A Celebration of

Irish and American Friendship

he centuries old bonds of friendship that exist between Killarney and the American people will be appropriately acknowledged on Thursday, 4th July – a day close to the hearts of US citizens just as St Patrick's Day is considered very special by people in Killarney and Ireland.

During the preparations for this year's event, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce was contacted by members of the Killarney For Palestine group who voiced concerns about this year's traditional 4th July Festival proceeding, given the conflict in Gaza.

The Chamber Executive met with the individuals involved, on two occasions, and remained in contact in an effort to reach a solution acceptable to both groups.

The sentiments voiced by the Killarney For Palestine group are acknowledged, fully appreciated and understood and Chamber members have been equally disturbed and horrified by the dreadful events occurring in Gaza.

It is important for Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce to stress, however, that it is not and never has been a political organisation and it has no political affiliations whatsoever.

Given the circumstances, a decision has been taken to completely rebrand this year's midsummer celebration to A Celebration of Irish and American Friendship and, following the representations made to Chamber, many of the events organised and enjoyed in previous years will not take place this year.

The following changes to the programme have been implemented:

• There will be no free open air big movie experience on the grounds of Killarney House • There will be no live open air free concert prior to the parade

 $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ There will be no outdoor ceremony at the town hall

• Festival memorabilia and statues will not be displayed on the streets

There will be no fireworks display

With the 100-year celebration of the opening of Killarney National Park scheduled for 2032, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce last year initiated a project to celebrate the generosity of the Bourne-Vincent and McShain families who gifted the park to the people.

On that occasion Killarney marked the amazing gesture by both families with a celebration of music, song, poetry and drama at a special

Killarney will always be extremely grateful to the Bourne Vincent and McShain families, not only for Muckross Estate and Killarney House and Gardens, but for the gift of Inisfallen Island, Ross Castle and 8,000 acres of parkland, mountains and lake.

This year further events are being arranged to reflect on just what the park has meant to the town and its people and the very special attraction it has become.

Both families will be celebrated and remembered at a colourful street parade which has been a hugely popular summertime feature in Killarney for the past 11 years.

It will feature spectacular floats, marching bands, dancers, cheerleaders, colourful movie characters and so much more.

Over the years, children have lined the streets to meet and greet their favourite Disney characters, beautiful princesses, cartoon favourites and all the colour and fun the parade brings to the town centre.

The gala parade attracts thousands of people to town and it creates a real party atmosphere and a wonderful midsummer boost for local businesses.

This year, also, there is an opportunity to reflect

on and remember the estimated six million Irish people who have emigrated to the US since 1820, at least a third of whom fled from the Great Famine of 1845-1852, and their descendants now proudly describe themselves as Irish American.

Chamber wishes to stress that this will be a celebration in recognition of the American people who have been great and loyal friends to Killarney for longer than most people in the town can remember.

Chamber's function is to support, promote and help develop business and tourism in the town through community-based events, including a number of festivals, such as Wander Wild, the St Patrick's Festival and Christmas in Killarney.

Almost €200,000 in funding for Killarney town centre

HOUSING, IMMIGRATION, **TRAFFIC, ROADS - THE BIG KILLARNEY ISSUES**

St Kevin's former Mental Hospital has been transformed and the first of almost 270 homes are on track to be delivered next year with creche and other facilities by the Land Development Agency. Gutted by a fire in 2017, the landmark structure was stabilised and saved.

Overlooking the Lee, it has some of the best views of Cork. Not unlike our St Finan's, a similar institution, and structure, whose views of Killarney are unparalleled. But alas that is where the comparison ends.

It appears our landmark building is caught between State bodies - all suffering from deep inertia.

I can see why Kerry County Council could not take on the 100 million euro project from the HSE - but surely they could be more proactive and set up a team to drive it given the housing and the refugee need.

The 2014 Local Government Act badly needs revision to send councils back to the basics of housing and roads; we really don't need to have local authorities distracted by tourism which has enough State agencies from Failte Dhuibhne Tommy Griffin is piling the

to Tourism Ireland looking after that industry anyway.

Immigration is a huge issue on the doors, candidates of all parties and none tell me. We were a country with no immigration until 20 years ago. We handled it well. But the huge volume over a short period in the past two to three years, thanks to our Government, and no opposition, and the no questions asked handout of benefits like medical cards, pensions and social welfare and accommodation/housing - thinas very difficult to obtain by Irish people - has sown division even among the immigrant communities who came here to work.

In Kerry there is also the dire effect on our biggest industry, tourism. And on our pitiful GP and health services.

All this was forecast - and written about by the likes of myself in this column - but yet no Kerry TD or Government representative or opposition TD and few local politicians shouted stop! To be fair to Michael Healy-Rae, he called for a cap on the numbers of Ukrainians, regardless of his contract to house them.

I don't know who exactly decided to smother any kind of debate. Or why. But now we find ourselves at an uncomfortable, dangerous pass.

Traffic management is the other big issue in Killarney and as we go to press, mayor of Killarney Niall Kelleher has called an emergency meeting on this decades old Killarney problem.

Rural roads are simply too busy for walking or cycling, cars are going too fast and residents well outside the town are now seeking ramps, Marie Moloney told me.

Speaking of roads, candidate in Corca

pressure on Kerry County Council on the Local Improvement Scheme. He has now obtained the square metre figure for doing up local roads in the Kerry v Mayo road race. Sources tell me there is only patching going on in Mayo while in Kerry whole roads are done. We await the explanation.

THE BATTLE FOR KILLARNEY

The battle for seats in Killarney will be down to the wire and the large Ukrainian community will have a say in determining one - if not two - seats.

