

LIP SYNC BATTLE SET TO ROCK THE INEC

The official launch of the much anticipated Killarney Lip Sync Battle took place on Sunday night last at KTown Bar.

The event which will feature a number of well know Killarney faces is set to take place on August 25th at the INEC.

The group got together to raise funds for Anthony Morris who is currently in the USA receiving treatments for chronic Lyme Disease. The gala affair will see ten acts battle it out to be crowned Lip Sync Battle champions.

Speaking to the Killarney Outlook, Anthony's brother Jim told us about the progress so far.

"Anthony, who has just begun his 3rd month of a 9 month treatment protocol, has had the intensity and aggressiveness stepped up a level. Anthony's doctors big concern has been an obvious deterioration in his cognitive function and metal sharpness. He has been really struggling to communicate, getting confused and lost for words. This is a result of the Lyme infection affecting his brain and fighting back against the antibiotics. His pain levels and headaches have also increased but this can be attributed to a Herxheimer reaction as the bacteria starts to die off. Anthony receives I.V. treatment 3 times a week where he generally stays in bed and tries to sleep through the nausea and pain, on his flush days he is usually sleepy and groggy. His doctors are quick to prescribe sleep and pain aids to make him as comfortable as possible. In

addition the I.V regime causes severe stomach cramps and nausea. His fiancée Margaret and daughter Roísin have become accustomed to the everyday needs that is required of them. Seeing the outreach of love and support during this time through the different fundraisers keeps Anthony and his family in high spirits and drives him on to win his own battle".



REPAIR WORK COMPLETED ON SKELLIG MICHAEL

Major repair works which were made necessary following damage to a rockfall which damaged a key section of the road and wall at Skellig Michael island have this week been successfully concluded and the Island infrastructure reinstated.

The major damage occurred earlier this year when a large section of rock fractured at a high level on the slopes above the Lighthouse Road, the main visitor access to the famous Monastery site, and fell into the sea, on its way, crashing into and severely damaging the Road and its seaward boundary wall and badly compromising the access to the Monastery. When this was discovered in March last, it gave rise to significant fears that the Island would not be able to open to visitors this year owing to the severe safety risk that it presented and the OPW commenced a major rebuilding and safety project to ensure that the damage was repaired and continued visitor access facilitated.

Visitor access to the Island was maintained throughout the repair project and visitors were able to safely access the famous Monastery steps just past the works site from the start of the summer season in May last without any significant interruption. The number of visitors landing on the Island this year up to the end of June was 5,232 which is broadly in line with the total of 12,260 for the 2015 season. Demand from tourists remains buoyant with Boatmen and other local business interests reporting a steady flow of visitors to the area. However, as always, the weather and the seas remain the major determining factor in whether the Island can be accessed. While there have been significant periods of good weather between May and July, access for the remainder of the season until 2 October 2016 will be weather dependent.

IN THE NATIONAL INTEREST — TD'S REVEALED

Six months on from the General Election and Outlook Publications catches up with the Five Kerry TD's that were elected to the very new Kerry constituency. This week we talk to Fianna Fail's John Brassil TD

It has been six months since you were elected what immediate changes have taken place in life since then?

The most challenging change is the amount of time I spend away from home and my family travelling up to Dublin every week is a significant change but I am thoroughly enjoying my time in Dáil Eireann and honoured to have been given the opportunity to be there.

As a first time TD we had a lot of work to put in setting up my constituency officers in Tralee, Killarney and Listowel which was demanding given the short space of time we had to do it but we are settled in now and glad to be providing a steady service in the Counties three biggest towns.

The work load is significantly greater than in my time as a Kerry County Councillor, the type and number of representations coming through the offices is much greater however I have the back up of my wife and family and my very hard working staff which has made this transition a lot easier.

It took a while to put the government together, were you happy with its foundation and what challenges do you think lie ahead for it?

The formation of this government was very new to Irish Politics and to be honest I was not convinced right up to its formation that another election was not going to happen, they say a day is a long time in Politics and the weeks in the lead up to it were long . I genuinely believe that the fact that every party and member of Dáil Eireann is now relevant to its survival can make the Dáil more effective and the Government more answerable.

Can you walk us through a week in the life of a Kerry TD?

Mondays, Fridays and Saturdays are dedicated to constituency work. I have clinics across the County from Cahirciveen to Castleisland to Dingle which is an excellent way to touch base with constituents and find out what

issues are affecting people here in Kerry. Tuesdays, Wednesday and Thursdays are Dáil sitting days. The days are filled with a combination of attending Dáil Debates, meetings of the Health Committee of which I am a member

Weekends are filled with clinics and meetings plus attendance at various events. I try to spend Saturday evenings catching up on the events of the week and plan for the following week but every now and again, weather permitting; I try to get out on the golf course in Ballyheigue with my son Noel.

