Killarney hoteliers secure planning **FOR €50M DUBLIN HOTEL**

The owners of The Great Southern Hotel in Killarney have secured planning permission for a new €50m luxury hotel on the site of the former St. Mary's College in Donnybrook following a successful appeal to An Bord Pleanála by Joe and Margaret Scally.

The new 169 bedroom hotel will be located on Bloomfield Avenue and is the groups first hotel based in the capital.

The family, have a number of properties in their portfolio including Hayfield Manor in Cork, The Royal Hotel and The Great Southern Hotel in Killarney.

Plans for the new hotel in the former Carmelite Seminary include indoor and outdoor swimming pools, a spa, and a steel and glass orangery which will incorporate a tea room and outdoor terrace.

The Scally family bought the property in January 2018 for \in 16 million and plan to spend \in 50million on the development which is supported by Failte Ireland.

The former college dates from 1888 and is a protected structure.



Kerry Airport to continue serving Kerry-Dublin route and facilitate emergency air services

KERRY Airport will remain open throughout the current Level 5 restrictions, and beyond, serving passengers travelling on the twice daily Kerry-Dublin route.

Prior to announcing the cancellation of flights from all regional airports for a four-week period from November 14th, Ryanair had already reduced the frequency of services to London Luton and Stansted while flights to Germany are not operating at present.

Kerry Airport CEO John Mulhern said: "We remained open throughout the first wave of the pandemic and we will continue to operate into the future to facilitate the needs of the emergency air services who require a landing base in Kerry. The PSO route between Kerry and Dublin also continues to be a crucial lifeline for passengers travelling for essential work, education and healthcare needs."

18 percent of jobs in Kerry are directly dependent on the tourism and hospitality sectors.

Germany, a key market for tourism in Kerry, has returned to partial lockdown while the UK continues to lower the number of daily cases. Air travel is ancillary to the incredible efforts being made by so many at home and abroad to keep us safe and well.

"We understand everyone's concerns about getting home to see loved ones this Christmas and we remain hopeful that there will be some positive developments heading into the festive season," said John Mulhern.

Lucky for me I live within 5km of the Killarney town centre and decided to take a cycle through the town one night over the bank holiday weekend which was so sad to see everywhere shut up shop. As humans, social interaction is essential to every aspect of our health. Research shows that having a strong network of support or strong community bonds fosters both emotional and physical health and is such an important component of life.

Jimmy Brien's bar is a closely knit hub, an adoptive, blended family like many of our 'local pubs' throughout the community. "We are a close bunch at Jimmy's and it is so frustrating not to see our locals, many of which live alone. I had seen many videos online where mobile bars were in operation throughout the various communities. My partner Alison Maher & I welcomed a baby boy Tom into the world during the last lockdown, little brother to our two year old Sam. So while the notion was in my head it wasn't quite a venture I was in a position to take up at that time. Declan & I really missed our family of friends for almost six months. When the new Level 5 restrictions were announced it brought great anxiety to many, especially our locals where Jimmy's is somewhat their social circle, their home. This time round, like many other delivery services we decided to set up a mobile bar distributing pints to our local customers" Alan explained.

"To be honest Marie it's more about checking in and breaking up the long evenings for people, a lot of which live alone. We miss them just as much as they miss us. We've been on many outings together as a group of friends" Declan told me. "We've been all over the place really, the Guinness Store House, bus trips to Dingle and around Kerry & we even got abroad to Portugal would you believe"?

"The majority of our customers are not on social media. Some don't even have smart phones. The reaction has been brilliant Marie. For example over the weekend one of our customers grandsons had seen our social media posts for our mobile pint service and ordered two pints for his grandad on his birthday. To say he was thrilled was an

understatment" Alan told me. What a novel idea I thought, to still be able to buy a drink for your friend on their birthday or special occasion when you can't be there to celebrate with him/her. Or even just because you want to give someone a little surprise and a lift.

I wanted to know a little bit more about how the mobile bar service operated and how would one order? "So we operate on weekends only Marie" Alan explained. "We take the orders of a Friday and Declan 'The Navigator' maps out deliveries from a 5K radius from Jimmy's Bar. The order is a minimum of two pints per delivery and we'd try our best call again on our return journey if needed too. Postal codes are the business. There are no orders for more than a couple of pints at a time so we'd spot a house party a mile off. Most of the orders are prepaid and like ourselves, 90% of people will know we're arriving and open their doors with their masks on. For our regulars we do try to have a socially distanced chat weather permitting, which is great for them..... and us!" Alan Breen will be 8 years in operation at Jimmy Brien's Bar come next May. I thought to myself how on earth is this profitable not to mind bearing the elements of the cold and wintery dark evenings??

"Well it's not a money spinner Marie that's for sure. Wouldn't everyone be doing it if

that were the case" Alan laughed. "We're not making money or losing money either. It's a social interaction with our locals many of whom live alone. It's a visitor calling and a distraction to shorten the long winters nights and I think it's great for mental health in general. My customers are my friends. It's a two man operation and I'm delighted to have Declan, my co-pilot, on board with me" Alan continued. "I enjoy it" Declan replied "and all going well, the lockdown will be just for six weeks or so and we can hopefully welcome our customers back to Jimmy Brien's sooner rather than later".

I left the conversation half wishing I part of this caring family of friends. Humanity at it's best. "You wanna be where everybody knows your name"!! Aint that the truth???.... and in the meantime if you're thirsty for a pint on draught, check out Jimmy Brien's social media pages for orders within their 5K and more updates. Fair play to these two.

Thank you for having me on College Street Alan Breen & Declan O'Riordan as they were busy cleaning out the beer lines for a busy weekend ahead.

