



the contractor will start works on Monday next October 4th. The essential works on this old bridge which is half demolished will finish on October 28th, 2022.






FIRST IRISH CAP



Autumn Gathering 2022

The highlight of the Killarney National Park Nature Calendar

Autumn watch...This year marks the Ainaugural 'Call of the Wild' Autumn gathering in Killarney National Park, on Saturday 15th Sunday 16th October 2022. Autumn is considered the highlight of the Killarney National Park nature calendar, the programme will be presented by the Conservation Rangers of National Parks and Wildlife Service, led by Danny O'Keeffe, **District Conservation Officer, NPWS.**

Killarney National Park was the first National Park in Ireland, it encompasses 10,000 Hectares of diverse ecology, ancient oak and yew woodlands - the most extensive covering of native forest of international importance, the famous Lakes of Killarney, the monastic 6th century Innisfallen Island, Muckross House and Killarney House and Gardens. The Renowned Native Irish Red Deer - the largest and only native species with a continuous presence in Ireland since the end of the last Ice Age (c.10,000 BC)

Autumn in Killarney National Park, in particular the month of October, is considered the most amazing time to observe the Irish Red Deer activity during the annual rutting season. The audible bellows and tribal behaviour is fascinating. The rich colours of Autumn, the clear crisp air of the mornings and shadows of evening light make the park so spectacular.

To celebrate this wonder and designated UNESCO Biosphere Reserve, a number of events will be taking place during the weekend.

Saturday will feature the Inaugural Paudie O'Leary Lecture, Paudie, was the Head Conservation Ranger at Killarney National Park, and sadly passed away unexpectedly in August 2012. His gentle presence has left a huge void among his peers and people of Killarney. His knowledge and love of the National Park was incredible. His legacy is insurmountable. This year to honour Paudie's memory, Divisional Manager Killarney National Park, Eamonn Meskell, will deliver the Inaugural Paudie O'Leary Lecture at Killarney House Auditorium on Saturday 15th October 2022 at 3.00pm.

Unfair "rural" electricity charges to be zapped?

The energy companies better watch out though - Kevin Moynihan ran a four year campaign to end charges where it was cheaper to phone Belfast than Tralee from Killarney. Households and businesses were being charged long distance rates for calls a couple of miles back the road.

Now Kevin has his sights on the rural electricity surcharge. This is the "historic" and "archaic" charge whereby people living in the country or in rural towns in older houses(not so old, by the way) where there are overhead connections, pay substantially more in standing charges than others.

This year alone the charge for rural dwellers by Electric Ireland has gone from Euro 200 to Euro 484. And the reason for the increase? Something to do with collection and billing and reading meters and maintenance of the system. Kevin says there is "no justification whatsoever" for the charge let alone the increase, as the reading meter days are being phased out anyway.

"The only maintenance is bringing the power past the doors of rural Ireland for the rest of the country," Kevin says.

Kerry and Duhallow have 25 percent of the wind generation in the country and only 4 per cent of the population. Yet they are paying the higher standing charges .

The ESB a semi-state body, is either directing or allowing the increases. It made 400 million in profit in the first six months of this year. Ireland is a republic and rural dwellers should be treated equally to those in cities and those in newer houses, he says. Watch this space: those rural surcharges will go, if Kevin puts energy into this campaign.

Slip Road : Movement on the Mission Road problems

This week's Killarney MD council meeting in Kilcummin heard how at long last we will have some kind of "movement", pardon the expression, on the Mission Road. Long ago, so long ago, it had "slipped" my mind, Brendan Cronin had suggested a slip road into the lower Beech Road car park.

There has been a lot of talk on social media and on the street about easing Killarney's traffic with huge engagement from the public eager to sort it out after Tralee TD Pa Daly raised it when he tried to get to a funeral in Killarney and was astonished at the gridlock. Generously, Cllr Niall O'Callagahn said the slip road was a great idea and while he had seen people on social media suggesting it was their idea, it was in fact one put forward long ago by Brendan Cronin.

The good news from engineer John Ahern is that the council are preparing designs for this access and drawing up a number of alternatives into the car park.

Once finalised, they will then have to present the drawings to the TII, the national transport authority, because Mission Road is a national Road.

There is a similar pattern with the long, longed for pedestrian crossing into Killarney House across Mission Road: it will all have to be approved nationally.

Here the TII have now identified their preferred layout. Other steps including feasibility report have been taken by the council and the ball is now in the TII court. Do we not have any senior politicians anymore who can hurry up the TII and other national roads authorities, I wondered.

There was a time, whether in the Dick Spring or the John O'Donoghue or the Jackie Healy-Rae era when you could be assured of influence on long-standing problems in roads. Alas, we don't have clout in Kerry anymore. We need to get Kerry's most senior politician Norma Foley - she has close relations in Killarney - to Mission Road for a day to show her the traffic problems and I am sure when Minister Norma is made aware, she will take up the baton.

Plenty of solutions but little progress on housing

Suggestions were put forward in Kilcummin to ease the truly "frightening" and "worrying" housing problem in Killarney now.

One of the most immediate solutions came from Cllr Marie Moloney who also raised stories of families being evicted. When, she asked, is it proposed to start the housing on the council owned Pretty Polly site?

The Kerry Education and Training Board has to to come back to the council with their plans for a third level college on part of the site first.

But Marie - who sits on that ETB board - pointed out this was a long and complex process.

"Why don't you develop part of the site for houses in the meantime. On the parcel of land we have agreed to put social housing on?" she asked.