Sundays I do everything I can to keep for my family, but there are some events where my presence may be required and I work in my pharmacy from 12-1 but in general Sunday is family day. I try and keep Sundays for my family, I cherish the time I spend with Bernadette and the children and make every effort to have some family time every week, we would also religiously go on a 1 week family holiday every year.

How conscious are you that you are a Kerry TD?

I am 100% focused on Kerry, the issues affecting people at a local level are the same issues that need to be addressed at National level. They are intrinsically linked, as in what is good for the country is good for the County. So we do our utmost to address issues affecting people personally

from Agricultural payments, housing allocation's, hospital appointments, but I want to affect change at policy level which has the potential to improve these issues in the longer term. I am very much aware that we are a rural county and relatively peripheral and the concerns that arise from this need to be addresses at National level, I fully intend to use my voice to lobby for improved services for the County.

What TD outside of Kerry and your party has impressed you most in the last six months and why?

The Green Party leader Eamon Ryan has impressed me greatly with very reasoned and well thought out arguments.

How do you keep an eye on the constituency when too are away in Dublin?

I am fortunate to work with two excellent constituency staff and Cllr. John Joe Culloty. I talk to my PA and SA on the phone daily. Social Media and the internet are also mines of information and there isn't much that would go unnoticed from home that I would spot this way. I have also set up a network working with Cllr John Francis Flynn, Norma Moriarty, Mike O'Shea and Senator Mark Daly in the South West, Jimmy Maloney and John Lucid in the Listowel area, John Joe Culloty and Niall Kelleher in the Killarney area and Norma Foley Tralee all of whom I liaise with on a daily/ weekly basis. The Fianna Fáil team in Kerry is a great one and I'm very lucky to have their support and to be able to support them.

What one footprint have you personally left to date as a TD in Dail Eireann and one that you are proud of?

In my first contribution to the Dáil, I laid out proposals for trying to deal with the thousands of unoccupied houses in towns and villages across Ireland. I put these proposals to the Committee of Housing and Homelessness and they are now part of their recommendation coming before

I am also proud of the contribution I made on Climate Change which was based on Scientific evidence and Fact.

In this week's Killarney Outlook we look at some of the best offers available.



BACK TO SCHOOL COSTS 2016

Credit Unions say "Avoid Moneylenders, Shop Around, Plan a Budget".

- Research undertaken in June 2016 by the Irish League of Credit Union indicated that back to school costs negatively impact 26% of household bill payments with 13% of parents saying they will have to sacrifice spending on food to cover these costs.
- School associated costs have increased year on year from 2012 with overall spend for primary children on average is €967 per year per child and secondary €1,474
- On average primary school parents are spending €145 on uniforms per child, secondary school parents spending €234 per child
- 31% of parents find themselves in debt covering back to school costs, borrowing an average of €357
- In 2016 60% of parents will shop online for back to school items, up significantly from 47% in 2015
- 79% parents expected to make 'voluntary contribution to school averaging €118 per child, up from €112 in 2015
- 37% of parents feel under pressure to buy branded school supplies, down from 42% in 2015, pressure more evident in secondary school parents.
- \bullet Only 14% % of parents eligible for back-to-school allowance believe the back to school allowance is sufficient to cover school costs.
- Speaking about the research, Helen Courtney Power, Business Development Officer with Killarney Credit Union said "we are very aware of the increased costs that families are facing when returning children to school after the holidays, we recommend that you plan early by making out a budget, shopping for deals in local retailers and avoid door step credit at all costs. We offer personal micro credit loans for smaller amounts which can be repaid through the household budget scheme or you can also look at our standard education loans for members" she concluded.

How can I afford the BACK TO SCHOOL COSTS?



The school year is now at an end and it won't be long until September is with us again and the children go back to school with all the associated costs. The list can seem endless. Rather than wait for the last frantic weeks of August, it's a good idea to start planning now and to try and spread the cost of going back to school over the summer. Here are a few things to consider.

Step 1. Cut the Costs

The school uniform and book list will have been given out already.

- Ask the principal if the school offers the Book Rental Scheme or other supports available under the School Books Grant Scheme
- Check if the school runs a second-hand book and uniform sale.
- Ask friends and family if they have any of the books on the list or organise your own book and uniform exchange with friends.
- Ask your local book-shop if they offer instalment plans and pay for the cost of books over the summer weeks.
- Copybooks, pens and pencils can all be cheaper if bought in large quantities – will a friend split the costs with you if you buy a lot together?
- Re-use stationery items such as folders, files and pockets.
- Watch the shops for special promotions on uniforms. Some may offer discounts if you buy early in the summer.
- Shop around for generic uniform items like shirts, t-shirts, trousers and skirts in local chain stores.
- Check with the principal on other costs that come up over the year for things like art & craft, photocopying, school trips etc., and plan for them.
- Remember the voluntary contribution is voluntary speak with the principal if you have any difficulty.