Last Spring, a magnificent display of purple crocuses bloomed on the lawn of St Mary's Church of the Sloes. A visual reminder of the world-wide Rotary Global Polio Eradication Initiative, towards a polio-free world. Next Spring, inspired by the example, a section of lawn of the Franciscan Friary adjacent to the KDYS driveway at Fair Hill, will mark the same message, while Spring beauty brings hope and cheers eyes, minds and hearts.

World Polio Day Saturday 24th October, had to be anticipated slightly ahead of schedule, due to the Level 5 lockdown, and crocus corms had to be quickly planted by Killarney Club President Anne Alcock with the assistance of some the Franciscans and Imogen and Janine O'Connor, who are the daughters of Rotary member Angela O'Connor on Wednesday October 21st. They will hopefully all come up purple, because purple has become the symbolic colour in the Rotary fight against polio, inspired by the colour of the dye painted on the finger of a child, to signify that they have received their potentially life-saving polio vaccine. These are just some of the great ways that supporting Purple4Polio can result in great Rotary projects for outreach into our own local communities.

In August 2020 Rotary and its partners across the world celebrated a significant milestone, as the World Health Organisation certified the African region, which includes 47 countries, free from wild polio.

This leaves just Pakistan and Afghanistan as the two remaining polio endemic countries in the world. But despite the momentous progress, more challenging work lies ahead to eradicate the disease for good. CAOIMHE MAKES A DIFFERENCE TO THE ORPHANAGES IN BELARUS

gave my wardrobe a good old 'Marie Kondo' style shake up in the last lock down. So many things to discard, many with tags on.

The guilt of throwing them away led me donating to charity. When I saw what Caoimhe Lynch was up to, I thought my next Marie Kondo / Mrs Hinch project should be to the Belarus Chernobyl project after speaking with Caoimhe Lynch popularly known as the organiser of the Kingdom Gospel Choir, but this week, Caoimhe was making a difference to the orphanages in Belarus.

"I got chatting to Br. Liam of the Burren Chernobyl Project Marie. He works with people affected by the Chernobyl disaster in Belarus. He was telling me that there is a huge shortage of nappies and adult shoes in many of the orphanages he works with. I found it shocking that such basic items as we know it, are poorly lacking for people in Belarus orphanages. I felt so guilty for the amount of shoes I have thrown in the back of my wardrobe, never used. So that's what gave me the incentive Marie and I began a shoe collection for Bellarus".

Gulp!! I am a bit of a shoe-a-holic myself so I could totally get where Caoimhe was coming from. Just ask the girls at Whos4Shoes. Back in 'normal times' I'd call for the chats and leave with a pair of shoes..... or at least put a pair on deposit.

"On Sunday last, I decided to make a Facebook post that offering a shoe collection of preloved shoes to my family & friends. The facebook post got over 280 shares and I had endless messages of people willing to donate shoes and nappies. The power of social media!!! I picked Tuesday evening 7pm at the Cathedral carpark as a drop off point for anyone I couldn't make it to. I've said it before and I'll say it again - the people of Killarney really know how to rally together when they hear of people in need. The donations you see in the photo is a mere fraction of what was donated".



"Would you believe Marie, I even received brand new toys which I will be giving to the Killarney Garda station for their Christmas toy appeal for homeless families at Christmas and I would urge anyone who can afford to donate, please do. Women's clothing was another I received a lot of. These will be given to ADAPT Women's Refuge Centre, Tralee".

What a lot of work for one lady I thought and she's right, the people of Killarney are so generous. When I arrived at the Cathedral car park at 7pm on a cold and wintery night, many cars passed through (as you can see from the donations) and few stopped for a little chat before the down pour. But that's Caoimhe. She oozes generosity & kindness. A kind soul way beyond her years. Times are hard for everyone at the moment regardless. She's a dab hand at making a positive out of a negative. "I am blown away by the support given. I also feel like the people who have been affected by the Chernobyl disaster have a big place in the hearts of the Killarney people. Many Killarney households have taken on Chernobyl children for decades under the hand of the ever so dedicated, Betty Crosbie. When restrictions ease a little, I will be drive to The Burren, home of the Chernobyl Project office in Co. Clare, with our generous donations, Belarus bound on the next transfer. A massive thank you to everyone who donated to this appeal. The kindness shown has been so heartwarming. The document is intended to consolidate practical guidance on how to manage business continuity of the retail sector during the current pandemic. It looks at risks to both workers and the public and draws from many published documents. The guide will assist businesses in implementing the mandatory

Return to Work Safely Protocol for Employers and Workers which applies to all workplaces across the economy. The guide incorporates current advice about measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19 in the community issued by the National Public Health Emergency Team (NPHET). As the advice issued by NPHET continues to evolve, the document and the measures that both employers and workers need to address may change. The document also specifies requirements to implement, maintain and improve a retailer's ability to protect against, prepare for and respond to and recover from COVID-19 related disruptions when they arise. Seven West Kerry Archaeological Sites Feature This Weekend

Tomorrow, Saturday Octover 31st, on Radio Kerry from 9am - 11am, Frank Lewis visits seven archaeological sites within 300 meters of Nora Anne's holiday home at Kilmalkedar – with Smerwick Harbour and the Three Sisters headlands out in front and Brandon Mountain behind.

Archaeologist Micheal O Coileain, stonemason Breandan O Muircheartaigh and Blasket guide Tomas O Luing tell stories of three or more thousand years:

• Kilmalkedar , the pre-eminent church on the Dingle Peninsula

• A holy well and cross slab that were important before Christianity, in early Christian times , in dark Cromwellian days and later

• A large flat rock where eight basins were carved and worn out by whole families grinding their grain

 \cdot The Gallarus-style St. Brendan's Oratory, a quiet place of prayer

• The five circular buildings in Cathair Deargain



stonefort might have housed an
extended family of up to 40
The 14th century home of the Chancellor of
the Diocese of Ardfert has a perfectly

• The medieval St. Brendan's House where the monks from the nearby church lived

Statutory agencies in the Cork and Kerry region have thanked the people of both counties for adhering to new temporary restrictions which are now in place to stop the spread of Covid-19.