There is a decisive block of votes. The new register is now well over the 1,584 election quota of 2019 in Killarney and it is believed much of this is Ukrainian.

Now not all the Ukrainians will vote for their own candidate. I am also hearing.

There seems to be strong support for Fine Gael candidate Dermot Healy among the Ukrainian community; die-hard Fine Gael supporters in the Killarney LEA now that Simon Harris is in charge of the party are energised too. The speculation is FG will take back the seat. But whose seat might Dermot take?

The Bangladeshi community is also energised with two candidates, both well known in the wider community. The real test of the Ukrainian and Bangladeshi communities will be how well they manage the Proportionate Representational (PR) system and will they manage vote transfers with other candidates. Donal Grady and Maura Healy-Rae both had hundreds of first preference Bangladeshi votes last time round, I am reliably told. The number twos and threes will be just as valuable this time, with 17 candidates for seven seats in Killarney.

DINIS COME BACK

We got word last week that Dinis was to open in early June. The outcry by the public in Killarney had the desired effect and the blunt closure order was rescinded. We are all grateful to the powers that be and doff our cap.

Certainly it was a big issue on the doorstep, and Mayor Niall Kelleher is claiming credit for introducing the new tenants to Dinis.

At any rate, the stark "closed for the season" post on the National Park facebook page was taken down and this has now been replaced with one drooling in sentiment, heading:

"The beloved Dinis Cottage Tea Room on Muckross Lake, Killarney National Park, is reopening for the summer season on Saturday, 1st June, 2024 at 10.00 am."

(Some might call this a climbdown but we are too gracious!)

It seems the generator was fixed. Ed Lacey and Oona Tibbetts from a water sports background are in place.

According to the post, they are "passionate about the environment and Killarney National Park. They hope to serve the finest local produce for the season ahead."

There is an accompanying picture by the various men involved in the national park management and the various men involved in commercial boating.

The reopening of the Dinis Cottage is particularly welcomed by the traditional boatmen who operate on the Lakes of Killarney.

Ed and Oona said: "We're really looking forward to the challenge this summer, what a beautiful setting on Dinis Island, Dinis Cottage has such character, we love hearing the stories of the engravings of rings on the Victorian window. Of course the famous cakes by the late great Betty Crosbie, we hope we can live up to all the past operators."

Leading industry figures echoed Griffin's sentiments on the day, emphasising the course's impact on the Irish film and television industry. The course is designed to equip learners with the skills and knowledge necessary to excel in content development and screenwriting across film and television.

Elaine Geraghty managing director of Ardmore Studios and Troy Studios said "The course the Deputy is talking about is one with which we are very familiar. A point relevant to why we are here today is that it would be great if a college or institute in Kerry could be the feeder school for a much wider region."

Mr. Gar O'Brien-Collins, Western Region Audiovisual Production executive said "I agree with the Deputy on the course. That course and the students coming out of it are important."

Counting on the lads to know their numbers

Back again for 2024 is the free Men's Health at the Mart awareness day, being held alongside the sheep at the Mid-Kerry mart in Milltown on June 11, from 10am-2.30pm. All are welcome – men themselves and those who care about men's health.

The annual mart event is held as part of Men's Health Week 2024 (June 10-16) which also features four local pharmacies offering free health checks - O'Doherty's Pharmacy in Milltown; along with Mulvihill's Pharmacy, Haven Pharmacy O'Sullivan's and Laune Pharmacy in Killorglin.

There will be a number of different health professionals, service providers and community groups in attendance at Milltown Mart on June 11 and the day will include a performance from the Killorglin Men's Social Club Choir. The 2024 theme for Men's Health Week is 'Know your Numbers' in an attempt to increase awareness of the key numbers that policy makers, service providers, men and important people in men's lives need to know. Sometimes, these relate to medical issues (e.g. blood pressure), but they also include the key statistics on the state of men's health (or ill-health) in Ireland, as well as the contact numbers for helpline and support services that can maintain men's health.

The free mart event and health checks in south Kerry are being organised by the Health Promotion & Improvement Department in HSE Cork Kerry Community Healthcare; in partnership with Enhanced Community Care, Public Health Nursing, Community Work, South Kerry Development Partnership CLG, Killorglin Family Resource Centre, Social Prescribers and the Men's Social Club in Killorglin.

IT'S OFFICIAL Killarney National Park is first in the Country & 9th In Europe

513 Species - 899 Observations - 11 Observers

The results from Europe are in! And what a great result for Killarney National Parks, Conservation Rangers, General Operatives, Education Staff, and many volunteers who came together at the weekend to take part in the Natura 2000 'BioBlitz' celebration 2024, the highlight of Biodiversity week in Killarney National Park. Killarney National Park managed to top the poll in Ireland, with a massive 513 species identified, 899 observations, with 11 observers! The National Park came 9th overall in Europe, while Veluwe National Park in the Netherlands came first - with 1472 species, having a huge advantage of 1515 observers at the weekend! The BioBlitz day is a friendly competition with fellow European nature sites and reserves to help identify and record as many species in one day. A record number of species were confirmed by Chris Barron and the education team, who were also on hand to help identify and record the Killarney National Park results.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take $\leq 20,000$ via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000. Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power.

There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

The Fifth Class pupils in Ms. Olwyn Trant's completed the school courtyard revamp project with Resident Artist, Darragh Kinch as part of "Creative Ireland's" BLAST initiative. BLAST, Bringing Live Arts to Students and Teachers, is a key Department of Education initiative of the Creative Youth Plan 2023-2027 which aims to foster a "creativity in schools" focus and to provide young people with opportunities to learn and develop the key skills and competencies of collaboration, critical thinking, problem-solving, and innovation. This initiative builds upon the prior experience of the pupils and also enlists the expertise of a resident artist to work directly with the pupils and their teachers.