Step 2. Make out a Budget

- List the costs using our budget guide.
- Check if you qualify for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance
- Subtract it from the total cost to find out the balance needed.

Step 3. Planning to meet the balance needed

- Work out how many weeks are left until September and how much you will need to save each week to cover the cost.
- Can you afford to cover the costs from your income? If not, look at your budget again and see if you can reduce the costs further. For some families there may be very difficult circumstances and they may also need to contact their local Community Welfare Service.
- If you have to borrow, think about whether you can afford the repayments, make sure to get the best rate (APR), and only borrow what you need from a reputable financial institution.

THERE ARE A NUMBER OF SCHEMES WHICH PROVIDE HELP TOWARDS THE COST OF GOING TO SCHOOL, AS FOLLOWS:

BACK TO SCHOOL CLOTHING AND FOOTWEAR ALLOWANCE

The Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance helps you to meet the cost of uniforms and footwear for children going to school. The Scheme runs from June 1st until September 30th. You may qualify for the Allowance if you are:

- Getting a social welfare payment (including the Family Income Supplement) or a Health Service Executive payment
- Taking part in an approved employment scheme
- Taking part in a recognised education or training course
- Involved in an Area Partnership Scheme
- Attending a SOLAS, Fáilte Ireland or LES training scheme

To qualify for this allowance, your household income must be below a certain limit, depending on your family size. In general, the rate of the allowance paid for each eligible child aged 4-11 on or before 30th September is €100. For each eligible child aged 12-22 on or before the 30th September and in second level education the rate is €200. Children in third level education are not eligible. The Department of Social Protection will have written to you in early June. For more information, log on to www.welfare.ie or low call 1890 66 22 44.

EXEMPTION FROM EXAMINATION FEES

If you hold a current medical card then your child is exempt from Junior Cert and Leaving Cert examination fees. Enter the medical card details on the fee payment form and return to the school before the required date.





FOCUS ON SUMMER GARDENING



with John O'Sullivan

JOBS TO DO IN THE GARDEN IN AUGUST

- Keep patio container plants well watered and feed with a liquid fertilizer every couple of weeks.
- If you have Dahlias or Lilies now is a good time to stake them to prevent wind or rain damage.
- Trim back lavender plants if they have stopped flowering so it will keep them nice and compact you can also prune Summer flowering plants if they are finished flowering.
- Prune climbing roses and rambling roses once they have finished flowering unless they are repeat flowerers, then leave them alone.
- Now is also a good time to spray perennial weeds such as ground elder as there is plenty of foliage to absorb the weed killer.
 - If possible cut lawns at least once a week, keeping the edges neat.
- Lawns should be fed, if this has not already been done. However, if the sun does come out don't mow as often during long, dry spells as this just lets the grass grow longer plus summer feeds shouldn't be used as this encourages new growth. Lawns in drought areas may turn brown during warm weather in the summer, making the look less attractive, but try not to use a sprinkler as they will quickly recover once wet weather returns in Autumn, if not sooner!

KILLARNEY **Cardiac Response Unit**

THE KILLARNEY CARDIAC RESPONSE UNIT have Approximately 40 volunteers, from all sectors of society. We cover a 6km radius from the center of Killarney and are activated by Ambulance control once an emergency call is received to 999/112 for Cardiac Arrest, Chest Pains, Stroke or Choking. Community Responders work alongside and under the control of the National Ambulance Service, and assist and treat patients while waiting for the Ambulance to arrive.

Having more people who can respond to medical emergencies and trained to use AEDs will greatly increase survival rates for people in sudden cardiac arrest.

When a person suffers a sudden cardiac arrest, chances of survival decrease by 7 to 10 percent for each minute that passes without defibrillation. A Person's chance of survival is less successful when the patient has been in cardiac arrest for more than a few minutes, especially if no CPR was provided.

We have a total of 5 Defibrillators in use in our unit, and are always looking for volunteers.

ALL-IRELAND SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

KERRY TO LOWER THE BANNER COLOURS ONCE AGAIN

KERRY O'SHEA LOOKS FORWARD TO SUNDAY'S ALL-IRELAND SFC QUARTER-FINAL CLASH BETWEEN KERRY AND CLARE

KERRY V CLARE

Croke Park, Sunday 2pm

The late, great John B Keane in his epic play 'The Man from Clare', deals with the personal tragedy of an aging athlete who finds he has no longer the physical strength to maintain his position as the captain of the team or his reputation as the best footballer in Clare.

This Sunday, Clare's best footballers put their reputations on the line when they face Kerry on the biggest stage of all, the All-Ireland SFC quarter-finals in Croke Park.

Kerry have one of the most consistent records since the guarter-finals were introduced in 2001 and have lost just twice in 15 years, to Down in 2010 and Donegal in 2012, while this is Clare's first time to reach the last eight.

