

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Killarney Strikes Gold in Tidy Towns

A Triumph of Community Spirit and Legacy

illarney is once again basking in national glory after being awarded the coveted Gold Medal in the 2025 SuperValu Tidy Towns Competition, achieving an outstanding 11-point increase to reach a total of 395 marks. This remarkable leap in marks reflects not only the town's relentless dedication to environmental excellence and community pride, but also the deep-rooted sense of teamwork that has defined Killarney's approach to tidiness, sustainability and inclusion.

There were scenes of delight in the town when the results were announced, marking a proud moment for the hundreds of volunteers, Kerry County Council staff, and community groups who have worked tirelessly throughout the year. From the colourful bursts of floral planting on the streets to biodiversity-rich green spaces and the meticulous restoration of Abbey Woods, Killarney continues to set the benchmark for what a thriving, environmentally conscious town can achieve.

Johnny McGuire, Co-President of the Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce, paid heartfelt tribute to those behind the success, calling it "a win for every single person who rolled up their sleeves and cared for our town." "This gold medal and the jump of 11 points reflect the sheer hard work, dedication and pride of our amazing outdoor staff at Kerry County Council and the fantastic volunteers who give so much of their time," he added. "They are building on a legacy left by two giants of the Tidy Towns movement here in Killarney, the late Fr. Michael Murphy, affectionately known as Fr. Tidy, and the late Yvonne Quill, whose energy and vision continue to inspire everything we do."

The adjudicators' glowing report highlighted the unrivalled sense of community spirit in Killarney, praising the collaboration of over 400 volunteers, 15 committee members, and a wide network of local organisations including Men's Shed, schools, sports clubs, housing bodies, and residents' associations. The town's strong links with groups like the Killarney Coffee Cups Project, KASI Cultural Café, and the Clean Technology Centre were commended for their innovative approaches to inclusion, environmental awareness and sustainability.

Particular praise was given to the restoration efforts at Abbey Woods, where volunteers, including members of the Men's Shed from across Ireland, spent thousands of hours clearing invasive species and reopening historic walkways in partnership with the National Parks and Wildlife Service. The adjudicators also noted the thriving biodiversity in areas such as Dr. Crokes GAA's wildflower zones, the return of the Great Spotted Woodpecker and other native species, and the continued success of tree planting programmes involving students from Killarney Community College and local



primary schools.

The judges were deeply impressed by the vibrancy of the town's streetscape - from the freshly painted shopfronts of New Street and Flemings Lane to the bursts of colour from sustainable perennial planting throughout the town. They also admired the stunning Killarney House & Gardens, with its pollinator-friendly floral borders and scenic views of the McGillycuddy Reeks and Lough Léin, describing it as "a spectacular setting, deserving of every accolade."

Residential areas featured prominently in Killarney's success story. Estates like Pinewood, which scooped top honours in the Killarney Looking Good Awards, were singled out as shining examples of community involvement, showcasing murals, community gardens, exercise spaces and well-kept homes that reflect civic pride at its finest. Ballydribeen, too, received warm praise for its litter management, bulb planting, fence repairs and community cycling safety events.

The adjudicators acknowledged the meticulous care given to approach roads, roundabouts, and cycleways such as the Flesk Walkway, describing Killarney as "remarkably clean and tidy" with only minor graffiti issues noted. They applauded the 2Go Cup initiative, the Energy Roadshow, and the town's sustainability conferences as impactful projects that are positioning Killarney as a leader in green innovation.

The judges' closing remarks spoke volumes about Killarney's standing in the national competition: "This large town is a big deal in

Kerry, with over 1.2 million visitors a year. We are in awe of the community who have engaged in planning, networking, and collaboration with

volunteers, local businesses and government

agencies to make the best of its attractions.

Artists tell new stories with captivating murals, but it is the community of Killarney who make this town tick."
For many, this year's gold medal is not just an award but a tribute to the spirit of cooperation, to the town's shared pride, and to the memory

of those who dedicated their lives to making

Killarney shine.
As Johnny McGuire concluded, "Fr. Murphyand Yvonne would be so proud today. They always believed that Killarney could lead by example, not just as a beautiful place to visit, but as a community that looks after its people and its environment. This gold medal belongs to everyone who loves Killarney."

With an impressive 395 marks, a gold medal, and a renewed sense of unity, Killarney's 2025 Tidy Towns triumph stands as a golden testament to the town's enduring commitment to excellence, sustainability, and heart.

Meanwhile, Tralee was named Ireland's Tidiest Large Urban Centre at the SuperValu Tidy Towns 2025 Awards Ceremony held at Croke Park on Friday. The announcement capped an outstanding year for Kerry, with Killarney, Kenmare, Listowel, Castlegregory, Sneem and Portmagee all recognised for their achievements in this year's competition.