"We were extremely grateful to work with the very creative and talented Mr. Darragh Kinch of 'Kinch Design Studio' this year. He worked with the pupils on lateral thinking exercises as well as collaboration of their own ideas for their space and unifying them into a cohesive design." said teacher and school coordinator of the BLAST project, Mrs Rhonda Healy. Darragh worked with the children to greatly enhance the existing "Suaimnheas" wellness space as part of our commitment to promoting pupil wellbeing. It is intended that it will be used as an outdoor classroom, with a space for sensory experiences. How to use technology to track training intensity

A lot of people nowadays use smart watches to track lots of things like step count, sleep and hear rate to mention just a few but when it comes to training are you using your smart watch in the smartest way possible for you?

Using your smart watch to monitor your heart rate while training may be useful for you. The thing is that depending on your device you may be getting a lot of information but it could be a case of you "can't see the wood for the trees" with the amount of info it actually gives you and what info you really need to look at the track your training intensity.

So what if we look at some of the basic information that you are receiving:

 Resting heart rate – exactly what you think it is, it is your heart rate while not taking part in any activity. This can vary from 60bpm to 100bpm but the fitter you are the lower the number
 Recovery heart rate – the amount of time required to return to resting heart rate after vigourous activity

• Maximum Heart Rate – again this is exactly what you think it is, the fastest that your heart rate can go. Some devices may not display this for you so if it doesn't the easiest way to calculate your max heart rate is to use the age based formula; 220- your age = Max heart rate

So for example for a 50 year old it would be 220-50 – 170, so for this person their maximum heart rate would be 170bpm.

We can now utilize this information with regard to training intensity as we can now tie our training intensity to different heart rate zones depending what it is we want to achieve.

HOW TO TREAT EYE ALLERGIES

Allergic conjunctivitis is commonly caused by sensitivity to grass and tree pollen, dust mites or animals. It is far more common in those with a history of allergies or those who have a family history of allergies. **Symptoms**

Allergic conjunctivitis usually causes pink or red itchy eyes. The eyes are normally watery and other allergy symptoms such as sneezing and a runny nose may be present.

The seasonal type of allergic conjunctivitis will vary with the time of year and weather conditions. Those with more general allergies, such as an allergy to dust mites, will most likely have symptoms throughout the year.

TREATMENT

You can treat allergic conjunctivitis by:

• Avoiding the cause of the allergy (if possible)

• Using cold compresses (such as clean cotton wool balls soaked in cold water) to soothe the eyes

Avoiding rubbing your eyes as this will make the symptoms worse

There is also a range of medicines that may help. Some are available over the counter at the pharmacy and other stronger medicines need a prescription.

Mast-cell stabiliser eye drops such

as sodium cromoglicate (Opticrom) do not work straight away. Instead, they take a few days to start to work. These drops are good if you know when you are likely to develop an allergy and so you can use them to prevent symptoms

Antihistamine eye drops such as antazoline sulphate (Otrivine-Antistin) provide a more immediate effect. They won't prevent an allergic reaction, but instead treat the symptoms once the allergy has started.

Antihistamine tablets work in the same way as the eye drops, but will also treat other allergy symptoms such as a runny nose and sneezing that is caused by the allergy.

You should not wear contact lenses if your symptoms are severe or if you have been told that your cornea is affected. Do not put drops in your eyes while wearing contact lenses. **Remember:**

Avoid rubbing your eyes, as this may make your symptoms worse
Use a cold compress to soothe your eyes

• Wearing glasses or sunglasses may help to shield your eyes from pollen

EXAM TIME

With the state exams beginning next Wednesday, 5th June, for about 136,300 Leaving Cert and Junior Cycle candidates, this is the final weekend for major revision. Stick to your study plan on Saturday and Sunday. Concentrate on subjects being examined during the first week. As the exams run into the subsequent weeks, the optional subjects are nicely spaced out allowing for study days.

PRIORITISE

Leaving Cert candidates should prioritise last minute work in English, Home Economics, Engineering, Geography and Mathematics Paper One and get it done by Sunday night. Likewise Junior Cycle candidates should do the same in English, Religious Education, Irish, Geography, History and Maths. On Monday, concentrate on the tips and predictions for subjects being examined the first week. Don't cram on the days before the exam as this may cause confusion and fatigue.

SKIM

Spent an hour or two on Tuesday skimming over your notes for Wednesday's exams and leave it at that. Some relaxed leisure will be more beneficial than spending the day cramming material that you may not recall anyway. You need a clear and alert mind going into the exams on Wednesday morning.

NOTES

On the evening before each paper spend an hour or so looking over your notes so that the important concepts and ideas are fresh in your mind. Heavy study sessions on the night prior to any paper are not a good idea as you will be exhausted the following morning. Instead, relax and get a good night's rest. Put all thoughts of the following day's exam out of your mind. If you find it difficult to sleep, try a little non-academic reading for a short while.

EQUIPMENT

Over the next few days check your equipment and assemble your exam materials - black or blue biros, pencils, ruler, eraser, drawing instruments, calculator and so on. Have at least two biros or fountain pens in case one doesn't work properly. It's time, too, to organise your

personal needs such as a watch and tissues.

RELAX

A few nerves are normal on the first day so be prepared to deal with it. A relaxation exercise or maybe a shower to freshen up will do the trick. Eat a nutritious breakfast as you'll need the extra reserves of energy. Finally, go through your equipment checklist before leaving home.