Killarney is in a bad way not just for social housing but for affordable housing to allow people to buy in their own town, Mayor Niall Kelleher said.

In the meantime, with practically nothing being built that is affordable "Barraduff is the only show in town", councillors said.

They spoke of the anguish of families given eviction notices.

With private landlords quitting the social welfare housing rental systems, the risk of homelessness in the Killarney area is deemed to be great and mothers and young children are "distraught" after being told they may have to avail of homeless shelters.

Cllr Maura Healy-Rae got a breakdown on the approved transfer list in the Killarney Municipal District.

Some 485 of the 650 were renting from private landlords with the help of HAP (housing assistance payments) social housing supports.

Almost half are on the list because they are at risk of being homeless.

The housing officers themselves said this was "a worrying and challenging time" in social housing in Killarney. In a race that went right down to the wire they were managing to accommodate most. The local solution (once again) is the HSE owned St Finan's lands and buildings. State-owned, they are ripe for not just a courthouse, but a mix of social and affordable housing. And while they are at it, turn the listed building into apartments and a catering college. And put in a primary care centre. The answer to Killarney's seemingly intractable problems in housing, health and education is on our doorstep. So obvious, it is literally looking down on us!

I was intrigued by an article that appeared in a few of the local publications last week concerning data protection laws and how it appears to be effecting the right of elected representatives in having access to the names of applicants for social housing lists of Kerry County Council.

It appears these elected representatives, will never be told the names of such applicants according to an officer of the council, as to do so would be in conflict with General Data Protection Regulations, GDPR. The officer further states, according to the reports, that "there is no legal basis to provide this information," and "there have been legal challenges over providing information to elected representatives."

I don't believe there is any legal basis, in not providing the information and if there has been legal challenges to providing the information, what was the outcome ?.

If the officer is correct, then the effect on local democracy and democratic institutions in general will be profound.

As a democratically elected representative of forty years up to 2014, I can state without fear of contradiction that when a citizen applies for social housing that formal request for housing is made to the local authority, which in this county is to, Kerry county council, a legal entity recognised as such in legislation. This legal entity has two elements 1, The elected and 2, The executive. Though both have defined prescribed roles, each has a responsibility to have cognisance of each others duties and to work in unison with the other.

If the county council is a legal entity as I have outlined, how then can any other body GDPR or other seek to apply exclusions or prohibitions on one element of the same organisation.

In other words, Kerry county council just like all the other councils in the country is not the elected alone nor is it the executive alone. An applicant for a house isn't made to the chief executive of the council or to the senior housing office or to any of their staff, it is made to the County Council. Sure, the chief Executive is tasked with making the decision of who is allocated a house or group or scheme of houses but there is no prohibition or exclusion of the elected members submitting information, or receiving information in relation to an applicant or applicants for housing, as has been the practise with over eighty years. MTU & HSE PARTNER ON A NEW APPROACH FOR ENDURING MENTAL ILLNESS RECOVERY

Physical activity, nutrition and digital technology can improve health outcomes for those with enduring mental illness.

MTU is committed to regional development, including improving health outcomes for those in the community or residential care with severe or enduring mental illness (EMI). Local and global

experts are collaborating on new interventions that can be part of the standard treatment protocols. New training on human rights will ensure staff and service users can access a broader range of treatment options to complement existing pharmaceutical, psychiatric and psychological choices. People living with enduring mental illness often experience physical and social health consequences. MTUs Aclú initiative is developing and evaluating new treatment options to tackle this. Aclú meets UN calls for action on SDG 3 Good Health and Well-being, Target 3.4: Ensure a reduction of mortality from non-communicable diseases and promote mental health.

Mairéad Carolan, Senior Clinical Psychologist, HSE, says this is about ensuring people can create a good life, make a home, engage in meaningful work or learning and build good relationships with family, friends and people in their community.

At the launch, MTU President Professor Maggie Cusack thanked the organisations that have come together to deliver change. Aclú is a new multidisciplinary initiative involving partners from MTU, the HSE, the Mental Health Commission, Dartmouth University in the US, the

University of Manchester, Southeast Technological University, Bielefeld University Germany, Kerry Recreation Sports Partnership and Enable Ireland.

Dr Joe Firth of the University of Manchester, who coordinated the Lancet mental health commission work, said physical activity improves fitness and cognition while reducing symptoms. Dr Kelly Aschbrenner, Associate Professor of Psychiatry Dartmouth, US, said that studies have shown that programs that support physical activity and healthier diets can improve the health of people with EMI through weight loss and fitness, even among those taking antipsychotic medications. Weight gain was prevented in over 50% of participants in her Dartmouth study. Dr Evan Matthews of the South East Technological University spoke of the importance of co-design work to shape interventions for the local context.

Aclú lead researchers Dr Tara Coppinger and Catherine Carty, UNESCO Chair Manager, said the next two years would see programmes designed, delivered and evaluated in the southwest. Aclú will provide solutions aligned with global priorities to improve health outcomes and empower recovery in enduring mental illness in the southwest and beyond.


Jim was presented with his Award at a meeting of Directors of Listry Community Council held on 21st September 2022.

YOU STILL HAVE TIME TO APPLY FOR POST LEAVING CERT (PLC) COURSES THAT REMAIN UNFILLED



ATTRACTIVE

Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses, which are provided by Education and Training Boards (ETB), are an attractive alternative to higher education and provide a link between 2nd level and 3rd level. The CAO route doesn't suit everybody directly after Leaving Cert. Some may not feel ready for 3rd level. Others may not have secured a CAO offer or may be unhappy with the offer received. Over 200 Colleges of Further Education throughout the country offer PLC courses leading to awards at Levels 5 & 6 in Further Education and Training (FET) from Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI).

