Kerry Cancer Support Group has been shortlisted for a national awards, Culture Night is looming and from first years to leaving cert results, we have all the photos from these major milestones.



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## KILLARNEY FAMILY RALLIES

## in the Face of Devastating Diagnosis

Killarney couple are facing the greatest challenge of their lives after Warren Tierney was diagnosed with stage 4 oesophageal cancer, a cruel blow that has shaken their young family to its core.

Warren and his wife Evelyn Dore, parents to two young children, Trinity and Wesley, are now in a desperate race against time to access lifesaving treatment abroad, and are asking for the support of their community and beyond.

The diagnosis, stage 4 adenocarcinoma of the oesophagus, came after months of health concerns that were initially dismissed as acid reflux. But Evelyn, determined and unrelenting, knew something wasn't right.

"We had to fight our way through A&E, begging them to take it seriously," she said.

It was a devastating moment for a family who has already been through so much.

"When I was pregnant with both Trinity and Wesley, I was very sick," Evelyn shared. "Through it all, Warren carried us. For the past three years, he's devoted himself completely to looking after me and our children, pouring every ounce of his strength into our family, and never once thinking of himself."

Now, it is Warren who needs care, and time is not on their side. In Ireland, only palliative options are currently available for Warren's condition. But the Dores have found a glimmer of hope in Germany, where curative treatment is possible at a private clinic: Medias Klinikum in Burghausen.

Thanks to the assistance of Kate Powell from Booking Health, the family secured a 10% discount on their first round of localised chemotherapy. That treatment alone cost €38,557. The family flew to Munich this week to begin what they hope is the beginning of



Warren's recovery.

"We will need a couple more treatments," Evelyn said. "We're hopeful and we believe we're going to beat this, but we can't do it alone. Every donation, every share, every prayer, it all helps." The outpouring of community support has already been heartfelt. Dr. Crokes GAA Club, where the family are members, has made a public call to support the Dores during this incredibly difficult time.

"As a club and community, we are asking our members, supporters, and friends to come together in support of this young family," the club said in a statement. "Warren is courageously battling stage 4 cancer, and Evelyn and their children need our support

now more than ever."


The family has launched a GoFundMe campaign, which has already begun to gather momentum and at the time of print, has raised over €`70,000. But more help is urgently needed to fund the next stages of treatment.

"From the bottom of our hearts, thank you," Evelyn said. "We are humbled and grateful beyond words. Your kindness and generosity have given us strength in this darkest of times. God is good."

Warren who is originally from Limerick said, 'Killarney and the surrounding areas have rallied so strong around me. It's overwhelming. It can be hard to integrate into a community. and I feel a part of the Kingdom. Up the Crokes!' Evelyn and Warren are currently in Medias Klinikum in Burghausen. The Medias Hospital is a private medical center that specialises in Surgical Oncology and Regional Chemotherapy (RCT). Warren receivede an isolated thoracic perfusion yesterday, Thursday. He will get another 3 weeks from tomorrow in a different area and then an assessment to see where to go from there.

#### RISH KIDNEY ASSOCIATION LAUNCHES APPEAL TO COMPLETE VITAL **FACILITY RENOVATION**

The Irish Kidney Association (IKA) has launched a nationwide fundraising campaign to support the €1.3 million refurbishment of its National Kidney Support Centre (NKSC) on the grounds of Beaumont Hospital in Dublin. The Centre, which offers free accommodation and respite to kidney patients and their families, is set to reopen in Spring 2026 following extensive renovations. To mark the launch, the O'Shea family from Killorglin, travelled to Dublin to lend their support. Clodagh O'Shea (15), a kidney transplant recipient, and her father Tim, who donated a kidney to her in 2016, shared their experience of how the Centre eased their journey through Clodagh's treatment.

"Living in Kerry meant a 640km round trip for every appointment. The Centre was a lifeline," Tim said. "During my donor assessment and Clodagh's transplant, it allowed our family to stay close, without the financial burden of hotels or extra travel. It gave us dignity, comfort, and hope."

The NKSC, temporarily closed since 2020, is being completely modernised with new ensuite bedrooms, communal areas, a counselling room, and sustainable energy systems. The IKA aims to raise €250,000 through its new website www. supportkidneycentre.ie, where supporters can:

Buy specific fit-out items (e.g. bedding, kitchenware) Purchase vouchers from €20

Sponsor corporate giving packages starting at €5,000

All donations will directly support the fit-out and operation of the Centre, which will continue to provide free accommodation and respite to families in need.



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

# Runners Conquer Rugged Terrain in 'Top of Coom' Half Marathon

The race began at Barrnastooka, Kilgarvan, hosted on the farm of John and Glynn Egan, known as the Good Shepherd. From there, participants followed a spectacular horseshoe loop around the Grousemount Wind Farm, traversing some of the region's most remote and scenic uplands.

The first section of the route climbed over Barrnastooka and the four tops of Carrán, before reaching Bealick above Gougane Barra. Runners then followed the historic County Bounds back to the finish line at the 'Top of Coom', proudly known as Ireland's highest

## THE ROSE EVOLVES AND IT BLOOMS

The usual suspects are dismissing the Rose in the usual manner. But this year's competition and its winner Co Laois apprentice electrician Katelyn Cummins, signals a new look.

Even so, I heard one female columnist dismiss it as "still the lovely girls" festival of Fr Ted era.