"Our freshly baked breads, scones & pastries are popular so we still have our customers within 5Km visiting the store. It's great to introduce our customers to these small businesses" Paul said. I was having a little browse around and asked about the items in the fridge. They looked delicious. "Oh they're our ready to go meals Marie. We've Lasagne, Beef stir-fry, Thai Green Chicken Curry, Bacon & Cabbage and our world famous Fish Cakes" Paul explained.

"Good Morning Paul. Are you selling any power tools today???? Isn't it quiet enough with this pandemic and now Main Street is closed too" a customer buying some scones asked. "You should go into the paving business too Paul" he laughed and left. "I do try to adapt" Paul replied "We're resilient at this stage Marie" Paul joked. Very true I thought. To remain open to the public producing fresh baking and meals daily for the public in a pandemic within a 5K radius is not an easy task not to mind no access to the store via Main Street for at least a few weeks. Typical Paul looking on the bright site "Sure wasn't it easy for you to pull up outside the front door Marie. At least there's no parking issues for customers to call for the foreseeable" Paul laughed.

"I'm here daily to greet the customers Marie. Interaction is so important right now. I had a light bulb moment and thought to create hampers with wholesome produce from each of the local suppliers you see here including



ourselves. They would be a great alternative as a Christmas bonus or a local personalised gift for Auntie Nora's birthday, benefitting 5 or 6 different families in one purchase". I had a quick look at the hampers that start from \in 50 each, just FYI.

The Treyvauds are also looking after Christmas with individual portions of Turkey & Ham with optional trimmings including starter options too which can be picked from their restaurant on High Street before Christmas. "People are supporting us so we thought for those essential workers or those living at home alone it would be a great service to offer" Paul said. Too right. It'll save this veggie the time and effort!!

"We are paying all our staff their full time wages Marie. None of them are on the Covid Payment" Paul told me. I wondered how he was making any money at all???? It was out of my mouth before I realised. "Well we do have the wage subsidy in place Marie but that's a mere 55% of our staff's earnings. We're open Tuesday - Saturday 9am-5pm. Yes, it's probably costing us but to remain open is for our locals, our community, our staff and our sanity" Paul laughed.

Before I left Treyvauds Restaurant on High Street I asked Paul would he be streaming live again on his very popular cooking demonstrations on Facebook throughout Lock Down No.2? "That was phenomenal Marie. There were 97 Million viewers watching over 3 months. Unbelievable. I'm afraid you'll have to watch this space. I'm giving nothing away" Mysterious Paul joked.

YOU ARE A LEGEND... and legends live forever



The emotional words spoken by Pat Moynihan at the funeral mass of his nephew Derek Twomey were heard around the world on Monday morning last.

The town is still reeling from the sudden death of Derek at his workplace The Dungeon Bookshop the previous Wednesday.

The popular 31 year old, and son of Mary and Gerard and brother of Deirdre and Darren was laid to rest in Aghadoe Lawn Cemetery following Requiem Mass in St. Mary's Cathedral.

The Mass, which was celebrated by Fr. Jim Lenihan, and which was live streamed around the world welcomed many of Derek's friends in Australia, America and London, all of whom are deeply saddened by his passing.

Gifts brought to the alter included a shirt carried by his sister Deirdre, symbolising the many times Derek came home to his mother to iron his shirts, a book on his favourite football team, Aresnal, brought by his niece Faye and the No. 26 Legion Shirt, which he wore when Legion secured the O'Donoghue Cup, brought up by his friend James O'Donoghue.

An avid sportsman, Derek worked tirelessly for his club and in a fitting tribute, the cortage made its way to Killarney Legion Clubhouse in Dirreen where Club Chariman, Fergal Moynihan and Kerry footballer and Derek's friend, James O'Donoghue spoke about Derek to the club members who had gathered for a guard of honour. To the sound of Derek's favourite song "Angles" by Robbie Williams, Derek's cortege left the club grounds and made its way to Aghadoe where Derek was laid to rest.

This has been a tough year for everybody, but it has been especially hard on Killarney Legion GAA Club, who have suffered some really heartbreaking losses of them in recent times. The recent passing of Derek Twomey at just 31 years of age is among of the hardest. Derek was an unstinting servant of the club, both on and off the field of play, and one of its most popular members.

Derek was a club member virtually from the cradle, apart from a brief stint with Kingdom Kerry Gaels in London, and a very talented sportsman in his own right. Derek was part of a close circle of friends that grew up in Legion colours and included several future Kerry seniors. As well as well as enjoying a number of underage successes, he was a part of the Killarney Legion teams that reached the Senior Club Final, and the Senior County Final in 2015, the club's first since 1946. He was also a mentor with the Legion team that reached the U21 County Final in 2012. Probably his favourite sporting moment, however, was when he helped Killarney Legion to win the O'Donoghue Cup in 2019 alongside team-mates he

had grown up with and around, beating rivals on the field (and good friends off it) Dr. Crokes in a thrilling final.

Derek also enjoyed huge success with his alma mater St. Brendans, losing a Corn Uí Mhuirí Final in 2007 to their old rivals Tralee CBS before flipping the tables the year after to record a memorable triumph, with Derek scoring a crucial first half point. The school reached the Hogan Cup Final that year but lost out to St. Pats of Dungannon.