IDEAL

A PLC course is ideal for a person who has completed the Leaving Cert and requires further vocational education and training to enhance her/his employment prospects. A PLC course provides students with the opportunity to try out a course before committing to 3rd level studies. It's also tailor made for a student with the Leaving Cert Applied (LCA) and for mature students, who are returning to education.

FULLTIME

PLC courses are full time, mainly one year, offering a blend of academic work, practical work and work experience. Many PLC courses lead directly to employment. Increasingly, PLC courses are used to access 3rd level education, with more than 700 courses in the CAO system now accepting a PLC qualification for entry. This year, 10,197 applications to the CAO offered a PLC qualification. This is a very healthy development as it provides an alternative route into 3rd level.

ALTERNATIVE

PLC courses provide an alternative route into CAO courses other than Leaving Cert exam results. A PLC course normally involves completing eight modules in the academic year. Students' entry to CAO colleges is then based on a scoring system for PLC awards achieved at Level 5 and/or Level 6 on the National Framework of Qualifications. Full details about the scoring system are available on the QQI website, www.ggi.ie.

The centralised application system has made the application process for PLC courses much easier. Entry requirements normally consist of Leaving Cert standard and satisfactory performance at interview. Mature applicants are assessed on their life's experiences. Even though the centralised application system for 2022/2023 academic year closed on the 1st July, individual PLC colleges may still be accepting applications for courses that have vacancies. Keep in touch through the FET course hub or the website, www.fetchcourses. ie or contact your local PLC provider, Kerry College of Further Education and Training, www.kerrycollege.ie, for information about PLC vacancies in your locality. Applications for the 2023/2024 academic year for new CAO/FET courses will open on the 5th November 2022.

CAO 2023

The 2023 CAO online application facility opens on 4th November at 12 noon. A discounted application fee of \in 30 will be available up to 5pm on the 20th January 2023. After that date, the application fee will increase to \in 45 up to 5pm on the normal closing of 1st February 2023.





KEY POINTS

Budget 2023 was announced on Tuesday, 27 September 2022 by the Minister for Finance, Paschal Donohoe and the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform Michael McGrath.

The Budget is generally announced in October but with the current cost of living crisis, it has taken place 2 weeks earlier than usual in 2022.

In this week's Killarney Outlook we take a look at the mai changes in taxation, cost of living supports, supports for energy costs, social welfare, health, housing, education, employment and other areas.

Some of the changes announced in the Budget come into effect immediately. Others take effect from the beginning of January 2023 or later in 2023. Many others have to be finalised before coming into effect. Some elements of these measures may change when the legislation required to bring them into effect is enacted.

TAX CHANGES

Entry point for paying higher 40% income tax rate is increased (by €3,200) to €40,000 a year while main tax credits rise by €75.

Home Carer Tax Credit increases by €100, to support stay at home parents.

Second USC rate band (2% rate) will rise from €21,295 to €22,920.

SOCIAL WELFARE

Weekly social welfare rates will be increased by €12 for working age recipients

There will also be a €12 increase in weekly payments for pensioners

The Working Family Payment threshold will increase by €40

There will be a €2 increase in the weekly rate for a qualified child qualified child

There will be an increase in eligibility for Fuel Allowance

A €500 lump sum for families availing of the Working Family Payment , a €500 lump sum for carers , a €500 lump sum for people in receipt of Disability payments and a €20 increase in the domiciliary care allowance for sick children

HEALTH

All inpatient hospital charges will be abolished GP visit cards will be provided to those on or below the median income (340,000 additional people)

There will be a €2 increase in the weekly rate for a **Qualified Child**

The Drug Payment Scheme threshold will remain at the lower rate of €80 in 2023

Funding will be provided to provide access to IVF treatments

Free contraception will be available for all women aged between 16 and 30

CHILDCARE AND EDUCATION

There will be a Free School Book Scheme for primary school pupils from autumn 2023 Over 660 additional mainstream teachers, over

1,190 SNAs and 680 special education teachers will be provided

The National Childcare Scheme hourly subsidy is to increase from 50c to €1.40 There will be a €500 increase in post-graduate contribution grant for eligible families Over 4,800 additional places on craft and consortia-led apprenticeships and 4,000 places on craft apprenticeship programmes will be supported

PRIVATE AND PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Excise cuts for petrol, diesel and marked gas oil extended until 28 February, 2023.

20% public transport fare reduction and the Youth Travel Card discount of 50% to end of 2023.

BUSINESS SUPPORTS

Temporary Business Energy Support Scheme once eligibility criteria are met - will cover 40% of an organisation's energy bill increases subject to a monthly cap of €10,000.

TOBACCO

Excise duty on a pack of 20 cigarettes rises by 50c, with a pro-rata increase on other tobacco products.

ENERGY ASSISTANCE

Fuel allowance payment recipients to receive an extra lump sum of €400 before Christmas.

CARBON TAX

Carbon tax will increase by €7.50 per tonne of carbon dioxide emitted, from €41.00 to €48.50. This applies from 12 October 2022 for auto fuels but will be offset by a levy reduction so that it will not result in a price increase. For all other fuels, the carbon tax will increase from 1 May 2023. See 'Environment and climate' below, for examples of the price increases to common household fuels.

VAT (VALUE ADDED TAX)

The VAT rate for newspapers (including digital editions) will be reduced from 9% to zero.