Group thinking and top down opinion with anyone afraid to step outside the stereotype is bedevilling the Irish media. One of columnist Alison O'Connor's big gripes about the Rose was that Gaza was not raised by any of the Roses. Well would it be okay in Alison's book to also have a Rose give the Israeli point of view?

The view of women in this society has matured and it is now possible to be useful and attractive and, yes, have a bit of craic.

People interested in art know this idea is not new: Over 100 years ago Roger Fry and the Bloomsbury group promoted the idea that household objects could be useful and beautiful and fun. So the dull brown milk jug gave way. Go into any hardware shop and you will see this carried through again in the revival of the coloured toaster.

Decades back the Rose of Tralee festival was very American, college educated, and dare I say a bit too assertive at times. But the show also opened windows into new worlds for Irish women.

Then came the all too obvious "follow the trend"- the first gay rose, followed by the rose of colour etc.

This year something different happened. It was no longer predictable. The competition took a step in a lightbulb moment for the nation in the winner. "Very girly but one of the lads", is how electrician Katelyn described herself. And clearly very able.

It was a profound take on modern young Irish women and should spark a debate - they are not ornaments, neither are they unlovely girls either. And they are fun.

This year's festival answered a great need to celebrate women. It's less than two years since Leo and co tried and failed to take the words mother and woman out of the constitution, remember? Some of the same columnists who don't like roses were also screaming at us to vote yes.

## THE GREEN LAWN IS FAR FROM MOWED DOWN

The saga of the controversial Green Lawn car park is far from over. A big question now hangs over the council as a whole as to why advice from the planning watchdog, the Office of the Planning Regulator, was not referred to. Kerry's only opposition TD Pa Daly, SF, has already raised the matter.

The OPR was set up after the planning scandals of the tiger era. It assesses all town development plans, and has the last word on planning. The development plan for Killarney was out for public comment because of proposed variations on parking and other matters. There were over 80 submissions and these will come before the council meeting in September.

One of the most important and earliest was from the OPR/ planning regulator.

To recap: In their variation the council stated "It is considered that there is sufficient car parking within the town, both on street and car parks, located within close proximity of the town

centre ... There is currently a public consultation process taking place for a Part 8 development of a car park off Mission Road."

The next line refers to the "objective" to build a multi-storey.

Back comes the regulator and effectively tells the council: You can't be building a new car park in Green Lawn and still want a multi-storey.

"The proposed Variation states there is sufficient car parking within the town based on current provision, and the development of an additional 139 car parking spaces off Mission Road has recently been the subject of public consultation in accordance with Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations.

As such, the Office is concerned the provision of a multi-storey car park in Killarney is not supported ....On this basis, the Office considers that Objective (of the multi-storey) should be omitted."

The Regulator's advice was issued to Kerry County Council on July 12th.

This was before the two votes on the Green Lawn. It was not referred to at either meeting by either management or councillors. Should it have been is the question.

True, the submission wasn't specifically on the Part 8 planning process for the Green Lawn. But it was current and most assuredly relevant.

Councillors if they hadn't seen it on the website were sent all 80 plus submissions on 7th of August - that's almost a full week before they voted by a narrow majority to allow the green lawn car park. Should the OPR advice have been flagged as important and disclosed and discussed? That is the question.

Has a public multi-storey been sacrificed for a car park on private land that is only going to be leased? Once that lease is over or broken, there will be a fine exit onto Mission Road for any property developer for whatever high rise development they choose. And the whole town will still be left with wall to wall surface parking - And a more clogged than ever Mission Road which even the Gardai are upset about. That's my take on it.

#### THE OUTLOOK ON THE PRESIDENT

Clearly every national publication was waiting for the Outlook last week! Because there's a run on Bertie for president now since last Friday and the debate has shifted.

Every newspaper and radio station every day since the weekend is transfixed by will he won't he, Bertie.

Seán Kelly is not for giving up. And as a Munster man, with his back to the wall, why would he? The man is not for turning now that he has turned, having woken up to the advantages of being president, if you get me. Seán may yet take the shine off Heather's pearls. FF have no one charismatic unless they go with likeable Bertie. Fianna Fail are encouraging Jim Gavin. But Jim is unlikely to get votes in Kerry or outside of Dublin if he decides to run. So we are back to the Fine Gael candidate as the most likely and will this be Heather or will it be Seán?

Michael Healy-Rae might yet have to remove his cap and bend the knee to Seán whom he effectively tried to scuttle by encouraging Heather to the fray. The fun has only started.

Of course, we could yet be landed with the very virtuous and sincere














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## SAM **MAGUIRE**

inister for Culture, Communications and Sport, Patrick O'Donovan, officially launched the Kerry Icons art exhibition by emerging visual artist Paul Egan on Tuesday morning at Government Buildings, New Road, Killarney. The launch, which took place at 10:30am on August 26, drew a strong public turnout, with attendees from across the county gathering to celebrate the unique collection of portraits paying tribute to Kerry's most influential figures. Hosted in partnership with Kerry County Council, the exhibition will remain open to the public until September 23.

Now 22, Paul Egan has rapidly gained attention for his signature graffiti realism style, creating near-photorealistic portraits using aerosol spray paint on recycled materials. In Kerry Icons, he presents 50 striking portraits of individuals who have shaped the cultural, sporting, and social landscape of the county. Each piece is painted on repurposed vinyl records sourced from local charity shops.