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KILLARNEY BOXER IS EUROPEAN CHAMPION





Congratulations to Pa Casey, one of an enormously talented boxing family from Killarney, who put on some simply phenomenal performances at the European Boxing Championships from the 16th October to 26th October in Budva, Montenegro, to become the first Kerry boxer to win the title.

Pa beat Latvia, Poland, England and Israel to become European champion in a stacked weight with national champions from Ukraine, Turkey, Hungry, Georgia, Lithuania, Estonia, Bulgaria and Azerbaijan He then went on to win the best boxer of the entire tournament with 33 countries and 350 boxers participating and Pa being one of the youngest boys in the tournament, boxing a year underage.

Pa won every fight on a unanimous decision throughout the tournament.



Ann has captured a vivid moment: two artisans in Vietnam patiently applying wax and dye to fabric in the time-honoured batik tradition. The way the light falls, the rich tones of the cloth, and the focused expressions of the women all combine to communicate not just process, but cultural heritage and human connection.

Ann told us 'My photo was taken in Cat Cat village in Sapa, Vietnam. The old lady on the right is wearing the traditional dress of the black H'mong people. She would have made the linen from flax grown locally and hand dyed, sewn and embroidered the outfit herself. The hill tribes wear these colourful clothes everyday, even when working in the fields. She is demonstrating the batic methods the dyeing



using molten wax to outline the pattern on the fabric which is then immersed in the dye. After removal and drying the wax is removed and the pattern underneath stands out against the dyed cloth. The young woman on the left is wearing a costume based on the traditional dress of the flower H'mong people, which she would have hired for the day'

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Killarney Town Twinning Wraps Up a Busy Season

As the year draws to a close, Killarney Town Twinning Association is beginning to wind down after what Chairman Seán Counihan described as "a tremendously busy and productive season." Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in Killarney



THE MAN WHO BUILT WASHINGTON AND GAVE US MUCH OF KILLARNEY LOCAL HISTORIAN REMINDS US OF THE LINKS

The most knowledgeable person in Ireland about Killarney's John McShain, the man who undertook the last great revamp of the White White House, is Damien Switzer. I asked Damien for his view on the new White House ballroom which Trump is building without bothering to consult with the authorities. Yes, it is necessary, but perhaps not as respectful of heritage and tradition as John McShain's reconstruction was, is Damien's view.

Every president has left a mark on the White House. Truman's full reconstruction from 1948–52, which John McShain oversaw, was by far the most extensive but handled with restraint and



respect for the building's heritage, he said. McShain's work preserved history while strengthening it. That balance is what we risk losing now.

The term "White House" became official under Theodore Roosevelt in 1901, though it had

been whitewashed since 1798 to protect the stone.

"Killarney's original town administration building, market house at the market cross was a whitewashed building... "maybe we could call it the White House too," Damien told me.

Trump's 90,000-square-foot ballroom is the largest expansion since Truman and is needed for state dinners. However, progress is good, "but not when it erases cultural heritage".

The East Wing isn't especially old, but its loss is part of a wider pattern where "progress" often means demolition and not just in Washington - in Killarney too.

Damien inspires me to think a town trail as in Rome or in Richelieu in France where you recreate on the web and in booklets how the streets actually looked, one hundred, two hundred, one thousand years ago and so on might be a runner. A project for Damien, perhaps.

PRESIDENT CONNOLLY: A SCALP FOR SINN FÉIN

It is curious how much of the Presidential election comes back to Kerry.
Sinn Fein TD Pa Daly stuck his neck out for his party backing Connolly. Breaking the famous party omerta.

True, SF may well have been afraid to put forward their own candidate after "the drumming" they got in the last elections, as Mchael Healy Rae said.

But Connolly is a SF scalp. Without their money, internet savvy and impressive ground organisation it is difficult to see how she could have been elected.

Pa's stock will have risen in his own party. And in Kerry. Because Pa's great strength since the start of his political career is that you don't have to like Sinn Fein to like Pa. Maybe that is the destiny of Sinn Fein: to rule when they position themselves at arms length.

But there are losers. Had Killarney's Sean Kelly run, we would have had a different president. Jim Gavin would not have been selected by Fianna Fail - one GAA man is enough.

Then there is the Healy-Rae factor. Michael Healy-Rae's intervened in Fine Gael politics approaching Heather to run. Did Michael Healy-Rae's early move - he said it was to keep Connolly out - scuttle his fellow Kerryman? And is this "the first big dent in the Healy-Rae armour" as SF think.

As for the voting patterns, less than half Kerry voted. In round figures: of the under 53,000 who voted in Kerry, more than 10,000 either deliberately spoilt their vote or voted for the "gliogar" Gavin (In Lismongane "glugger" was the word for an egg that wouldn't hatch). We have a much cherished proportional representational system. I saw no transferring in the Connolly voters. It was one woman one vote and nothing for anyone else. Plumpers.