The sides are already familiar with each other, having met in the McGrath Cup in January when Clare defeated a very depleted Kingdom on a 0-12 to 0-9 scoreline and the opening round of the Munster campaign on June 12th in Fitzgerald Stadium, a game won by the Kingdom by a 2-23 to 0-17 margin.

Since then, Clare have regrouped through the qualifiers and wins over Laois, Sligo and Roscommon has given Colm Collins' charges the opportunity of an outing to Croke Park which they will certainly relish.

Clare's progress in getting to the quarter-finals comes as no surprise to Kerry manager Eamon Fitzmaurice, who spoke to representatives of the local print and broadcast media ahead of the clash with the Banner County on Monday.

"We have played Clare twice this year. I don't think a lot has changed since we met them in June. Their game against Laois was very tight, they played very well last Saturday and should have scored more than they did. They now have three wins under their belts and we always felt they would be around for the summer they have a lot of good footballers, are well coached and play attractive football. They have had a

great run through the qualifiers which really suits them. They are playing with energy and verve at present."

Fitzmaurice felt that some comments in Dublin media circles in relation to Kerry's easy passage to an All-Ireland semi-final were disrespectful of Clare and Tipperary

"Both Clare and Tipp were dismissed because of defeats to Kerry during the provincial championship. Their results since show the sterling work that is afoot in both counties to promote football in largely hurling counties."

The fact that three Munster counties, with the possibility of a fourth have already reached the quarter-finals for the first time ever, was keenly emphasised by Fitzmaurice.

"Clare still scored 17 points against Kerry in Killarney in June. Of the three counties we could have faced, Clare were obviously the best. They have improved since last June. They have confidence and momentum too. They have Croke Park experience having won the Division 3 title earlier in the year and that is why we have to be at our best in order to beat them."

"We are looking forward to be heading for Croke Park again, we will be chomping at the bit and are keen to play in Headquarters. We are coming in against a team that has a level of match fitness at the moment that we don't." he said.

On the injury front, Eamonn Fitzmaurice confirmed that Kerry will be without Colm Cooper who picked up a shoulder injury after 20 minutes of the Munster final win over Tipperary and the man who replaced him, Mikey Geaney, who subsequently picked up an ankle injury. Johnny Buckley has resumed training following his injury issues but Fitzmaurice stressed that the game may be a week too soon for him.

On the plus side from a Kerry point of view, the return to form of James O'Donoghue who scored 0-4 in the Munster final when coming off the bench was something that delighted Eamonn Fitzmaurice.

Clare will face this game with nothing to lose, they have big, powerful players and in Gary Brennan they have an excellent midfield general and a natural leader.

Brennan's displays for the Banner this year haven't gone unnoticed and he is being spoken of as a possible All Star contender.

David Tubridy, their go to man for scores from both play and frees, Owen Cleary, Cian O'Dea, Cathal O'Connor, the Collins brothers, Sean and dual star Podge, and Pearse Lillis, who scored 0-3 coming off the bench against the Kingdom in June, are all players Kerry will have to be wary of if they are to advance to the last four.

Kerry will be strong favourites to win this encounter and set up the possibility of an All-Ireland semi-final meeting with Dublin, should the Metropolitans win their quarter-final encounter.

Stand tickets for Sunday's games are €30 with terrace tickets costing €20. Family tickets in the Cusack and Davin stands cost €30 for adults and €5 for Juveniles.

Club Tickets can be collected at the

County Board offices in Austin Stack Park from until Thursday 5:30pm and on Friday from 12pm to 4pm.

Tickets went on public sale in Austin Stack Park Wednesday 27th July and are also available to purchase from the Kerry GAA Store in the Outlet Centre in Killarney, and participating Centra and SuperValu stores around the County.



TAX Matters with



DEPOSIT INTEREST RETENTION TAX

Financial service providers such as banks, building societies and post offices, offer accounts where you can save a sum of money (a deposit) for which they will pay you an annual rate of interest in return, usually as a percentage of the deposit.

The interest you receive is subject to a tax called Deposit Interest Retention Tax (DIRT).

DIRT is charged at 41% on all interest payments.

The tax is deducted by the bank or other deposit-taker before the interest is paid to you. If you request it, you are entitled to be given a statement of the amount of DIRT deducted from your interest. If you receive annual interest payments (or similar profit-type payments) of over €300 your bank, building society, credit union or An Post must automatically report this to Revenue.

