

# **WELCOME** for Kerry's stronger voice in Government

t is a huge advantage for Killarney and the county at large that two of the five Kerry TDs have been allocated key positions in the new coalition government, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce has said.

The business body said the appointment of Deputy Norma Foley as Minister for Children, Disability and Equality and Deputy Michael Healy-Rae as Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture is a very significant boost for the county and they are both well placed to make strong representations on what is needed in their home constituency.

Chamber said having four of the five Kerry TDs supporting the Government places the county in a very unique position and the business representation wished all five of the county's public representatives well in their efforts to deliver on their stated priorities.

"We would encourage them to endeavour to deliver on pre-election pledges on such projects as the new Farranfore-Killarney bypass road, the development of the former Pretty Polly site as a training college for the hospitality and tourism industry and the redevelopment of Fitzgerald Stadium," the Chamber stated.

"We know that Minister Foley, Minister of State Michael Healy-Rae and Deputies Danny Healy-Rae, Michael Cahill and Pa Daly will work long and hard and with renewed enthusiasm to deliver for Kerry.

"We have great faith in them and we assure them that Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce will support them in any way possible," the Chamber Executive added.

#### CHAMBER'S WISHLIST

Addressing the cost of doing business, greater supports for smaller operators and the need for a more intense focus on the provision of housing must be a priority for the new administration.

There is a need for more urgency with the delivery of pledges to construct a new N22 Farranfore-Lissivigeen road and the

development of a promised third level tourism and hospitality college at the former Pretty Polly site on Park Road.

The Fitzgerald Stadium redevelopment needs to be a priority to ensure that one of the country's premier and most popular sports grounds is brought up to the required standard and future proofed.

There is an urgent need for the necessary

infrastructure to tackle traffic congestion in Killarney, including the construction of a multistorey car park and new inner relief and slip roads.

Given the critical importance of Killarney National Park to Kerry, there is a requirement to sanction additional funding for the National Parks and Wildlife Service to allow hugely important projects to be brought to fruition.

# KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL SECURES FUNDING under Town Centre First Heritage Revival Scheme

Kerry County Council has announced its participation in the new THRIVE - Town Centre First Heritage Revival Scheme, an initiative co-funded by the Government of Ireland and the European Union through the ERDF Southern, Eastern and Midland Regional Programme 2021-2027.

The THRIVE programme focuses on revitalising urban centres by repurposing heritage buildings, contributing to both community renewal and heritage conservation. Under Strand 1 of the Scheme, Kerry County Council has been awarded €197,094 for each of the towns of Tralee and Killarney. This funding will be used to develop Integrated Urban Strategies and create investment-ready proposals for the adaptive reuse of a publicly owned heritage building in each town.

A2 Architects Ltd. has been appointed by Kerry County Council to deliver this project, including the development of the strategies and exploring innovative opportunities to adaptively reuse key heritage buildings in each town.

Speaking about the initiative, Jean Foley, Town Regeneration Officer said "The THRIVE programme is a fantastic opportunity to breathe new life into the heart of our towns while preserving and celebrating our rich architectural heritage. We strongly encourage everyone in the community to get involved, share their ideas, and help shape a vision that reflects the unique character and potential of Tralee and Killarney." As part of the project, public input is vital, and Kerry County Council is inviting the public to share their ideas and contribute to shaping these strategies. This is an exciting opportunity to influence the future of local heritage while tackling vacancy and dereliction in town centres.

Interactive drop-in workshops will be held in both Killarney and Tralee to present details of the project and gather feedback.





#### TOWN COUNCILS FLYING ON ONE WING?

The return of town councils is written into the new programme for Government. But will these be town councils as we knew them, fully fledged. Or will they be flying on half a wing?



"On a regional, phased basis, establish town councils in large towns to provide a focal-point for raising concerns of towns and coordinating town-focused activities," is signed off on by Messers Cahill, Healy-Rae and Ms Foley. The "corporate" style of management which has grown legs since 2014 is to be reined in too.

Much of the sentiment is in line with a thought-provoking submission by former Killarney councillor Sean O'Grady to the consultation on local democracy in 2023.

I came across Sean last week. The town councils must return to financial autonomy to strike their own rates and keep their own money - or this will not be town councils like we knew, he said.

He sent me a copy of his 2023 paper:

"Most of these town councils were not just token democratic assemblies, they were economic democratic entities answerable every five years to the electors of their towns with their own finances and budgets, " Seán wrote.

Those appointed to look into and guillotine town councils in 2014 were all men from the business sector.

They advanced "corporate culture". Saving money, not democracy, was the priority for them. (Much like Trump's America now). And we already had the poorest local democracy in Europe.

There is fairly strong stuff - and justifiably so for someone who dedicated 40 years of his life to the town council in Killarney.