Immigration a subject not addressed in the campaign was on the spoilt ballots. And how about cyber? There was blanket and cynical in your face over the top bombardment on social media across all platforms. Some managed, but lots driven by bots and algorithms, some of the content fake, such as Connolly was pulling out.

Is it altogether fanciful to ask were the Russians around? Ireland has been warned about Russian cyber interference in previous elections. I am not suggesting the Russians were directly involved with her, but the Ireland result would have suited the Russians. A candidate against Nato, against defence spending , with anti-US and EU views, pro Hamas/ anti Jewish state, watery criticism of Russia in the Ukraine and trips to Syria etc - all of which align with Russia.

Then internally the unrest in the main parties, candidates having to pull out, and maybe even the toppling of a Taoiseach and a Tanaiste - Ian Fleming couldn't have written a better Bond novel. Still, our undersea cables are safe now!

ÁRAS PROJECT NOT DEAD IN WATER, COUNCILLORS INSIST AMID STINGING CRITICISM FROM CORCA DHUIBHNE COUNCILLOR

Killarney councillors are reeling from stinging criticism by Fine Gael councillor Tommy Griffin at the recent meeting of the full county council in Tralee.

Tommy - who does not mince his words - asked if there was "reputational damage" for Kerry when it came to grants. Other areas lost out when Killarney was favoured for the massive URDF money which they rejected, he said.

Close to one million euro and four years of work went into the plans, we recall.

Tommy withdrew his remark money was "misused" but persisted with the accusation - other areas had lost out because they were overlooked for Killarney.

John O'Donoghue said the information had changed and that is why they had voted differently.

"We should be commended for realising this was a mistake. Rather than our reputation that was damaged - it should be our reputation is enhanced," John said.

Speaking after she got confirmation Columbanus and the District were now being assessed as sites for a primary care centre, Marie Moloney said the project is not dead in the water. Councillors had put an alternative a combined library, exhibition space and administrative building alongside a new theatre.

At the meeting, the chief executive of Kerry County Council, Fearghal Reidy, said Kerry was very strong on accessing grant aid. However there were challenges with the new proposal, Mr Reidy conceded. The council was working with the URDF team. "It is going to be challenging," the manager said.

The joint proposal with the HSE for the Áras Phádraig site, rejected by councillors in July, had "stacked up with the URDF "in terms of cost benefit," Mr Reidy said.

The alternative proposal - for the combined library, offices and theatre - would also "have to stack up" with the Department of Housing URDF team.



Pat and Joan's 60 years together stand as a beautiful testament to enduring love, faith, and family. Their family and friends wish them continued good health and happiness in the years ahead.


All Roads Lead to Beaufort Rambling House

for Castleisland Community College Junior Cycle Students



A wonderful occasion celebrating a special group of men and a proud chapter in the history of Dr. Crokes GAA.



Owners of historic structures in Kerry urged to apply for heritage funds to maintain and preserve buildings and structures

Grants of up to \leq 200,000 available for Kerry projects with strong built heritage conservation objectives and clear public or community benefit.

Interested applicants should contact their local authority's Architectural Conservation office

Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, James Browne TD and the Minister of State for Nature, Heritage and Biodiversity Christopher O'Sullivan TD have today launched the Historic Structures Fund (HSF) for 2026.

With over €3.5 million in funding allocated to 28 projects in 2025, the 2026 scheme will support the repair, maintenance, and rejuvenation of historic structures in all Local Authority areas, honouring their past and safeguarding them into the future.

HSF 2026 will offer grants of up to €200,000 for projects with strong built heritage conservation objectives that can also demonstrate a clear public or community benefit. It enables vital investment in our valuable built heritage and helps owners and custodians of historic structures to safeguard for the future benefit of communities and the public. Funded works focus on the conservation of historic fabric of these important buildings, with priority given to works to protect or repair the outer envelope, such as the roof and windows, the repointing or rerendering of the external walls, and other similar works.

In order to be considered eligible for the scheme, the property in question must be included (or eligible for inclusion) in the Record of Protected Structures of the relevant Local Authority. Structures or works within an Architectural Conservation Area (ACA) may also be eligible.

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














RING OF KERRY CHARITY CYCLE RAISES €1.2 MILLION FOR CHARITIES



Keane added another free before Brendan Kealy landed a pair of 2 pointer frees from distance to reel the advantage back to just 2 points as Crokes led 0-11 to 0-9 at the break. Kilcummin continued their positive charge on the resumption and with further points from Cian Foley, Paul O'Shea (f) and Sean O'Leary regained their early lead to push 0-12 to 0-11 clear by the 37th minute. However, it was the home side that once again found next 3 scores as they began to take control once again. 



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PRESBYOPIA

What is presbyopia?

Presbyopia is the normal loss of near focusing ability that occurs with age. Most people begin to notice the effects of presbyopia sometime after age 40, when they start having trouble seeing small print clearly.