DIRT is a final liability for income tax purposes. This means that if you have paid DIRT you do not have to pay any further income tax or Universal Social Charge on the interest but it is declared as income if you are making a

A SPANISH EX-MONK HAS BUILTAUNIQUECATHEDRAL

If you want to see an example of great devotion, diligence, care and faith, you need look no further than the wonderful 90-year-old builder of a superb Spanish 'cathedral'. The cathedral is utterly unique in ecclesiastical history since it has been built entirely out of discarded trash. Born in 1925, Don Justo Gallego Martínez was raised by a pious Catholic mother, and grew up to be a lowly peasant farmer. In his early years his schooling was interrupted by the devastating Spanish Civil War, he actually witnessed the communists shooting priests and desecrating his local Church. These atrocities turned him off politics, and the world of violence he saw around him. His ambition was to be a holy monk, set apart from the ways of man to learn the will of God. So he joined the Trappists, but he contracted tuberculosis after eight years and was forced to leave the monastery, ending his dream. However, this man of faith was not perturbed by the turn of fate and Instead he pondered how best he could dedicate himself and serve the Lord. So he decided, without any training or experience, to build his own cathedral. Don Justo started work in 1961 on the feast day, Our Lady of the Pillar, with only a vision and no plans. So for the next 55 years right up to the present day, Don, with only his unique personality and certain faith driving him, would begin to work from 6am, always doing 10 hours of labour per day (except on the Lord's day). For most of the time, unbelievably, he worked solo, without any crane, only using whatever trash or donations he could get his hands on for building material. Yet lately he has help from a local man and also some of his nephews.

Occasionally volunteers from far afield (as far as Germany) come to help out and learn at the feet of this untrained master, so taken are they by the wonderful virtue of the great but humble man. In 2014, Don Justo predicted

that the Church, christened by him Nuestra Señora del Pilar (Our Lady of the Pillar), would be completed in two to three years. Hopefully this will be the case, as it would be so beautiful for Gallego to be able to sit back and enjoy his finished work. Although the Church has no official status of any kind – neither does he have planning permission, nor does the Catholic Church recognize his 'cathedral' – the building has become a major tourist attraction in the small town of Mejorada del Campo, situated near the capital, Madrid.

If you are interested, you can actually visit the cathedral and see the man at work, as it's open daily between 10am and 4pm. The town is about 40 minutes' drive from the centre of Madrid.

TODAY IS INTERNATIONAL TIGER DAY

International Tiger Day is held annually on July 29 to give worldwide attention to the reservation of tigers. It is both an awareness day and a celebration. It was founded at the Saint Petersburg Tiger Summit in 2010. This was done because at that time wild tigers were too close to extinction. Many animal welfare organisations pledged to help these wonderful creatures and are still helping to raise funds to reach this goal.

The goal of Tiger Day is to promote the protection and expansion of the wild tigers habitats and to gain support through awareness for tiger conservation.

- In 1913 it was estimated there was 100,000 tigers in the wild by 2013 that number was estimated to having been reduced to 3,274.
- Tigers have lost 93% of their natural habitat due to the expansion of cities and agriculture by humans.
- There are 6 out of 9 recent subspecies of tigers left on Earth. How long they will be able to survive is in question. Right now all 6 of these remaining species are considered to be endangered.
- The Javan tiger was last recorded in the 1970s, the Caspian tiger was lost in the 1950s, and the Bali tiger became extinct in the 1930s.
- The female tiger raises her cubs without any help from the male, she will find a den for her cubs to be born in approximately 16 weeks after conception. The cubs are blind at birth and she will feed them milk from her body for about 8 weeks before they venture outside of the den with her. She may have from 3 to 4 cubs at a time.
- Usually, only two survive, because the mother must leave the cubs while she hunts, and she cannot kill enough prey to feed so many cubs.
- Tiger cubs mature quickly. At 8 weeks old, they are ready to learn how to hunt and go out on hunting expeditions with their mother. At 2 years old, the cubs will set out on their own, and their mother will have another set of cubs. Less than half of them will survive, they may be killed by farmers or poachers, by males of their own species that are threatened by them or become prey for other types of animals out there in the wild.

STILL WORRIED ABOUT EXAM RESULTS? DON'T BE - THE 32ND PRESIDENT OF THE US WAS A COLLEGE DROPOUT

Considered smart "but not brilliant" by many of his teachers, U.S President Franklin D Roosevelt's success story began long before his presidency. Attending Harvard College, Roosevelt studied economics and served as the editor for the school newspaper. Graduating with a Bachelor of Arts in history, Roosevelt went on to attend Columbia's Law School for three years only to drop out after he passed the bar exam. The degrees didn't matter, of course, since both Harvard and Columbia presented him with honorary degrees once in office.

He served as the 32nd President of the United States in the longest leadership in history lasting four terms and over 12 years. Helping to lead the country through the post-Depression era and again through World War II, Roosevelt was highly praised for his intelligence and ability during such troubling times.

PARROT SAVES CHILD'S LIFE

A 2-year-old named Hannah Kuusk would have choked to death if it weren't for Willie, a Quaker parrot. "While I was in the bathroom, Willie started screaming like I'd never heard him scream before and he started flapping his wings," said Megan Howard from Denver, Colarado, the child's babysitter and the bird's owner. "Then he started saying 'mama baby' over and over and over again until I came out and looked at Hannah and Hannah's face was turning blue." Ms. Howard performed the Heimlich manoeuvre to save the little girl, but she says Willie is the real hero. The bird was later presented with the local Red Cross chapter's Animal Lifesaver Award.

