citizens and MEPs are demanding it. All contracts should be made available immediately," concluded Kelleher.

Vegan Chocolate Brownies

With continued lockdown, home schooling and all that comes with it I felt we definitely deserved and needed a treat this week so vegan chocolate brownies were made and boy were they tasty!

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons ground flaxseed mixed with 6 tablespoons water set aside for 5 minutes (This is called a flax egg and replaces egg in a mixture)
- 150g vegan chocolate
- 80g vegan margarine
- 125g plain flour
- 1/4th teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
- 70g ground almonds
- 50g cocoa powder
- 250g brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Pinch salt

(Strawberries and raspberries to garnish)

Method

In a pot melt the chocolate and margarine with 60ml water. When this is melted whisk in the brown sugar and vanilla extract until smooth and shiny. Leave to cool slightly. In a separate bowl put the flour, ground almonds, cocoa powder, baking powder and a pinch of salt and mix well.

Then add the chocolate mixture and flax egg mix to the dry mixture and whisk with a hand whisk until well combined. Pour the mixture into a 20cm greased and lined baking tin bake in a pre-heated oven on 170 degrees for 35 minutes.



When baked turn it on to a wired baking rack and when nearly cool cut it into portion sized pieces. I served garnished with a little strawberry and raspberry, these are so yummy and make a lovely weekend treat-

AIB BRANCHES ACROSS KERRY RAISED OVER €8,000 FOR LOCAL CAUSES DURING COVID

AlB branches across Kerry have raised over €8,000 for local causes last year as part of AlB Together, the bank's community investment programme. In total, money was raised for 28 local causes including Kerry Cancer Support Trust, SVP - Killorglin social action group and Listowel Family Resource Centre.

In addition to the money raised for local causes, on a national level AIB committed €2.4m to Trinity College Dublin's dedicated Covid-19 Research Hub to urgently accelerate the college's immunology project.

The bank also launched the 'AIB Together Fund' to further support communities impacted by the Covid-19 crisis. This allowed staff to donate directly into a dedicated fund which the bank then matched, helping raise over €422,000 for



the bank's long-standing community partners FoodCloud and Soar, as well as Alone, and Pieta House. The bank also established a fund of €200,000 which allowed branches to donate directly to vulnerable groups in the community which were impacted by the pandemic.

This has brought the total amount donated by the bank and its staff to causes in support of Covid-19 to over €3 million. This money helped support the vital work these charities and organisations do and the vulnerable groups they support in the community.

Since partnering with FoodCloud in 2018 for example, over 1,100 AIB volunteers have volunteered over 7,000 hours which have gone towards ensuring 100 million meals have gone to people and not to waste across Ireland and the UK.

New grant offers support to businesses

A new Ready for Customs grant has been made available to help provide companies with financial assistance to cover the costs of taking on much needed additional customs clearance staff, which will be required when Brexit becomes a reality on the 1st January 2021.

This is a cash limited scheme of up to €20m, with the following financial support available:

- A grant of €9,000 to support the recruitment or redeployment of a full-time employee into a dedicated customs role.
- A grant of €4,500 to support the recruitment or redeployment of a part-time2 employee into a dedicated customs role.
- Enterprise Ireland may seek repayment of the grant if 12 months from the date of offer it is established that the dedicated customs role was not sustained, or that suitable customs training was not provided.

The maximum number of eligible employees per enterprise who will qualify for support will be limited by the amount of De Minimis Aid available to the enterprise. However, Enterprise Ireland reserves the right to determine that the number of employees proposed is appropriate to the additional customs clearance capacity proposed.

The application process will close when the €20m fund has been dispersed or on 31st March 2021 at 3pm, whichever is earlier. Eligible Enterprises

The 'Ready for Customs' grant is open to enterprises that are currently engaged in the



movement of goods to, from, or through the UK and which will require new or increased customs clearance capacity. These include enterprises that:

Are providing freight, haulage, logistics services to, from or through the UK or

Are providing customs intermediary services or Are directly engaged in the movement of goods with or through the UK.

In addition, enterprises:

Must have a CRO number (not a business name) and be incorporated in the Republic of Ireland at the time of application.

Must have an EORI number from Revenue. Enterprises providing customs intermediary services less than 12 months since

establishment must also provide a supporting business plan.

Eligible employee

An eligible employee:

Is based in Ireland.

Is/will be engaged primarily in customs clearance activities with a role such as Customs Clearance Clerk/Administrator, Customs Clearance Operator, Customs Supervisor, Import/Export Freight Operator/Administrator or similar.