Presbyopia is caused by an age-related process. This differs from astigmatism, myopia and hyperopia, which are related to the shape of the eyeball and are caused by genetic and environmental factors. Presbyopia generally believed to stem from a gradual thickening and loss of flexibility of the natural lens inside your eye.

These age-related changes occur within the proteins in the lens, making the lens harder and less elastic over time. With less elasticity, this means the eye has a harder time focusing up close and we may have to hold material further away to see it clearly.

What is the treatment for presbyopia?

Presbyopia is a natural part of ageing and there is no cure for it. The solution is generally to wear glasses for reading

Contact lenses are also available for presbyopia if you do not want to wear alasses.

Are there exercises I can do to stop needing reading glasses? Will I make my eyes worse by wearing glasses?

No. As presbyopia is caused by the lens stiffening, and not the muscles weakening. Wearing glasses will not make your eyes worse and there are no exercises that can help this. However, you may notice that when you take your glasses off, things appear to be worse without them than before you had them. This is simply because you are noticing how clear and comfortable vision should be. Before you had the glasses, you were unaware how blurry your vision really was because it changed slowly over the years.

Presbyopia will get worse as you age until you reach your late fifties, when you will have no natural focusing ability left. Unfortunately there is nothing you can do to stop it.

For any vision changes it is important to have a sight test to determine the cause.

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The 2026 CAO application season opens so use the remaining three months for course research

CAO SEASON

While applicants have until the 1st February 2026 to submit a CAO application form, it's now time to start making good use of the remaining three months. The 2026 CAO application season opens at 12 noon on Wednesday, 5th November. It's worth clicking into the applicant resources section on www. cao.ie to view the CAO video guides which will tell you everything you need to know about preparing and submitting your application. It's also advisable to do a practice run on the 'demo application' before beginning the official form.

TWO SECTIONS

The application form itself can be divided into two sections, namely general information and course choices. As the form is interactive you can continue to work on it until the normal closing date of 1st February. If you open your CAO account by 5pm on 20th January 2026 you pay a discounted application fee of €35. Thereafter, the fee increases to €50 until the closing date of 5pm on 1st February.

REGISTER

To register on the CAO system, go online to www.cao.ie and click on 'Apply.' Enter your personal details and supply a valid email address. Tick the qualifications and assessment sections that are relevant to you. For the vast majority of applicants that will be the Irish Leaving Certificate Exams (1985-2026). Select your payment option, which for the vast majority of applicants is credit or debit card. Create your password. Now click on 'Proceed with application' to obtain your 2026 CAO application number, which begins with 26. You have now opened your interactive CAO account.

LOG ON

Whenever you wish to log on to your account go to www.cao.ie and click on 'My application.' You will be asked to enter your CAO number, your date of birth and your password. You can complete the remaining steps at your leisure. It's a good idea to leave the Level 8 and Level 7/6 course lists unfilled until you have completed your course research.

ADD COURSES

Add your Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degree) and Level 7/6 (Ordinary Bachelor Degree/ Higher Certificate) course choices by 1st February. To do this, click on "Add Level 8 course choices" and/or click on "Add Level 7/6 course choices." You may apply for a maximum of ten course choices on each list. List your courses based on your genuine order of preference. At the offer stage, you will be offered the course highest up on your list(s) that you are entitled to, if any.

REQUIREMENTS

Every college has general entry requirements. For Leaving Cert applications for a Level 8 course, the minimum entry requirements are normally six subjects with at least Grade H5 in two subjects and at least Grade O6/H7 in four other subjects. Each college also requires certain subjects in the chosen six. For example, the University of Limerick (UL) asks for Mathematics, Irish or another language, and English. On the other hand, University College Cork asks for Irish and English. Many courses also require specific entry requirements. Mary Immaculate College of Education (MICE) requires at least a H4 in Irish for its Primary Teaching degrees while

UCC asks for a minimum of H4 in Biology for its Genetics degree. General and specific entry requirements for all courses can be found on the CAO home page. Just click on the "Courses" box and follow the instructions.

USER FRIENDLY

The CAO application form is straight forward and user friendly. The most critical step, of course, is the completion of your two course lists. The more research you do the more satisfied you will be with your course choices. For the next few months make good use of the CAO Handbook 2026, which is in PDF and personalised digital format. Identify the courses in which you have an interest. It's a good idea to record the codes and course titles, on a paper or digital notebook, for future reference.

GUIDE

This column will stand shoulder to shoulder with you in order to guide you safely through the 2026 CAO application process, with advice on career profiling, appropriate course selection and current employment trends. In order to be as informed as possible and starting now, devote an hour or two each week to course research. Aim to have about fifteen choices for each list at hand by Christmas. Then by mid to late January you'll be in a strong position to select your top ten preferences on each list in order of your choice.

Working Families at Loreto Convent Deserve the Same Urgency as Any National Crisis Lack of Affordable Homes and Long Term Lets in Killarney MD

As Mayor of Killarney Municipal District I want to highlight the lack of affordable homes and long term letting properties in Killarney.