VAT will also be reduced to zero for:

Period products

Hormone replacement therapy (HRT) and nicotine replacement therapy medicines that are not currently zero-rated (such as patches and gels) These VAT changes will apply from 1 January 2023. The reduced VAT rate of 9% for the hospitality and tourism sector will continue until 28 February 2023.



WHY FI FXIBII ITY IS IMPORTANT FOR OLDER ADULTS

WHAT IS MEIBOMIAN GLAND **DYSFUNCTION (MGD)?**

The normal tears of the eye are : made up of three layers – an oily (lipid) layer, a watery (aqueous) layer, and a sticky (mucous) layer. MGD is when the glands that make the oily layer of the tears are not working properly and this allows the watery layer of the tears to dry out.

The Meibomian glands are inside the eyelids, and the openings are on the edge of the eyelids. The outer oily layer stops the watery layer of the tears from drying out. When the glands become blocked, the oily part of the tears cannot be released. This causes the watery tears to dry up more quickly which results in the eye becoming dry and can make it feel sore. It is not usually a serious condition, but can cause discomfort and sometimes blurry vision. If it is not treated, the glands may stop working permanently.

MGD can cause dry eye. It is common to have a combination of MGD, dry eye and blepharitis. **Risk factors**

MGD is a common condition and can affect anyone. However, it is more likely to happen after the age of 50, if you have diabetes or oily skin conditions and it is also more common in women.

Symptoms

The eyelids can become sore and

swollen as the glands become blocked. As the eyes become dry, they can feel itchy or gritty, as if there's something in the eye. The eyes may be red, and if they're sore, may be watery, which can cause vision to become blurry. TREATMENT

Treatment involves releasing the oily tears from the glands using hot compresses. You need to get a face cloth, or cotton pads, soak them in hot (not boiling) water, close your eyes, and hold the hot cloth onto your eyelids. Wet the cloth again with hot water and keep applying the compress for at least five minutes. Repeat every day until the condition gets better. You can also use products known as 'heat bags' that are specifically designed for this condition. These bags make it easier to direct the heat and are much more effective than a hot cloth. To help stop the glands from blocking up again continue the treatment every day for a few minutes. Massaging your eyelids can also help to release tears.

If the hot compresses or heat bags don't work, referral for further treatment may be required.



HSE RECRUITMENT PROCESS IMPACTING ON ESSENTIAL SERVICES FOR KERRY CHILDREN

Deputy Michael Healy Rae has charged the HSE with a failure to do better when it comes to Kerry children who are availing of essential psychology services after it was revealed to him that at least 467 Kerry children are still waiting psychology services. While no records are available from the Disability Services as they do not gather data to be able to reveal an actual number awaiting their services when it comes to children.

The information became available by way of a reply from Hugh Scully (Acting General Manager) of Mental Health Services Cork Kerry Community Healthcare following a parliamentary question by the Kerry TD

"I find it frustrating that we are six months on from the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) services fiasco which visited so much pain and hardship on parents and children and here we are still talking about an improved need to do better rather than just doing better"

Deputy Michael Healy Rae also admitted that he was "terribly disappointed in the HSE attempts to recruit the proper people for (CAMHS) services with a number of prominent posts as yet unfilled.

"While North Kerry CAMHS has doubled their staffing Whole Time Equivalent (WTE) from one position to two, some clients are still waiting four weeks for an assessment. Meanwhile in South Kerry CAMHS following the resignation of the senior psychologist on the South Kerry team the HSE have admitted



that they have failed to attract even a single applicant for the post." Deputy Michael Healy Rae said.

The HSE admitted that there are 448 children on the Kerry Primary Care Child, Adolescent & Family Psychology Service with a further 19 CAMHS clients awaiting an appointment due to staff shortages and extensive demands on the service.

Deputy Michael Healy Rae has urged the Minister for Health to do a lot better for the children of Kerry and to ensure that vacant posts are filled as quickly as possible

GAA Senior County Championship Group One

Kenmare Shamrocks 0-17 Dr. Crokes 1-14 Realistically I think Dr. Crokes will maybe feel that they dropped the ball a little bit on this one. They were five points up and looked home and hosed, but somehow Kenmare managed to take control and snatch a draw with a late burst that concluded with a great equaliser from Stephen O'Brien. Seán O'Shea was their main man, kicking three early points - his marker Fionn Fitzgerald had to depart very early with injury - for a side already missing Gavin White and Micheál Burns and Neil O'Shea sitting this one out, that's a real body blow. Fionn has been quietly and efficiently superb for Crokes; his consistency at a high level is incredible. It was 0-7 apiece at half-time, with Seán O'Shea and Tony Brosnan the main scorers on each side. Both sides traded scores before Cian McMahon gathered a great pass from Mark Fitzgerald and struck for a goal. Brian Looney, Mikey Potts (his second point from cornerback, Tony Brosnan and David Shaw all popped over points, while O'Shea kicked two for Kenmare. That was a five point lead - it says a lot for Kenmare's resilience that they whittled it down, but it raises a question about Crokes (although, to be fair, they did bring on a full complement of subs) that they allowed it to happen. Both sides advance, and both will be reasonably content with their form but worried about injuries going forward.

Shannon Rangers 4-10 St. Kierans 1-14

Let's not dance around it. This was, quite literally, a challenge game between Tarbert and Knocknagoshel. I'm not joking; that's exactly the two teams that lined out. Frankly, I have no great problem with it. Both divisional teams were already out of the competition. They had to field teams or face a €1000 fine and expulsion from next year's competition. Knocknagoshel and Tarbert are in the latter stages of the club championships, so a bit of game time for their players will suit them just fine.