CENTRE

On Wednesday morning arrive at the exam centre at least a half hour before the exam begins. For all subsequent exams be present about fifteen minutes before the appointed time. Spend the few minutes before entering the exam centre on your own in peace and quiet. At all costs, avoid groups that are involved in last minute revision. If you need to, use the bathroom before you enter the exam centre. Be in your seat a few moments before the exam is due to begin. Synchronise your watch with the clock on the wall and use your watch or the clock to help you pace your work.

DESK

Check your seat and desk for firmness and stability. A shaky desk will torment you and distract you during the exam. When the answer book is distributed, fill in the required details and read the directions. When you receive your question paper read the instructions carefully in case there is any change of format. Don't be put off by your first glance at the paper. It's new and it will look unfamiliar at first. Once the exam begins, keep to your prepared answering plan and address the questions which are asked.

REMAIN

If you finish a paper before the time is up, do not leave the exam centre. Recheck your work and extra information may come to you. Attempt an extra question only when you have thoroughly answered the required number of questions. Once an exam is over, spend as little time as possible on a post-mortem. Focus on the next paper and when the entire exam is over, forget about it and enjoy your summer. There is no advantage in dwelling on what might have been. Be happy and satisfied that you have done your best. Good luck to all candidates starting exams next week.

CHECKLIST

 Concentrate on subjects being examined in the first week

- Complete major revision by Sunday night
- · In a relaxed study session on Monday concentrate on tips and predictions
- On Tuesday just skim over your revision notes for an hour or two
- Have a clear and alert mind going into each exam
- Arrange the equipment and materials you will need for the exams
- · Organise your personal needs such as a watch and tissues
- Spend the few minutes before entering the exam centre in peace and quiet
- Be in your seat a few minutes before the start of each exam
- · Check that your seat and desk are firm and steady
- Read the instructions carefully
- Know what to expect but be prepared for the unexpected
- Use all the time available to you
- · Once an exam is over, avoid protracted post-mortems
- The exams are a marathon rather than a sprint
- · Eat well during the exams when you'll need lots of energy
- Avoid over-exposure to the sun
- Keep fluid levels high to avoid dehydration
- Take regular aerobic exercise during the exam period

- CAO Round One offers will be available on Wed., 28th August

ST. FINANS RAISED WITH HOUSING MINISTER

"Following participating on the 15th May on a Teams meeting from the Council Chamber with Minister for Housing, Darragh O Brien along with Council Managment, the Mayor and 6 elected members, Cllr. Brendan Cronin again highlighted the urgent need for the Land Development Agency to step in and examine the construction potential of all HSE and public lands in Killarney, particularly St Finians Lands and building.

"I welcome the commitment given to me by Minister O Brein that the LDA would be meeting with KCC Managment and the fact that this meeting has taken place last week is a major step forward. My information is that following the meeting with the council management the

LDA will now proceed to make there assessment and evaluation and decisions on available public lands including the St Finians property. I want to reiterate my appeal to the LDA and Minister for Housing, that Killarney MD and its people have been forgotten about Nationally for provision of any kind of affordable housing. We are in a situation that working people can't access a mortgage and cannot access affordable housing or affordable sites to build their own home. There is a major onus of responsibility on the LDA to deliver now for Killarney families, we cannot be ignored and left behind any longer", Cllr. Cronin told Killarney Outlook



Someone will die unless improvements are made



A candidate in the forthcoming local elections has said it's only a matter of time before someone is either killed or seriously injured trying to cross one of Killarney's busy roads.

Caroline Kenneally, a native of the town who is contesting next month's local election in Killarney for Sinn Féin along with her party colleague, Damien Switzer, has said that the feedback on the doorsteps has highlighted a need to review pedestrian crossings throughout Killarney and the surrounding townlands.

Whether it is in Fossa, Kilcummin, Glenflesk, Barraduff, Farranfore or the town centre, people are telling Damien and I that it's not safe to cross many roads because of a lack of high visibility crossings, and where crossings do exist, the road markings have either faded or are non-existent.' She continued: 'for example, on Park Road and along the road to Fossa, routes that are busy with daily traffic, it is very difficult for people to safely cross from one side to the other. One family in Lacabane said it was simply too dangerous to cross the N72 to access the Fossa greenway, which has resulted in their children been driven to school.' She concluded: 'last week the Department of Transport clarified that all drivers must yield the right of way to a pedestrian who is waiting to cross or has commenced crossing the road at a designated crossing. These amendments have been made under the Road Traffic (Traffic and Parking) Regulations. As I've highlighted, the issue in Killarney is that there is much confusion as to where these crossings are, because many of them are poorly marked out.'

The local election candidate has said that elected or not, she will seek a meeting with the Kerry County Council, An Garda Síochána and other stakeholders, to discuss improving pedestrian crossings in the town and across the municipal district.

Minister Foley announces new classrooms and facilities for Castlemaine National School

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D. Norma Foley has today announced that funding approval has been given for new classrooms and facilities for Castlemaine national school. Castlemaine national school, which has 108 pupils, will be getting two new special educational needs classrooms and a daily living skills room. The new facilities will free up a classroom when completed, which will then be reconfigured as a special education teaching room. The school will be appointing a design team to deliver the project.

Minister Foley said: "I wish to congratulate the Castlemaine national school for the excellent work they do every day in providing for the education of children in their care."

The reintroduction of a farmer's market to the town would benefit visitors, locals, and cafe/restaurants as it will encourage people to stay in the town centre for longer and buy local produce.