Among the subjects featured are literary giants John B. Keane and Peig Sayers, GAA legends David Clifford and Mary Jo Curran, and internationally acclaimed actors such as Jessie Buckley and Michael Fassbender.

Speaking at the launch, Egan said: "This collection celebrates those who have shaped Kerry's identity. It honours both well-known and forgotten heroes who've made a lasting impact locally and beyond."

The exhibition is open Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm, and admission is free.





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
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## Record Crowds and Runway Looks at a Sun-Soaked


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## Bingo Fundraiser in Memory of Baby Archie to Mark His 1st Birthday

#### **ARCHIES STORY**

Stacey Lockyear and Mark Kennedy, a grieving couple from Limerick, are turning their unimaginable loss into a mission of hope and gratitude. Following the tragic passing of their baby boy, Archie, just three days before Christmas, the couple has launched a fundraising initiative in his memory to support the Limerick Maternity Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and University Hospital Limerick's (UHL) Children's Resuscitation Unit.

Archie Kennedy was born prematurely on 1st September 2024 at just 28 weeks and 6 days, weighing a tiny 2lb 2oz. His early arrival was due to Stacey being diagnosed with preeclampsia just days earlier. From the moment he was born, Archie faced significant medical challenges. For 85 days, he remained in the care of the NICU at Limerick Maternity Hospital, bravely fighting chronic lung disease, anaemia, and sepsis.

Despite his fragile condition, Archie showed remarkable strength. He required continuous breathing support until shortly before his discharge. On 25th November 2024, after nearly three months in hospital, Archie was finally able to go home to meet his adoring big brother, Jack, who had only previously seen Archie once during a special visit allowed by NICU staff.

Sadly, Archie's time at home was short-lived. On 7th December, he became unwell and was admitted to the Rainbow Ward at UHL with flu symptoms. After six nights in hospital, he returned home on 13th December. However, just over a week later, on 21st December, Stacey noticed Archie's breathing had become laboured. Despite a swift response by paramedics and hospital staff, Archie's condition deteriorated rapidly.

He was intubated and prepared for transfer to Temple Street Hospital, but his condition worsened en route. The transfer was aborted, and Archie was brought back to UHL. In the early hours of 22nd December 2024, Archie tragically passed away in the arms of his heartbroken parents, Stacey and Mark.

In the midst of their grief, Stacey and Mark are determined to give back to the medical teams who supported Archie throughout his short life. They are now raising funds for the NICU



that cared for him from birth, and the Children's Resuscitation Unit at UHL, where he received critical emergency care.

"We will truly never be able to repay all the healthcare professionals who cared for Archie," the couple shared. "But we would love to show our gratitude by raising as much as possible to help other families who may find themselves in a similar situation to ours."

The couple has planned a series of fundraising events and are encouraging the public to get involved. Whether through donations or by attending the events, any support would mean the world to them.

In honouring Archie's memory, Stacey and Mark hope to bring light and support to others facing similar heartbreak and to give back to the institutions that gave them precious time with their son.




Two musicians with deep roots in Killarney will return home this October as part of a nationwide tour with the acclaimed modern Irish trad group, 3 on the Bund.

## SR. MARY

## R. MARY LUCEY

This week on Radio Kerry's Saturday Supplement, Frank Lewis explores the remarkable life and work of Sr. Mary Lucey, recipient of the Zambian President's Special Award, reflecting on her 31 years of dedicated service in Zambia.

Building three villages, bringing two 40 foot containers filled with second hand bicycles and sewing machines, feeding the hungry, building schools, were all part of the work of Sr Mary Lucey's years in Zambia. In May Zambian President Hakainde Hichilema presented Mary with the country's highest honour, the President's Insignia of Mercy. The story of Sr Mary's 31 years in Zambia will be told on Radio Kerry on Saturday August 30 from 9 to 11 am.

Sr Mary's work was inspired by experiences growing up in Rathcoole in Co Cork from 1944 to 1962 on her family's 40 acre farm where the programme was recorded and her life as a Presentation sister since 1962 teaching in Dingle for 23 years and in Millstreet for three. All of that prepared for working in Zambia from 1992 to 2023. She is now retired in the Presentation Convent in Castleisland.

On the Radio Kerry programme Frank Lewis is guided by Mary Lucey and also joined by the Irish Ambassador to Zambia for five years Seamus O'Grady, Fr Ger Godley who worked in Kenya for six years, Mary's brother-in-law Tadhg O'Flynn and her niece Deirdre Foley.

When Mary arrived in Zambia in 1992 there was famine. The challenges included making sorghum grain imported from Canada palatable. Hammermills were bought. As well seed was provided, fruit trees that were more drought tolerant were planted. In time a tractor was bought with €20,000 raised by family and friends.

The growing up memory that nothing was wasted encouraged a call out for old bicycles, sewing machines and all sorts of domestic and educational materials. Organised and funded by family and friends. Two forty foot ship's containers were crammed full helping to make family life easier and create new sources of income.

Shelter was the next challenge. Over 20 years three villages, each of 8 houses, were built. Materials for the first village were funded by ACC (the Agricultural Credit Corporation). The second village was financed by women Sr Mary bumped into in the US. The third was paid for by the parish of Harrogate in Yorkshire where Mary's brother Donal was Parish priest.