Is a new or planned hire to the organisation, or has been re-deployed within the organisation to a dedicated customs role from date of application.

Buying online from the UK after Brexit

Advice from the Citizens Information Service

The impact of Brexit is now being felt by Irish consumers up and down the country. As a result of the UK leaving the EU, there are changes to consumer rights that everyone needs to be aware of when buying from online retailers in the UK.

In particular Irish consumers should be aware of the following changes when it comes to purchasing goods from a UK retailer online:

- The sale of goods from the UK to Ireland are now treated as imports to Ireland, this means additional import charges and VAT may apply when buying from UK websites
- EU consumer protection legislation may no longer apply, instead Irish consumer rights will be set down in UK law.
- It may be more difficult to resolve a dispute with a UK business

As a general guide, packages valued more than €22 are subject to import taxes and charges. The consumer will have to pay import taxes/customs duties and also VAT charged at the Irish rate of 21%. In some cases, the duty and tax for EU deliveries will be covered by the UK company, but this is completely up to the individual retailer. So, check the small

Speaking about the impact of Brexit on Irish consumers, Frances Clifford, Kerry Citizens Information Manager said, "From 1st January 2021, you should be especially careful when buying from a UK seller. It is very important to carefully check the terms and conditions on the seller's website and familiarise yourself with their proceedings. If you have any concerns relating to buying online from a UK retailer please contact your local Citizens Information Centre, we remain open and are here to answer any questions you may have."



SIXTH YEAR STUDENT CILLIAN HICKEY AIRS THE VOICES OF THE STUDENTS AT ST. BRENDANS

he grueling struggles of any normal leaving cert year can be difficult for any student to cope with. However, the class of 2021 have been the subjects of an incredibly stressful and torrid what is nearly twelve months now. We spent our last day of 5th year in school on the 12th of March 2020 being told we would return before or, in the worst-case scenario, after the easter holidays. Little did we envisage remotely learning at home until the end of May and returning to school having to implement social distancing at all times while wearing masks in September only to being stuck at home once again after the Christmas holidays just passed, and the message that was reiterated to us that it'll only be for January is now beginning to look more and more unlikely.

I recently represented my year group along with my classmate Darragh Doolan at an online conference hosted by the Irish Second-Level Students Union (ISSU) where opinions and suggestion of students from all over the country were heard. The consensus of most students is that we just need clarity and decisions to be made soon in relation to the state exams instead of waiting until the last minute as we saw last year. The Minister and Department of Education say they want to do what is best and what is fair for all students yet I hardly think it is fair to lead exam students along by an indecisive string for weeks on end while stress and anxiety levels are only increasing. Thousands of exam students are unsure of whether they should be putting themselves under increased pressure to cover work missed last year, or should they be studying for orals and practical's which aren't guaranteed to go ahead.

Lunderstand the Minister of Education finds herself in between a rock and a hard place to say the least but with the lack of clarity and predictability this global pandemic has brought I think it's a bold statement for Norma Foley to make that we will be in a safe environment to complete a "tradition leaving cert" come June. Despite the fact that our experience of senior cycle has been far from "traditional", having nearly been absent for our classrooms for approximately 13 weeks so far with no nailed down date for our safe return I find it hard to believe that as a year group we are expected to stay motivated to commit so much time to working at home which can often present its own struggles such as, a poor internet connection or no quiet place for a student to work productively. While not forgetting to revise old materials and retain new information being taught to us through a screen without any escape from our studies such as meeting friends, sports or whatever it is that lets you go into a world of your own with no worries.

The pre leaving cert exams are crucial for students to experience the environment we could be dealing with over the two weeks that technically define the next couple of years in our young lives if the exams go ahead, and with the amount of school time missed the question being asked by most schools is can we finish courses in sufficient time to allow us enough time for crucial revision while also accommodating nearly two more weeks of class time for the pre-exams when we return to school, whenever that may be. In my own experience I have to thank the teachers and all staff in St. Brendan's College who have adapted fantastically over the last year for the pressure they too are being put under amidst all this



uncertainty. Keeping to our timetabled school days we have live classes with each teacher via Microsoft Teams every day. Although it is a somewhat efficient way of making up for our absenteeism from the classroom it doesn't come anywhere near the same benefit of face-to-face learning. No matter how many breaks or walks you go for throughout the day, the emotional toll that comes with the mundane repeated routine sitting at the same desk from 9am to 4pm takes on you is mentally draining, without worrying over the fact if we were in school, we'd be expected to take our seat in the study hall for another 2,3 if not 4 hours.