As a Tour Guide I often get asked for recommendations on places to visit. I would love to have a town centre site to add to that list. Tourists are increasingly looking for a unique experience in the places they visit. What could be more local and authentic than food grown in our locality by passionate farmers who grow vegetables and make ice-cream right here in Killarney.

The negative impacts of overgrazing are affecting local farmers, local ecology, and causing traffic accidents. Culling is needed and to encourage a structured, sustained and sustainable supply of venison, I would like to set up a forum for interested parties similar to the Wild Venison Project in the UK. If you need to be convinced of the overgrazing and its impact on trees, take a trip to Innisfallen Island or see the damage bark stripping is doing to our trees on Ross Island.

HEALTH

The health system continues to pose many serious difficulties for people. There is a great demand for more enhanced services for people with disabilities including: respite services, residential services and day services. I recently highlighted the need for these services in the Killarney Area and requested that the HSE would consider providing such services in the District Hospital and St. Columbanus Home – both buildings are due to be vacated once the new hospital is completed later this year. There should also be scope to provide a minor injuries clinic. People continue to wait for simple procedures such as cataract, hip and knee replacement I will continue working with Deputy Danny Healy Rae who has provided many people with the opportunity to go to Belfast to get these procedures done. Lastly I firmly believe that carers allowance should not be means tested. Carers provide invaluable care and support for their family members and in turn save the State significant sums of money.

HOUSING

Housing continues to be one of the biggest issues facing our area despite the fact that there has been positive developments in Killarney and Barraduff. There is substantial need for more social housing to address the waiting list which now has in excess of 1,500 applicants. Vacant and void properties need to be brought back into use. Transfer applications need to be dealt with in a timely manner. More rural cottages need to be built by the local authority for people who may have a site available to them but would struggle to obtain a mortgage. Furthermore, affordable housing development needs to take place so that families and single people can have a realistic opportunity of purchasing a home. I have time and time again campaigned for St. Finians landbank to be used for social and affordable housing development. I want to continue my work in this regard. I am very active in assisting elderly people and people with disabilities to make applications for housing grants to make their homes more suitable for their needs.

ROADS

I have assisted many people in making applications for the Local Improvement and Community Involvement Schemes. Furthermore, I have requested increased funding for such schemes in order to deal with the long waiting lists. Traffic congestion continues to be an issue facing Killarney town. Following many representations, funding of €750,000 has been made available from the TII which will allow for the preferred route for the Kerry-Cork bypass to be selected in 2024. I have continually highlighted the need for safety improvement worksto be carried out along the N22, at Poulgorm junction, Glenflesk Village, Coolcaslagh junction, Ballycasheen junction, Cleeney Roundabout and Madams Hill. I have continuously highlighted the need for a multi-storey car park for Killarney. This would future proof the parking needs of the town. I have been very active in the area of increasing safety at our schools making representations for and bringing deputations from different schools including Fossa National School where works are due to begin later this year and Two Mile National School where phase 1 of safety works will also be completed this year. Previously, I allocated a substantial amount of money for the provision of speed indicator lights at Knockanes National School

PLANNING

I am a strong advocate for people being allowed to build on family owned land or on a site they could obtain in the area they are from. Difficulties are posed in this regard due to the local area clause and in areas deemed to be under significant urban influence in the rural settlement policy. I have also consistently raised the issue where the TII object to people seeking planning permission who want to exit onto a national primary or secondary route despite there already being an existing entrance.

Furthermore, I have also continually highlighted the unfairness where people exiting onto a national road from a private road are being turned down for planning whereas those exiting from a public road are getting approved. I am totally opposed to the Residential Zoned Land Tax where working farms will be taxed from February next year; this government introduced policy will affect the livelihoods of farmers. The Local Area Plan will be one of the main body of works for the next council to complete and will determine the planning and development of the Killarney Municipal District for the next number of years. I have the experience to contribute to this process effectively.

BUSINESS & HOSPITALITY

Employment is critical when it comes to retaining people in rural counties such as Kerry. The cost of doing business has increased substantially in the last number of years with the cost of living crisis and increased rate bills for many businesses. In a recent notice of motion, I requested that the Government would consider a rates waiver for businesses to try and alleviate pressure and avoid more small businesses from closing, 37% of hospitality beds are not available for tourists, many restaurants, cafes and pubs have already closed. I have called on the Government to discontinue the policy of using tourist accommodation to house refugees and asylum seekers as this policy has resulted in less footfall in out towns and villages and in turn less revenue for businesses. I have continuously highlighted that self-catering must be allowed to continue to provide their services and not be subjected to over-bearing enforcement action from the local authority.

INWARD MIGRATION

The massive influx of inward migration of refugees and asylum seekers into our towns has impacted on medical, education and social welfare services. It is more attractive for Landlords to rent to Ukrainians as they get €800 a month tax free. I believe the same concessions should be given to all who want to rent a home, we don't even have a homeless centre now in Killarney to accommodate people who cannot get a house, in fact some people are on the housing list for up to 15 years in Killarney, has had an affect on our hospitality sector, 37% of hospitality beds are not available for tourists. Many restaurants, cafes and pubs have already closed. In a recent notice of motion I called on the government to discontinue the policy of using tourist accommodation to house refugees and asylum seekers. This policy has resulted in less footfall in our towns and villages and in turn less revenue for small to medium size businesses. I have continuously highlighted that selfcatering providers must be allowed to continue to provide their services and not be subjected to over bearing enforcement action from the local authority. ENVIRONMENT

Protecting the environment is of paramount importance. To help eliminate the adverse affects the increased deer population is having in Killarney National Park, I recently requested that the government would provide funding to employ a deer manager and deer stalkers. The deer population must be controlled to protect woodland vegetation and the Island of Innisfallen. Furthermore, proper deer management will help decrease the number of accidents occurring on our roads. Monitoring the water quality of the lakes is also crucial and I have requested that Kerry County Council would publish the Lough Leine report for 2023. I have also consistently campaigned that Estates such as Mountain View Kilcummin be connected to the new Sewerage scheme. Similarly, in trying to progress the connection of Birchhill estate and the Old Killarney Village, I have continually called on the government to provide the necessary funding. The work of our volunteers in the Killarney Looking Good committee and tidy town groups must be commended.