It would be a huge mistake to measure Derek's huge contribution to Legion, with whom he was a willing helper in everything, and to the wider community merely by his undoubted sporting prowess or medal collection. Derek was quiet-spoken but very funny and had a wonderful dry wit – he had the ability to make people of all ages smile and always made a big effort to do so, as anyone who visited The Dungeon could easily attest.

Killarney Legion themselves expressed it best in a statement when the news broke of his untimely passing. "Derek and his family have been involved with the Legion for many years and are hugely respected within the club. An accomplished and determined footballer, Derek was a regular and influential player at all grades and a very valued member of the senior panel. A fantastic footballer and character, his presence around the club will be missed beyond words."

Reduced tongue movements have been linked to difficulties extracting milk, especially during breastfeeding. The exact cause of tongue tie is not yet known, but it tends to run in families. It is estimated that tongue tie affects approximately 10% of babies. The aim of this article is to provide practical information for parents concerned about tongue tie (ankyloglossia). In this article, we base the recommendations on our clinical experience and recent research evidence.

What are the common symptoms related to breastfeeding which may suggest that a baby may have a tongue tie?

Effortful, prolonged, not efficient breastfeeding

Constant feeding (unsatisfied baby)

Difficulties latching on or maintaining the latch
Disorganised suck, baby losing suction and sucking is noisy, sometimes clicks may be heard
Baby swallows more air during sucking which may cause excessive wind

Baby upset or unsettled during feeding

Slow weight gain

Deformity of the nipple after breastfeeding

 Nipple pain during breastfeeding, baby 'pinching' the nipple

• Damaged nipples, and sometimes blocked milk ducts or mastitis

• Mother reports pain and discomfort

•As a consequence of sucking difficulties, low milk supply may occur.

(Please note that the above symptoms may also be caused by other problems outside a tongue tie).

If a mother experiences difficulty during breastfeeding, it is advisable to assess the baby's sucking skills including the possibility of tongue tie. There are formal tools for assessing tongue tie, such as Assessment Tool for Lingual Frenulum Function, Bristol Tongue Assessment Tool, and most recent The Tongue-tie and Breastfed Babies (TABBY). These are usually administered by a professional. In our opinion, it is also very important that parents become familiar with the anatomy of their baby's mouth and observe their baby's feeding patterns. We propose some practical tips for parents, which may help them to recognise if their baby could potentially present with a tongue tie.

How parents could check for a tongue tie?

1. First of all, parents should look for opportunities to observe baby's tongue as much as possible, for example during crying or yawning. They should get familiar with the anatomy of the mouth in a small baby. Parents could use a small torch to illuminate the inside of the mouth, but be careful not to upset the baby and not to shine the light into baby's eyes. Some positions may be easier for viewing the mouth than others, parents should experiment what works best for them.

2. Parents can use certain reflexes to learn about baby's mouth, such as a tongue thrusting reflex. If the tip of the baby's tongue is touched with a clean finger the baby should stick the tongue out a bit. This will allow parents to see the shape of the tongue (please note that this reflex disappears when the baby is 4 – 6 months old). 3. Parents should observe:

• The shape of the tip of the tongue: is it round and well defined? Sometimes, the tip of the tongue may be heart shaped if the tongue tie is present.

• How far does the tongue stretch out? Is the baby able to stick the tongue out beyond the lower lip, to the lower gums, or does the tongue stays inside the mouth behind the gum? Tongue tie usually restricts tongue movement and does not allow the tongue to stretch out of the mouth much.

4. When the baby's mouth is open (during crying or yawning) observe if the baby is lifting the tongue up at all, or if the tongue positioned low at the floor of the mouth. Note that the baby should be able to lift the whole front of the tongue, if a tongue tie is present the sides of the tongue may still curl up and backwards, but the tip of the tongue is usually kept down.

We must acknowledge, however, that there are different types of tongue tie, some may be relatively easy observed, but some may not.

The management of a baby with suspected tongue tie

Often tongue tie causes no feeding issues. The feeding difficulties are present in approximately 25% of tongue-tied infants. Until recently, the consensus among paediatricians was that tongue ties do not cause problems and they should be left alone. Nowadays, there is an increasing body of evidence which supports division of tongue tie in selected infants. However, identification of those babies who will definitely benefit from the procedure is difficult. Indication for division of tongue tie is where the tongue tie is significantly interfering with feeding. Ideally, a feeding assessment should be carried out to identify the source of breastfeeding problems and recommend some strategies which may help. There could be other reasons causing problems with feeding and tongue tie may not be the primary issue. If this is the case, tongue tie division will likely not improve feeding. Sometimes, the feeding problems can be resolved without any medical intervention, for example, a change of the feeding position may improve baby's suck. Supplemental feeding technique may also improve baby's latch and suck. There are simple exercises, such as using a soother to improve the strength of the suck. The milk supply also influences the baby's ability to suck, and some babies with tongue tie find it easier to latch on a fuller breast. There is some clinical evidence that a therapeutic massage of the baby's tongue can improve tongue movements and subsequently improve feeding, but this technique is not commonly used in Ireland. However, if tongue tie continues to interfere with breastfeeding parents should consider medical help. Frenotomy is the most common surgical procedures applied to release tongue tie. During frenotomy, the tongue tie is clipped with scissors or laser. Frenotomy may resolve breastfeeding problems for some babies, but not for all. The review of international evidence concluded that although frenotomy improved nipple pain among mothers, it had inconsistent effect on baby's breastfeeding. Frenotomy failed to improve breastfeeding in approximately 20% of cases. Identification of those babies who will definitely benefit from the procedure is difficult. Timing of the procedure is also debatable. We would not recommend it before three weeks of age as the tongue tie may rupture of its own accord.