There is no definitive line that can be drawn in the sand that will satisfy every student, but from hearing the viewpoints of so many 6th years and their thoughts towards the situation, I believe what we all want to know is if the Leaving Cert of 2021 does go ahead will there be additional edits to the papers on top of what has already been changed in September in line with the additional school time missed. Difficult decisions have to be made and bold leadership needs to be seen to come to the fore. After all the powers that be must take into account and always remember in their decision making that they are dealing with young people's lives and futures.

It's been a whirlwind for teachers and students...

Sinéad Collins, Irish and Spanish Teacher in St. Brigid's, Killarney tells Killarney Outlook what teaching is like during the third lockdown

Where to begin? It's been a whirlwind few weeks for the entire country going back to full lockdown! For myself, my colleagues and students it has been difficult to face into the complexities of another school closure and engaging with online learning. In an ideal world, the best teaching and learning takes place in the class room but I suppose we have to deal with the cards we've been dealt given the circumstances surrounding Covid19. Personally, I have had a really positive experience with teaching on-line. In St. Brigid's, we are following the school time table and I meet with each class group at their allocated time daily for an online class - which is similar to a 'Zoom call'. This really helps with keeping routine and providing structure to the day (for me personally and for the students, I'm sure!) I have to admit, I am really lucky with the students that I teach - I believe credit should be given where it is due! The levels of engagement, attendance in my 'online classroom', and the resilience that the girls have shown in adapting to online learning is commendable. The feedback we have been receiving from the students has been really informative and positive as well. My niece is a first vear student in St. Brigid's and has reinforced this sentiment regarding her own teachers - Just in case anyone thinks my own students are telling me what I want to hear!

I suppose it's worth mentioning, I am lucky enough that I don't have toddlers to entertain

or any children of my own to home-school while also teaching from home - so that definitely makes life a little easier. I don't envy the difficulties that many of my colleagues face in trying to engage with teaching on-line and also trying to tend to their own children's needs with online learning. Recently, I've heard an awful lot about 'Jolly Phonics' and the nightmare it seems to be. Needless to say, we are a lot better prepared than the last time around. Let's be honest, we were thrown in at the deep end last March when schools closed unprecedently. Both teachers and students have been engaging in IT upskilling since returning to school in September and it has really stood to us. We are so much better equipped this time around and many lessons have been learned along the way.

It is an extremely uncertain time for our Leaving Cert students. I teach Leaving certificate Higher Level Irish and I am acutely aware of the stress and anxiety that my students are experiencing at the moment. Hopefully, some difficult decisions will be made in the coming weeks and they will get the answers they so anxiously want. This is what I am most conscious of throughout this entire ordeal – some stability and clarity, for them. They're a fantastic group of girls and have put in so much effort over the last two years – I have no doubt they will strive and excel, no matter the outcome, but the question on everyone's mind is – What that outcome will be?

Submissions and observations on the plans must be submitted to the Council by 17 February. A report on these submissions will be presented at a meeting to the Killarney Municipal District councillors.

Cathaoirleach of the Killarney Municipal District, Cllr Brendan Cronin encouraged people to participate in the webinar and to engage in the consultation process.

'The new cycle paths would measure a cumulative total of almost four kilometres and would greatly enhance the cycling infrastructure in the town. This is a very exciting development for Killarney, and I hope everyone will make their views known on what is proposed, he said.

The Part VIII process for such a development, under the relevant planning legislation, involves the public display of all relevant plans which can be downloaded from the Kerry County Council website. The details of the plans will be outlined during the webinar by Senior Engineer, David Doyle. Comments and questions can also be dealt with during the webinar.

The five proposed cycle paths are as follows:

Rock Road - Car Park northward to N22 Roundabout at

Upper Lewis Road - St. Anne's Road junction to south of Bridgefield estate

Park Road - Park Road roundabout to the Friary Junction Deerpark Road - Park Road junction to Gaelscoil Road junction

Gaelscoil Road - Deerpark road to Killarney Sport & Leisure Centre

PARKING FOR CYCLISTS At the January meeting of

Killarney Municipal District, Councillor Michael Gleeson proposed that as cycling by visitors is ever growing in popularity, that Kerry County Council would seek to provide small car parks, initially proximate to Killarney town, where motorists could park prior to the occupants going cycling throughout the area and the County. Such developments would attract many to visit our County without having to endure and add to traffic congestion within the urban centre.