You can say that it's a fierce indictment of the group stage of the County Championship and yes, it is. The group stage of the senior club championship was absolutely gripping, but basically none of the third games in any group last weekend in the County Championship made the slightest difference to anything. I'd leave the format alone for at least another year, though. I think there has been a tendency to make too many changes too fast in the GAA (even though I fully approve of many of the recent changes, such as the split season). In olden times, when people bathed slightly less frequently than nowadays (not remotely as infrequently as once or twice a year; that's a silly myth) and used the one bath of water because of the difficulty of heating it, the water was very dirty by the time the littlest one was bathed. There was a literal danger of "throwing the baby out with the bathwater". Let's not rush too fast to chop and change formats until we give this one a real go.

GROUP TWO Dingle 1-11 East Kerry 2-13

All eyes were fixed on one particular team before the Championship even started – sure, if Stephen Kenny was managing East Kerry, wouldn't they win the World Cup? They could relax with twenty minutes to spare against a depleted Kerins O'Rahillys in their first game. Spa, having been well beaten by Dingle in their opening game, cast doubts on all the prophetic assumptions by giving East Kerry a very tough battle – maybe they didn't quite shake the foundations, but they certainly rattled the spire a bit! This one was going to be intriguing, even if qualification wasn't at stake.

Then David Clifford started his first game in this year's championship and slotted 1-1 straight away. What can you do? Dingle played defensive – Mikey has been one of the players of the championship so far – and held East Kerry to 1-4 to 0-4 at the break. In fairness, East Kerry never really pulled away and Paul Geaney's 48th minute goal trimmed it down to a point. Ruairi Murphy gathered from Darragh Roche to crack home a beauty and Dingle couldn't close the gap after that. Interesting to see Shane Ryan back in goal, big Pádraig Lucey playing as a target-man (a very under-rated player, in my opinion) and Donal Down O'Sullivan getting some game time under his belt. For Dingle, injuries late on to Barry Dan O'Sullivan and Paul Geaney will be a big concern going forward, with Conor Geaney already a noticeable absentee.

In olden times, successful Roman generals were paraded through Rome in laurel wreaths, but had a slave over their shoulder whispering the whole time "Remember, thou art mortal!". I suspect that East Kerry players know how they felt...

Spa 4-13 Kerins O'Rahillys 0-16

Nothing but pride to play for, but plenty of that on both sides. Rahillys were missing David Moran, Cormac Coffey, Jack Savage, and Tommy Walsh – it's like playing poker with no aces in the deck. Too big an ask for any team. Spa had been badly understrength against Dingle and that defeat will have stung them, but that great display against East Kerry was a real confidence boost and they had matchwinners in Shane Cronin, Liam Kearney, and Ciarán Spillane, all of whom were outstanding. Conor Hayes, Tom Hoare, and Barry John Keane stood out. Neither side will be thrilled with their County Championship, departing at this stage, but both sides proved that they deserve to be at this level.

GROUP THREE Mid Kerry 1-15 Austin Stacks 1-7

The best game of the championship so far. The margin would have been bigger but for a stupendous display by Austin Stacks' Wayne Guthrie with some superb saves, but Stacks gave nothing easy here in a very fast, very skillful game of football. In the absence of both Joe O'Connor and Brendan O'Sullivan (again, Stacks are beginning to feel the toll of a fairly intense plaving schedule – it was always going to be an issue for clubs). Mid Kerry pulled away a bit after a tight first guarter to lead by 0-7 to 0-3 but Guthrie had been superb (three great saves) and they had left a good few chances go astray. A Michael O'Donnell goal was part of a Stacks' third guarter surge that pulled them level, but Mid Kerry re-asserted control and scored 1-5 without reply, Fiachra Clifford's late goal icing the cake. Mid Kerry top the group and look like contenders, but Mike Breen's departure at half-time through injury is a worry. Stacks are still in the hunt to retain their trophy and with good reason. Their own injury list, though....

West Kerry 3-9 Na Gaeil 4-15

Na Gaeil's first ever Senior County Championship campaign finished with their first win, and an entertaining one it was. West Kerry had goals from Thomas O'Donnell (two) and Marc Ó Mainnín on their way to scoring 3-9, a tally that would win a majority of football matches. They led by 1-1 early on but Na Gaeil reeled that in to lead by 0-6 to 1-2, with Diarmuid O'Connor outstanding. Éanna Ó Chonchúir's goal effort struck the post and Roibeard Ó Sé was just inches away from the rebound. Instead the ball travelled up the field and Jack Sheehan struck a trademark goal at the other end – a real turning point. Sheehan added another and Na Gaeil led by 2-7 to 1-3. Two goals by Thomas O'Donnell turned the tie completely on its head, 3-3 to 2-7. However, Na Gaeil closed out the first half with a brace and added another to start the second half. Diarmuid O'Connor kicked 0-8 (6f) and Jack Sheehan had 2-2. An entertaining game, but of course fairly meaningless in the overall circumstances.