In vast majority of infants if frenotomy improved feeding, no other action is required.

If there is no improvement in feeding following frenotomy it is recommended that the baby is seen for a feeding evaluation by an infant feeding specialist such as a lactation consultant or speech & language therapist with appropriate expertise.

In any case, it is worth observing how well the baby manages solid food in the future, as sometimes tongue tie interferes with side-toside tongue movements which are necessary for chewing solid food. Tongue and jaw move together as a one unit during sucking, but from about 4-6 months onwards the tongue should start moving independently from the jaw. With appropriate support every baby should be able to feed well and mealtimes should pleasant for any family. If you are worried that your baby may present with a tongue tie talk to a professional. Your GP, practice nurse, paediatrician, lactation consultant or speech & language therapist can help you in assessing and managing tongue tie.

Domestic Violence Campaign Launched in Kerry Invites Men to be "Better Than This"

Time to do some courses research as CAO online application facility opens on 5th November



A sif to illustrate that we live in strange times, the 2021 CAO colleges application season opens on 5th November while the 2020 Leaving Cert written exam, which was postponed from June, begins on 16th November.

It brings to mind the old adage of putting the cart before the horse but there are some positives to be drawn from it. The November exams by the State Examinations Commission (SEC) provide candidates with one last chance to improve their exam scores. The best scores from the calculated grades process and the November written Leaving Cert exam may be combined for points accumulation in any application to CAO.

Despite the challenging conditions in schools at the moment due to the pandemic restrictions, the Department of Education is determined to provide the traditional state exams next June. The exams will be run as normally as possible subject to the prevailing public health advice at the time. Nevertheless, with so much concern about the ongoing impact of the coronavirus pandemic and its potential to prevent the exams from going ahead next June, students are anxious about their immediate future.

It's not easy to prepare for an exam when there is uncertainty about how it will be assessed. While I sincerely hope that the calculated grades process will never again be used to produce Leaving Cert exam results, I fully appreciate the anxiety being suffered by students despite the best efforts of school authorities. My advice to students is to be optimistic about the June exam going ahead but, at the same time, to be careful in their school assessments and their ongoing school work. Norma Foley, who is proving to be an outstanding Minister for Education, continues to act in the best interests of all students within her portfolio. If there is any chance that the state exams can proceed safely next June, Minister Foley can be depended upon to see that they do.

Every Leaving Cert student should now have a copy of the 2021 CAO Handbook which contains all the relevant information about the CAO application process. Use the next few months to go through it carefully and find the information you need to assist you with your application. The CAO Handbook 2021 explains how to apply for a third level college place. The colleges in the CAO system are listed in alphabetical order by location. The courses in each college are listed directly under the college title, with 'Level 8' courses being listed separately from 'Level 7/6' courses. Select your personal preferences from the entire range of courses in the Handbook. Each course is assigned a code, which you enter on the application. You may apply for up to ten courses in each of the two categories, listed in order of your preference.

The CAO Handbook 2021 doesn't contain information about general academic requirements, specific course requirements nor content of courses, so consult the colleges' Prospecti and websites for that information. Many colleges are currently providing virtual open days and webinars instead of the usual on campus open days. Consider the potential career value of each course in which you are interested. Play to your strengths as you do your course research during the next few months. Jot down your personal career profile, including such variables as ability, achievement, application, aptitude, ambition, values, interests and personality (5AVIP). Select courses that suit you in order to have a fulfilling and successful college experience.

You can open your interactive CAO account from noon on 5th November to 5.15pm on

20th January at a discount application fee of \notin 30. Thereafter the fee increases to \notin 45 up to 5.15pm on the normal closing day, 1st February. The online change of course choices facility, which if free of charge, also closes at 5.15pm on 1st February.

My Personal Journey

DEACON THADY O'CONNOR SHARES HIS RELIGIOUS JOURNEY

y first memory of Church was when, as an Altar Server I served mass for our Parish Priest Fr. Herlihy in my native parish of Kilcummin.

Serving the Church was a core value held by the culture during my early formative years, and is something that has stayed with me to this day. I married my wife Carmel who was also from the parish, and later we were blessed with four children Evelyn, Ronan, Patrice and Clodagh and in the past year we have been blessed by two Grandsons James and Ryan. It was during the rearing of our own family that we found a greater necessity for the Church and living a life of faith. We found it gave meaning to our lives and helped us with the inevitable challenges that we encountered. As a young parent I took part in the Kerry Diocesan Programmes which really helped us to develop as a family. Each of our children became involved in the ministries of the Church as they came of age. We believe it was and still is the best formation we can give our children, perhaps a view that is not known by young parents today. In this context I'm always reminded of the words of Fr Adrian Van Kaam, "Spiritual development is a prerequisite for personal development".

After a very fulfilling career at the cutting edge of technology an opportunity arose, allowing me to pursue a lifelong love to work in the area of spirituality and the creative arts.

Having seized this opportunity, I pursued a fulltime residential MA degree in Holistic Development for Pastoral Ministry, in All Hallows College Dublin, (DCU), and thereafter I was appointed manager of the IOSAS Pastoral Centre with the Columba Community Muff Co Donegal. I really enjoyed my work there and gained much experience as my work took me across the border into Derry city, working with colleges and parishes of the area. Developing and promoting cross border interfaith peace programmes was a key feature of my work for the centre at the



time. Having studied and seen the benefits of Music Ministry, I took up the position of Musical Director of the Vincentian Parish Mission Team which as everybody who knows me, I'm still striving to develop and promote to this day.

Diaconate Formation Programme

Formation as a Permanent Deacon is a four-year programme, with the first year being a year of discernment followed by a three-year academic programme. I found the first year to be a very beneficial year also, with regard to bringing me into contact with likeminded people. It also refined my understanding of the call to the ministry of Deacon as a way to serve parish and communities within the Church. The three year academic programme took place in St. Patricks College, Thurles. Ironically my uncle Fr. Pat O Connor was ordained there in 1929.