Killarney Municipal District replied that it was successful in 2020 in receiving funding for the design of cycle routes on a number of approaches to the town centre. These plans are currently out for public consultation. In order to encourage and promote cycling there will be a need to provide enhanced cycling infrastructure. As part of further plans and proposals in relation to active travel, the Council will consider this proposal to give adequate access points to those cycling routes.

Councillor Gleeson proposed that as part of its progressive commitment to the advancement of cycling, that the Killarney Municipal signpost District would and delineate a safe and legal crossing corridor on Muckross Road (just south of Flesk Bridge) where need to cross from the end of the dedicated cycle lane to the commencement of the offroad Walking / Cycling / Jarvey Road at Cahernane.

Municipal District Council replied that Kerry County Council will make a submission to TII for funding to provide this facility.

Early CAO figures indicate a rush to

college as Kerry's 25% unemployment rate is the worst in the country



with Leaving Cert candidates grappling with nerve wracking uncertainty, early CAO figures indicate that the rush to college is on. By early application deadline of 20th January, CAO had received 66,547 applications, up by 5,070 on last year. By normal closing date of 1st February last year, 73,035 applications had been lodged with the CAO, so that figure will surely be surpassed this year. With the addition of late applications to CAO, the number of applicants in 2020 eventually increased to 78,168. That number will be considerably higher in 2021.

This week's unemployment figures, compiled by Central Bank economists for the Irish Independent, make shocking reading. 20% of the national workforce is out of work. Kerry's unemployment rate is the worst in the country, having jumped from 6% to 25%. Kerry's workers are also worst hit by the pandemic with a staggering 45% on State benefits. Counties, like Kerry, which are highly dependent on tourism and retail, are being devastated by the lockdown.

This time last year, college applicants were full of the joys of life. With national unemployment at 5%, opportunities were never better for those with a strong work ethic and a skills' set to meet the demands of a thriving economy. There was a job for everybody who was willing to work. College applicants were acutely aware of employment opportunities in a buoyant economy. They were buying into the notion that the jobs market was their oyster if they were well educated with a marketable qualification.

But all changed utterly when the deadly coronavirus invaded our shores. Unemployment has shot up to a staggering 20% nationally from 5%. All non-essential services ground to a halt. In a concerted effort to oust the coronavirus, the country is led by skilled, dedicated and passionate people. College applicants are switching to courses

that this 'new normality' is receptive to. As the coronavirus continues to cause medical and employment havoc, CAO applicants are favouring courses with strong employment stability.

Applicants are opting in large numbers for science, engineering and information technology courses. Science is riding the crest of a wave with attractive jobs available in industrial, medical and research science. In the current 'green wave', environmental, agricultural, marine and physical sciences are employment friendly.

The acceleration of social media platforms, artificial intelligence, data analysis, automation and digital communication during the pandemic has forever changed long established business practices. Many more business transactions are taking place online so the demand for courses in analytical and digital skills, e-business, software and coding skills is increasing.

The need for housing and infrastructure will result in high demand for courses in civil, mechanical, electrical, environmental and structural engineering, architecture, quantity surveying, valuation surveying, property management and auctioneering.

Front line healthcare workers – Doctors, Pharmacists, Nurses, Physiotherapists and allied health care staff are the heroes of Ireland's battle with the virus. Demand for all courses in health sciences will be at an all-time high this year.

Civil and Public service jobs showed how resistant they are to unpredictable economic circumstances. Every civil and public service worker remains on the State payroll while thousands of private sector workers depend on a variety of Covid-19 payments. Many private sector employees, especially those in the tourism and retail sectors, remain uncertain about their future job status.

With so much emphasis in the jobs market on skilled and well-qualified personnel, college

applicants are aware that their chances of employment are considerably increased by a competitive qualification. They are looking at the skills' set needed in the work environment of the future. Remote working is here to stay so self-management, self-motivation and self-discipline skills are growing in importance. Work place logistics catering for staggered hours, regular hand washing, social distancing and face mask protection will impinge on most professions. They realise that a strong work ethic, high-digital skills, adaptability and a passion for one's qualification makes one more employable in a rapidly changing work environment.



has been identified in submissions to the National Development Plan by Kerry County Council as critical to the development of the Kerry Hub Knowledge Triangle and the improvement of local infrastructure. As well as reducing travel times on the N70 road, the new 1.6km bypass will ease traffic

I don't need to explain to any of ye who Paul Murphy is. I could go through his underage career - the fact that he was never selected by the Kerry minors is certainly worth a mention. I think the fact that Rathmore had several strong players that year (Mark Reen did play minor) meant that star factor overshadowed his complete effectiveness. I wasn't thinking at the time myself that he was a surprising omission, by the way. By U12 he was what he is. And the fourth Rathmore player to be man of the match in an All Ireland Final is as good as any of them. Normally it's the O'Donoghue Cup champions would get to nominate East Kerry's choice, but that competition isn't finished (I fear for it, to be honest). The choice came to East Kerry themselves and they plain and simple went for the obvious and popular choice.