My own reading of the programme for Government is the new town councils will be little more than arts and events organising committees. Nothing wrong there - Killarney Town's Arts Co-op in the late 1980s was a great body and organised lots including Killarney's first twinning with Castiglione in Sicily. It did tremendous work during its short life, as I and the editor of this paper know well! Alas, it too was replaced by a county council officer based in Tralee - but even the great Killarney arts co-op was only part of the town council, not the whole thing. Between the snow and the storm, this January is teaching us lessons about taking too quickly to fads. Those who lived through the arrival of electrification in the mid 1960s - the Black Valley was only electrified in 1976 - retained a healthy suspicion of electricity. They believed in having something "to fall back on" at all times. They would never have been caught out so badly this January. Gas, electricity, and open fires and the range were all in the mix. Electric cookers were firmly eschewed."What would I do if the electricity goes?" was the common refrain among women around Lismongane where there was a near devotion to gas and solid fuel range cooking.

One neighbour would not be connected up at all, she so distrusted the wires. Yet she baked beautiful "cakes of bread" in the cast iron pots of the open fire or the gas oven, whichever took her fancy. She had her oil lamp and water from a cold spring well. I can still get the smell of carbolic soap, snuff, lux soap flakes and cardinal red floor polish from Poll's house. Storms and power outages never bothered her. There has been a lot of arm-wrestling in recent years to go all electric. Many houses now have no chimney. Bizarrely on this wind swept island.

But is it high time we are more sceptical about all this leaning on electricity? The hike in energy prices was the first set off alarm bells.

An insulated house won't boil the kettle. And what do you do when you can't charge the electric car outside the door? And you have no water. And no fire. And no gas. And no internet.

Ken O'Neill of Milltown told me sold a lot of generators on Thursday before the storm. No wonder!

# LOTS OF NEWS IN KILLARNEY NATIONAL PARK

Planning has been granted for the raised Dinis to Torc platform and cycleway with viewing points to run along the Muckross lake.

The almost one km run is to form the final leg of a loopway around the lakes of Killarney and unless appealed within four weeks is expected to commence shortly and be completed during 2025 - if there is no appeal.

The application by the National Parks and Wildlife Service was lodged with Kerry County Council a year ago, in January 2024. But further ecological and baseline studies were undertaken by agents Malachy Walsh and Partners after requests by the council to the NPWS.

An ecologist to oversee any disturbance to the Kerry Slug is among 18 conditions imposed by Kerry County Council in the grant of planning. The plans are strongly supported by tourism interests, and the public on safety grounds, but opposed by a leading environmental consultant.

It is not the only news in Muckross: Muckross House and Farms has appointed a new general manager.

The circa 100,000 Euro a year job for a senior management position with experience in tourism was advertised last autumn and handled by a global agency with offices in Ireland, Principal Connections, which bills itself as "a top global executive search group for chief executives".

Local man Shane Treacy - he is the son of Marcus Treacy who was chair of the Trustees of Muckross House last year - has been appointed, current chair of the Trustees Bernadette Randles confirmed to me.

Staff have been informed, she said.

A good number applied from within and outside of this country. A shortlist was drawn up by Principal Connections.

An independent person sat on the interview board along with four Trustees of Muckross House, she said. The trustees whose children were shortlisted for the job and interviewed - two were in the final selection - were not on the interview panel.

The Trustees are a volunteer not for profit charity, who manage the State owned property that is Muckross House and Farms. Many people - including myself - are inclined to think it is run by the Department of Housing's NPWS who are in charge of the Killarney National Park. But this is not the case.

The general manager over 68 staff etc will be financed and report to the board of Trustees. "Everything was done in line with proper governance," Bernadette said.

The Department of Housing /NPWS have no involvement as the role is governed by the Trustees, a spokesman said.





# LETTER TO THE EDITOR

#### Active Travel Projects announcement

#### A Chara,

The National Transport Authority announced the allocation of 2.75 million euros for Active Travel projects in County Kerry.

The investments are part of the governments efforts to improve and support sustainable transport options. Such projects include bus stop enhancements and improved cycle lanes for commuters.

A sizeable amount of the funding is going to the Park Road in Killarney for cycle lanes. This will be amazing for the town, giving people safe options to cycle to work, school, town center, or the National park. However, this will only work if the new cycle lanes are connected with existing ones.

The cycle lanes on the bypass and the pike hill are all overgrown from the verges and the bike signage on the road is no longer visible. There are also large height drops for coming off and onto cycle lanes.

If the new Park Road cycle lanes could be preplanned, to connect with Pike Hill road, the Bypass, Muckross road, Rock road, Hans Liebherr road and New road, which, all have some existing cycle lanes, then this funding may well alleviate some of the traffic issues in Killarney as we await the construction of the new bypass. Any commuter using a bicycle is one less car in traffic. There are proposals for the Pretty Polly site to become an Apprenticeship / Training College, so it is important that the cycle lanes are linked in advance to this area. The same for any new housing estates in the area.