REQUEST TO LIFT BLANKET PLANNING POLICY

Cllr. Maura Healy Rae raised the following by way of a notice of motion at the meeting on Monday 20th May asking that Kerry County Council write to the TII, the Minister for Transport and the Minister for Local Government requesting that the current blanket policy be lifted where all planning applications along national primary and national secondary roadways exiting from existing entrances are not being considered, this is a long running saga emanating from Fine Gael introducing this policy over 10 years ago. It has directly resulted in numerous planning applications being refused and even considerated at pre planning stage. It is particularly acute in the Killarney MD given the amount of national roadway

surrounding the area with the N22, N71 and N72. It is non-sensical that where an individual is living at home and using an existing entrance, can't be considered to build their own house and use existing entrance they are already using. How the TII can quantify this as additional traffic is preposterous. Given we are in a housing crisis, given all the challenges surrounding planning, given exorbitant house prices and the lack of affordable housing- it is ludicrous that this is a reason people are being refused planning Cllr Maura Healy Rae states, I have raised this issues several times as has Deputy Danny Healy-Rae in Dáil Éireann. The government have failed to act in a positive way in this regard.

Provision should be made for people with severe disabilities

At the recent meeting of Kerry County Council Cllr. Marie Moloney moved a motion requesting that in every Council and Housing Association build provision be made for people with severe disabilities who need housing. Some people on the Social Housing list have either an adult or a child with very special physical needs. They need scope in their accommodation for the provision of a hoist on a track from bedroom to bathroom, some being peg fed who need specialised facilities.

"I have helped people who have had to wait a number of years while the Council Officials constantly viewed houses for sale in an effort to find a suitable house that could be adapted to suit the needs of the applicants", Cllr. Moloney told Killarney Outlook.

If every development by the Council and the Housing bodies built just one be-spoke

.



house to meet the individuals needs it would eliminate the need for a search for an adequate house. Kerry Council will provide such a build but unfortunately Kerry County Council build little or no houses in the Killarney Electoral Area but there is scope for Housing Bodies to build be-spoke houses.

I have written to the Minister asking that he make it regulation that the AHB in association with Kerry County Council provide at least one such house in their developments.

TRAFFIC CALMING IN GLENFLESK

At the recent meeting of Killarney Municipal District, Cllr Maura Healy-Rae again tabled a motion seeking an update from Kerry County Council and TII on the traffic calming scheme for Glenflesk Village on the N22. It is expected that the proposals will be presented to the Elected Members in Q3 2024.

LOCAL AND EUROPEAN ELECTION FEVER FRIDAY, JUNE 7TH AGREEMENT REACHED

between Laune Salmon & Trout Anglers Association and KPH in relation to Cronins Wood Housing Development

aune Salmon & Trout Anglers Association and KPH have reached an agreement that resolves the observation in relation to effluent discharge from the Cronins Wood Housing Development being undertaken by KPH. The Laune Anglers had lodged an observation to the planning application by KPH for



this development on the basis that the capacity of the sewage treatment plant in Killarney is not sufficient to take the additional effluent from this development. The group have been raising concerns over the last number of years as to the continued decreasing water guality on the river Laune and Killarneys Lakes, which is the second most polluted waterway in the country, which is being blamed by the Environmental Protection Agency on the continuous overflows from the Killarney treatment plant. Following discussions between both sides, facilitated by Cllr. Niall Kelleher, KPH have now agreed to install a new storm water pipe at St. Marget's Road in Killarney town that will have the effect of taking storm water out of the treatment plant equivalent to the effluent the Cronins Wood development will produce. The agreement has been warmly welcomed by the Laune Salmon & Trout Anglers Association who again reiterated their position that they have no objection to the houses being built but rather the potential environmental impact this would have on the already very poor water quality in the River Laune and Killarneys Lakes.



A spokesperson for the group said that they are very pleased that the discussions with KPH have yielded this very positive result for both sides and that this outcome shows what can be achieved when parties are willing to negotiate and work together. They added that they hope now that both the responsible authorities and other potential developers will join with KPH in undertaking works required at other locations across Killarney town to take all of the storm water out of the treatment plant. They have also called on Irish Water to undertake an immediate upgrade of the treatment plant to ensure it is sufficient to meet the growing needs of Killarney town and to ensure it no longer causes pollution to Killarneys Lakes and Laune River. As a result of the agreement, the proposal to developer the Cronin's Wood site can now proceed . Laune Salmon & Trout Anglers Association thank Kenmare Plant Hire for being proactive and engaging in resolving this mater and contributing to reducing the pollution entering Killarneys Lakes. Welcoming the agreement between the Laune Salmon & Trout Anglers and KPH, Cllr. Niall Kelleher said that the agreement represents an excellent outcome

for both sides. "I warmly congratulate them on coming up with this innovative solution that will help protect the water quality on the Laune River as well as facilitating the construction of these houses that are so badly needed in Killarney" Cllr. Kelleher said. I would also like to note the involvement of Kerry County Council in enabling this solution through providing the relevant consents. "I hope that both they, and indeed Irish Water, will move forward now and undertake the necessary works to the water treatment infrastructure in the greater Killarney area to facilitate the future development, both in housing and industry, that the town so badly needs" he concluded. In their response, KPH have stated that the solution they have engaged in, demonstrates the companies long standing commitment to enhancing the "Built Environment". KPH have stated that their commitment to solving the housing crisis in a sustainable manner is unwavering and this demonstrates that commitment.