Over the last 2 weeks I've been working with the fourteen families living at Loreto Convent in Killarney who have been served with notices to quit their homes. These are not transient tenants, they are long-term residents, many of whom have built their lives, raised their children, and contributed to our local community and economy for years. Yet now, due to a large investment company terminating their leases, they face the harsh reality of having nowhere to go.

This situation is not just a tragedy for these families, it is a stark reminder of a much deeper crisis in County Kerry and across Ireland: the chronic lack of affordable homes and long-term rental properties.

As of this week there are only three properties available for long-term letting in Killarney on Daft.ie, and just eight in Tralee. That's a total of eleven homes available across two major towns, in a county with thousands of families who live and work here year-round. It has been over twenty years since Killarney last offered an affordable home to those who need one most, That is simply unacceptable.

The working-class family, the people who keep our towns alive, are being squeezed from every direction. The cost of living continues to rise, yet



access to stable housing continues to fall. For an average family of four in County Kerry, the income threshold to qualify for social housing is €38,500 per year (or €738 per week). If you earn even slightly above that, you're excluded, and yet you also won't qualify for cost rental schemes unless your net household income is below €59,000.

These limits leave thousands of hard-working families trapped in the middle, earning too much to qualify for support, but not enough to secure a home in the private market. The system is leaving them behind.

Meanwhile, we have seen how quickly government action can be mobilised in times of emergency. In 2024, modular units were built nationwide for emergency accommodation for Ukrainian refugees , and while the initial estimated cost per unit was €200,000, the final cost was €442,000 per unit, more than

120% over budget. While those efforts were necessary and compassionate, it shows that when the State identifies a crisis, it can act swiftly and decisively.

Well, I say this clearly: the situation at Loretto Convent is also an emergency. Fourteen families losing their homes, with nowhere to go in the local area, demands immediate action. These families deserve the same urgency, compassion, and resources that have been mobilised in other crises.

Killarney is a proud, hard-working town. But if we continue on this path, where people who contribute to our community are forced out because they cannot afford to stay, then we risk hollowing out the very heart of our society. I am calling on both Kerry County Council which I want to commend them for their engagement and attention so far and the Department of Housing to treat the Loretto Convent case as an emergency, to intervene, and to bring forward immediate measures to secure housing for these families. We must also see a renewed national focus on building affordable homes and ensuring that long-term letting remains viable for those who live and work in our communities.

Our people deserve security, stability, and a place to call home. Anything less is a failure of the system.

Councillor Cahill calls for stronger water safety measures and wider provision of life buoys across Kerry and on private lands

Fianna Fáil Councillor Tommy Cahill has called for a renewed focus on water safety across County Kerry, urging the Council to ensure an adequate number of life buoys are provided and maintained at all beaches, rivers, lakes, and waterbased recreational areas, and to make life buoys available free of charge to landowners whose properties border waterways regularly accessed by the public. At the October meeting of Kerry County Council, Cllr. Cahill said

County Council, Cllr. Cahill said the motion was about "taking a proactive approach to a very real danger."

"As councillors, our first responsibility is public safety," he said. "Whether at a beach in Ballybunion or Caherdaniel, a riverbank in Killorglin, or a lakeshore in Killarney, accidents can and do happen in seconds. Life buoys save lives, and their presence is vital."

Cllr. Cahill specifically highlighted

areas such as Cromane and the Flesk River, noting that Kerry's strong connection with its coastline, lakes, and rivers also brings risks that must be carefully managed. "In Kerry, we have deep ties to our rivers, lakes, and coastlines. These waters are part of our identity, our recreation, and indeed our livelihoods. But with their beauty comes risk. The provision and maintenance of life buoys is, in essence, lifesaving, it can mean the difference between life and death in a moment of crisis."

According to figures provided in response to his motion, Kerry County Council currently maintains approximately 414 lifebuoys across the county, primarily at Blue Flag beaches, designated bathing areas, councilmanaged piers, harbours, and public walkways such as Tralee Bay Amenity Walkway. These are subject to scheduled inspection

and repair throughout the year. However, the Council confirmed that it does not currently provide life buoys at privately owned or privately accessed watercourses or lakes, due to the resources required for ongoing inspection and maintenance.

Cllr. Cahill said this gap needs to be addressed through community partnership, "I am calling on the Council to go a step further, to offer life buoys free of charge to landowners whose properties border waterways frequently used by the public. These landowners often find themselves in a grey area of responsibility, and we can empower them to help protect lives without placing an unfair burden on them."