GROUP FOUR Templence 0-10 Feale Rangers 1-14

Templenoe have been the dreamers who made dreams come through in recent years, but this County Championship has been lit up by a Feale Rangers's side who have gloriously defied all expectations (including, I freely admit, my own). Templenoe were missing big guns like Brian Crowley, Patrick Clifford, Seán Sheehan, and Stephen O'Sullivan, and Adrian Spillane's departure late on with injury – his second in recent weeks – is unnerving. A goal late in the first half by Barry O'Mahony was the difference between the sides at half-time, 1-6 to 0-6, but

livewire Killian Spillane had already forced two great saves out of Rangers' keeper Cathal Keane. He looked dangerous any time that Templenoe managed to get the ball into him, but Feale Rangers simply out-worked them in the second half and eventually ran out convincing winners. Feale Rangers top the group – granted, they will be swimming in much deeper waters in the knock-out stages, but I think it's fair to say that they are in bonus territory in terms of expectations. Templenoe will need to have most of their top guns available going forward, and there must be half an eye on their forthcoming Senior Club Championship Final – a historic day in itself for the club.

South Kerry 0-16 St. Brendans 0-16

It was the only game with something real at stake in terms of qualification, and in the end it came down to a moment of high drama as St. Brendans free-taker Nathan O'Driscoll stood over one last long distance free. Hollywood made a lot of good westerns out of movies like this! We all remember Seán O'Shea's moment of magic at the end of that gripping contest against Dublin in the semi-final, this was similar but with a much smaller audience. And it was similar quality, too, as O'Driscoll sent the ball over the black spot and, probably unknown to himself, put Templenoe through at the expense of South Kerry. The Iveragh lads could rue their luck, especially man of the match Daniel Daly, but their fate had lain in their own hands. Joe Lenihan was a first half colossus for St. Brendans and Alan O'Donoghue is still one of the sharpest club forwards in the county, but they only had seventeen players in total, with selector Adrian Greaney having to come off the bench in the second half. They deserved their share of the spoils here, but no more than that.

GAA ADMINISTRATION

Just a heads up on a few things. A Cork motion regarding restoring minor to U18 has finally forced an active response from the GAA's Age Grades Task Force (is it just me, or does that sound like a set of childrens' toys to anyone else?). The grassroots response to the original change to U17 was strongly opposed, and the grassroots have been proven right. Reports are that people are equally sceptical about the idea of a U19 grade has apparently met with a similar response – hence the deferment of the matter to next year's Central Council. The Age Grades Task Force have offered three options. 1 Counties can retain U17, with the option of one other grade (U19, U20, orU21) before senior. 2 Counties can revert to U18 for minor if they wish. 3 Counties can support a mandated national return to U18 for minor, with U18s not allowed to play senior for their clubs.

The very obvious solution, to me at least, would be to restore U18 and U21 as they were, while ensuring that the inter-county minor (U18) and U21 competitions are finished in the first half of the season before the club championship, and U18s then being available to their clubs, is not on the table. The issue before was senior competitions being held up for minor players, but that shouldn't be an issue with the split season. It shouldn't have been an issue anyway if County Boards had been tougher about insisting on players being released. I really think that this is all getting very messy, and needlessly so.

It's hard to get a bit of certainty in the calendar. The new round robin format in the All Ireland Championship will generate more games and more revenue. Our own County Championship shows the danger of dead rubbers, but it's a move I'm happy enough with in principle. Let's try it and see. However, circumstances in our County Championship give another clear warning, with clubs getting injury-depleted with the long run of games. A recent proposal to ensure that counties would have a break between the last round of the league and a preliminary round of the championship included doing away with National League Finals. The reaction was an immediate and vocal negative. Counties like playing finals in Croke Park and sponsors like those highlights. Personally, I'd be okay with League Finals; it defeats the purpose of a 'league' to have knockout end-games. Right now, it's been taken off the table, with the All Ireland Finals moving back a week in 2023 instead. Watch this space! The Parish Rule is back up for discussion. It always reminds me of Winston Churchill's famous quote "Democracy is the worst form of governance except for every other method that we have tried". The Kerry GAA's Sub Committee on the Parish Rule will be meeting with club chairs, secretaries, delegates, and Coiste nan Óg chairs and secretaries in an attempt to find equitable solutions to that old and hard chestnut, I wish them luck and wisdom.

Former President of Ireland Mary McAleese has agreed to chair the integration process between the GAA, the LGFA, and the Camogie Association.

Lastly, and it shouldn't need saying but very obviously does, the GAA needs to urgently address the lack of respect for match officials, mentors, and players. There have been very serious reports of two incidents in Kerry, one in Wexford, one in Roscommon, and one in Mayo, all in just the past number of weeks. It's not a new thing in any sport, but this is a whole slew of unsavoury incidents, and a clampdown is needed. And no, the standard of refereeing is no part of that particular discussion. When people say that they "totally condemn it, but....", that's

a very insidious and very unwelcome 'but'.

AFL

Tadhg Kennelly in 2005 became the first Irishman to win an AFL Grand Final. He was also the only Irisman to do so until last week, when both Zach Tuohy of Laois and Mark O'Connor of Laois were key players for the Geelong Cats as they beat the Sydney Swans (Tadhg's old team) by a whopping 132 to 52. It was one of the most one-sided finals on record, as the Cats kicked six goals in the opening quarter to lead by 41 to 6 and had another unanswered six on the trot in the third. It was Tuohy's 250th game - only Brownlow medal winner Jim Stynes played more as an Irishman - and Tuohy was deservedly chaired off the field by his jubilant team-mates. Mark hadn't originally been expected to start the game, having been a 'medical replacement' (sub) in the semi-final, but Mark was drafted into the starting team as a 'tagger' (man-marker) to replace the injured Max Holmes and played a full role in the victory. Rumours abound that O'Connor might line out for Dingle in the knock-out stages of the County Championship, depending on permission from the Cats. Either way, he has already done his native Kerry proud. Dingle could be in line to have another former double All Ireland minor winner back in the ranks, with Deividas Uosis being released by the Brisbane Lions after three years.