ADVICE FROM 104 YEAR OLD DOCTOR CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK

Dr. Shigeaki Hinohara was born in 1911, and is probably the world's oldest and longest-serving physician and educator. After World War II, he had the vision to establish a world class hospital and college, and today his St. Luke's International Hospital (Seiroka International Hospital) Tokyo and St. Luke's College of Nursing are the top medical organisations in Japan.

The following is the conclusion of Dr. Hinohara's advice and beliefs taken from an interview he gave ten years ago:

• Science alone can't cure or help people.

Science lumps us all together, but illness is individual. Each person is unique, and diseases are connected to their hearts. To know the illness and help people, we need liberal and visual arts, not just medical ones.

- Find a role model and aim to achieve even more than they could ever do. My father went to the United States in 1900 to study at Duke University in North Carolina. He was a pioneer and one of my heroes. Later I found a few more life guides, and when I am stuck, I ask myself how they would deal with the problem.
- Until one is 60 years old, it is easy to work for one's family and to achieve one's goals. But in our later years, we should strive to contribute to society. Since the age of 65, I have worked as a volunteer. I still put in 18 hours a day, seven days a week, and love every minute of it.
- Energy comes from feeling good, not from eating well or sleeping a lot.

We all remember how as children, when we were having fun, we often forgot to eat or sleep. I believe that we can keep that attitude as adults too. It's best not to tire the body with too many rules such as lunchtime and bedtime

CHIMPS TO BE RELEASED FROM RESEARCH CENTRE

It has been announced that 220 chimpanzees are going to be released from the University of Louisiana's New Iberia Research Centre (NIRC) and retired to a 236-acre sanctuary run by Project Chimps. This is ground breaking news; it is the largest ever release of captive chimps. It is also the first time a private research facility has consented to liberating its entire colony. "We're making history here," said Project Chimps President Sarah Baeckler Davis. "We're thrilled to partner with NIRC on this retirement of so many chimpanzees. It's an unprecedented collaboration and a

momentous occasion for chimpanzees."

The chimps' long-time confinement at the controversial laboratory provoked waves of public criticism. Dozens of petitions were drafted and signed demanding that NIRC retire the animals to a reputable sanctuary. The chimps, whose ages range from one to 50 years, will be relocated in small social groups over a period of two or three years, while Project Chimps arranges for the appropriate accommodations. The relocation of the Chimps began in June!

Coping with everything from traffic to tractors The holiday season can mean high temperatures, increased stress levels, and extra demands on your car - so here's our advice to help with the bigger challenges of summer

WET OR LOST KEY FOBS

It's easy to lose your car keys in the sand, or ruin your remote control with water by accidentally taking the fob for a swim.

Keep your keys safe and dry and check your handbook - on most cars, there's an alternative way to open the doors that you can use if the remote stopped working.

PUNCTURES

If your tyres are already damaged or they're at the wrong pressure, the higher temperatures of summer will increase the risk of a blowout.

Make sure you check tyres regularly - for condition and pressures - and increase pressures to suit extra loads, as advised in your handbook.

Check caravan tyres too, and replace those that show any signs of cracking in the sidewall or tread grooves.

OVERHEATING

High temperatures can aggravate cooling system problems too. It's important to check the coolant and cooling system regularly to avoid overheating.

GLARE

Dazzle from the sun causes lots of accidents but you can reduce the effect by keeping your windscreen nice and clean, and by replacing worn or damaged windscreen wipers.

It pays to keep a clean pair of sunglasses in your car year-round but avoid lenses that darken in strong sunlight.

DRIVING TIRED

If you feel tired, stop and take a short nap (up to 15 minutes) or drink two cups of strong coffee. It's best to avoid getting tired in the first place if you can. These tips can help:

Include a 20-minute break in journeys of more than 3 hours

On longer trips, take a break every couple of hours



You're better off taking several short (at least 20 minutes) stops than one long one

Don't drink alcohol or eat a heavy meal before drivina

Don't stop for a nap on the hard shoulder, and make sure you check parking restrictions before putting your head down at a motorway service area as you could get a ticket for overstaying your welcome.

HAYFEVER

If your hayfever is particularly bad, it's best to get someone else to drive if you can. Also: Make sure any medication you're taking doesn't

cause drowsiness Close windows and air vents to reduce pollen grains in the car

Clean mats and carpets regularly to get rid of

Keep tissues close to hand

Wear sunglasses to block out bright sunlight Slow down and drop back if you feel you're about to sneeze - at 70mph you'll lose vision for up to 100m

LOOSE CHIPPINGS

Roads repaired with tar and loose chippings are a common sight in the summer but they can cause cracked headlamps and windscreens, and damage paintwork if you're not careful. Stick to any temporary speed limit that's been put in place and keep your distance from the car in front.