He concluded, "If this motion helps save even one life, then it will have been worth it. That life could be someone's child, friend, or neighbour, and that possibility alone should be enough for us to act. The potential impact is immeasurable

Hurricane Melissa a stark reminder of the need to ramp up Ireland's resilience to extreme weather - Pa Daly TD

Sinn Féin spokesperson for Climate, the Environment and Energy, Pa Daly TD, has called on the government to urgently address Ireland's vulnerability to extreme weather and to ramp up climate mitigation and adaptation efforts.

Deputy Daly also highlighted the critical need for states to continue to cooperate on climate action, pointing to the importance of the upcoming COP summit due to take place in Brazil next month. Teachta Daly said:

"Hurricane Melissa has wreaked devastation and destruction in its wake.

"The storm has now made landfall in eastern Cuba after pummelling Jamaica as one of the strongest Atlantic hurricanes on record.

"Approximately 735,000 were evacuated from their homes in advance of the storm.

"Authorities have said Jamaica is now a 'disaster area'. Many homes, businesses and even entire communities were wiped out. Hospitals have been decimated.

Farmland is destroyed. And tragically, they are expecting loss of life.

"In southwestern Jamacia, the parish of St. Elizabeth is now 'underwater' according an official, with over half a million homes without power.

"Storm Éowyn last year demonstrated just how vulnerable and ill equipped we are to deal with these types of extreme weather events, which are only going to grow in scale and intensity.

"Entire communities the length and breadth of this country were left devastated. Hundreds of thousands of homes were left without power for days. For many areas of the country, things felt they were at a complete standstill for days, even weeks, on end.

"However, Storm Éowyn paled in comparison to Hurricane Melissa. "Therefore, it serves as a stark warning to small island nations like Ireland to massively ramp up our efforts to become resilient to increasingly frequent extreme weather of this magnitude.



"Storm Éowyn last year demonstrated just how vulnerable and ill equipped we are to deal with these types of extreme weather events, which are only going to grow in scale

"Report after report consistently says that government is not doing enough. It's time they sat up and listened.

"Similarly, we have seen a rolling back of the green agenda particularly at an international level, with President Trump extracting the US from the Paris Agreement.

"The upcoming COP therefore represents an important opportunity to demonstrate the

world's continued efforts to tackle the climate emergency.

"The impact of climate change will remain the same where President Trump believes it is real or not.

"Therefore, I am calling on the Irish Government to do all in its power at COP to achieve continued international cooperate on climate action and to advocate that poorer nations, in particular small island nations, are supported to mitigate and adapt to climate change."

Wastewater Facilities in Kerry

The fact that many Wastewater Treatment Plants in Kerry communities are either non-existent or are working at capacity including Glenbeigh, makes the announcement of the €600,000 successful upgrade to the Kilgarvan facility all the more welcome according to Fianna Fáil TD Michael Cahill.

"We need such upgrades as this very welcome development in Kilgarvan, all over Kerry and new builds as well, to bring our facilities up to a 21st century standard. House building and business developments are being blocked and the health and safety of our population is at risk, due to the failure to have acceptable water treatment in every community" stated Deputy Cahill.

"I have been banging the drums about this issue for many years now and it is disappointing to see how slow the processes are. Beaufort was allocated €6m in funding for a long overdue Wastewater Treatment system there 2 years ago and I have been pressing hard for the work there to be expedited. I have been informed in a response to a Parliamentary Question and by Uisce Eireann that it will take another 7 years before there is a scheme there and this is simply not good enough, especially in the midst of a housing crisis " said the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People and Tourism. .

"Utilities such as Water Supply, Wastewater Treatment, Electricity, etc, are vital to every day living and therefore should have a speedier and more efficient planning and development process and I will be calling on the relevant Ministers to to make this a reality" stated Deputy Cahill.

"I have been pushing with the Minister and at the highest level of Government for Constructed Wetlands to be developed around County Kerry. Over 40 of our villages are unsewered. Constructed Wetlands are faster and cheaper to develop and are environmentally friendly. Where extra capacity is required, you can put in 2 or 3" added Michael Cahill TD.

Minister Foley Welcomes €663,000 Climate Action Fund for Kerry Community Groups

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed confirmation of the allocation of €663,000 to Kerry County Council under the Community Climate Action Programme.

"This is fantastic news for Kerry," said Minister Foley. "Everyone wants to do their part for the climate, and it's crucial that our communities have the support they need to make a real difference."

"I strongly encourage community groups across Kerry to apply for this fund. It offers huge potential, and I want to see it put to the best possible use for the benefit of our communities."


Tidy Towns groups, residents' associations, voluntary and not-forprofit organisations, sports clubs, and community centres not owned by the local authority can now apply for funding. A total of €663,000 has been allocated to Kerry County Council as part of the €27 million Climate Action Programme.



COUNTY FINAL 1948

I was tempted last week to do a piece about Dingle's last County Final win. It wasn't a Bishop Moynihan win, Bishop Denis Moynihan didn't present that Cup to the Kerry County Board until 1953.