Transport for Ireland have public bicycles in Dublin, Cork , Galway and Limerick. Why not Killarney.

The funding will not stretch far given the cost of construction but preemptive linking and repair of existing cycle lanes will give people a safe commute option.

The traffic gridlock in Killarney affects the whole County so any improvements to local commute is reciprocal.

The funding is also part of a Bus Stop enhancement program . We have fantastic Local Link buses traversing the County now, so sheltered bus stops and improved signage are welcome given our climatic conditions.

Farranfore Bus stops are just one example , rusted illegible signage , no shelter , despite the fact that this village is a connectivity hub for our County Airport , a train station , South Kerry , Tralee and Killarney.


Barraduff village is another example, where there are over a 100 houses in the village but no Bus Stop.





# KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take  $\leq 20,000$  via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder  $\leq$ 45,000. Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power.

There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

# The "Mocks" are a useful trial run but the "Real" exam takes place in June

#### **MOCK EXAMS**

With CAO applications closing tomorrow, students are beginning to focus on the mock exams. The "Mocks" or "Practice Exams" are usually held in schools during February. They have nothing to do with the State Examinations Commission (SEC) and the exam papers are provided and corrected by independent educational groups. It's worth doing the mocks for the experience but don't let them distract you from the State Exams in June. Don't burn yourself out at this early stage by overestimating the mocks.

#### **OPPORTUNITY**

The mocks provide an opportunity to work on your presentation, timing, answering techniques and current knowledge. They are usually marked externally so they provide you with an impartial assessment of your state of readiness for the State Exams. It's an opportunity to see if you can deliver the required information within the time allowed on a neatly presented script.

#### LOGISTICS

Avail of the mocks to become familiar with the logistics and technicalities of each exam paper. The quality of your answering is the core of any exam so learn from the mocks how to approach each paper. Keep the content of your answer relevant to the question asked. Read each question carefully before deciding which ones to answer. Be concise, accurate and relevant. Be familiar with the format of each paper well before each exam session. Know how the paper is presented. What topics are examined? How many questions must be answered? What styles of question can you expect on the exam paper? Be familiar with the choices available on the paper. Is one or more questions compulsory? Be particularly careful about a paper, which is subdivided into subsections. Without prior knowledge of such a paper you could easily fail to address the relevant number of questions.

#### TIMING

Use the mocks to test your allocation of time. The mocks are a great time trial. Go into the mocks determined to attempt the required number of questions. Work out in advance the approximate time you have for each question. The allocation of time to each question should be proportionate to the marks available for that question. Let me emphasise that if you attempt the required number of questions, you will maximise your grade in that subject.

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

When your mock exam paper is handed to you read the instructions carefully. Spend a few minutes reading the entire paper. Keep to your pre-prepared answering plan and once you have made your choice of questions, start with a question you can answer well. When you have finished each question, reread it to ensure that you haven't omitted any part. Allow a few minutes at the end of the exam to read back over your answers and to check your numbering and presentation. Stay in the exam hall until the time is up even if you are finished early as some extra information may come to you. Every mark counts so don't leave any after you!

#### PRACTICE

When your marked mock papers are returned, go over them to identify your strengths and weaknesses as outlined above. The old maxim of making your mistakes in the mocks and getting things right in the State Exams next June is as true as ever. As the saying goes, practice makes perfect and the mocks are the perfect practice!



# WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION **& WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU** WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.



# **VISUAL DISTURBANCE**

What is visual disturbance? Visual disturbance is when you experience a short spell of flashing or shimmering of light in your sight. The symptoms normally last around twenty minutes before your sight returns to normal. Usually, there is no headache during the visual disturbance. A visual disturbance should not be confused with a retinal or ocular migraine where there is a partial or total loss of vision in one eye, normally with a headache.

# Who is affected by visual disturbance?

Visual disturbance is a common condition among people who are affected by migraines, although they can affect anyone.

Visual disturbances tend to be more common in:

- women
- people aged under 40
- people aged over 60
- people with a personal or family history of migraines

# What are the symptoms of visual disturbance?

• Flashes of light

These may start in the periphery of your sight, and become larger and more central (Some people experience the opposite, starting as a tiny dot centrally and become a bigger arc as they reach the periphery) They may be black and white or brightly coloured

Typically described as a zigzagging pattern, or giving

the appearance of shards of glass

They may be apparent when your eyes are shut

• The disturbance affects your sight and both eyes are affected.