THE BURNING QUESTIONS OF OUR TIME

Actually, no, I have no intention of touching the actual burning questions of our era. The Digital Age has transformed into the Social Media Age, and it might never have been a swan, but it's certain an ugly duckling at this stage. Cancel Culture started out as a voice for the downtrodden – as tends to happen, the pendulum has swung much too far and it's now used as a cudgel by self-important bullies. Polarisation attracts attention, and public attention is obviously (really?) a necessity for self-validation.

Geopolitics, climate change and oil dependency, supply chains, isolationism, immigrations crises, with knocks on affects globally....an increasing rise of militant nationalism and hard right conservatism (and I really am talking Margaret Atwood 'Gilead' conservatism).....

Did you think yours truly was touching on any of those burning questions? As B.A. Barracus was wont to say to Hannibal Smith (the original A-Team series, not that truly awful pastiche of a film 'reboot'. I used to love 'The Fall Guy' and 'Roadhouse was awful, but in a junk food kind of way – I have no intention of watching the remakes – ever) "My momma didn't raise no fool".

Obviously, I'm concentrating on English speaking areas and that basically means Britain (not the UK) and the US. Ireland – and some of you may not like these – don't actually feature as much as we like. 'Going viral' to most of us still means your kid picked up a bug in school. I will allow for the search for the next Irish soccer manager, because that's gone on so long it's become more of a trope than a meme.

No. These are the sort of burning questions you get from pundits desperate for clickbait. There are certain cues. Joe Brolly leaning back in his chair....Micah Richards giving a big, huge belly laugh and no-one knows why... Stephen A. Smith trying and utterly failing to break a pencil in his righteous anger....Simon Jordan giving an English Eamon Dunphy impression without any of the wit, passion, or humour...Joey Barton (actually, I have always switched Joey Barton off immediately, a clickbait misogynist is almost worse than the real thing)....Piers Morgan saying anything. About anything. Ever. Let alone hagiographing ('interviewing') the likes of Cristiano Ronaldo. That was the worst interview I have ever seen. It was only embarrassing for Ronaldo, but it was utterly demeaning for Piers (and finding a new low for the editor of the Sun newspaper during the Hillsborough disaster, the phone hacking scandal, and the cheerleader for the supposedly surreptitious racism dished out to Meghan Markle is fairly spectacular).

they will appear on your social media at some point, no matter how uninterested in sport you are, so let me give you the obvious answers.

Who Should be the next Irish Manager?

He should be, and I think he will be. John O'Shea. Has he shown a particular aptitude for it? He hasn't mis-stepped badly. We had one decent international friendly, and one that was disappointing. Jaysus, lads, that's actually an upswing on recent results. Now, would he be my first choice? No offence to John, who has put in the graft, shown decent man-management, and reasonable media skills towards an Irish media basically baying for blood (sadly, media management is a requirement, especially given that the FAI's complete failures in that department), but this isn't flying a cargo plane from A to B. This is pulling a passenger plane that's in a steep dive back up, and doing it with stuttering engines. Charlton, McCarthy, and O'Neill were castigated for a lack of ambition in playing style. Stephen Kenny – and I always liked him - was criticised for a lack of pragmatism. Look, the hard and obvious truth is that you are going to get pasted if you don't win, no matter how good the effort.

The main reason I think he will end up getting the job is because he is the only one I know who has put his hand up for it. A small country, with an awful administrative record and totally dependent on Government largesse, almost all of whose international players are actually developed into seniors in a different country which no longer accepts as many of them because of Brexit? Whose supporters expect not just qualification for major tournaments (which admittedly has gotten much easier as entry requirements are loosened) but good displays when there? Whose one high value player is out injured at the moment and remains unproven, though undoubted talented? Most of whose players ply their trend at the lower level of the Premiership or the Championship? Worst of all, where you won't get to pick your own management team and will be expected to supervise the development of all Irish underage teams? Whoever came up with that parcel of absolute insanity? It's like telling an architect that they also have to mix all the cement and chop down all the trees for the lumber. It's not quite as stupid as Qatar hosting a World Cup, but we are definitely in that kind of territory.

Apologise to John, tell him that you just made that nonsense up to big yourself up in the media in the days when you could still face them, and that you'll always have his back (he'll know your lying, but he's smart enough to have a pay-off in his contract, just as Robbie Keane quite rightly did when John Delaney panicked and made the worst managerial deal in history) and just give him the job.

Who is the Goat in Soccer, Messi or Ronaldo?

Ronaldo has slightly more goals, but Messi has almost double the number of assists. Messi, in my opinion, is better. In the end, both were absolutely iconic figures in Spanish soccer and both took their countries to international titles (in fairness, Portugal winning a European Championship was always less likely than Argentina winning a World Cup). Both developed an unhealthy dominance of their already brilliant clubs, so much so that they skewed viable development models for well, now, really. Between them, Real and Barcelona basically have a monopoly of one of the world's top leagues, but there's a reason for their declines at the elite level. Zlatan on the wing? I kniow he is full of himself (I suspect it's an act and he's laughing away behind it all) but shouldn't the greatest playmaker create the goals and out-and-out goalscorer Zlatan tuck them away? But no, that would have involved sharing the limelight.