1948

It was a fairly momentous year anyway in Irish history. The Republic of Ireland Act was passed, making Ireland a republic. Emaon de Valera and Fianna Fáil lost a General Election in February after sixteen years in power – De Valera was a great leader in many ways, but his isolationist economic policies were biting fairly hard. John A. Costello, leading Ireland's first ever coalition government, was taoiseach. However, the relatively new Clann na Poblachta Party of Seán McBride's, backboned by staunch republicans, did not get the expected surge, with only ten TDs elected. John Flynn and Honor Crowley (FF) and Patrick Palmer (FG) represented Kerry South.

The biggest events politically worldwide were the assassination of Gandhi in January and the foundation of the State of Israel. Obviously, that British construct called 'India' was going to fracture into its component kingdoms of yore, while Israel was going to be a bastion of peace and understanding.....

It doesn't look like it was a great year for movies. 'The Treasure of the Sierra Madre' seems about as big as it got, with 'Easter Parade' and 'The Red Shoes' (never heard of it) also popular. Norman Mailer's 'The Quick and the Dead' was the biggest book of the year – George Orwell finished '1984' that year but it wasn't published until 1949.

Ireland sent a big contingent to the 1948 Summer Olympics, but a dispute between the governing bodies of athletics regarding the selection of athletes from Northern Ireland meant that a lot of athletes couldn't participate. Kerry beat Cork in the Munster Final, but had no answer to Paraic Carney, Peter Solan, and Tom Langan as Mayo won the All Ireland semi-final to Mayo, who lost out in their turn to reigning champions Cavan in the final.

Dingle – it was drawn from almost all of West Kerry except Castlegregory, not just Dingle

town – would have been ranked as serious contenders before any ball was thrown in. Between 1937 and 1947 they had amassed five County titles and lost three more. They had also backboned Kerry to five All Ireland titles in that period. The likes of Paddy Bawn Brosnan, Tim Brosnan, Bill Casey, Bill Dillon, Tom Long (he would move to Killarney as a teacher and become a stalwart with Dr. Crokes) and Tom 'Gega' O'Connor were household names. For a lot of Kerry GAA supporters, they still are.

It was a long championship, starting on April 18th and the final being played on September 12th. Imagine having that luxury now! Dingle were in a group with Austin Stacks, Kerins O'Rahillys, and Castlegregory. They showed serious scoring power, beating Rahillys by 3-7 to 1-4 and Castlegregory by 2-10 to 2-8 (those were big totals for that time) and getting a walkover from an already eliminated Austin Stacks. That meant that Dingle and Rahillys both had two wins in the group. They were drawn with byes into the semi-finals, while the other top two in each group went into quarterfinals. Interestingly, I see that the two group winners were drawn against each other, as were the two second placed teams (nowadays first would play second in the other group).

Killarney saw off Castleisland after a replay. That great Kerryman reporter, P.F., noted afterwards that "at one time a fight between players (broke out) which several spectators did their utmost to embroil themselves in. The Cunty Board, to avoid a near-riot, must seriously consider abolishing sideline seats in this venue (Tralee)". P.F. was never one to mince his words! To be fair, Killarney and Castleisland would win the next two County Championships, and spectator involvement was not mentioned.

Dingle beat Killarney by 4-5 to 1-4 in the semifinal, while Shannon Rangers defeated Rahillys by 3-5 to 1-4. Shannon Rangers had some serious players on their side, Gerald Stack, Eddie and Denis Dowling, Gus Cremins, Mick Finucane, Johnny Walsh, and of course, Kerry minor Jim Brosnan of Moyvane. Con's son would go on to win senior All Irelands and, in my opinion, lay the groundwork for modern Kerry football in his time as County Chairman. According to Pat O'Shea's excellent 'Face the Ball: Records of the Kerry Senior Football Championships 1889 - 1998', "Most Rev. Dr. Heffernan, Bishop of Zanzibar, threw in the ball to start the final". John William Henderson. of course, was a native of Kilmanikan, near Abbeyfeale, and was ordained in Kerry (don't mind the "of course" there; I just googled it. I wouldn't be well versed in the Bishops of Zanzibar).

It was actually a very one sided final, disappointingly so. Dingle had a very strong wind and basically had it wrapped up by half-time, leading by 2-7 to 0-0. Shannon Rangers did fight back in the second half but lost out on a 2-10 to 0-5 final scoreline, with Tom Long lifting the Cup.

games like these are as much about a culture as a sport. As for the game itself? To be honest, I didn't fancy it. I was very critical of the Irish womens' performance against Wales - don't be thinking that I am going to be eating any of my words here; that really was a narky mismatch of a display. Now, with promotion of the line, they were facing a side ranked seven places above them in the world rankings. Oh, and that was without Louise Quinn, Niamh Fahey, Diane Caldwell, Megan Campbell, Áine O'Gorman, and Karen Duggan. A new management team, while the old management team were in public dispute with the FAI. Although, given that the previous management had also ended in acrimonious and highly public circumstances, the players are probably used to that.