• There is no headache during the disturbance

• The visual disturbance last around 20-30 minutes

# How do you treat visual disturbance?

Firstly, do not panic; visual disturbances can be frightening, but in most cases are short lived. If you are driving or operating machinery, stop what you are doing and wait for the symptoms to go away. Make a note of your symptoms, how long they lasted and what you were doing just before they began. In most cases, there is a common trigger and keeping a diary of symptoms can help work out what the trigger is. Simply avoiding the trigger, where possible, may be all you need to do.

Common triggers include:

stresstiredness

flashing or flickering lights (including driving through a row of trees in bright sunlight)
glare

- exercise
- bending over
- dehydration
- certain foods such as
- chocolate, cheese or alcohol • excessive heat

"Planning laws and Wastewater Treatment issues are two major obstacles that must be dealt with. If we crack these two nuts, we will be heading in the right direction on housing unit supply" added Councillor Cahill.





Scotts Lakers will always remember the Titans of the 2024/25 season and will probably be the first to admit that they are glad to see the back of them. Three times the sides have met and on all three occasions the spoils have gone the way of the Westerners. The latest, played in the Ballyfoyle Community Centre, will probably be the one they will rue the most as it was a game that they were capable of winning, provided they played to form. But their mojo deserted them, especially at the offensive end, where they struggled to get any momentum going.

The Lakers are the best defensive side in the league, with the stats to back it up. The concession of 73 points is below their average and actually bolsters their positions. But they left their shooting hands at home and no doubt Coach Manuel Suarez will spend the week coming, getting that back up and running after this experience. It was a curious game with neither side at their optimum and it was the Titans who made the game winning move early in the fourth quarter that sealed the points

Suarez concluded "It was a really tough game, we couldn't be consistent on both sides and we mixed very good moments on defense with bad offenses and totally the opposite with good runs of scoring but conceding easy baskets. We need to keep working as a team and bounce back to get a win at home next weekend against Carrick Cruisers". He was happy with their effort though.

"The team fought till the end and that's also important. We need to be conscious of how difficult it is to get a win on the road and mostly against a good team like the Titans." The Lakers would have targeted a fast start but it was the Titans American star Michael Hayes who struck first with Joseph Coughlan following it up with a three. Coughlan was in fine form early hitting another from outside the arc but Darnell Snyers, Mikah Blackwell and Eoin Carroll looked sharp early on to get the Lakers into the conversation. The Titans had in Fortune Igbokwe, Victor Tashev and Declan Gbinigie three Irish underage Internationals and they brought a huge

physicality to the court making scores hard earned. Abdul Oladipupo and Jamie O Suliivan did try hard off the bench and Mark Sheehan did slide past them to have the Lakers only four in arrears at the end of the first quarter, 18-14, and significantly Hayes was in foul trouble for the Titans.

The Lakers tried to get the game going through Blackwell, Snyers and Sheehan but the Titans squad was all contributing on the scoresheet with Brendan Hardiman and Michael Gormley helping them into a 33-20 lead. John Hughes joined the Lakers and a mini scoring run from Snyers and Carrollcup the gap to eight. Gormley and Hardiman did the needful for the hosts again but baskets from Jack O Sullivan and Rui Saravia (3) gave the Lakers a feel for the game at half time, 38-30 in arrears.

The third quarter saw the Lakers hold the Titans to just ten points, who no doubt were missing the influence of Hayes. That should have been the foundation for them to close the gap but Blackwell had his own foul trouble as well. The Lakers did create good scoring opportunities and just couldn't convert them, going 4 for 22 from the field. Saravia and Snyers did net early but it wasn't until Jack O Sullivan hit a three that they started to get going. They say it takes the hammer of persistence to drive the nail of success. Utility Trust St Pauls certainly had the handle of the hammer in their possession on Saturday afternoon as they drove home the win over 2024 National Cup champions Brunell in a thriller in a packed Presentation Gym. And you could have forgiven them if they decided to down tools early in the fourth quarter as they sat ten points behind the Cork side. But instead they redoubled their effort and whipped up a rousing finale to eke out a 71-70 win.

Six times this season between league and cup games, James Fleming's side have come out on the wrong side of a tight scoreline so the nature of this victory will certainly please them. Their performances against some of the top teams in the country have deserved more but when the fat is in the fire you have to come up with the match winning moments. Denise Dunlea, Mathilde Diop and Gracen Kerr provided those at vital stages, none more so than Kerr in that late drive.

Brunell, under Kerryman Liam Culloty, are a wily side best exemplified by the promptings of Irish International Edel Thornton. She cajoled her troops early with Trinity Hudson and Lauryn Homan settling them into a 7-4 early lead. The introduction of Denise Dunlea and Rheanne O'Shea helped to up the ante for St Pauls. Lorraine Scanlon did her usual tidy work inside to make it 10-7 but it was in defense that Dunlea made her presence felt. Twice she stole the ball, firstly helping Kerr to a basket and then finishing one off for herself.