To qualify for a house families had to make


3,500 hand moulded fired bricks, help with the building, dig a well for each village and promise to send their children to school. When a shovel went missing all work stopped until it was returned. All houses now have solar powered electricity funded by friends and visitors. Inspired by the co-operatively owned milk collection service in Rathcoole the three villages are run by a co-operative owned by the tenants of all of the houses.

Sr Mary remembers how her parents believed the education of their children was the way to a better life. In Zambia she built two schools and a new wing on the secondary school. Mary continues to fund some students to third level and other educational initiatives in Zambia.

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

Here's to the next 50 years!













## WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. 

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## **CHILDREN'S EYES**

## How do I know if my child has an eye problem?

Some eye conditions do not display any signs or symptoms, so the only way to know for sure is to take your child for a sight test.

Signs which may show there is a problem with a child's sight include:

- an eye appearing to drift inwards or outwards;
- difficulty concentrating;
- headaches:
- sitting too close to the television; or
- rubbing their eyes a lot.

The condition 'lazy eye' can run in the family, so if someone in your family has either an eye turn ('squint') or suffers from reduced vision in one or both eyes('amblyopia'), it's a good idea to take any related children for a sight test.

## What is vision screening?

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## Round One confirms that grade deflation was offset by record number of CAO applicants

### COMFORT

When CAO Round One of college offers was released at 2pm on Wednesday, 27th August it soon became clear that grade deflation had brought little comfort to the 2025 Leaving Cert Class as it has been offset by the record number of CAO applicants. Although the post marking adjustment of raw Leaving Cert scores by an average of 6.8 % from 7.5% deflated the 2025 grades, the 19,795 applicants to CAO with inflated grades from the past five years had the edge. The record CAO application figure of 89,347, up 5,804 or 7% from last year's 83,543, also caused keen competition for the available places

### **RESULTS**

The excellent results achieved last week by Kerry's 1,701 traditional Leaving Cert candidates saw them collect their fair share of college offers. The vast majority of Kerry's CAO applicants have received a college offer. On a pro rata population basis, Kerry's CAO applicants will be close to the top of the class in securing college places. However, it remains to be seen what percentage achieved their courses of choice.

A 7% increase in CAO applications was bound to keep points competitive across many courses. A random selection for entry to about 25 hotly-contested courses left some applicants on the maximum 625 points without their top choice. At Level 8, points have increased for about 50% of courses. Points have decreased for about 40% while the rest are relatively unchanged. It's very evident that the 2005 Leaving Cert class was disadvantaged by the prevailing circumstances and that scenario will continue

while the infamous "post marking adjustment" of raw scores applies. Grades deflation must be the priority in the immediate future so that college places can be allocated on actual exam performance rather than any artificial adjustment of marks.

## **EFFICIENT**

The 2025 statistics prove that the applicants are very efficient in their engagement with the CAO. 59,201 CAO applicants received at least one of the 86,098 courses on offer on Wednesday afternoon. The offers consisted of 54,256 at Level 8 and 31,842 at Level7/6. Offers are issued independently in respect of the two lists (Level 8 and Level 7/6), so that some applicants received two offers, one from each list. The collective good news is that of the 54,256 applicants who were offered a Level 8 course, 27,897 (51%), received their first preference and a very impressive 43,150 (80%) received one of their top three preferences. Of the 31,842 applicants who were offered a Level 7/6 course, 28,554 (90%) received their first preference and a whopping 31,442 (99%) received one of their top three preferences.

### **MARKET**

The overriding conclusion from the points' trends is that CAO applicants are totally focussed on the jobs market. They applied in large numbers for courses with strong employment growth. UCC's flagship Biological and Chemical Sciences is offered at 532 points, while its Engineering degree is up to 543 points. Physiotherapy at the University of Limerick came in at 589 points while Occupational Therapy is offered at 543 points. Primary Teaching at Mary Immaculate College Limerick is 484 and MTU Tralee's excellent General Nursing Degree is

380 points. Health Science courses remain very popular putting them beyond the points' totals of most CAO applicants. Dentistry at UCC, for example, requires a staggering 613\* points and Pharmacy is offered at 602. All points' requirements are available on the CAO website, www.cao.ie.

### **HEALTHY**

School leavers continue to rush to college in unprecedented numbers. The steady flow also of mature and non-traditional applications is a very healthy development as everybody deserves a second chance. A quota of places was reserved by CAO for the 8,323 mature applicants and the 13,491 applicants from the Post Leaving Cert (PLC) sector. Congratulations to all applicants who received a CAO college offer

## Michael Cahill TD Welcomes Additional €476,500 in Road Funding for Kerry

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has welcomed the announcement of an additional €476,500 in funding for road improvements in the county under the 2025 Restoration Improvement Scheme (RIS).

The mid-year allocation by the Department of Transport will go towards the upgrade and repair of rural and private roads across Kerry, a move Deputy Cahill says is both timely and essential for local communities. "This funding will directly benefit rural families, farmers, and isolated households throughout Kerry," said Deputy Cahill. "While it comes late in the year, I want to commend Director of Services Frank Hartnett and his Roads and Transportation team, who have already confirmed to the Department that Kerry County Council is fully ready, willing, and able to carry out the necessary works without delay."

The funding forms part of a mid-year redistribution under the national RIS. Deputy Cahill said the funding highlights the importance of strong Fianna Fáil representation in government. "It's often said ,and rightly so, that having Fianna Fáil TDs in your constituency delivers results. With the



return of a second Fianna Fáil seat in Kerry, I'm proud to see our county having secured its biggest ever allocation under the national Local Improvement Scheme some weeks ago," he said.