To be fair, Carla Ward wasn't actually drawing from a bad hand of players. Hayes, Stapleton,Littlejohn, Sheva, Carusa, and Denise O'Sullivan (I consider her very under-rated, although her recent displays may have altered that perception now). Oh, and Katie McCabe. Maybe a bit too fiery for her own good, and her left back/false nine type of game doesn't sit easily in any template, but when she clicks she would enhance any team.

And Ireland did click. I know next to nothing about Carla Ward tactical preferences or player management, and I'm sceptical of how much a national manager can do in a time frame of a few days, but something really clicked here. Granted, Belgium were a little bit tentative early on and Ireland were able to grow in confidence,

but Ireland were very good. And I don't mean the individual little bits of brilliance that usually masks a hit-and-hope approach; I mean Ireland were spraying long passes taking players on, making support runs. We love our crunching tackles as Irish fans – I'm a bit of a heretic; I love when our play is good enough to render them unnecessary, or at least rare.

Ireland were genuinely excellent here – when last did our mens' team play like this? - and deserved to take the lead when McCabe calmly slotted a penalty. Full value for a 1-0 lead at the break.

Early in the second half Ireland coughed up a poor enough goal. Grace Moloney is a very good keeper; she won't like watching replays of that one looping above her head. A test of character for the girls in green now.

In the 52nd minute we took the lead again. I don't exactly know how to describe it. I do think that McCabe was aiming for goal, I don't think it was meant as a cross or anything like that. I'd have said it was an over-ambitious effort from out on the left wing - except that it dipped over a wrongfooted keeper, hit the post, and bounced back in off the falling goalkeeper's back. Technically an own goal, because the ball would not have gone in without that goalkeeper's intervention, but I'd credit that goal equally to McCabe and Lady Luck. Ireland were flying now, and McCabe drilled home another ten minutes later with a more conventional finish. 3-1. Belgium were at sixes and sevens now, and coughed up another four minutes later, Marissa Sheva's blistering finish was the best of the night.

Ireland did cough up a goal to Belgium in the 82nd minute. Taking a two goal lead to Belgium for the second leg? My faith hasn't been completely restored, a more composed Belgium on their own ground could score three, but I'd have snapped your hand off for this result before tip-off.

of giddiness in the RTE studio – and I usually like RTE's coverage of soccer games..

Only then Belgium scored another goal, and that was a really bad one to cough up. Caitlin Hayes coughed up possession (look, she had a good game overall and is one of our best defenders, but that has to go down as a mistake). Worse was to follow, as Wullaert looked up, saw Moloney off her line, and superbly lifted it over her.

Level pegging at half-time. I won't lie; I felt that the momentum had completely shifted. Ireland were under the cosh and I felt that more mistakes were inevitable. In fairness, Ireland showed more composure than I had expected, but so did Belgium. The game was poised on a knife edge now, and this is where the better teams began to pull away a little bit and pile on more pressure. And – admittedly very much to my surprise - that was Ireland. They weren't panicky, they weren't frantically belting the all clear. They were trusting each other and trying to create things rather than force them. Even if we had lost, I would have come away feeling very positive about that aspect. It was the Belgian keeper who was forced into making saves, Murphy, Sheva, and Caruso all testing

In the 90th minute the breakthrough arrived. It was deserved on the balance of play, Abbie Larkin pouncing to fire a loose ball home.

Not only will Ireland compete at A level in Europe, but we are now also guaranteed at least a play-off place for the next World Cup. th the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT **CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY** COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry

County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect" Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008 This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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














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Healy-Raes welcome over €92,000 for Kerry community safety project under national scheme

Minister for Forestry, Farm Safety and Horticulture Michael Healy-Rae TD and Deputy Danny Healy-Rae have welcomed today's announcement by Minister for Justice Jim O'Callaghan of funding under the 2025 Community Safety Fund, which will see €92,260 allocated to the "Call of the Wild" project by New Wave Adventure Therapy in Kerry.

NOVEMBER GARDENING

Now that November is almost here, it is a great time of the year for planting bare rooted trees, hedging, fruit bushes, roses and rootballed conifers.

The bare rooted planting seasons lasts from November until March. The reason for this is that the trees and hedging are dormant at this time of the year, so you can't really do any damage when you are lifting or planting.

When planting bare rooted as a general rule, plant about three plants per metre, roses can also be purchased and planted bare rooted as can fruit trees and fruit bushes.

The main thing when planting bare rooted trees and hedging is that when you purchase

them and if you are not going to plant them straight away you will

have to heel them into the ground; by this, I mean you will just have to dig a hole and put the plants in and cover the roots with earth to stop the roots drying out.

With hedging plants, roses and fruit bushes, they will usually come in bundles and will be tied together, so you don't have to separate them, just put the whole bundle in the ground.