She escaped their attention though late in the quarter to make it 20 a piece, with Megan O Leary and Ava Walshe netting from outside for Brunell.

The second quarter was equally tight initially with Kerr, Wittinger and Scanlon keeping their side in front. That lead was embellished by Dunlea from outside but Brunell was starting to turn the screw. Danielle O Leary and Hudson got them within one, 33-32 but Thornton then picked up the baton, her direction helping Brunell into a 40-34 half time lead with points courtesy of Lauryn Homan.

The third guarter was tense with neither side hitting top form but what it lacked in quality it more than made up for in intensity. Wittinger got the kind of security detail usually reserved for a Papal visit but worked hard for her team and crucially came up with sixteen rebounds throughout the game. Brunell were able to extend their lead early with a Thornton three with Kerr and Diop replying. The Leesiders were starting to show their knowhow with slick play from Kelly Sexton and Danielle O Leary and it took five points from Captain Dunlea to keep her side in the race. The lead now stood at eight, 53-45 in favour of Brunell, and the best was yet to come

Brunell started the final quarter well with Homan and Hudson netting but Kerr was back on court having retired late in the previous quarter with a facial injury. And she returned like a woman on a mission. She hit eight swift points to close the gap to five but that was extended again by Thornton. But the momentum swing had started with Diop and Wittinger giving it more traction. With 4.20 left to play Lorraine Scanlon three point play really had the crowd involved and Kerr stole in to level with 3.30 on the clock. Kelly Sexton hit one from the free throw line before Kerr hit a three that came closer to lifting the roof off the gym than any storm could.That gave her side a two point lead but there was still work to be done.

It took two monumental blocks from Diop to deny Thornton what looked like certain scores while Kerr helped to maintain the two point advantage. With the clock ticking down Wittinger took advantage of a clever set play to make it 71-67 and the game nearly in the red. But the drama didn't end there. Danielle O Leary hit a three to make it a one point game and from the resultant restart Brunell turned over the ball, only to be called for a travelling offence, much to the relief of the bumper crowd. # LATE GOAL SURGE COSTS KERRY LADIES

LADIES DIVISION ONE: ARMAGH 3-11 KERRY 1-13

Last year Armagh beat a relatively subdued Kerry in the league itself and then handled us with relative ease in the League Final. I thought at the time that they controlled the channels superbly. Kerry absorbed their lesson and came back a lot stronger in the championship, while Armagh failed to kick on. In a way, this defeat to open Mark Bourke's managerial reign feels almost a bit worse, because this was a frustrating one. The truth is that last year we were beaten fair and square. This year we were actually the better side overall and played more of the football but were badly caught as Armagh careened through for three goals, two of which were definitely preventable in my opinion, while Kerry had good chances of their own but couldn't capitalise - fair play to Anna Carr in the Armagh goal. Full disclosure, I was in Mallow at the Corn uí Mhuirí semi-finals and watched TG4 on my laptop. As good as the coverage is - and TG4 is a brilliant service you simply don't have the same overview of proceedings.

Arrah, kit's not ,like this one required the analytical genius of a Sherlock Holmes – or a Professor Moriarty for that matter. We played

well and we lost. Kerry are obviously going to be in a bit of a transition phase this year, and the All Ireland champions are always on a pedestal to be shot at by every other team - it's not like we weren't watching Dublin like hawks last year. I'm genuinely not all that concerned by the result. At this time of year, I wouldn't even be panicking over performance, let alone result. The bones are there. Of course, Armagh will say the same thing; they'll be disappointed with last year's championship and quite rightly have ambitions of a title. Did they maybe go too hard too early last year? We didn't, we rested quite a few players during the National League and threw others in at the deep end, and I felt it paid off in the long run.

This happens every year, and every year I am preaching the same thing – it's January, and any analysis of any team is over-analysis. I know papers never refuse ink and media monoliths need to be fed – many a journalist is thanking the stars for the new rules in the mens' game, that will fill a lot of column inches in mostly uninteresting ways – but once again, January. Wake me up in the second week of April and I'll start paying attention. Kerry had the wind – on reflection, we might have been better off against it in the first half, but that's easy to say in hindsight - but Armagh drew first blood with a fine score by Eimear McGeown. Siofra O'Shea was looking dynamic for Kerry and soon had us on level terms after good work by an impressive Anna Galvin and then nudged us in front. Armagh's Niamh Reel cancelled that out. Good football on both sides.

Eve Lavery and Niamh Reel put Armagh two to the good. Early days, but the visitors were definitely looking clinical in testing conditions for football (I don't know what it was like in Austin Stack Park, but in Mallow it was so cold that brass monkeys were running away in terror). A good run by Aoife Dillane saw Rachel Dwyer trim it back to one point.