It was a wonderful and deeply humbling experience along with my two colleagues Deacon Denis Kelleher, St John's, Tralee and Deacon Patrick Coffey, Killorglin, when Bishop

Ray Browne ordained the three of us as Permanent Deacons for the Kerry Diocese on Oct. 2017.

There are six Permanent Deacons currently serving in the Diocese for the first time in the history of the Diocese, and that tells its own story.

Subsequently, I was assigned to Castleisland Parish and Pastoral Area. I'm delighted to be part of the dynamic team in Castleisland. Having been assigned to the Sacrament of Baptism by my Parish Priest Fr Mossie Brick, my work brings me into contact with young parents which I love, and is such a natural area of ministry for me. I'm also involved in Music Ministry through live streaming as well as recording. I have recently released my third album "Sea of Tranquility Volume II", which is available through the newly opened outlet in Castleisland Parish Office, as well as the Friary Bookshop in Killarney. NATIONAL LEAGUE CHAMPIONS!

Kerry 2-18 Donegal 0-10

The Kerry seniors lifted just their second national trophy in a five year period last Saturday (let's not kid ourselves, the introduction of the back door has seen the currency of a Munster title being completely devalued) and did it in fine style. I won't do a detailed match report – I imagine many of you will have read plenty such in the intervening days. I will make my own observations of the game (I was one of the fortunate few to be there) and draw my own conclusions.

I do believe that matches are now divided into short quarters rather than halves. It makes for short and intense bursts before the clock is reset for the next quarter – I can understand that in high-intensity games like basketball and NFL, where a majority of players are directly involved in the play; far less so in more tactically nuanced (not superior, I'm just noting that movement off the ball and team synchronicity are more subtly effective) field sports. I don't really agree with it; I don't see it as safer as regards infection. Runners don't carry water bottles to the players any more, but they do still run onto the field.

First Quarter

Let's not kid ourselves. Kerry played a total blanket defence. This was Tyrone in the early 2000s or Donegal under McGuinness. Kerry mostly had one man in the opposition half, but several times they had none. And it was working. Donegal were running into a massed wall. They had plenty of possession; Kerry were happy to let them have it - outside the danger area. David Moran opened the scoring David's main strengths of high fielding and long range kicking are mostly redundant in a game like this) and a highly industrious Dara Moynihan neatly picked off a second. But Donegal actually led at the break. Ciarán Thompson (whom I have always thought of as a brilliant engine room wing back, not as a score-executioner) scored two superb points - they had to be superb, with Kerry's defence closing out normal opportunities, At the end of the quarter Jason Foley picked up a black card (very harsh, I thought) and Oisin Gallen popped the free.

Second Quarter

In the first half, both sides were picking up uncontested short kick-outs (Kerry did put one over the sideline; not a big deal for me). I actually think that being a man down meant that Kerry were more willing to go for distance. Significantly, Donegal put their spare man around the middle – it left the door slightly ajar. And paid the price. Tom O'Sullivan initiated the move in defence, raced forward, regathered, had a look at the posts....and chipped a



beautiful, clever, almost cheeky pass into Sean O'Shea as he drifted behind the defence. It was the very definition of a killer pass. Sean still had plenty to do, but Sean O'Shea? Stop, he could and did finish in style. Donegal were reeling. Kerry were admirably ruthless rather than celebratory, with Tom finishing off a good team move for a point. Tadhg Morley won a good ball inside (Tadhg was outstanding in guarding his patch, really assured) and got it out to Gavin White, who burst forward in trademark style. The cardinal rule in the modern game is to never take the ball into contact, hence all the recycling. There's an exception to every rule, and this was it. Gavin burst straight through three tackle attempts, shrugging them off like irritant mosquitos. I've always admired Gavin's ability to slice defences apart with that power and pace, but queried the actual end product.... this time Gavin buried it beautifully. 2-3 to 0-3. Jason McGee, Donegal's best player and the most dominant midfielder, did kick a good score. Kerry didn't care. This was the Tony Brosnan Show. He gathered from David Clifford (David and Tony put in hard shifts - both are well known as great snipers but they dug willingly in the trenches hard and often here) and fired over. The same pair combined again for his second - he could arguably have gone for goal. He rose high to catch the kick-out himself and kicked it over - he might have tried to lob the keeper, but opted rightly for the certainty of a score. Three points in as many minutes.

Ironically, Jason Foley returned, both sides reset...and Donegal reeled off three points themselves, twice turning over our kick-out. Thompson with two frees (one a careless pick-up of a Kerry kick-out) and McGee with a monster score from the right wing. Sean O'Shea (looking like the goal had increased his confidence) fired over a Kerry response. Kerry had their first couple of wdes before the effervescent Tony Brosnan pointed. Caolan McGonigle curled over a good point – it was a great effort; I suspect that he was thinking about under rather than over. A foul on Paul



Murphy, another player who exemplified Kerry's work-rate all day, was converted by David Clifford. A Sean O'Shea '45 (Tony's shot was blocked) drifted wide, but Kerry could be more than pleased with their first half.

KERRY 2-9 DONEGAL 0-8 Second Half

Let us not dwell on it. Oisin Gallen opened the second half from a free after two Kerry wides, and Caolan McGonigle fired over from an angle after good work by Thompson. In the meantime Sean O'Shea had slotted a free and David Clifford kicked a point. He 'kicked a point' that Michelangelo once 'painted a church roof', or Newton 'dabbled in physics', or Mozart 'had a few ditties'. A few people who might have been expecting some kind of comic-book hero Clifford were probably disappointed up to now (I hadn't been; David was moving, passing, and especially, tackling superbly all through) – this was a simply unreal point.