Deputy Cahill also reaffirmed his ongoing commitment to lobbying for further investment in road infrastructure throughout Kerry. "This additional funding in RIS is a welcome boost, but it's far from the end of the road. I will continue to lobby the Minister and

Department for additional investment, not just in road repairs, but in the overall improvement of transport and infrastructure across Kerry. Our people deserve nothing less.

Kerry County Council will now move forward with selecting the roads to be improved from its approved three-year programme. All works are to be completed by the end of 2025, with formal claims submitted to the Department by November.

## Minister of State Healy-Rae announces next tranche of Sustainable Forest Harvesting Machinery Grant

Minister of State for Forestry, Farm Safety and Horticulture, at the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Michael Healy-Rae TD, has today announced the opening of the second tranche of the Innovative Forest Technology Scheme: Module 3 – Sustainable Forest Harvesting Machinery Grant.

Minister Healy-Rae said: "This grant will continue to assist with the procurement of modern, efficient, and increasingly specialised machinery and equipment for forest operations. The new equipment and machinery supported under this scheme will be a benefit not only in terms of productivity and sustainability,

but will also provide for better operator safety, ensuring that the forestry industry can continue to operate safely."

The scheme will provide support to forestry contractors and timber hauliers for the purchase of new forest machinery that will optimise the performance of forest operations. Minister of State Healy-Rae continued: "Innovative forest machinery solutions eligible for funding under this scheme include the clearance and extraction of trees from reconstitution sites, such as those impacted by ash dieback disease. This scheme should also assist in increasing the harvest capacity

of the sector, which can allow for the better mobilisation of windblown timber following storms Darragh and Éowyn."

The objective of this intervention is to encourage the availability of sustainable timber harvesting, extraction and transport equipment in the marketplace to protect water quality and deliver on environmental and operator safety objectives.

The closing date for applications is Thursday, 23 October 2025. Further information on how to apply is available on the Department's website.

## 5 NEWLY ATTESTED GARDAÍ ON ROUTE TO KERRY a boost to local policing

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill has welcomed the deployment of 5 newly attested Gardaí to Kerry, strengthening visible policing across the county.

Amongst the deployments there will be 2 new Gardaí for Killarney Garda Station, and 3 deployed to Tralee Garda Station.

Cahill said the arrival of additional Garda members underlines Fianna Fáil's commitment to increasing Garda presence on the ground.


He noted, "This latest allocation shows that investment in Garda recruitment is making a real difference on the ground. Local stations

## KERRY FC RECORD ANOTHER WIN

**Kerry FC 1-0 Longford Town** by David Moriarty

Kerry FC welcomed Longford Town to Mounthawk Park for the second time this season as they faced off for the final time in 2025. Last time out against Longford, they took the three points at Bishopsgate, whereas the same fixture in Tralee back in May finished in a 2-0 win for Kerry FC.

Kerry were going into the game on a high after last week's win in the Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup, whereas Longford were knocked out in an intense battle against Shamrock Rovers.

Both sides knew a win here would put them closer to further progression up the league table. It was a game with big potential, and the Mounthawk Park crowd were well up for it.

The opening exchanges were cagey, both teams mindful of giving away an early advantage. Kerry's first real look at goal came in the 19th minute when Joe Adams let fly from distance. The winger's ambitious strike had the crowd briefly on edge, but his effort dragged wide of the post. Still, it signalled intent from the home side, who were keen to test Longford's rear-guard.

Kerry continued to probe, with pressure in midfield and sharp transitions. The game's first booking came in the 24th minute when Carl Mujaguzi found his name in the referee's notebook for a mistimed challenge. The foul highlighted Longford's growing frustration at Kerry's control of possession. Kevin Williams looked lively down the right flank and nearly made the breakthrough just before the half-hour mark. His direct running caused problems, and his cross had promise before being smartly intercepted by Longford goalkeeper Harry Halwax.

Moments later, Oran Crowe almost carved out the opener for Kerry with a dazzling display of footwork. Beating his marker with a clever feint, Crowe tested Halwax with two long-range strikes in quick succession, both of which the Longford shot-stopper dealt with confidently. The pressure was building, and Kerry looked more likely to break the deadlock.

From the resulting corner in the 33rd minute, Niall Brookwell rose highest, only to see his header sail narrowly over the bar. It was a real let-off for Longford, who were struggling to contain Kerry's energy in attack.

As the half wound down, Kerry continued to pepper the Longford goal. In the 43rd minute, Brosnan tried to catch Halwax off guard with a speculative effort that forced the keeper into action. Then, right on the stroke of halftime, Brosnan again came close, racing clear on a quick counter-attack before dragging his shot wide of

Despite Kerry's dominance, the sides went in at the interval deadlocked at 0-0. The hosts had created better chances, but Longford's goalkeeper and a lack of precision in front of goal kept the game scoreless.

The second half began much as the first had ended, with Kerry showing greater purpose and invention in attack. Their persistence was rewarded in the 52nd minute with a goal that brought the Mounthawk Park crowd to its feet.

The move started with Robbie Cleary, who produced a breathtaking solo run, weaving past multiple Longford defenders and carrying the ball deep into enemy territory. As the defence scrambled to close him down, Cleary laid the ball off at the perfect moment. Waiting in space was Cian Brosnan, who showed great composure to guide the ball past Halwax with a tidy finish. The stadium erupted, and Kerry had the lead their performance deserved.