The experienced Lavery kicked another good point but Kerry were growing into the game. A great move saw Siofra O'Shea do what she does best and raise a green flag. Jadyn Lucey followed up with a point before Mary Ellen Bolger denied Eimear McGowan with a stupendous save.

Kerry were well on top now and a Siofra O'Shea brace (1f) and Anna Galvin again saw us lead by 1-7 to 0-5 at half-time. I'd be guessing that there was at least a three point swing in that wind, but I thought Kerry were playing a lot of really nice, fast football.

Anna Galvin burst forward for an inspirational score to open the second half. Armagh, to their credit, came back fast and hard. Eve Lavery and Blaithín Mackin are regular scorers for them. McGeown is a new enough name to me, but she looks like a very serious talent and her point was taken as confidently as anyone's. Good player and a name worth remembering, I suspect. Just a goal in it at this stage.

Kerry had two chances to score a second goal through Siofra O'Shea and Jadyn Lucey, but Anna Carr was equal to both. Great goalkeeping. Carr was nominated for an All Star last year with good reason.


Siofra O'Shea made it 1-13 to 0-9. There's no nice way to say this, and nobody in the Kerry camp needs me to say it anyway (they can be plenty hard enough on themselves) but the unpalatable truth is that you shouldn't be losing a game from that position.

Carr was one of the key factors, making another great save to deny Niamh Ní Chonchúir. Should she have gone for the point? Was Mark Bourke wrong to start using his subs' bench?

Arrah, I hate that kind of pseudo-analysis. Res ipsa loquitar, 'the thing speaks for itself'. When you know the result, there is a tendency to treat it as a conclusion. Kerry lost 'because they went for goals' or 'they ran their bench too early'. Rubbish. There are a

myriad of factors why a team loses - or wins, for that matter. Knowing one thing doesn't make it the main factor. I've been involved in selecting various teams of the year and teams of the championship etc. - they are meat and drink to every journalist because they are entirely subjective. In every single case, the All Stars always being an obvious one, the winning team usually has over half of the final team selected. Logic be damned. It perpetuates the appalling myth that a great team must be composed of individually great players, whereas I genuinely believe that ordinary but intelligent and genuinely committed players link up to form the best teams. Abstract philosophy, I suppose, but 'greatest' is a different thing to 'most skillful' or 'strongest' or 'fastest', and 'greatest' is attainable by every player. To me, it's the whole point of sporting endeavour and speaks to a base value of the human condition.

Not that Mark or any of his players would thank me much for my dissertation on sporting philosophy. Not in the circumstances.

Niamh Reel with two points. I don't know if it's a real thing or just something in my own head, but the amount of games I've seen at all grades where Northern teams simply have more power than us approaching the finishing line of games is a worrisome trend, and this was another case in point.

It was all Armagh from here on in. Naimh Reel with a brace of points. Blaithín Mackin shimmied her way through a plethora of defenders and neatly fired home a goal. I'm sorry now, but that was much, much too easy. It was about to get worse for Kerry, much worse. A stunning run by Emily Druse, genuinely stunning, and a simple lay-off to Rebecca Cunningham. Great goal. In fairness, sheer class, I wouldn't blame the defence for that one. Just like that, Kerry were down a point – but there was plenty of time left for an equaliser at least.

Today just wasn't one of those days. With Kerry retreating, Armagh had time for that slow outside build-up that they love – something to note there for later on in the year – followed by a fast break. Lovely layoff by Caoimhe McNally to Roisín Mulligan, and a superb finish. Mary Ellen got a good hand to it, but the shot had both precision and power.

Six points up to four down, and that was how it finished. Tough one to take but as I say, I'm more happy about the performance than disappointed with the result.

# KERRY V DONEGAL POSTPONED

Hmmm. Lot of questions about this one. Of course you can't quibble with safety – nobody got hurt, and that's always top priority. I'm not and never would question that. But there were rumours – granted, on social media, not exactly the true metric of this confused disinformation age – about the game being called off from late Thursday evening. Mind you, I was extremely dismissive of them at that stage – this is the time of year for rumour-mongers.

But an individual with a lot of credibility certainly posted that the game was off on Friday evening. That was promptly denied by Donegal GAA.

I don't know exactly when it was confirmed that the game was, in fact, postponed, but I heard it around 10.00am on Saturday. Exactly when was the decision made? Now, I'm not swinging straight into conspiracy theories, both Elvis and JFK have told me over the Christmas break how much they detest that guff. But exactly when was that decision taken? Put it this way, I'd be feeling a lot stronger about it if it had been Kerry travelling, and I feel that we would have managed the journey.

Donegal hurlers were able to travel to Meath, their ladies' team were able to travel to Clare, and club side Naomh Pádraig were able to travel – albeit apparently they all travelled earlier on the Saturday, before another fall of snow. Don't mind looking askance at me; I'm only reporting what was officially stated. A good few Donegal supporters were able to travel on Saturday. I can confirm meeting a good few of them on Saturday night, nice people, understandably a bit unhappy with the circumstances.