And that was that. It was, basically, all over with twenty minutes left on the clock. David added another from massive distance. Tony, easily man of the match, nailed another two points. David with another well-worked team score. Sean from play and another free. David made it 0-7 without reply before Conor Lane blew a fairly merciful whistle.

One of Kerry's most influential figures wasn't on the pitch and never has been. Kerry are only the second county after Dublin to employ a strength and conditioning expert across all grades. On this evidence, Jason McGahan is

worth every cent and a bonus. It's no secret and I'm not alone in saying that Dublin in particular have been easily out-running and out-muscling Kerry in the last ten minutes of crunch games and last year's All Ireland Finals continued that worrying trend. But Kerry were hunting and sprinting at the finish just as hard as they had been at the start, long after Donegal had given up the ghost. They brought subs on for the last quarter – Stephen O'Brien is as fast and relentless as ever, while Brian Ó Beaglaíoch also caught my eye.

Two important caveats, and let's not shy away from either. First, this title will always have a shadow cast on it by the circumstances. These were warm-up games, nothing more. In the list of interesting or strange things that happened in 2020, the National League title won't even be getting a mention in the appendix.

Second, Donegal were not even vaguely bothered about this game, no matter how much anyone pretends otherwise. Missing from the day's action were players like Michael Murphy (a game-changer on his own) Paddy McBrearty, Neil McGee, Eoghan Ban Gallagher, and Ryan McHugh. Donegal have their eyes firmly fixed on Tyrone in the Ulster Championship, not a League title that they could theoretically have won only if all the other results fell their way.

Mayo join already relegated Meath in the drop to Division Two, just a year after beating Kerry to become National League Champions. Roscommon and Armagh are promoted.

There was some interesting Kerry involvement in a few other counties as well, two in particular. **Kildare:** After losing three out of four games early on, Kildare, managed by former Kerry minor, senior, and U20 manager Jack O'Connor, saw off Westmeath by 0-16 to 0-11, and ended up narrowly enough missing out on promotion. It's champions Roscommon and Armagh who go up.

Laois: Laois also have a Kerry manager in Micheál Quirke, former county midfielder and GDA as well as manager of Kerins O'Rahillys (following in the footsteps of Jack O'Connor). Laois were facing a real possibility of relegation. In the 67th minute, trailing by five points and down to 14 men, it looked all over for them. Gary Walsh nailed a penalty and added a goal from play, with Paul Kingston adding a third. Down by five and winning by seven....some turnaround.

Fermanagh were already down (and deserve credit for their gutsy performance) and Cavan lose out to Clare on head to head to join them in the drop. Unbeaten Cork come up as Division Three champions, with Down joining them.

LADIES GAA

Kerry will open their Football Championship with an away game to Cavan this weekend. Their Camogie Championship was supposed to start against Cork last weekend, but that was very abruptly curtailed when Cork (and nine other counties) were told that they couldn't enter B teams. That's a very tough call on young players, in fairness, at so late a stage. Kerry will now open their campaign at home to Meath this Saturday – subject, obviously, to change at short notice.

Kerry Get Off To A Great Start

Joe McDonagh Cup: Kerry 1-20 Meath 0-13 Kerry have been left scrambling after first round defeats in the Joe McDonagh Group Stage in recent years, so a convincing win over Meath is a big fillip for Fintan O'Connor's players.

I disagree completely with the idea that a lack of supporters (though certainly disconcerting) negates home ground advantage – shorter travel and familiarity with surroundings is a huge plus.

Meath were promoted from the Christy Ring last year (the third tier competition) and Kerry were favourites here. Meath are no pushovers, though, far from it. Jack Regan in particular is a great hurler, while Padraic O'Hanrahan is a freetaker par excellence. But Kerry have greater strength in depth, and it showed.

First Quarter: Kerry faced early pressure with Meath raining in long balls. Bryan Murphy and Jason Diggins were superb, though, with sweeper John Buckley adroitly clearing the lines. Mikey Boyle was an effective target man at the other end, setting up Brandon Barrett for our first score. O'Hanrahan was on target twice (one an absolute beauty, in fairness) but Kerry reeled off points through Shane Conway, Micheál O'Leary, Mikey himself, and Shane again (after Mikey was fouled) to lead by 0-5 to 0-2 at the first break.

Second Quarter: Oh wow, but the heavens opened. Kerry handled the deluge slightly better. Meath snapped early points through O'Hanrahan and Regan (2) to level but Kerry responded through Micheál O'Leary, Mikey Boyle, Shane Conway, and Mikey again in response to an O'Hanrahan free. Then came Kerry's goal. Conway's long free looked like it was going wide, but Mikey Boyle batted it back into play and pressured the defender to spill it towards Michael Leane, who slipped it to Shane Nolan for a great goal. Michael Slattery and Shane Conway added quick points before jack Wall and Jack Regan gave Meath hope. Half-time Kerry 1-11 Meath 0-8

The rain cleared as quickly as it had arrived. Meath came out hungry, but Kerry handled the pressure well (Diggins was my man of the match) and all they got was two O'Hanrahan frees. Shane Conway had put over a brace himself in the meantime, and then Kerry cut loose.

Shane with another two Shane Nolan, Mikey Boyle, Colm Harty after coming off the bench (subs like Harty, Daniel Collins, Padraig Boyle, James O'Connor, Daniel Casey....that's a deep panel to draw from!)....Kerry were completely assured here. Regan and O'Hanrahan did pick off Meath scores, but not enough. Play did get a little ragged (to be honest, referee Thomas Walsh let some clumsy tackling go on both sides; I wouldn't have in these wet conditions) but it didn't deter Kerry, who closed it out with points from Nolan and Conway.