The goal injected confidence into the hosts, who looked briefly as though they might push on to extend their advantage. Brosnan remained central to Kerry's attacking play, buzzing around the Longford back line and constantly seeking to exploit gaps.

By the 60th minute, Brosnan's evening came to an end as manager Colin Healy turned to his bench. Ryan Perez replaced the goal-scorer, a move that ensured fresh legs in attack while giving Brosnan the ovation he merited.

The match grew more scrappy as Longford sought a way back. A yellow card for Francis Campbell in the 65th minute underlined the visitors' increasing desperation. Kerry, meanwhile, were happy to settle into a compact shape, relying on their defence to frustrate the opposition. As the game entered its final quarter, Kerry began to manage the contest with maturity. Healy looked to his bench again, bringing on Arran Healy for Joe Adams in the 82nd minute, shoring up the midfield and adding defensive stability.

Longford continued to chase the game, but clear chances were hard to come by. When Kevin Williams managed to slip into the six-yard box in the 84th minute, Halwax reacted quickly to smother the danger before the ball could fall kindly to a teammate. It was a reminder that Kerry could not afford to relax.

With 90 minutes approaching, the fourth official signalled four minutes of additional time, raising the tension among home supporters. Kerry made their final change, with Sam Aladesanusi coming on for the tireless Cleary, whose earlier run had paved the way for the decisive goal.

The closing stages were not without drama. Kevin Williams, already on a booking, received a second yellow card and his marching orders. Kerry were reduced to ten men in stoppage time, a situation that might have spelt disaster. But the defensive unit held firm, repelling Longford's late surges and refusing to allow a clear opportunity.

When the referee's whistle finally sounded, relief and jubilation swept through the ground. Kerry FC had held on for a priceless 1-0 victory, thanks to their defensive resilience and Brosnan's clinical

This was a match that showcased both sides of Kerry FC's game. In the first half, they demonstrated attacking invention, creating a series of promising opportunities but failing to apply the finishing touch. In the second, they combined a moment of individual brilliance from Cleary and Brosnan with disciplined defensive organisation to grind out the result.

The back line deserves immense credit. Time and again, they stood strong under Longford's pressure, closing down space and making crucial interventions. The midfield, too, played its part in breaking up play and ensuring Kerry retained

Brosnan's goal was the evening's highlight, but it was the collective effort that carried Kerry across the line. Every player contributed to the victory, whether through running, pressing, or sheer determination to keep the clean sheet intact.

The three points will be a significant boost to Kerry FC's campaign. With wins like this, they show they can not only play attractive football but also manage tight games under pressure. They now look ahead again to Friday night as they take on League leaders Dundalk FC in Oriel Park, Kerry FC Team: 16. Matthew Connor, 3. Sean O'Connell, 4. Oran Crowe, 5. Christopher McQueen, 6. ## **MUNSTER FOOTBALL SEEDING**

I didn't say anything about it last week, simply because I didn't, and don't, think that its all that big of a deal. From next year, the Munster Football Championship will have the two highest placed teams in the National League on opposite sides of the draw. Okay. Cad é an céist agat?

I was on the opposite side of this argument once. I can actually remember when Clare's Chairman finally won a very hard political fight to get the Munster Council to vote to break up the seeding of Kerry and Cork (nothing to do with League standing; the two counties were specifically named) in 1990.

I agreed with Noel Walsh (not that anybody was asking my opintion, then or now). Kerry and Cork are by far and away the top two football counties in Munster. It's not even close. Between them Kerry (86) and Cork (37) have 123 out of 137 titles. The other four counties have 14 all told - exactly as many as Kerry goalkeeper Danno Keeffe on his own. Waterford won their last title in 1898. Limerick won their last title in 1896. The last Munster Football Final to feature neither Cork nor Kerry? The first Munster Final on record all the way back in 1888, where Tipperary got a walkover from Limerick. Consider that the Kerry County Board was first formed on November 17th that year, that's how far back you are going.

It didn't feel fair to me that you had to beat both of the top two to win a title. Open draw meant that you could win a Munster title by beating just one of them (if Kerry beat Cork or vice versa). My opinion, then and now, is that it's better for the sport to incentivise the weaker counties. Again, spare me any of the so-called weaker counties' nonsense. They simply are weaker in football, just as we are oviously weaker in hurling. Acknowledging that is not any kind of denigration or attack.

I have no idea how Limerick were convinced to vote in favour of the move. Certainly the grassroots, the clubs and players and coaches on the ground in Limerick, like the other three counties involved, are unhappy with the decision. And I can't say that I am convinced by the argument that the Munster Council promised €25,000 for GDAs to each county. That's a lot of money for you or me, but not for the GAA, including the Munster Council.

I have made the same argument frequently in terms of targeting funding – the successful counties tend to get the most money from Central Council, and I understand the reasoning, but I don't agree with it. I'm referring as much to Kerry as Dublin, before anyone tries to revive that old chestnut. And I personally think that, while the successful counties are obviously going to have higher inter-county expenses, they also have much stronger

income platforms. Target the weaker counties, particularly in hiring GDAs.

Anyway, Noel Walsh finally succeeded in his campaign to do away with seeding in 1990. Two years later Clare beat Kerry by 2-10 to 0-12 to win the Munster Final. Deservedly so, by the way. They were the first county outside of the top two to lift the Munster Cup (it still doesn't have a name) since 1935.