As I say, safety must of course prevail, but all of the circumstantial evidence isn't kind to this one. I can't help thinking that last year Donegal also had a bit of a contretemps over fielding a U18 player around this time of year. Just unnecessary stuff. Business should be handled better in my opinion.

Look, no great harm from a Kerry perspective. We'll have players able to line out in the Sigerson, a great competition that is much too squeezed for me (I'm open to correction but I don't think we have anybody left in the Fitzgibbon?) and lads from Crokes, Stacks, and injury rehab will be returning in the meantime. The game is likely to be rescheduled for the weekend of February 8th as I understand it. Unfortunately, that means playing a bit of catch-up, and Kerry playing for at least five weeks in a row.

Which brings me to the main crux. Personally I don't mind games being off at this time of year. I'd actually like if there was nothing at all on at this time of year.

January, and already games are coming far too thick and too fast. I'm sorry now, but this is absolutely outright ridiculous. Teams are playing competitive games while trying to get their heavy work done for the inter-county season. U20s and minors are 'rumoured' to be playing challenge games. The third level competitions are on mid week. Along with National League in both codes and the latter stages of the post primary schools.

There was nothing scheduled for the Connaught Centre of Excellence last weekend. Or Tralee Sports Centre.I wonder why.....oh yeah. It's because Irish weather in January and February has been steadily getting worse. Even mensa aspirants like Sarah Palin, Pier Morgan, and Sammy Wilson are changing their tones on climate change. Meanwhile, the GAA (and both soccer and rugby) are expanding their playing schedules in recent years. The GAA have adjusted their playing rules for gaelic football - it's early for judgement but most certainly does look good. But January is crammed with games? While they stubbornly persist with the age change to U20 and U17 because of 'burnout'? As I have said, analysing any team at this time of year is a pointless exercise. Even the evaluation of the new playing rules is a bit dubious. This isn't anything like championship football. And any team that is actually geared up for championship at this time of year has zero hope - I repeat, absolutely zero - of featuring in the latter stages of an All Ireland senior championship.

Seriously, look at NFL. That really is one of the most gruelling and demanding professional sports on the planet. Does this match their playing schedule? It does not, they play 17 games in 18 weeks....because their bodies could not possibly maintain more (I'm not suggesting that gaelic games are as physically demanding, but it certainly isn't yoga either). NNBA and NHL do play more games...frankly, there's too many dross games in the NBA as well as far as I am concerned.

I'll watch the National League games, as much to adjust my own understanding of the new patterns of play as any genuine interest. I'd like Kerry to blood a few – and just a few, I'm sorry, but we are talking up some young talents far too much and I'm not sure if people can actually grasp the huge leap from club to inter-county level – new players. I'd like us to stay up – although I've never believed that the League actually has that much impact on the Championship any more, too big a training gap. In fact, I think coming from a relatively easier Division Two appeared to suit teams better for championship in the last couple of years.

A game between Kerry and Donegal postponed? Nobody will be talking about it in a month's time. It doesn't feel right to me, but that isn't really worth any fight. I wouldn't even call it a scuffle, to be honest. There are bigger nettles and a lack of willingness to grab them.

And....I know. I already know I will basically be copying and pasting this exact same article next year because the grumbles will die down as the year moves along and we'll end up exactly where we are next January as well. And I guarantee you right now that the weather isn't going to improve.

When I say cold, I mean that I genuinely found it extremely difficult to type. It made little difference to Mounthawk's fulcrum, with Ben Murphy opening the second half account and Daniel Kirby teeing up Paddy Lane for another. A Lane free made it 1-16 to 0-1. Jack Cullinane finally got Bandon's first score from play, a real beauty by Jack Cullinane, and Kevin Hannon added another from the kick-out. Look, nobody's pretending that there was any danger of the game suddenly exploding into a dramatic finale, but credit to Bandon for the character that they showed. Paddy Lane exchanged scores with Bandon midfielder Oisín Gillain.

A foul on Daniel Kirby in the square saw Paddy Lane saw him drill a penalty into the botto corner of the net and another point took his personal tally to a phenomenal 1-11 before Ben Murphy closed out Mercy Mounthawk's account. Oisín McCarthy had one last free for Bandon as they bowed out gracefully.

Once again Mercy Mounthawk will be going in as favourites against Kerry opposition as they bid to make history by retaining their Coen uí Mhuirí crown. On this showing against a good Bandon team, very few would bet against them.

The introduction of substitutes Blaithín Mackin, who struck for 1-1, and Rebecca Cunningham, with a goal, made all the difference, whilst Anna Carr in the Armagh goal was also in superb form.