MOTOR-RACING

Congratulations to Killarney's Noel O'Sullivan, who won the British Rally Championship with a round to spare as co-driver to Welshman Oisin Pryce by winning the TRackrod Rally in Yorkshire. The pair opened a big lead on Friday and went on to win four of the six stages outright, to win the prestigious BRC Trophy and the championship. Kerry/Cork duo of Keith Cronin and Mikie Galvin were strongly in contention for the championship coming into this rally but lost a lot of time on the opening stage after it started to rain (they had selected drv tyres - these are the very fine margins in racing!). They did have the fastest time in the finishing stage, but Pryce (three times runnerup in the championship previously) and Noel O'Sullivan were flawless and were warmly

congratulated on a great achievement by their rivals/friends.

ROWING

Rowing pre-dates the likes of football in Killorglin - it may well be as old as the goat festival itself, at least in the official record (Puck was chartered in 1613 but is older, possibly all the way back to Lughnasa in Celtic Ireland). Monika Dukarska must be the most famous scion of the Laune river, where her family moved from Poznan in Poland at the age of sixteen. She became one of Ireland's best international rowers and twice World Champion as well as competing in Olympics and World Cups. Two of those who cheered her on from a young age and set out to emulate her were Zoey Hyde. Monika helped to coach Zoey to phenomenal underage success and the pair medalled together as seniors for Killorglin Rowing Club.

Last weekend Zoey joined the international elite in her own right, winning a bronze medal in the double sculls at the World Championships in Racice. It was a cracking race; it took absolutely everything the Irish girls had to get to the finish line just ahead of Austria. Romania took gold, with the Netherlands claiming silver.

Interestingly, Dukarska and Puspure teamed up together in the double sculls themselves for a while and the pair won bronze together in the 2018 Memorial Paulo d'Aloja in Italy.

A special mention to Paul O'Donovan, who won his fifth World Championship in a row with Fintan McCarthy beside him (it was the pair's first time racing together this season) in the Men's Lightweight Double Sculls. All in all, Ireland won two gold and two bronze medals and finished seventh in the medal table. Add in Niamh Coffey's gold in the B Final at the European U23 Rowing Championships, and it certainly hasn't been a bad month

BOXING

Congratulations to Kingdom Warrior Kevin Cronin, who took his professional record to 5-0 with a win over Ryan Hibbert on points, 60-54, at the AJ Bell Stadium in Manchester. The winning margin certainly didn't flatter Kevin, whose last five fights all fell through but kept his training discipline and focus in a sterling performance.

Hibbert was almost totally defensive from the start. I suspect he was hoping that the Kerryman would get over-excited, start swinging wildly, and leave himself open to counter-punches -Kevin is far too experienced to fall for that and just neatly picked away with his left jab. Hibbert did try to clinch early enough in the second round, but Kevin dealt with it easily with a good uppercut – I don't think clinching would have availed the Lancashire man much anyway, Kevin was too physically strong for Hibbert to control in a clinch. Kevin took the second round easily and it was already obvious that Hibbert needed to land a big one at some point to win this one. I'm not knocking him (he'd easily make minced meat out of me!) but he just didn't have the offense. Kevin stepped up a gear again in the third, starting to land a few bigger ones. By the fourth, Kevin was still dancing on his feet,

while Hibbert was starting to labour. In the end, it was about whether Hibbert would get to the end of the sixth and he showed both guts and guile in doing so, but Kevin was operating at an entirely different level in terms of boxing.

GOLF

Tom Wins Johnny Reay Classic

Tom Doherty has always been a champion of disability rights. Last weekend he became a literal champion when he won the first ever International Golf Tournament under the Remit of the European Disabled and Inclusive Golf Association. Tom, a keen golfer despite his own spinal injuries, beat an international field of golfers from all over Europe in the Stableford category at the Stoneleigh Deer Park Golf Club in Warwickshire in the inaugural EDGA Johnny Reay Classic (the recently deceased Johnny owned Stoneleigh Golf Course and was a golf retail pioneer as well as a noted philanthropist). Very well done, not just of course to Tom, but to all the participants and organisers of what will hopefully become a regular feature of the great game worldwide.

Maguire Falls Just Short at Irish Open

Leona Maguire was the biggest name at the Ladies Irish Open at Dromoland Castle –she'd be one of the biggest names in any tournament, given her phenomenal form over the past two years. She actually made a very poor start to the tournament, but soon adjusted and got herself back into contention. She opened her final round with two bogeys, but again showed brilliant composure to end up shooting a closing round of 68. She missed out on the play-off by just a single shot. Klara Spiklova from the Czech Republic just about made that play-off, brilliantly saving par on

the 17th by actually wading into the water to chip from the edge to within four feet – a truly stunning shot. In the end she birdied the playoff hole to win the title.

US Win Presidents' Cup

The Presidents' Cup is similar to the Ryder Cup, except that it's America versus the Rest of the World. And it doesn't exactly have the prestige or competitiveness of the Ryder Cup. Even without the LIV contingent – and the debate rages on as to whether their invitational bigmoney tournaments should count towards PGA rankings (I'd be a hard "no", but nobody's asking my opinion and I suspect that a deal will be struck before too much longer) the US still had nine of the world's top fifteen players, while the Internationals had eight debutants at this level. The US, unsurprisingly, won by 17.5 to 12.5, and the issue was never once in doubt.