If you're a smoker, don't just throw your cigarette out of the window when you've finished it. Verges and embankments can become bone-dry and a smouldering cigarette may be enough to ignite roadside grass.

TRACTORS

The driver of that slow-moving tractor in front of you may have a soundproofed cab or could be wearing ear protectors, so may not be able to hear approaching cars.

Be aware that tractors only have to have brake or indicator lights if driving at night, so they may stop or turn suddenly and without warning in daylight hours.

WHEN YOU'RE **DRIVING** THE **COUNTRYSIDE:**

Keep plenty of distance behind a tractor Remember that a tractor may be longer than it appears – there could be a loader on the front Before overtaking, make sure you have plenty of room to get past

AVOID A BREAKDOWN THIS SUMMER

Slow down if you come across a spillage – if you hit a bale of straw at speed you will damage your car

Don't park in a gateway or passing place – they are farmers' field access points

Drive extra carefully after rain, which can turn dry mud into a skid pan





HEALING FROM BETRAYA



We looked at trust last week and how to build trust, so this week we examine how to heal when trust is broken, or when betrayal happens. There are examples throughout history and in every religious script of serious betrayals, and many great pieces

of literature contain betrayal as the main story. This occurs between individuals, e.g. Jesus and Judas; between countries, too many to mention and between religions e.g. Hindu and Muslim. So we all have a clear picture of what happens when betrayal occurs but how do we recover or heal from betrayal. For most of us this is not so easy to do, especially if it has happened in our lives more than once, or if the same situation or person keeps hurting us.

Everyone is different, so any guidelines for how to heal or forgive when betrayal has happened must fit for you, there is no one size fits all. Research in restorative justice, which means what justice helps the person wronged heal, and the person who has done wrong learn and accept the consequences in the most constructive way, has shown that some key steps or issues must be addressed. These steps are quite helpful to think of in terms of healing in relationships as well.

- •The person who has betrayed or broken trust must acknowledge her behaviour has caused hurt or pain directly to the hurt person
- The hurt or wronged person must face this person that hurt him and say what the effect of those actions has had on him
- · Sorry is a good start, but not enough, the person has to actively say what he is going to work on to do things differently in the future, and where or what help she will seek to ensure that this does not keep happening
- The person who betrayed or hurt has to ask the person what will help to make it better as well, and accept whatever the wronged person asks for, within reason of course.

Now all of this sounds quite ideal, if not a bit confusing, but these are steps to start not end with. Good communication is the key, and a hurtful situation can be the opportunity to change a pattern.

Often the person who caused the hurt is no longer in our life, and then a way to begin the healing process is to imagine or actually write that person a letter, telling him or her all the pain it caused, then imagine or actually write a letter to yourself from that person asking for forgiveness. By forgiving others we start to heal ourselves.

"To err is human, to forgive divine"

Know Your Rights: PART-TIME WORK AND SOCIAL **WELFARE PAYMENTS**

OUESTION

I'm working part-time on a low wage. Do I qualify for any social welfare payments?

ANSWER

It depends on your personal circumstances. Many people work part time before taking up full-time employment. If you are working part time you can, in some cases, keep or apply for a partial social welfare payment, or you may qualify for additional supports.

If you work over 38 hours in a fortnight and you have children you may be able to claim Family Income Supplement (FIS). FIS is a weekly tax-free payment for people on low pay. You may be able to claim a jobseeker's payment for the days you are not working. You can work part-time for up to 3 days a week and claim a reduced Jobseeker's Benefit or Jobseeker's Allowance payment. You may qualify for the Part-time Job Incentive Scheme if you were getting Jobseeker's Allowance and find part-time work for less than 24 hours per week.

However, one of the main conditions for getting a jobseeker's payment is that you must be available for and actively seeking work. This means that you must continue to look for work on the days you are unemployed. You must also be unemployed for at least 4 days out of 7 consecutive days.

If you return to work after a period of unemployment, you may qualify for the Back to Work Family Dividend (BTWFD) which aims to help families move from social welfare into employment. The BTWFD and FIS can be paid together and the BTWFD is not taken into account in the means test for FIS. If you are parenting alone and getting a One-Parent Family Payment, you are allowed to earn a certain amount each week and keep your payment. DAIL DIARY....



Before the Dail broke up for the Summer Recess, Deputy Danny Healy Rae spoke on the following issues:

HOME CARERS Deputy Danny Healy-Rae: Since being elected to this House, I and the other representatives from

Kerry have highlighted our dissatisfaction with home help provision for elderly people in our county, which is unacceptable. We raised the issue many times in the discussions on the programme for Government, on the Order of Business and at other times here, but nothing has changed in Kerry with regard to improving home help services.