TG4 All-Ireland Senior champions Kerry had the advantage of the wind in the first half but It was Armagh, the Lidl NFL Division 1 holders, that made the brighter start when late replacement Eimear McGeown popped over in the first minute, although Kerry were soon on level terms when Síofra O'Shea slotted a free following a foul on captain Anna Galvin.

In a repeat of last year's top-flight decider, and in the first competitive game between the sides since the 2024 TG4 All-Ireland semi-final, O'Shea put the Kingdom 0-2 to 0-1 to the good in the fifth minute but Niamh Reel showed her abilities when she replied two minutes later for the visitors to level matters.

Reel then slotted a free that she earned herself and Armagh went two to the good with Reel once again doing the damage, although Rachel Dwyer did get one back for the hosts after a fine run and assist by the marauding Aoife Dillane. Eve Lavery stretched Armagh's advantage to two in the 18th minute but from here on Kerry dominated the half, with Síofra O'Shea striking for a brilliant goal in the 20th minute after excellent approach play from the impressive Niamh Ní Chonchúir and Jadyn Lucey. Lucey followed up with a score of her own, but

The rest of the half belonged to Kerry and Siofra O'Shea with two (one free) and Anna Galvin saw them take a 1-7 to 0-5 lead in at the half time break.

Galvin went on a fine run and score from the second half throw-in but Armagh struck for three points on the trot from Eve Lavery, Eimear McGeown and Blaithín Mackin, fresh off the bench, made it a 1-8 to 0-8 game.

Carr made a fine double save from Síofra O'Shea and Jadyn Lucey, but Lucey saw yellow straight afterwards for a high challenge.

When O'Shea pointed for Kerry in the 45th

The last goal of the contest came from Roisin Mulligan as Armagh had too much in the finish for a Kerry team that faded in the last quarter.





## PLANTS FOR SHADE

Most gardens have a shady spot, a north facing wall, under a tree or in the shadow of the house. There is a huge range of plants to suit shaded areas including broad- leaved foliage plants, to spring flowers and ever green flowering shrubs. Ferns are probably the first plant you would think of when it comes to shade — you can choose from a wide range of ferns from dwarf, medium or large. Ferns look very natural when planted under a tree or beside a wall. Most ferns will die back for the winter so if you want all year round foliage you will need to plant something evergreen near the ferns i.e something low growing like the Viburnum Davidii which is a great plant when planted in groups of three. Another good evergreen plant for the shade is the Heuchera which comes in lovely shades including dark to light purple and green to light green.

There is also a wide range of flowering plants for shade. A good example is an Astilbe, an Astilbe has a good range of flower colours and foliage to choose from. A good plant for this would a plant called Vinca Minor which is an evergreen flowering ground cover plant. But remember to water until established.



"He came into the very world He created, but the world didn't recognise Him. He came to His own people, and even they rejected Him. But to all who believed Him and accepted Him, He gave the right to become children of God" (John 1:10-12 NLT).

Welcome back dear student, have you ever felt unaccepted, or been rejected? It's a huge cause of physical and mental sickness and torment. The Lord Jesus knows what it feels like. "He was despised and rejected: a Man of sorrows acquainted with deep grief" (Isaiah 53:3). When a member of a royal family comes to visit there is great pomp, ceremony, and fuss. However, when the King of all kings came to this earth He entered in humility as a newborn baby. He grew up strong in God's Word (Luke 2:40). When He ventured out in ministry He was mocked, rejected, and despised - an outcast in the eyes of those who supposedly knew all about Him. The gift of sonship - adoption into God's family as His children – totally washed and cleansed from sin, redeemed from the power of death and destruction (Romans 8:15-16). You don't need the latest procedure or cream to find renewal friend. That's a ploy by Satan that will keep you searching and striving for all of your life. The Scripture continues "...they are reborn, not with a physical birth resulting from human passion or plan, but a birth that comes from God" (John 1:13; John 3:3-16). Later Paul confirmed this saying "anyone who belongs to Christ is a new creation" (2 Corinthians 5:16-18).

One thing about rejection is very often the person affected has rejected themself most of all. Listening to and believing the lies of the devil causes one to NOT accept oneself. Everything in life boils down to what Jesus said are the greatest commandments. 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and mind....and love your neighbour as you love yourself' (Matthew 22:37-39). You cannot love either God or others if you do not love yourself' (Matthew 22:37-39). The current worldwide identity crisis and confusion is a result of people not knowing the True God: His love, or His purpose for them, causing a self-obsession: 'me, myself and I'. God's gift of Salvation is received through accepting and believing in Jesus His Son, the spotless Lamb of God. He is the 'Way, the Truth and the Life', and He is the Gate through which we enter the Kingdom of God, totally accepted as His beloved (John 10:7; John 14:6). Give your whole heart to the Lord Jesus, accept Him, study His Word, and be filled with His Peace.