The GOAT? I still give Pele the nod, despite his famous capacity for self-promotion. He was on a great team, but he really was that good. He played with the abandon of the schoolyard at recess in the most demanding games in the world. Maradonna, despite his personal problems, was the most skillful. He piggybacked teams and made it look easy. You talk about the Argentinian trope of the 'pibé'? No Argentinean thinks of Messi that way. Cruyff, despite famously not winning a World Cup (that narrative is too simple in team sports) was the most impactful. Messi belongs in that list, but certainly not at the top.

Are Manchester City the Greatest Premiership Team Ever?

Four in a row has never been done before. Surely this is the greatest team to ever grace the English Championship and Premiership? In

the circumstances, why are the celebrations so muted?

Everyone knows why. And yes, every single title they have won in recent years has a serious cloud over it. Look, arguably the burning question is, given that Everton and Forest have been docked points for smaller infractions, are Man City likely to be relegated and stripped of their titles? Let's ask Joáo Havelange, Sepp Blatter, Franz Beckenbauer, Jack Warner.....Man City will eventually walk with a token gesture and keep all their medals. FIFA haven't been in the business of soccer for generations. They have been in the business of business, and Man City is more folding green than blue. But I doubt if even their most die-hard supporter will ever try and include them in the conversation of greatest teams.

Should Man United Sack Ten Hag?

It's not like anyone is asking my opinion (for which I thank you all) but I suspect we will have answer by the end of next week. You might have an answer by the time you read this. Man United have had their worst season in years. For most of my lifetime, being outside the top four was an absolute crisis. Four places behind Tottenham would be a humiliation even if Tottenham won the Premiership. And Tottenham just about scraped into the Europa Cup (you know, the bad one that saps energy and costs you in the League after – but you are simply not a top team if you aren't playing some sort of European football).

That FA Cup is only a piece of trivia by now, but it is important because it gives Man United a place in the Europa Cup. Without that, I do think he would be gone. It also came at the expense of Chelsea - God be with the days when an unctuously arrogant Mourinho goaded the red-nosed Scottish bull and ganged up on an urbane Wenger; they were giants on the stage. But games come thick and fast nowadays, many of them on various pay-per-view outlets, and it's owners and pundits who take the headlines. Managers are ephemeral characters, here today and gone tomorrow. Boehly at Chelsea is a case in point, I have zero sympathy. Hurl money in ridiculous proportions and demand instant gratification.

Ten Hag has had to contend with a massive injury list. But worse for United, in my opinion, is the insistence in recent years in buying big names and reputations rather than actually applying system. I think Ten Hag can do that, not by next year, but the year after. There's an argument that supporters won't wait that long, but they will, because they are waiting since 2013 and Man United is still one of the biggest merchandise sellers out there. And the alternative – and this is my key point – is opting for a ninth manager in twelve years. I came across that statistic and I thought "absolutely no way" so I googled it and it's spot on.

Hey, if there's some magic man out there that I haven't considered, some budding Napoleon that has completed eluded me, all the rampant speculators (and they have been proposing some absolutely ludicrous candidates), and that fine mesh net cast by the FAI, then best of luck to them. Rome is famously known as the Eternal City. It also, equally famously, wasn't built in a day (we shall ignore the fratricide and the lupine fostering for the purposes of this discussion, obviously).

Should Saudi Arabia be Hosting the World Cup in 2034?

No. It's better than Qatar, but so was Tattooine or Mordor. It has neither the facilities, nor the culture. It does have the money, and enough international disapproval to be willing to spend the money on completely unnecessary white elephant facilities (it's called 'sportswashing'). I suspect that Saudi Arabia, which is much much smarter than Qatar, will treat its migrant workers a lot better - that was the headliner from the Qatari World Cup. But is Saudi Arabia affordable for most soccer fans? LeBron was a faster rising star and lasted longer, has always been far more unselfish on the court, and didn't have the under-rated Scottie Pippen (I know he's a Hall of Famer, but trust me, the word applies), Dennis Rodman (Michael famously punched team-mate Steve Kerry – he never tried that on Dennis, who would have battered him and then sat out the next ten games out of spite. Dennis was always about Dennis, but he was so good they had to tolerate it), Horace Grant....

No. If I had to pick one, I'd pick Michael. But the 'GOAT'conversation is a different thing. Was Michael the greatest moneyspinner? Absolutely. He took the game into the stratosphere. Earvin Johnson was known by his nickname, and for a good reason. Larry Bird was definitely great, no guestion, but as great as the legend of Larry? Isaiah is another very under-rated player for me. PLANTS FOR SHADE

Most gardens have a shady spot, a north facing wall, under a tree or in the shadow of the house.

There is a huge range of plants to suit shaded areas including broad- leaved foliage plants, to spring flowers and ever green flowering shrubs. Ferns are probably the first plant you would think of when it comes to shade - you can choose from a wide range of ferns from dwarf, medium or large. Ferns look very natural when planted under a tree or beside a wall. Most ferns will die back for the winter so if you want all year round foliage you will need to plant something evergreen near the ferns i.e something low growing like the Viburnum Davidii which is a great plant when planted in groups of three. Another good evergreen plant for the shade is the Heuchera which comes in lovely shades including dark to light purple and green to light green.

There is also a wide range of flowering plants for shade. A good example is an Astilbe, an Astilbe has a good range of flower colours and foliage to choose from. A good plant for this would a plant called Vinca Minor which is an evergreen flowering ground cover plant. But remember to water until established.

"The king's heart is like streams of water in the hand of the Lord; He turns it whichever way He wishes.