I was opposed to seeding back then. And for a brief while after it was removed, it felt like football in Munster was fourishing. Remember Limerick with John Galvin and the Stephens Lucey, Kelly, and Lavin? Galvin not winning an All Star is still mystifying to me. Declan Browne of Tipperary remains one of the best forwards I have ever seen. Yes, you can talk about Colm Cooper, Peter Canavan, the Brogans, Conor McManus.....I'm telling you, Browne was as good as any of them. He had decent footballers beside him, the likes of Peter Lambert were making any team, but I watched Declan Browne play Kerry teams as a sole threat and he still had me worried. No word of a lie; he was that good. Had he arrived in a slightly later era and played with the 2012 All Ireland winning minors....Quinlivan was great in his own right; Colin Riordan was as good a young player as I have seen - he went to the Sydney Swans but returned to shock Cork in the 2020 'Covid' Munster Final and got an All Star nomination a vear later.

Clare, with a deadly poacher of their own in Martin Daly (ask about him in Cork, if you want) and the likes of Podge Collins. Waterford didn't flourish in the new system. Their minors did come within a point of Kerry in 2000. Mind you, Kerry had a weak enough team....lads named Colm Cooper, Declan O'Sullivan, Declan Quill, DJ Fleming, Donald O'Sullivan, Seamus

Scanlon, Conall Ó Cruadhlaíoch. I don't know did a one of them ever kick any ball after.....

It did look for a while as if The Kerry/Cork hegemony in Munster football was under real threat. And I would have had absolutely no problem with that. The plain truth is that during the Golden Years, everybody knew what Mick O'Dwyer was saying when he claimed that 32 and a half counties wanted Kerry to lose. We all wanted Dublin to lose during their six-in-arow; it wasn't just Kerry. The Kilkenny hurlers in their heyday. For most of my lifetime and a lot longer, the correct answer to "who do you want to win the League of Ireland?" was "Anybody but Shamrock Rovers". Not because the players on any of these teams were unlikeable - very far from it. But just because sport is about underdog dreams. In a strange way, the same team winning almost instinctively feels unsporting.

A competitive Munster championship would also be good for Kerry in the long run. U21/U20 championship? Kerry (32) and Cork (28) have 60 titles between them. The other four counties have four. In total, not each. Minor? Kerry are going for four in a row in Munster, not long after winning five out of six All Irelands. A lot of those minor players came from successful Corn uí Mhuiri teams (plus four Hogans on the trot). Is that dominance helping us? In fairness, we have won two All Irelands, lost two finals (one after a replay), and a semi-final in recent years, albeit losing the 2020 Munster semi-final after a late goal by Cork. Remember Tipperary winning Munster with their centenary commemorative jerseys? It was lovely, but it didn't have the slightest feel of a shift in the balance of football power. You, I, and all of Tipperary knew that they weren't going to be winning one once normal service resumed.

Except that you should maybe take a look at a lot of those Corn uí Mhuirí, minor, and U20 teams. They are running into Ulster teams,

espeially Tyrone. And that does feel like a shift. Ulster teams are facing high quality opposition from the get-go, and that may be a steep upward curve, but the teams that come out of it have a massive advantage.

And that's why I am in favour of seeding now. It has been tried without it, and the weaker counties are even weaker in competitive terms now. It seems to be a reflection of a greater social and especially economic trend where the world gets divided between 'haves' and 'have nots', with a corresponding political shift to a hard right in a lot of countries. The rich get richer, the poor....do not. The new rules have absolutely made the games entertaining again, but there is still only a small handful of genuine contenders. Probably less than hurling, which has a much smaller base to draw from in the first place.

Munster championship results against teams other than Cork in the last five years. 2025 Kerry 4-20 Clare 0-21. 2024 Kerry 0-23 Clare 1-13 2023 Kerry 0-25 Tipperary 0-5, Kerry 5-14 Clare 0-15. 2022 Kerry 1-28 Limerick 0-8. 2021 Kerry 3-22 Clare 1-11, Kerry 1-19 Tipperary 1-8.

Not all of those are Munster Finals, your showpiece in Munster, but too many of them are, and interest in attending is declining.

That's not doing Kerry any good at all in the long run. That's fine; Kerry are well resourced anyway. But exactly what good do you think it's doing for the weaker counties? Because until you can answer that question, don't be telling me that seeding is unfair.

## JACK O'CONNOR BACK IN CHARGE

Having brought Sam back to the Kingdom, it was always going to be Jack's own choice whether to stay or go, and the Dromid man has decided to stay on for another two years. Great news all round. Winning back to back All Irelands is extremely difficult and the burden of expectation on Kerry next year will be huge (look, we do have a very good team. But, respectfully, if Donegal had another go at us, they would ask different questions, Tyrone are on their way, Armagh haven't gone anywhere, and I'd wear a duffle coat in hell before I turned my back on Dublin). Having Jack, who obviously knows the current players and set-up like the back of his hand and has a phenomenal record, back at the helm is great news.

## CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS

## Senior Club Championship Group One

Templenoe had to beat Na Gaeil by ten points or more to advance. It was always going to be a big ask, but they made a lightning start to lead by 0-4 to 0-1 and should really have had two goals – Brian Crowley rattled a thunderbolt off the crossbar and Adrian Spillane's fisted fort was just wide. However, it was Na Gaeil's Diarmuid O'Connor who slalomed through for the only goal of the first half. With O'Connor and an outstanding Jack Barry taking control around the middle, Oisín Maunsell and Dara Devine got plenty of ammunition to lead Na Gaeil to a very convincing victory. ## **Group Two**

## KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

# ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

"This investment will help young people in Kerry realise their full potential and get the support they need, where and when they need it most," Deputy Cahill concluded.









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

## **HSE South West**

## expands winter programme to shield babies from RSV



HSE South West is building on last winter's very successful RSV immunisation programme which was delivered to new born babies in maternity settings and higher risk babies in the community. The programme significantly reduced infections, serious illness and hospitalisations of young infants during the 2024-2025 winter season.

#### Key statistics from the national programme include:

Almost 22,500 babies were immunised.

83% those offered immunisation accepted it for their babies

Among those immunised (compared to similar babies the previous year who were not immunised), there was a significant decrease in the impact of RSV including:

65% reduction in total number of cases presenting;

reduction 57% cases in presenting emergency departments;

reduction babies in requiring hospitalisation

reduction in babies needing intensive care due to complications of RSV

This winter season HSE South West will once again offer RSV immunisation in maternity settings across Cork and Kerry to all babies born in Ireland from 1st September 2025 to 28th February 2026.

This year the programme is extending to include all babies born in Ireland, during the six month period from 1st March 2025 to 31st August 2025. Parents and guardians of these babies can book an appointment from Monday 1st September on the RSV Immunisation page of the HSE website: https:// www2.hse.ie/conditions/rsv/ immunisation/ It is important to note that appointments will only be available during September. Parents and guardians are advised to book early, to ensure their child is protected ahead of any surge in RSV infections this autumn/ winter season.

Parents of babies born from 1st September 2025 to 28th February 2026 will be offered the immunisation before they leave the maternity hospital.

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## **ROSES**

Planting roses this time of the year will give you colour for years to come. Container grown roses can be planted any time of the year but the autumn and springtime are the best. Bare rooted roses can be planted from late autumn until around mid March. Bare rooted roses are plants that are dug up straight from the open ground when they are dormant and best planted or heeled into some earth as soon as possible.

Make sure when you are planting bare rooted roses to heel them in well with the heel of your foot to prevent their roots from being moved in the wind.

Roses are hungry plants so make sure when you're planting to add plenty of manure or a rose fertilizer.

"Therefore, beloved, since we have these promises, let us cleanse ourselves from everything that defiles body and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God" (2 Corinthians 7:1)

Welcome back dear student, last week we saw how we are joint heirs with Jesus. This happened because of the the New Covenant which God made with man, sealed in the sinless blood of His Son. This relationship with God comes through accepting that Jesus Christ is Lord; repenting of and turning from sin to follow Jesus, believing that He died to pay for our sins and that God raised Him from the dead, allowing us to be reconciled to God as His beloved children. It requires us to leave behind the old way of life — lying, stealing, cheating, gossiping, hating, hurting, pride, immorality - to name just a few (Galatians 2:20). In turning to God for Salvation through Christ we become 'new creations in Christ' - that is, washed and clean from sin, given a new identity as His children, filled with His Spirit, reconnected to God (2 Corinthians 5). This is the Good News (the Gospel). Not one of us could ever make ourselves righteous — it is a free gift from God. Understanding that our Salvation is not based on good works brings freedom from the religious, perfectionist spirit. The enemy uses those things to bog people down in condemnation and ritual works of service - trying to please God. The Lord calls our self-righteous acts 'filthy rags' (Isaiah 64:6). Yes, we are to do good and live right - out of love: not out of wanting brownie points from God or others. Prideful flesh loves attention on its sacrifices. Humility just gets on with it whether anyone notices or not, knowing that ultimately God sees and knows everything (Matthew 6:1-18).

There is only One way to right-standing with God and that is Righteousness from the sinless Blood shed by Jesus, the Lamb of God. But there are many ways to defilement. Shops are now stocked with lovely earthy coloured decorations for Autumn, but alongside these are decorations for Halloween. It's amazing how easy it has been to subtly plant in people's minds that these things that exalt evil and darkness are harmless décor to seasonally embellish a home. Folks figure that they're just the same as Christmas decorations - a nice thing to light up the dark winter. That's not true friend - please, don't fall for it. For these Halloween decorations are accursed things — they defile and separate one from God. "And you must not bring any detestable thing into your house, or you, like it, will be set apart for destruction. You are to utterly detest and abhor it, because it is set apart for destruction" (Deuteronomy 7:26). There are all kinds of evil and tragic things happening, and people blame God - asking why He would let bad things like this happen to them? But they're accusing the wrong Person. The enemy comes to steal, to kill and to destroy, he's a murderer, a thief and a robber, a liar and evil (John 10:10; John 8:44). He seeks attention for himself while using deception. Halloween has been embedded into culture now as just another holiday - even integrated into the school curriculum as a fun activity for this time of year, taking equal place with creation's change of season. These things open the door for Satan to enter and defile, bringing chaos, death, torment, and dysfunction. Objects that promote false gods or evil give the enemy a landing strip — like when an airplane locks on the airfield lights to land. Decorating homes with witchcraft items or things symbolising paganism are welcoming darkness, and bring curse, not blessing. Search this out for yourself friend and reject it.