Best of luck of course, to Paul, and to hurling counterpart Daniel Collins of Kilmoyley (another fairly obvious choice, I would think. I'm aware, of course, of the various rumours circulating around about changes to the Kerry management and various names being linked. and BI would not tell ye if I did. I'm no admirer of this cloak of secrecy and this fostering of unity against hostility in intercounty teams), I think a lot of them are confusing the Championship with a James Bond movie.

This is a time of where I could be updating ye on the various player retirements around the country.

Dr. Crokes Apply to go Senior Hurling

It's ambitious; there's no doubt about it. The simple truth is that if the first round draw for the Hurling County Championship was made tomorrow and one team drew the Intermediate champions, they would delighted, we all know that. But they would also be worried, and they would be right to be. It's not just that Crokes are good, it's their youth and their proven commitment.

Obviously as a Killarney man who delights in stories about our 1950s minor teams and our senior team of the late '60s, I would absolutely love it. But I actually think this is a great decision on it's objective merits.

The thing is – and I want to be very careful about how I phrase this – I have a kind of a belief that in the boardrooms of Kerry GAA, the senior Kerry hurling clubs have a subconscious tendency to vote en bloc and be mindful of intrusions into their level. Just a small, stupid little suspicion that's in the back of my own mind.

SOCCER Chorley's Dream Ends

The giant-killers managed by Jamie Vermiglio finally bowed out of the FA Cup at the hand of Wolves, but they did so with their heads high. Wolves are a whopping 109 points above them in the league tables, but Chorley gave them a great game of it. And that's usual the usual sympathy when vast underdogs put up a good battle and lose, no-one ever criticises the underdogs in those circumstances. But this is not that. When I say that Chorley gave them a good battle, I mean literally that. Chorley could very well have won this and it certainly would not have been undeserved. Wolves goalkeeper John Ruddy was arguably the standout player for a side that included five internationals. Chorley had a lot of players who showed, not only their eagerness for the contest, but their ability to match Wolves all the way in quality as well. It was a great game for any neutral to watch.

The possibility of Chorley visiting Killarney to play a combined team at some time in the future was put to Jamie and he was not averse to the idea, although of course any such things



Chelsea have parted ways with Frank Lampard as manager, in the same kind of circumstances.

Frank did his best, but the truth is simply that Chelsea have had a dismal season so far and this is a business, very much a business, where results have to be the bottom line. He had to go, and no-one could honestly argue against. Frank is a hero with Chelsea, honestly one of their best players ever including the likes of Ron 'Chopper' Harris and Jimmy Greaves. But he lacked experience as a manager, he had one solid but not spectacular year with Derby previously. That actually isn't enough to suddenly step up to the level of a team expected to win the Premiership. But I'm not actually sure that it's all down to Frank, in the sense that changing the manager will suddenly create a huge turnaround. That's something that Chelsea have tried before; they have the highest record of changing managers of the past twenty years. I have a theory (I have many theories, and even and I am embarrassed at some of them!) that Chelsea's problem is obne that dogged them before. When Roman Abramavovich first purchased Chelsea, they developed a habit of spending enormous sums of money (back then - 'big money' is very different now!) on superstar players. But what I think happened was that both manager and team were trying to assimilate these new players constantly and it slowed them developing confidence in their team play. When you join a new team, at any level and in any team sport, you need to practise a lot with your team-mates. You need to learn who likes what kind of pass, what defender you need to provide cover for, the various styles of movement. The rhythm of your team. When they are all playing to that rhythm is when a team is at its absolute best. Think about all the

I actually think that we are seeing a few more moves breaking down this year than previously; I don't think anyone will honestly argue with me that the actual standard of play has dipped this year. I suspect that the many restrictions imposed by the pandemic have made it harder to maintain and sharpen that rhythm.