Tosach maith, gan amhras!

Kerry have Antrim (who walloped Westmeath by 4-25 to 1-15, having also defeated us in the Division Two Final) Westmeath, and Carlow in our five team group.

We are away to Westmeath next weekend. To be quite honest about it, we have to beat Westmeath, and they will be a much tougher test. Only one team qualifies from the group, and Antrim are red-hot favourites for that. We face them in our third game and we need to make that a decider. We have no margin for error here. It's tough, of course it's tough..... when did Kerry hurling ever have it easy? We have faced harder challenges in our time.

AFL GRAND FINAL

Ah well. Geelong Cats came, gave a fair whack at it, and in the end were answered by the Richmond Tigers. It was the first Grand Final played under lights or played outside Victoria (at the Gabba Stadium – is that not the most Australian word you have heard in your life? Gabba, mate!).

Geelong led by a point after the first quarter, and only for the legendary Dusty Martin, Geelong's advantage might have been a lot more than fifteen points. Gary Ablett - and yes, even I had heard of him - was as classy as ever in his last game (Richmond gave him a guard of honour at the finish instead of celebrating - pure class). Patrick Dangerfield had played a whopping 268 AFL games and never played in a final, but looked quite comfortable doing so (while making opposition players distinctly and decidedly uncomfortable; this is a tough sport!). Our own Mark O'Connor isn't up with those legends yet, but he is definitely on the same road and he was comfortable in the company.

It wasn't enough for Geelong. It was the Tigers, inspired by Dusty Martin (three times man of the match in a Grand Final in four years) who took over in the second half. Four goals in the third quarter saw them lead by two at the break, and in fairness, they really put it to bed in the fourth. In the end they had 31 points to spare, 12.9 to 7.8.

Mark and his team-mates will have to wait, but judging by their performance, they will be back on this stage again.

RUGBY

Ireland top the table going into the final weekend of the strangest Six Nations of all time. Let's face it, we were playing by far the weakest of the Six Nations, and we needed to put p a big total.

We were composed and controlled, with just the right amount of aggression.

Can England beat Italy by more than 24 points? Ah, stop. That's a very thin straw to be clutching, in fairness. Will that late try against Italy cost us if it comes down to scoring difference? Look, I thought the concession of that 55th minute try was worse, to be honest, a really careless attempt at a pass that almost seemed a bit contemptuous of Italy.

At least it makes it very simple. If we beat France with a bonus point, then we deserve to be champions. If we can't – and you can do all the permutations and calculations that you want – as far as I am concerned, we don't.

Munster clocked up a great win over Cardiff on Monday, with JJ Hnarahan starting and finishing a real try of the year contender.

Irish Women Start Slow But Sprint to the Finish Ireland 21 Italy 7

The Irish Women's Team, captained by Kerry's Ciara Griffin, were completely dominated by Italy early on. They only coughed up one try, but it could well have been a lot more. Being honest, I only saw the highlights, but those early highlights were frightening. Ireland did manage to get over the line in the 37th minute through Lindsey Peat and soon added another from Claire Molloy. 14-7 to Ireland, a flattering margin after a hard-fought half.

Ireland were way more assured in the second period. They struggled to put it on the board, though, until awarded a penalty try. That was how it finished, 21-7, and a happy result for Ireland and their Kerry captain.

They'll need to bring more, and a good bit more, against France in their next outing.

SOCCER Women's European Championships Ireland 0 Ukraine 1

Not only are Germany in pole position to qualify from our group, but this one is almost certain to prove fatal to our chance of a runnerup spot – Ukraine have a much easier run in, while we have to face Germany in our last game. Yes, we were desperately unlucky. Katie McCabe hit a good penalty that came off the crossbar (it was a clear penalty, but I don't agree with the complaints that the Ukraine player should have been sent off – the same people would be singing a different tune if it was an Irish player in that position) and we were even more unlucky with that unfortunate own goal that preceded it.

But, look, I think it would be doing a real disservice to women's sports to pretend that this was a great display or that luck was the only factor. We were tentative, our teamwork was very poor, and our attacks were more tentative than convincing. Ukraine were a limited side.... the blunt truth is that so were Ireland. We are, and will be, better than this.

League of Ireland

Shamrocks Rovers were the kingpins of League of Ireland back in its heyday, when you often had attendances of 30,000 for league games in Dublin. Those kinds of numbers are long, long gone (60 years or more) but Rovers (including Kerryman Gary O'Neill) are back on top after their best season in years despite the disruptions. Dundalk, still our European flagbearers, fell very much off the domestic pace in a surprisingly disappointing fashion.

Mind you, things were much worse for their main rivals over recent years. Cork City FC, double champions, have simply had a nightmare season in every respect, and last weekend their fate was sealed as they dropped out of the top division. Cork City were as close as we here had (or will likely have for quite some time to come, given the enormous expense involved) to a League of Ireland team.

HOUSE PLANTS

House plants such as Cyclamen, Azalea, Gardenia and Poinsettia give their best display this time of the year but they have to be kept in the right conditions like the right temperature and humidity level to prolong their lives into the new year and longer.

The conditions of a house environment can be a challenging place for houseplants because of central heating which is very drying to houseplants especially for ones that come from humid tropical parts of the world. There are several ways to improve conditions for your plants in the house. You can avoid placing them in draughts, especially in places where temperatures will fluctuate from very hot to very cold or in very hot areas like above or beside a radiator. Water your plants by placing them in a container of water for about twenty minutes.

For plants that need more humidity place them on a tray of gravel with some water but make sure that the plant is sitting on the gravel not the water.