SOCCER Nations League Scotland 2 Ireland 1

The usual drill in recent times has been to bemoan our luck in games like this. We've 'blooded phenomenal young talent' (that somehow aren't performing in the second tier of English soccer for the most part), we're 'playing the right way' (because previous Irish teams were attempting something else) and 'deserved something from that game' (scoreboards are sentient and hate the Irish). The thing is that for once, it's actually true. We did actually play better than Scotland. We did actually pass intelligently and look to carve out chances - it wasn't Plan A; lamp it onto Shane Duffy's head. It was highly entertaining, fearless, confident. John Egan finished his chance very well and we left a couple more after us - yes, our finishing is poor, but that's not news. Parrott is doing more behind the front lines at club level than actually scoring, and I like his movement and work-rate but I'm sceptical about his finishing. Molomby was good but Nathan Collins was very much my man of the match. We fully deserved to be 1-0 up and it actually could and probably should have been more, and that's while discounting Parrott's obviously offside goal. Their equaliser was a poor one to cough up. The penalty was ... I don't know, a hard one to explain. It was a penalty; we'd be rightly screaming for it ourselves if it was the other end, but you can't really blame the defender – shades of Seamus Darby and the famous nudge in the back in 1982 about that one. Look, we lost largely because we just didn't finish them off on the

ropes, but we were the better team all night for me.

Ireland Armenia

Relegation to the third tier was looming as a possibility. Not a huge possibility - we'd deserve it if we didn't manage to beat Armenia. Look, I was never going to be sweating on the Nations League - the chances of qualifying for any significant tournament by that route is so remote you'd be as well off buying lottery tickets. It was only introduced because more and more players were turning away from national friendlies - the clubs butter their bread fairly generously, whereas these are basically fundraisers for national associations, and in Ireland's case very little feeds back into the national league. Regardless, any team that loses to Armenia twice would fully deserve the drop! Armenia are ranked far below Ireland, hadn't scored away from home in the whole campaign, and their own media had walked out on a press briefing.

Ireland played a pressing 3-5-2 again and it was the right move as Armenia couldn't make any inroads. John Egan made it two goals in two games with a very traditional Irish goal – a good header from a corner. Obafemi doubled our advantage with a good flick past a defender and shot from distance – the keeper should really have done much better. I like Obafemi. He isn't refined, but he is very direct and goes for everything. That should have been that – Ireland had several more chances to extend their lead, most notably a Robbie Brady deflection. Then Armenia levelled. I have no problem with the first goal - a good shot tipped onto the post by Bazunu and then a good follow-up. Good goal and well-executed. But the second one within two minutes? Hourihane has come in for deserved criticism for a far-too-casual pass in danger territory, but I thought Bazunu could have done a lot better as well. That was appallingly careless. At 2-2, Ireland would have stayed up, but I doubt if Kenny would have been in the hot seat much longer - then again, with the FAI's lack of finance, credibility, or top tier players, who'd really want the job? As it was, a Robbie Brady penalty on the stroke of injury-time (and it was a clear penalty - he moved his hand to intercept) and two red cards for Armenia spared our blushes – barely. Funny enough, the defeat to Scotland was actually a good display by Ireland. This victory over Armenia most definitely wasn't.

U21 European Championship Play-Offs

We could and maybe should have put Israel away in a Tallaght Stadium that had a lot of empty seats for a sold out game. Aaron Connolly looked sharp, unlucky to hit the post and having another great chance skim just barely wide of the post. Ireland were the more attacking side – Will Smallbone played behind Connolly and Ferguson and it forced Israel out more than they wanted. Israel were always in the game but under pressure...until Ireland coughed up a bad enough goal. Great direction on the header, but you can't let a player get to that chance so easily. Young starlet Evan Ferguson (please, let's just for once not get carried away

about a young player's potential) headed an equaliser from a corner in the 65th minute – again, that's a bread-and-butter chance that a solid defence won't cough up. Even when Israel picked up a red card for denying a clear goalscoring opportunity – correct decision, as was the awarding of a free-kick (contact was just outside the line, unfortunately for us) – we just couldn't break through as they absorbed our attacks and calmly ran down the clock. 1-1, and an opportunity missed.

Ireland were away for the second leg and Israel had a big and vocal crowd behind them – mind you, a solid Irish fanbase made themselves known as well. Israel had a number of senior players available and it showed, Ireland did well to keep Israel's first half dominance unrewarded. The second half was tighter as Ireland opened up a bit more and had a couple of chances – Israel's Gorno missed a proverbial sitter, though. The tempo dropped a bit as the game headed into extra-time. Neither side really looked like breaking the deadlock, to be honest.

I had a sinking feeling when it went to penalties. In fairness to RTE, they did point out the quality of Israel's goalkeeper beforehand. He was class, but our penalties were poor, with three out of four saved by Peretz.

Ireland miss out on a first ever U21 qualification for a major tournament in the most heartbreaking fashion. The truth is that we didn't leave it behind us in Tel Aviv; it was the goals that we didn't score in Tallaght that came back to haunt us.





PRUNING APPLE TREES

Apple trees should be pruned every winter if you want a good crop of fruit the following season. If you don't prune your apple trees every year, they can become congested with a lot of old branches and don't produce as much fruit as it would when pruned.

It is not a very difficult job to prune an apple tree. All you need to remember is that you want to create an open centre with about half a dozen main branches. You should prune your apple trees when they are dormant, that is between November and early March.

When you start pruning your apple trees always use a sharp pair of secoteurs, loppers or pruning saw.

The point branches to start are those that are diseased, dead or damaged, then start by pruning those that are crossing each other. Try to remember to keep the centre of the tree open even if you have to remove large branches.