This Government will be judged on its ability to make a difference to the people we represent. I believe that the people who need home help are not getting a sufficient number of hours. I know of many cases where the husband and the wife are trying to stay in their home but they are not getting a sufficient number of home help hours. A half hour in the morning and a half hour in the evening for five days is not sufficient in terms of helping people to get out of bed, give them a meal or whatever. Very little can be done in that short time. The home helps are wonderful people and they stay longer than they are paid to do. I am aware of an elderly couple that is using the pension of one of them to provide a home help. That is not acceptable.

Very few people get a home help on a weekend. That is not acceptable. They do not get a home help on bank holidays. I mentioned previously that home help was taken from people on Christmas Day, St. Stephen's Day and New Year's Day. That is a time of peace and goodwill when we are all supposed to look after each other, but especially elderly people. That is the service our State is providing.

It appears to me that there is no accountability in this area. The HSE is not accountable to the Minister for Health, but the buck should stop with the Minister. If we raise an issue in this House the Minister should address it and see how it can be approved. If we do not help our elderly people to stay in their homes for as long as they possibly can, we are not doing our duty.

Kerry has been badly let down with regard to the provision of a sufficient number of home help hours. I ask that this matter be addressed. On another issue, Deer Lodge is a new facility that was built 12 months ago at great expense in St. Margaret's Road, Killarney, to deal with people with mental health problems, but the door has not been opened yet. That brand new facility has been lying idle for 12 months. I want the Minister to make a statement on when he will open the doors of that facility. Our county is riddled with suicides, and I am not saying that facility will stop suicides from happening in our county, but it is not acceptable that its doors are not yet open.

As an elected representative, I promised many people that we would do our level best to ensure the facility would be up and running. The facility was completed in June of last year and was supposed to open in July of last year but the doors and gates are closed and it has not yet opened. I want the Minister for Health, Deputy Harris, or the Minister of State, Deputy McGrath, to make a statement on when it will be opened. That is the question we are being asked day in, day out.

Another serious problem is manifesting itself regularly. Consider a person who has had a heart attack and goes to Cork University Hospital in the hope of having a triple or quadruple bypass. I have a constituent who was waiting for three weeks and who had to return home many times during those three weeks because when he went to the hospital. there was no bed available and the operation was cancelled. Imagine the stress and trauma that family had to endure wondering if he would get another heart attack. The operation was cancelled several times. That was not fair on the family, the patient or the patient's poor wife who could hardly sleep for those three weeks all because a bed was not available to cater for that patient following the operation. Those matters need to be addressed.

Members elected to this Chamber highlight these concerns but nothing is happening. The Minister needs to make a statement on what he will do about these serious matters. I am not alone in raising these issues but I ask that they be addressed and that the Minister makes a statement on them.

SEPTIC TANKS

Home owners who are experiencing problems with their septic tanks and who need financial assistance from their local authorities have been informed by the Minister for the Environment, Community & Local Government that under the Domestic Waste Water Treatment Systems Financial Assistance there is a grant scheme to assist with the cost of remediation of septic tanks and domestic waste water treatment systems which are deemed following an inspection the Environmental Protection Agencies National Inspection Plan to require repair or upgrading.

The grant scheme insures that the limited financial resources available are targeted towards householders particularly those on lower incomes who incur expenditure

directly as a result of the implementation of the water services amendment act. The regulation provides that subject to the applicant meeting all qualification criteria a local authority may pay a grant to a person who is required following an inspection to have repairs or upgrades to or replacement of septic tanks or other domestic waste water treatment systems. Application for grant aid are administered by the local authority in whose functional areas the particular domestic waste water treatment system requiring remediation is situated where a local authority pays a grant under the scheme. The Ministers Department will recoup 100% of the amount paid by the local authority.

The Minister was responding to a Parliamentary Question by Kerry TD Michael Healy-Rae who raised the matter in recent days in the Dail.

MUNICIPAL AREA NEWS

MID KERRY WATER PIPES

Cllr. Brendan Cronin is delighted to confirm that the long overdue major water pipe replacement works have begun from Barleymount to Flynns forge. The total funding amounts to €390,000 (€ 300,000 from Flynns Forge to Aglish and €90,000 from Coolroe cross towards Barleymount) for mains pipe replacement and road reinstatement.

These improvement works should benefit over 2,500 homes in the Mid Kerry district from Aghadoe to Rockfield and from Milltown/Listry to Ballyhar including all townlands within this area. Residents in this area have suffered for years with continuous water breaks and I am delighted to have been able to secure and deliver this funding as the pipe network in Mid Kerry is appalling for 21st century Ireland.

Cllr. Maura Healy Ray put forward the following notices of motion to Kerry County Council:

"That the members of Kerry County Council revisit the proposal to provide public toilets at