I don't follow the sport closely. it has always seemed more focussed on the hype and the razzmatazz than substance. The truth is that I have always had a large dollop of cynicism when it comes to it. Maybe it's time for me to put that away....

Poirier looked in trouble in the opening round. He did manage a good take-down. but McGregor shook it off with relative ease and dominated for the most part. Both fighters landed some really good shots, it was impressive stuff to watch.

ATHLETICS

The passing of the great Jerry Kiernan sent a ripple of sadness far beyond his native Kerry. Best known in recent times as probably RTE's best analytical and unsentimental commentators, Jerry of course had earned the right to be uncompromising by being among the standard-bearers of his own golden generation. Jerry didn't make too many friends when he pointed out that GAA players would be far out of their league at the top level athletics. Of course he was absolutely right. Anyone suggesting that the likes of David Clifford or Brian Fenton would be competitive at the All Ireland Athletics Championships is either suggesting that Jerry himself would have been brilliant if suddenly landed into an All Ireland Final, or the GAA is costing Ireland hundreds of Olympic medals.

Con Dennehy, himself one of the top runners in that golden era, is a friend whom Jerry and I had in common, and has compiled Jerry's career stats. A few, and only a small few, include 5 Irish titles at different events, Y, 7 World Cross Country Championships, a Youth All Ireland, Junior Cross Country All Ireland, and capped 17 times for his country. His 9th place finish in the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles was somewhat overshadowed by his friend John Treacy's silver medal but it really was a phenomenal achievement – it would be fair to say that year's line-up in the race was the best ever.

But those achievements were far from any measure of his

THINKING ABOUT **FEELINGS**

When someone comes along to counselling and begins to talk about what is troubling them, one of the difficulties that sometimes emerges is their sense of having feelings that are 'bad' or 'wrong'. Perhaps they have been experiencing feelings of anger, or frustration, or maybe sadness, or regret. They may see such feelings as negative or self-pitying, and not compatible with being a good and kind and positive person. They wish these feelings would just go away. But, however much they try to wish them away, the feelings stubbornly persist. So then they experience shame and anxiety about having what they see as such negative feelings, and this shame and anxiety gets added to the mix, and just makes everything worse.

Counselling can offer us time and space in which we can talk about, and think about, all the different aspects of our emotional life, without using labels like positive or negative, right or wrong, good or bad. Instead, the counsellor provides a non-judgmental relationship, in which all aspects of our emotional experience can be heard and thought about. If we can slow things down a bit, begin to make sense of our feelings, and see them as an unsurprising response to aspects of our life experience, they are much less likely to cause us anxiety.

Gradually, we become more able to manage our feelings and get on with our lives, instead of our feelings managing us, perhaps by making us anxious or irritable or unconfident or withdrawn. We learn to accept that, if we face difficult and challenging situations in the future then, naturally, we are bound to experience difficult and challenging feelings within ourselves. And when we have to bear particularly difficult circumstances or events in our lives, there is no shame in seeking support to work through our feelings about them.

A counsellor is able to sustain an open and accepting attitude to another person's feelings, without anxiety getting in the way, because, through their own training and personal development, they accept that having emotional responses to life's events is a part of what it is to be human. Perhaps then, the more accepting and tolerant we can be towards our own emotional life, the more kindly and accepting we are able to be towards the feelings of others.

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HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS

What we mean when we call a plant an Herbaceous Perennial is that in most of them the stems are soft, succulent and green as opposed to being brown and woody. With most Herbaceous Perennial they will sprout growth from ground level in spring and will grow and flower right through the summer and into the autumn. With most Herbaceous Perennials, in late autumn and early winter they start to look a bit ragged. But depending on the severity of the winter, some will hold on until the first real cold snap. The maintenance for most Herbaceous Perennials isn't a lot really. During late autumn, early winter cut the majority of the stem down to ground level and mulch over with some compost, some Herbaceous Perennials such as Lupins and semi hardy Fuchsias will have woody stems because of the milder climate here so when pruning back cut right back to just a couple of inches above ground level.

Herbaceous Perennials are a valuable plant in the garden for a number of reasons.

1. Because of the length of time they flower for.

2. Because of the short length of time it takes them to grow to the maximum height and spread. When planting an Herbaceous Border always remember to plant the taller ones to the back or middle and the smaller growing ones to the front. When choosing your plants pick one plant that you can repeatedly plant in the border to create a sense of continuity to the planting scheme. Herbaceous Perennials flower from April until October/November so you have a wide range of flowering times and colour to choose from. 
